Lose At Austin 21-14

CJC -Ranger Football Game To Feature Lions Benefit Bowl

Cisco Junior College's Wranglers, who lost a 21-14 decision to the University of Texas JV in Austin Monday night, will meet No. 1 ranked Ranger JC in the annual Lions Club Benefit Bowl football game at 7:30 p.m. Saturday at Breckenridge stadium.

Coach Bill Anderson and his staff began preparations for the contest Tuesday. It will be their 3rd game in eight days, and the 88-man squad was in good spirits and looking forward to the Breckenridge affair.

The Wranglers lost their No. 1 quarterback, Steve Bean of Dallas Roosevelt, at Austin. He suffered a knee injury in the third quarter and was in Dallas Tuesday to be examined by a specialist to determine the seriousness of the ailment.

James Thompson, defensive back from Marlin, also sustained a knee injury at Austin, and he will be out at least this week. Danny Delgado, linebacker from Garland, has a broken finger and may not be able to play. And Brent Scribner of Wichita Falls Rider, a 245-pound defensive tackle, has a neck ailment that probably will keep him out of action.

At Austin, the Wranglers moved the ball well and completed a good many passes, including seven to Quintin Smith for 142 yards and five to Fred Paige for 86 yards.

The UofT JV scored first early in the opening period after intercepting a Cisco pass. Also in the first period, Cisco scored

after a pass put the ball on the one and Bean went over with a sneak. In the second, UTA scored on a 30-yard pass play.

Cisco came back in the third to score on a Bean to Evans Heaton pass play of some 30 yards. Bill Bayless converted after each CJC touchdown. The UTA's final touchdown came after a fumble recovery late in the game.

The Wrangler staff regards this week's game at Breckenridge as probably "the toughest of the year."

Coach Anderson said the starting lineups would not be definite until late in the week.

Offensive starters will probably have Maurine Knight of Wichita Falls Rider at quarterback. He finished the game at Austin after Bean went out with the knee injury. In the backfield with him will be Blake Moody of Dallas Sprice, Wade Stanford and Eric Jones.

At ends, Quintin Smith and Evans Heaton are due to start, with Steve Kudlacek and Mario Rangel at tackles and Tim Munkres at center. A decision on the starting guards will be made later, the coach said.

The defensive team will be about the same

as in recent games with the exception of the injured men who aren't expected to play.

The entire squad will be in uniform at Breckenridge. The CJC Band and Belles will be featured in a big half-time show.

Statistics in the Austin game showed Cisco with 392 yards of total offense, as compared with 255 for UTA. Cisco had 21 first downs while UTA had 13. The Wranglers completed 15 of 30 passes with five interceptions, while UTA had only three completions in 14 passing plays with one interception. Cisco lost two fumbles.

Lobos To Face Early Here Friday At 8 p.m.

The Cisco High School Lobos will finish non-conference play this season when they take on the District 10-A Early Longhorns here at Chesley Field Friday night. The kickoff will be at 8 p.m.

The following Friday, October 5, the Lobos will have an open date. They will begin district play on October 12 in Clyde against the Bulldogs.

Coach Rick Calhoun reported Tuesday that the Lobos should be back at full strength Friday night and he is expecting a real good game between the two teams. He said that Steve Hopson, junior tailback who has been

out with a badly sprained ankle, will probably be allowed to play Friday night.

Coach Calhoun also stated that he feels the Lobos played a good game last week against the Bowie Jackrabbits. He invited persons interested in seeing the game films to attend Cisco Booster Club meetings on Tuesday nights.

The Longhorns are 0-1 for the season, having tied the Eastland Mavericks 12-12 in both teams season opener and losing to Glen Rose last week 48-21. Coach Calhoun stated that Early has a quick team and some good

players. The Lobos are 1-2 for the season.

Lobo seniors will continue to act as game captains this week with plans calling for permanent captains to be elected before district play begins.

Coach Calhoun said this week's lineup will be basically the same, but Mark Evatt will replace Keith Winnett on the defensive secondary.

