





Citizens Reminded Of Jan. 30 Blood Drive

The third bi-monthly Cisco Blood Drive has been set for January 30, at E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital. A trained team of laboratory technicians from Mary Meek Blood Bank of Abilene will again be present from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

The joint organized project of the Cisco Civic League and the Cisco Service Club has received outstanding response from Cisco citizens and CJC students in the first two Blood Drives. A total of 69 units were donated at the September 12 drive, with another 45 units credited to Cisco from the Cisco Junior College, November 14 Blood Drive.

The January 30 Blood Drive will be the first one of 1980, and even greater participation is anticipated. It cannot be emphasized enough, that in order to maintain Cisco's adequate blood supply and repay our long-time debt, that each Cisco citizen's every effort is manadatory - either by their participation or help in "soliciting" eligible blood donors.

Up until the past two Blood Drives, Cisco has been in debt to Mary Meek Blood Bank, 900 units of blood. And though 114 units have been generously offered in only two drives, everyone must realize that a great part of that blood is used to maintain Cisco's average need of 40 pints every two months. To maintain this blood supply and repay its present debt, the Blood Drive Committee has set its goal to collect 60 pints of blood every two months.

The rains during January have pleased most people in Eastland County. The farmers and ranchers see the winter rains as being very important, as this provides the needed moisture for a good planting season in the spring. After the very dry fall, most of us were a little worried about the moisture condition of 1980.

What is this warm weather going to do to our fruit trees? We have heard this question asked several times. If the warm weather continues, we will probably see fruit trees blooming in February and most likely the blooms or small fruit would be killed by a late freeze.

The fruit trees need more cold weather. Not only is this necessary to keep them from blooming early, but fruit trees need a certain number of chillding hours to produce fruit. Chilling hours are hours when the temperature is below 45 degrees Fahrenheit. The number of chilling hours required varies from one variety to another.

Normally we don't have to worry about this in Eastland County, but this year may be an exception. Most peach varieties require from 700 to 900 chilling hours.

Fruit trees usually live longer and produce more fruit when they receive proper pruning. Larger fruits and better

fruit colors result from better light distribution throughout the tree after pruning. Cultivation, spraying and harvesting are also made easier by pruning With annual pruning, the

growth of a tree can be guided to establish secure branches correctly on the main trunk. By selecting and establishing scaffold branches early, you can

avoid many large cuts later First prune dead or dying wood and suckers growing from the trunk and large limbs. Next remove interfer-

ing branches. Prune limbs that grow inward, criss-cross through the tree or lie directly on or

over another. Leave only those limbs that radiate outward. After suckers and interfer-

ing branches are removed, thin the remaining terminal growth. Use discrimination and regularity when pruning the tips of branches.

Make all pruning cuts flush with and parallel to the branch structure. When removing the end of a branch, make the cut just beyond a side branch since close cuts heal faster.

Although late winter is the best pruning time, do not prune trees in extremely cold weather as trees may be injured.

If you have young peach or plum trees you will need to train them to an open center system. To do this, select three limbs radiating in 120 degree angles from the uppermost part of the trunk scaffold primary as branches. The lowest scaffold branch should be 18 inches from ground level and pointing southwest to shade the trunk from intense sunlight.

Leave enough trunk space so there are 8 to 12 inches of trunk between primary scaffold branches. If all these branches emerge from the trunk near the same location, the trunk may split from a
