

Following the discussion of a request by the Cisco Ministerial Alliance for an ordinance which would govern where alcoholic beverages could be sold should Cisco ever go "wet," Morgan Fleming made a motion for City Attorney Billy Wright and City Manager John Boland to work up an orregular meeting. Whitley seconded the motion which passed unanimously. Part of resolution the presented by the Ministerial Alliance suggested such establishments be allowed no closer than 700 feet to a church, school, private residence or recreation area.

Allison made a motion the council deny a request of the Westbound Water District for the time being. Following a second to the motion by Eudy, all members voted in its favor. The request made by the Water District concerned allowing it to service the residents on the North and South shores of Lake Cisco and also the Enserch plant northwest of town. During the discussion of monthly bills Collier made a motion for the city to buy an appropriate number of uniforms for each city employee. Eudy seconded the motion and all voted in its favor. The motion was the result of a discussion about the cost to the city by West Texas Linen for the supply and cleaning of uniforms.

Council member Allison then made a motion that no flower or gifts be purchased with public funds. (She stated such items should be taken care of through a collection among the employees.) Collier seconded the motion and all voted in its favor.

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



HOW TO SURVIVE A HEART ATTACK This self-help plan could save your life. Clip and keep.

KNOW THE SYMPTOMS

very year in this country, over one million men and women suffer a heart attack. But in the last 10 years the death rate has dropped 20%, according to the American Heart Association. This is probably partly due to better preventive measures and better emergency care. Getting help quickly can be the most important factor in surviving a heart attack. Says Dr. James R. Bell, cardiologist and assistant professor of Clinical

Medicine, Dartmouth Medical School, Hanover, N.H.: "Most heart attack deaths occur outside the hospital. Once you get there, your chances of survival increase tremendously, but if you don't know you're having one, you'll be in trouble." The first step is to recognize the symptoms.

If you are unconscious, you will have to depend on others for help. At least 3,500 lives a year could be saved. according to Dr. Julius E. Stolfi, professor of medicine, Downstate Medical College, Brooklyn, N.Y., if anyone present at a heart attack knew CPR. The technique takes 60 minutes to learn, and with it, damaged hearts have been kept beating for an hour

A feeling of fear or "impending that may radiate down the left of right arm or over the back, with short

NOTE: The feeling may not be this spe cific. Pain can occur anywhere between the ears and diaphragm, often coming from just under the breastbone, but sometimes only in the jaw, or, rarely, only in the back, and then usually between the

oulder blades. Perspiration may break out.
Dizziness or a giddy feeling sometimes occurs—but not in all cases.

♥ One thing does not happen: You do not feel your heart racing or pounding. You usually don't feel your heart at all. NOTE: The heart pain called "angina". usually brought on by strong emotion or xertion-is not an actual heart attack, but can sometimes quickly lead to a heart atrack. Angina usually subsides in two ninutes with rest. If the pain lasts longer than two minutes, it is probably not angina. See a physician as soon as possible.

GET HELP QUICKLY

♥ Don't panic. Try to remain calm and get help quickly. Fear itself can trigger heart damage. But don't deny what may be hap-pening. "Don't sit down and hope it will go away," warns Dr. Joseph C. Greenfield, cardiologist of Duke University Medical School "Because it won't." Don't try to "walk off" a heart attack. Don't smoke a cigarette, warns De Bell.

♥ Call for help. Waiting can be fatal. Call your rescue squad or anyone else who can get you to a hospital immediately. When you phone for help, supply the following information: Phone mber from which you are calling. • Address and special directions for teaching you. . Nature of the emergency (heart arrack). · Your name. Don't hang up. Give emergency personnel a chance

to ask questions and give special instructions ♥ Stay calm. This is of utmost importance. Once you have made that call and know help is on the way, sit or lie down and relax-till help arrives. Take the position that is most comfortable for your breathing, says Dr. Kevin McIntyre, Chief, Emergency Cardiac Care, Harvard University Medical School. But do lie of it so if you lose consciousness, you don't fall and get hurt.

♥ If you cannot reach help, you probably will have to save yourself. Stay calm and walk don't run-to some form of trans portation that will get you to a doctor quickly. If you feel you are going to faint, sit down till that sensation passes and then get one to take you to a hospital

DON'T PANIC

▼ Memorize your emergency number. Find out and memorize-but also keep handy-the emergency number that will respond to help fastest. Have a backup number to call if the first

mber doesn't respond. Write down emergency numbers and other information ou have to give so you'll know what to say.

