Rotarian Hear Talk On Republic Of China

A talk and picture slide presentation on the Republic of China was presented by Dr. Arthur Zappe, DDS, prominent Mineral Wells business and civic leader, at the annual Cisco Rotary Club ladies night dinner Thursday night at the Colony Restaurant.

Dr. Zappe recently toured China and his tour included visiting a number of cities and places open for the first time to visitors. He joined the tour after flying to Tokyo where he presented a Japanese dentist with an award for outstanding contributions to his profession.

China is not yet ready for tourists in large numbers, needing more facilities and guides, he said. His tour included Peking with seven million people and three million bicycles, the Forbidden City, the Ming Tombs, China's great desert, and, of course, the great Wall of China.

Dr. Zappe said that China has 960 million people - one of every five human beings on earth. The government encourages birth control to limit families to two children. Women marry at age 23, men at age 26. Special privileges are accorded couples with no children or with only one, he said. More than two children draws a penalty for the family.

China has a six day work week with a monthly salary averaging \$75, he said. People dress alike, prices are fixed at stores, and tips are discouraged.

Dr. Zappe was introduced by Bill Reynolds, president of the Rotary Club, who presided. Mr.

Reynolds presented a sweetheart pin to the club sweetheart, Miss Patti Gorr. The Rev. Dell Crockett gave the invocation.

Some 50 persons enjoyed the dinner and program.

Send Bernie Water To Lake Cisco, Is Urged

In a recent edition of the Cisco Press there was a report of the City Council meeting and the question of allowing water from Lake Bernie to go into Lake Cisco and a "hint" that it might be a good idea to publish a "ballot" to let the people of Cisco express their desires on this subject.

Allowing Lake Bernie to discharge water into Lake Cisco was mentioned to the City Council some four years ago. Then, about two years ago, it was brought up by one of the Council members in an open meeting. As I remember it, not one of the council members even entertained the idea except the one who brought up the question.

The mayor closed the question and said they would hire an engineer to study the subject and make recommendations. I am told that some months later the engineer did come up with three ideas, the best of which was water from Lake Bernie.

After spending six years with the City, three in the office and three as councilman, and studying this problem from every approach, I am convinced that "the moment of truth" has arrived, and some method should be devised to let the drainage from Lake Bernie go to Lake Cisco instead of being held in Bernie to evaporate and be lost by absorption. If the elected city council does not have the courage to do this, then the subject should be taken to the people by a referendum "ballot."

Lake Bernie is a part of the water system of Lake Cisco and should be kept as such. However, at this time, the spillway should be lowered to a point so that the next rains could go to the big lake and kept lowered until we catch sufficient water to justify raising the Bernie spillway back to normal.

The spillway might not have to be lowered since there is a 16-20 inch pipe already through the dam, which is plugged by debris. This plug might be rammed out with a section of steel pipe and dozer or drilled out with a road crossing machine. Or, even better, by installing a 16 inch syphon over the dam and could be opened and closed when necessary.

In the event "We the People" have the opportunity to vote on the subject, (or, you might want to call city hall and express your desires on this). I have compiled some figures which, I think, are within reasonable estimates of the significance of Lake Bernie to Lake Cisco.

Approximating the size and depth of Lake Bernie by using a rectangle of 50 acres (about 1000 feet wide and 2000 feet long) one foot deep would take 325,000 gallons of water per acre or a total of 16 and a quarter million gallons. At an average depth of 5 feet, Lake Bernie when full would hold eighty-one and quarter million gallons.

According to my notes, made when I was a councilman and measuring Lake Cisco two years periodically, May 15, 1969, the water was only 12 inches below the spillway. This could be called "full" and highest in history. The water would sometimes blow over but did not run over. Lake Cisco has gone down every year since.

Now going back to Lake Bernie. Estimating that drainage into it would fill that lake twice a year, this would have been 20 times since May, 1969, or, using 81 and a quarter million for one fill, Lake Bernie has caught and held up for evaporation and absorption one and a half billion gallons. Using one million gallons per day, annual average, this amount of water would equal to over four years supply for the City of Cisco.

Of course, there's a lot of variables, in getting water from upper drainage from I-20 Highway thru Lake Bernie, thru Lake Cisco and then to our bathtubs, but I've used very conservative figures and am not looking at the problem from the short term but rather for 3-5 years or until it can be seen that Lake Bernie is not coming up to

expectations or we catch sufficient water in the big lake to justify raising Bernie spillway back to normal. We can get a lot more water from Bernie than we ever will from the Battle Creek project. In fact, I believe the Soil Conservation people in Eastland have determined that the Bernie watershed would furnish 25% more water going into the big lake if it was allowed to function properly.

