### Hall Of Remarks by Herrel Hallmark

I HOPE YOU had a safe and fun Memorial Day weekend with no accidents of any kind. Several stores in Cisco were open on Monday, but a number were also closed.

THUNDERSTORMS rolled into this area on Monday afternoon and also again Tuesday afternoon, although no bad weather was actually experienced in Cisco. There was a small amount of rain both evenings, as well as thunder and lightning.

A tornado was reported to have been in Monday evening's storm south of Cisco and was sighted east of Rising Star.

CISCO CITY swimming pool opened on Tuesday of this week, instead of the hoped for opening of Monday.

A number of persons took advantage of the good weekend weather and went swimming, fishing or boating at area lakes.

WITH SUMMER upon us and a large number of persons heading for area lakes, it would be wise for everyone to be extra careful while boating. Boaters should be extra cautious when near the shore and watch for swimmers, especially young children. In turn, persons swimming in a lake should watch for boaters coming toward the shore.

Governor Bill Clements has designated June 1 through 7 as Safe Boating Week in Texas and pointed out that "observance of water and boating safety rules becomes more important as boat users increase."

The Texas Safety Association in Austin notes that boat owners now number 531,781, according to Texas registrations. This is a significant increase in recreational craft. Last year there were 265 reported boating accidents in Texas resulting in 66 fatalities, 84 injuries and \$323,500, of property damage. The primary cause of these accidents was collision with another boat. Collision with a fixed object ranked second.

Captain Joe Denniston of the Division 7 Coast Guard Auxiliary said, "The most prominent cause of a collision is failure to post a lookout," adding, "Collisions also occur in periods of poor visibility."

Statistics show capsizing to be the third factor in boating accidents leading to death. The danger of capsizing which is mainly caused from improper loading or overloading of the boat or unfavorable weather conditions emphasizes the importance of using personal flotation devices. "Everyone should

Auxiliary teams will check a boat at the dock, marina, lake or owner's home explaining use and importance of the necessary items a safe boat should have.

In Clements proclamation he stated, "Safety and accident prevention behavior will save lives and increase the quality of water recreation for all Texans." The Texas Safety Association joins the governor in urging all citizens to enjoy boating safely.

## Garl Gorr Awarded Knight Of The York Cross Of Honour

Garl Dean Gorr of Cisco has been awarded the designation of Knight of the York Cross of Honour, it was reported. This honorary degree, highest in the York Rite of Freemasonry, is conferred only on those who have held the highest office in each of the four bodies of the rite. ## STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

**AUSTIN** — For awhile some thought they were hiding out in a Winnebago Mobile Home. Not a likely place to find a state senator with only a week left in the session.

And some people had the sneaking suspicion that the 12 missing senators were spread from Mexico to Las Vegas, from Houston to five minutes driving time from the State Capitol Building.

But wherever they were, 12 senators were not in the Texas Senate last week—at least four and a half days of that week.

What that meant, of course, is that the Senate, left without a quorum, had to close its doors and put a halt to the business. The 12 missing senators had set out to do just that.

### "Spoiled Children"

The 19 remaining senators described their absent colleagues as "deserters," and accused them of being "on strike." Even Gov. Bill Clements threw in his two cents worth by saying they were acting like spoiled children and needed a good spanking.

The whole episode, charged Sen. Carl Parker of Port Arthur, had been caused by Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and his parliamentary slight of hand in an attempt to get SB 1149—basically an election bill—passed by the Senate. The bill was labeled a "Trojan Horse" by Sen.

Lloyd Doggett and few disagreed.

Hobby's plan was to get SB 1149 (that would have put the secretary of state in charge of funds now ruled over by county party chairmen) out of the Senate and into the House where it could be substituted. The substitute, so the plan would go, would be a measure providing for a split presidential primary. That primary, in March and separate from the regular state primaries, would cost the taxpayers \$5 to \$7 million. But besides that, backers of the idea were quick to point out, it would give Texas one of the earliest presidential primaries and would enable the state to have more clout over critical national issues such as energy. Not so, said the absent senators.

And when Hobby announced that he would abandon the traditional order of business, it was obvious, the missing senators charged, that what was at stake was political hides and not the influence of the state on national matters.

