When the Range Grass Band performs you may be assured there is happiness among the luncheon guests of the program. This band performs often for the senior citizens and is always well received.

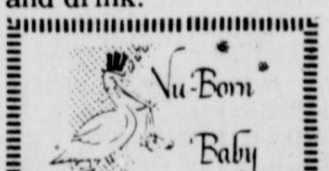

graze the "back side" of a pasture or utilize areas where they ordinarily would not spend much time. In a big pasture, water should be spaced approximately every 1/4 to 1/2 mile in rough country, 3/8 to 1/2 mile in rolling country, and 1/4 to 1/2 mile apart in level country. Properly spaced water sources will help improve distribution of grazing. In smaller pastures, there should be at least one good pond or one that can be trapped to provide water to two or more pastures.

A well located pond can be an asset to wildlife on rangeland. In the photograph we see brush in the background which provides cover for deer or turkey. Deer are a valuable game animal and must have food, water, and cover before they will stay in an area. If water is the missing element, a pond in the right location may improve the deer habitat. Wild turkey need to get their young to water within 24 hours. In studies conducted at the Kerr Wildlife area at Hunt, Texas, no turkey nests were found over one mile from water and most averaged 2/10 mile from water. Turkeys like to range up and down wooded bottomlands

Ponds Necessary Part Of Operation

Ponds are a necessary part of a successful, well managed ranching or farming operation. They provide a water source that is inexpensive to install and maintain. A pond can sometimes be

used to enhance the beauty of an area or make use of a soil of low productivity such as some of the shaly hills in Eastland County.

The main use for ponds in Eastland County is for live-

stock water. A pond has the advantage of being cheaper to install than a well, windmill, and trough and can also be built where it will do the most good. It is a known fact that stock tend to graze more near water, feed, salt, and shade. By building a pond in a remote area of a pasture cattle can be encouraged to

where they have cover and food. Ponds can be located to benefit both wildlife, and livestock.

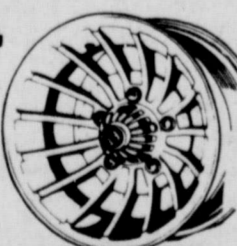

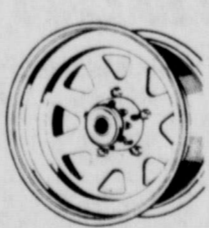

Adults Can Increase Bicycle Safety

Summer brings hordes of kids on bicycles streaming into the streets at all hours. To help children avoid accidents and adults cope with potential problems, the Texas Medical Association offers some suggestions.

During the school year, drivers have learned to slow down when they see school zones. But summer means slowing down in lots of other areas. Swimming pools and playgrounds attract youngsters in the summer so drivers should slow down when passing these areas, especially if there are warning signs or lights. Bike lanes, bike crossings and pedestrian crossings also require extra attention.

Long summer days mean many children may be playing in these and other areas at twilight. Since even cautious drivers have trouble seeing during this time of day, parents should make

sure children have reflectors on their bicycles and wear light-colored or reflective clothing. For riding at night, the law requires that bikes have a white headlight in front and a red reflector in back. Optional equipment such as a red light in back, reflectors attached to spokes, reflective tape on fenders and reflective armbands also can increase visibility.

Even under the best visibility conditions, children have little chance of avoiding accidents if their bicycles are in bad shape. A quick maintenance check should include: making sure major nuts and bolts are tight, especially the ones for handlebars, pedals, wheels and seat; making sure brakes work well enough to skid on dry, hard pavement; inspecting tires for cracks and adequate tread; checking the bicycle frame for loose places or spots so rusty the frame might break. Arthritis Costs Billions, Pain And Crippling

Arthritis has a devastating \$13 billion annual impact on our nation's economy, but the pain and crippling disease causes are equally staggering, according to Mrs. E.S. Elgin, president of the northwest Texas Chapter of the Arthritis Foundation.

"This shocking economic toll of arthritis includes the loss of \$955 million in tax dollars from those victims of the disease who are unable to work and \$4.8 billion in lost wages," Elgin said. "In addition, arthritis cost business and industry nearly 27 million lost work days and 240 million days of limited activity, last year alone."

"The harsh, socio-economic facts of arthritis are measurably," Elgin noted. "But how can you put a dollar amount on unrelenting pain, crippling and

disruption of family life that arthritis causes?"

Arthritis is America's No. 1 crippling disease. It afflicts many Americans of all ages so seriously that they require ongoing medical care. Annually, this care totals \$4.2 billion including hospitalization, physician's office visits, and drug costs. Not to mention the \$950 million spent annually on

"Everyday thousands of American workers are forced to quit their jobs prematurely. They can no longer cope with the pain and crippling of arthritis. All too often, these workers are highly-skilled, experienced employees in whom the company has vested many years of training," Elgin said. "But then, arthritis is not particular, it can strike anyone, whether it be an assembly line worker, a secretary, or a key executive."

quack products and techniques by arthritis victims seeking a "cure."