♥ Have help available. Be sure that you, you other family members are trained in CPR (Cardiac Pulmonary Resuscitation) and take a refresher course once a year.

Know the cardiac emergency procedure in the place where you work and be sure your immediate co-workers kn

♥ If you have a known heart problem, carry a Heart Card or a Medic-Alert card or other signal for rescue personnel.

* Know your risk factors. Most at risk for heart attack are men over 35 (especially over 45) • Women over 55 (especially over 65). Those with high blood pressure or known heart dis case. • Those who have had a previous heart attack. • Those

under stress. . The intense striving type-A personality (the work abolic). • Smokers. • Heavy drinkers. • The sedentary. • Those who cat a high-fat diet. • Those with heart disease in the family . Diabetics. . The obese. Any of these risk factors except diabe tes, previous heart disease and the genetic factor-may be changed and your risks lowered. See your physician to learn your risk factors and how to lower them.

"But," Simpson said, "after some explanations and answers to questions farmers usually change their minds.'

Simpson is a plant geneticist and peanut breeder who collected hundreds of peanut plants in the wilds of South America to establish probably the most, and certainly the most unsual and hopefully valuable assortment to improve the peanut industry.

"We collected everything we saw, and alot of them didn't seem close to resembling peanuts as we know them in the U.S.," Simpson explained. "You never know, however, what genetic material a plant might contain which could become of value to our domestic

drops.' Simpson's array of more than 400 plant selections is at the Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center at Stephenville. He was a member of team making the collection under auspices of the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) of the United Nations. Although improvements made at Stephenville will be shared with other peanut sceintists, and with farmers and processors, Simpson's efforts are direted primarly to benefit Texas farmers who harvest some 300,000 acres per year, qualifying peanuts as a crop of significant economic importance in this

Peanuts are processed into a variety of products, primarily peanut butter and oil in the U.S., but Simpson said the big utilization in

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South America, where peanuts originated, is for home consumption--an excellent source of energy-providing protein. Only about 5 per cent of the U.S. peanut crop is used by the entertainment

Livestock and wild game munch tops of peanuts right down to the ground, making identification difficult for the research team.

"The natives came to our aid," Simpson said. "Some of the peanuts have been maintained within tribes, families or colonies for generations. Some were cultivated. Some were not. Argentina, Bolivia and Brazil are the center of South America's peanut production.'

He described soil in those countries as similar to the deep sandy soil where peanuts are produced in Texas, primarily in the West Cross Timbers and in an area southwest of San Antonio.

"Our major concern is to locate characteristics which are resistant to diseases, a costly item to peanut farmers." Simpson explained, "particularly leaf spot, a fungus which kills leaves, cutting off plant food intake and ultimately reducing yields of peanuts. Leaf spot is the Number 1 disease problem in all geographical areas of peanut production.'

Much research has been directed toward development of peanuts which would make higher yields, which currently averages some 1,500 pounds per acre-double the average 25 years

Some "better farmers" dig up to and in excess of 4,000 pounds per acre when produced under irrigation.

Texas produces Spanish type (small) peanuts with a bunch type plant with upright branches, thereby leading to one of Texas' peanut growing problems, compared with the newer Florunner developed in Florida.

Florunner has branches, but they lie prostrate, putting out runners which spread the fruit load," Simpson explained. "This requires a longer growing season for maturity of Florunner, resulting in larger peanuts produced over a larger solid area. Florunner yields are 15 to 20 per cent higher than Spanish type peanuts."

He said that with exception of a longer growing season Florunner and Spansih type peanuts produce under simi-

"To improve our Texas yields the runner germ plasma has been incorporated into our breeding pro-Simpson said. gram," 'Some of the promising lines are being tested, but we also realize it will be difficult for peanut breeders to improve on the current yielding

ability of Florunner. Simpson assured that plant breeders "cannot take all the credit" for existing increases in yields, but he said that Spantex and Starr varieties developed by B.C. Langley at the Stephenville facility and released by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station to farmers did trigger 20 per cent more peanuts per acre.

Simpson and Dr. Olin D. Smith of Texas A&M's Soils and Crops Sciences Department developed Tamnut and Toalson, with a spinoff of another five to eight per cent in yields. increase

Toalson's biggest impact on the industry was described as "a foot in the door" although modest, toward overcoming a soil-borne organism which causes pod rot of peanuts.

In addition to selection of new plants in hopes of disease and insect resistance, Simpson said scientists also collected the Rhizobia-the nitrogen-fixing bacteria within a plant.