The first contention from the people against lowering Bernie spillway would be about "all the elderly people that fish Lake Bernie" and should be kept intact for recreational purposes: or, "all the silt" Lake Bernie holds back from Lake Cisco, or, losing the Bernie lake property to the original owner if abandoned. We are not attempting to abandon Lake Bernie. We are talking about re-locating and lowering the spillway to a point where most of the water can go to the big lake.

None of the above negative arguments will "hold water" in comparison to getting more water into Lake Cisco, at least, on a trial basis.

Our city growth depends to a great extent on getting more water in the big lake and attempting to hold a more constant level.

The area below the dam is a little "Gem" and would take a lot of polishing, but the first thing to consider is a higher level of water in Lake Cisco. The upper part of the "largest swimming pool in the world" might be opened in a few years with a plentiful supply of water. This alone would bring again thousands of people from hundreds of miles around as it was in the past.

I am not writing this letter to leave the impression that we are running out of water, as we still have lots of water, and the lake is several feet

above the level in early 1957. What will it look like 5 years from now?

One of President Coolidge's famous classics was in answer to the question, "is it gonna rain," he said, "It always has."

I have one gripe with the City Council method of handling "citizens problems" that are not on the agenda which is published some few days before the council meetings. To bring up a problem that is not on the agenda, one must sit for maybe hours, until 11-12 o'clock in order to bring up a subject. This is discouraging to anyone and was not the case under the old charter. We tried to encourage the ordinary citizen to come by inviting them to bring these questions up first, instead of last item of business, then they could leave if so desired. I believe this is intentionally designed to discourage new business.

Texas Peanut Producers Board

The Texas Peanut Producers Board is required by law to hold biennial elections for the purpose of electing board members. In the 1974 biennial election, three board members were elected for six year terms. Those whose terms expire April 30, 1980 are J.N. Pruitt - District No. 2; Dick Palmore - District No. 3; and Wendell Sellers - District No. 4.

DISTRICT NO. 2 includes the northernmost counties of the State. The southernmost boundary of this district includes the following counties: Loving, Wheeler, Ector, Midland, Glasscock, Sterling, Coke, Nolan, Taylor, Callahan, Eastland, Palo Pinto, Parker, Wise, Denton, Grayson, Fannin and Lamar. All peanut producers north of this line are in District No. 2.

DISTRICT NO. 3 - The westernmost boundary of this district includes the following counties: Red River, Delta, Hunt, Collie, Dallas, Tarrant, Hood, Erath, Bosque, McLennan, Bell, Milam, Lee, Bastrop, Fayette, Colorado, Wharton, and Matagorda. Producers east of this line are in District No. 3.

DISTRICT NO. 4 - The northernmost counties of this district includes the following counties: Maverick, Zavalla, Medina, Bexar, Guadalupe, Gonzales, Lavaca, and Jackson. Producers south of this line are in District No. 4.

Election of these members must be completed and tabulated by May 6, 1980.

All producers of peanuts within the area defined, including owners of farms on which peanuts are produced, are eligible to vote in the election if such producer would be required under H.B. 525 to pay the assessment.

Any producer of peanuts who is qualified to vote in the election and desires to be a candidate for membership on the Texas Peanut Producers Board shall file with the principal office, P.O. Box 398, Gorman, Texas 76454 an application to have his name placed on the ballot. The application must be signed by the candidate and by at least ten peanut producers who are qualified to vote in the election and must be filed at least thirty (30) days prior to the election.

No candidate, unless so nominated, shall have his name placed on the official ballot. However, this does not prevent the writing of the name of any candidate on the ballot by any qualified voter at the election. Spaces shall be provided on the ballot for such write-in candidates.

GENEALOGY

Countin' Kinfolks

By Marie Boney
 "Times two plus one" can equal fun and satisfaction when it is applied to a genealogical pedigree chart. Genealogy, the study of family history, is based on the pedigree chart which lists only direct ancestors.

Each individual is assigned a number so that his parents are twice that number (father) and plus one (mother). In your personal history, you will be number one, your father two, your mother three. This makes it easy to locate the parents of any given person. This will become even more important as your history grows toward the 1,027 direct ancestors it takes to make ten generations.

In order to include siblings and cousins, it will be necessary to have a family group sheet for each couple. These forms are available from many companies and societies or you may design your own. You may use any system which include names, dates, places and which makes it easy to record and retrieve. A jumbled mass of papers in a box is not a family history. Soon the number of names in your files will be mind boggling. You must have a system of keeping records which is easily understood. We started our own history in 1967 and have wasted much time by not having a good clear system from the start.

Always write down any data exactly as you find it. It may be altered later by additional information, but record it exactly, date it and state where you got it.

The first step in your story is what Norman E. Wright, author of "Building an American Pedigree", calls the survey stage.

