The possibility of Cisco being declared a Historical District may not happen unless the citizens become interested in the project, according to Dr. Rinaldo Petrini, architect in charge of the Hilton Hotel restoration. Dr. Petrini also stated it would not be worth happening unless the citizens are willing to look after its restoration.

Dr. Petrini is donating his time and talents to Cisco in trying to get the city declared a Historical District. He spoke Thursday night, on behalf of the Cisco Historical Society, at the Cisco High School Auditorium to give citizens the opportunity to ask questions about the project and learn what they can do to help. ## Cisco Frontier Jubilee Parade To Be Saturday

The Cisco Frontier Jubilee Parade on Saturday, April 19, is going to be one of the best, according to Olin Odom III, who is in charge of the parade. Parade time is 10:00 a.m.

Joe Hanna, state representative from Breckenridge, will serve as Grand Marshal of the Parade this year.

The Moslem Shriners Motorcycle Corps will be one of the main highlights of the parade, with the group performing downtown. The Cisco Junior College Band and Belles will march and perform, and the Cisco

## Mayor And Council Members Take Oath At Council Meet

Following the canvassing of election returns by Doug Fry at Tuesday night's regular city council meeting, the elected mayor and council members were sworn into office. Eastland County Judge Scott Bailey did the swearing in of Mayor Roy Cartee and council member Jerry Jeffcoat. Louise Allison was sworn into her second term of office by City Attorney Billy Wright.

The canvassing of the election returns was accepted in a motion made by council member Bill Eudy and seconded by Raymond Whitley. Mayor Hugh Chief Brown and council members Eudy, Whitley, Lucy Collier, Louise Allison, Harold Phippen and Morgan Fleming all voted unanimously in favor of the motion. Election judge Doug Fry stated the turnout for the election was the best Cisco has seen in years

with a total of 921 ballots being issued to voters.

Before the swearing in of Cartee as mayor, Mayor Brown read a quote from a Bible which was given him by his mother when he left home in his youth to attend college.

Mayor Cartee expressed appreciation, on behalf of the citizens of Cisco, to Chief Brown and Morgan Fleming for their long hours contributed while serving

as Mayor and council member. Cartee also stated some of his plans during the next three years. He said all items for placement on the agenda are to be given to the City Secretary and the Mayor will approve the final order in which they are placed on the agenda. He said the second meeting of each month will be a form of work study to discuss items and find facts about each item and finally, to decide which items are to be acted upon. The first meeting of each month would be to act upon proposed resolutions and ordinances and approve the monthly bills. He also stated a Mayor-Council office was to be established on Wednesday in City Hall.

Also before the swearing in of the new members, Collier made a motion to accept the minutes of previous meetings. Allison seconded the motion and all members voted in its favor.

City Manager John Boland briefed the council on the city's

## Absentee Balloting Begins Mon.

Absentee balloting begins Monday, April 14, for the crucial May 3 Democratic Primary election. Those persons who know that they will be out of the county on May 3, may vote absentee at the County Clerk's Office.

Two county-wide races, a county commissioner contest and a constable contest in Gorman highlight the primary ballot.

Contest drawing the most count-wide interest is that for district judge, 91st District Court. Four are candidates for the office.

District Judge Earl Conner Jr. resigned last November and Jim Wright was appointed to serve out the unexpired term which ends at the end of this year.

He is a candidate as are Eastland Attorneys Bill B. Hart and Saul Pullman, and Cisco Attorney Truman Kirk.

Another contest of great interest is that for County Sheriff. Johnnie Morren was appointed to serve the unexpired term of Ronnie White when he resigned last year.

Morren is a candidate for a full term, as is Cisco Police Chief Kenneth Eaves and Jim Williams of Gorman.

County Commissioner Danny Woods of Precinct One (Eastland) is opposed by Richard A. Robinson.

On the Gorman ballot, Johnny Ingram and Dewey Keesee are candidates for Constable.



## Skateboarding Safety



many experienced skaters to protect the knuckles and palms when using the hands to pivot or break a fall. Footwear is also important. Riders who skate barefoot are asking for trouble in the form of broken or mutilated toes. Sneakers provide some protection and allow for a good grip on the board.

Defensive skating is another factor to consider when skateboarding. Check ahead for stones, holes, or other conditions that may present a hazard.

