

Grady Resigns

In a closed meeting following Tuesday night's regular council meeting, the city accepted a letter of resignation from Lonnie Grady, council member place 3.

Mr. Grady is being transferred to San Antonio by Lo-Vaca Gathering Company where he is employed.

His letter stated he regretfully submits his resignation effective Wednesday, August 15, 1979. The letter gave his new job placement as the reason for his resignation.

Mayor Brown stated an election will have to be held to replace Mr. Grady, but the council is waiting for City Attorney Billy Wright Jr. to determine the legal standpoint of where and when such an election should be held. Announcement of the election will be made at a later time.

City Manager Presented Monthly Report At Meeting

City Manager John Boland presented his monthly report to the Cisco City Council at Tuesday night's regular meeting in the Council Chambers.

Included in the report was a breakdown of benefits and drawbacks of the 1979 Youth Conservation Corps (Y.C.C.) program. Benefits were as follows: 1) Educated youth in the knowledge of how to work together; 2) Educated youth to how to work; 3) Provided work for fourteen Cisco youth not available otherwise; 4) Provided constructive, worthwhile work; 5) Cost city-1978, \$3541-1979, \$3176.20; 6) City reimbursed-1978, \$13,361.07--1979, \$9,528.59. A note in the report stated that all 1979 figures are approximations as of August 3, 1979.

Drawbacks of the Y.C.C. program were listed as: 1) Not enough fully constructive work such as extension of boat dock, construction of tables, opening trails, building restroom facilities; 2) Young people are required to transport self to job site, some problems were experienc-

ed; and 3) Problems experienced in payroll system.

Other areas covered by the City Manager's report included the 1979-80 budget. Boland asked for the council's consideration in not having a "called" meeting on August 21, for the submitting of a balanced budget for next year. He said he would attempt to get a preliminary budget to council members by that date, but would like to wait and present the budget formally at the next regular meeting on August 28. Council members were in agreement with his request.

Boland reported that the total cost of fence reimbursed by the Airport Advisory Committee for Cisco Municipal Airport was \$1,806.60. He went on to say, "Another reimburseable cost is \$254.80 for cornerposts and braces, which Mr. Joe Wheatley donated. The cost of volunteer labor was \$702.25. No actual out-of-pocket cost was incurred for these last three items but are reimburseable under T.A.C. guidelines. Mr. Ray Ferris is keeping me informed of the work times volunteer labor

and progress being made at the airport." He continued, "The overall picture looks good, but progress is slow. The large grader is being used on weekends by volunteer workers who are checked out on proper handling of the equipment."

Under a heading of Work Progress, Boland said a water chemical analysis was much improved over the last reading of one year ago. He also said, "The general read shows a hard water which is alkaline (as compared to acid conditions and soft water)."

In field conditions he said, "This month we had a total of nine sewer leaks, six water leaks, one street complaint and two trash problems. This compares to the last month with 33 sewer leaks, 14 water leaks, five street complaints, three brush pickup calls and one complaint concerning low pressure."

The report states the police department investigated 100 complaints; 25 offenses; had five arrests (mostly DWI) and three were transferred to Eastland County; 67

citations were issued and 121 parking tickets. There were six accidents worked. Chief of Police Kenneth Eaves reported that Kay Honea has replaced Mrs. Casse Abbe as a female officer. She is being scheduled to go to certification school this month. He stated she will not patrol the streets, but will carry on the duties of the former meter maid. She will also be called upon any time the city has a female prisoner or juvenile. He said this will protect the police officers and the city. Chief Eaves also said he has submitted a complete set of uniform guidelines to the City Manager for the police department. He said these guidelines allow the officers to all work under the same set of rules and treat all citizens the same.

In the Fire Department there was a total of 16 calls with five rural, four grass in the city, four autos, two structures and one false alarm. David Gill is enrolled in certification school in Abilene this month and next due to its being a state requirement.

There was a total of 38,250,300 gallons of water used with a daily average of 1,233,880 gallons, a maximum of 1,567,800 gallons and a low of 763,800.

Judge O.T. Killion spent 54 hours in his Municipal Court office and acted over: 69 tickets for a total of \$1,456.50, two were dismissed; nine complaints for \$531.50; eight warrants were issued. A total of \$1,988.00 was collected.

