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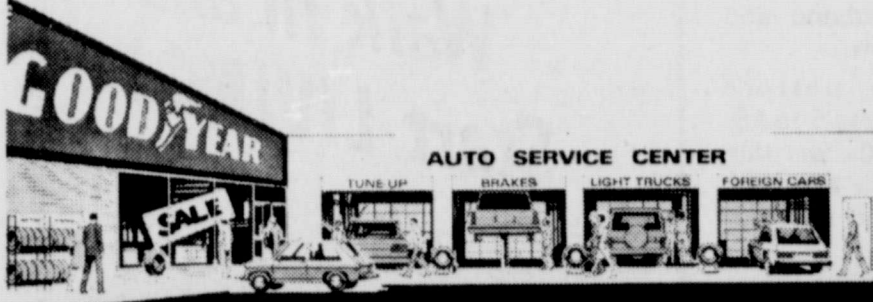

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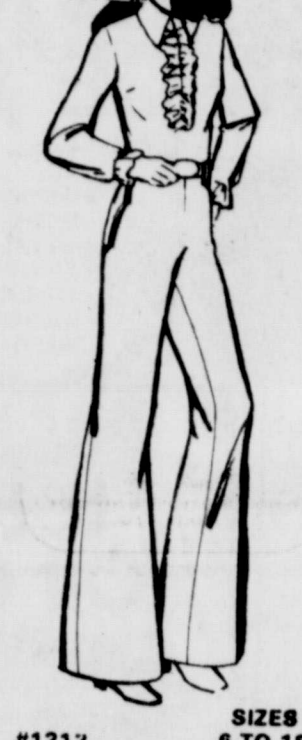

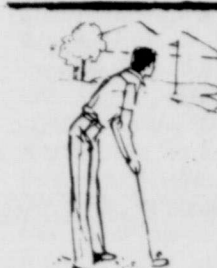

Retail Gas Dealers Offering Special Treatment May Be Violating Federal Regulations

DALLAS—Retail gasoline dealers offering special treatment to preferred customers or requiring the purchase of a product or service in order to buy gasoline may be violating federal pricing regulations, it was announced today by G. Dan Rambo, Dallas, Regional Representative for the U.S. Department of Energy.

Rambo pointed out that these practices occur more frequently during times of gasoline supply shortages and long service station lines. "Any new tie-in sale, business practice or credit arrangement may be a violation of the regulations."

Rambo emphasized the DoE Office of Enforcement currently is investigating

Outdoor Power Equipment Pose Safety Problems

Deaths and injuries associated with outdoor power equipment make up a nationwide safety problem. Homeowners and their helpers, out to cut the lawn, saw off tree limbs, or trim the hedge, are the typical victims.

Power mowers, both walk-behind types and ride-on kinds, head the injury list. Other outdoor power machinery include hedge and weed trimmers, chain saws, snow throwers, and garden tractors.

More than 60,000 injuries related to power mowers occur yearly and are treated in hospital emergency rooms, according to the National Electronic Injury Surveillance System (NEISS).

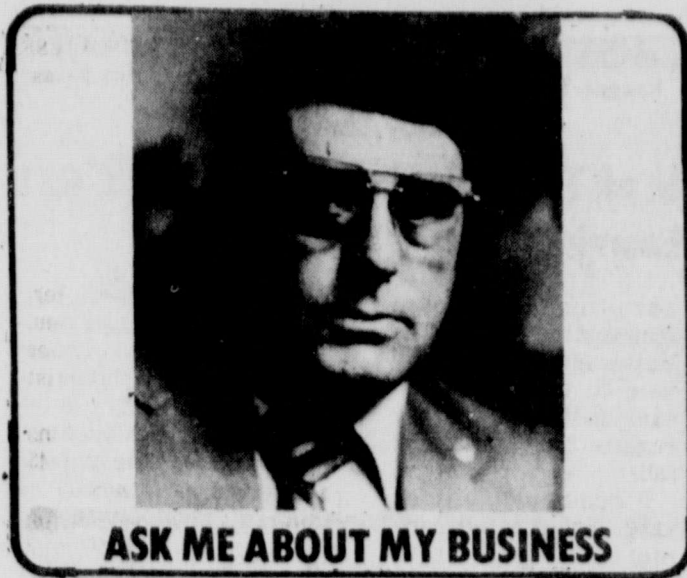

The Consumer Alert

AUSTIN—If the new product you just bought comes with an impressive and official-looking warranty you may feel that you have also bought complete protection should problems develop.