Speed should be limited to a rate where control of the board is firmly in the hands of the skater. For safety, don't exceed a speed where you would be unable to jump off without serious injury.

A final word of caution should be directed to the skateboard itself. Purchase the best board you can afford. Chances are a more expensive board will be better constructed and ultimately safer for you, the rider.

Skateboarding is becoming an increasingly popular sport among teenagers. Many communities have provided skateboard parks where students may practice and enjoy the sport without the concomitant danger of vehicular traffic associated with street riding.

However, no matter where one rides, danger is an ever present reality. A skateboarder should prepare for and eventually expect an accident. Even a minor spill can rip the skin, allowing dirt and small stones to become embedded in the flesh.

To minimize the potential danger involved in an accident, riders should wear the proper attire. Helmets are desired especially when speed skating or slaloming. Some experienced riders reach speeds of 50 miles per hour or more.

Knee and elbow pads can help prevent nasty scrapes and cuts in the event of a spill. Gloves are worn by

## Wild Turkey Season Opens In County

Spring turkey season in Eastland County is April 12th through 27th, this year. This county is becoming well populated with the Rio Grande turkey due to restocking efforts by farmers and ranchers, assistance from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission, and the application of conservation practices con-

ducive to good turkey habitat recommended by the Soil Conservation Service. The turkey is now a wildlife resource because flock numbers have increased to substantial numbers through good habitat management. A mature Rio Grande turkey gobbler averages 16 to 18 pounds. Turkeys have

an average life of two to three years; however upon reaching maturity their life expectancy increases substantially. Most mortality occurs in poults and yearlings. A few birds have been known to live as long as 10 years.

Turkey hunting provides thousands of hours of recreation for sportsmen as well as a delicious addition to the menu. Legal hunting pressures have never been a limiting factor on turkey in Texas since less than 10 percent of the entire population is harvested by hunters annually. Turkeys can withstand an annual harvest of 20 to 30 percent of the population. If these birds are not taken by sportsmen during the hunting season, they will eventually die and be wasted.

Turkeys are primarily vegetarians, although they eat many insects such as grasshoppers. Major food items during the spring and summer are green grasses, forbs (weeds), buds, flowers, seeds and insects. In the fall and winter, turkeys take fruits, mast such as pecans and acorns, and green forage such as Texas winter grass, oats or wheat depending upon availability. Poults' diet during the first two weeks of life is 90 percent insects.

For cover, turkeys prefer leafy trees for their roosts and utilize the upper half of a tree which, if possible, grows in or near water. During their midday loafing period, turkeys utilize dense cover to remain quiet, preen, or dust their feathers. Protective brush cover for travel is utilized when available and is useful for screening cover near roosts. Vegetative cover adequate for nesting is a basic requirement; then as soon as poults are old enough to fly, adequate roosting areas are needed. Species of plants used for cover in Eastland County include live oak, post oak, pecan, elm, mesquite, and shin oak. Effective turkey habitat includes a minimum of 30 percent open terrain where the birds can forage for insects.

Water for turkeys is essential because they drink at least twice a day. Turkeys also prefer to roost and nest near water. A nesting hen should have drinking water within 400 feet of her nest. Sufficient rainfall during the spring and early summer months is essential to good turkey production and survival. During droughts, turkeys will leave any range where surface water is not available.

As previously mentioned good habitat is essential for turkey production and survival. The Soil Conservation Service is available to help persons interested in improving their habitat for wild turkey. Conservation practices which improve habitat include: Proper Grazing Use which assures production of forbs and grasses that are utilized by turkey for food and cover; Planned Grazing Systems with planned rest for pastures improve range conditions and habitat. For example, a rancher could defer a pasture or pastures having a high concentration of nesting turkeys during the months of March through July. This would improve the range condition and increase flock numbers. Range seeding of grass and forb species preferred by turkeys is another positive management practice for improving habitat; Brush Management can be planned to leave prime turkey roost sites and other desirable woody

species while removing and undesirable brush and invading species. There are other conservation practices benefiting turkeys and all other wildlife. More infor-

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### A PERSONAL MESSAGE FROM JUDGE JIM R. WRIGHT:

It has been stated that the qualifications for Judge of the 91st District Court are experience, training, maturity, and integrity. I wholeheartedly agree. However, I believe that it is possible to achieve those qualifications at age 33 and that those qualifications are not achieved automatically by years alone. I have been fortunate in my career to work around and with some of the top lawyers and Judges in this State, and in the Federal Judiciary in both trial, administrative and appellate matters. I have had the type of extensive practice that qualifies me on all grounds to continue to serve you as your Judge, not only in maturity and integrity, but also in experience and training both as an attorney and now as District Judge.

