

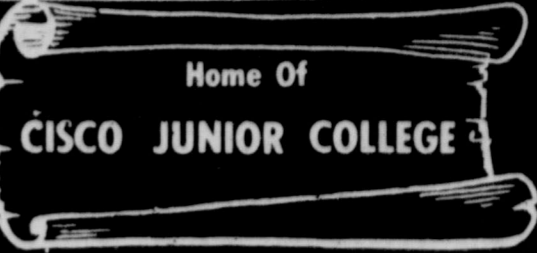

Kenneth Eaves Named As Cisco Chief Of Police Monday

'Cats' Ingram Re-Assigned As Lake Patrolman

City Manager John Boland announced Monday of this week that Kenneth Eaves, 33, has been named as Cisco Chief of Police effective July 16. Acting Police Chief, "Cats" Ingram has been re-assigned to new duties as Cisco Lake Patrolman.

Police Chief Eaves is well qualified for the position and was previously with the Austin Police Department from April 1971 to September 1975. While there, he was a member of a S.W.A.T. (Special Weapons and Tactics) team and he was a fire team leader.

From September of 1975 until October 1976, he was with the Hayes County Sheriff's Department. He left there in October of 1976 due to the election of a new sheriff.

From June 18 to July 9 of this year he was a member of the Eastland County Sheriff Department. Mr. Eaves holds 1178 hours of law enforcement training. He has his Intermediate Certificate and should receive his Advanced Certification within the year. He previously attended Tarleton State University for two years.

City Manager Boland states that Mr. Eaves comes highly recommended from the law departments he has worked for in the past. Some of the recommendations cited that he is "conscientious and

clean-cut". Reading from an efficiency report by the Austin Police Department Mr. Boland quoted, "He can handle any assignment given, he is dependable, a good all-around police officer and he has definite leadership abilities."

Mr. Eaves was born September 15, 1945, in Gorman and he was raised in Carbon. His parents presently live between Carbon and Cisco. Mr. Eaves and his wife, Harriett Ann, and their two children have purchased a home in Cisco.

City Manager Boland stated that he had no intention of changing Police Chiefs at this time, but due to recent changes in the County Sheriff's department he had received some outstanding applications for

Police Chief. He went on to say that due to Mr. Eaves qualifications, he briefed the City Council last Tuesday concerning the applications and he felt a decision to hire a new chief was well worth the investigation.

Mr. Boland stressed the fact that "Cats" Ingram had accepted the position of Police Chief last August as a temporary assignment and had neither asked for, nor wanted, the position. He went on to say Mr. Ingram only felt it was his duty as senior officer to keep the department stable and functioning properly. He also said Mr. Ingram only accepted the position as long as he felt the City Manager was looking for a qualified man for the permanent position.

Because of the City

Council's recent expressed desire to see the police department and Lake Patrol as two separate departments, Mr. Boland has re-assigned Mr. Ingram as Lake Patrolman effective July 16. Mr. Ingram had applied for the new position and was accepted due to his qualifications in that area.

As Lake Patrolman, his duties will be to patrol Lake Cisco, both the water and the north and south shore roads; he will also patrol the areas of Lake Cisco Park, Williamson Dam and Cisco Municipal Airport. He will be in charge of cabin security and will be available for 24 hour emergency calls. He will also do other jobs as specified directly by the City Manager.

Mr. Boland stated that he feels "what is one department's loss is another's gain. I value "Cats" as both an employee and as a friend. I feel this re-assignment is in the best interest of both, he and the city.

Continuing, Mr. Boland said, "The City is indebted to "Cats" for the work he has done over the past year as Chief of Police. I would like to publicly commend "Cats" on his efforts during his time as Cisco's acting Chief of Police."