Offense starters will probably be the same as follows: Ronnie Eudy and Chuck Canistraci, ends; Curt Posey and Mike Sherman, tackles; Tom Green and Sy Tabor, guards; Kory Wallace, center; Barton Philpott, quarterback; Forrest Starr and Donnie Worley, running backs; and Gary Speegle, fullback.

October 5 Is Last Day To File For City Council

October 5 is the last day for candidates to sign up for the city election to be held November 6 to elect a new council member to the place vacated by Lonnie Grady's resignation. In an announcement following Tuesday night's regular city council

meeting, City Manager John Boland stated that so far no one has filed for the position of Council member Place III.

In council action during the meeting, council member Louise Allison made a motion that Carl Gorr (recommended by

Mayor Hugh Chief Brown) be designated election judge for the November 6 city election. Council member Bill Eudy seconded the motion and members Eudy, Allison, Lucy Collier, Raymond Whitley, Morgan Fleming and Mayor Brown voted in its favor.

A motion by Whitley named Sherry Ledbetter, Charlene Thacker and Ramona Nichols (all recommended by Mayor Brown) as absentee voting clerks for the city election. The motion was seconded by Allison and all voted in its favor.

The minutes of the council's previous meeting, September 12, were accepted with revisions in a motion made by Allison. Whitley seconded the motion and all voted in its favor.

City manager Boland gave a financial report to the council and discussed the re-investment of some revenue sharing funds into U.S. Treasury Bills until October 10, at which time the money will be needed for the Front Street project and also for the purchase of a sanitation truck. (Boland says the actual paving of Front Street should begin either on Monday or Tuesday of next week. He said whichever day it is begun on, it will be finished that day.) He also recommended the re-investment of some sales tax funds in a six-month CD (Certificate of Deposit) at First National Bank in Cisco.

Council member Allison made a motion for the re-investment of revenue sharing

funds in U.S. Treasury Bills and sales tax funds in a C.D. for six months.

Collier seconded the motion and all voted in its favor. A motion to accept the financial report was then made by Eudy, seconded by Whitley and passed unanimously.

Boland informed the council of an Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) meeting on Wastewater Treatment Grants which city engineer Billy Jacobs attended. He said two points made by EPA at the meeting were:

- 1.) Each city should create a citizen's study group to be kept informed of progress on the wastewater treatment grant. Such a group allows the citizen's education on the project and helps the entire program to move smoothly.
- 2.) EPA offers an alternate plan to the building of a new wastewater treatment plant. This plan would call for the city to have a "no-discharge permit." With such a permit, the city could sell its wastewater effluent to local farmers or individuals who have a 90-day holding pond and would then use it on non-consumable crops.

Boland said he was only briefing the council on the information and it would be brought up for possible action at a later date.

A request was made to the council by Mrs. J.P. McCracken for the closing of the streets and alleys on some property which she and Richard Moore own in the southeast part of Cisco. She said

there are no streets open on the property at the present time and it is up for sale to businesses which would find it less attractive if it were cut-up by streets and alleys. The area of land under discussion is between Red Gap Western Store and Avenue A along Interstate 20. City Attorney Billy Wright Jr. said he thinks there needs to have been more information on the published agenda concerning the request. Mayor Brown said the council would take the request under consideration.

In a public hearing of the 1979-80 proposed revenue sharing budget, city manager Boland said the total fund revenues would be \$77,517.00. He listed proposed expenditures as follows: \$5,000 for an administrative car; \$5,000 for police vehicles; \$25,000 for major street repair and maintenance; \$30,000 for a sanitation truck; \$1,000 for the library; \$10,000 to engineering; and \$1,000 for a police walkie-talkie; making a total of \$77,000 for expenditures. The excess of revenues over expenditures would be \$517.00.