Those of us who work in the 91st District Court have been engaged in an evaluation of every phase of the operation of the Court. This evaluation has as its goal the betterment of our judicial system in our county. One particular area in which we are working is in the area of probation. The appraisal is continuing and will result in a more comprehensive program of supervision rehabilitation. I, too, feel that there are some cases in which probation should be supervised closely in accordance with the law. However, I also feel that a massive change in our probation program should be initiated only after clear thought and appraisal. I do not feel that just because the State of Texas offers financial and technical assistance that one should jump off the cliff of State aid blindly. We all know that more State control comes in the same package as State aid. Many of the State benefits are in danger of being cut off through legislation. Certainly we do not want to enter such a program until the full effects of this legislation are known. The program should be evaluated closely before being accepted, and a proper evaluation takes time. We are currently studying other probation departments and hope to take these studies as models in formulating our program. A program as vital as probation and rehabilitation should be studied closely, intelligently and with mature judgment. My concern for well supervised probation is one reason for my supervising the probation department personally, which I now do.

Ladies and gentlemen, I can and will make every department under the 91st District Court work successfully, if given the time and opportunity to do so. I ask you for your vote and your support in order that I can have the time and opportunity to continue to make your Court work for you.



financial report and it was accepted in a motion by Fleming. The motion was seconded by Whitley and all members voted in its favor.

Boland was also scheduled to give a city manager's report, but due to a conflict in schedule, he requested it be tabled until the next meeting. Allison made a motion to this effect with a second by Pippen, and all members voted in its favor.

City Attorney Wright was instructed to find out more about the city's mineral rights on some Lake Cisco property which is being considered for bids on an oil and gas lease.

The council heard a report from Don Isbell, executive director of the Supplemental Energy Assistance Program which is requesting the City of Cisco's participation. Mr. Isbell explained the program is designed for "the poor, or near poor" the help in paying their utility bills or offering other types of assistance. He said the money would not come from city or county funds and the city's responsibility would be to help with paper work for providing direct payments for the poor's utility bills. He said the general public would apply for such help at the Family Planning Clinic in Eastland and he stated such aid would not interfere with Social Security income for the elderly. No action was taken by the council.

John Muller and Dorothy White presented a request to the new mayor and council from the Cisco Historical Society for the renaming of Avenue D to the Conrad Hilton Avenue. Mrs. White stated that approximately 98% of the merchants on Avenue D were contacted about the proposed change, and only a few did not sign a petition in its support. She also presented a letter from Eric Hilton which said the Hilton family feels it "will be of great assistance in being able to obtain Hilton identification off the freeway, which will help encourage tourism to come into the downtown area of Cisco." The signed petition states the official change would "be made upon completion of the building and at the ceremony of the dedication of same." Following a discussion, Whitley made a motion to honor the request and allow the city attorney to begin drawing up the legal papers. Collier seconded the motion and all voted in its favor except Allison, who abstained, saying she did not feel the request was made plain enough in previous publicized announcements of the meeting.

The council heard a request of several citizens about the possibility of allowing Lake Bernie to be

drained into Lake Cisco, due to the low water level of Lake Cisco. Mayor Cartee said he would personally request that nothing be passed at Tuesday's meeting in order to allow time for the matter to be thoroughly looked into and placed on the agenda for the council's second meeting this month.



are concerned a number are "better" than Coastal in some respects but none is a better producer. Coast Cross 1, Calie and Tifton 44 bermudagrasses all have higher digestibility ratings but do not produce as much forage. Also, Coast Cross 1 has not been adapted enough to withstand use and climate here in Eastland County.

Individuals desiring to plant "better" grasses should give some thought to use of the grass once established. Most improved pasture grasses are selected under conditions that represent intensive use under maximum production.