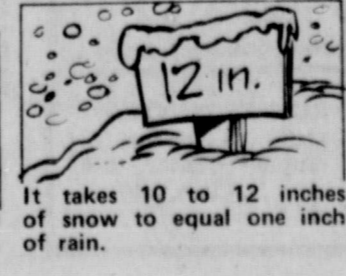

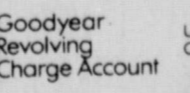

Congressional Comment

Washington, D.C. — The true test of the greatness of a nation is never how well it deals with war, but how well it can learn to live in peace. Wars have always been the easy way to settle disputes, but peace has always been difficult to maintain. Nowhere is this more evident than in the Middle East today.

The roots of our culture, our religion, and our way of life all come from this region. Now, as in the beginning of civilization, this area continues to be one of the centers of world conflict. From the Assyrians, to the Babylonians, to the Macedonians, Romans, Turks, and Europeans this area has for 5000 years been subject to repeated wars and foreign domination. In recent history the Middle East has been involved in a 30 year war that has

often had profound effects throughout the world. In 1956 an Arab-Israeli War also involved France and Britain because of the nationalization of the Suez Canal by Egypt. Soviet military intervention was narrowly averted. The 1973 Arab-Israeli conflict led to the oil embargo and rapidly escalating oil prices at a cost to the U.S. economy of billions of dollars.

But starting in November of 1977 with the visit of Anwar Sadat to Jerusalem the hopes for stability and peace in this region began to be a possibility. In March of 1979 a peace treaty was signed between Egypt and Israel. Though there are still significant obstacles to overcome, this action is a major step in the right direction.

All parties concerned are learning that the price of peace is never cheap. Anwar Sadat

has been ostracized by his Arab neighbors and marked for assassination. Israel will have to withdraw from certain occupied lands making their strategic defense capability considerably more vulnerable.

The American government will be required to pay \$1.1 billion dollars in grants and provide \$3.7 billion in military loans for Egypt and Israel.

It would appear that the motives of the United States to support peace in the Middle East are entirely altruistic — they are not. It is in our self interest that stability in this region be maintained. The continuous operation of the Suez Canal is vital to East-West trade. The flow of Arab oil is essential to the U.S. economy. There is a need for America to establish a military presence in the Mediterranean and the Persian Gulf which can effectively discourage Soviet aggression.

A recent study was done by the Pentagon which found that the Soviet navy could only last eight days in the event of war — Why? — because of the effectiveness of the Israeli Air Force. So is \$1.1 billion too much to pay for a chance at peace? I think not. The cost of war is astronomical.

Coping with death together helps both children and adults in families share feelings—their hopes, fears, sorrows, ideas, beliefs and faith for now and for the future, a family life education specialist says.

This is especially important for the children in a family, Patricia Lamson with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, stresses.

"What would you say to your child who asks, 'When will Grandpa wake up?' not long after Grandpa has died?"

For some parents this is not a difficult question, Ms. Lamson says.

"It is important to answer honestly and use language and ideas that the child will understand."

"Parents need to help their children cope with death—regardless of age level—because it is fundamental to developmental growth," she explains.

CHILDREN'S VIEWS
Most studies reveal that children think of death within the limits of their own experience.

They also accept the reality of death in several stages based on their social and emotional development, Ms. Lamson says.

From birth until four years of age, most children sense loss, but they cannot grasp the realities of birth or death.

Children, five to nine, become aware of life and death as well as joys and sorrows they bring. This age group often attributes death to the bogeyman.

Most children eight to twelve years old see a pet die and may see a relative die. They begin to see some causes of death and to wonder about life.

But death to them is still distant and far off.

Most teenagers realize all living beings die, and most view life and death as part of the natural process of aging, sickness or general physical deterioration.

TALK TO CHILDREN
Be objective in talking to children about death and dying, but avoid being technical, Ms. Lamson suggests.

Being technical could confuse the child, she says.

Attempt to answer questions with the most sincere, direct and truthful response possible.

SHARE FEELINGS

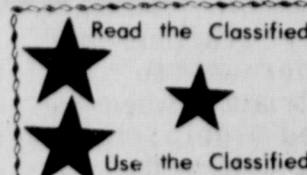
Mourn with your child because supporting each other helps both.