But that warranty could be essentially worthless, according to our Consumer Protection and Antitrust Division attorneys.

For instance, a consumer who buys a hair dryer with a lot of plastic parts might discover when trying to have it serviced under warranty that plastic parts are excluded from coverage.

While consumers have certain rights regarding warranties under both federal and state laws, our attorneys point out that it's always far better to avoid potential problems by knowing exactly what kind of coverage you'll

get before you buy a product.

They suggest, too, that you shop as carefully for warranties on products as you do for a good price. In the long run, you might save money by buying a more expensive item with a "full" warranty than a less expensive one with a "limited" warranty.

What's the difference? A "full" warranty means complete coverage. A defective product will be fixed or replaced at no charge; the product will be repaired or replaced within a reasonable amount of time; the warranty covers anyone who owns the product during its life; and if the product cannot be fixed after reasonable attempts it will be replaced or the purchaser's money refunded.

A "limited" warranty means one with restricted coverage. For instance, it may mean that

cost of parts only, not labor, is covered; that the buyer must return the product to the original seller for service; that there are charges for postage and handling; or that the owners other than the original one are not covered.

Of course, a product may have a combination of full warranty on some parts, a limited one on others.

Then there's the "implied" warranty consumers get with every product, whether or not it's stated in writing. This type of warranty means that the item purchased must do the job it's purchased for—an example would be that a stove

must cook. Only if the seller expressly disclaims such implied warranties are they inoperable.

Our lawyers say that one important right all consumers have, and which they should take advantage of, is the right to examine the warranty on a product before buying. Warranties must be displayed so the consumer can read them and use them for comparison shopping. They must also be written in language that is easy to understand, not in legal jargon the average

consumer would find confusing.

But the very best warranty is only as good as the merchant behind it, according to experts. So pick a seller with a reputation for prompt, courteous service on warranty complaints. And if you have questions about your rights regarding warranties, get in touch with the Attorney General's Consumer Protection and Antitrust Division in Austin, Houston, Dallas, San Antonio, El Paso, Lubbock, or McAllen.

GORDON SPOT

By DeMarquis Gordon

It's a bumper crop of wheat being harvested in Eastland County this year. Yields of 35 to 40 bushels per acre are being reported, and the price has improved too.

The wheat growers are long over due for a good year. Both yields and prices have been low for several years. For example in 1978 there were 8,000 acres of wheat planted in Eastland County, but only 600 acres harvested. The average yield was 13.3 bushels per acre.

This could be a great year for all agricultural products in Eastland County. Prices for cattle and hogs have been tops. Grass has been abundant throughout the spring. Good hay crops are being made now.

The fruit trees have large crops and the pecan trees could produce a record crop this year. I don't think we have ever seen as many pecans on the trees this time of year as we are seeing now.

It's much too early to know what the peanut crop will do.

Planting was delayed because of wet weather, but most of the peanuts are planted now.

Now for the bad news - production cost continues to increase at a rapid rate, especially fuel and energy costs.

Eastland County producers and commercial pesticide applicators are reminded that certain pesticide products now on the market are restricted and available for use only by or under the supervision of certified applicators.

The Texas Pesticide Control Act requires certification of commercial pesticide applicators but not of private applicators. However, the act authorizes the Commissioner of Agriculture to establish a program to certify private applicators on a voluntary basis who wish to use or supervise the use of restricted-use pesticides in compliance with federal law (FIFRA).

The term "private applicator" means a person

who uses or supervises the use of any restricted-use pesticide or state-limited-use pesticide for purposes of producing any agriculture commodity on property owned or rented by him or his employer or, if applied without compensation other than the trading of personal service between producers of agricultural commodities, on the property of another person. The program established by the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) enables a private applicator to become eligible for certification by completing an approved training program conducted by a qualified institution or training group or by home study including submitting a completed questionnaire to TDA following review of self-study material.

