Cisco Public Schools To Begin September 4

Classes for Cisco Public School students will begin September 4, 1979. The first class will start at 8:15 a.m. and school will dismiss at 3:30 p.m. each day. Students in kindergarten will attend half day sessions. Students in grades one and two will be dismissed at 2:30 p.m. each day.

State Law Requires Full Immunization Of Children

Texas state law requires full immunization of children entering school and licensed daycare centers. Children must be immunized against polio, diphtheria, tetanus, measles and the mumps before they can attend school.

The Texas Department of Health estimates that 20 percent of preschool children over the state do not complete the recommended series of doses and boosters for full protection against these diseases. Most children receive only one or two of the required three doses of vaccine for polio, and DPT.

Immunization requirements are:
Polio—Three doses, the last dose must be taken after the age of four.

Diphtheria, Tetanus (DPT)—Three doses, the last dose must be taken after the age of four.

A Powered Glider Stops In Eastland

The aero acrobatics of a hang glider, equipped with seat, engine, and landing gear, over Eastland Wednesday drew a crowd to the airport where it landed.

Jack Petterson was flying the powered glider across the United States and stopped in Eastland to eat lunch. He was being refueled and assisted by a ground crew consisting of two friends with a van.

Mr. Petterson was flying to Kittyhawk, North Carolina from Longbeach, California, in the aircraft. Kittyhawk was the site of the Wright Brothers first flight. Appropriately, James Wright of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, who claims kin to the Wright Brothers, was on hand to welcome him to Eastland.

The day's trip had started in Sweetwater with plans to make the Dallas area by night. Mr. Petterson said that it was very beautiful as he flew in and out of the low clouds in the area, but that it he was trying to avoid the

stormy weather and lightning. He said he had to take off across a muddy field in Sweetwater because of strong crosswinds.

Earlier on the trip, he had a blowout when he landed in the desert and hit a cactus. He had to lighten the craft over the desert as the high temperatures reduced the amount of lift received from the air.

Due to the slow 18 to 45 m.p.h. speed of the 18 to 20 h.p. snowmobile engine powered craft, crowded airspace areas must be avoided. Also the fuel tank capacity is only enough for two to two and one half hours of flying time.

The three men are spending their vacation taking this self financed trip across the country, just because it hasn't been done before and they considered it fun and a challenge. However they expect their employer, the Manta Products Co., 1647 E. 14th St., Oakland, California 94606, to look with favor at their trip as the company

manufactures and sells this and similar craft. The aircraft being used costs about \$3000.

Mr. Petterson and his friends, who may be contacted through Manta Products Co., expect a welcoming reception and an interview by National Geographic in North Carolina.

They say they appreciate any assistance that is given to help them complete their trip.

The people who gathered at the airport were able to talk to Mr. Petterson and to see the aircraft at close range.

The crafts only directional controls were for turning, with the pilot shifting his weight to go up and down and to bank. It was constructed of very lightweight materials that were designed to be durable.

Upon hearing the desert of the craft, Dale Bakker, a local pilot, took his ambulance to the airport, but after seeing it, he said he thought it would be fun to fly.

Doctors To Improve Jail Health Care

AUSTIN—The Texas Medical Association (TMA) soon will receive a grant to improve health care in Texas jails. The money may add as many as 10 jails to TMA's pilot program started about a year ago.

The federal Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA) and the American Medical Association (AMA) are coordinating the 16-state program which offers accreditation to jails with adequate health care.

TMA provides technical assistance to jails interested in upgrading health care to meet a set of AMA standards. These standards include more than 80 things such as procedures for screening inmates for contagious disease, providing emergency medical care and helping addicts withdraw from drugs or alcohol.

This month TMA will contact all Texas county sheriffs and ask if they are interested in the program. Then TMA will select

several jails of different sizes in various areas. Travis, Dallas, Harris and Orange county jails already are participating. The Orange County jail is in the final stages of accreditation.

Depending on the number of jails approved for participation, TMA may get as much as \$43,600 in LEAA funds to run the program.

The jail health care program was the result of a national survey conducted by the AMA. The survey disclosed very inadequate health care facilities in jails. For instance:

--only first-aid facilities existed in 66 percent of the jails;
--physicians were available on a regularly scheduled basis in only 38 percent of the jails;

--physicians were not available to provide medical care in 32 percent of the jails;

--emergency rooms and physician offices

TAKE PRESSURE OFF
Since competition puts pressure on children, parents can help relieve it by making "fun" the primary

goal in sporting events.