"High cost of nitrogen fertilizer mandated research to increase the amount of nitrogen-fixing capabilities in all legumes, not just Simpson peanuts,"

explained. Simpson said that one of the biggest challenges of the plants introduced from South America is keeping them alive. And handle them with care and detail, Simpson

"One bunch won't pollinate within a greenhouse, and another bunch of the plants has to be manipulated by hand to pollinate." he said. "Cross pollination must be done during morning hours and emasculation by artificial light at night.'

Mrs. Dorothy Whitt is labled "The Bee Lady" because she "trips" the flowers, similar to the action of a bee gathering pollen for making honey. This is done outside of a greenhouse. Other plants self trip inside a greenhouse.

'A peanut flower has four petals--standard 'wings" and a keel," she explained. "Hold the standards with one hand, and with the other hand pull the wing petals back," she demonstrated. "This forces pollen out of the keel and increases chance of pollina-

Simpson also is excited about possibilities of hybrid peanuts--the vigor of wild varities combined with the improved domestic varieties. Simpson noted also that peanut oil will fuel diesel engines, with minor mechanical modification.

"When we get yields high enough to make energy output higher than energy input (in production of peanuts), then the peanut industry can be in the energy production business," the scientist explained.

He added that when diesel fuel was 20 cents per gallon the equivalent in peanuts

would have been yields equi valent of five tons per acre. "However, diesel fuel is nearing \$1 per gallon," Simpson added. "So the target production of peanuts is a whole lot lower, and I figure we aren't in the far too distant future from five tons

of peanuts per acre.' He said that a West Texas farmer produced 7,000 pounds of peanuts per acre with an existing variety--Tamnut 74.

"Peanut breeders have a long way to go, genetically, and we are at the level of progress likened unto the wheat breeders in the early 1900's," he concluded.

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
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Wichita Falls Hospital Taking Contributions For Christmas

Texas farmers might be able to save some money as well as get a jump on the 1980 crop by fertilizing cropland early.

'The possibility of shorter fertilizer supplies and much higher costs next spring should provide some incentive for farmers to put out fertilizer early for next spring's crops," believes Dr. Charles Welch, soil chemist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas

A&M University. Increased crop acreages, export demands and reduced fertilizer production have caused a decline in fertilizer inventories, points out Welch. This, coupled with an increasing transportation problem, makes it uncertain and difficult for many local



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

Dan Childress of Cottonwood was the big winner at the 27th annual Eastland County Pecan Show in Eastland Friday and Saturday. Champion pecans were selected from 136 entries representing over 40 different varieties.

Childress' Mohawk entry was named Champion In-Shell pecan while his Barton entry was named Reserve Champion In-Shell. The winning Mohawk pecans were also the largest pecans in the show, only 33 pecans per pound and shelled out 60.5% kernels.

An entry of Sioux pecans owned by Childress was named Shelling Champion. The Sioux pecans shelled out 61.3% kernels and contained 55.7 nuts per pound.

The Reserved Champion Shelling pecans were another entry of Siouxs shown by Southern Star Pecan Orchard of Rising

James Alexander of Rising Star had the Champion and Reserve Champion Native pecans. The Champion Natives shelled out 61.5% kernels and contained 64.6 nut per pound.

Judges for the show were Sammy Helmers, Area Extension Horticulturist and Dr. Thomas Lee, Area Extension Plant Pathologist. The Show was sponsored by the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association and the Eastland Chamber of Commerce. Members of both organizations and other volunteers assisted in the precessing of pecan entries.

County Extension Agent, DeMarquis Gordon Said the show was small this year because of the shortage of good quality pecans. Pecan trees set large crops, but due to the summer and fall drought the did not mature well and many pecans did not hull from the shucks pro-



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Know How Shade Works

Know how your window shades work -- for operating success and for repair jobs, a housing and home furnishings specialist

Window-shade operation may seem complicated, but

it's really easy. Here's how the window

shade roller works. One end of the roller has a flat metal pin that is attached to a spring on the inside of the roller.

This pin fits into a vertical slot on one of the window shade brackets -- so the pin cannot turn as the shade is unrolled.

As the shade is pulled down (unrolled), the spring winds

A small pawl and ratchet mechanism (see illustration A) on the outside of the roller "catches" -- and that holds the roller in place so the shade won't fly back up when you let go (see illustration B). give it a slight downward pull first to release the pawl from its locked position (see illustration C).