You survey what you know and what your relatives can tell you so that you know what research is necessary to fill in the blanks.

You must be careful when interviewing relatives for two reasons. First, ancestors were subject to human failings and one relative may not wish to discuss the family for fear of rattling skeletons in the closet. Another will tell you much more than you need to know. Before including anything in your story, make sure it furthers your research and does not needlessly create or fan family frictions. Also generally the more recent a problem, the more carefully it must be handled.

Secondly, much of what you are told will be family tradition, interesting but not necessarily factual. Tradition may be included in your records as long as it is clearly marked for what it is.

Ask relatives for family Bibles, newspapers, letters, and diaries kept by ancestors. Copy photographs if you like. All these will add substance to your ancestors and keep them from being just names and dates on a chart.

If you find it necessary to write for information, send a self-addressed, stamped envelope and payment for any copies you want made. Ask for specific data, not a general "whatever you may have on this name". We have thousands of people with the surname Reeder in our files and could not possibly answer such a request. Most long-time researchers are the same way.

The research stage of your story will include both secondary and primary sources. Secondary are the printed county and family histories, which are usually a cross between fact and tradition. They are not accepted as fact by most historical societies but, like, tradition, they add substance to ancestors and they guide you to primary sources.

Birth, marriage, and death records are your primary sources and are usually housed in city halls, county courthouses, state or national archives. Whether you plan to visit or write, first go to the Eastland county clerk's office and ask someone to show you how to use the records. All courthouses are set up on the same basic principle and knowing how to use records in one will enable you to use them in others.

If you plan to write, the "Handy Book for Genealogists", compiled by G.E. Everton, will be invaluable to you. If you visit, always ask permission before using any records although most of them are public and available to you. And never alter any record in any way. It is illegal and the sheriff's office is usually just a few feet down the hall.

The United States census, taken each decade since 1970, is available through 1900 except for the 1890 schedule which burned. You may order films to be used with a microfilm reader in a local library. The regional headquarters of the Federal Archives in Fort Worth will allow you to work there, free, by appointment only. Check with either Ranger or Cisco Junior College about ordering films for you to use on their readers.

Genealogy has never been more popular and there have never been so many family genealogists. The popularity may be due in part to the recent bi-centennial or the impact of Alex Haley's "Roots". Regardless of its origin, the popularity has created a public awareness and an easier availability of information, making this an

excellent time to begin or continue your personal history.

You begin with your knowledge and the tales of your relatives tell. You go to libraries, you rent books, you buy books. You check official records. You write, visit; you side track and you back track. You think that if you had to work this hard on your job, you'd hunt a different

job, but you like this, you are ready to quit and you are eager to go ahead with it, all in the same moment.

Congratulations! You are now a family genealogist. According to Wright, genealogical research can be more than enlightening and interesting.

He says, "It can even be fun. So dig in and enjoy yourself."

Retail Business Success Story

Allsups has come to Eastland County, and now the three stores open and operating (in Cisco, Eastland and Ranger) are among 168 now operated by the company. Second St. Now, Lonnie and Barbara Allsup have put together the 24th largest chain of convenience stores in the nation, with 168 Allsup's Convenience Stores helping form a \$50 million business. Before the final chapter is written, Allsup's Convenience Stores Inc. will have some 400 stores selling items ranging from garden hoses to barbecued chicken throughout New Mexico, West Texas and parts of Oklahoma. In conversation, Mr. and Mrs. Allsup speak repeatedly of motivated employees, long-term workers, loyal customers and consumer convenience. "Anybody can have buildings, fixtures and merchandise, but if they don't have good people to run those stores - all the way and all the way down - you won't be successful," explained Allsup, president of the corporation which he and his wife started building alone. "I'd look pretty funny trying to run 168 stores," he added with a chuckle. "Anyone who gets negative on people won't grow with the business. You really have to be optimistic and you have to think that people are good," Allsup said. "If we decided that people are no good, we'd have to get out of the business. As chief executive officer of a major chain, Lonnie Allsup looks back nostalgically to the time not so long ago when he was waiting on customers. "One of the parts I enjoy most about the grocery or convenience store business is meeting with the customers, taking care of the customers. I really enjoy that," he said. Now I don't get enough contact with the customers; it's all employee contact now.

