Jim received his degree of Doctor of Jurisprudence in 2-1/2 years, with honors, from Texas Tech School of Law in Lubbock, graduating third in his graduating class, and has received many scholastic achievement awards in undergraduate school and in law school, both from the faculty and from his fellow students.

Jim was employed by the law offices of Wagonseller and Cobb in Lubbock, both during and after law school. Jim and his family returned to Eastland in 1973, when he opened his own law office for the practice of law. Jim has served as City Attorney for the City of Eastland, for the past several years in addition to his private practice. Jim has served on the Resolutions Committee for the State Bar of Texas, and is currently serving on the Admissions Committee for the State Bar of Texas. During law school Jim was also employed as a teaching assistant for the Business Law department at Texas Tech University.

Although Jim is only 33 years of age, he has had the opportunity to become involved extensively in the areas of the law that are necessary to attain the qualities required of a District Judge. He has practiced trial work extensively in both the State and Federal Courts in both Texas and New Mexico.

Jim is a 32 degree Mason and Shriner, a member of the Lions Club in Eastland where he served as Vice-President. He has served as a Trustee on the Eastland School Board up to the time of his appointment as District Judge and has been involved in many, many other civic functions as is demonstrated by his receiving the Golden Deeds Award in Eastland in 1979.

Jim is currently serving as Judge of the 91st District Court in Eastland, and has been so serving since being appointed to that office in December, 1979.

"On December 7, 1979, I took the oath of office of the Judge of the 91st District Court. I am now asking you to elect me as a Democratic candidate for a full four year term as Judge of the 91st District Court. Although I intend to talk with as many of you as possible, I intend to devote my full time to the work of the office of Judge and would take this opportunity to summarize my goals and ideals, should I not be able to talk with you personally."

January 31st Is Deadline For 1979 Payment Of Taxes

The Cisco ISD Tax Office offers this reminder to taxpayers who have not yet paid their 1979 taxes. January 31st is the deadline for payment of 1979 taxes. All taxes paid after that date will be delinquent and will have penalty and interest added to them.

ISD Mails Request For Exemptions

All homeowners who were granted residential homestead exemptions for 1979 by the Cisco ISD have been mailed a request for their 1980 exemption. If you have not received yours, please come by the tax office prior to April 1st. These requests should be signed and returned to the tax office by the April 1st date if you wish to receive your exemption for 1980.

If you were a homeowner on January 1, 1980, and did not receive an exemption last year; please check with the tax office as you may now be eligible to receive the exemption for 1980. The exemption is \$5000 off of the full value of your residential homestead with an additional \$10,000 granted to those who are over 65 years of age or disabled.

Cost Of Petroleum Products Could Be Beneficial To Cisco

The rising cost of petroleum products could be beneficial to local businesses according to Roy Dennis at Thursday night's 64th annual Chamber of Commerce banquet. Mr. Dennis has been elected president of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce for 1980.

Mr. Dennis explained his statement, saying the high cost of gasoline is encouraging the local community to do more of its shopping in Cisco. He suggested for everyone to shop Cisco and support local businesses, then "we can all sit back and watch Cisco grow together."

He expressed his thanks to all for electing him president and also presented an

award to Dick Woolley, CofC president for 1979, stating Woolley achieved many things for Cisco during his term as president.

Some CofC plans for 1980, outlined by Mr. Dennis, are: (1) Beautification—help to make Cisco a town for all to be proud of; (2) To work with Cisco's older industries, as well as incoming ones—help the businesses which have supported Cisco during the years to have a promising future here; (3) To do something about the problem of housing in Cisco—help Cisco's building contractors and real estate businesses work out the problems as the demand arises for housing; (4) To begin

preparations for Cisco's 100th birthday in 1981—help make Cisco's centennial a good year and try to get everyone involved.

Retiring president Dick Woolley stated, "1979 was a year of challenge for your Chamber of Commerce—a challenge that your Chamber responded to and stayed with to a successful conclusion."

He listed some of Cisco's accomplishments during the past year as the selection of Cisco for the site of a new manufacturing firm, Otis Engineering Corporation, a Halliburton Company; the Chamber is working with the University of

Houston Foundation in developing the Mobley Hotel and area around it; and the opening of several new retail businesses to "serve the needs of the ever growing Cisco community." He also expressed his appreciation for the various oil companies and related service companies which have located in Cisco during the past year, stating "they have added quite a lot to the economic picture of Cisco."

