The third bi-monthly Cisco Blood Drive has been set for January 30, at E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital. A trained team of laboratory technicians from Mary Meek Blood Bank of Abilene will again be present from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

The January 30 Blood Drive will be the first one of 1980, and even greater participation is anticipated. It cannot be emphasized enough, that in order to maintain Cisco's adequate blood supply and repay our long-time debt, that each Cisco citizen's every effort is mandatory -- either by their participation or help in "soliciting" eligible blood donors.

The menus released by Ruth Cartee, director, are:

Monday--baked ham, candid yams, English peas, fruit salad, bread, butter and drink.

Wednesday--braised beef, potatoes au gratin, green beans, sliced peaches, bread, butter and drink.

Friday--chicken enchilada with cheese sauce, macaroni and tomatoes, carrots with orange sauce, congealed pudding, bread, butter and drink.

Up until the past two Blood Drives, Cisco has been in debt to Mary Meek Blood Bank, 900 units of blood. And though 114 units have been generously offered in only two drives, everyone must realize that a great part of that blood is used to maintain Cisco's average need of 40 pints every two months. To maintain this blood supply and repay its present debt, the Blood Drive Committee has set its goal to collect 60 pints of blood every two months.

Striving to find the most effective means of conducting a successful Blood Drive, the Blood Drive Committee will be trying several approaches in the drives. Due to some impossibilities of time scheduling every willing donor, appointment times will not be made for the January 30 Blood Drive.

A blood insurance policy is available for those interested donors, whereby for a pint of blood given, that donor's immediate family will be insured for having blood available to them for one full year. That donated pint of blood, however, will not count toward credit for Cisco, but for those persons interested in the insurance policy, perhaps at a later date, the donor can donate another pint of blood for credit for Cisco.

All types of blood are needed. There are no longer paid donors, due to FDA regulations, except in the cases of institutions, using only the plasma from a pint of blood, so it therefore depends on voluntary blood donations. Blood donors should be aware of the following when preparing to give blood:

A. All donors must be age 18 or older; there is no age limit, only that each donor is healthfully able to give blood.

B. Blood donors should eat normally, and are encouraged to do so before giving blood.

C. No medication should be taken 18 hours prior to donating blood.

D. No medication, however, should be deleted without checking with the perspective donor's own doctor.

E. Any person who has been sick or has had a cold within the last seven days prior to donating blood, should not donate blood.

F. Any person who has had their ear pierced within the last six months at any place other than a doctor's office, should not donate blood.

G. Any person who has been in Southeast Asia in the last three years should not donate blood, due to malaria possibilities.

H. Any woman who has menstruated in the last three to four days prior to donating blood, should not donate.

I. No woman who is pregnant, or suspects she is so, should give blood, and should not do so until six weeks after pregnancy.

J. Persons can donate blood every two to three months, with no foreseen problems, although, it is hopeful to not have to call on the same donors nearly this often.

DEAR PAT--We are in need of information on where and what kind of lift to purchase for our 30-year old son. He was injured several years ago in a swimming accident but he still loves the water. It is almost impossible to get him in and out of the pool and we would like to have some type of "lift" to help or perhaps someone

could design one for us. We will be so grateful for your help.--Mrs. T.H., Fla.

DEAR PAT--I have had my driver's licenses for over a year now but I am very much inconvenienced by the fact that I MUST have help in transferring from my wheelchair to car and vice-versa. A "sliding-board" will not help me (who would load the chair even if I could get in the car?)

I am seriously considering buying a van. I have a good set of hand controls that I can transfer from my car. What I need now is the correct type of wheelchair elevator lift to get me into the van. I can then drive while sitting in my own chair.--G.J., Minn.

DEAR PAT--I would like to sound off a bit and let handicapped persons know that it is up to them to be aware of what's going on and request that amends be made whenever necessary. They should not expect nor should they take for granted that provisions will be made for them when designers are designing and builders are building or even when planner's are planning. They should not expect it because everyone in these trades cannot know of every disability and know of every detail in correcting the architectural barrier that limits their access or mobility in their place of business or entertainment. They should not take it for granted that "someone" else will see to it that it is accessible, or they will find several months later that they have been left out in the cold (literally). Some-

Regulations add to health care costs

It has been estimated that 25 percent of all hospital costs are now due to government regulations, with the annual cost of this red tape totaling more than one billion dollars.