Boland also went over the proposed city budget for 1979-80 in a public hearing. The proposed total revenue of all funds for 1979-80 is \$1,198,742.00 with total expenditures being \$1,182,457.00. This would leave a total excess revenues over expenditures of all funds at \$16,285.00. Boland explained some of the changes in the proposed budget as being the addition of several new

employee positions; the creation of a new account for Lake Cisco; a \$30,000 major sewer project replacing a sewer line along Front Street from West 8th to West 2nd and then east to the sewer plant; the purchase of a new sanitation truck, two used highway patrol vehicles for the police department and a city administrative vehicle. Council member Allison said she believes the budget is excessively high, over one million dollars, and she does not think there will be enough money for the expenditures.

Council member Allison later made a motion that the proposed 1979-80 annual budget be approved with the provision that a review of the budget be scheduled for January 1980. Council member Whitley seconded the motion and all voted in its favor.

In other action, Whitley made a motion that the discussion of the city manager's salary, and the salaries of city employees, be tabled until a later date. Collier seconded the motion and all voted in its favor. Council member Allison made a motion that a city auditor not be designated at the present time. Eudy seconded the motion and all voted in its favor.

Mayor Brown opened four bids for a sanitation truck to be purchased by the city. The council seemed to be in agreement that the best deal appeared to be a bid from Environmental Sales and Service, Inc., in Hurst,

Commercial and educational booths will be set up and all exhibits, except baked goods, will be entered by 6:00 p.m. Thursday. Baked goods will be entered from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. Friday.

Everyone is encouraged to enter exhibits, but youth have an added incentive. All youth exhibiting in the Fair will receive a silver dollar. These awards are being sponsored by the First National Bank of Cisco.

The Eastland National Bank is sponsoring \$100 for the top four placings in the Educational Booths. Plaques will be presented to the outstanding educational and commercial booths.

Donna Brown, will give a cake decorating exhibition on Saturday afternoon from 3 to 4 p.m. in the home craft exhibit area. Decorated cakes used in the demonstrations will be auctioned with proceeds going to the County Fair Association.

Saturday morning will be devoted to youth and youth activities at the Fair. A Pet Show will be held at 9 a.m. all pre-school and school age children may enter pets. Games and contests such as relays and bubble-gum blowing contests will follow the pet show.

A magic show will be presented by H.V. O'Brien. Other entertainment for youth is being planned for Saturday morning.

The seventh annual Eastland County Hay Show will be a feature of the Fair. Over 60 entries of hay are competing for ribbons and plaques. The hay will be judged for both physical and chemical (crude protein) factors by Dr. George Alston, Extension Agronomist, Friday morning.

At 1:30 p.m. Friday Dr. Alston will present an educational program on quality hay production. The program will be of interest to hay producers, hay users and general suppliers of fertilizer, seeds, chemicals, machinery, buildings, and equipment.

Congressional Comment

WASHINGTON, D.C. — responsible for stagnating growth. To paraphrase an old story, there was once a man who built a mighty house; a beautiful house complete with scores of rooms, enough, in fact, for every man, woman and child in the village.

And the people were in awe of the gift and they rushed to move into their new homes, as their old ones were in sad repair and they could not afford to rebuild.

But, while that towering house was a masterpiece of gingerbread from the doorstep to the highest turret, the builder had put all of his money into the beautiful shell of the house and had neglected to construct a foundation.

The house and all of the people came tumbling down. That may be a rather simplistic way of describing the construction of some of our nation's economic and tax policies in recent years, but the description fits. While the Federal Government has concentrated on fancy gingerbread, very pleasing to the general populace, it has neglected the underlying foundation.

We are now facing an economic slowdown, along with rampant inflation and declining productivity. During past periods of recession, the Congress has built a gingerbread house in an attempt to solve the problems by settling on programs aimed at stimulating the economy through increased Federal spending.

But rather than solving the problem, these measures have fueled inflation because fewer goods are being chased by more dollars. Pumping up the demand for goods only gives short-term relief to a sagging economy and does nothing to correct the structural inefficiencies in the marketplace — the foundation — that are

responsible for stagnating growth. It is time for the rebuilding

of the foundation of our economic strategy. The emphasis should now be placed on the supply side of the economy. Policies which expand our capacity to produce goods and services more efficiently are the most effective in dealing with our current economic problems.

