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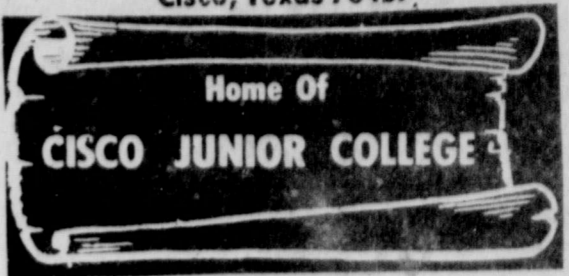

## Glenn Scott To Present Program At Rotary

Glenn Scott, science demonstrator and 34-year veteran of Southwestern Bell, will be in Cisco to present his new program "An Adventure in Communications."

Doug White, Southwestern Bell's manager, said his company's science demonstrator will highlight key technological innovations in the communications industry when he addresses the Rotary Club on Thursday, October 25, at 12 noon at the Laguna Hotel.

Scott will describe these innovations and their practical application in the successful management of business and in the effective service of residence customers.

"The technology we gain in the Bell System is worthless if it isn't used in anticipation of or to provide for human needs," said Scott. "And in a science demonstration of this kind, we can personally describe how these needs are met."

The company, for example, invented the transistor in 1948, which opened the door to electronic communications as we know them today and to the development of the ESS (Electronic Switching System).

"The telephone is the customer's access to the ESS—the world's largest programmed computer. It's a national resource through which, in a matter of seconds, a caller in New York can talk to someone in downtown San Francisco, by direct distance dialing and station-to-station, for \$1.30," said Scott. "In 1920 that same three minute call cost \$20.40."

"Also, it would take a minimum of six operators and an eventual call-back to the originating customer some minutes afterward to connect the parties." Added Scott. "Now some No. 4 ESS units can be expanded to handle 550,000 calls an hour."

"This is an exciting program," said White. "It gives people a perspective and appreciation of how basic scientific research and development has improved and expanded our standard of living."

The science demonstration program is presented in a non-technical manner for audience entertainment as well as information.

The defensive team will include most of the above named players. Lobo coaches used virtually every man on their 22-man squad during the games.

Plans call for the team bus to leave for Brady at 2:30 p.m. Buses will carry the Lobo band students later.

The Wranglers scored first on a 17-yard pass from QB Mark Wilkerson to End Rick Page, and Bill

Bayless converted. This score was the only figure on the scoreboard at halftime.

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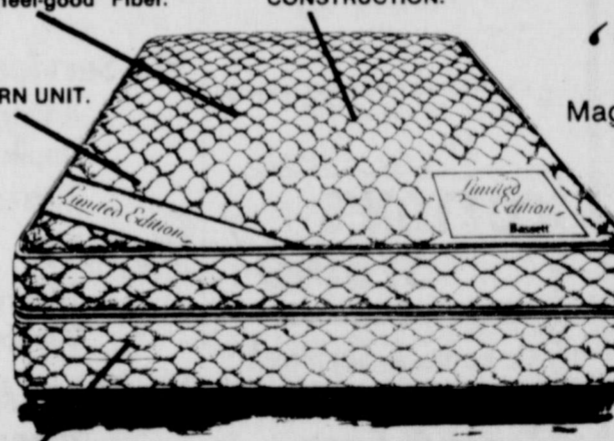

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### Avoid Telephone 'Hard Sell'

Guard against unscrupulous telephone solicitors with a little knowledge of how they operate, advises Claudia Kerbel, a consumer information specialist.

Many types of goods and services are sold by telephone—magazines, kitchenware, insurance and land—but some dealers may try to trick consumers into a purchase or contributing to a phony charity, she explains.

Mr. Kerbel is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

She recommends following these tips:

1. Never agree to buy a product, let a salesperson come to your home or make a charitable contribution during the first phone call.

Tell the salesperson you will call him back if you decide to buy or let someone come to your home.

2. Call the Better Business Bureau or Chamber of Commerce to check on the company, then call the salesperson back if you really need what he is selling.

3. If it is a charitable organization, ask them to send you information about the charity.

4. If the company represents itself as helping the handicapped, ask if the handicapped are employed by the company and how much goes to the handicapped.

5. If you are told that you have won a free prize or gift, find out what you have to do.

Often the prize is only given if you buy something, and frequently you will be

DEAR PAT--When my husband installed a new sink in our kitchen it had the new "one-handle" control.

This device is marvelous and I don't know why we never thought of installing one to aid me in my household work. Now with only slight pressure I can turn the water on and get the mixture of temperature I want without fumbling for 15 minutes.