Computed on a per-patient basis, red tape accounts for almost \$40 of cost, per patient, per day.

This has led the president's Council on Wage and Price Stability to comment: "It is all too apparent that with current reimbursement programs and the ubiquitous and often conflicting morass of regulations, the federal government instead of being part of the solution, is part of rising health care costs."

Often cited are spiraling new drug development costs, boosted by a dramatic increase in Food and Drug Administration regulations. New drugs developed in the late 60s frequently bore ready-to-market prices of about \$1.5 million. Today to reach federal clearance, a new drug or compound often costs \$10 to \$15 million.

The Hospital Association of New York estimates that the cost of compliance with 164 regulatory agencies in that system exceeds \$1 billion per year. Again, the New York study confirms that at least 25 cents out of each patient dollar-cost can be traced to regulatory compliance.

Increased health care costs coincide with sharp increases in government health care involvement. In 1966, the government's share of the nation's health bill was 25 percent. Beginning in 1967 with the advent of Medicare and Medicaid, the federal portion of the health care bill began a steady rise to its present 42 percent.

In observing this trend, former Secretary of the Treasury, William Simon, wrote: "Partial federal intervention is already driving prices skyward. Total federal intervention would accelerate the process...."

Wildflower Calendars Increasing In Popularity

A wildflower poster calendar which lives long after the year is exhausted is now in its seventh division and is growing in popularity each season.

The calendar's increasing

popularity is a good thing for the originator--Carroll Abbott of Kerrville, the state's only fulltime wildflower seed and plant collector.

Sales of the calendars help fund Abbott's crusade to save the native plants of Texas by getting folks to grow wildflowers in their homescapes, in city and state parks and on school grounds.

The big calendar measures nearly two by three feet in full color and is bordered with 22 individual portraits of the most popular Texas wildflowers. A tranquil landscape with windmill and country

cabins decorates the center.

The "Beautiful, Beautiful Texas" calendar never dies, Abbott says, because the individual portraits are useful later for framing and decoupage work. And the centerpiece often is laminated between plastic sheets for a place mat.

The calendar also serves as an educational tool. An accurate description is given for each plant, along with its botanical name. Many teachers use it as a classroom aid.

The calendar is available by mail for \$3.90 each, which includes sales tax and postage, from Green Horizons, 500 Thompson, Kerrville, TX 78028.

GORDON SPOT

The rains in December seemed to please farmers and ranchers throughout Eastland County. Soil moisture was badly needed since the last half of the year was very dry. The official rainfall in Eastland, in December was 1.99 inches. This brought the total rainfall for 1979 to 21.77 inches, about 6 inches below normal.

Oscar Schaefer, Chairman of the Eastland County Screwworm Eradication Committee, reminds us that livestock men would like a report on the program's success in 1979.

Program officials report the 1979 year appears to be the best year in the history of the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program. Very few cases of screwworms were found in Texas, and those were in South Texas.

Emphasis on sterile fly drops are being shifted from the United States to the Mexican side of the Rio Grande. In fact, by as early as next March, Mission

Lab's sterile fly production may no longer be showering down anywhere over the United States on a routine daily basis. Since the flies over winter in Mexico, the emphasis will be on eradicating this insect before it crosses the border.

Of course, any cases turning up anywhere in this country will be treated until officials are satisfied the infestation has been wiped out. For this reason, it will be even more important that every case of suspected worms be reported. We continue to have a supply of mailing cartons in our office.

It's Income Tax reporting time again. As a service to farm families, we will conduct a farmer's Income Tax Clinic, at the Texas Electric Reddy Room in Eastland on January 18. The clinic will begin at 9:30 a.m. and will last until 2:30 or 3:00 p.m.

The new Farmer's Tax Guide for use in preparing the 1979 tax returns are now

available in the County Extension Office. You may come by the Extension office, in the Courthouse and get a free copy of this publication.

