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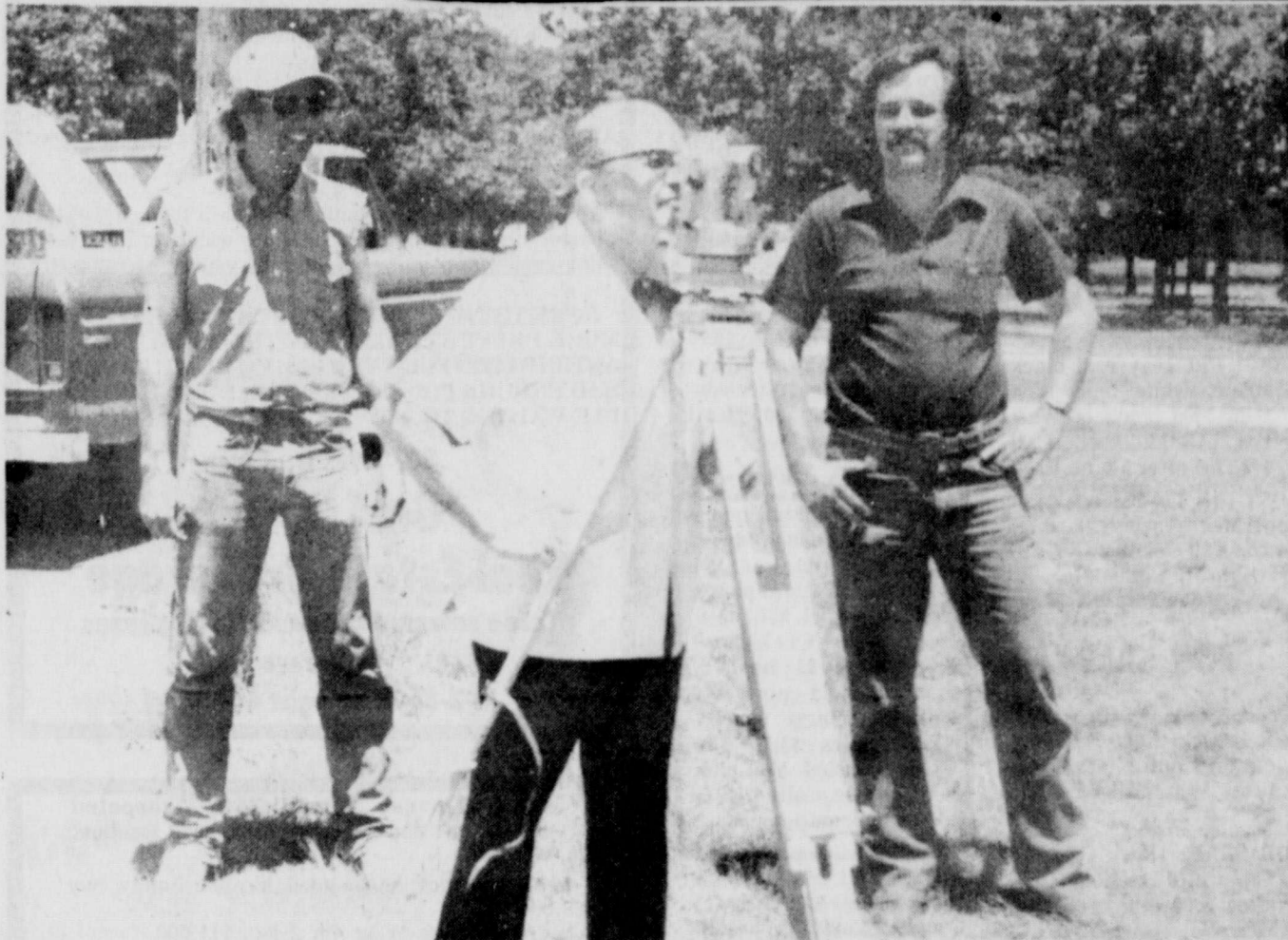

Tax Values Going To 100% ... And Here's How

Tax evaluations are going to be raised to 100 percent of market value across the state, by mandate of the State Legislature—and it's coming quicker than a lot of people might think.

A group of 33 Eastland Counties "got the facts" in a special meeting Monday night, when a representative from the Pritchard special meeting Monday night, when a representative from the Pritchard and Abbott Appraisal firm "spelled out" the details of Senate Bill 621,

and many were surprised to learn that there's a fixed time-table. The various taxing agencies in Eastland County (city, school, county, hospital, water, junior college, etc.) traditionally have maintained relatively low (compared to many) tax valuations, but under the new law (prompted by big-city interests where values have been high for a long time), all property will be on the tax rolls at pure market value.