Mr. Woolley also said local manufacturing businesses were being recognized at the banquet and encouraged everyone to view the various displays of their products following the banquet. He (Continued On Back Page)

The joint organized project of the Cisco Civic League and the Cisco Service Club has received outstanding response from Cisco citizens and CJC students in the first two Blood Drives. A total of 69 units were donated at the September 12 drive, with another 45 units credited to Cisco from the Cisco Junior College, November 14 Blood Drive.

The January 30 Blood Drive will be the first one of 1980, and even greater participation is anticipated. It cannot be emphasized enough, that in order to maintain Cisco's adequate blood supply and repay our long-time debt, that each Cisco citizen's every effort is mandatory - either by their participation or help in "soliciting" eligible blood donors.

Up until the past two Blood Drives, Cisco has been in debt to Mary Meek Blood Bank, 900 units of blood. And though 114 units have been generously offered in only two drives, everyone must realize that a great part of that blood is used to maintain Cisco's average need of 40 pints every two months. To maintain this blood supply and repay its present debt, the Blood Drive Committee has set its goal to collect 60 pints of blood every two months.

Striving to find the most effective means of conducting a successful Blood Drive, the Blood Drive Committee will be trying several approaches in the drives. Due to some impossibilities of time scheduling every willing donor, appointment times will be not be made for the January 30 Blood Drive.

A blood insurance policy is available for those interested donors, whereby for a pint of blood given, that donor's immediate family will be insured for having blood available to them for one full year. That donated pint of blood, however, will not count toward credit for Cisco, but for those persons interested in the insurance policy, perhaps at a later date, the donor can donate another pint of blood for credit for Cisco.

needed. There are no longer paid donors, due to FDA regulations, except in the cases of institutions, using only the plasma from a pint of blood, so it therefore depends on voluntary blood donations.

Blood donors should be aware of the following when preparing to give blood:

A. All donors must be age 18 or older; there is no age limit,

only that each donor is healthfully able to give blood.

B. Blood donors should eat normally, and are encouraged to do so before giving blood.

C. No medication should be taken 18 hours prior to donating blood.

D. No medication, however, should be deleted without checking with the perspective donor's own doctor.

E. Any person who has been sick or has had a cold within the last seven days prior to donating blood, should not donate blood.

F. Any person who has had their ears pierced within the last six months at any place other than a doctor's office, should not donate blood.

G. Any person who has been in Southeast Asia in the last three years should not

donate blood, due to malaria possibilities.

H. Any woman who has menstruated in the last three to four days prior to donating blood, should not donate.

I. No woman who is pregnant, or suspects she is so, should give blood, and should not do so until six weeks after pregnancy.

J. Persons can donate blood every two to three months, with no foreseen problems, although, it is hopeful to not have to call on the same donors nearly this often.

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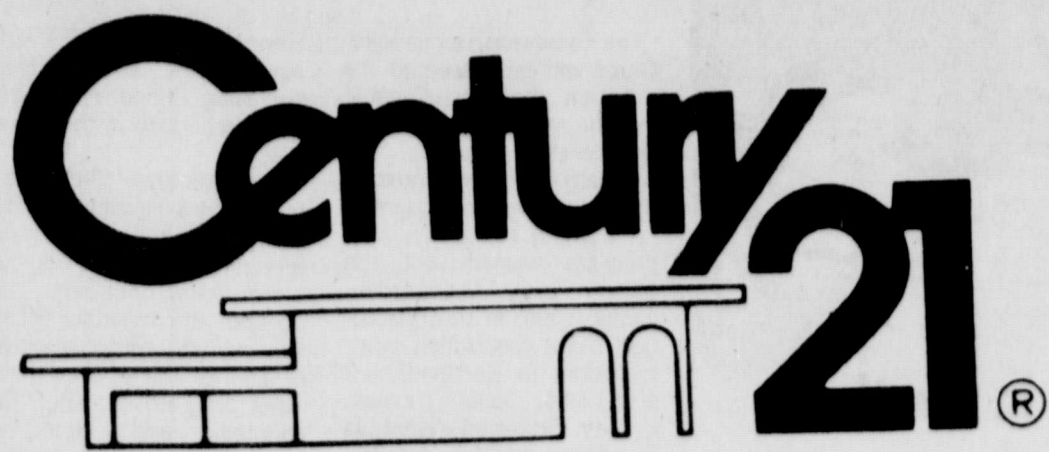

GORDON SPOT

The rains during January have pleased most people in Eastland County. The farmers and ranchers see the winter rains as being very important, as this provides the needed moisture for a good planting season in the spring. After the very dry fall, most of us were a little worried about the moisture condition of 1980.