The hand operated sprayer-hose is also difficult for me to reach and manipulate because of lack of strength in my hands so he attached a small, inexpensive device onto the faucet that allows a person to direct the flow of water in different directions. This can be done with slight finger-tip pressure.

This tiny nozzle can be purchased at a local hardware store and is simply screwed onto your existing faucet.

I have plans now to convert my bathroom faucets to the single control style as I have found out this can be done without installing a complete new lavatory.--Mrs. K.L.C., Arkansas

DEAR PAT--I use crutches and always had a problem about how to carry my purse. Even a shoulder strap did not solve the inconvenience and discomfort I sometimes faced.

My son-in-law came to the rescue by taking my small leather purse to a shoe repair store. The man attached two small leather straps to it and now it snaps over the handhold of my crutch.

By using this method, the camera is steady and I can concentrate on getting a good shot instead of trying to hold the camera. The Clampette can be used in the house also by attaching it to chairs, ladder or any similar object.

## Stan Williamson To Challenge For World Championship

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following article is reprinted from the Sapulpa (Okla.) Herald Monday, Oct. 1, 1979. Stan Williamson is the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. B.A. (Toots) Ingram, 200 East 17th, Cisco. His wife, Vicki, is also the granddaughter of the Toots Ingram and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Buddy Ingram of Kellyville, Okla., and formerly of Cisco.)

**KELLYVILLE, Okla.**—When neighbors talked Stan Williamson into becoming a professional cowboy three years ago they knew he could wrestle steers but they didn't expect he would challenge for a world championship.

Williamson has led the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association standings in steer wrestling since February. If he maintains his lead this fall and at the National Finals Rodeo in Oklahoma City this December, Williamson would be one of the most unlikely champions the PRCA has had in some time.

Most of the rising stars on the pro rodeo circuit have enough time and the means to enter nearly 100 rodeos each season; most are in their 20s and most are college graduates. Williamson is 31, owns and operates his own home construction business here and, between jobs, enters fewer than 60 rodeos.

"I'd like to win the title, but I'd like to win it without a whole lot of sacrificing," explains Williamson, who could also pick up a \$5,000 bonus from the Winston Rodeo Awards program if he hangs on for the world title.

"I've also got a wife, a daughter and a good business at home," he adds, "so I don't enjoy traveling as much as some of the guys. But I do enjoy winning."

Although Williamson admits to "messing around" with rodeo some as a youngster, he never went to sleep at night dreaming of the National Finals. But after settling down with his wife, Vicki, and starting his own business here, he soon became friends with some PRCA bulldoggers who lived nearby.

Duane Hennigh, a former PRCA cowboy, was probably the most influential, encouraging Williamson's rodeo hobby. Jim Smith and

Bill Duvall (brother of former world champion Roy Duvall) also lived nearby and talked Williamson into entering some amateur rodeos in the early 1970s.

"I placed a lot of the amateur rodeos. I sort of surprised myself at first," says Williamson. "I think it was Bill (Duvall) who told me one day that if I was doing that well at it, I might as well win some money."

So in 1976, at 28, Williamson earned his PRCA membership. The following year he finished eighth in the steer wrestling standings and also won two go-rounds in his first National Finals Appearance. He had a similar campaign in '78, finishing 12th during the year, eighth at the NFR.

This year Williamson got off to a fast start at the big-purse winter rodeos. Back-to-back wins at Tucson, Ariz., and at the Houston Livestock Show in February netted him almost \$10,000 in just two weeks.

Williamson has held onto the lead all season, despite his habit of entering only the biggest events and some small rodeos within a few hours drive of his home. By mid-September he had over \$24,000 in winnings and a \$2,000 edge over second-place Byron Walker.

"Even though I'm not on the road all the time, I do practice a lot, and I think that's been a key," Williamson explains. "I have some pretty good practice steers and I usually work out about four or five hours a night after work."

"It doesn't matter how tough you are; if you don't practice, you don't win anything."

In addition to Walker, Williamson has several proven veterans chasing him down the stretch including Skip Ayers, Roy Duvall, all-around contender Paul Tierney and defending world champion Tom Ferguson. This year the world title is based on total money for the entire season, including the National Finals money.

"I feel like whoever goes into the NFR in the top five will have a shot at it," Williamson adds, "I'd love to win it. But it all depends on what happens in Oklahoma City."

