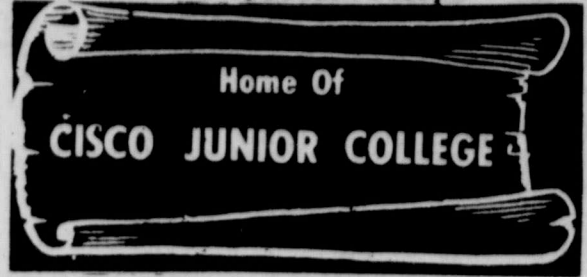

## Three Killed; Two Injured In Head-On Collision Monday

Three Cisco men were killed and one Cisco man critically injured in a head on collision between a car and a pickup in Young County Monday afternoon. The driver of the car from Graham was also critically injured in the accident.

The accident occurred on State Highway 67, two miles south of South Bend in the extreme southern portion of Young County, the DPS said. South Bend is located about 10 miles southwest of

Graham. Arthur Grover Guthrie, 19, of Cisco, was pronounced death at the scene by Bobby Choate, Young County Justice of the Peace, according to the Graham Police Department.

Emanuel Ray Jenkins, 26, of Cisco and George Aaron Buckner, 36, also of Cisco, were pronounced dead at Graham General Hospital, police said.

The dead victims were passengers in a

pickup driven by Terry Dale Gosnell of Cisco, a Texas Department of Public Safety source said. Driver of the other vehicle, a 1977 car, was Terry Eubanks of Graham, the DPS said.

Gosnell was listed in poor condition Monday night in Graham General Hospital, suffering from a fractured pelvis, internal injuries and lacerations, a hospital spokesman said.

Eubanks was transported to Wichita Falls General Hospital where he was listed in serious condition Monday night.

City manager Boland informed the council that one of the city's U.S. Treasury Bills will mature on June 28 and he requested the council's direction on what to do with the funds. (They had originally been planned for a payment on Front Street, but a small delay may make the payment due at a later date.) Council member Eudy made a motion that after checking into the legality of placing Revenue Sharing Funds in such a bill, the money be placed back into a U.S. Treasury Bill to mature whenever the payment on Front Street is due. Council member Whitley seconded the motion and all voted in its favor except council member Allison, who stated she would have to abstain until it is found out for sure about the placing of Revenue Sharing funds in such a bill.

Council member Whitley made a motion to appoint Sherry Ledbetter as City Secretary. Council member Allison seconded the motion and all voted in its favor. Council member Grady made a motion the City Secretary salary be set at \$650 per month. Whitley seconded the motion and all voted in its favor. Council member Eudy made a motion that City Manager

## City Council Accepts First Reading Of Proposed Lone Star Gas Rate Increase

The Cisco City Council accepted the first reading of a Lone Star Gas rate increase at Tuesday night's regular meeting, following an explanation of the proposed new increase by Wayne West, manager of the local Lone Star Gas office.

The motion to accept the first reading was made by council member Lonnie Grady and seconded by council member Raymond Whitley. Council members Grady, Whitley, Bill Eudy, Morgan Fleming and Mayor Hugh (Chief) Brown voted in favor of the motion while council member Louise Allison voted against. Council member Lucy Collier was absent from Tuesday night's meeting.

Mr. West informed the council that the proposed new rate increase had been formed following the discussion by council members at the previous regular City Council meeting against the originally proposed rate increase. Under the original proposal each residential customer would be required to pay a three dollar customer service charge for having an active meter, whether they used any gas that month or not. Under the new proposal the service charge will be dropped and the customer will pay four dollars (\$4) for the first 1,000 cubic feet of gas or "fractional part thereof". For everything over 1,000 cubic feet, the charge will be \$3.14 per thousand. If the customer does not use any gas he will not be charged. Mr. West explained that the average customer uses 8,000 cubic feet of gas per month; therefore, under the new proposal

that customer's bill for the month would be \$25.99.

The last Lone Star Gas rate increase in Cisco was in 1977.

Council member Grady made a motion Tuesday night to accept the minutes of the previous council meeting as corrected. Council member Whitley seconded the motion and all voted in its favor.

Council member Grady also made a motion to accept the city manager's financial report. The motion was seconded by council member Whitley and all members voted in its favor.

Council member Fleming made a motion to accept the monthly bills and council member Whitley seconded the motion. All members voted in favor of the motion.