If an adult does not grieve, a child may think something is being hidden.

Express your feelings, because tears, grieving and crying are not a show of weakness. Rather, they express sadness or pent up emotions released from pressures.

Help your child establish a realistic memory of the person who has died with pictures and spoken memories.

Helping a child cope with death is an important basic part of his life and of each family's life, she says.

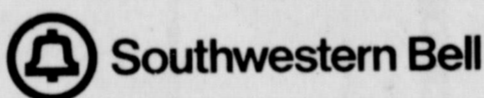

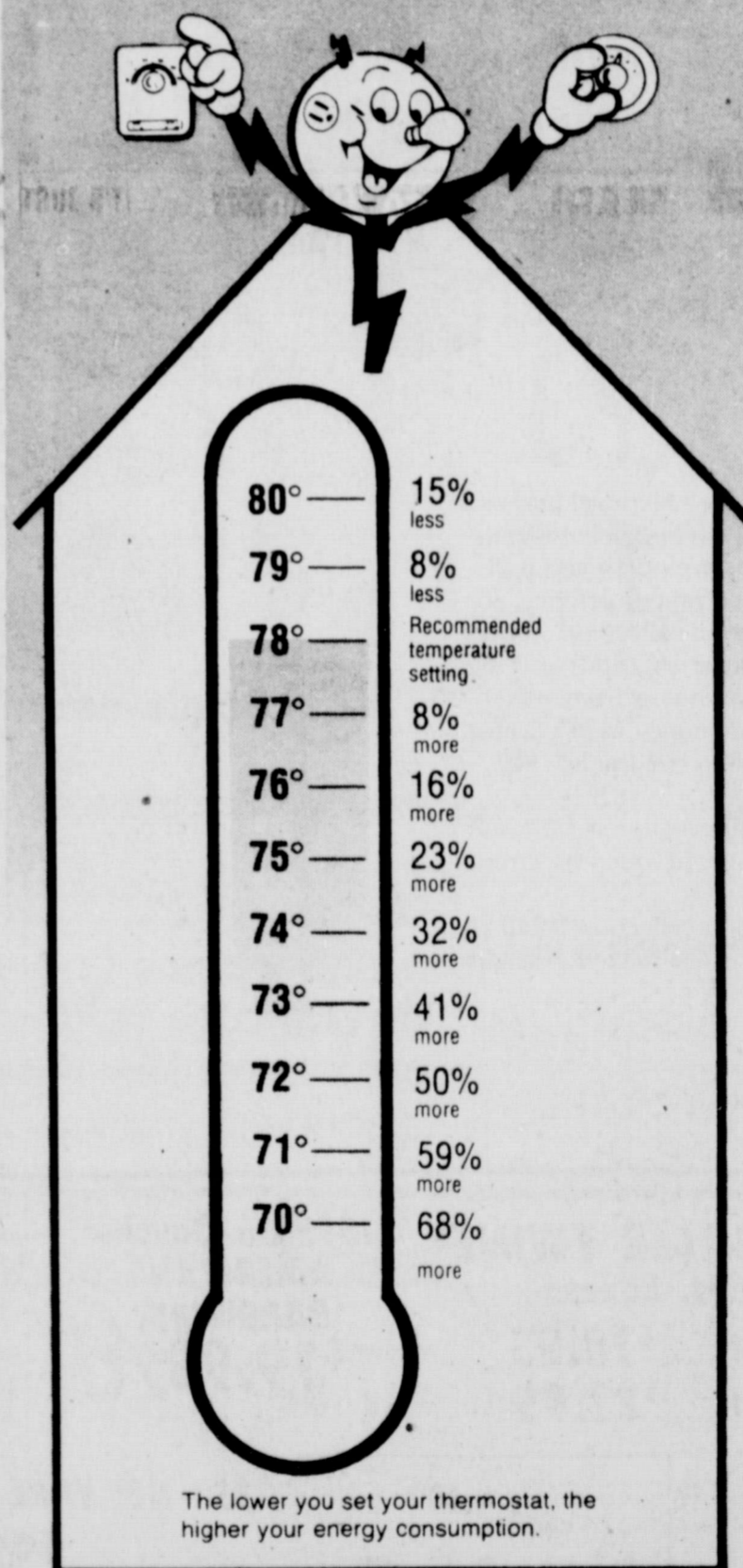

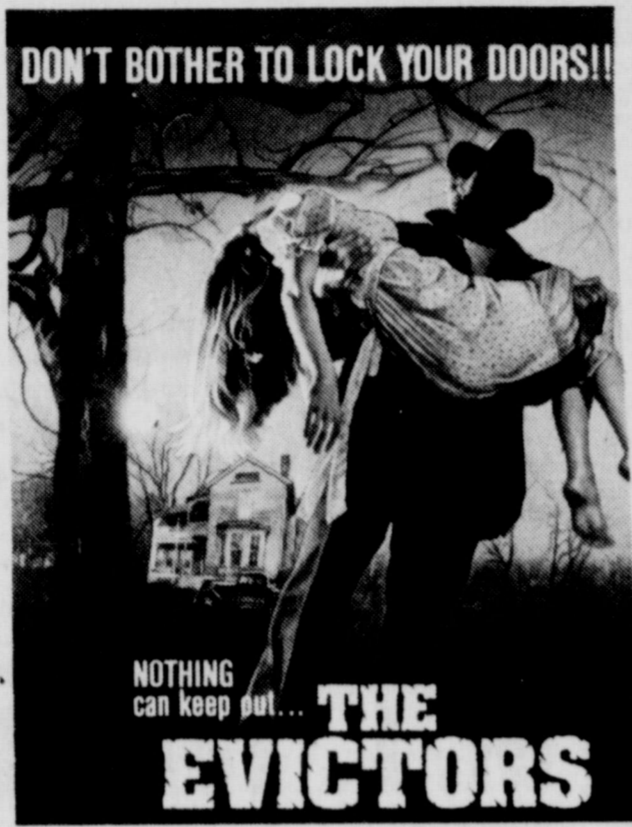

The entomologists encourage farmers and ranchers as well as homeowners to check for grasshopper infestations along roadsides, fence rows or idle, undisturbed ground where the pests may be hatching. A key to effectively suppressing grasshopper number is to treat these hatching areas early before young hoppers begin to migrate.

A bait mixture using toxaphene has been effective in controlling grasshoppers along field margins and roadsides, point out McWhorter and Hamman. The formulation calls for 100 pounds of mill-run bran, 1-one-third pints of Toxaphene 6E, 7 to 8 gallons of water, and 2 gallons of blackstrap molasses. Sawdust may be substituted for up to three-fourth of the amount of bran. Distribute the bait while still moist at 10 to 20 pounds per acre.

People Things

SOME MONTHS ago, The Longhorn Press (our small book printing company) received a letter from Billy G. Hughes, Jr., who had seen our ad in a magazine. He wanted to know if the Longhorn Press would be interested in a book manuscript he had finished. Billy's address is the Ellis Unit, Texas Department of Corrections (the state prison system), Huntsville. And he is in a cell on death row.

After some correspondence, we decided that Billy's book idea has some merit. So we drove down to Huntsville last Monday to see Billy and talk to him about book publishing. BILLY HAS been in the death row cell for over three years now. Briefly, his story is this: A native resident of

Alabama, 24-year old Billy was driving through Texas - between Colorado and his home. It was a rainy night on the highway in a small town area near Houston.

Police stopped Billy. One approached the car on the driver's side. The other was back of the car. Billy reach for his wallet with driver's license in the glove compartment. Gun shooting began. The officer beside the car was shot and died. Nine bullet holes were in Billy's car.

Billy says he couldn't have done the shooting as he had no gun. In the excitement of it all, he jumped out of the car and ran. Later, he was found and arrested as he lay under a tree nearby.

