Persons wishing to address comments to the Board will be asked to complete an information card indicating their name, address, county of residence, and whether they desire to speak for or against the proposed site. In a burst of young love, most of us marry and start our families, full of high hopes and expectations. Before long, however, we find ourselves mired in jobs, children and responsibilities, and the joy can easily begin to dim. There is much advice available on how to "rekindle the fire". The theory being that if old romantic feelings can be fanned into flame again, family life will be stronger and more satisfying.

. The theory is partially true, but doesn't go far enough. For the most part, it is not the "heat" itself that we want, but something related to it, something richer and deeper. Why does falling in love feel so good? It's because all of a sudden someone else is there who thinks we're special, needs us, compliments us, and pays attention to us.

In love, a vital and primary human experience happens: We actively affirm another person, and that person actively affirms us. The result is a tremendous sense of hope, joy, and wellbeing. Again, and again, studies have shown that this active affirmation is what we really want and need in our relationships. This

family life we receive our basic sense of self-worth, our confidence to function in the world, and our ability to form intimate relationships.

A strong family then is one that enables each of the individuals to affirm his or her own self-worth and to do the same for others. The family, as psychologist Virginia Satir aptly puts it, is a "peoplemaking" unit. Its major purpose is to create strong, healthy individuals who can deal with others respectfully and confidently and move through life

County Business Is Big Business

By Viola Payne

The Eastland Count Budget adopted by the County Commissioners for 1990 is \$3,470,574, a sharp rise from the (est.) 1989 expenditures of \$2,964,435. The 1990 fiscal year began Oct. 1, 1989.

This rise follows several years of an attempt by County Officials to "hold the line" on expenditures to around \$2,800,000. This total was first projected for the 1987 budget. By 1988 expenditures were \$2,870,193.99, on their way up.

Eastland County is still in better shape than many counties. A financial statement ending with September, 1989 showed that the County had \$2,062,838.34 in cash on hand - a little more than most of us! This was slightly above a Sept. 1988 statement listing a balance of cash \$2,051,696.06. In 1990 a deficit in the Road and Bridge funds however.

The "Cash on Hand" statements do not reflect what is available for general spending, however. Many of the assets are in dedicated funds such as Road and Bridge, State Lateral Funds, etc., and these can only be used for

expenses - everything from Law Enforcement, salaries, insurances, courthouse maintenance, etc. The current General Fund on hand is \$995,733.98, up from the \$819,843.75 reported at the

end of September, 1988. While operating expenses have been going up, revenues also came up some. Tax increases as well as increases in fines, forfeitures, fees, law enforcement revenues and various other departments brought in more money. The most recent tax increase for one year (1989 to 1990) was from .305 to .33039 cents per \$100 valuation.

The collection of delinquent taxes has apparently increased, probably due to heavy penalties by law and the work of a law firm in contacting taxpayers.

As more money came in last year it was generally offset by more expense. State mandated regulations cost plenty, and there was increased expense on law enforcement and the Courts. For one thing, the state mandated an extra jailer for the County Jail here.

The Commissioners also assumed an obligation to pay part of the cost of ambulance service to the whole county And there was no more Revenue Sharing money for a

buffer. The 1990 budget also re-

flects a raise in pay for all County Officials and employees. After deferring raises for two years (except for some special requests) the Commissioners granted .30 cents per hour raises for all County employees and \$60 each pay period (each 14 days) for all County Officials.

A number of the Departments listed bring in a large amount of revenue, such as the County Clerk's office, the Tax Assessor's Office, the County and District Courts,

Some Departments receive partial pay from the state, and are not totally funded by the County. The county furnishes offices for several statefunded agencies

Another item this year: The Sheriff's Department is using a different method of accounting than was used in previous years. The Jail Department's financial records are now kept separately from that of the Sheriff's Department.

know that two factors of the law were to have gone into action in 1990 and 1991. January 1, 1990, the maximum a person would have had to pay out of pocket for part B (the doctor's and care provider section) would have become \$1370. We have seen some figures indicating that this will go as high as \$1500. On January 1, 1991, Medicare would have started paying 50 percent of outpatient prescription drug expenses when they exceeded \$600 a year. This portion of the catastrophic law was going to be very expensive and we had no ideas how much it would have cost the medicare plan. Neither do we know if Congress is going to "knock out" the prescription plan. Another item in the plan concerned entering of the skilled nursing facility. We were in hopes this segment of the plan could be retained. You could enter the skilled nursing home from the home paying \$22.50 for eight days expanding the time to 150 days (the eight days included) Medicare would have picked up the tab

for the difference between the \$22.50 plus full amount of 142 days. We are fearful this will be taken from the plan as once again it is very expensive. QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, it







Delegation Meets TDC Selection Team At Eastland Airport

By Viola Payne

On the prison protest Oct. 25, all I can do is write my own observations. When I heard that members of the TDC selection team were due in Eastland by plane between 11-11:30 a.m. I decided to go to the Airport.

I was not assigned to do this by the Eastland County Newspapers. For one thing -Wednesday was my day off. So I was going more as an interested citizen.

This had already been a week full of action, I reflected. After months of asking for a vote on the prison, the opponents finally had the \$700,000 land purchase question on a ballot for Nov. 18.

As I arrived at the Eastland Airport I saw a number of cars and pickups near the terminal, with a Police car to the south. Around 60-70 people were standing or walking about, many carrying "No Prison" signs.

There were people of all ages, ranging from babies in strollers to spry elderly folk. An assortment of Abilene television newsmen were pushing heavy equipment and conducting interviews.

A car with two or more Chamber of Commerce Redcoats drove away. I wondered where the rest of them were and if the protesters had been given the correct information about the plane. Did they really think they were going to get near the TDC selection group?

Suddenly the situation seemed strange to me. The word "protesters" was supposed to mean people away off somewhere else. It was sad to realize that salt-of-theearth Eastland County folk now felt so alienated from the local establishment, County government and state people. that they felt they had to leave their farms and businesses and walk around in public with sings in order to be heard.

son muttered. "Dirty tricks again," another added.

About this time Eastland Mayor C.W. Hoffmann drove into the area, stopped, and went over to speak to Eastland Police Chief Lyndell Underwood. He stayed briefly and then left.

After several minutes Earl Bradley came by and said: "Let's go find out what is going on here." I walked with him to where Chief Underwood and several other people

were standing. When Bradley asked about the plane, the Chief replied that he had received word that the plane would not be in at 11:30 a.m., as scheduled.

When asked why the crowd hadn't been informed of that before, I understood the Chief to say that one had asked him about it before.

As news of this delay there.

Someone mentioned there was supposed to be a lunch for the officials at the Eastland Chamber of Commerce. He added: "You can bet your bottom dollar none of us are invited!"

The crowd dispersed, and I went back to Eastland. It was past 12:30 p.m. when I decided to check out the prison site at Flatwood before going home.

As I drove south from Eastland I realized what a beautiful day it was. There was a faint blue haze in the air, and oak and wild china leaves were beginning to burn

taxpayer. After 1 p.m. one man went to a house and made a call, and came back announcing that Dr. Charles Barnes said that people from the TDC might arrive late in the afternoon, or the next morning. I decided to go home. I

drove back a different way down a pretty country lane with hedgerows. Finally I reached a patch of large old oak trees - remnants of a forest which had probably once covered Flatwood. No confu-

I didn't know whether the people protesting the prison would ever find the TDC officials. Human being often lack communication, and have strange ways of dealing with each other.

But the protesters, and other Eastland County citizens, would at least get to give opinions on the prison at the polls on Nov. 18. That was a lot more than had happened in some other counties, including my old home county of Scurry.


