Chiropractic College Is Reality For Cisco

Southwestern Chiropractic College became a reality for Cisco last Saturday as the initial convocation of school leaders and the Founder's Day dinner were held here. The convocation was held on the campus of Cisco Junior College, and the dinner was attended by some 80 people at the Laguna Hotel.

Both SCC President Richard L. Simpson and Board of Regents President J.C. Shipman heralded the founding of the new college as an important event for the chiropractic profession. Both addressed the \$100-per-plate dinner meeting.

Dr. J.C. Shipman, Abilene, said the new school would benefit many people — patients as well as those employed in the chiropractic field.

"Our school will be a citadel of chiropractic training," Dr. J.C. Shipman, said. "By the year 2000, SCC students will be among the leaders of their profession. We will attract fine students. We have an outstanding opportunity."

Dr. Richard L. Shipman, the college president who lives at Sweetwater, noted that the first classes would begin in 10 months in facilities that SCC will use under a lease agreement with Cisco Junior College. He said "we have developed a fine curriculum as our catalogue will show, and our faculty will be composed of outstanding men in the chiropractic

profession." The president formerly was a chiropractic school administrator and has practiced for some 30 years. He said that SCC has taken the initial steps for accreditation and acceptance as a non-voting member of the Council on Chiropractic Education. Full accreditation will be possible when the first class completes the course of study in 1984.

Dr. Frank Doyle, chairman of the college's development board, told the dinner meeting that "this school offers us an opportunity to put something back into our profession — something to make it flourish." He told the audience that a survey showed that "we are an endangered species," noting that the number of chiropractors has dropped from 1,518 in 1950 to 1,150 at this time.

"Now is the time to do something for our profession, and the new college is a fine answer," Dr. Doyle said. He urged members of the profession to support the new school.

The dinner began with the invocation by Dr. G.N. Weaver, Abilene, member of the board of regents. Dinner music was provided by Joseph Mangano, organist, Abilene.

Dr. H. Chief Brown, vice president of the board of regents and mayor of Cisco, extended a welcome to

visitors. Director Tim Jones presented a CJC ensemble for special music. Members of the group were Ray York, Cisco; Thomas Mims, Lubbock; T. Fleming, Brady; Mark O'Flaherty, Mineral Wells; Kenna Cotton, Goree and Danya Craft, Brady.

Dr. Ruby N. Perkins, secretary-treasurer of the board of regents, introduced guests, including Dr. Charles Downing, San Antonio, president of the Texas Chiropractic Association. She reported that more than \$64,000 has been pledged in Founder's Gifts. Many of the gifts of \$3,600 have come in to honor deceased members of the profession, she said.

CHS Assigned To New District

Cisco High School athletic teams will compete in District 10-AA during the 1980-81 school year, according to information received this week by Supt. James Couch.

Schools listed in the district under the new setup include Bangs, Early (Brownwood); Cisco, DeLeon, Dublin, Eastland, Ranger and San Saba. Other teams in the present 9-AA District, including Breckenridge, Coleman, Brady and Clyde, will compete in a Class AAA district.

Schools are assigned to districts on the basis of high school enrollment figures, Mr. Couch said.

Vernon Gibson, Dublin school superintendent, was

appointed chairman of District 10. He hosted a meeting of district schools there last Monday night, and Cisco was represented at the meeting by Mr. Couch, Coach Rick Calhoun and Principal Harry Lister.

Mr. Couch said the tentative schedule calls for the 1980 season to open September 4. Cisco will play Haskell, Baird and Goldthwaite in non-conference games and will meet each of the conference schools. The official 1980 schedule will be announced soon, Mr. Couch said.

Several Cisco business and civic leaders, including Manager Gene Abbott of the Chamber of Commerce, took part in the day's program.