You fight inflation and recession by producing more goods, cheaper, not by lengthening costly unemployment and welfare rolls.

In order to promote productivity, changes must be made in our tax laws. I have cosponsored the Capital Cost Recovery Act, designed to encourage real economic growth by stimulating investment in more efficient plant and equipment. This legislation would scrap existing depreciation schedules for fixed assets and substitute in its place a simplified system of rapid depreciation. The proposal would allow a 10 year writeoff for buildings, a five year writeoff for equipment and a three year writeoff for limited investment in cars and light trucks. This is no "quick fix," gingerbread solution, but a long-term attempt to make the United States more competitive in world markets.

Among major industrialized nations, the United States is 18th in both economic and productivity growth over the past 10-year period. In 1976 the actual rate of fixed business investment was 9 percent of the Gross National Product, compared with 20 percent for Japan and 15 percent for West Germany. We cannot continue to ignore the facts. Our economic position in the world is in decline. The choice now before us is whether or not we have the courage to reverse

this trend — before the gingerbread house falls on us. Clearly meaningful tax reforms, such as the Capital Cost Recovery Act, would be at least a beginning in the building of a strong economic foundation.

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—Work crews have yet to cap the off-shore oil well spewing barrels of crude daily into the Gulf of Mexico, but all the early indications of a courtroom collision between Gov. Bill Clements and Texas Attorney General Mark White apparently will be realized. White told reporters last week he will sue SEDCO, the drilling company found-

ed by Clements, and Mexico's nationally owned oil company PEMEX sometime this fall.

SEDCO is now run by the governor's son, B. Gill Clements, while the governor's stock is in a "blind trust." Though the governor may never appear in the courtroom, the political effect of the lawsuit will remain the same: one of the

state's top Democrats will confront the top Republican state official.

Will Allege Negligence

White said he will allege negligence on the part of SEDCO, which had leased the off-shore rig used by PEMEX to drill the blown-out well.

"It (the blow-out) wasn't an act of God. This thing occurred apparently because of mismanagement, negligent operation, negligently maintained equipment, whatever," White said.

He added that SEDCO's subsequent sinking of the damaged rig in deep international waters on July 12 "cast grave suspicions on everything they (SEDCO officials) have said" about the company's role in the blow-out.

White said he expects to delay until after President Jimmy Carter and Mexican President Jose Lopez Portillo meet Sept. 28 and 29.

Clements in Yugoslavia

Clements, meanwhile, has been unavailable for comment while leading a Texas delegation tour of several Communist-block countries. Reports indicate he is optimistic about future joint U.S.-Yugoslavia ventures.

When he returns he will find a message on his desk from Speaker of the House Bill Clayton saying there is no political support for a special session of the Texas Legislature.

Clements had promised to call the legislators back to Austin to pass an initiative and referendum bill, among other issues, but Clayton advises the legislators who failed to reach agreement on the issue last spring would probably not resolve the issue in a special session.

State Rep. John Bryant

of Dallas, who heads the House minority bloc, thinks Clements should offer a pure initiative and referendum proposal or none at all.

Demo Chairman Race

In times past a Democratic Texas governor has always hand-picked the chairman of the Texas Democratic Party, but not this season.

With Republican Clements in the statehouse, the crucial Demo leadership post may be filled by a person emerging after a bona fide convention ballot, not one standing in the shadow of a governor.

Three prominent Democrats are mentioned for the job: State Rep. Luther Jones of El Paso, Houston lawyer John Odom and Democratic Executive Committeewoman Carrin Patman of Ganado.

With election of the chairman over a year away, others are sure to be considered.

Ms. Patman is the wife of State Sen. Bill Patman, who is expected to meet a serious primary challenge for his seat from State Rep. John Wilson of La Grange. Wil-

Be assured that this newspaper will run any and all photographs that Steve may be able to get.

