A County Board of Appraisal would be established by the following time table:

By September 15, 1979 County commissioners must decide and advise county clerk if they intend to join the appraisal districtcounty tax assessorcollector must approve. By October 1, 1979

County clerk calculate and certify the number of votes each taxing unit entitled to vote. Only towns, cities and school districts are entitled to vote, unless the county commissioners, with the approval of the county tax assessor-collector, opts to come in the appraisal district. In that case, the county is entitled to vote. By October 15, 1979

All voting taxing units nominate candidates to the county clerk. May nominate as many as five (5) candidates, or as few as one (1) candidate.

By October 30, 1979 County clerk prepare ballot in alpha order, and deliver same to taxing units entitled to vote.

By November 15, 1979 Taxing units vote and deliver same to county clerk. By Decen

Dr. Patrick also mentioned that some cattlemen are still not aware of the free calfhood Burcellosis vaccination program.

We strongly recommend that all heifer calves, both beef and dairy be vaccinated against brucellosis or Bangs disease. The proper age for vaccination is from 2-6 months for beef calves. Livestock producers can

have their calves vaccinated at no cost by an accredited veterinarian under the freebased vaccination program. The veterinarian will be reimbursed when the calves are reported to the Texas Animal Health Commission.

Honey-dew aphids are Calves that are properly

immunized against brucellosis should have more resistance against the disease and therefore be more valuable for herd replacements. In addition, more states are now requiring that all female dairy animals entering the state be only officially vaccinated animals. Other states requiring all non-vaccinated heifers over 6 months be tested and negative at test.

Producers interested in having their calves officially vaccinated against brucellosis should contact their veterinarian for further details.