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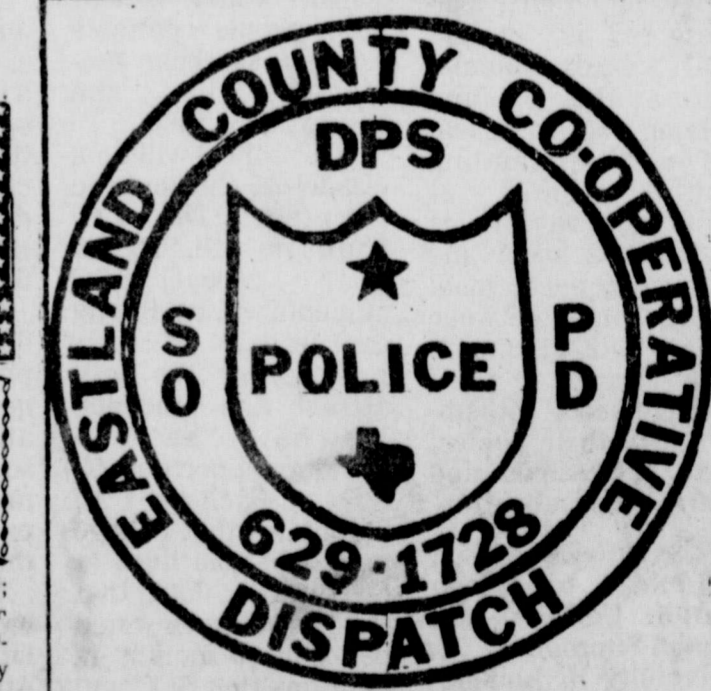

AUSTIN—The shutdowns of low-level nuclear waste dumps in other states may prompt Texas to create a dump of its own. Although Texas has several sites which generate nuclear waste, the state has no permanent site for disposal of such wastes and has been shipping them to dumps in South Carolina, Washington and Nevada. Only the South Carolina dump is still operating and officials there announced recently it would not take on the wastes refused by other states.

Texas now has to find a place to ship the radioactive wastes which are accumulating here. Health Department officials predict the wastes could pile up for six months to a year before the state faces a major problem. Last session the Texas Legislature rejected a bill to create a low-level nuclear waste dump somewhere in Texas because the penalty to other states for illegal dumping was \$200—the same fine for littering on the highways. The Nevada and Washington dumps shut down after illegal dumping was discovered at those sites. Gov. Bill Clements long ago expressed his willingness to create a dump site in Texas, and lawmakers are now mulling over the problem. Strong sentiment exists that if Texas does create a waste dump, then the facility should accept only Texas waste and none from any other states.

added, "if there were fat (too much tax money) there, I think we would cut it out." **Black-Hispanic Coalition?** Controversial Ruben Bonilla, national president of the League of Latin American Citizens and a Texan, flew to New York last week to meet with the director of the National Urban League. The subject: creation of a working coalition between blacks and Mexican-Americans. The Corpus Christi attorney said minorities are concerned they are losing ground in the area of civil rights.

Bonilla, who has been outspoken in the past months, also blasted U.S. District Judge Ross Sterling of Houston for sentencing three former Houston police officers to one year and one day in prison for violating the civil rights of Joe Campos Torres. Torres died in police custody after he was beaten and thrown into a bayou by the officers. Sterling's removal from the bench will be a priority Hispanic issue, Bonilla vowed.

Hill Seeks Refund Former Attorney General John Hill asked Dallas County to refund half of the money he paid for a recount of county votes last year in his race against Gov. Bill Clements. Hill said he was due the money not spent in the recount, about \$1,000 of the \$2,071 he paid.

Garwood Named Governor Clements has appointed Austin attorney Will Garwood as associate justice of the Texas Supreme Court. He replaces Sam D. Johnson, who is now judge of the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals. Garwood is expected to seek a full term as a Republican in the 1980 election.

Rep. Roberts to Retire U.S. Rep. Ray Roberts, D-McKinney, announced he will retire at the end of the 96th Congress. Roberts, 66, touched off a flurry of political activity in the 4th Congressional District. One observer predicted the district will be split by redistricting.

Football, '79 is a long-shot from being over but announcement this week by UIL officials of district-resuffling for next year has a lot of people excited, here and elsewhere.

