ASC News Letter . . .
1959 Conservation Reserve Program (Soll Bank)
As of this date it appears that the 1959 Program will be available for wheat and cotton producers next year. However, the Conservation Reserve Bank Program will be in operation for 1959. This part of the program is available to all farm operators in this county. Listed below are the most important details of the 1959 Program.
1. Any part of land is eligible for the Conservation Reserve.
2. A request for payment of a maximum annual fee of \$10.00 per acre must be filed by not later than September 30, 1958.
3. After the county committee has established the rate for your farm, you have until October 17, 1958 to file an application for a contract.
4. Provided you wish to place this program on all of your eligible cropland, you will receive an additional 10% of the regular payment rate.
5. An approved perennial cover must be established on the designated acreage provided an adequate cover does not exist at this time.
6. The contract period may be for 3, 5 or 10 years.
7. Where an approved cover is established, the Federal cost-share of approximately 70% of the required cover will be made.
8. The designated acreage can be harvested and stocked throughout the year.
9. It will be necessary to establish a Soll Bank Base for each farm unless the entire eligible cropland is placed in the reserve. The Soll Bank Base will be determined from an average of base crops harvested on the farm in the years of 1957 and 1958.
10. Farmers with existing contracts may receive additional acreage in Conservation Reserve for 1959.

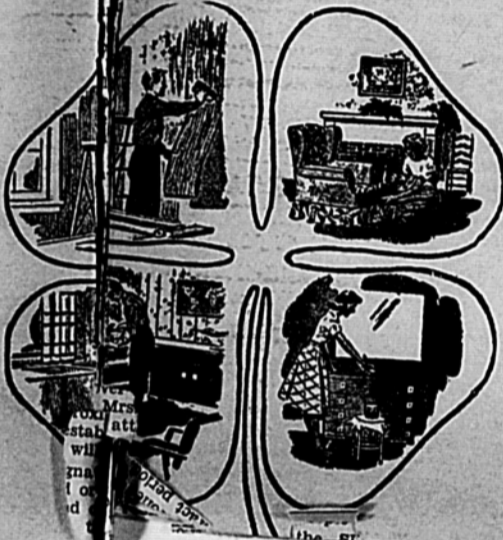