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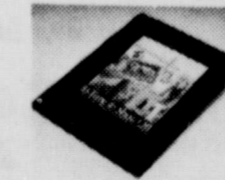

OBSERVATIONS FROM...

The River Road

Before long the United Fund will be asking for its annual contributions, which will help many organizations. The Salvation Army will benefit from this drive, and I consider it very worthy. The work of the Salvation Army covers much more than help for the destitute, but it is usually thought of in this manner. It is hard for us to realize, here in a tranquil area, the vast amount of good this group does in places with a heavy population density. For the very poor and neglected seldom live in the country anymore - they have moved to the cities for lack of anywhere else to go. The Salvation Army, through Rescue Missions, help for alcoholics and other programs, handles many areas of life other organizations are simply not equipped to deal with. This was impressed upon me very vividly about ten years ago, when I was helping with Community Service projects of the Seventh-day Adventist Church in El Paso.

Our small church, located in the Upper Valley from the city, had a dedicated Community Services leader named Alyce Bennett. Alyce was so engrossed in her work that she wasn't just waiting for needy people to come to her - she was out beating through the salt cedar bushes and across the irrigation ditches to find anyone who needed assistance. She found so many that she was calling for help from larger churches across town, and from any citizen she could press into service. She pressed some pocket-books, too, including her own. For Alyce, a sixty-year-old widow with a small income, took food from her own kitchen if she found a neglected or hungry child.

It is really amazing how many unusual characters will cluster on the fringes of a city which is a Border crossing. Mexican Nationals were slipping across north, and other people, including

self-supporting missionaries - were headed south. We met people from all over the United States - and most of the world. For the 1960's were time of great intellectual upheaval - of young people drifting about. Almost every little adobe house around the rich irrigated farms sheltered people who were picking up work or simply collapsing for a while. One of these buildings contained a somewhat unusual young family. Alyce came to tell me about them one afternoon. The wife was a young blonde woman from Ohio named May. Her husband, Frank, was a black man from a local family. The couple had two girls - a three-year-old and a baby. May and the children had no food in the house, for Frank had been drinking for two weeks straight. She suspected he also took L.S.D., for sometimes he went into rages and beat her severely. Right now he was gone from home.

We decided to carry May some food and see if there was anything more we could do to help. Alyce, who had spent most of her life in Ohio and West Virginia, exhibited no emotional reaction about the bi-racial marriage. I had come from a different background, but decided to breeze into the situation just as calmly as she had. I knew some fine black people who belonged to my church - they were my friends. I had never been inclined to judge people by their race or color.

May's two room house furnished a shade from the sun, and little else. There is nothing quite as elemental as a house built for Mexican workers by a wealthy landowner on an irrigated farm. Flies winged through the unscreened windows. But May's meager belongings sat in neat clusters.

May appeared wan, with limp hair strung down her back. Her children were pale, almost anemic. Her conversation was halting, telling of a deprived childhood where no one had really cared for her. Her drunken father beat her, so she left home at age sixteen. She felt sorry for anyone who had a bad time, she said, such as black people. So she had drifted into the south to help out the protest marchers. The blacks fed her, and everything was alright until she met Frank, who was drifting around too. They married soon afterward, and came here. But, to her great surprise, Frank's parents hadn't been happy about the marriage at all! They resented her, and wouldn't have much to do with the children.

"You can't stay here in this situation!" Alyce said briskly. "Have you talked to Mr. Padilla, the Justice of the Peace up here, about how Frank treats you?"

"Of course not!" May answered quickly. "I couldn't do that! For I have no where else to go. My relatives in Ohio wouldn't take me back - not with these children! And the black people don't want me. So what can I do?"

We had no answers, but promised to help all we could. For several weeks we carried food and clothing from the church to the little house. Finally Frank showed up on the scene. Alyce cornered him, and somehow won his confidence enough to get him to promise to treat May and the children with more consideration. He became friendly, and brought May to Alyce's house several times.

He happened to be at home when I stopped by with some things one day. I found him courteous and soft-spoken, with obvious potential, a totally different person from what I had expected. I could hardly imagine one of his violent moods.