In effect, the re-alignment is exactly what many have been hoping for: the qualifying numbers have been lowered, so schools with more similar enrollments, will be playing

The new cut-off figures for the 1980-81 and 1980-82 year are: A-134 and below; AA-264 to 135; AAA-614 to 265; AAAA-1309 to 615; and AAAAA-1210 and above. (If effect, the UIL added a new designation at the top. Down to specifics:

Region II, District 10-AA, basketball and football: Bangs, Early, Cisco, DeLeon, Dublin, Eastland, Ranger and San Saba. (Bugabo Breckenridge will move up to AAA and face Wylie Clyde, Colorado City and Stamford.) The switching, in effect,

moved Ranger up to AA. Gorman and Rising Star moved into a pack in District 7-A: with Blanket, Bronte, Cross Plains, Eden, Evant, Goldthwaite, Lometa, Irion Co. (Mertzon), Miles and Santa Anna. In the six-man conference, Carbon is in District Four with Lueder-Avoca, Bryson, Gordon, Moran, Strawn, Woodson.

Countians Vote For 2 Amendments

Eastland Countians (in light numbers) voted for notary public law changes and farm and ranch loans, but turned down legislative review of executive rulemaking in Tuesday's Constitutional Amendment election. Only 702 countians voted. Proposition one (notaries) passed here 384 to 307. (rulemaking) was defeated 451 to 230. And farm and ranch loans passed, 377 to 317. The County voting reflected the state exactly in that statewide voters nixed the legislative review and passed the other two. The notaries public change would permit statewide appointment instead of county-by-county.

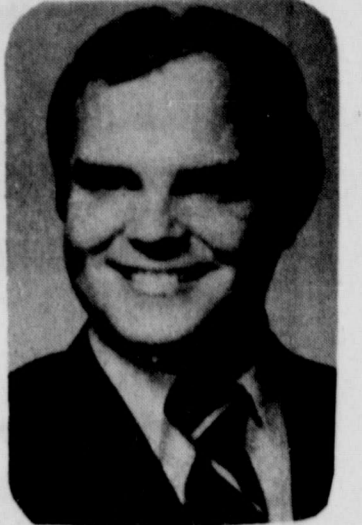

Homeowners May Be Eligible For Loan

An Eastland County homeowner whose house needs fixing up may be eligible for a loan and/or grant from Farmers Home Administration (FmHA). The Agency makes home improvement loans to families who may not need or cannot afford a new house, but need some work done on their present house to bring it up to minimum property standards. It also makes loans as well as grants to homeowners to remove health or safety hazards from their dwellings. Grants are made only to low-income elderly homeowners, 62 years or older.

A borrower's income is the key to the type of assistance for which he is eligible.

If income is so low as to permit only removal of health or safety hazards, a repair loan and/or grant may be available.

For families with somewhat higher income, a home improvement loan may be possible to bring the house up to FmHA minimum property standards.

He has published more than twenty articles, many poems and many short stories—one of which was selected by Martha Foley as a "Distinctive Short Story of 1976."

West Texas Utilities Co. Files For Rural Increases

West Texas Utilities Co. has filed for an increase in wholesale rates for electric energy it supplies to 14 rural electric cooperatives and one municipality.

The increase would average 10.6 per cent, and for most of the co-ops would be the first increase in base rates in 15 years. Most of them have been buying power from WTU under contract initiated in 1965.

WTU, in its filing with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission in Washington, estimated that the increase would amount to \$2,261,349 in additional revenue for the Company during the 1980 calendar year.

The increase would be effective January 1, 1980. All of the existing co-op contracts expire on December 31, 1979. The contract with Sonora, which is the municipality involved, expires December 31, 1983, but contains provisions for rate changes.

W.P. (Bill) Sayles, WTU's vice president for customer services, said rising costs of providing service made the increase necessary. "Fifteen years without an increase is a long time," he said, "especially in a period of inflation."

He said the proposed rate structure is designed not only to bring charges to wholesale customers more in line with WTU's increased cost of service, but to encourage the co-ops to level their loads.

This incentive is provided in a demand charge, based on a ratchet clause which allows WTU to bill these wholesalers for up to 80 percent of their peak demands over a 12-month period and helps level costs over the year. It also gives them the opportunity to actually decrease the unit cost of electric energy and minimize costs to their customers by shifting load to off-peak periods.

"We chose the demand charge because we feel it will be beneficial to the co-ops and their customers, and to the overall efforts to conserve energy," Sayles said.

"Without such a provision there is no incentive or benefit for the wholesale customers to implement load management programs," Sayles said the proposed new contract had been discussed with all of the co-

op managers and their engineering consultants before the filing was made with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission.