### Help Connally

Who the split presidential primary would help and who it would hurt is a complicated story. Most agree that a split primary, non-binding as to party, would enhance the presidential hopes of John Connally. Others say a presidential primary on the same day as the regular state

primaries would probably endanger the seats of some incumbent conservative Democrats.

What some called a "desperation move" on Hobby's part meant that it would take only a majority vote to bring up a bill in the Senate, instead of the traditional two-thirds. It was the first time Hobby had ever used such a tactic since becoming lieutenant governor in 1973. The last time anyone could remember the Senate going to a majority vote was in 1961.

When the 12 senators learned of Hobby's intentions, they decided the only thing left to do—the filibuster, which they had tried against SB 1149, had proven to be ineffective—was to abandon the Senate chamber.

### Call on Senate

Hobby retaliated by putting a call on the Senate—the first since 1969. The Senate Sgt.-at-Arms, the Department of Public Safety and the Texas Rangers were called in to locate and return the truant senators.

Understandably, Hobby had started calling the group, "The Killer Bees." And when a statewide search failed to turn up even one of the hiding senators, almost every newspaper sang out with the same refrain: "Where are the Killer Bees?"

Hobby was more than just irritated that state police couldn't locate "12 prominent citizens of the state." Those 12—The Killer Bees—were Sens. Doggett, Babe Schwartz, Ron Clower, Parker, Bob Vale, Raul Longoria, Gene Jones, Chet Brooks, Glenn Kothmann, Oscar Mauzy, Bill Patman and Carlos Truan.

At one point during the

search for the senators, the DPS nabbed a man they thought was Gene Jones at his home in Houston. Only after the man had been helicoptered back to Austin, did troopers learn that they had grabbed the wrong man—Gene Jones' brother, Clayton Jones.

Clayton said, innocently of course, he went along just to get to ride on a helicopter. But it was later learned, that while one Jones (the right one) was slipping out the back door, another Jones (the wrong one) was being escorted out the front door by the DPS.

### Deal Finally Struck

While the police chased the senators and the news media chased the police, Hobby and the Killer Bees quietly began negotiations. When the senators returned (to a packed senate gallery and chamber, to some boos and many cheers), it was clear what deal had been struck. The Killer Bees had forced Hobby to return to the two-thirds rule.

As soon as the Killer Bees took their seats, the Senate rushed back into action and passed more than 20 bills in one afternoon and evening. One of those bills was SB 1149. The measure was approved on second reading 17-14, meaning that if the 'nos' stood pat on the third and final reading of the bill, Hobby wouldn't even have enough votes to bring the legislation up for consideration.

Later, the Killer Bees admitted that nine of them had hidden out in a cramped garage apartment not more than five miles from the Capitol Building. Jones (Gene) had left the "bunker," as the Killer Bees called it, because of claustrophobia.

### Congressional Comment

WASHINGTON, D.C.—On May 16 the House of Representatives passed one of the most comprehensive conservation bills ever considered by the Congress—The Alaska Lands Act. If this legislation is also passed by the Senate and signed by the President, it will shut off much of

Alaska to economic development. Alaska's Outer Continental Shelf, with its large potential for oil and gas reserves (10 to 14 billion barrels), will remain unexplored. Under the provisions of this bill 130 million acres would be closed to mining. Development of

the world's second largest molybdenum deposit would be stopped. Other natural resources affected include large copper and coal deposits, tin, and cinnabar. Also 30 million acres would be closed to hunting.

Despite the fact that this state is 5000 miles away, this legislation will affect all of us. We are dependent on Alaska for large quantities of oil and gas production, many of our essential minerals, and much of our timber supply. This is a delicate issue trying to balance the needs of environment against the needs of the American people. The current House-passed version, in my opinion, does

not recognize this balance and precludes the production of many of our vital resources. The bill is opposed by all of Alaska's representatives in Congress. Much of their opposition is centered around the power of the Federal versus state governments. Are we going to allow Alaskans to rule Alaska or are we going to permit Washington to rule the people of this state? It is my belief that local problems can best be solved by the people in the individual states and communities. It is very difficult and inefficient for officials in Washington, most of whom have never been to Alaska, to dictate policy to the people of this area.