What is this warm weather going to do to our fruit trees? We have heard this question asked several times. If the warm weather continues, we will probably see fruit trees blooming in February and most likely the blooms or small fruit would be killed by a late freeze.

The fruit trees need more cold weather. Not only is this necessary to keep them from blooming early, but fruit trees need a certain number of chilling hours to produce fruit. Chilling hours are hours when the temperature is below 45 degrees Fahrenheit. The number of chilling hours required varies from one variety to another.

Normally we don't have to worry about this in Eastland County, but this year may be an exception. Most peach varieties require from 700 to 900 chilling hours.

Fruit trees usually live longer and produce more fruit when they receive proper pruning.

Larger fruits and better fruit colors result from better light distribution throughout the tree after pruning. Cultivation, spraying and harvesting are also made easier by pruning.

With annual pruning, the growth of a tree can be guided to establish secure branches correctly on the main trunk. By selecting and establishing scaffold branches early, you can avoid many large cuts later on.

First prune dead or dying wood and suckers growing from the trunk and large limbs. Next remove interfering branches.

Prune limbs that grow inward, criss-cross through the tree or lie directly on or

over another. Leave only those limbs that radiate outward.

After suckers and interfering branches are removed, thin the remaining terminal growth. Use discrimination and regularity when pruning the tips of branches.

Make all pruning cuts flush with and parallel to the branch structure. When removing the end of a branch, make the cut just beyond a side branch since close cuts heal faster.

Although late winter is the best pruning time, do not prune trees in extremely cold weather as trees may be injured.

If you have young peach or plum trees you will need to train them to an open center system. To do this, select three limbs radiating in 120 degree angles from the uppermost part of the trunk as primary scaffold branches. The lowest scaffold branch should be 18 inches from ground level and pointing southwest to shade the trunk from intense sunlight.

Leave enough trunk space so there are 8 to 12 inches of trunk between primary scaffold branches. If all these branches emerge from the trunk near the same location, the trunk may split from a heavy fruit crop.

CAN THIS BE TRUE?—The reference to the Farm Bureau Bulletin report is correct. We'll print it later.

But first this letter: Dear Editor, If American farmers think they have it rough now, they

haven't seen anything yet. And if they have plans for leaving their farms to their children, that won't likely be possible. Without Congressional approval, U.S. bureaucrats [4 departments] initially will use 16.7 million taxpayer's dollars of their departments' appropriations to set up farming [and eventually industrial] communes in Alabama, Louisiana and

Florida. Eventually to become all-encompassing. The U.S. has the best agricultural and industrial know-how in the world. Yet, Israelis are to come to the U.S. to plan and direct these communes that will be patterned after Israeli kibbutz are patterned after Marxist communes in Russia that were planned and directed by Jews, as were the Russian slave labor camps, according to A. Solzhenitsyn's "The Gulag Archipelago Two".

This Federal-Israeli-Communist scheme to control our land and food will cost U.S. taxpayers \$140,000 per commune family. Each family will be "selected by the directors". No independent farmer near such government controlled and subsidized communes could compete even if mortgage or loan money were easily available to independent land owners. In hard times that would make it easier and cheaper to take over the independent's land.

Isaac's book, "Jews and American Politics".

489, Waco, Texas Zip 76703. Ask for copy of "Collective Farming", Pages 274, 275, 276 from "Facts For You", Vol. XXII, No. 45, Nov. 16, 1979. -Or ask your editor to print that information in his paper. Then write your

representatives in protest. Remember, no matter how the schemers try to sweet talk this project, it is collective farming, communism and is the foot in the door to complete government control of our land and food.