Two motions made by council member Allison died for lack of seconds concerning the depositing of money in the First National Bank in Cisco. Mrs. Allison's first motion was to prepare a resolution naming the First National Bank in Cisco official depository for city funds. The general opinion of the other council members seemed to be in disagreement with Mrs. Allison, since they feel the money should be put wherever it will draw the most interest.

Council member Allison then made a motion that Revenue Sharing money be placed in the First National Bank of Cisco. She supported her motion by saying that she believes Revenue Sharing money must be kept in trust funds. There was no second to the motion and Mayor Brown tabled the matter.

A request from the Cisco Softball Association for a \$500 donation from the city was granted in a motion by council member Eudy.

City manager John Boland stated this request is in line with requests from the Association in the past two years. Eudy's motion also stated that if the city can, it will run a sewer line to the softball field. Council member Allison seconded the motion and all members voted in its favor except Fleming, who was against the motion since the city does not give donations to the Little League or Pony League.

A request to rename Avenue D to Hilton Street was tabled; however, the general opinion of the council was against the renaming of the entire street. All members seemed to agree that it is a nice thought, since the Hilton family is planning a restoration of the Mobley Hotel in Cisco, but not feasible. Mayor Brown stated he is personally against the idea since all merchants along Avenue D would have to change all their letterheads and stationery. Mayor Brown then suggested the possibility of renaming the area around the Mobley Hotel as Hilton Circle.

The council also agreed that City Manager Boland should look further into the possibility of putting the city's tax roll and billing procedures on a computer system. The suggestion was made that he get some other cost estimates on such a system for a cost comparison to the figures the city has received.

City manager Boland reported to the council that the Tax Equalization Board is not through with its work, so their report

was not available at that time. Prompted by a question from council member Eudy concerning the raising of tax evaluations this year, City Manager Boland stated the re-evaluations are taking place because the tax evaluations are not fair or equal, since recent property added to the roll is placed on it with a 1979 evaluation while other property on the rolls has not been evaluated since before 1950. He went on to say all commercial property is being re-evaluated this year with plans calling for one-third of residential property to be re-evaluated next year.

The remaining two-thirds of residential property will be re-evaluated, one-third a year, during the following two years. The total re-evaluation of taxable property will take four years.

Council member Allison questioned the legality of such a re-evaluation, since she stated the House Bill 18, which went into effect January 1, 1979, is a state law and supersedes the city charter. City Attorney Billy Wright Jr. agreed that state law does supersede the city charter, but he stated that state law also requires that tax rolls be made equal.

A spokesperson for the Tax Equalization Board stated the new evaluations are not set as non-negotiable figures, and the board welcomes individuals to come in and tell what they feel their property's fair market value is.

During a discussion concerning the College Heights addition, the council was informed that a certified, registered surveyor has been hired by the Bill Jacobs to survey their property so other

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## Supplementary Insurance Policies

Persons eligible for medicare health insurance benefits who seek to supplement their coverage by purchasing additional private insurance should be sure that they are not buying coverage already provided by medicare, warns Glyn Hammons, manager of the Abilene Social Security Office.

Hammons says that Dallas Regional Officials of HEW'S Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA), the Federal Agency that administers the medicare and medicaid programs, are concerned that many elderly medicare beneficiaries are being sold duplicative or overpriced supplementary insurance policies.

According to Jerry Sconce, HCFA'S Regional Administrator, some medicare beneficiaries are being taken advantage of by a few scrupulous insurance agents, often posing as representatives of medicare or the Social Security Administration. Sconce has recently contacted State Insurance Commissioners asking

their cooperation in identifying and controlling such sales practices.

The problem is a costly one, said Sconce, citing a recent report by the U.S. House select committee on aging which estimated that senior citizens are "being taken" \$1-billion a year by a few insurance companies and their agents. The Committee report also noted that some companies which specialize in selling this type of insurance return an average of 50 cents on the premium dollar while others return as much as 90 cents for similar coverage.

Sconce urges senior citizens considering buying a supplemental plan to be sure that they are not duplicating existing medicare coverage and to seek out policies that pay a high return in benefits.

He further warned that any insurance salesman representing himself as connected with medicare or Social Security should be viewed with suspicion since no federal employee is authorized to engage in this activity. Sconce urged the

public to report any such misrepresentation to the local Social Security Office and to the State Insurance Commissioner.

### St. Augustine grass

Gray leaf spot, a fungal disease, can give St. Augustinegrass lawns a blotchy appearance. The disease can also attack centipede grass.