I supported a more even-handed approach that recognizes the needs of the national economy and the environment. The Breaux-Dingell bill was also supported by most Alaskans. This region of the Country should be protected—but it should be protected wisely. This legislation would have designated 85 million acres of wildlife refuges, 33 million acres as national parks, and 3 million acres of national forests. The bill would have also designated the National Petroleum Reserve as a wildlife refuge potentially subject to oil and gas exploration. The Arctic National Wildlife Ranges would be studied for seven years for its oil and gas potential. While oil and gas exploration could occur, congressional action would have been required to actually open the lands to oil and gas production.

Man can live in harmony with nature only if we recognize the needs of both.

# UIL Involves 1,000's Of Students

The current energy shortage apparently does not apply to Texas high school

students involved in University Interscholastic League activities.

Participation in the athletic, literary and academic, and music programs reached record high in 1978-79, reinforcing the long-standing contention that one of two graduation seniors in Texas has taken part in a UIL activity during his high school career.

"Certainly, the UIL has had its problems the past year, with the numerous court cases and occasional one-sided press coverage," said Dr. Bailey Marshall, League director. "But I would be remiss to emphasize the negative and overlook the positive aspects of our programs."

"More students were involved in UIL activities this past year than ever before and this participation by students on a fair and equal basis has been and remains our ultimate goal: This is the reason the UIL exists," he added.

Across the board, participation by schools remained stable, with the exception of girls' basketball, which increased by 55 schools. Football, girls' volleyball, boys' basketball, swimming and track and field remained on a per-school participation

basis near their 1977-78 marks.

Individual participation, however, continued its upward surge, with more than 42,000 playing football, 30,000 and 23,000 in boys' and girls' track respectively, and 23,000 and 19,000 in boys' and girls' basketball respectively.

Elsewhere, participation in boys' baseball neared the 16,000 mark, while more than 20,000 took part in boys' and girls' tennis. Approximately 8,000 participated in boys' golf and 4,000 in girls' golf. Swimming figures reached 3,500 for the boys' and 2,500 for the girls', while cross-country boys' and girls' totals sped near the 600 plus mark.

In the UIL music program, some 71,000 took part in choral competition while 40,000 participated in the solo and ensemble contest, and a whopping 215,000 joined bands and orchestras in UIL contests.

Participation in the UIL literary and academic contests was equally as impressive:

"The University Interscholastic League embraces more than a half-million participants and anytime you're working with a program having the scope this one has, you must operate under a system of uniformly enforced rules and regulations," Dr. Marshall said. "The school administrators and educators of Texas have voted for the support rules and governing inter-school competition. To abandon these rules would be detrimental to the educational benefits of the overall programs."

"It is wise to keep in mind that Texas school people, with the support and counsel

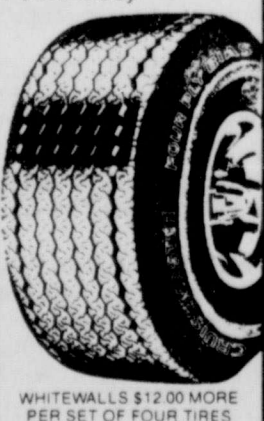

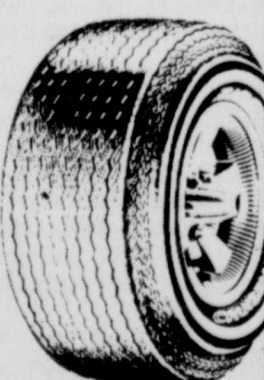

ONE OF THE big changes we noticed after returning home last weekend after being away two and a half months was the price of gasoline. The posted prices at service station was about 56 cents per gallon when we left town last March 14th. The lowest prices you see around town these days is about 75 cents per gallon.

All of which might make one wonder whether some kind of price controls would be justified.

**A N O T H E R** NOTICEABLE change is the color of the country-side. It was just beginning to show signs of green when we left. Thanks to good rains the green plants, trees and grass everywhere are very becoming... There are many nice gardens over town and they're beginning to yield food for dinner tables... Lawns and flowers are attractive. Wild

flowers are blooming in profusion.

**WHAT DID WE** think of Panama? A good many folks have asked that question. We don't hesitate to rate Panama the most interesting country we have visited in Central America. The climate is pretty much like here. It's pretty warm if you're out in the sun in the middle of the day, but nights are nice.