Private applicators may qualify through home study using self-study materials available at the County Extension office.

Commercial-noncommercial applicator requirements for certification include written examinations administered by the appropriate certifying agency. The term "commercial applicator" means a person who owns or

manages a pesticide applicator business engaged in applying restricted-use or state-limited-use pesticides to another's land. The term "noncommercial applicator" means a person or government agency or department which wants to use restricted-use or state-limited-use pesticides and does not qualify as a private applicator and is not required to have a commercial applicator's license. Commercial-noncommercial applicator training is provided by District Pesticide Applicator Training Committees located at Texas A&M University Research and Extension Centers. Training is provided through workshops and by previous appointment through an autotutorial system available at each location.

Persons participating in the need to use restricted-use or state-limited-use pesticide products are encouraged to take advantage of these Extension training programs. Information regarding the private applicator program is available through the County Extension Office. Persons interested in commercial-noncommercial applicator training may ob-

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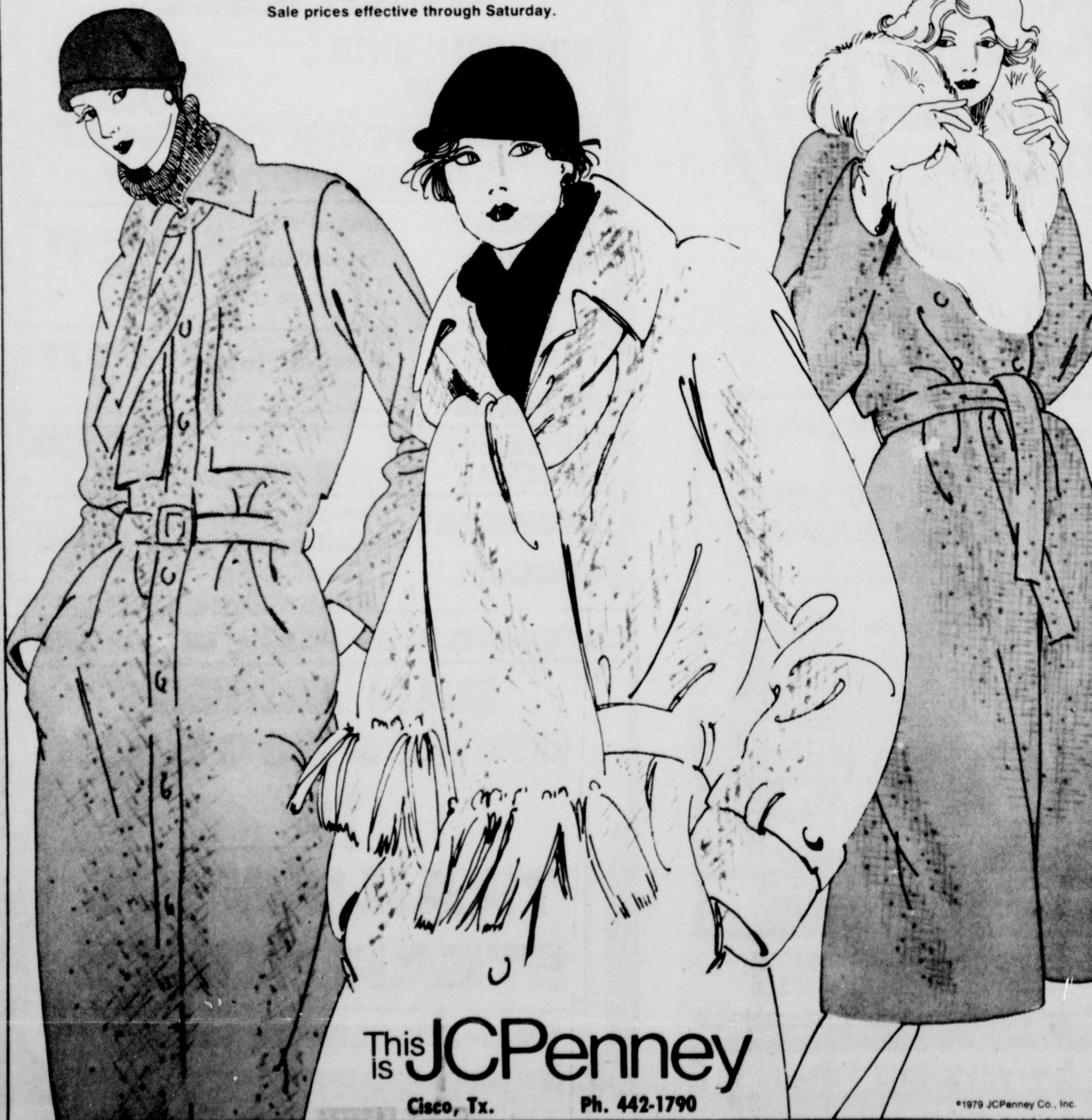