THREE DAYS later, police took Billy to court for a hearing. He was charged with capital murder - a mandatory life or death sentence if found guilty. Lawyers he talked to wanted \$30,000 to defend him, and he didn't have that kind of money. Another said he would take the case if Billy's parents would sign everything they owned over to him. He wouldn't let them and the court appointed an attorney to defend him.

Billy remembers the trial as a formality and the jury found him guilty with a death sentence. The county authorities saw to it that he was delivered to Huntsville the next day.

SINCE GOING to Huntsville, the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals and the Texas Supreme Court have reviewed the case with the verdict left intact. Billy was last scheduled to die July 9th - last week. A federal official intervened and he has an organization looking into his case.

A well known magazine has a writer assigned to the case with the prospect that a report will be published in a few months.

Billy is now 27 years old. He is a neat, clean appearing young man who devotes some 15 hours a day to writing and cartooning. His parents come from Alabama to see him every month or two, and his girl friend flies in from Oregon twice a year or so to visit him.

Prison rules allow Billy to have company twice a month - four hours if the company is relatives, two if not. Visitors meet prisoners in a large room with a chair on each side of a bench. You're separated by a heavy mesh wire.

BILLY SAYS HIS plight is an example of what can happen to you if you are at the wrong place at the wrong time. When he says he is innocent, Billy is quick to add: "They all say that." Now that the federal intervention has stayed the execution, Billy is hopeful that some breaks will come his way.

Three years on death row haven't been easy, he says. He stays busy "to keep my sanity," he said. There are 120 cells (all full) in the death row block, and television monitors are attached to the wall outside the cells where the prisoners can watch programs. Billy ignores most of the tv offerings, preferring to write or draw. He has a small radio that he keeps on softy much of the time.

THE FIRST time we visited the Huntsville prison was in 1937 when the newspaper we worked for in East Texas sent us there to cover an execution. A young man was put to death in the electric chair after conviction on murder-rape charges. It was an experience that we'll never forget.

Billy wanted to know if we believed that the courts should be allowed to use the death penalty. We told him that there are occasionally crime cases where anything but a death penalty would seem too lenient. Billy said that he could see our point but he wondered if a life sentence wouldn't be worse.

IN ANY EVENT, we hope that an exhaustive investigation will be made in Billy's case and that the truth will come out. Meanwhile, we hope to print a small book that he has written and illustrated.

On occasional trips from the mountains I had considered Albuquerque an exciting place, with beautiful landmarks all around the horizon. But this was no picnic in a park beside the Rio Grande; now I lived in this war-swollen city. And I realized that nothing in my previous experience had prepared me to cope with it. The salary of an Airforce private was about \$60.00 per month in those days, with no allotment for a family. I needed a job, but there were hundreds of well-dressed, well-trained girls in

town competing for everything desirable, including the men at the airbase! We hadn't been in town long until the area was shocked by huge black headlines in the paper telling of the fall of the Philippines, and the Bataan Death March. The New Mexico National Guard was caught in that disaster, and I never understood why it was sent there in the first place. As I looked over the long list of New Mexico boys who were killed or missing I saw the names of a number of my classmates from Mountainair High School, carefree kids

who had joined the Guard just to earn a little extra money. I found a job managing an apartment house while the owner, an unusual elderly woman, went to Arizona for the winter. She flitted happily in and out of reality, and had few requests for me as she left her remodeled mansion. She simply wanted everything cleaned with kerosene - the beautiful cherry-wood floors in her part of the house, the bathtubs, everything! As I tried that stuff I was really surprised at how well it shined up the house, but the smell was overpowering! As soon as the landlady caught the bus to Arizona, I grabbed a mop and some soap!

One of the tenants from an upstairs apartment, an attractive, dark-haired girl named Vesta Muth, came down the entry-hall laughing. "Well maybe we'll get that horrid smell out of here for awhile!" She stopped to chat, and her friendly manner was in marked contrast to other people I had met in the city. Especially, I reflected, northern people.

Her husband Don, she explained, was a cook at Kirtland Field, but he liked to sketch in his spare time. She would like me to look at some Southwestern drawings he had finished. He called them terrible and she thought they were wonderful. Don had attended college in California, but had never studied art.