Now it's conceivable that when values are raised, rates "could" be lowered to raise an equivalent amount of tax revenue necessary to operate the various taxing agencies, so it doesn't necessarily mean an automatic tax hike for everybody. The formula(s) for equalizing values is a fairly complicated one, and is carefully set out, with the establishment of a new "all-powerful" appraisal district in each county, which will serve all taxing bodies. (Counties, by Constitution, are now required immediately to go into the program, but would by Amendment in 1980, surely be forced to go into the program.)



Truck Overtakes On I-20 Friday

A truck loaded with 9,000 gallons of naphtha overturned at 1 p.m. Friday at the southern edge of Cisco on Interstate 20. Naphtha is a highly flammable liquid mixture used chiefly as a solvent.

Traffic was detoured for two miles around the wreck from 1 to 5:30 p.m. The driver, Dixon A. Brown of Lindale, was treated and released at the E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital.

Department of Public Safety Trooper Boyd Herring, who investigated the accident with trooper Steve Tone, said the eastbound truck topped a hill and suddenly was behind traffic moving much slower than he was. He hit the median, causing the truck to overturn.

About 7,000 gallons of the naphtha spilled from the truck. The spill was covered with sand by the Texas Highway Department. Another truck, westbound and of the same company, came by and pumped about 2,000 gallons out of the overturned truck and picked up the driver at the hospital.

Summer Is The Season For Catching Live Bait

If you want to add versatility to your summer fishing techniques without spending a lot of money, you might try catching your own live bait.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department points out that there is a staggering array of aquatic and terrestrial creatures which make excellent fish bait, and most are fairly easy to get. Here are a few tips from department fisheries specialists on collecting live bait:

MINNOWS
Most Texas streams and reservoirs have several native species of minnows. A two-person minnow seine pulled through the shallows will sometimes yield enough bait for a fishing trip, and it is theorized by many anglers that native minnows or shad often will catch fish when their store-bought counterparts of a different size or species fail.

Minnow traps made from fruit jars also can get results. Fitted with a funnel-shaped lid, the traps are especially effective when placed in shallow stream water with the open end pointed downstream.

EARTHWORMS
Digging for worms can be tiring and unproductive unless you dig in soil which has been undisturbed for some time. Soil which is fairly moist and has a good network of root systems usually is the best place to find worms. White grub-worms which often turn up in a worm-digging operation also are excellent fishbait.

GRASSHOPPERS
One of the deadliest baits, and one which will catch virtually every native game fish, is the grasshopper. And they are surprisingly easy to catch. They are

sluggish in the early morning hours when there is a heavy dew, and can be caught by hand or with a butterfly net. However, the most effective method is to use a flashlight at night. They tend to remain immobile in the light's glare and are vulnerable to capture. Also, if you need to catch some hoppers in mid-day and don't have a net, use a small tree limb or long shock of weeds to swat them. The blow usually will stun them long enough to allow the energetic fisherman to pick them up. A small wooden frame box with sides of window screen is handy for keeping the hoppers, particularly when fitted with overlapping flaps made from automobile innertubes on one end. The flaps allow the angler to slip a hand into the box without allowing a mass escape by the agile insects.

CRICKETS
Another highly effective bait for summertime is the cricket, either the black or gray variety. You can attract a few in your back yard by using a sheet of corrugated

aluminum, plywood or other flat object. Lean it against a fence or building, leaving a few inches of space between "roof" and "the" ground. crickets will seek the cooling shade during the heat of the day and can be harvested regularly. During peak hatch periods, crickets can be collected in large numbers around yard floodlights or street lights. You generally can capture some by searching grassy areas around building foundations at night with a light. If there happens to be a water well in your area, check it at night. Gray crickets often congregate in wells or caves during the summer and can be caught easily. After you catch a bunch of crickets, you might find it handy to buy one of the commercial "cricket tubes" which dispense the insects one at a time for easy hook baiting and re-baiting.

CRAWFISH
Another highly prized live bait, crawfish can be captured several ways. The easiest method during spring and early summer is simply to seine roadside ditches or other low-lying areas after a rain. This often will produce more crawfish than one would need for a dozen fishing trips. However,

during drier times it may be more difficult. If the water is clear you can snare them by hand after turning over rocks. Cloudy water makes catching them by hand difficult if not impossible, but a standard minnow seine pulled slowly through the shallows can be effective. Square-frame dip nets also can be pushed through aquatic weeds where crawfish hides. Oddly, this technique is more effective when the net is moved downstream, as the crawfish tend to swim upstream when flushed from hiding places. Crawfish should not be stored in a minnow bucket or other receptacle full of water. Rather, place them in a styrofoam chest with only about an inch of water in the bottom and throw in some weeds for the crustaceans to cling to. The most laborious, but perhaps the most sporting way to catch crawfish is to tie a piece of bacon or meat scrap on the end of a string and toss it into a creek. After a few minutes, pull the bait slowly and very likely you will have one or more crawfish clinging to it. A dip net is fairly essential to scoop up the crawfish as the bait nears the surface.

