The Cisco Civic League will sponsor a mini-marathon October 16. It will begin at the bottom of Cisco Junior College hill and end at Lake Cisco Park.

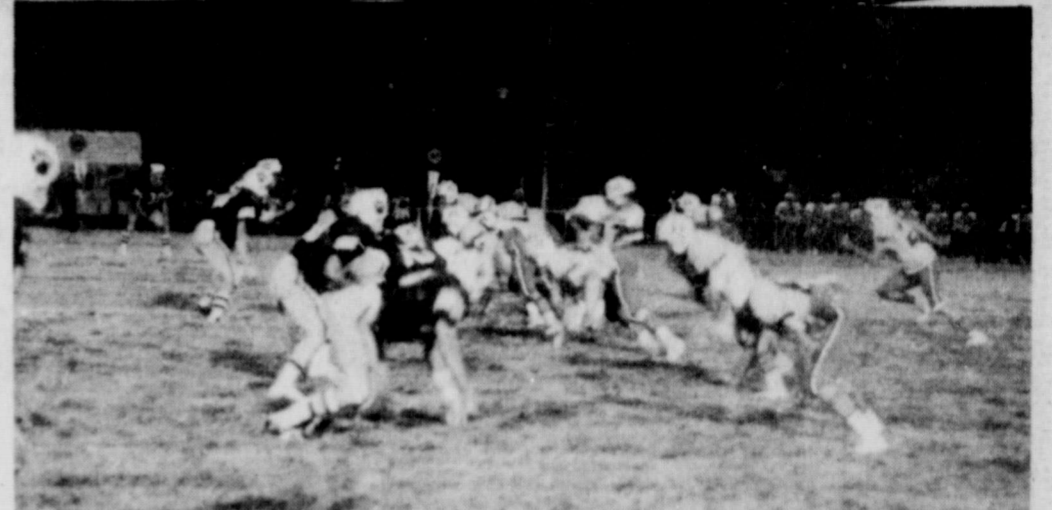
The Cisco Junior College band will give a concert and the Cisco Civic League will sponsor a dinner following the mini-marathon.

Loboes Defeated By Anson In 15-14 Thriller

The Cisco High School Loboes lost their home game opener here Friday night at Chesley Field to the Anson Tigers by the close score of 15 to 14. The Loboes are now 1-1 for the season in non-district play.

Neither team was able to score in the first quarter, but Cisco got a touchdown in the second quarter and led at half-time by the score of 7 to 0.

The second half of the game was exciting with Anson tying up the score in the third quarter. Both teams then scored touchdowns with less than six minutes remaining in the game.

Cisco's first touchdown drive in the second quarter was set up when Anson's quarterback, Ken Williams, fumbled the ball at Cisco's 32 yard line and the Loboes recovered. Cisco quarterback Barton Philpott handed off to Gary Speegle for a gain of three yards on the first play. A quarterback keep then lost two yards bringing up a third down and nine yards to go situation. Quarterback Philpott then hit Forrest Starr with a pass to Anson's 40 yard line and Starr took it in for a 70-yard play touchdown. The PAT by Jimmy Elrod was good making the score 7 to 0 with 3:31 left in the first half.

The Loboes took the second half kick off and began moving it downfield from their own 29 yard line. Five plays later, a Philpott pass was intercepted by Anson's Tim Laws at the Lobo 43 yard line setting up the Tiger's first scoring drive.

Anson quarterback Williams utilized the running abilities of Junior Garcia, Tim Laws and Santos Garcia to make three first downs in ten plays placing the ball on Cisco's four yard line. Santos Garcia took the handoff from Williams in for a touchdown with 4:23 left in the third

quarter. The PAT by Garcia was good making the score tied at 7 to 7.

Cisco's final scoring drive came about when Anson's Junior Garcia failed to get three yards for a first down, so the Tigers turned the ball over to the Loboes at Anson's 45 yard line. Cisco quarterback Philpott handed off to Speegle for a gain of four yards. Another handoff to Speegle netted five more yards placing the ball on Anson's 36 yard line, one yard away from a first down. Cisco's Donnie Worley took the handoff three yards getting the first down. A pass from Philpott to Starr got the Loboes second touchdown with 5:22 left in the game. The PAT by Elrod was good putting Cisco ahead by the score of 14 to 7.