The Farmer's Tax Guide is designed to explain how the tax laws apply to farming situations. It gives examples and illustrations showing how different items should be reported on your Federal Income Tax Return. There are also samples of records and tax forms illustrating how good records help you to prepare an accurate tax return and to pay only the correct amount of tax.

New developments in the tax laws are summarized under items of interest. A number of changes have been made that will affect the amount of tax you pay.

We sometimes forget to properly store spray equipment during the winter and as a result the equipment is not ready to use in the spring.

First, wash the sprayer thoroughly. Then apply a light-weight oil, such as a summer oil, used in spraying ornamentals. The oil film will prevent rust and corrosion that might otherwise occur.

With hose-on sprayers, thoroughly wash all parts, including any screens or strainers.

THERE WILL BE A CHANGE IN THE WEATHER

(ED. NOTE: This is especially appropriate because reports are that we'll be Havin' a Blue Norther come Sunday night.)

All Eastland Countians know all about Northers. We know all about the Big One called the BLUE NORTHER. If you haven't lived in Texas all your life, sooner or later you will experience OLD BLUE. No one will have to describe him you will just know.

A physician from Mississippi, by the name of Gideon Lincecu, traveled across Texas in 1835. He quickly became aware of Northers. On Feb. 26, he wrote in his diary:

Lay by today on account of the severity of the cold. Snowing and sleeting greater part of the day, wind from the North, very cold indeed. The weather in this country is the most variable that I have ever experienced in any country. Some days it is so warm that you cannot keep your coat on, a perhaps a change will take place in three hours that will render you uncomfortable under all the clothes you can pack on.

The moods of Texans are frequently affected by the severity of the winds. In 1841 on a Christmas day a resident of the Columbus apologized for writing a dull uninteresting letter, his boring style was attributed to the Norther raging out side. Texans not only become dull but often cross, some are unwilling to work during Northers. Carl, Prince of Solms-Braunfels, a German visitor to Texas in 1844 observed.

When a Norther is blowing, the Texan cannot be moved. Since such winds continue at least two days, this time can be counted lost. If two such Northers follow successively, then six or seven days are generally lost.

An editor in Bastrop stopped publication of his paper stating as a sufficient reason for the action that his printing office was in the North part of the house.

There was a full grown norther on the day the Declaration of Texas Independence was signed. From the diary of Peter Gray, for many years the Dist. Judge of Houston, was taken the following:

March 1, 1836, yesterday was a warm day and at bedtime I found it necessary to throw off some clothes. In the night the wind sprung up from the North and blew a gale, accompanied by lightning, thermometer was down to thirty-three degrees and every body shivering and exclaiming against the cold. This is the second regular Norther I have ever experienced. Notwithstanding the cold, the members of the convention net today in an unfinished house without doors or windows. In lieu of glass, cloth was tretched across the windows which partly excluded the north wind.

A few years ago I was privileged to visit Flin Flon, Manitoba, Canada. this place is located in the extreme northern part of the Province. We witnessed a display of THE GREAT NORTHERN LIGHTS, in their full glory. Exchanging weather conditions with native Canadians we found they were just as fascinated by our COLD FRONTS and NORTHERS as we were with their GREAT NORTHERN LIGHTS and SUNDOGS.

Winters are still cold, wet and often uncomfortable on some days and on other days warm, balmy and spring like. This still happens in Eastland as well as all of Texas.

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Guidelines To Preparing 4-H Presentations

4-H youth in Eastland County are beginning their preparation for County Round-Up in April. County 4-H Round-Up provides an opportunity for 4-Hers to prepare a demonstration, talk, etc., and present it at the County Level. Those who win at the County level are eligible to compete at the District contest in Stephenville says Donna White, Assistant County Extension Agent. Below is some information to help you understand more about 4-H presentations.

Demonstrations and illustrated talks are two of the most effective methods of presenting information. People learn faster and

remember longer if they see as well as hear—one reason demonstrations and talks are a vital part of the 4-H program. Their greatest value, however, is to the 4-H members who plan, prepare and present them.

Each 4-H member profits in some way from planning and presenting a demonstration or illustrated talk. Poise, self-confidence, and self-assurance grow each time he makes a presentation.