MISCELLANEOUS BAITS
If you live in East Texas, check your local area for catalpa trees. Periodically during the spring and summer, larvae of the sphinx moth hatch into a caterpillar stage. These are referred to as "catalpa worms," are prized as fish bait. They can be plucked from the underside of catalpa tree leaves. A natural bait which is effective for sunfish is wasp larvae, although the dangers inherent in obtaining an active wasp nest are obvious. Also, the wasp larvae require by the fisherman to be effective. Meal worms are good bait, and you can have a continuous supply by putting a few into a lidded container with bran, corn meal or potatoes. Normally they will reproduce enough to provide a constant supply of worms for fishing. Hellgrammites are a terrific bait, but are difficult to capture. These centipede-like aquatic nymphs are the larval stage of the dobsonfly, and they can be captured by turning over rocks in some Texas streams. The hellgrammite either will be clinging to the underside of the rock or nestled in the stream bed. Despite their grotesque appearance, they can be picked up by hand.

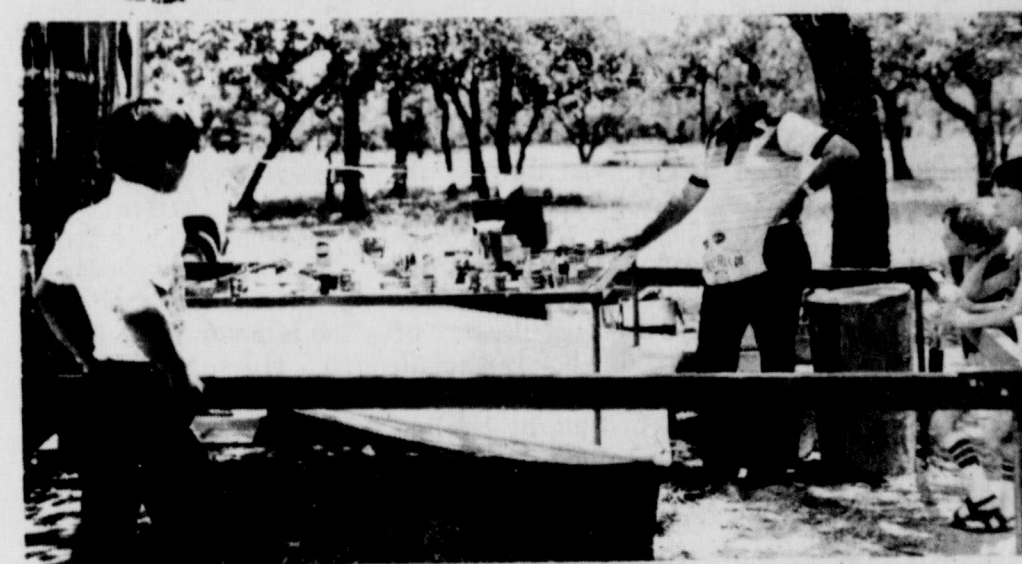
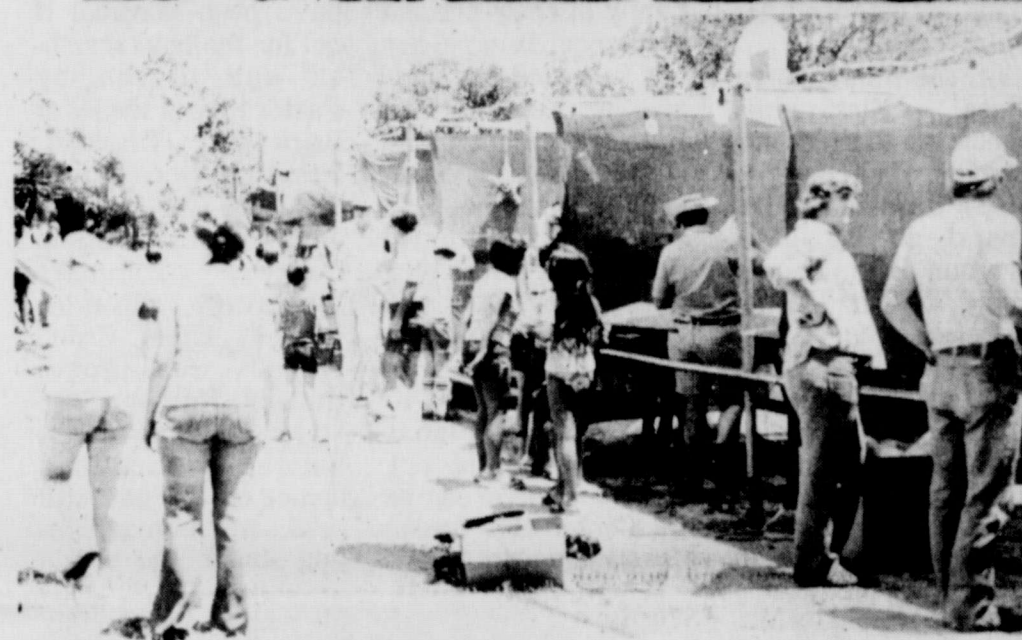