Anson took the kick off and started their own scoring drive from their 40 yard line. Santos Garcia, Randy Thompson, Junior Garcia, Daniel Grussendorf and quarterback Williams all had a hand in moving the ball downfield in ten plays, getting two first downs and a touchdown. One of the biggest plays of the drive was a 40 yard sidarm pass from Williams to Thompson putting the ball at Cisco's 20 yard line.

With the ball on Cisco's eight yard line, quarterback Williams handed off to Junior Garcia who carried it in for the touchdown. With 1:02 left in the game and still trailing by one point, Anson went for two and a pitchback to Junior Garcia got the two point conversion moving the Tigers ahead by the score of 15 to 14.

Cisco took the kick off at their 30 yard line and began one of the most exciting drives of the game with only 53 seconds left. Three incomplete passes brought up a fourth and ten yards situation for the Loboes at their own 30 yard line with only 39 seconds left. A

pass interference call against Anson on the next play gave Cisco the first down and placed the ball on Cisco's 45 yard line with 35 seconds left. Philpott connected a pass to Starr, at Anson's 45 yard line, who stepped out of bounds to stop the clock with 30 seconds. Worley took a pitchback down the left sideline, breaking two tackles, before running out of bounds at Anson's 34 yard line to stop the clock with 22 seconds. A sideline pass to Starr moved the ball to Anson's 27 yard line and stopped the clock with 16 seconds. An incomplete pass left nine seconds in the game and another pass to Starr moved the ball to Anson's 18 yard line with five seconds left. The Loboes decided to go for a field goal but Elrod's kick was to the left, leaving one second in the game with the ball in the Tiger's possession.

Outstanding defensive players for the Loboes were Sy Tabor, John Hagan, Ronnie Eudy, Audie Woolley, Jimmy Elrod, Chuck Cannistraci, Mike Sherman, Curt Posey and Keith Winnett.

The Tiger's defensive standouts were Tim Laws, Santos Garcia, Larry Gee, Mitch Heidenheimer, Tony Robbins and Randy Thompson.

GORDON SPOT

If you have not sprayed your pecan trees for weevils recently you should check them very carefully for weevil infestation. Unless you closely observe your pecans you may not notice that the weevils are consuming the entire crop. It's very discouraging to think you have a good pecan crop only to discover at harvest time you only have empty shells with small holes

where the grubs have emerged. We found an abundance of weevils in trees this past week. One female weevil may deposit an egg in as many as 60 nuts over a two month period. This insect is a large weevil being brownish in color and about three-eighths of an inch in length. It has a beak about as long as it's body. You can shake the weevils from a limb in order

to check for infestation or you may find the weevil on the pecans. Another method of checking is to look for infested nuts. A weevil punctured pecan will have a small pin size hole. The shuck will be black around the hole and you will see a circle of black marks in a larger ring around the small hole. This outer ring of marks are made by the weevil's feet as it bores its beak into the pecan. Trees should be sprayed with Sevin for weevil control. Once a pecan has been punctured and the egg deposited there is nothing that can be done to save that pecan.

The County Fair is just around the corner, September 27-29. Everyone is encouraged to enter exhibits in the Fair. There is a class for any vegetable, fruit or crop that you may have produced this year. Check the Fair page in this paper for a list of classes and rules. We see a lot of small grains being planted in Eastland County. Weed prevention is a practice that producers need to consider. Wild oats, mustards and other weeds will show up this winter where they were a problem last year. Despite last year's severe winter weather, enough wild oats

survived to reseed thousands of acres. Therefore, weed-free seed is the best investment a producer can make. Run seed purchased in bulk lots through a seed cleaner to prevent the addition of weed seed to the soil. There are other things that can be done to control weeds in wheat and oats. First, plant on clean (weed free) land. Although this is sometimes impractical, it is important in keeping weeds under control. Next, if wild oats have heavily infested a field, rotate to a spring-planted crop. Wild oats emerging in the summer won't produce

seed. If crop rotation is impossible, destroy wild oat seedlings through tillage before seeding small grains. Late planting reduces grazing potential but decreases spring weed competition. Heavy seeding rate will also increase a crop's competitive advantage. Heavy grazing of infested fields is another way to reduce plowing plus heavy grazing pressure applied before wild oats produce seed reduces weed seed numbers that will infest the next crop.