The disease thrives in warm, humid weather and is

characterized by irregular gray, dirty-yellow or ash-colored spots on grass leaves. Borders of leaf blades may have a brown, purple or water-soaked appearance. A gray mold may cover the spots.

Dr. Walter Walla, a Texas Agricultural Extension Service plant pathologist, says the disease develops rapidly during periods of warm temperatures and abundant moisture. It first appears in damp, shaded areas. Grass with heavy disease develop-

In addition to avoiding excessive nitrogen fertilizer, Walla advises watering during the day so foliage won't remain wet overnight.

He also points out that most turf fungicides effectively control the disease when used at 10-day intervals during warm, humid periods. Mix the fungicide in 15 gallons of water plus 2 ounces of liquid detergent for each 1,000 square feet of lawn.

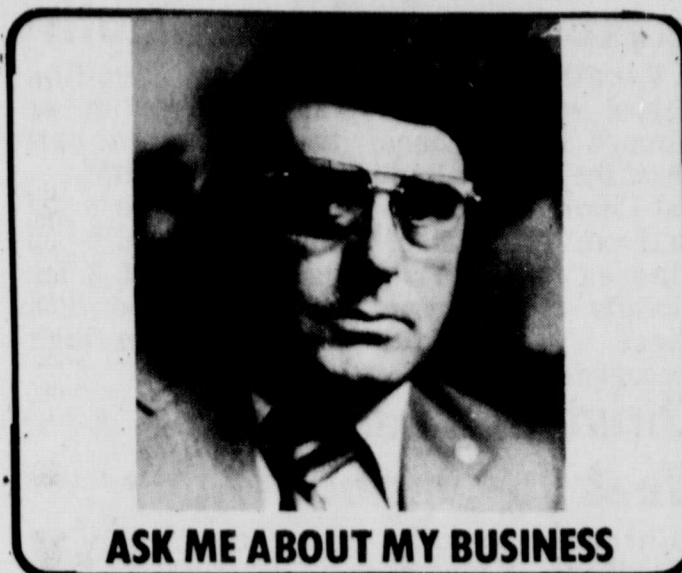

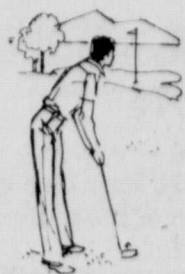

### FB Urges Truckers Not To Ignore Harvest

The president of Texas' largest general farm organization urged striking independent truckers Friday not to ignore the Texas fruit and vegetable harvest.

Texas Farm Bureau President Carroll Chaloupka said, "We recognize that the trucking industry is suffering from the price of fuel and the shortage of fuel, just the same as agriculture, but this is the only income that many of these farmers will receive this year."

Once the crops there are ready for harvest, we need the full cooperation of the truckers to move these perishables immediately because very soon they will be in no condition to be moved at all, said Chaloupka.

### Judges Nomination Opposed By NRA

D.C.--President Carter's nomination last month of U.S. Rep. Abner Mikva (D-Ill.) for a key federal judgeship, subject to confirmation hearings July 12 before the Senate Judiciary Committee, is drawing sharp opposition from the 1.2 million member National Rifle Association.

Calling Rep. Mikva "unfit for service in the federal judiciary," Neal Knox, executive director of the NRA Institute for Legislative Action, warned that Mikva's nomination to the second most powerful court in the land, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia, posed a "serious threat to all citizens concerned with civil liberties."

He is the leading advocate in Congress of gun prohibition. He endorses computerized dossiers on law-abiding gun owners, and he advocates arbitrary stop-and-search laws and the confiscation of firearms, Knox said.

"If the U.S. Senate confirms Mikva to the U.S. Court of Appeals, he would hold a lifetime position of tremendous power to legislate by judicial fiat that which he has failed to accomplish in Congress.