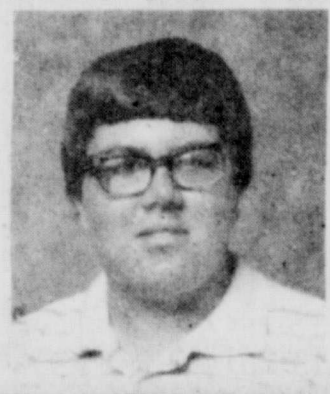

Dear Pat—Not long ago "Realtors Review" ran an article "Housing for the Handicapped", relating how accessible homes could easily be found through the Multiple Listing Service (MLS) in Fort Lauderdale, Florida. Realtor Fred Wooten, who has muscular dystrophy, specializes in homes for the disabled in that area. He was successful in getting homes for the disabled identified in the MLS book by having the book by having the accessibility symbol applied to the photo of a house before it was reproduced.

Barred-free homes are now easy to pinpoint by any realtor or prospect looking through the listings.

I know your column is

widely read in many cities, and if an organization, an agency for the disabled, or even an individual brought this idea to the attention of realtors in their community it would serve the growing number of physically handicapped individuals well.—Ms. B.B.N.—Georgia

Dear Ms. N.—House hunting has always been difficult not only for the physically handicapped but for parents of handicapped children, the elderly, and the able-bodied who are looking for retirement homes.

The accessibility symbol and the Multiple Listing Service has already joined hands in a number of cities but at this time I don't have an accounting of how extensive this service is.

I would like to hear from some of my readers on this subject as to whether their city offers this type listing, is considering it or has rejected it. There is a possibility your local realtors have never heard of it. You can explain it to them or send them a copy of this column.—Pat

Dear Pat—Can you give me some information on the new federal guidelines that affect the blind and deaf in regards to being hired in Civil Service jobs?—Mr. P.L.—Oklahoma.

Dear Paul—I think perhaps you misunderstood the basic fact of the new guidelines.

The office of Personnel Management (OPM) has given federal agencies new guidelines on hiring or assigning readers and interpreters for government employees who are blind or deaf.

Under the Civil Services Reform Act of 1978, readers and interpreters may be appointed noncompetitively in the excepted service, on a full time, part-time, or intermittent basis. grade levels will vary according to the

situation. If you are currently a competitive service employee and assume these duties, you will retain your competitive service status even if you are reclassified as a reader or interpreter.—Pat

Dear Pat—My wife is disabled and uses a wheelchair. Can you give me any information on working in a garden. She does have a weakness in both hands but for many years she did love her garden.

I have heard about growing a water garden which would eliminate a lot of work I think.—S.M.—Arkansas

Dear Mr. M.—I have a booklet on Gardening Tips For The Handicapped that does refer to water gardening. The main portion deals with gardening in the traditional manner, however, but there are many excellent tips on gardening with various disabilities. 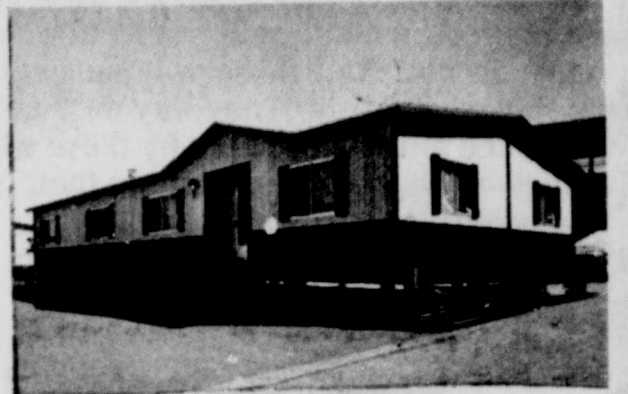

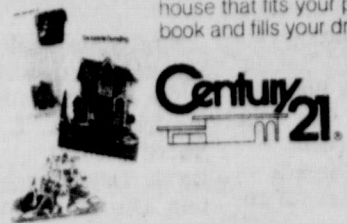

GORDON SPOT

There are a lot of Sorghum hybrid pastures and hay fields in the County this year. They are furnishing good grazing for cattle, but we would like to remind horse owners of the danger of these sorghum fields.