Often this is hay meadow-type production with high fertility rates and periodic clipping. Much of the grazing research for selection of grasses is done on an intensive basis where stocking rates may be four or five steers per acre throughout the growing season. With intensive production tests and comparisons, more productive grasses prove their value.

Will the individual planting a "better" grass see its benefits? With expense involved in establishing a new grass, this question must have a positive answer.

Three key factors for considering a new or "better" grass are digestibility, protein level and productivity.

Increased digestibility means that animals can get more nutrition from the same amount of forage with higher digestible grasses. For stocker animals, this means more weight gain per acre. For cows, it means a higher level of nutrition. However, research has shown that the amount of fertilizer applied does not influence forage digestibility.

On the other hand, protein level of a pasture or hay is highly dependent on fertility

and age of the grass at harvest. In other words, management of the pasture or hay meadow is more important than the type of grass. The "better" grasses will not necessarily be better than other grasses. High protein hay or grazing can be produced from any grass if it is fertilized and managed properly.

When it comes to productivity, the new bermudagrasses will not produce much more than common bermudagrass unless they are fertilized and managed.

If an individual is not willing to use some type of good fertility program and apply grazing or haying management, growing a new grass may be questionable.

New and improved grasses can be more productive and more nutritious for livestock. But to get the most from

these grasses, a producer must consider digestibility, protein levels and productivity possible under his planned fertility and management programs.

Beautiful pecan trees and regular harvests of high quality pecans begins each spring with frequent zinc sprays. Good foliage is the secret to optimum growth, healthy trees and regular production. Mature pecan trees can have double the amount of foliage with three or four zinc sprays in April and May. Young pecan trees can grow six feet instead of six inches in one year if zinc is sprayed on to the foliage every two or three weeks from April until August. This is of course in combination with a good management program. The first application of zinc should be applied to the foliage this week.

There are two types of zinc used, zinc sulfate or NZN. Both are effective. Zinc sulfate is a wettable powder and must be mixed in water. Caution will need to be used however, because zinc sulfate can kill many types of plants, so spray it only onto pecan foliage. NZN is a new type of zinc which is a liquid. It is highly

soluble and less toxic to other vegetation.

Commercial rates of zinc for spraying pecan foliage are two pounds of zinc sulfate or 1 1/4 quarts of NZN per 100 gallons of water.

The homeowner should use two teaspoons of zinc sulfate or 2 teaspoons of NZN in one gallon of water.

## Congressman Collins And State Senate Candidate Visit Eastland

 Republican Jim Collins, U.S. Congressman from the 3rd District of Texas, and Jay Brummett, Republican Candidate for State Senator from District 22 (including Eastland County) spoke during a reception held Thursday afternoon, April 10th, in the home of Virginia Russell, Eastland. The event was sponsored by the Republican Women's Club, and more than fifty area residents attended. The audience broke into frequent applause during the talks, and asked a number of questions afterward.

Mr. Collins, who is serving his 6th term as a Representative from the Dallas-Ft. Worth area, covered a wide range of topics. His service on the Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee, his recent appointment to the House Energy Committee, and his election as Ranking Member on the House Investigations Sub-Committee gave him a broad background of knowledge upon which to base observations. He began, however, by stating that was "good to get back home, where people know what is going on." He described his early life as "born a Democrat and raised in East Texas", but stated he joined the Republican Party because he believed it upheld American ideals.

Collins stated that in order to save this country we must defend it properly and provide internal financial responsibility. He said that the difficulty this country is experiencing in Iran actually began with the "give away" of the Panam Canal, a decision which caused many nations to conclude that the United States would not stand up for her rights anywhere. He described our foreign policy as presently "weak", and noted that Russia has 50 per cent more military strength than we do, with missiles capable of reaching any U.S. target within 20 minutes of firing.

Lasar beams, he said, offer the most promise for future defense from this threat.

Collins turned to the financial problems of the nation, stating that more people are now living off the government than are paying taxes. Monetary reserves are depleted, and the National debt is a staggering 616 Billion. "It was 366 Billion when President Carter went into office," he declared. "And when Pres. Ford was in office, we had 4.2 inflation. Now we have 18 per cent. We will have 25 per cent next year if we have Carter. Since bank interest is always 2 per cent above the rate of inflation, we also have a fantastic interest rate to contend with."