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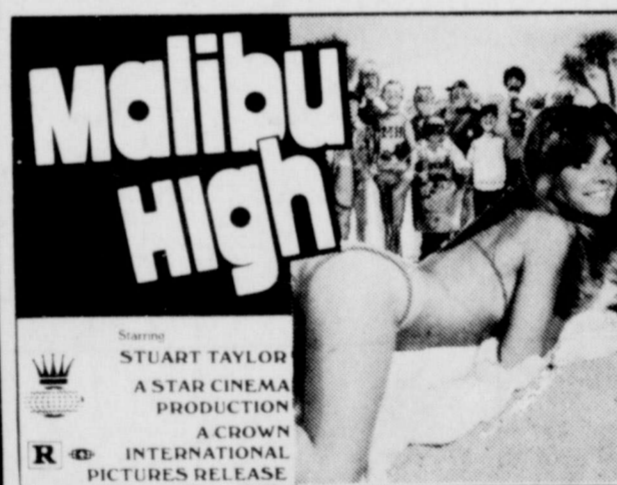

## Recipients Of V.A. Benefits Must Return Report

On Nov. 1, 1979, a large number of people receiving Veterans Administration benefit payments will receive an annual income report, which must be completed. According to James Wright, Veterans Service Officer for Eastland County, persons receiving the card must complete it and return it to the VA before Jan. 1, 1980, or have their benefit payments terminated.

Those receiving the income questionnaire card will be veterans, widows and children who are receiving nonservice-connected disability or death pension under the new pension law, which went into effect January 1, 1979. Also receiving the card will be veterans and widows who are receiving pension under the laws which were in effect prior to January 1, 1979, and dependent parents of veterans whose deaths were caused by military service.

Veterans, widows and children being paid under the new pension law, as well as parents receiving dependency and indemnity compensation, should remember that their countable income may be reduced by any unusual family medical expenses they pay out in 1979. It is therefore

important that the medical expenses be shown in the proper space on the income card. Upon receipt of the card showing medical expenses for 1979, the VA will recompute entitlement and, if necessary, increase benefit payments retroactively to January 1, 1979. All VA claimants should report all of their income for 1979, and their anticipated income for 1980. Based upon information shown on the card, a determination will be made as to whether VA benefits will continue in 1980.

The area conference for Delta Kappa Gamma was held in Jacksboro on Sat. Oct. 20. The theme for the conference was "Together We Build."