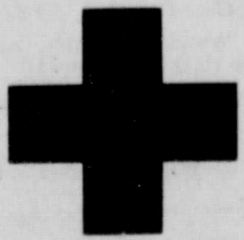

The lesson was on feelings and about child behavior.

The group learned that there are two things to deal with—feelings and actions. One must be able to distinguish between the two.

It takes time and experience for children to learn which behavior is acceptable to others. As children mature, they develop some control over their emotions. Improved language skills also make it easier for children to communicate their needs and feelings in acceptable ways.

A child learns how to behave by watching and listening to the people around him.

A child's behavior may be a clue that (1) needs some limits so knows what can do; (2) needs a clear explanation of what to do; (3) needs some help and encouragement; (4) needs someone to pay attention to what says and does; (5) needs consistency so knows what to expect and that parents mean what say.

These needs are the basics of good guidance. They help a child learn to manage his feelings and think for themselves.

The girls played a game called "Wicked Witch." This game showed each girl what it feels like to be left out of a group. They said that it is not a very good feeling.

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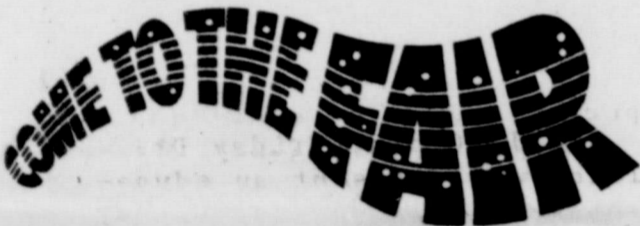


County Fair Show Bigger And Better

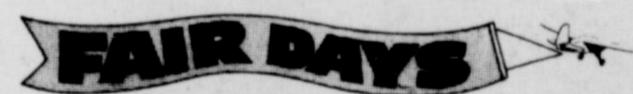

All booths need to be set up Thursday, September 27th at the Eastland Livestock Show grounds. Booth spaces that are reserved will not be held after 12 noon on Thursday.

Sales of items which conflict with the Fair Association money raising projects will be prohibited. Also items to be given away (such as drawings, etc.) will be given away at the Fair Association's preferred time during the Fair. Special arrangements will be made.

Booth reservations may be made by calling 629-2222 or 629-1093 from 8 to 5 p.m. After 5 p.m., call 629-2878.

The seventh Annual Eastland County Hay Show will be a feature of the county fair. Over 60 entries of hay were entered in August. A sample of hay was taken from each bale and sent to the Agricultural Analytical lab at Texas A&M to determine the protein analysis.

On September 28 at 9:30 a.m. the hay will be classified by Dr. George Alston, Extension Agronomist. Both physical and chemical (crude protein) factors are considered in classifying all hay entries.

The hay show which is sponsored by the Eastland Young Farmers chapter focuses attention on this important crop with special emphasis on hay quality. At 1:30 p.m. Friday Dr. Alston will present an educational program on quality hay production. The program will be of interest to hay producers, hay users and general suppliers of fertilizer, seeds, chemicals, machinery, buildings and equipment.

Businesses and organizations donated money to pay the cost of protein analyses and prizes. The Texas Plant Food Institute will provide the ribbons.

The hay will be grouped in the following classes: Alfalfa and other legumes; Sorghum - Sudan hybrids and other forage Sorghums; Coastal Bermuda, other Bermudas; Other perennial grasses; Oats and other winter annual grasses; Peanut; and Legume mixtures.