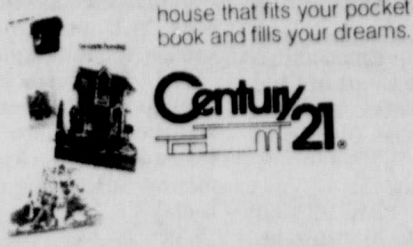

Hints For The Aged & Handicapped

By PATRICIA GALBREATH

DEAR PAT--In March of this year ten California State Rehabilitation Counselors for the Blind were trained in "Sensory Aids for Employment of Blind and Visually Impaired Persons: A Training Program". Funded by the California State Department of Rehabilitation, the trainees had an opportunity to examine a broad range of issues related to career development and job placement.

The following areas were examined during training sessions:

SENSORY AIDS. Sessions aimed at developing a practical, functional knowledge for the selection of appropriate sensory aids for vocational purposes. Sensory aids are instruments that enhance the visual functioning of visually impaired persons, provide alternative forms of information

for totally blind persons. **VOCATIONAL PLANNING AND PLACEMENT.** Discussion of more diverse fields of employment, such as communications, machine trades, electronics, business management and science and engineering careers.

JOB PLACEMENT SKILLS. Developing effective skills and appropriate sensory aids analysis and selection.

Training include direct hands-on experience with a variety of sensory aids, and presentations by specialists in the areas of low vision.

An ongoing evaluation process is conducted with each class of trainees. Participants in the first experi-

mental sessions have expressed much enthusiasm and satisfaction with the content and form of the training program and are exploring a wider range of vocational goals for their clients.

Sensory Aids Foundation, 399 Sherman Ave., Suite 12, Palo Alto, CA 94306, is currently evaluating the interest and need for counselor training in states outside of California. They are also considering restructuring the course content into subject modules. Inquiries regarding the training program, along with statements of specific needs, are invited from all

Apply By July 15 For Tax Relief

The Eastland County Farm Bureau has asked taxing jurisdictions in this county to help at the new tax relief law into effect in 1979.

In a letter to elected officials of all taxing units, Roy Johnson of Desdemona, president of the local county farm organization, reminded them that this law provides for limiting tax valuation on agricultural land if the owner applies by July 15, 1979.

Mr. Johnson reminded the tax officials that the Act states: "The Legislature believes that implementation of Articles 1 and 2 of this Act is both feasible and desirable and hereby expresses its intent that all taxing units in this state implement those articles for taxes imposed for the 1979 tax year unless it is impossible to do so."

The Farm Bureau officer told each of the tax officials: "We believe that your tax office has the competence to follow this new law in 1979."

"The letter added: "If there is to be a proposed resolution or ordinance to deny this tax treatment in 1979, please let us know so that we can attend the hearing and present our views."

School district authorities were also reminded that any school districts which deny this valuation in 1979 will receive less state money.

A tax manual will be furnished by the School Tax Assessment Practices Board in late June. A training session will be offered in Austin at the University of Texas Special Events Center on June 25.

The local farm leader said that his organization was helping notify farmers and ranchers that they should apply with all their local tax offices between July 1-15. The county Farm Bureau office will have a supply of sample application forms for use in preparing the information for the official form.

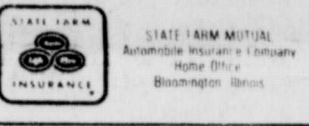