There are some key differences in demonstrations and illustrated talks. A demonstration is doing, showing how, etc. In a demonstration, you make something or do something. There is a finished product. The key to a good demonstration is "Go and DO likewise."

On the other hand, an illustrated talk is talking and telling how with the aid of visuals. In an illustrated talk, you use charts, slides, models, cut-outs, etc. The key to an illustrated talk is "Here's Information."

Demonstrations and illustrated talks add variety, interest, and enthusiasm to the 4-H program.

There are a few basic facts to remember when beginning a presentation.

1) CHOOSE A SUBJECT. The subject should fit the 4-H members interest, experience, knowledge, and skills. It should be exciting and challenging. 4-H projects provide excellent ideas. Limit the presentation to one principal idea or theme.

2) DECIDE ON A GOAL. What is the presentation trying to accomplish? Is it to entertain, stimulate, convince, etc. The 4-Her should decide what response he wants from his audience and work toward that goal.

3) GATHER INFORMATION. Once the subject has been selected the 4-Her should learn all he can about it. A good background of information gives confidence and assures a better performance. Food sources of information include: 4-H project information guides, textbooks, libraries, interviews with knowledgeable people, etc.

4) DEVELOP AN OUTLINE. List the important

steps and processes that are to be discussed. Arrange the steps in logical order. Outline the explanation necessary to go with each step or process. List all material needed. Plan for making illustrations.

5) ORGANIZE YOUR PRESENTATION. There are four major parts for every complete presentation—introduction, body, summary, and question and answer period. Introduction: This is the interest-getter. The member should tell why the demonstration or talk was selected and make it important to the audience. Be original and clever, but keep the introduction brief. Body: This is the show and tell part. Here is where 4-H members exhibit "know how" and skill in putting it across. A convincing demonstrator uses his own words and avoids memorizing the talking part of the demonstration. Talk to, not at, the audience. The factual information should be given at this time. Summary: Review of the important points in the presentation. A good summary is short, concise, and pertinent. Questions and Answers: Time should be allowed for the 4-Her to answer any questions the audience may have.





A THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK

The poet Alexander Pope once wrote: "Order is Heaven's first law." Yet, today, we seem to be in danger of forgetting this lesson. Are we making a fetish of individual liberty in permitting everyone to "do his own thing?" Moral codes and laws are being discarded because they are thought to be confining to this spirit of individual freedom. But shouldn't we realize that giving free rein to certain individuals to live in their "life style" can threaten the peace, order and good government of many more individuals?

The traditional viewpoint - upon which all systems of justice and public have been based - is that there are definite and unchanging moral principles. These are expressed in the Ten Commandments and in similar statements of the other great religions. The other viewpoint contends that morality depends upon the times and one's own personal judgement. Couldn't this lead to dangerous consequences? We think so. Men do possess an amazing capacity for self-delusion.

The traditional standards of morality represent the soundest bases for man's laws and social relations. When these are rejected, social order is in danger and individual freedom depends on social order. "The art of progress," wrote the philosopher Alfred North Whitehead, "is to preserve order amid change and to preserve change amid order."

Short Course On Communism

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The Soviet Union recently celebrated the 62nd anniversary of the October Revolution of 1917, which brought the present Communist regime to power. Unlike our own Fourth of July celebration, it was not an anniversary of human freedom. Communism today is the world's foremost enemy of freedom, and an understanding of it is essential if we are to defend ourselves against it.

First, what is Communism? There are many varieties of socialist practice in the world today besides Communism and even more theories of socialism. Socialism is a great historical movement which has brought greater or lesser changes to almost every society on earth, including our own. Americans have good reasons for opposing socialism. It diminishes human freedom by subjecting society's rich pattern of human actions and reactions to the deadening weight of bureaucratic control. It is a failure even by its proclaimed criterion of bringing material abundance to the masses, since its attempts at economic planning can never match the extraordinary ability of capitalism to create new wealth and economic opportunity and to distribute both through all classes of society.