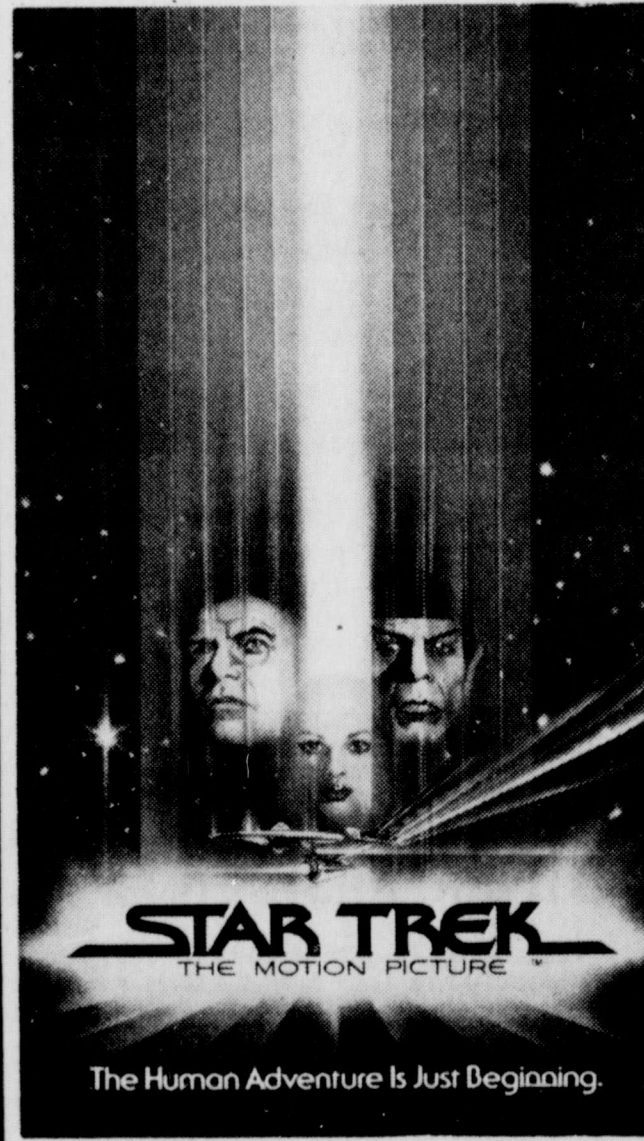

stressing the importance of keeping up-to-date files on important papers, information on personal records, inventories of household furnishings and other

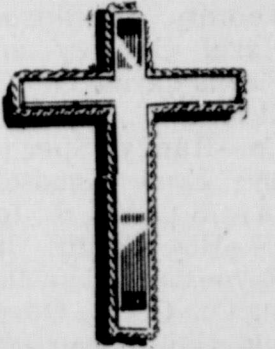
data that might be needed by family of others.

"I love America because America trusts me. When I go into a shop to buy a pair of shoes, I am not asked to produce my identity card. When I visit with friends, it is not reported to the secret police.

"You have only to live in the darkness of tyranny for a little while to realize how wonderful freedom really is! Few men in all history have lived with the privileges that we take for granted!"

Mr. Woolley concluded his speech saying, "it was a pleasure to serve" as CofC president during 1979. He expressed his thanks to everyone for their support of the Chamber and a special thanks to "the Board of Directors, Gene Abbott and

He was employed with the Lone Star Gas Company 18 years, being district manager in Cisco for most of those years. He is a two-term past-president of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce, a past president of the Cisco Industrial Foundation, and Cisco's delegate to the West Texas Chamber of Commerce for nine years. He was named Cisco's

Citizen of the Year by the CofC in 1968 and is a past president of the Cisco Lions Club, a past American Legion Post Commander, past president of the Cisco Country Club and a past president of the Community Chest. Mr. Abbott's interest in Cisco and the Chamber of Commerce motivated him to take an early retirement from Lone Star Gas in 1970 to accept the manager's job of the Cisco Chamber. Harry Lister, principal of Cisco High School, presented Academic Excellence Awards for C.H.S. to Kay Kamon and Greg Qualls. The Academic Excellence Awards for Cisco Junior College were presented by Clois Purvis to Susan Swindle Schaefer and Randy Agnew.

Kay Kamon, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Kamon, has maintained a 97.8 grade point average at Cisco High School. Throughout her years in high school she has been active in the following: class officer for four years, coronation representative, Senior Who's Who, Student Council member, Student Council president, F.H.A., National Honor Society, cheerleader, Lobo Howl, pep squad, basketball, golf, Homecoming Queen nominee, Queen Lobo nominee and U.I.L. contestant.

Greg Qualls has maintained a 94.52 grade point average in high school. The son of Lou Jane Qualls of Cisco and Bob Qualls of Abilene, Greg has been active in the following high school activities: class officer his senior year, Senior Who's Who, class favorite, annual staff, editor of annual staff, annual staff photographer, National Honor Society, band, Band Council, Drum Major, golf, tennis, one-act play, all-area choir, U.I.L. contestant and D.A.R. recipient.

