Hall Of Remarks by Herrel Hallmark

WITH THE FAST approaching day of fireworks, the Fourth of July, drawing nearer and being less than a week away, the following release from the Texas Society To Prevent Blindness should be read and heeded by all who plan to use fireworks in the coming week:

Fireworks stands that have begun business along roadsides in Texas this year should be a reminder not only that July Fourth is near, but also that fireworks bodily injured at least 6,139 people in America last year.

That statistic includes 1,207 serious eye injuries. Most resulted to some degree in permanent vision loss or impairment, Texas Society To Prevent Blindness (TSPB) spokesman Bobby Williams said.

Most accidents—about 60 per cent—occurred to children younger than 15. In one Texas accident, the child was merely a bystander not using the fireworks that damaged his eye, the TSPB Eye Safety chairman added.

The statistics, compiled by the Consumer Product Safety Commission, are probably low, since they include only people who were treated in hospital emergency rooms, Williams pointed out.

"Such injuries are needless," he said. "The TSPB urges that all fireworks be restricted to licensed public display."

Most eye injuries were caused by bottle rockets and most injuries, according to the American Pyrotechnics Association, were caused by improperly handling fireworks.

"But all fireworks are dangerous," Williams stressed. "To take only two examples, sparklers burn at about 1,500 degrees Fahrenheit, and punks can cause lacerations, punctures and severe burns."

TSPB is an affiliate of the National Society To Prevent Blindness. The parent organization, established in 1908, is the oldest voluntary health agency nationally engaged in preventing blindness through service programs, education and research.

IF YOU PLAN to set off fireworks this year, be sure and be extra careful and keep from causing bodily harm to yourself or someone else.

If you do not want to take a chance on fireworks this year, then just be sure and attend the fireworks display scheduled for Wednesday night, July 4, in the Cisco City Park. Also be sure and attend the day-long ac-

The ordinance, "Section I", states, "No person, firm, company, corporation or association shall cast, throw or fire any squib, rocket, cracker, torpedo, grenade, gun revolver, pistol, or other combustible fireworks of any kind in the City of Cisco."

Violators, upon conviction, shall be subjected to a fine of not more than \$200.00

Cemetery Ass'n Makes Progress, Clubs Told

Officials of the Cisco Cemetery Association believe that assets of the organization will reach the \$100,000 goal within a year, President Anton White told the Cisco Lions Club and the Cisco Rotary Club in talks at their respective meetings last Wednesday and Thursday.

Organized three years ago as a perpetual cemetery association, area residents and those with loved ones buried

in Oakwood Cemetery have contributed a total of \$77,500, Mr. White said. The association's funds are managed by the Trust Department of the First National bank without charges.

Mr. White said the association was organized April 25, 1975, at a meeting sponsored by the Delphian and 20th Century Clubs. The smallest gift was \$1 and the largest amounted to \$5,400, Mr. White said. The cemetery received one gift of corporate stock that has increased in value and pays good dividends.

Under the association plans, only interest earned by investing funds is dues in perpetual care work. There has been an increase in recent months in the use of memorial donations, he added.

"The association is a real credit to Cisco," Mr. White said. "The success achieved in three years shows that many people are interested."

Last January 1, the association took over full management of the cemetery with a \$600 monthly subsidy from

the city. Previously, the cemetery had cost the city \$13,000 annually.

Plans call for the association to mail out letters soon, giving a report on its activities to all who have made donations and to those with loved ones buried in the cemetery. Hopefully, this will help the organization reach its \$100,000 goal.

The cemetery has sufficient space for graves through the year 2000, Mr. White said.

FINAL REMINDER
MONDAY, JULY 2, 1979 is the final date to certify to your planted acres of corn, grain sorghum, cotton and set aside acres. (Set aside is applicable only to farms that signed to participate in the program)

The acreage for future program purposes will be considered zero on all farms that do not certify.

PEANUT CERTIFICATION
MONDAY, JULY 16, 1979 is the final date to certify your planted acreage of peanuts. A report to account for the acquisition of seed peanuts must be filed when you certify peanut acreage. A receipt for purchases will be required.