Socialism, then, is a great historical movement which would merit our opposition even if there had never been a Marx or Lenin, a Stalin or Mao. But Communism--i.e. the philosophy of Marxism-Leninism as exemplified in the totalitarian regimes of Russia, China, Eastern Europe and Southeast Asia--presents a special historical danger.

The philosophical originator of Communism was Karl Marx, whose massive volumes contain many standard socialist ideas plus a few original ones. Marx's most important original idea was to combine socialist ideology with a theory of historical change borrowed from the German

Philosopher Hegel. In Marx's version, this included a belief that societies could best be analyzed by asking who controlled the means of production, i.e. the means of creating wealth. Marx further believed that societies developed historically through a series of radical changes which formed a predictable pattern.

Europe, which was the world's most advanced culture, displayed this pattern most clearly. In the feudal era, the means of production had been in the hands of land-owning aristocrats. In the bourgeois era, they were in the hands of the great capitalists. But the proletarian era which was about to dawn, they would be in the hands of the working class. And after that, since there were no classes below the working class, would come the age of pure communism, a happy age when most of mankind's miseries, which originated in the exploitative class structure of society, would be abolished.

We may dismiss Marx's notion of his historical change as obviously wrong but, in order to understand the peculiar strength of Communism's attraction, we should try to imagine the world as it appears to a Communist believer. To him, the age of pure communism must appear as an earthly paradise. Marx's teaching that it will come through proletarian revolutionary activity provides a natural focus for his idealism to express itself in action. In short, Marx's Communism gives to socialism the fervor of a millenarian religion.

Lenin completed the intellectual structure of the religion of Communism by answering concretely the question, "What is to be done?" He organized and led to power the Communist Party of Russia. His success in Russia, plus his personal charisma and the force of his ideas on party organization, gave his theories a commanding influence among the Marxists of Europe and formed Communism as we know it today.

Two features of this mature Communism deserve particular attention. One of the

nature of power within Communist parties. It does not flow from bottom to top, as in a democratic organization, but from top to bottom. It is dictatorially organized. This gives Communists a great advantage during these periods of social disarray when revolutions are possible. They can seize power with the efficiency of an army while their opponents are debating the issues and passing resolutions.

Secondly, Communists are wholly dedicated to one simple goal, the success of the Revolution. They have shown themselves ready to perform any act--whether lying, cheating, murder or torture--which the Party determines is necessary for the Revolution. This ruthless morality would be a source of political strength for the Communists in any case, but its value is increased because time and time again Communism's opponents refuse to believe that Communists really will lie, cheat, murder and torture when the Party tells them to. Whether it is the Nazi-Soviet Pact, the Gulag Archipelago or genocide in Cambodia, each new atrocity hits the democratic mind with the shock of a great surprise.

People who live in democracies are continually surprised because they fail to understand that Communism is a demonic religion, a 20th-Century successor to the great proselytizing religions of the past. For many Americans, whose own turn of mind is rational and secular, it is simply impossible to imagine the force of a comprehensive political ideology which has been joined to millenarian religious zeal.

But the historical evidence is before us, in the form of Communist domination of a third of the world's population. In the face of this evidence, opponents of Communism have become familiar with several arguments.

First, we are told that Communism is no longer unified but rather seriously split between Russia and China, and again between Russia and the "liberal" Eurocommunism of France, Italy and Spain. To this, we reply that heresies and schisms are a familiar religious phenomenon and do no necessarily deter the religion's further spread. As for Eurocommunism, it is not a priori impossible that a Communist party could evolve in a democratic direction. But a simple test should be employed. Has the party changed its internal structure from dictatorial to democratic? Until that happens, the Communist parties remain fundamentally different from and dangerous to the democratic parties. It has not yet happened in Western Europe.

Secondly, we are told that although Communism may have possessed religious zeal once, that has now burned itself out, and Communism has become "conservative," even a defender of the status quo. It is true that Brezhnev and the Chinese leaders are bureaucrats, not charismatic leaders, but a religion, once established, is often guided by bureaucratic leaders. This fact need not diminish the force of religious zeal on the frontiers of conversion. Each new country that falls--Vietnam or Cambodia, Angola or Mozambique--proves that Communism is not yet a