The council discussed a problem of water running down West 13th Street from Avenue K and eroding the pavement. The council was in agreement that the problem should be checked into and something done to correct it. During this discussion Mayor Hugh (Chief) Brown said he has received complaint calls in the past where the caller would not identify themselves. He said he believes if the complaint is legitimate then the caller should not be afraid to be identified; therefore, he said he no longer accepts complaint calls if the caller will not give his or her name. He emphasized that if callers will give their names, he will listen to

their complaint and do what he can to help them.

In an update on the rabies situation, City Manager Boland said he has been in contact with Dr. Catherine Tull of the Region Four Health Department in Abilene. The doctor has sent him information on rabies and offered a film presentation to the Cisco area. He said the Health Department does not feel the situation in Cisco is serious at this particular time. They do encourage the city to enforce its leash law and ask citizens to have their pets vaccinated. It also encourages the public to become better educated to the symptoms of rabies in both domestic and wild animals. He also said they suggested the boarding up of windows in vacant buildings and other places which bats could inhabit; however, they discourage mass extermination of bats since this could be harmful to the environment. He went on to say the Health Department said bats migrate and that is probably the reason a rabid bat was found in Cisco.

Council member Allison made a motion to adopt a resolution which applies for Cisco to be a Wastewater Management Agency. Grady seconded the motion and all voted in its favor.

Council member Allison also made a motion for the city not to participate in a Texas Municipal League case against a Southwestern Bell rate increase. Collier seconded the motion with all members voting in its favor. The motion was made following a discussion by City Manager Boland on the matter. He stated the League will go through with the case whether Cisco participates or not, and the city could save some money by not participating.

City Manager Boland informed council members that Cisco has three investments which will mature this month: two United States Treasury Bonds and one Certificate of Deposit. This money was originally planned for payments on the Front Street paving when it matured; however, no bills on the paving have been presented to the city at this time. Boland asked the council for its suggestions on whether to re-invest the money or not. Council member Eudy made a motion for Boland to check and see when the money will be needed and re-invest it as he sees fit. All voted for the motion following a second by Grady.

Council member Grady made a motion to appoint Louise Allison to a steering tax appraisal district committee board. Eudy seconded the motion and all voted in its favor. Mrs. Allison will attend a meeting next Monday composed of all the County taxing units.

Mayor Brown told council members he believes it is time for the city to purchase a new sanitation truck since the present one has been patched as much as possible. Council member Collier made a motion for Boland to take bids or whatever needed to get a new sanitation truck. Council member Allison seconded the motion and all voted in its favor.

Reverend O.T. Killion gave the invocation for Tuesday night's meeting.

Council member Eudy made a motion to answer questions from the council.

Council member Louise Allison informed the council that the Eastland County Dispatch discussed its 1980 budget at a meeting last week. She said the budget reflects a 20 per cent increase with a minimum increase in salary. Because of the increase Cisco's monthly dues will be raised \$228, from \$1251 a month to \$1479. The county pays the same amount as Cisco. Council member Allison made a motion to accept the 1980 budget of the Eastland County Dispatch. Council member Bill Eudy seconded the motion with all members voting in its favor.

Council member Morgan Fleming made a motion to accept some plan changes in the Front Street paving contract as presented by City Engineer Billy Jacobs. Council member Eudy made the second and all members voted for the motion. The plan changes include the deduction of paving costs on Front Street since the council decided to stop the paving on the street's north end where the brick pavement begins. Another

change calls for the paving of 11th street from Front to Avenue P.

Council member Eudy, seconded by Lucy Collier and all voted in its favor. The companies making bids were Cheek Computer Service, Smith-Verett and Company, and Computer Data Center. Each company had a representative at Tuesday night's meeting to answer questions from the council.