Buttermilk Biscuits

Once you acquire the knack, biscuits are the easiest of all hot breads to make. That is, once you acquire the knack. To acquire the knack you must make them until you learn the "feel" of the dough — then make them often to "keep your hand" in.

This recipe is a Southern favorite, crisp Buttermilk Biscuits.

- 2 cups flour, sifted
- 1/4 teaspoon soda
- 2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 5 tablespoons lard or vegetable shortening
- 3/4 cup (approximately) buttermilk

Sift dry ingredients in a roomy bowl. Cut in the fat with a pastry blender until it is fine like meal. Add buttermilk and mix with your hand, lightly but well. Mix until the dough is not sticky. Wrap in wax paper or foil and refrigerate until cool or ready to roll out.

Roll on flour, having dough about 1/2 inch thick, always from the center out for crisp biscuits.

Cut and place on cookie sheet. Bake in preheated oven at 425 degrees for approximately 10 minutes. Makes about 25 biscuits.

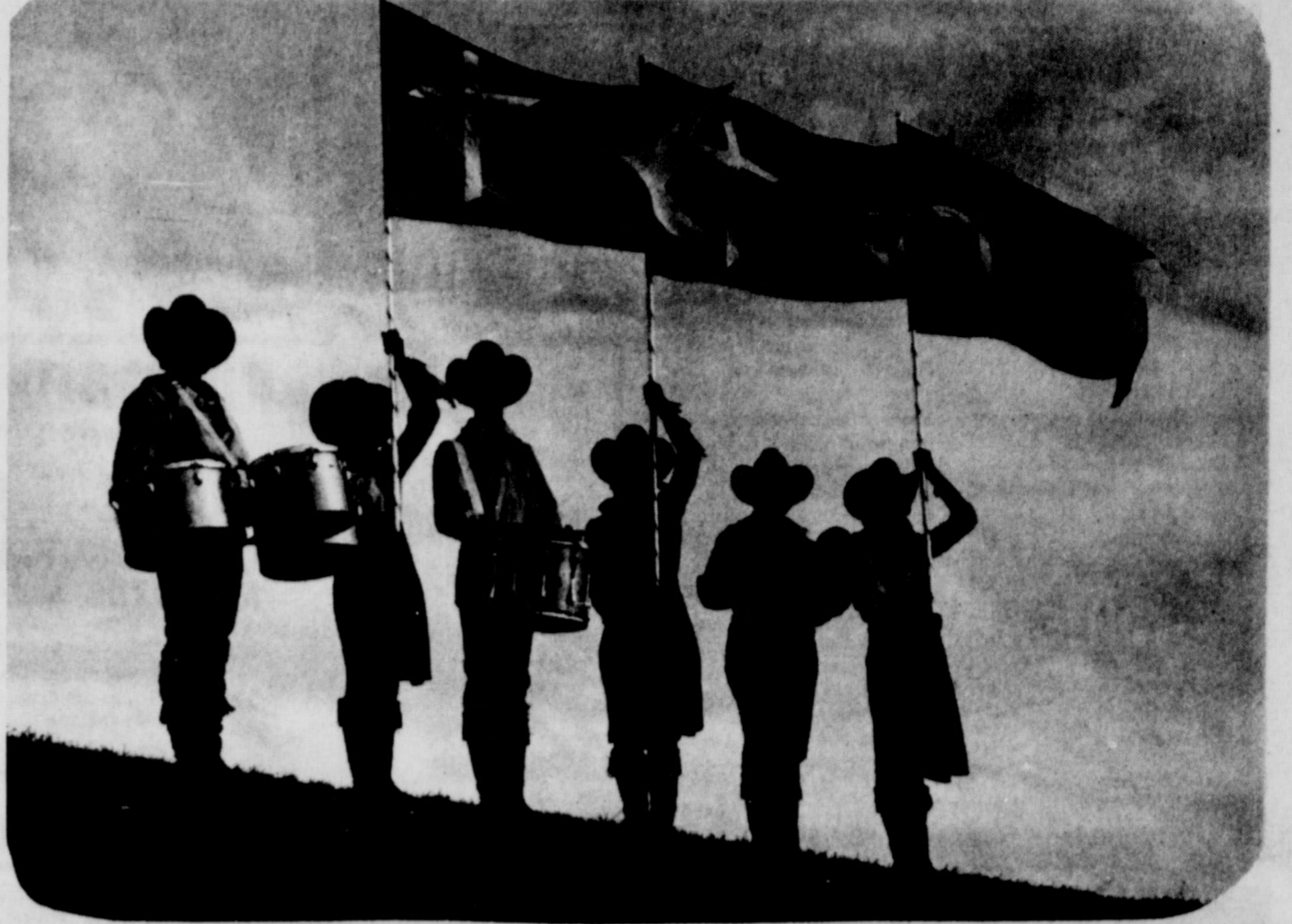
A pastry cloth helps prevent too much flour going into the biscuits, which toughens them.