"I always enjoyed the customers and the customer was No. 1. That's your business, that's all you've got is the customer," Allsup added. She fondly recalls their Roswell customers when they were starting out. "They were really receptive about what we were trying to do. A lot of people were very helpful," Mrs. Allsup added. In addition to what she describes as "Lonnie's vision," she attributes the chain's success to Allsup employees through the years. In fact, they opened their second store - also in Roswell - with money borrowed from an employee. "We've been lucky to get good people and to keep them," Barbara Allsup said, pointing out that some of the current employees of Allsup's Convenience Stores Inc. started with the first stores in Roswell. "They're very loyal, it's almost like a family relationship," she added. The Allsups began putting their present chain together shortly after selling their 12 initial stores to Southland Corp. in 1963. At that time, the couple owned eight stores in Roswell, two in Ruidoso and two in Alamogordo. These dozen convenience stores had been built up 1956 when Lonnie Allsup opened Lonnie's Drive-In Grocery after his discharge from the Air Force. Allsup's infatuation with grocery retailing, however, began many years before that. "I started out standing on a box, sacking groceries when I was 10 or 11," he recalled. "It's a fast business," he added, explaining how he "liked the fast part of the grocery store business." Working in the grocery business, he said, was much faster than working for his father's Chevrolet dealership in his hometown of Morton, Texas. "That was more of a work real hard and trade cars, maybe make a sale of one a day or two," he said. Allsup also recalls working the maintenance area of his father's automobile dealership, around the oil and grease. To this day, he insists that all stores in the Allsup's chain be virtually spotless. At the age of 16, Allsup graduated from Morton High School; married Barbara, his school sweetheart, who was 16 years of age; and moved to Abilene, so he could attend Hardin Simmons University. While Lonnie was studying business and medicine at the university, Barbara was finishing high school in Abilene. She said that when they left Morton she "only lacked one credit for graduation." But the new school raised requirements and eliminated some credits. "I ended up going to school all day long," she said. "I was taking more hours than he was. Unbelievable!" Barbara recalls, with a laugh, that "we never saw each other. It was just a mass of books. It was a hectic year, but we made it." While in Abilene, Lonnie Allsup's interest in grocery retailing surfaced. "There was a little grocery store nearby and he'd go down and buy a loaf of bread and he'd come back and say, 'I'd really like to buy that grocery store,'" Barbara recalled. But he didn't. Instead, the couple moved to Lubbock, where Lonnie enrolled in Texas Tech. Then the Korean War started and he enlisted in the Air Force. When discharged in Las Cruces in 1956 at the age of 23, Allsup held the rank of staff sergeant. Barbara Allsup recalled that her husband looked into purchasing land in Las Cruces for a store, but "it was extremely expensive, like it was \$200 a front foot even back then. "We couldn't afford to buy it new and start building a store, so he found a store for sale in Roswell," she said. "His father cosigned the note or we wouldn't have been able to borrow the \$6,500," Barbara said. Lonnie Allsup, thinking back to that time recalled that "my ambition was five stores. If I just have five, I think I could run five." Today, with a goal of adding 25 stores to the chain this year, Lonnie regards building up to 12 stores in eight years as "pretty slow." But, he adds, "it was pretty fast for me" at the time.

Soil insects can damage home vegetable gardens unless control measures are taken at least two weeks before vegetable are planted. We have had several calls recently concerning the control of such insects as white grubs, cutworms, wireworms, mole crickets, seed corn maggots and cabbage maggots.

The white grub is of particular concern. It is widely distributed and is one of the most destructive underground insects pests in the garden. White grubs are immature May beetles or June Bugs and can be recognized by their curved or "C" shaped white to dirty-white body. They are 1/2 to 1 inch long and have a brown head. The abdomen, or rear end, appears darker because soil particles inside show through the body wall. They may live up to three years in the soil before emerging as an adult.

White grubs feed and destroy roots and underground parts of potato, corn,

bean, pea, strawberry and many other vegetable plants. Most severe damage occurs on newly established garden sites, that were in sod the previous year.

You might sample the soil to determine before planting if the treatment for white grubs is necessary. Check soil at six to nine 1 square foot areas over the garden to depth of 5 to 6 inches. Thoroughly sift the soil and count the white grubs. An average of one white grub per three locations warrants use of a soil insecticide.

Diazinon provides effective control of soil insects. For 1,000 square feet of surface area, use 3/4 cup of 25 percent emulsion concentrate of 1/2 cup of 50 percent wettable powder in three gallons of water. Apply the insecticide to the surface and mix thoroughly into the soil to a depth of 4 to 6 inches.

Before applying any pesticide, read the label and follow all directions.

We are rapidly approaching the bloom period on peach and plum trees. This will signify the beginning of another fruit season and the beginning of brown rot. We just hope that we don't have a late freeze that would damage the crop.

Brown rot is a disease that attacks our fruit when we have rain or damp weather in the bloom stage.

It would be a good idea to spray those fruit trees while they are in the pink-bud stage with benomyl fungicide (Benlate) and Malathion. This will help prevent insects and diseases. Do not spray the fruit trees with an insecticide such as Malathion while they are in full bloom. You will kill the bees and other insects that spread the pollen.

Begin spraying with the fungicide and insecticide again with 75 percent of the