Hay Show Rules

1. Anyone in Eastland County may exhibit hay which he produced or purchased.
2. Any individual may exhibit only one bale per class, but may have entries in a many different classes as he chooses.
3. An entry must be in a bale form or large round bale.
4. Each entry in the officially established classes will be awarded a blue, a red, or a gold ribbon, if it is scored 50 points or better by the judge.
5. An entry will be disqualified when it contains more than a trace of injurious foreign material. This includes injurious plants such as bull-nettle, briars, headed sand-burs, mature Texas winter grass, or Aristida species (needlegrass) with needles attached, and poisonous plants. Presence of hardware, such as nails, wire, and other matter which is injurious when fed to livestock will disqualify an entry.
6. An entry will be disqualified when it has any objectionable odor; or when it is undercured heating, hot, wet, musty, moldy, caked badly shattered or broken, badly weathered, badly frosted, or very dusty.

COUNTY CHURCH LIFE TO BE CHRONICLED HERE

One year ago I began writing Feature Stories about interesting persons in Eastland County. I found a lot of them, and the supply has not run out by any means! I am amazed at the talents of these people, and their contributions to life here. Other outstanding people will be written about in the future. But recently Publisher H.V. O'Brien suggested a series of articles which seemed to be vital and challenging that I decided to suspend everything else in order to write them. These articles will cover, one by one, each Church in Eastland County, and some religious faiths which have no local building. Many Church leaders will be contacted on this project. If your group is overlooked, please call the newspaper and leave your name. All organiza-

tions, regardless of size, will be given an equal opportunity to explain their faith, doctrine, and practices. Information from each Church will be incorporated into a weekly article up to 1600 words long. This will give people of the County an opportunity to understand the various Churches, and can lead to enlightened decisions by the public. In the articles the newspaper would like to include answer to these questions: Do you accept the Bible as the inspired word of God? Which translations? How many members, locations, and Pastors does your Church have in the County? Tell of the basic doctrines of your Church. How does it differ from other Churches? How is your Church governed? How does a person become a member of your Church? How are the finances

handled in your Church? What sort of program does your Church have for young people? What sort of life-style does your Church expect from its members? What does your Church teach about the use of alcohol? What does your Church teach about marriage and divorce? Does your Church support the separation of Church and State? How does your Church view tax exemption for Church schools? Does your Church feel that the Ten Commandments have any validity for persons today? Does your Church teach that Christ will make a literal return to this earth? What does your Church do to make the community around it a better place to live? I believe our Nations was founded on a prophetic timetable—under God. With its separation of Church and State, it has been a haven of religious freedom. Each person can decide his own religion—or whether he does not believe in God at all. But no Nation which forgets God, and principles of right living, has ever last long on this earth. So there can be no more important thing—for a newspaper or a people—than to clarify what these principles are. Religion is currently in the news—and it will be even more in the news as time goes by. There is a wide diversity of religions in Eastland County. The first Christian ministers came with the Anglo settlers just before the Civil War. The first organized Church in the County was Methodist, established in 1865 by Rev. William Monk on a Davidson Ranch. In 1872 a Baptist Minister, Rev. Johnnie Northcutt, preached under some large oak trees on Hog

Creek, near Desdemona. In September he continued his ministry in the local schoolhouse. Soon the Presbyterians and Disciples of Christ joined in religious work in the area, followed by a number of other organizations. The early Ministers rode through the wilderness on horseback, and lived like the Indians who were still around. They had meager rations, a saddle for a pillow, and none of what the world calls security. But they laid the groundwork for the religion of the local communities, and this has greatly influenced life here. Since those days, Eastland County has cradled a number of Ministers and religious workers, who have preached and taught in all parts of the world. There are persons, granted, who feel threatened—or even insulted—by people who do not see all points of religion as they do. I hope I am not one of those persons, and can deal with points of doctrine without bias. It has always been my belief that truth, if given an equal opportunity, has nothing to fear from error. If these articles can lead someone to discover the Bible as a living Book, and great Treasure in the field we are plowing, then these articles will be important ones indeed!