Susan Swindle Schaefer is the wife of Phillip Schaefer and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Swindle. During three semesters at Cisco Junior College, she has maintained a 2.90 grade point average. Her plans following graduation from C.J.C. in May are to attend Tarleton State University working towards a major in accounting. She is a graduate of Cisco High School and is employed by Robert Kamon.

Randy Agnew, the son of Mr. and Mrs. James Agnew, has maintained a perfect 3.00 grade average during three semesters at C.J.C. Also a graduate of Cisco High School and employee of Robert Kamon, Randy's plans following graduation in May are to attend the University of Texas in Austin where he will work towards a history degree. He then plans to attend Law School.

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John Boland presented a special award for Municipal Service to Cisco Chief of Police Kenneth Eaves. Mr. Boland stated the recipient of this award is voted upon by City employees. He said the police department has undergone a drastic change in its attitude and outlook since Chief Eaves' appointment. He stated the moral of Cisco officers is high and they are receiving improved training due to schools discovered by Chief Eaves. He cited Chief Eaves for his good job as Police Chief and stated that the number of crimes solved by the Cisco department is up from 19% to 35% since Chief Eaves came to the department.

J.L. Stafford of Cisco was presented an "Over Due" award by Eris Ritchie. This award was instituted in 1971 by the Chamber of Commerce to recognize citizens who have been overlooked in the past.

Mr. Stafford was a tail gunner on a B-17 in World War II, a two term Cisco City Councilman and a member of the Cisco Junior College Board of Regents. In 1946, he organized the Stafford Roofing Company. In 1955, he and James McCracken formed the S and M Supply Company which, after 25 years, is still one of Cisco's major employers. In 1961, his company purchased the Reynolds Manufacturing Company and in 1963, the Reynolds Company purchased a down and out aluminum window manufacturing company--turned it around and it now employs many Cisco citizens in its modern one half block of a city plant. He has been active in promoting high school and CJC athletics. He has been an active member of the Cisco Country Club for many years and has served as its president. For many years, he and his wife, Letha, have taught anyone and everyone that wanted to learn to play golf; and for the last two years J.L. has taught a Cisco Junior College Community Service Course in golf. 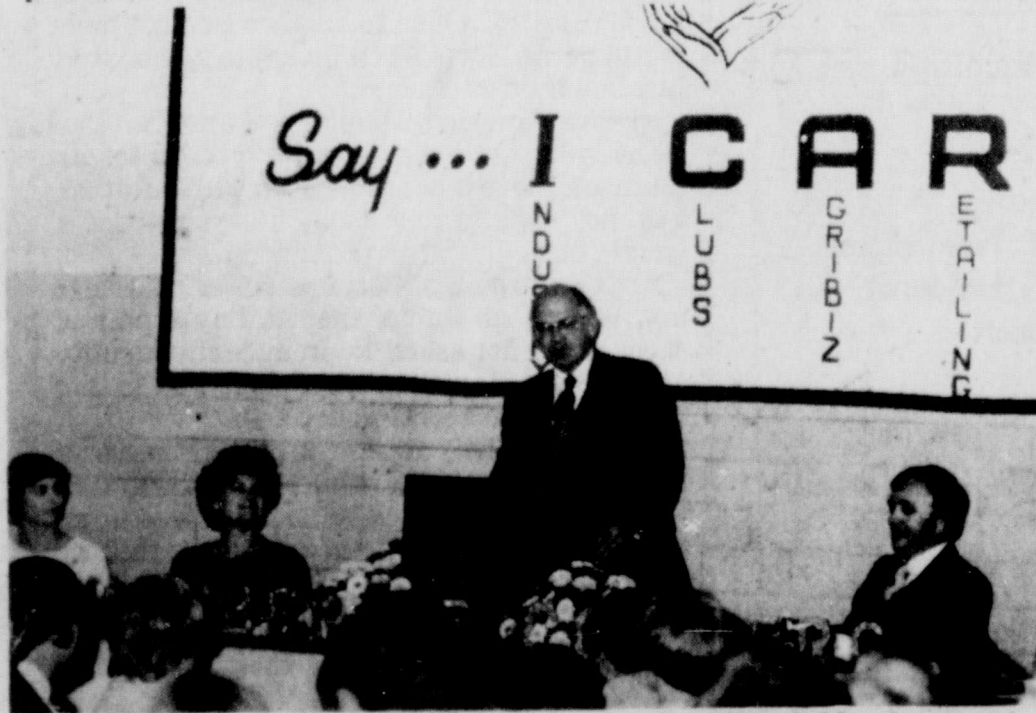