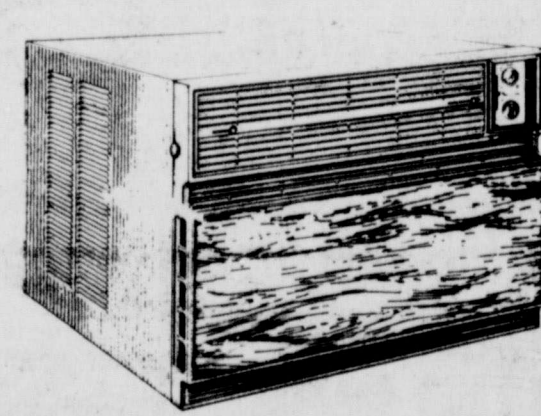
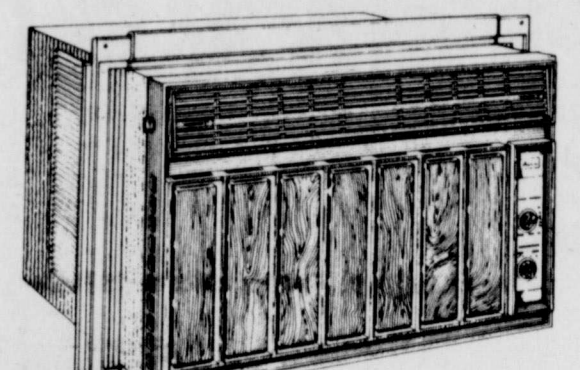

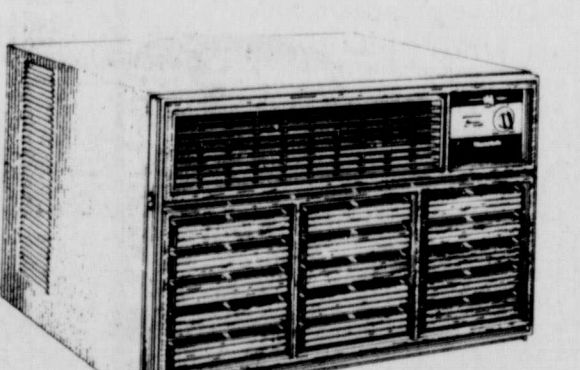

## Oil News

Claud Hunter of ventures 5-miles Bangs has staked locations for two wildcat southwest of Bangs in brown county. Both

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have proposed depths of 1,000-feet on a 154 acre lease.

No. 2 Jerry Rush is 5,224-feet from south and 1,620-feet from east lines of George waters Survey 114.

No. 3 Jerry Rush is 5,224-feet from south and 160-feet from east lines of the same survey.

Head Operating Management of Midland will drill No. 1 Young & Yarbrough 2-miles west of Thrifty in Brown County to a proposed depth of 2,300-feet.

Site is 330-feet from north and 467-feet from east lines of Sec. 37, J.M. Higgins Survey.

Barco Oil & Gas Co. of Houston has spotted site for No. 1 W.Z. Aaron, et al, 2-miles southeast of Rising Star.

Site is 2,173 feet from north and 990 feet from west lines of southwest quarter of Sec. 11, BBB&C Survey. The venture will have a proposed depth of 2,930 feet.