The more I learned of that couple, however, the more I realized their marriage was in real trouble. Not just from the bi-racial bit, the poverty, or the drinking, although that all added up! But the trouble lay in the motives behind the marriage - partly with May, desperate for some kind of love and security. She hadn't found approval with white people, so she thought that marriage to a black man would provide the perfect answer. Instead, she had picked a time-bomb

waiting to go off, a thwarted individual smoldering with all sorts of frustrations. And, in his mind, all these frustrations should be lumped on May.

One day a black friend of mine, a fellow church member from the Upper Valley, called me up. "Sister Payne," she began, "I've been so worried about you! I hear you ladies from the Westview Church are helping Frank A - and his wife."

"Sure thing."

"Sister Payne, you don't know what you got hold of this time! That man is a smooth talker - even talked me into loaning him some money once. Didn't pay it back, neither. But he is dangerous, especially when he gets a shot of whiskey and that L.S.D. stuff he brags about. Someday he's going to kill that little wife and those girls." She paused. "I don't know why he wanted to marry that white woman, anyhow! Just to show off - I'll bet that's why. Well, he didn't show nobody nuthin'!"

I couldn't restrain a chuckle.

About two weeks later Alyce Bennett gave me a frantic call late one night. "Can you please come over here! May barely escaped from Frank, and she is here at my house with the girls. She needs a place to hide!"

When I reached Alyce's little house, a bruised and shaken May was still tugging at her torn clothing, and sobbing out her latest experience like a broken record. Frank had been drinking - he had come home and declared he wanted rid of her and the girls. She had finally managed to get the children away from him and hide in an irrigation ditch, and had sneaked from there to Alyce's house.

Alyce spoke as she thought. "Frank knows where this place is, May, and he knows where Mrs. Payne's place is too. He will find you at either place. Where can you go?"

That was what I was wondering about. What people, even in our church, were in a position to take on a situation like that? I felt very inadequate. I wasn't even sure how my family would react to May and her crying children.

In this world, when you need help, you usually go to a person who understands trouble. So I called up a black Pastor, Elder D - , and explained the situation to him. He thought for awhile, and began to come up with an answer. "First of all, you need a safe place, and few private homes - or even churches - can provide that kind of protection. This situation is so complicated, so serious, that I believe you should call the head of the Salvation Army and see what he suggests. They have the best facilities here to protect anyone."

The voice of the Salvation Army officer, on the phone, was reassuring. "Of course we can take the woman and her children. We have apartments where she can live and be cared for until something better can be worked out."

Alyce drove May across town to a complex we hadn't even known existed - living quarters for battered, neglected, unwanted women and children. There May would have guards to assure her safety until some sort of vocational training and rehabilitation could be arranged for her and possibly for her husband.

And afterward, I sometimes wondered, what would have happened if the Salvation Army hadn't been equipped for such a situation? What would happen to a lot of people whom nobody else wants?

Childless Adobe Home Beats The Heat, Cold

As the early Spanish explorers crossed the vast open expanses of the southwestern United States and northern Mexico, missions were established and later forts were built.

They found the area to be arid with temperatures going to the extremes of both Summer and Winter and sometimes with winds that were very cold or that whipped up dust storms.

Seeking shelter from the elements, these early settlers observed the Indians and saw that while wood and stone were not readily available over much of the area, some of the Indians were using the plentiful clay to make adobe houses.

Houses made of adobe bricks made from the clay required thick walls for strength and those walls both stopped the wind and acted as insulation against the extreme temperatures. The thicker walled versions

were also used as forts for protection from Indian raids.

Since adobe construction is susceptible to moisture, the amount of rainfall in this part of Texas kept its popularity from reaching here.

While looking for economically feasible ways to beat the energy crunch and longing for the Old Spanish charm often seen in buildings in New Mexico, Mr. and Mrs. Dan Childress, decided on a new home to be constructed of adobe brick on their farm near Cottonwood in Callahan County.