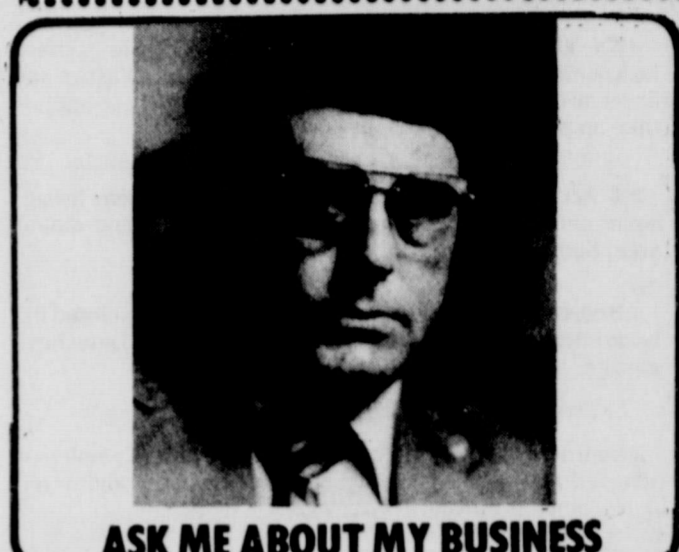

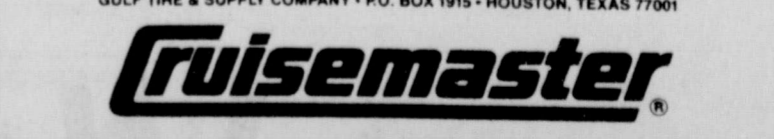

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Cut Your Utility Bill In Half

COLLEGE STATION - Toss out your air conditioner and cool off with fans?

Absurd? Not if you want to slash your utility bill in half in some Texas areas. Air conditioning accounts for up to 50 percent of all home energy used in some areas of Texas, says Dr. Jane Berry, a housing and home furnishings specialist. Fans save money, and they provide comfort, she says.

You can use them as "helpers" to your air-conditioning system - or in place of it.

Dr. Berry is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Here are two types of fans to start with - in deciding which will do the best job in your home:

CIRCULATING FANS Circulating the air inside the home makes you feel cooler because it speeds up evaporation of moisture from the skin. These fans "help" air conditioning - or work alone.

Fans for this job include standard table-top fans, "box" fans that sit on the floor or a flat, steady surface, and the old-time ceiling fan.

VENTILATING FANS Use ventilating fans with air conditioning - they need open windows.

Fans that ventilate do two things: they exhaust hot, stagnant indoor air to the outdoors, and they bring cooler outside air into the house.

They're most effective at night - or at times when outdoor air is cooler than air inside the house.

To use a ventilating fan, place it in an open window and seal up space around it. Also, shut windows near it for maximum drawing power. Then open a few windows on the opposite side of the area to be ventilated - that may be just one room or the entire house.

WHY FANS Texas is rediscovering the fan.

Many Texas residents already report that using the "right" fan lets them run air conditioners at higher settings - or simply turn them off - and still stay comfortable.

Research says that a fan makes an air-conditioned room feel six to eight degrees cooler.

Fans use only about 150 watts of electricity or less, while a typical room air conditioner uses about 860 watts.

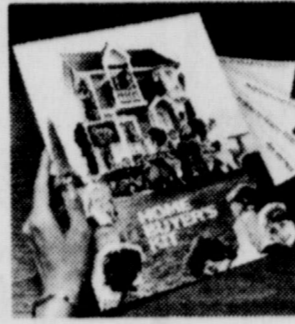

The Psychology Department of the University of North Carolina conducted an experiment with two rats. They placed them in different containers that were half full of water.

One container was sealed. The rat knew there was no hope of escape. He gave up in less than three minutes and died.

The other container was partially sealed. There was a way of escape. That rat swam continuously for thirty-six hours before dying of exhaustion.

What made the difference? One had hope. The other one did not.

Life for the disciples was about to cave in. What kept them from giving up? What

constrained them to go on and preach the gospel? Hope.

Our Lord said, "Let not your heart be troubled; ye believe in God, believe also in Me. In My Father's house are many mansions: if it were not so, I would have told you. I go to prepare a place for you. And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again, and receive you unto Myself; that where I am, there ye may be also."

Death, as it must, comes to all. And so does distress. How can one cope with distress and have courage in death? Faith in the Lord. That gives help and hope.

Some see only a hopeless end. But the believer rejoices in an endless hope.

PARENTS' INTEREST - A KEY IN SPORTS

Parents' interest in their children's sports is vital - as it is in all aspects of child development, says a family life education specialist.