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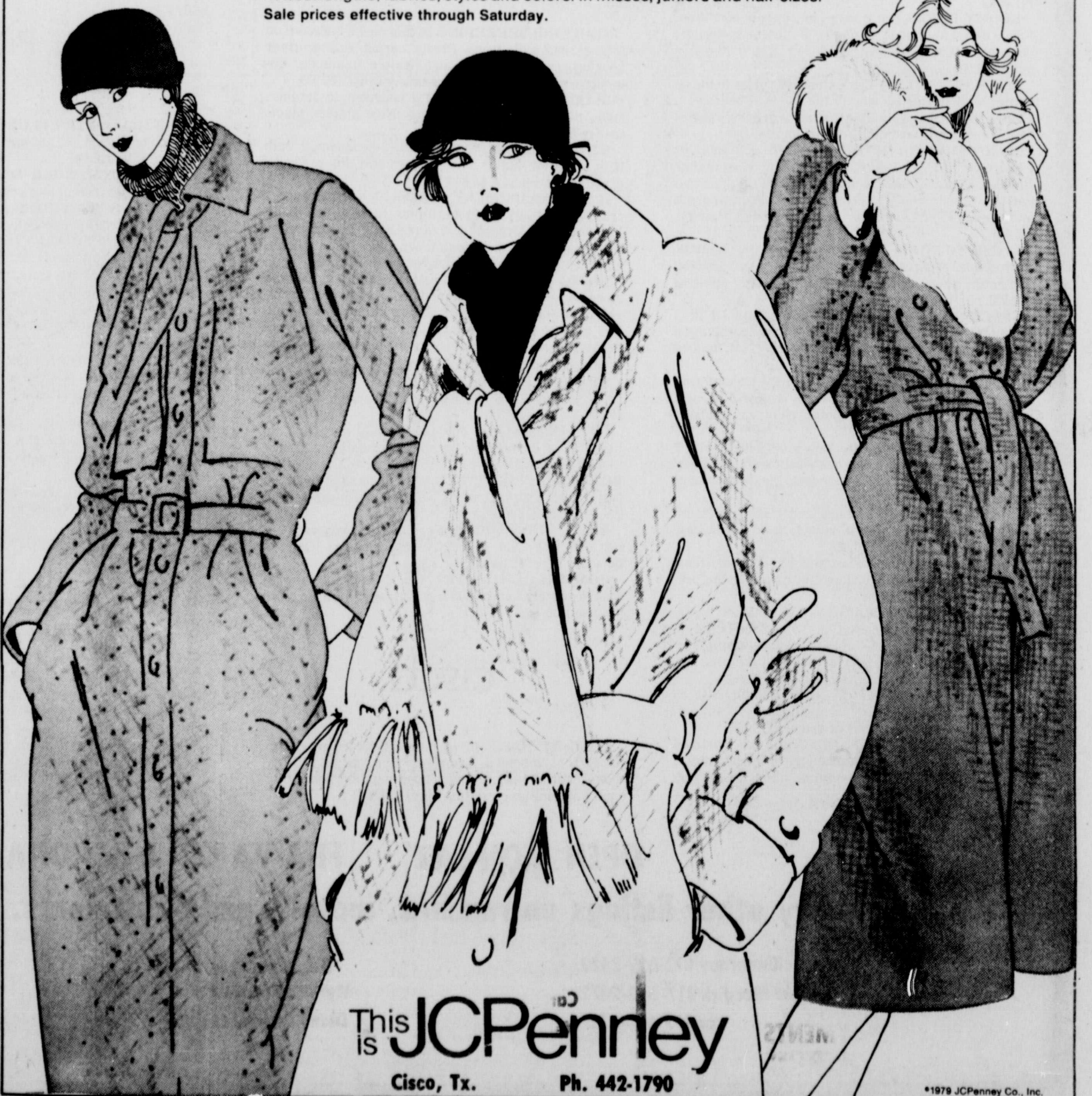
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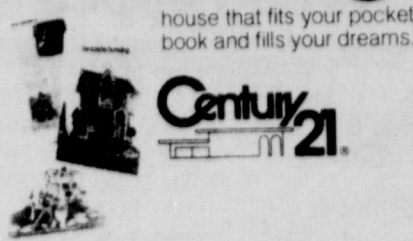

## Hints For The Aged & Handicapped

By PATRICIA GALBREATH

DEAR PAT-- I am a disabled veteran and am now working part time at a VA medical center.

So many of the men we see are not aware of their benefits of the changes that have been made in previous benefits.

The average age of Vietnam era veterans receiving compensation for service-connected disabilities is 35. These young adult years should be the most productive years in a man's life and if he is entitled to benefits because of a disability, he should use them. He first must be aware of them.

Could you please use your column space to help us reach these veterans and inform them of additional benefits? —Mr. C.R., Jr., Virginia

DEAR CAL-- That's one of the purposes of the column so here goes. EDUCATION: No changes in allowances or entitlements.

AUTOMOBILE

ALLOWANCE: Automobile allowance for certain disabled veterans has been raised from \$3,300 to \$3,800.

VA LOANS: (1) Mobile homes now at 50 percent or \$17,500 guarantee at 12 percent. (2) Housing 60 percent or \$25,000 guarantee whichever is less at 9 and one-half percent.

VA COMPENSATION FOR SERVICE CONNECTED VETERANS AND SURVIVORS: (1) All awards raised 7.3 percent. (2) 30 percent and 40 percent ratings provided a dependency allowance. (3) Qualifying surviving spouse-children allowed compensation rates if veteran does not die of service cause but was 100 percent service connected disabled for 10 years or more at time of death, or if veteran was released from active duty and carried 100 percent compensation rate for not less than 5 years at time of death.

VA PENSION FOR NON-

SERVICE CONNECTED CASES: (1) all recipients of pension during 1978 regardless of age required to report their incomes for 1978 and 1979. (2) All recipients of pension will continue to draw pension during 1979 at entitlements established for 1978. (3) New law (Veteran and Survivors Improvement Act of 1978) going into effect January 1, 1979 pays rates supplementing total incomes to show combinations above poverty rates. (4) All pension awards regardless of which law pensioner is under will be protected in the future from reductions caused by Social Security increases.

BURIAL ALLOWANCE: Increased from \$250 to \$300. Plot allowance remains at \$150.