The temperatures varies no more than 20 degrees or so every day of the year. There is never any temperatures cooler than the upper 60s at night. And the thermometers sometimes go up to the low 90s at mid-day. This is year-around temperatures. Their growing season is about 365 days a year. Fruits, melons and garden vegetables grow all time.

**WHAT ABOUT** Panama taking over the Canal? That's

another question a lot of folks ask. As you know, Panama is slated to take over October 1, 1979, under a treaty signed last year. The congress is now debating the details of the turn-over - mostly about how much money the USA will pay Panama each year. You hear talk in Panama that the Canal will be blown up if the USA doesn't provide money.

Business men in Panama told us they're apprehensive about how the Canal will fare after the USA turns the keys over to that country. One Panamanian said his country's reaction was kind of like kicking you rich uncle in the teeth.

Perhaps it will work out for the best of all concerned. We believe that a good deal would have been for the USA to sell the Canal to Panama and let them pay the debt over the next 100 years - like the USA has paid Panama for the Canal during the past 100 years.

**RECENTLY, WE** saw a panel truck driving down a business street in Panama. A sign on the side read: **SITTON CAFE**. And cafe is Spanish for coffee. We asked the newspaper manager about it and he explained that a man named Sitton owns a big coffee plantation and processing plant.

Since we answer to the same name, he wanted to know if we'd like to meet the company owner. And a telephone call brought us an invitation to visit and meet Mr. Jose E. Sitton, presidente, Sitton Cafe.

Mr. JES keeps a thermos of coffee on his desk and serves it to visitors. (And it is good coffee). We compared backgrounds and family trees. He has lived in Panama all of his life but has roots in England and France. Our roots have been traced to England.

The Panama man has a plantation of some 2000 acres with a processing plant that mostly packs 100 pound bags of coffee beans for shipment to New Orleans. The plant has two roasting ovens that turn out coffee for the retail trade in Central America. He provided us with a 10-pound package of coffee when we departed.

**DURING OUR** stay in Panama, we attended services of the Fort Amador (Army) Post Chapel several Sundays. It's a nice church and services were

pleasant. The weekly bulletin for the last Sunday we attended contained this item:

## Registrations Still Being Accepted At Wood Lake

Enrollment at Camp Wood Lake, the Girl Scout camp located at Lake Brownwood State Park, has already surpassed the record attendance of the past summer and registrations are still being accepted. More than 120 campers are expected to attend the two 12-day sessions which begin June 10, and approximately 80 campers are expected for the four 5-day sessions.

The Girl Scout camping program is open to all girls who have completed first grade through twelfth grade, whether or not they have been previously registered in Girl Scout troops. Applications will be accepted until all places are filled.

Some programs are filled to capacity. Those still available are: Brownie (Pathfinder IIB) July 1-6; Cadette (Explorer I) June 10-22. All sessions of Junior programs are filled and a waiting list has been started. Special interest programs offered to Cadettes have drawn a 45 percent increase in enrollment this year. Earnings from the annual cookie sale this year allowed the purchase of two sailcraft that are the pride of the Girl Scout fleet. Installation of a photographic darkroom will make it possible for girls to develop their own camp pictures, do nature studies and

explore the world of photo-journalism.

Girl Scout camp director, Zola Moon, of Brownwood points out that, "Camping, first and always, is fun. Along with the fun, we try to mix in truly worthwhile learning experiences. We are proud of our swimming program because we believe the close supervision and instruction we offer provide an excellent learning environment in which girls can develop skills that may very well save their lives one day. While photography is not critical in the sense that swimming is, it provides an opportunity for developing creativity and self-expression as well as a potentially valuable skill." "Girl Scouting camping differs from other recreational programs in the sense that all elements of program are evaluated in terms of fun, educational value, and health and safety factors," Miss Moon said.

Camp Wood Lake provides summer camping opportunities for Girl Scouts in a 19-county area in central Texas, including Cisco. The camp and all of its facilities and year around maintenance costs are paid for with money the girls earn themselves during the annual Girl Scout cookie sale. Cookie sale earnings will also pay more than \$1,500 toward individual camp fees, helping more than 150 girls pay for their camp opportunity.