Interest means responding to your child's feelings - and sharing his wins and losses. Interest also means being honest, and it means always avoiding "put downs."

Finally, interest means knowing six key facts about sports:

1) Know that pre-adolescents and immature boys and girls have growing bones that cannot take hard blows, so injuries can occur frequently in contact sports.

2) Know that all competitive sports pose threats of major injuries.

To help cut down that threat, be sure all events are properly monitored, and make sure each child has protective equipment.

3) Know that the competitive spirit is very much a part of our national fabric - and in appropriate amounts, it promotes healthy growth and achievement.

4) Know that losers realize quickly they have little support.

Sympathize with the pain felt in defeat, and admit that winning would have been more fun. However, do not promote the "win-above-all" feeling - that only makes the pain of losing more severe.

5) Know that children link performance with self-esteem, even when winning or losing has equal importance with other aspects of the game.

Because of that, don't laugh off poor performance when your child feels bad about it.

Let him talk about why the event and his part in it were so important.

Above all, don't put him down about his performance - you are attacking his self-esteem.

County Tax Assessing Board Planned

Twenty eight people who have taxing responsibilities in Eastland County gathered Monday to discuss, ask questions and make plans for the county tax assessing board, which will be set up in compliance with new state laws.

County, school, municipal and other taxing entities were present to hear Mr. Seawalt of Early discuss the requirements as he understands them. He is the tax collector for the Early School and reported that Brown County

is already gearing up for the new program.

Another meeting has been called here for 2 p.m. on Monday, Aug. 20, at which the tax-assessor-collector from each of the taxing agencies in Eastland County will serve as a steering committee to help establish the program.

Unofficially, it is understood that the County will participate, and share with the cities and schools in bearing the cost of establishing the county assessing

office, which serve as the official evaluator for all taxing agencies, including the water, hospital and other entities.

All taxing agencies were represented at the Monday Bank Conference Room meeting except the City of Eastland.

The new state law provides that an assessing office will be established, and that all property will be evaluated and put on the tax rolls at true market value. Then each agency will use these values to apply their own rates.

RURAL ENERGY INITIATIVES ANNOUNCED

Energy initiatives aimed at helping small town and rural areas cope with future energy problems through 1981 were recently announced by President Carter.

Federal funds totaling \$300 million will help renovate 100 small-scale hydroelectric projects across the country, says Jack L. Jones with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. The projects would generate about 300 megawatts of power. Eight federal agencies are involved in this Department of Energy program.

Nearly \$11 million will enable construction of 100 small gasohol (alcohol used for transportation fuel) plants, adds the community development specialist.

The Department of Energy and the Economic Development Administration will allocate \$1.25 million in grants to help about 20 economic development districts. The districts will plan integrated economic development and energy programs, giving special attention to alternative sources of energy.

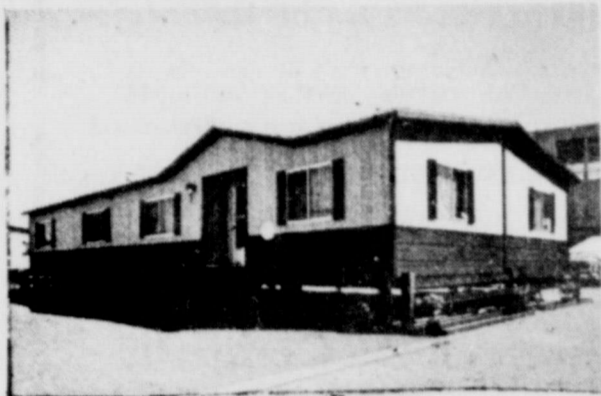
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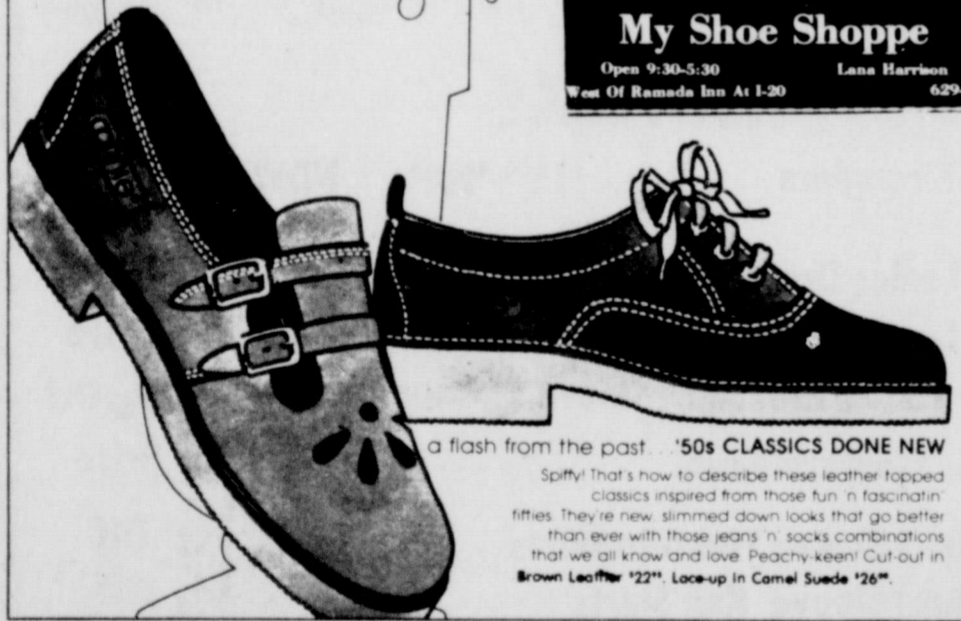