Mayor H.C. Brown Is Honored With Knighthood By Vicar Grand Master

It was announced from the Grand Magistracy of the Sovereign Military and Hospitaller Order of Saint George in Carinthia that the following Texans have been honored with a Knighthood by the Vicar Grand Master in Rome:

Knight Commander of Justice: (Reserved to members of the Aristocracy with at least a 200 years lineage) Dr. Nobleman Manuel Rigo De' Righi, senior vice president of Shell Oil, "For Services to His Profession."

Knight Commander of Magistral Grace: Hon. Achille Arcidiacono, consul for the republic of Italy in Houston, "For services to the community"; Dr. H. Chief Brown, mayor of Cisco, Texas, "For Dedicated Services to Man"; Mr. Eric Hilton, hotel executive, "For Services to Education and the Profession"; Dr. George Magner, provost of the University of Houston, "For Services to Education."

Knight: Prof. K. Seeger Carbajal, educator and architect, "For unselfish dedication to Education"; Dr. Louis A. Pontello Jr., attorney, "For Services to the Community."

The Sovereign Military and Hospitaller Order of Saint George was founded 705 years ago in 1274 by Rudolph 1st of the House of Hapsburg, King of the Romans, by Command of the Holy Father Pope Alexander to take charge of the Forth Crusade.

The first Knights were selected amongst the Knights of the Teutonic Order, the oldest Knighthood Order in the Christian World born for the first crusade, and these gentlemen were all members of the most aristocratic families in Europe.

In 1488 the Order of Saint George was granted by Frederick 3rd, the Duke of Carinthia in South Eastern Austria, where the Knights took possession of their

feudal fortified castle and cathedral in Millstatt, and only in 1940, during the Nazi occupation of Austria, did the order move its headquarters to Rome.

The Order of Saint George has an illustrious history of ancient and also contemporary martyrdom. Because of its Christian militancy, members suffered persecution and death under Napoleon, under Nazi Germany and now under the Communists in Hungary, Czechoslovakia and Rumania.

The Order of Saint George, one of the wealthiest orders in the world, owns palaces, castles, churches, real estate and museums throughout Europe.

The most famous of its castles, the Castle of Hochosterwitz, inspired Walter Disney for the prince's castle in his film Snow White.

Today the 24,000 Knights of the Sovereign Military and Hospitaller Order of Saint George in Carinthia dedicate their efforts to charitable work in society, such as giving patronage to hospitals, orphanages, research institutions and so on.

In the United States there are 500 members of the Order and their purpose is charity within the community as directed by the Diocese.

The present Grand Master of the Order of Saint George is His Imperial Highness and Royal Archduke Francis Joseph Von Hapsburg-Borbon-Lorene, Duke of Madrid etc. etc. of the Imperial House of Austria and direct descendant of Rudolph 1st.

The lieutenant for Texas and the South-Western United States is Sir Cmdr. Cpt. Edmund Furley of Houston.

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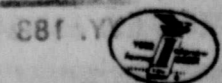