MEDICAL CARE: Reflects more leniency in providing outpatient treatment and hospital entries in local area for most of 1978. (The Veterans Administration stated that this was brought about because of changes in funding and bed availability.)

ANNUAL CLOTHING ALLOWANCE: For certain disabled veterans, this allowance was raised from \$203. to \$218.

—Look up your 1967 tax return and write down your income after deducting federal taxes and social security.

—Write down the same after-tax figure from your 1978 tax return.

—If the 1978 figure is not approximately twice as large as the 1967 figure, your income has gone down since 1967.

If your buying power has been cut, like most average U. S. families, there are three basic suggestions for managing family resources:

Evaluate Living Level

Evaluate your level of living. You may want to change your lifestyle and live with fewer bought goods and services. Changes in attitudes and values accompany a change in lifestyle.

To simplify and live with fewer material goods does not necessarily mean lowering the quality of life. Sometimes, less is more.

Expand, Extend Material Resources

Expand and extend material resources by increasing your consumer skills in maintaining, using, repairing, storing, conserving and recycling.

Become more knowledgeable about quality characteristics of products. Consider life expectancies

## STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—Energy dominated all issues this week at the State Capitol: how to ration it, how to conserve it, and how to find new sources.

Faced with short gasoline supplies and long lines at service stations in the Houston and Dallas areas, Governor Bill Clements mandated last Tuesday that stations must restrict sales through purchase limits and

as well as price. Increase Resources

a California-style odd-even license plate number plan. The plan (for Harris, Dallas and Tarrant counties only) restricts gasoline sales to a minimum of \$6 and a maximum of 20 gallons, and allows fill-ups for odd-numbered plates on odd-numbered calendar days, and even for even, etc.

Hours after his announcement, Clements' legal advisors remained uncertain on how much authority the governor's office has—if any—to enforce the mandate.

More fuel-related troubles appeared on another horizon when Agriculture Commissioner Reagan Brown told Clements Thursday that a truckers' boycott and sporadic violence around the country threatened Texas' \$40 million watermelon and vegetable crop. Brown told Clements his office was swamped with telephone calls from Texas producers in need of trucks to haul their produce to markets.

The truckers' boycott, a protest of rapidly escalating diesel prices, aims "to empty food shelves in supermarkets around the country" and is slowly bringing Texas agriculture to a "grinding halt," a Brown aide said.

Harry Hubbard, president of the Texas AFL-CIO, said he thought refinery workers and truckers who transport gasoline should not have to wait in line for fuel. "Making Texans stand in line for gas is like making Kansans stand in line for wheat," he said.

Clements came under fire in Austin from conservative State Rep. Dan Kubiak who called him "irresponsible"

for vetoing budgeted funds for several alternative energy projects. Kubiak, who successfully sponsored a bill allowing gasohol production in Texas, criticized Clements for ham-stringing gasohol and other energies only three days before mandating his gas rationing plan. The Rockdale legislator called on Clements to include "the rapid development of alternative energy" in the Governor's promised special session.

Primary "Death Knell" Sounded

A "Killer Bee" senator sounded the "death knell" for a regional presidential primary, saying he had checked with state officials from New Mexico, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana, Alabama and Mississippi with negative results. Those neighboring states, Sen. Ron Clower, D-Garland, said, "do not want a simultaneous primary with Texas."

Clements earlier had indicated he might call a special session to consider a regional primary if enough interest was aroused.

Other projects with neighbors may be more successful. Clements was to attend a Friday meeting of the Southwest Border Regional Commission—composed of Govs. Bruce Babbitt of Arizona, Bruce King of New Mexico, Jerry Brown of California and Clements—to sell his positions on illegal aliens, narcotics trafficking and energy. Clements will seek a method to document illegal aliens, stepped up law enforcement to control drug traffic on both sides of the border, and the importation of oil and gas from Mexico's vast reserves at prices acceptable to Mexico.

If the four governors and U.S. Ambassador to Mexico Patrick Luely agree on a

plan, they will depart Brownsville with a date for a summit with the governors of Mexico's six border states. If the border state governors agree with the plans, the recommendations will be turned over to the State Department as a guide to an international agreement between the two countries.

Clements Calls on LULAC

In his address Thursday to the national League of Latin American Citizens convention, Clements told delegates "You are our greatest resource" in solving the problems shared by the border governors and building closer ties with Mexico. Saying it is better to rely on a friend like Mexico for foreign oil supplies, Clements also brought the 2,000 delegates to their feet when he said oil companies should be required to either reinvest windfall profits into energy production or be taxed "100 percent—I repeat, 100 percent" on those above normal revenue.