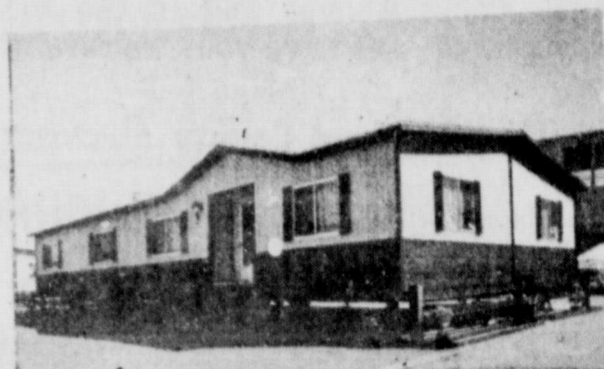

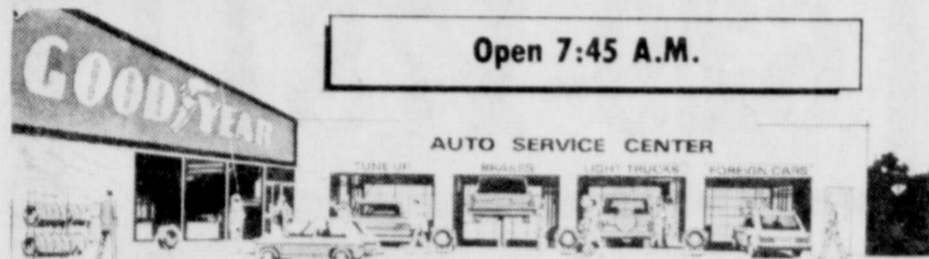

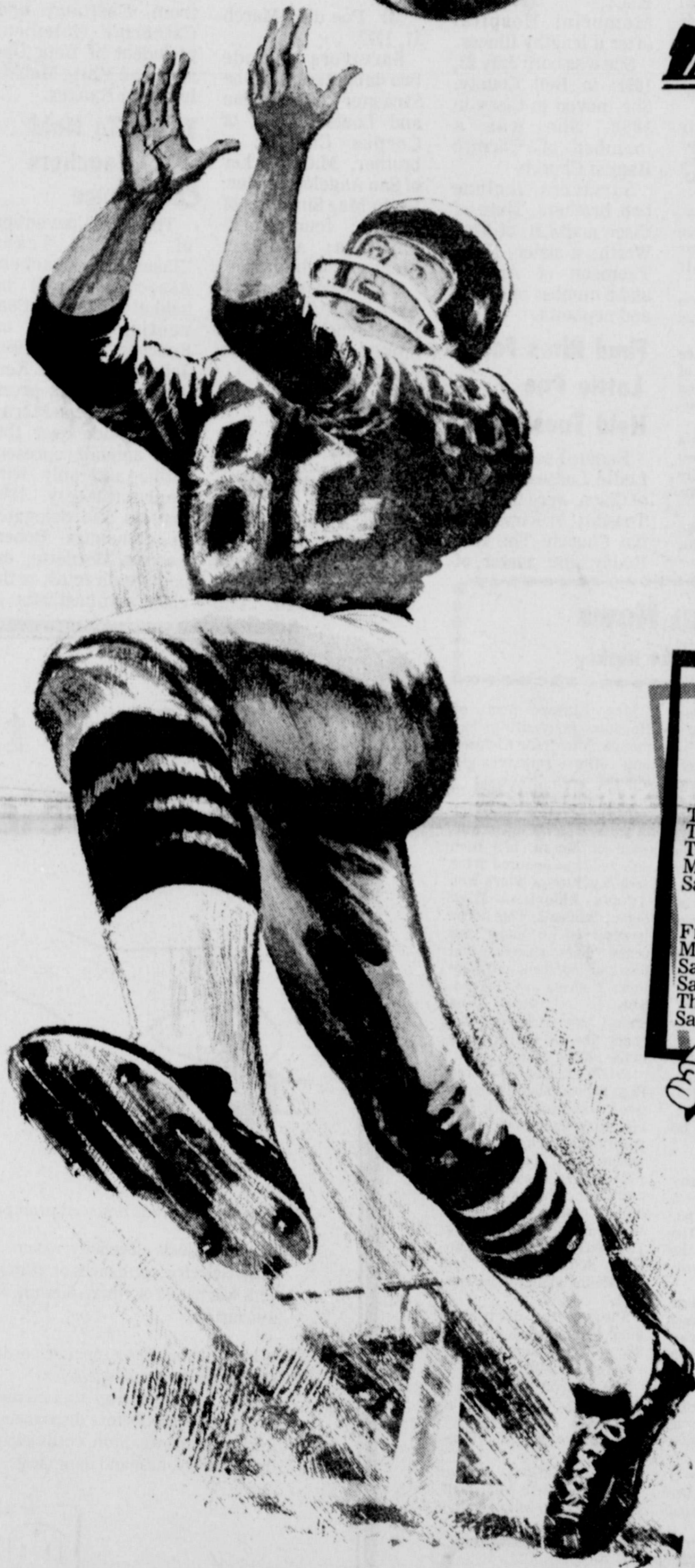

1980 Teachers

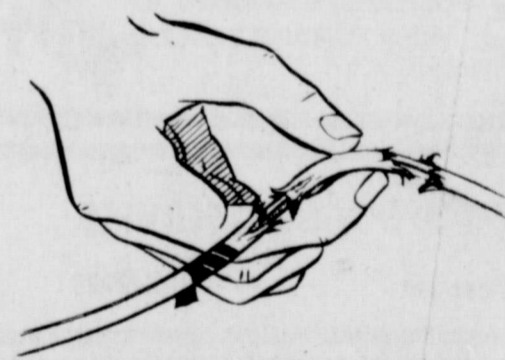

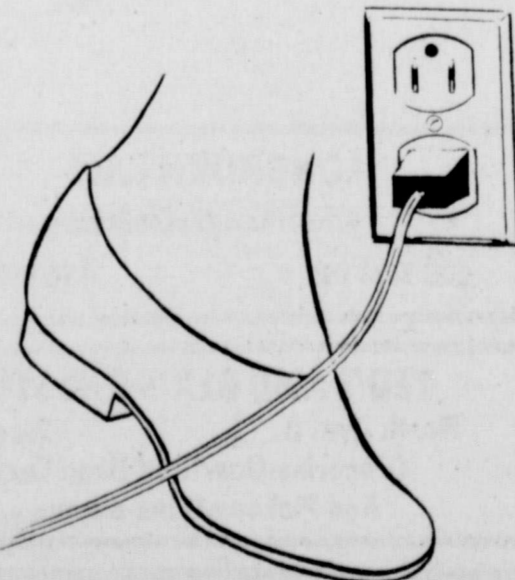

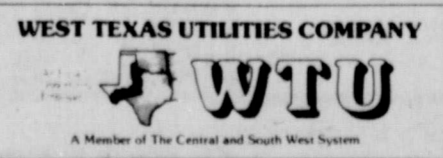
- ★ When disconnecting an appliance, don't pull cord; pull plug.