I had no technical knowledge of art, and could not have drawn anything if my life had depended on it! I spoke briefly to Don, who resembled a blonde Abraham Lincoln. But when I saw his sketches, I felt an impact difficult to describe. I sensed there was a living aura about great art, just as in fine music and good literature.

"Some day," I blurted impulsively. "You will be known as a great artist, Don Muth!"

As Don ripped apart one of his sketches he could not foresee his magnificent paintings hanging in galleries, winning acclaim, and selling for thousands of dollars. For his future, like all of our generation, seemed caught in global circumstances.

"But," Vesta said, "We are not really worried - for God is in charge of this world, and nothing can happen which is not for our good."

That speech surprised me so much that I accepted an invitation to go to Church with Vesta before my wits came back to me. But when she mentioned they attended on Saturday instead of Sunday, I almost bolted. She assured me they were Christians, and members of the Seventh-day Adventist Church. I decided I could stand anything once.

I must have looked like an unlikely candidate for conversion as I went to the simple downtown Church. I was on a Navajo Indian kick, and wearing a Navajo coat and all the Indian jewelry I could afford. (It was cheap, then!) I met a number of pleasant young people, many of whom were in the Air Force. I listened to a reverent service, which didn't particularly affect me. But I gleaned an invitation to a Church part, and it turned

out to be lots of fun. I found out that the young people of this Church liked music, and soon Travis and I were playing for a number of entertainments. These were cheerful people. I relished - seemed to have more hope than a lot of others in this town.

There were some loaves and fishes along with this Church too. One of the members was acquainted with a leading officer at the base, and he asked her for a list of dependable young women to go to the officer's homes and babysit.

When I saw the homes of some of these officers, I understood why they wanted the babysitters screened. Beautiful jewelry - expensive clothing - fine furniture. Even in wartime, I thought, some people manage to ride on the crest of the wave, with money, cars, tires, and gasoline.

But as I grew more acquainted with these Airforce families, I realized they deserved everything they got. Most of them had given up much more civilian life than they ever had around the base. In this age of non-sacrifice it is difficult to remember how constantly these pilots and bombardiers laid their lives on the line. And their arena was one meant for gods and demigods - tumbling clouds, far above the earth.

The landlady returned, and we moved to another apartment. It was a cold day in early March, 1943. Travis received a phone call at the base saying that Bert Kayser was dying in a hospital down town.

My first reaction was that of anger. "What did Bert Kayser mean, just faling up and dying? He couldn't treat us that way - take away his music! Why didn't the Doctors do something?"

Travis hurried over to the hospital to check things out. When he came from the visit I saw he had paled. "I don't think you'd better go down there. He's in a big ward for men - you can't get in. And he looks so terrible! When he finally recognized me he said to tell you to play enough music the rest of your life for the both of you."

"That is really crazy!" I cried. "He knows I can never play like him!"

"But there is no one else. For you are the only one he ever tried to teach anything. And for a violin player, you show signs of being downright durable!"

Bert Kayser was returned to the mountains for burial in a family cemetery. News of his funeral filtered back to me. One cousin declared he didn't hear a word the Baptist preaching said during the whole service - all he could hear was beautiful violin music, as if Bert was playing, and a whole choir of violins joining in. Since I was having some of the same problem - even without attending the funeral service I talked to Vesta Muth about it.

"What does happen to people when they die, Vesta? I've always been puzzled about how people will fight as hard as they can to keep someone alive, then if this person dies declare they have gone straight to Heaven, and are much better off!"

"I do not believe our dead are now in Heaven," Vesta answered quietly. "With a few exceptions, they are sleeping in the earth until Christ returns. The dead know not anything. Otherwise, why would Christ return?"

"But I don't really believe the Bible at all," I fumbled. "Have you ever really studied the Bible?"

I had to answer no. "Even a book-critic, reviewing a book in the newspapers would study the book before making up his mind about it," she replied. "Maybe I'll study it sometime."