Dr. Vergil Patrick, Veterinarian in Cisco, called to tell us that some people are grazing their horses in

these sorghum fields and having problems with sorghum cystitis.

This syndrome was reported by the College of Veterinary Medicine in 1966. Since the original reports, it has been recognized with increasing frequency in this area of the United States. It occurs more frequently during times of medium to

high rainfall, from June to November.

Horses affected have a history of grazing hybrid plants resulting from crossing Sorghum with Sudan. Other cases have been reported in horses grazing varieties of Sorghum of Johnson Grass mixed with native pastures. The problem occurred when the plants were young and growing rapidly, but mature and second growth pastures also caused sorghum cystitis.

Horses fed well-cured sorghum species hay were not affected, but cases did develop after eating freshly cut hay. The condition occurs in all equine breeds. Age does not seem to be a factor

since it has been reported in horses from 5 months of age to 20 years. The majority were 2 to 3 years old.

The first signs usually seen have been incoordination of the rear legs. This is usually followed by uncontrolled urination.

When affected animals are removed from the pasture and fed a balanced ration, they usually improve, but complete recoveries have not been reported.

The best prevention is to keep your horses off sudan and sorghum hybrid type pastures. Do not feed freshly cut sudan or hybrid hay to horses. Well-cured hay should cause no problems.

Dr. Patrick also mentioned that some cattlemen are still not aware of the free calf-hood Brucellosis vaccination program.

We strongly recommend that all heifer calves, both beef and dairy be vaccinated against brucellosis or Bangs disease. The proper age for vaccination is from 2-6 months for beef calves.

Livestock producers can have their calves vaccinated at no cost by an accredited veterinarian under the free-based vaccination program. The veterinarian will be reimbursed when the calves are reported to the Texas Animal Health Commission. Calves that are properly

immunized against brucellosis should have more resistance against the disease and therefore be more valuable for herd replacements. In addition, more states are now requiring that all female dairy animals entering the state be only officially vaccinated animals. Other states requiring all non-vaccinated heifers over 6 months be tested and negative at test.

Producers interested in having their calves officially vaccinated against brucellosis should contact their veterinarian for further details.

Honey-dew aphids are

now causing problems in pecan trees. Not only do the aphids cause damage to the pecan leaves but the sticky honey-dew is a definite nuisance where the pecan trees are located in the lawns

or near drive ways. Malathion is recommended as the insecticide to use on yard trees while Malathion or Zolone are recommended for aphid control in commercial orchards.

Dear Editor: Due to the turmoil, problems, dissension that is prevailing in the courthouse

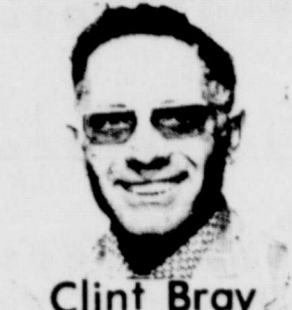
has upset many people in Eastland County. Sheriff Ronnie White deserves enough new cars for himself and all his deputies, he deserves his office to be refurbished, also

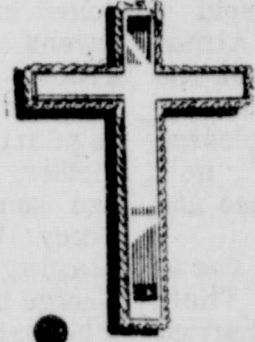

Homeowners In Cisco ISD Have Until July 16 To File For New Exemption

Homeowners in the Cisco ISD have until July 16 to take advantage of new exemptions passed recently by the state legislature. All homeowners, regardless of age, are eligible for an exemption of \$5,000 from the full market value of their home.

In addition, all persons who are 65 years old or older, or under a disability for purposes of payment of disability benefits under Federal Old Age, Survivors and Disability Insurance are also en-

titled to an additional exemption of \$10,000 from the market value of their residence homesteads for the purpose of school taxes.

To qualify for these exemptions for 1979, an application must be filed with the school district tax office on or before July 16, 1979. The exemptions cannot be granted for 1979 if filed after this date. The school tax office is located at 610 Avenue D.