Getting To Know Your County Government

 Since Eastland County Government was established in 1873, it has served a variety of needs. There are now 18 offices housed in the courthouse.
 The county auditor has the general oversight of all books and records of all officers of the county who may be authorized or required by law to receive or collect any money, funds, fees or other property for the use of, or belonging to, the county.
 Not only is the Auditor required to handle the accounting requirements for

all of the various functions of county government, the office must handle the accounting requirements for the overall county operation. Those working in the Eastland County office are: County Auditor-Emma Morris, and office assistants- Mrs. Agnes Johnson, and Mrs. Marcielle Justice.
 The County Extension Service provides educational programs in the areas of agriculture, home and family living, 4-H programs and youth, also community development programs. They conduct informal education programs such as

short courses, field days, stock shows, fairs, and individual counseling. There is a wealth of information available free to the public kept in the office. The County Extension Agents are DeMarquis Gordon, and Janet Thomas. The two assistant agents are Donna White and Danny Lambreth. Committees are made up of representatives from throughout the county to determine new programs. They meet various times throughout the year.
 The County Clerk's office is responsible for recording the transfer of land titles, anything having to do with oil and gas leases, registering brands, probating (wills), record births and deaths, handle marriage licenses, and misdemeanor offences. School and Family Census records, notaries for Eastland County, as well as nurses registration certificates are also kept in the office. The County Clerk is Joanne Johnson, Chief Deputy is Rita Ried, Deputies are Martha Millican, Jeanne Thorne, and Jane O'Pry. The CETA worker is Norma Rodriguez.
 It is the duty of the office of the District Clerk to keep records of the 91st District Court, to keep records of all civil cases, keep criminal records of felony and misdemeanor cases, also records of juvenile cases.
 Other duties of the office are to file tax suits, handle trust fund moneys placed in registry of court for minors and or unknown heirs.
 The District Clerk is Roy Lane. Mr. Lane served from 1945 to 1970 and then resigned to be the Jones County Tax Collector. He returned to Eastland County after two terms and was reelected last year. The Chief Deputy is Mrs. Mary Jane Rowch, and the Deputy is Mrs. Eloise Zuspahn.
 The office of the Tax Collectors duties are to register car titles and licenses in the auto department. The Tax Assessor/Collector for Eastland County is Nancy Trout. Those working in the Ad Velorem department are Sandra Haines, Cindy Carlton, Angie Clower, and Danelda Gevarra is the bookkeeper. Jan Rogers, Leann Wilson, and Betty Elizalda.
 The 11th Court of Civil Appeals, state court, hears appeals from the 23 counties of this district. These cases are civil matters in which the judgement exceeds \$100.00. If a defendant should want to further appeal his case the case would be tried in the Supreme Court at Austin.
 Employees of the 11th Court of Civil Appeals are: Chief Justice-Austin McCloud, Justices-Raligh Brown and Bob Dickinson, Clerk-Oleta Mosley, Deputy Clerk-Mrs. Sherry Williamson. Stenographer-Miss Melissa Tankersley.
 Other employees are: briefing attorneys-Lee Haney, Jim Moore, and Danny Ortiz. The custodian is Johnny McCoy.
 Employees of the 91st District Court are Judge Earl

Conner, and court reporter Laverne Key.
 Those working in the County Court are Judge Scott Bailey and Secretary Jean White.
 The County Commissioners Court involves C.B. Dill of Cisco, Danny Williams of Eastland, Mr. L.T. Owen of Ranger, and Mr. O.E. (Jack) Blackwell.
 The job of the Sherrifs office is to enforce the law, and operate the county jail. From this office warrants and civil papers are served. The Sheriff and his deputies also assist other law enforcement agencies when requested to do so. Eastland County Sherrif is Johnnie Morren, Secretary and Deputy Sherrif is Risa Livingston. Field Deputy is Ben Sancillo, Head Jailor is Terry Petree, and Truett Grice is the guard.
 Also working out of the Sherrif's office are the game Warden-Kenneth Payne, and L.D. Adams-Texas Alcoholic Beverages Commissioner.
 The Justice of the Peace, Buddy Rowch, hears in Court all class C misdemeanors, holds Small Claims Court (limited to \$150.00), and Justice Court (limited to \$200.00).
 The Justice of the Peace is a Magistrate performing duties such as setting bonds, giving rights warnings, and performing wedding ceremonies. He also holds inquest when there is a violent death, and serves as a notary public.
 R.L. Rowch is the Eastland County Justice of the Peace. His secretaries are Mildred Manke, and Ann Cartwright. The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee (ASCC) is in charge of the county peanut production adjustment and

marketing quota. The ASCC also helps farmers through conservation programs. It is a division of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. David Martin is the County Executive Director. Barbara J. Anderson is the Chief Assistant. Sharon Davis and Gay Bagwell are also assistants. The Field Assistant is Jeffrey White-side.
 Other offices in the Courthouse who we were not able to contact at this time are: Criminal District Attorney Emory Walton, a nd County Surveyor George Brenne-man, son of Chester Brenne-man, who is semi-retired, also Texas Ranger George Frazier.