My 'sometime' was suddenly postponed. The next day was a busy one - I had decided to look for a violin teacher to replace Bert Kayser, so I called a well-known teacher in town. He sounded tired, cross, and had a high fee for private lessons. I was decidedly annoyed, but while pondering over this I was reached by a long-distance call from West Texas. My mother was in a hospital, was not expected to live, and my father wanted me to come home.

In the early darkness I sailed down the Rio Grande on the little diesel train with the mournful whistle. I had wildly canceled out everything I had promised to do in Albuquerque. My new-found life there, I reflected, was probably canceled out too. Soon Travis would leave the Airbase, and there would be

no reason to go back. And the nice young people from the Church - they were educated, yet so unpretentious and human. I would miss them.

The news about my mother was paralyzing - it was unbearable. It simply could not be. I had to wait to change trains in Belen, and a dance was in full blast near the depot. A Spanish man staggered over from the dance, and tossed a dollar at my feet. I had forgotten that I carrying my violin - that made me fair game! I roused and made an excuse. Outside were the great blobs of stars, and sweet smells rising from the river. I would have to go through Abo Pass, to see the Manzano mountains tilted against the sky. If I could only shake that sweet, sad music out of my brain! For I would not be back in this part of New Mexico for a long, long time. (To Be Continued)

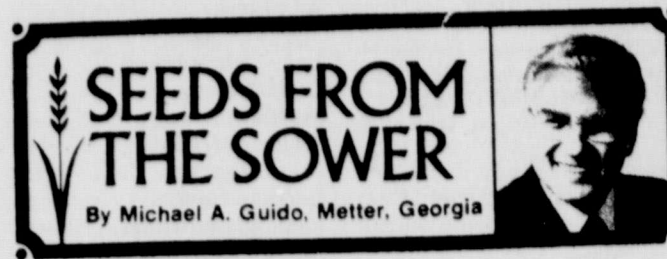

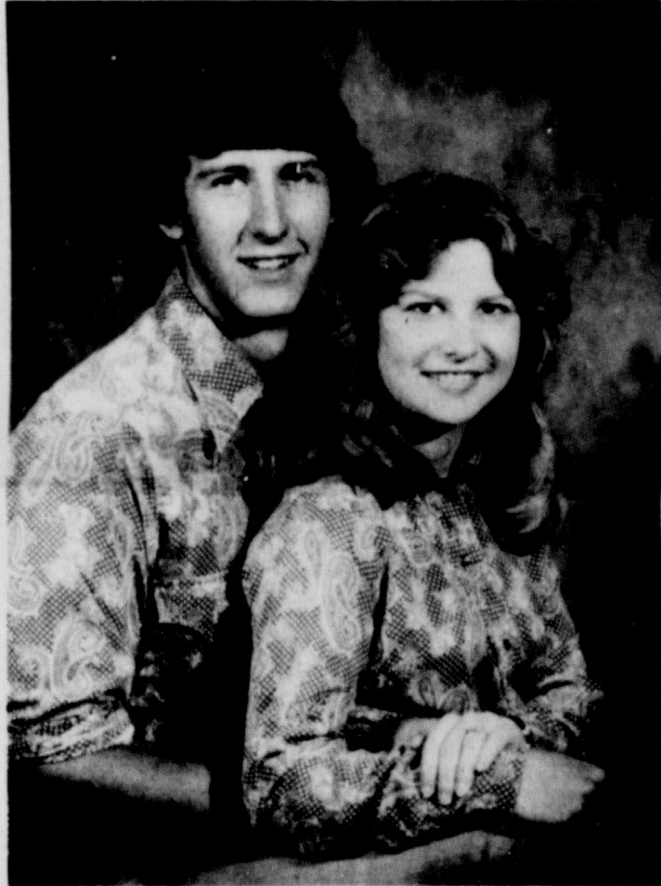
Engagement Announced

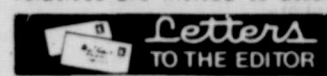