The report of acreage will be made on a field by field basis. Spot checks will be done by aerial observation on a random sample basis. Acreage on all peanut farms will be verified by aerial observation or ground measurement.

SET ASIDE ACREAGE
Producers are reminded that no crops may be harvested from set aside. Set aside must not be grazed

from May 1 to November 1. The set aside must be devoted to an approved cover or practice which will prevent wind and water erosion. Weeds must be controlled on set aside. Feed grains are not eligible cover on set aside; small grains are eligible only if clipped to prevent seed formation.

ACP SIGN UP
The County Committee has announced a sign up period for ACP cost sharing from July 2 through July 6, 1979. Requests will be accepted on a continuing basis thereafter.

The County Committee has added shrub control and reorganizing irrigation systems (underground pipe) to the County Handbook. Other practices available include cross fences, livestock water wells, water impoundment reservoirs and diversion terraces.

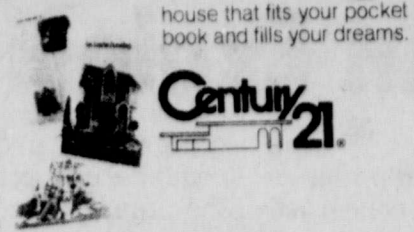

Improper Gasoline Storage Is An Explosive Situation

With Texas motorists becoming increasingly concerned over short supplies of gasoline and strict allocation plans in the state's major metropolitan areas, a

dangerous problem could become critical—the improper storage of gasoline.

Doug Williams of Dallas, chairman of the Texas Automobile Insurance Service Of-

fice, suggests the only safe place to store gasoline may be in your car or truck's fuel tank or in an approved gasoline storage container in a well-ventilated area. A gasoline can stored in the trunk of a car is like carrying a bomb that could go off at any minute.

"Technicians have compared the destructive force of a two-gallon can of gasoline to that of several sticks of dynamite," Williams said. "A spark from starting the engine, the flame of lighting a cigarette, or the impact of a collision could blow the vehicle apart, causing death or injury."

Unfortunately, the TAISO chairman says, the fear of running out of gas put a lot of rank amateurs into the gas storage game.

"Many of those who handle gasoline for a living are quick to note that a container with a

small amount of fuel can be more dangerous than a full tank," Williams said. "The reason is that a small amount of gasoline in a can creates a highly explosive gas-air mixture which is more explosive than liquid gasoline itself."

Another problem brought on by the gas crisis, according to TAISO, is the use of secondary or auxiliary gas tanks, many of which are improperly installed or are not manufactured to industry standards.

Though an auxiliary fuel tank may extend the time between stops at the gas pump, it can also be just as deadly as a can of gasoline in the trunk if improperly installed. Many dealers of auxiliary gas tanks have seemingly sprung up overnight selling poorly constructed or poorly

installed merchandise.

Though gasoline storage in cars is a major concern of safety officials, gasoline storage in homes can be as, if not more, dangerous. Houses have been lifted off foundations and set afire by a basement full of gasoline fumes ignited by a water heater or furnace pilot light.

In one California fire, seven members of a family were badly burned when they tried to store fuel in a plastic trash container in a bedroom closet.

Thus, what might look like a convenient way to beat a gasoline shortage on the road or in the home could have tragic side effects if precautions are not

taken. Here are a few tips from TAISO:

—Keep all gasoline containers tightly capped if they contain any fuel.

—Once a container is empty and thoroughly ventilated, leave the cap off to allow fumes from the remaining drops of gasoline to evaporate.

—Never put gasoline in anything but a container specifically designed for fuel.

—Keep gasoline where only an adult can get it. The smell of gasoline is often intriguing to children; don't let their curiosity cause them or anyone else harm.

—Stored gasoline must be kept away from heat and flame. Remember that

gasoline will expand in volume as temperatures rise and may seep out of even the best container.