Hints For The Aged & Handicapped

By PATRICIA GALBREATH
DEAR PAT—I know you will want to make your readers aware of "Self-Help Clothing for Children Who Have Physical Disabilities". This newly-revised booklet was published recently by the National Easter Seal Society and was written by Eleanor Boettke Hotts. The booklet suggests adaptations of ready-to-wear clothing to allow for special needs of children with physical limitations. The purpose of the book is to encourage independence in dressing. "Whether it be total or partial independence, 'doing for oneself' contributes to a healthier and happy life," she states. "Few parents realize how seriously they can handicap the physical, mental, and emotional growth of their children by limiting their independence in the performance of daily functions." The author discusses adaptations to clothing in relation to a child's muscle strength and coordination and range of motion, so that dressing is simplified. Underwear, sleepwear, tops and bottoms, dresses, outerwear, and swimwear are all discussed and in each case she considers changes to be made if a child is in a wheelchair, uses crutches or a prosthesis, has weak arms or limited use of hands, spastic feet, or limited movement of the lower extremities. The booklet includes specific sewing instructions to make suggested adaptations and a short discussion of the qualities of various fabrics. In addition, there is a brief guide to use in teaching dressing skills and a list of supplementary readings and appropriate commercial catalogs. For a copy, write: Self-

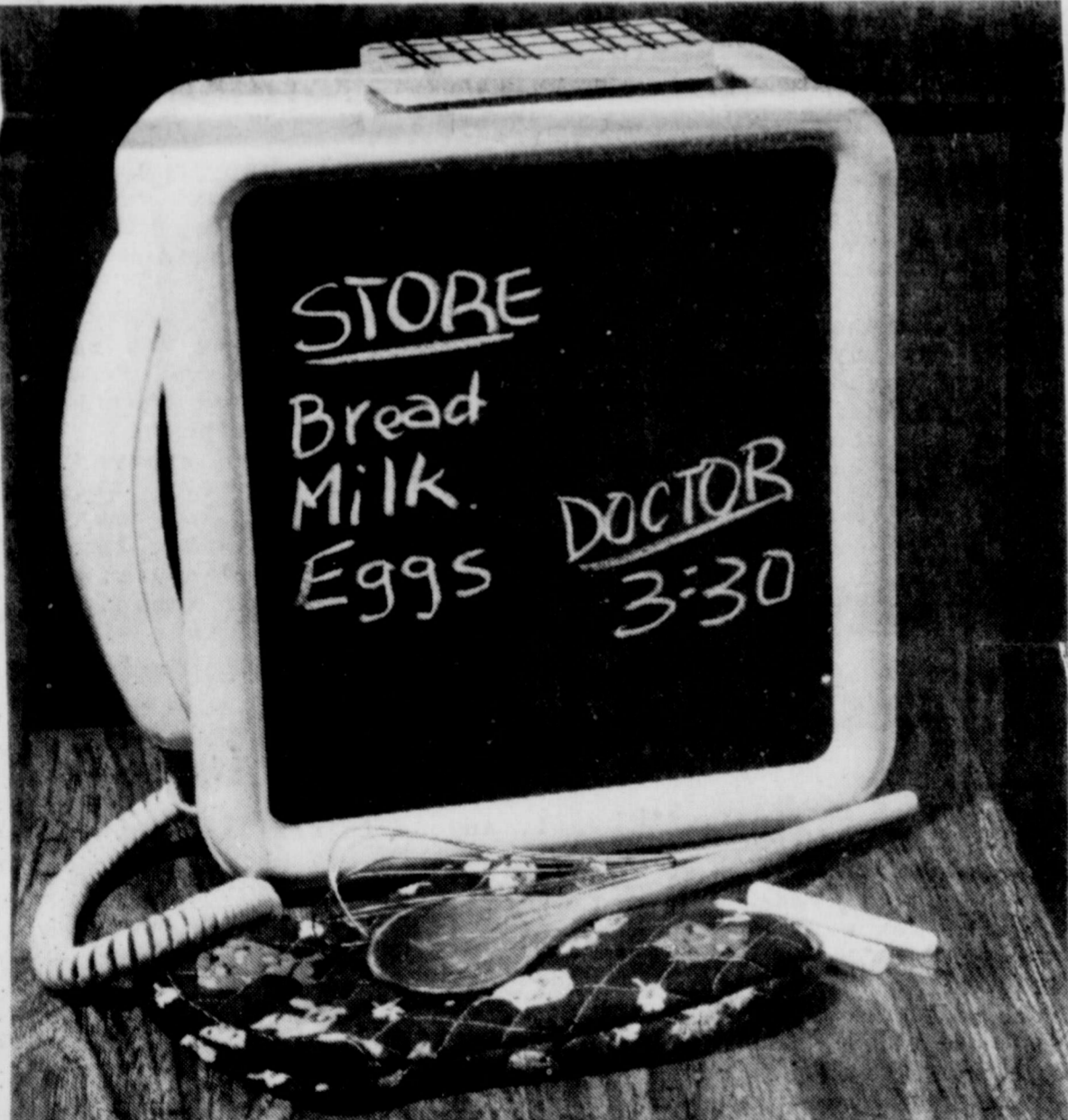

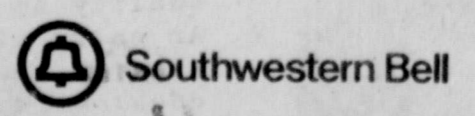

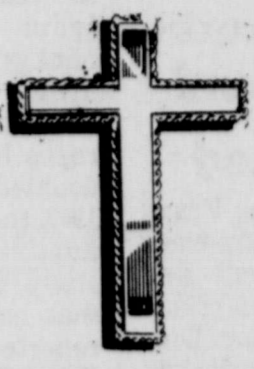

**Statistics Indicate Everyone
Affected By Crime Of Rape**

Statistics indicate that everyone is affected by the crime of rape. The victim suffers physically, psychologically and emotionally; but the rest of society also suffers. Victims range in age from 4 months to 89 years, and come from all ethnic backgrounds. According to National statistics, reported rapes have more than doubled, from 27,620 in 1967, to 63,020 in 1977. A Justice Department study in 1978 showed that only one in four reported a conviction. The FBI reports that convicted rapists usually repeat the same crime upon release 70 percent of