Parents can also "play up" other benefits - in addition to the glory of winning.

Other benefits include learning the rules and tools of the "game of life" - agility, skill development, cooperation, discipline and fair play.

Give these benefits plenty of attention, the specialist advises.

Also, consider different kinds of sports with your child - together you may discover some new ones that don't carry high pressures.

Instead of considering only competitive sports such as football, basketball and baseball, look into some non-competitive, less-pressured sports.

Non-competitive sports include jogging, swimming, cycling or hiking - all of which let children develop their bodies, enjoy themselves and keep a sense of self-worth.

These may be especially attractive to children who aren't ready for - or interested in - organized sports.

In addition, resist the natural desire to live through your children, especially on the athletic field.

Remember that adults usually are the ones that give winning too much importance.

Highly organized leagues for young children are the most often planned with adult seriousness, and they tend to take the fun and play out of the activity.

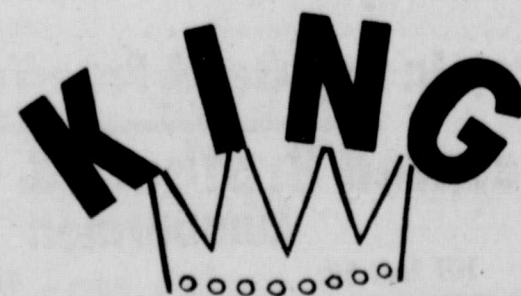

MANAGING INCOME FOR TAX CONSIDERATION-- COLLEGE STATION--

Managing farm and ranch income properly is vital to managing one's income tax liability.

Dr. Ashley Lovell, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, emphasizes wise management of all types of income during the current tax year.

Often livestock sales can cause problems in income management, says Lovell. In 1977 and 1978, many Texas cattlemen were forced to sell excessive numbers of breeding livestock because of drought. Normally, any gain realized would be drought, if replacements are purchased within two years of the year of forced sale, producers can defer paying tax on the gain.

Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) loan proceeds are considered as income the year they are received or the year a commodity is sold, whichever the producer chooses. The producer who chooses the first option can influence his taxable income situation by properly timing his commodity's entry into the CCC loan program. Once the decision is made, the producer must have IRS permission to change his election, Lovell explains.

According to the economist, a loss from a commodity hedging futures transaction is considered a necessary business expense. However, a speculative futures contract results in a short-term or long-term capital gain or loss. During 1979, a speculator should consider the six-month holding period required to establish a long-term capital gain or loss from liquidating a futures market contract.

The effect of additional off-farm income on an individual's tax liability situation should also be considered in income management. Such income may affect one's social security tax liability and future social security benefits.

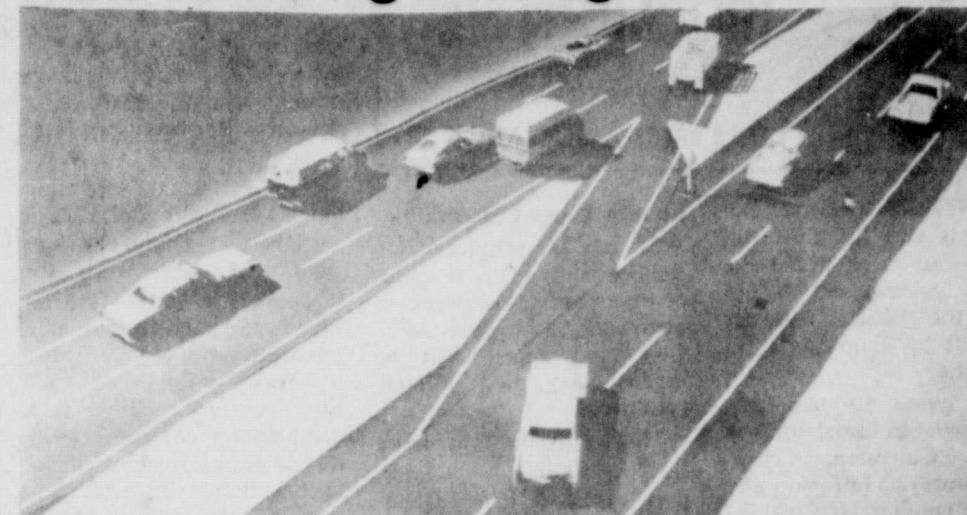
A related concern is whether or not the off-farm income will enable one to "income average", says Lovell. Unless off-farm income offsets a poor yield or commodity price situation, income averaging may be necessary. On the other hand, a taxpayer may not qualify for income averaging if there is no off-farm situation against last year's in managing one's income tax liability.