If LULAC was pleased with Clements' statements, it also is pleased with his 1978 gubernatorial opponent, former Texas Attorney General John Hill. Five days after the convention, LULAC national director Ruben Bonilla endorsed Hill as the group's choice to replace U.S. Attorney General Griffin Bell, who intends to resign prior to the 1980 primaries. Bonilla said their Hispanic choice, Reynaldo Garza, was recently appointed as 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals judge, but "Hill would be an extraordinary choice" because of his record on civil rights.

Roloff Homes Supported

Despite a State District Judge's orders to close the unlicensed children's homes of evangelist Lester Roloff, the facilities remained open last week. Officials from the Department of Human Resources refused to break through a human barrier of about 300 hymn-singing persons clutching Bibles and American flags who stood in front of the entrance to Roloff's Peoples Church. The teen-aged residents of Roloff's Rebekah Home for Girls had been moved from the home to the church next door, and their parents and some 150 pastors from 25 states kept a front-door vigil.

Roloff voluntarily closed down his Zapata boys' home facilities on June 19 in obedience of the court order, but maintained a stubborn resistance at the girls' home near Corpus Christi.

State officials, unsure of how to handle the large crowd, said they did not know when or if they would enter the home. Roloff, meanwhile, says he will "never give up."

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**The Consumer Alert**

AUSTIN—Warm weather means shorts and swimsuits, and it may mean a physical fitness program for persons who don't like the way they look in such outfits. It's at this time of year, report our Consumer Protection and Antitrust Division attorneys, that many individuals consider joining a health spa or club. And, while the good ones, equipped with the most modern exercise equipment; sauna, steam, and whirlpool baths; and knowledgeable instructors, can make exercise more pleasant, there are others from which consumers benefit not at all. Our complaint files show that many consumers are very dissatisfied with the return on their health spa investment. Typical problems include deceptive advertising, high-pressure sales pitches, misrepresentation of facilities, of the amount of improvement to expect, of contracts, and of costs. Some consumers have complained they were sold memberships in health spas that were still in the construction or planning stage, and which folded before ever opening. We also have numerous complaints about spas that have gone out of business without honoring existing long-term contracts—and without offering refunds. Our lawyers urge every individual who is thinking of joining a health spa to check on its reputation carefully. You may want to call the Attorney General's Consumer Protection and Antitrust Division in Austin, Houston, Dallas, San Antonio, El Paso, Lubbock, or McAllen, or call the Better Business Bureau in your city to see if complaints have been lodged against the company you are considering. And keep the following in mind when you are evaluating a health spa. —Watch out for high-pressure sales pitches, attempts to make you feel "cheap" if you object to the price, or emotional appeals ("You want to be around to see your kids grow up, don't you? Then let us help you lose that weight.") —Enroll for a few weeks, or on a "pay as you go" plan, if possible, to see if you like it. But be careful if you're asked to sign an application or short-term agreement. Some people have found out later that what they signed was a long-term, binding contract. Read everything before signing! —Realize that those "before and after" photos are usually not what they seem. The

**Apply By July 15 For Tax Relief**

The Eastland County Farm Bureau has asked taxing jurisdictions in this county to help with the new tax relief law into effect in 1979. In a letter to elected officials of all taxing units, Roy Johnson of Desdemona, president of the local county farm organization, reminded them that this law provides for limiting tax valuation on agricultural land if the owner applies by July 15, 1979. "before" often shows a model slumped, looking sad, and wearing clothes that are too tight. Our attorneys say this is especially important regarding assurances made to you orally that "you can quit whenever you want and get a prorated amount of your money back." Look for that in the contract. If it's not there, ask that it be written in before you sign. If there is any objection to your request, find another spa. Mr. Johnson reminded the tax officials that the Act states: "The Legislature believes that implementation of Articles 1 and 2 of this Act is both feasible and desirable and hereby expresses its intent that all taxing units in this state implement those articles for taxes imposed for the 1979 tax year unless it is impossible to do so." The Farm Bureau officer told each of the tax officials: "We believe that your tax office has the competence to follow this new law in 1979. "The letter added: "If there is to be a proposed resolution or ordinance to deny this tax treatment in 1979, please let us know so that we can attend the hearing and present our views." School district authorities were also reminded that any school districts which deny this valuation in 1979 will receive less state money. A tax manual will be furnished by the School Tax Assessment Practices Board in late June. A training session will be offered in Austin at the University of Texas Special Events Center on June 25. The local farm leader said that his organization was helping notify farmers and ranchers that they should apply with all their local tax offices between July 1-15. The county Farm Bureau office will have a supply of sample application forms for use in preparing the information for the official form.