Accidents and breakdowns mean added costs lost in down time, defective products and damaged equipment. Arthritis means higher workmen's compensation and other health insurance premiums. Last year, disability insurance payments to permanently and totally disabled arthritis victims totalled more than \$2 billion.

Arthritis doesn't stop there, according to Elgin. It strikes at the very foundation of our country - the home. Arthritis can destroy marriages and robs young and old alike of the ability to carry on life's functions. Abilities that once were taken for granted are performed with agonizing pain - to walk, to stand, to drink, to work.

"Price tags cannot be placed on these losses," she added. "When arthritis attacks the homemaker, the loss of service conservatively amounts to over \$1.4 billion yearly." Through early diagnosis, proper medication and therapy, the disease in most cases can be controlled. Arthritis patients can be helped to lead relatively normal, productive lives.

Elgin pointed out that within the twenty-seven county Northwest Texas Chapter area alone, there are over 200,000 victims of the disease. Many are severely crippled. The Northwest Texas Chapter is committed to helping all these victims through such services as public health in-

formation and education, professional education and training, and patient services. The Chapter also supports research projects seeking the cause and cure in order to reduce the toll exacted by arthritis.

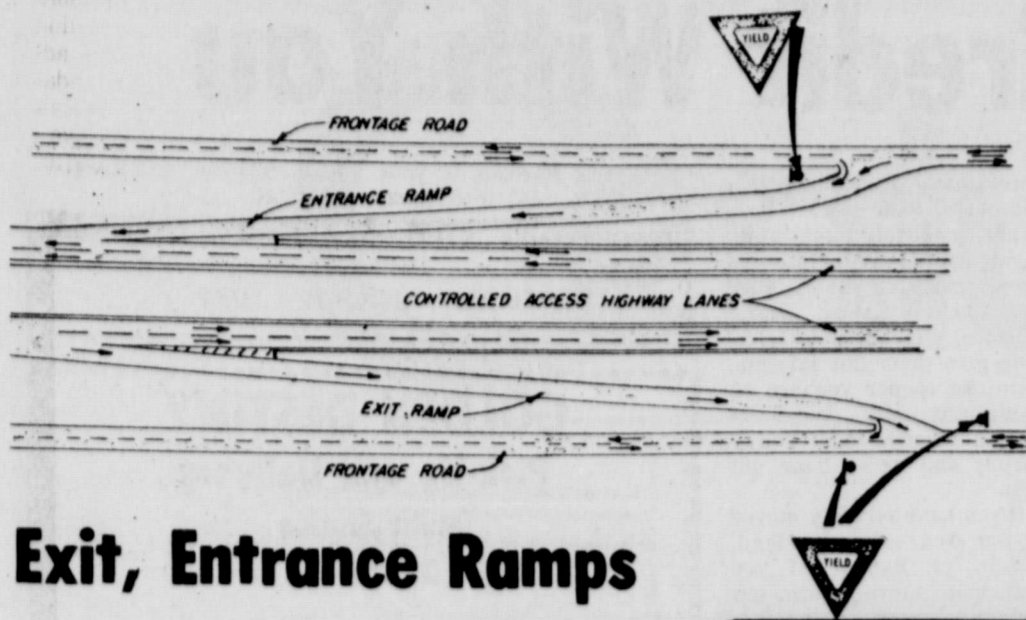

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Exit, Entrance Ramps To Have 'Right-Of-Way'

Motorists should use more caution next month than they have before when driving on frontage or service roads, controlled access highways, or interstate highways, according to Brownwood District Engineer Lawrence Schulz of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

Schulz has just received word that a new law passed by the 66th Legislature giving right-of-way to all exit ramps or entrance ramps on controlled access highways will go into effect August 27 throughout the State of Texas.

The new law directs that the driver of a vehicle proceeding on a service or frontage road of a controlled access highway shall yield the right-of-way to a vehicle entering the

frontage road from the highway or about to leave the frontage road to enter the highway.

"This is the reverse of conditions that now exist and may cause trouble for those motorists unfamiliar with the change," Schulz said.

Schulz cautions motorists using frontage roads to yield when they see a vehicle exiting or about to enter the controlled access highway lanes.

The new bill will necessitate some sign changes, and white lines will be painted across the frontage road pavement at the yield signs to accentuate this change. All work will be completed by August 27.

The accompanying sketch shows placement of the new yield signs.