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS
 By Lyndell Williams

AUSTIN—Governor Bill Clements and Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby last week asked the federal government to enlarge the official disaster area left by Tropical Storm Claudette.

The state's top two officials made an aerial tour of Harris, Galveston, Chambers, Brazoria, Jefferson and Orange counties, the official disaster zone, and requested that Hardin and Liberty counties be added to the list.

The storm damaged farms and refineries, knocked out telephone service to thousands of customers, and damaged some 20,000 homes. The total damage was estimated at about \$750 million by federal officials.

Clements found no fault with the federal government's actions in emergency procedures and praised community officials for reacting "admirably" to the disaster.

Bullock Urges Unionization
 State Comptroller, Bob Bullock stirred up a storm of controversy last week in his speech to the Texas AFL-CIO conference when he urged unionization of state employees.

His words drew applause from the crowd, and later, criticism from Gov. Clements. Clements campaigned last year on a promise to eliminate 25,000 state jobs and shrink state government.

Bullock told the AFL-CIO delegates that "public employees of Texas, the people who keep this state running, need a real friend," and he pledged to be the first state official to recognize a union contract.

Clements said he was "amazed" at Bullock's statements. The controversial tax collector's remarks drew praise

from union officials and criticism from anti-union factions who charged Bullock was merely trying to widen his power base by ingratiating himself with state employees.

Consumer Office Cut-Back
 In the face of "budget realities," Attorney General Mark White will turn his office's consumer complaints duties over to local Better Business Bureaus.

White explained the move was made because of a tight budget and not because of "a lessening of our desire or commitment to work for consumers of Texas," but he failed to pacify consumer advocate groups.

Texas Consumer Association director Jim Boyle said complaining consumers will lose, because sending them to the Better Business Bureau is "like sending chickens to the fox." Boyle said the AG's Consumer Protection and Antitrust Division has handled some 72,000 complaints since 1973, and he doubts the Better Business Bureau will be as aggressive in handling complaints.

A chief assistant attorney general said it's a mistake for anyone to think the attorney general is "getting out of the consumer complaint business." David Bragg pointed out that the cutback in mediating consumer complaints will free staff members to pursue fraud and deceptive trade practices more vigorously.

Commissioner Reagan Brown is having problems coping with a tighter budget—he wants to keep the department airplane which the governor vetoed in June. Clements cut \$300,000 budgeted to lease and operate Brown's airplane for the next two years.

A new state law requires all state agency planes to be pooled starting Sept. 1.

Brown wants to buy a \$450,000 airplane from funds left in his department budget when the fiscal year ends this month. "We've got to have a plane in this department. Agriculture is the biggest business in Texas... We have to go places where we couldn't go commercial," Brown insists. The million-dollar plane at half-price would be a good buy for the state, he thinks.

A Republican legislator from Dallas, Rep. Frank Gaston, accused Brown of a last-minute, end-run around the law aimed at reducing state aircraft expenditures. The state owns 18 planes and leases 11 more.

If the money left in Brown's budget is not spent, it will be returned to the state treasury.

Dallas Delegation Feud
 Two other Dallas lawmakers

ers have gone another round in a feud which began over this year's Juneteenth celebration.

This time Rep. Cally Smothers has attacked fellow black legislator Paul Ragsdale as a "nut" and a "lazy bum."

Smothers was angry with what he thought was Ragsdale's meddling in a state investigation of Smother's Henderson County child-care home.

Ragsdale immediately renewed his call for Smother's removal from the House Black Caucus, calling him "an anathema to black people."

The pair verbally clashed in June over a law making Emancipation Day an official state holiday in Texas.