the time. Odds are that better than one in 15 that a woman will be raped in her lifetime. Rape is a violent crime, not a sexual advance.

As a concerned citizen, become aware of the facts of the crime and the profile of a rapist.

September 25, at 7:30 p.m. in the Cisco Junior College Auditorium, a program will be presented by Carolyn Herring, Director of the Abilene Rape Center. The program, sponsored by the Cisco Civic League, is free to the public, and every

City Council Holds Called Meeting Wednesday

Members of the Cisco City Council met in a called meeting Wednesday evening in the Council Chambers at City Hall. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the agenda which had been scheduled for the regular City Council meeting Tuesday night. The regular meeting was not held because it lacked a quorum.

During a discussion of the minutes of the previous regular council meeting of August 28, the acceptance of bids on a computer billing system was brought up for rediscussion. The council discussed the need to keep business at home in Cisco and expressed a desire to go with the Smith and Verett Company of Cisco instead of an Abilene based firm. Council member Lucy Collier made a motion to rescind a motion of that meeting which accepted a bid from Computer Data Center of Abilene for a computer billing system for the city. Council member Louise Allison seconded the motion and it passed by a unanimous vote.

Council member Allison then made a motion to award the Smith and Verett Company with the computer service bid for the city's water billing system for a trial period of one year. Council member Collier seconded the motion and all voted in its favor.

Since it will take the Smith and Verett Company a few months to get its program set up for operation, Council member Raymond Whitley made a motion to go with the Computer Data Center for a period of four months

to allow Smith and Verett time to set up their system and get organized. Council member Bill Eudy seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

Council member Whitley then made a motion to accept the minutes of the August 28 meeting as corrected. Collier seconded the motion and all voted in its favor.