According to Mr. Childress, the project was a learning experience all the way. He was able to gain some assistance from men who had worked in building construction in Old Mexico, and he had to experiment and direct the work himself as local builders were unfamiliar with required methods.

The house was about a year and a half in building with about the first year used in making the eight thousand 3 one half by 12 by 16 inch adobe bricks used and seven months in actually constructing the house.

Red clay was used to make a hard adobe brick and blow sand was mixed into clay mud before it was placed in 1 by 4 wooden forms to keep the clay bricks from cracking. The same mud mix was also used later as mortar between the bricks.

With about three thousand square feet of floor space, the three bedroom house with attached garage is built in three sections with separate heating controls for each section. The rooms are also built with cross ventilation to reduce cooling needs.

The foundation and floor is of one piece poured concrete with the parts of the foundation that the bricks sit on raised to protect the bricks from a wet floor. The forms used to make the raised strips were left as baseboards and there were cutouts for the doors.

Wooden frames were used around doors and windows with wood blocks being set into the adobe walls to nail the frames and built in cabinet work.

The outside walls are eighteen inches thick and are covered on the outside with metal mesh that is nailed to each brick and stuccoed over to protect the adobe from rain. The inside walls aren't as thick and the walls are all plastered on the inside with a gypsum plaster or a lime plaster made with white cement.

Concrete was poured for window ledges and over window and doors. Steel around the top of the walls in the same pour. The window and door frames were used as part of the forms into which the concrete was poured and the forms over the inside of the windows were left to attach drapery rods to.

Brown aluminum insulating windows and Spanish style doors were used together with a dark red metal roof on the lighter pinkish tan house.

The roof is a conventional wood truss structure with a sheetrock ceiling insulated with twelve inches of insulation.

A hot water heating system such as is used with some solar heating systems is used together with a one thousand gal. hot water underground storage tank. The water is heated by heat exchangers in the fireplace through which the water is circulated when the fireplace is hot and by a backup gas fired unit if necessary.

Mr. Childress stated that the backup unit was used to heat the water in the hot water tank when it was first put into use and from then on the occasional use of the fireplace provided enough heat for the system to keep the house warm throughout the colder months.

The adobe tends to hold the heat in the winter and the cool in the summer.

Moran Helps Make Annual Cattlemen's Round-Up For Crippled Children A Success

Cattlemen living in and around Moran - a community of only 315 population - are doing much more than their share to make a success of the 20th annual Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children.

According to John McIntyre, Area Chairman, 30 cattlemen have either contributed livestock or made donations of \$200 or more each. Farmers and ranchmen who give livestock or \$200 donations are recognized with an exhibit of their cattle brands on a large community board, almost five feet tall, that has been set up in Helen Trowell's Cafe.

The idea of a board displaying brands was McIntyre's, and last year he got 28 to contribute an estimated total of \$6,800 (including auction sale proceeds and cash gifts).

"We'll beat that this year," he says, estimating the total may run close to \$9,000. "We've already got \$4,826 in cash - including some from Moran businesses who are buying two of the 6" by 6" squares in the checkerboard display.

McIntyre is proud of Moran's participation. On Friday the livestock were driven to the Rehab pens by Sam Snyder. Sam's wife, Mary Anna, did the lettering of the cattlemen's name that is affixed to each panel. McIntyre himself inscribes the brands. Ray Peoples of the WTRC staff constructed the display.

"Cattlemen are really proud of their brands. I got one a little off-center and had to re-do it," he said. McIntyre said he just about "hit up" everybody to get him to give.

On the eve of the Abilene sale, McIntyre noted that he still had four "blank" panels and said he hoped to "smoke out some more donors."

He added: "I bet Moran is giving more to the crippled children proportionately than any other area. One farmer told me he was blessed with eight grandchildren, but realized how many youngsters were handicapped and needed our help."

John and his wife, Roma, have farmed for 22 years, about six miles south of Moran.

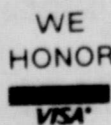
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Obituary Final Rites For Melvin Carey To Be Thursday