# Governor Vetoes Road & Bridge Fund

Today the presidents of the Texas Association of Counties and the County Judges and Commissioners Association of Texas expressed their

profound shock and dismay over Governor William P. Clements' veto of state assistance for county roads for the state fiscal year 1981.

Derwood Wimpee, Rockwall County judge and president of the Texas Association of Counties stated that he was extremely surprised by Governor Clements' action and expressed the belief the Governor may have been seriously misinformed about the operation of the sunset law. "Based on the text of the Governor's veto message, it appears the Governor thought the board of county and road district indebtedness could not operate after September 1, 1979," Judge Wimpee said. "Unfortunately, the veto wiped out the 1981 appropriation to the counties of Texas for road maintenance and construction even though the sunset act makes provision for the distribution of an appropriation to an agency being abolished." Judge Jerome Decker of Medina County and President of the County Judges and Commissioners Association of Texas also expressed his surprise over the veto and gave his support to Judge Wimpee's comments. "I cannot believe that a program as vital as this one is, could be intentionally vetoed by any Governor of Texas," Judge Decker stated. "The county judges and commissioners of Texas have always strongly supported a modern and efficient highway system composed of state highways supported by an extensive

framework of county roads," he added. Both Judge Decker and Judge Wimpee expressed the belief that Governor Clements also supported the county foundation upon which our state highway system was built. On behalf of their respective associations, the two presidents released the following statement:

In 1951 the legislature provided that \$7.3 million of the state's motor fuel taxes would be annually allocated to the county and road district highway fund. This fund would be distributed every year to all 254 counties on a formula basis to provide some state support to the

counties in recognition of the essential role county roads and highways play in the overall state transportation system. In 1951 the legislature acknowledged that an efficient state system depended heavily upon the network of local roads maintained by the counties of Texas. From 1951 to 1979 every legislature has appropriated these important funds to the counties. The Texas sunset act which passed in 1977, provides for the phased abolition of the board of county and road district indebtedness. From 1951 to 1978 every Governor of Texas has approved that part of the general ap-

propriation act that made the \$7.3 million appropriation. Now for the first time in history a Governor of Texas has vetoed this appropriation. Under the constitution of Texas the only local tax source a county has is the property tax. Governor Clements veto will force all 254 counties to choose between 1) a tax increase to make up for this unexpected early loss of State assistance; or 2) a reduction of local road and bridge maintenance and construction expenditures. With legislation enacted this year, it has become far more difficult to raise property taxes

for almost all purposes. With the required implementation of a number of new and larger tax exemptions, the early loss of state support for county roads could not have come at a worse time. It appears that this loss will result in a reduction in preventive maintenance and repairs to county roads and bridges. It may mean a much greater cost to the local taxpayer when major repairs are required. Today, more than half of all the roads in unincorporated areas of Texas are county maintained. With inflation and rising costs, the \$7.3 million originally provided in 1951 has less buying

power, however, it has been an important source of support for hard-pressed county budgets. On behalf of the county taxpayers of Texas, we respectfully petition Governor Clements to examine closely the effects of his veto. We feel that after serious consideration, this assistance to county roads will continue to be justified and desirable. Finally, we ask Governor Clements to include the restoration of the 1981 appropriation for county road aid in any call for a special legislative session. 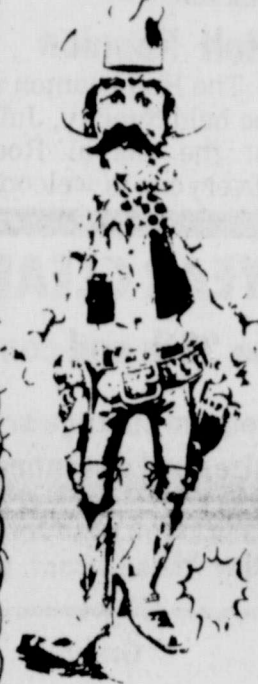

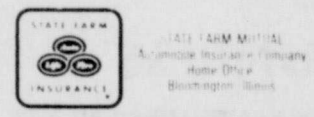