He mentioned the recent rise in taxes - a 50 per cent increase in three years. "The American standard of living has lowered at an alarming rate. No wonder our dollar is dropping in value!" He said he believed the hopes for turning the country around lie in new leadership, and application of Christian principles. He said the salvation of the Nation will be people who stand up for what is right.

Collins pointed out that Texas is a bright spot in the nation today because, as a State, it has stayed with fundamental principles of liberty and free enterprise. Three things have made Texas a great state: The Right To Work Law, no State Income Tax, and a balanced budget.

"In Texas," he declared, "We're going to come out ahead!"

In introducing Mr. Brummett, Collins stated we must send men to Austin who have correct principles of government. Brummett, a personable 36 year old from Cleburne, has had experience in farming, ranching, oil field work, and managing businesses. He is a graduate of the U. of Oklahoma with a degree in history, and studied at SMU and the U. of Texas Law School. At the present time he has a cattle operation, and the KASCO Manufacturing Co. in Dublin.

Brummett stated that he believes in curtailing government regulation of agriculture and business. If elected he will attempt to lower taxation, and curb foreign investments in Texas land and businesses.

cockscorn, corn flowers, stock, golden rod and baby's breath. Tie the straight stems of the flowers into bunches near the stem ends and string upside down. Let flowers dry 3 to 4 weeks in a closet or attic. Total darkness and lack of dampness is essential. Once the flowers and leaves are dry, the colors are "set". They will not fade and with normal, gentle care, the flowers should last two or more years.

Another method of dry flowers is the borax - cornmeal method. Flowers are beautifully dried in equal parts of borax and cornmeal. Flowers that respond to this treatment are zinnias, mori-golds, roses, daisies, carnations, larkspur and holly-hock.

To prepare the flowers for drying in the cornmeal - borax, cut off all flower stems. Insert a 6 inch length of No. 20 florist wire through center of the flower head. Depending upon the thickness of the flower blossom, bend an 1/8" or 1/4" of the wire tip backwards, then pull, letting this "hook" catch hold firmly in the flower head. The hook has now vanished and the remaining wire is the flower stem.

Next, mix one part borax to one part cornmeal. Use a deep box with a lid. Gently bury the flowers in the borax and cornmeal. Be certain that blossoms are covered. The tightly closed box should be placed in a dry, warm, dark place for about three weeks.

Foliage is beautifully preserved in a solution of glycerine and water. Magnolia leaves which have been treated by the glycerine method are well worth the time spent. They will last indefinitely. Cut branches when leaves are fully matured and full of moisture.

Wash foliage to remove dust and dirt. Crush the woody stem so it will absorb the glycerine solution. Several inches of stem should be immersed in half glycerine and half water solution. Let the stems stay in the glycerine solution for several weeks. Rub the foliage with glycerine once a day. Remove from the solution when the leaves take on a pliable texture.

**RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:**  
 Do you have trouble with pie meringues? If your meringue often "weeps" or shrinks, then here is a recipe that never fails.

**PIE MERINGUE**  
 4 tablespoons sugar  
 2 tablespoons corn starch  
 1 cup water  
 3 egg white  
 3 teaspoons sugar  
 Stir in 4 tablespoons sugar and corn starch together until well blended. Slowly add water, stirring until smooth. Bring mixture to a boil and stir until glossy and thick. Cool mixture. Meanwhile, beat egg whites and remaining 3 teaspoons sugar. Slowly add cooled liquid to egg white.

**NOTE:** Cornstarch mixture must be cooled. This meringue keeps longer, does not shrink or weep.



Jim Wright is naturally using the natural "Vote Wright" as well as looking at us from many, many big, blue yard signs all around. In the photo, his index finger is rested against his cheek, and we wondered why he didn't point it, as per the familiar Uncle Sam recruiting poster. Rates...rates...rates. Rates - rates - rates. Rates-rates-rates.

No matter how fast you mutter it, that word increasingly and unceasingly seems to enclose our lives in a flexible frame that both grows larger and squeezes

tighter at the same time. There are tax rates, gas rates, inflation rates, ad rates, electric rates, long distance rates, pulse rates, airline rates, interest rates, freight rates, metabolism rates, rates of return [or lack thereof], and so ad infinitum. At the moment the foremost