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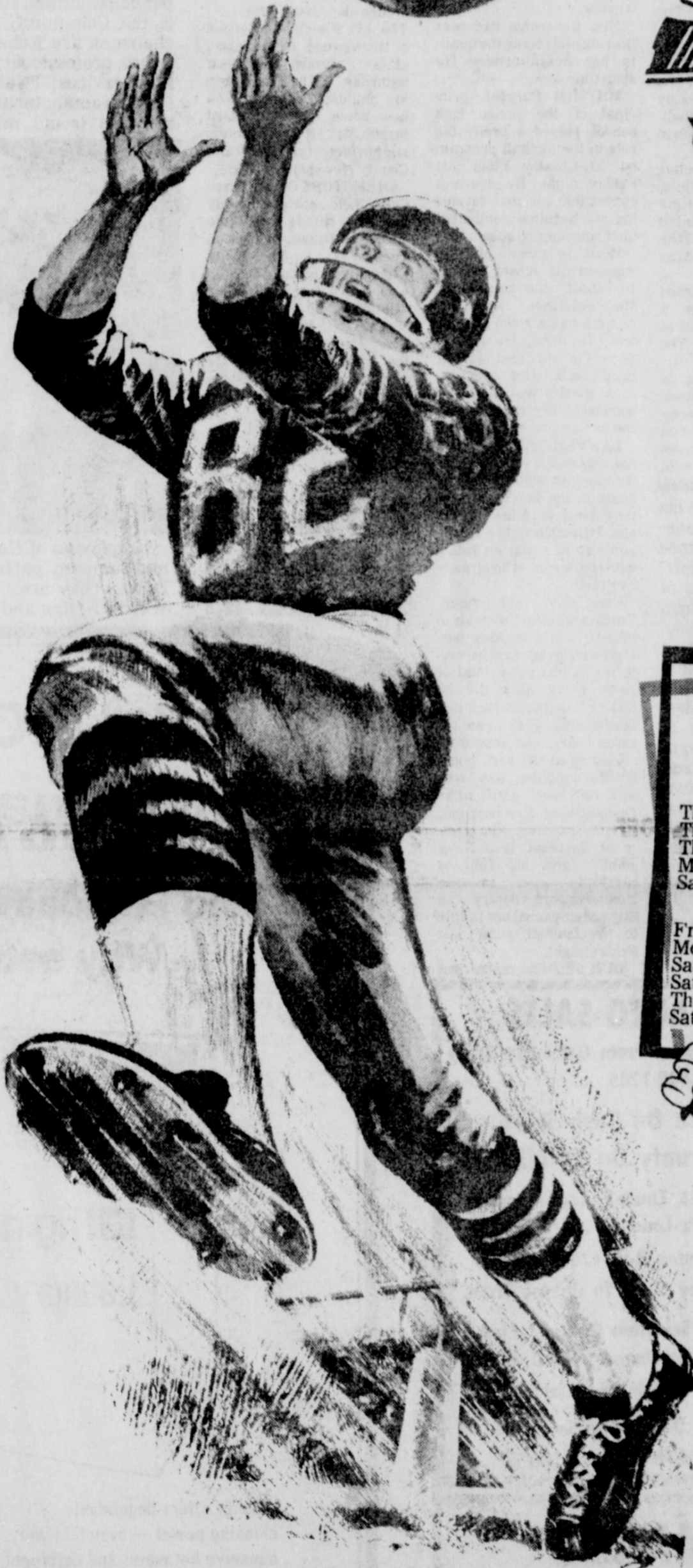

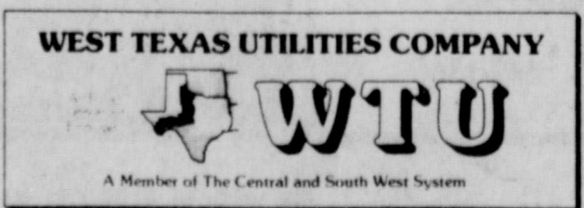
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