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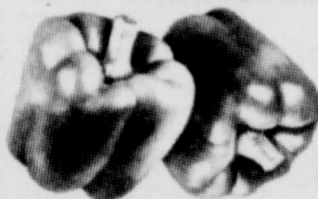

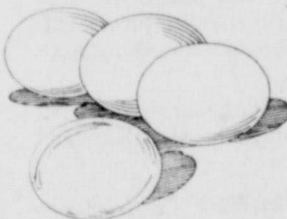

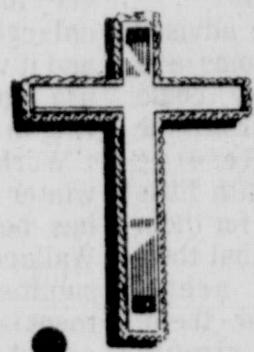

Homeowners In Cisco ISD Have Until July 16 To File For New Exemption

Homeowners in the Cisco ISD have until July 16 to take advantage of new exemptions passed recently by the state legislature. All homeowners, regardless of age, are eligible for an exemption of \$5,000 from the full market value of their home.

In addition, all persons who are 65 years old or older, or under a disability for purposes of payment of disability benefits under Federal Old Age, Survivors and Disability Insurance are also entitled to an additional exemption of \$10,000 from the market value of their residence homesteads for the purpose of school taxes.

To qualify for these exemptions for 1979, an application must be filed with the school district tax office on or before July 16, 1979. The exemptions cannot be granted for 1979 if filed after this date. The school tax office is located at 610 Avenue D. If you have any questions about the exemptions contact this office before deadline.

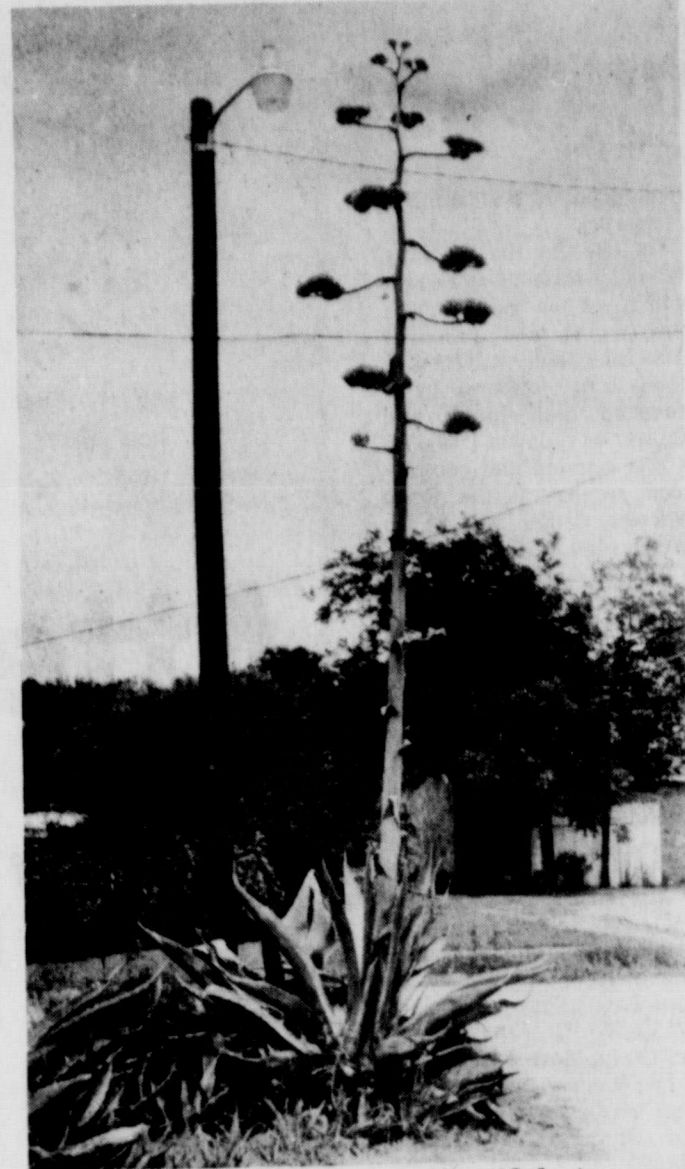