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Independent School District Serves Nutritious Meals Daily

The Cisco Independent School District serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for sixty cents in grades Kindergarten through the Sixth grade. Lunch for grades seven through twelve is sixty-five cents. Students may buy breakfast for twenty-five cents for all grades.

Children from families whose income is at or below those shown in the scale below are eligible for

free meals or meals at the reduced price of ten cents for lunch, and a reduced price of ten cents for breakfast. Children from families whose income is higher than that shown in the annual income scale may be eligible for free or reduced meals if they have unusually high medical bills, shelter costs in excess of 30 per cent of their annual income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, or disaster or

casualty losses.

To apply for free or reduced price lunches or breakfast, contact the Principal of your child's school.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for these meals. A family who has such children living with them should contact the Principal of the school involved.

All children are treated the same regardless of the ability to pay. In the operation of the child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color or national origin.

All students will be given an application for these meals at the beginning of school. Interested parents should complete and sign the application and return it to the stu-

Survivors include his wife, Lillie M. Williams of Cisco; four brothers, R.D. Williams of Baird, Everett Williams of Post, Lynn Williams of Cisco and Nat H. Williams of Lubbock; one daughter, Gayle (Mrs. John E.) Smith of Teague; two grandchildren, Jimmie Gayle (9) and Russell Ray (7); numerous nephews and nieces.

He was preceded in death by three brothers, Eugene Williams, Wesley W. Williams of Stanton and J.N. Williams of Putnam.

County Hay Show Set Sept. 28 at Fair

The Eastland Young Farmer Chapter will sponsor the Seventh annual Hay Show in connection with the Eastland County Fair. Date of the Hay Show is September 28th. Hay must be entered by August 21st. Only regular or round bales will be accepted. No loose hay can be entered. Hay entered will not be returned.

Eastland County residents that produce or purchase hay are eligible to enter hay for the show. An analysis will be run to determine the crude and digestible protein levels of each bale. Cost of this analysis is free. You may enter one bale in each of the following classes: Alfalfa and other legumes; Coastal Bermuda; other Bermudas; Sorghum-Sudan hybrids and forage Sorghums; other perennials grasses; Oats and other winter annual grasses; Peanut; and Legume mixtures.

Hay may be left at any of the feed and fertilizer dealers in the county, implement dealers, Young Farmer members, or the Eastland High School Vo. Ag. Dept. Members of the Eastland Young Farmer Chapter will pick up the hay from the various locations in the County. Please tag the hay you leave giving your name, address, and the type of hay. This information should be attached to each bale.

Anyone who feeds hay should be interested in having an analysis run to determine the value as a livestock feed. You cannot look at a bale of hay and determine the nutritive content. Only an analysis can tell this.

Dr. George Alston, Agronomist with the Extension Service, will conduct a program on supplementing hay with other protein sources and the value of producing and feeding high quality hay during the hay show.