The City Manager's monthly report, presented to the council for their information, included the following: The Front Street contractor says they are having a problem of over extension (trying to do too much too soon); Mr. Joe Hanna contacted the city concerning National Guard assistance on work at Cisco Municipal Airport. Cisco cannot be included this year because their project year has ended. City Manager John Boland is investigating the possibilities for this spring of 1980 and will get back with the council as soon as more information becomes available; the fire department answered a total of eight calls with five rural, two city grass, one structure and no city false alarms; total water usage was 32,593,800 gallons with a maximum usage per day of 1,407,000 gallons and a minimum of 703,500 gallons per day; in the Municipal Court, Judge Killion worked 63 hours in his office in August 1979. There were a total of 21 tickets taking in \$467.50, two were dismissed, 17 complaints for \$639.50 (one being dismissed, and one sent to Eastland), eight warrants were issued and there were two court cases. The

total court cases brought in \$1,106.50; under the sewer heading there was a total of 9,719,000 gallons of effluent treated during the month of August, showing an average of 462,800 gallons per day. The city is attempting some preventive maintenance main lines with a chemical for removing sand and silt. It has worked in several manholes clearing up cloggs caused by an accumulation of sand and related trash.

Council member Collier made a motion to approve and pay the city's bills for the month. Whitley seconded the motion and all voted in its favor.

The city has several insurance policies coming up for renewal and council member Allison made a motion to advertise for bids on the following policies: Workmen's Compensation; Multi-Peril; Standard Fire Policy for Airport Property; and Automobile Liability. Whitley seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

During citizen-council discussion, City Manager Boland presented a petition, which he received, to the council requesting a street light be placed at the intersection of Pershing and Royal Lane. It was pointed out, during discussion, that there are no street lights in this area mak-

ing it very dark and unsafe at night. The council instructed Boland to put a street light at the named intersection and to gradually, every month, have a new light put in until the area is lighted.

Council member Allison gave an update on the Tax Steering Committee meeting she attended on September 11. She reported the committee has decided to go with a three-quarter rule and a seven man board to be composed of one member from each school district in Cisco, Eastland, and Ranger; one member for the county; and one member each for Carbon, Gorman and Rising Star. She said Cisco, Eastland and Ranger must get together and choose one representative for the committee with nominations having to be in by October 15. The actual nomination has to come from a city's governing body.

The council held a worksession to discuss the proposed 1980 budget but there were no decisions made. The council decided to meet next Tuesday and go over the budget, and suggested changes, more thoroughly. Those members present at the meeting were Collier, Whitley, Allison, Eudy and Mayor Hugh (Chief) Brown. Council member Morgan Fleming was absent.

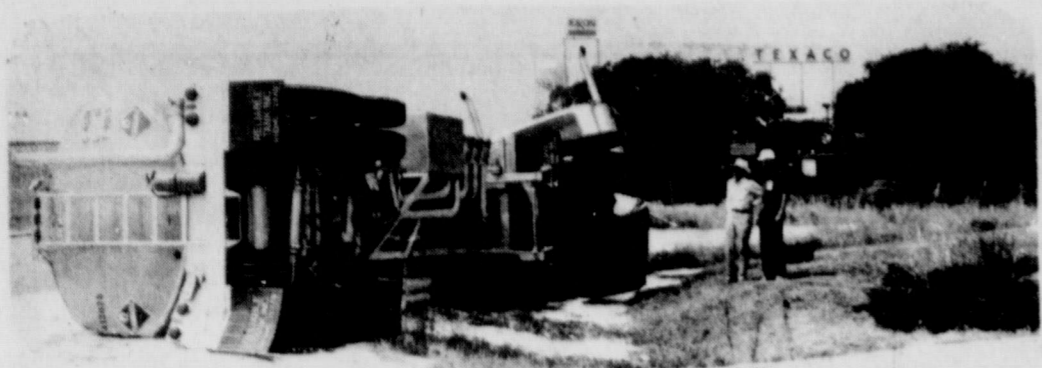