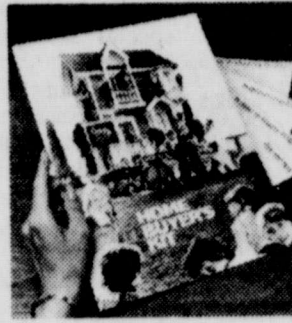

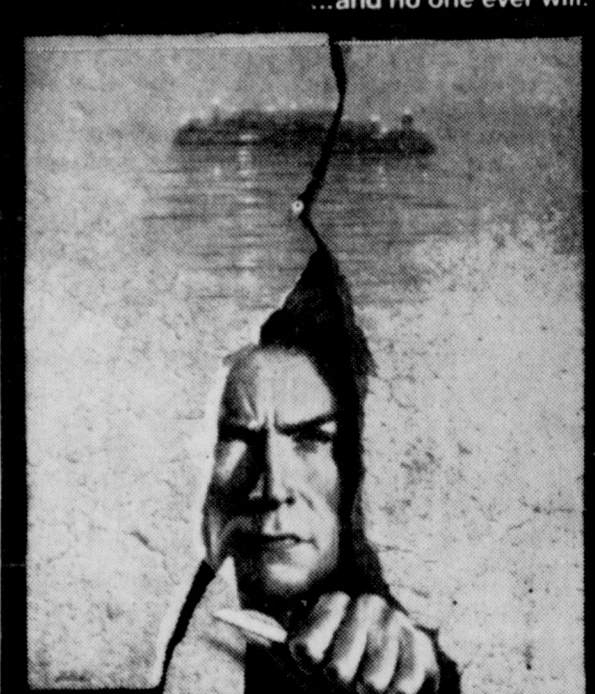

EASTLAND EXTENSION OFFICE

Meet The Legal Service Center

There has been quite a bit of speculation in Eastland County concerning the establishment of a legal services center here. First word came with a press release to

this newspaper from Cong. Charles Stenholm's office regarding a government grant to the West Texas Legal Services Corp. to provide legal services in this area. Word developed that an office had been recented in Eastland, and that there might eventually be as many as six attorneys "doing legal work for free." According to Stan Boose, managing attorney for the Eastland Expansion Office, in an interview with this newspaper, the Eastland office will be headquarters for a nine-county area stretching from Goldthwaite to Oleny and from Baird to Weatherford. It will be the ninth branch of West Texas Legal Services, a non-profit corporation, headquartered in Fort Worth. It has offices in Abilene, Amarillo, San Angelo, Lubbock, Wichita Falls, Midland-Odessa, Denton and Fort Worth. (As we understand it, this organization operates on government grants to provide legal services to the needy, much as in-


home medical services are provided by corporations in this area, utilizing government subsidies.) Boose (son-in-law of the Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Huckaby of Eastland from Wichita Falls where he has been staff attorney for a year. He is a graduate of the University of Texas and practiced law in Houston and Seymour before joining West Texas Legal Services. (The Fort Worth office began some two years ago with two attorneys and now is staffed by 70.) Mr. Boose (and hopefully some secretaries and paralegal aides) will be conducting meetings in hopefully again, all the towns in these counties to survey the needs and to set priorities. "Please let me emphasize," he said, "We are not offering any legal services at this time." It will probably be around the first of the year before any are offered, he said. Locally, practicing attorneys had wondered what guidelines the free

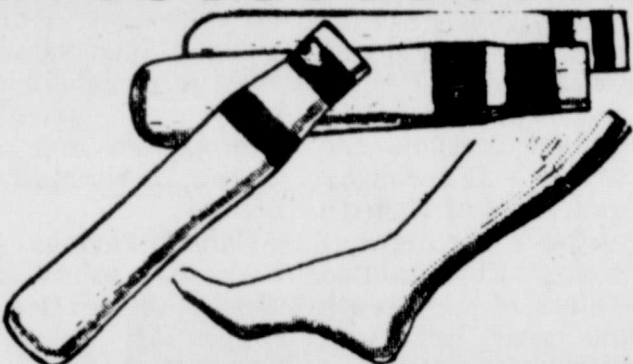

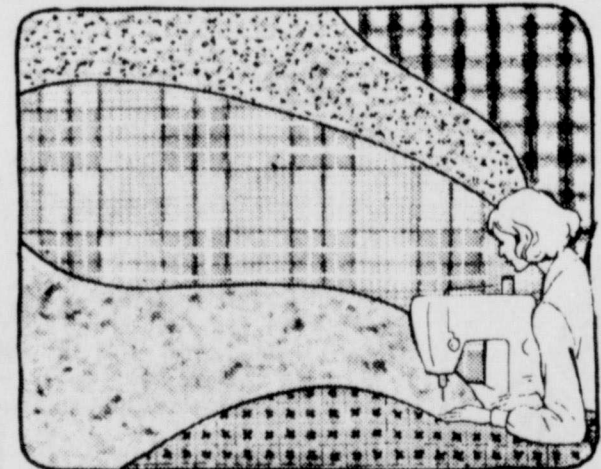
