Upon his return to the doors of the council chambers he announced, "The bat downstairs won't be so hard to catch, since he is hanging upside down from the ceiling." Later reports confirmed that there was another bat downstairs in the City Hall building.

During the continuation of the meeting, Mr. Whitley suggested doing something about exterminating the bats in City Hall. City manager Boland informed him that the only thing which will work on bats also works on humans.

Who knows, maybe the bat was waiting for the citizen-council discussion time of the meeting so it could voice his, or her, disapproval of the council recently encouraging everyone to board up old broken windows and doorways, as well as any openings into an older unused building to discourage living places for bats in the City of Cisco. However, I guess it found a comfortable place and went to sleep before the discussion time.

Seriously, Cisco seems to be having a problem with bats this year, as it had last year, and everyone is urged to take extreme caution if a bat is nearby, especially if it is acting in a strange or peculiar way. If you have not already done so, why not take the city manager's advice and board up openings, which could lead to a habitat for bats. If they can not find a place to stay while passing through Cisco maybe we won't have to worry about the possibility of someone, or a pet, being bitten by a rabid bat.

Cisco Swimming Pool Is To Open May 24th

City Manager John Boland reported to the City Council at Tuesday night's regular meeting on the proposed operation of the Cisco City Park Swimming Pool. He said the pool is scheduled to open Saturday, May 24, with a free swim day, and will close on Labor Day, September 1.

He said proposed hours for the pool will be from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m., Tuesday through Sunday. There will probably be a teen night from 8 to 10 p.m. on Friday and Saturday; an adult night from 8 to 10 p.m. on Thursday; and a ladies swim from 1 to 4 p.m. on Monday.

Season passes for the swimming pool will be \$20 for an individual or \$40 for a family, and they must be purchased by June 15th. Mr. Boland requested the

city council to set this year's daily admission price to the pool. Council member Harold Phippen made a motion to set the price for all children at \$1.00 and for all persons over 18 years of age at \$2.00. Parents who bring their children to swim will not be charged. Council member Raymond Whitley seconded the motion. Mayor Roy Cartee and council members Phippen, Whitley, Lucy Collier, Louise Allison, Bill Eudy and Jerry Jeffcoat voted unanimously in its favor.

Council member Whitley then made a motion to have one day a week for a three-hour free swimming time for children of the community. Saturday mornings was suggested for the time. Allison seconded the motion and all voted in its favor.

Boland said rules will be posted and enforced at the swimming pool this year as follows:

- No running
- No Pushing or Horseplay
- No Glass within the Pool area
- One Person on the Diving Board at a time
- One Bounce Per Board Per Dive
- No Flotation Devices Beyond Ropes
- No Food beyond red line
- No Cursing

Everybody must take a shower before going into the pool

Boland then answered questions from the council members on his monthly financial report and about the monthly bills. Following a discussion of the bills, council member Whitley made a motion for the bills to be paid.

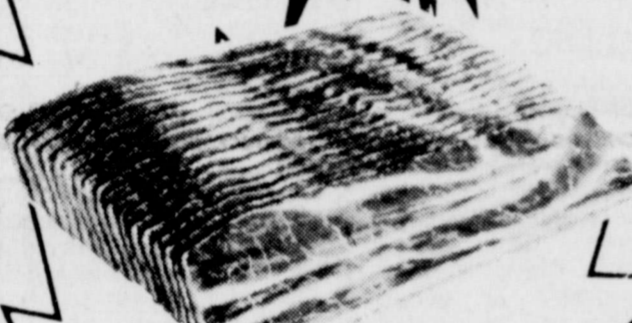

During her early childhood, Mrs. Lloyd states, she was very impressed by the Chief Vann House. It seemed to her to have a character - a presence - of its own, so she has personified the house in the introductions to various chapters of the book.

Lela Lloyd's family moved to Texas when she was young, and she grew up in Cisco. Later she became a teacher in the public schools

and Cisco Junior College. This part of her life was the theme of her first book: "The Best Damn Teacher" published in 1977. After her retirement, in 1971, she moved to Alaska, where she homesteaded and took a course in magazine article writing at the University of Alaska, under Dr. Chuck Klein.

During the course she thought of the imprisonment of John Howard Payne (author of "Home Sweet Home") at the Vann plantation. But as she worked on the article, she found there were many more historical events revolving around the old house - material which had never been adequately written about. Since the mansion figured prominently in Cherokee Indian, American, and Georgia history, she decided to expand her article into a book.

During a 1978 trip to Georgia she found a tremendous response to her suggestion of a book about the house, which was now in the National Registry as a Historic Site. By 1979 even more people in Georgia were interested, and offered original research material. The book was finished recently, and its first printing has just been completed.

In the Chapters of the book the house first speaks in ANTICIPATION, as a Scottish nobleman marries a Cherokee princess and begins the Vann dynasty - leaders of the Cherokee nation.

Then the house speaks on EDUCATION, as Moravian missionaries are invited to establish a school and

Church for the Cherokees on the Vann plantation.

The house speaks of VISITATION, as President James Monroe pays the Vanns an important visit.

HUMILIATION comes when John Howard Payne, a northerner and friend of the Cherokees, is imprisoned. DEGRADATION describes the time in the 1830's when the Cherokees were forced to leave on the long walk to Oklahoma, and the house gradually fell into disrepair.

RESTORATION speaks of 1951, when the Historical Association of Georgia began the monumental task of restoring the structure to its original handcrafted condition.

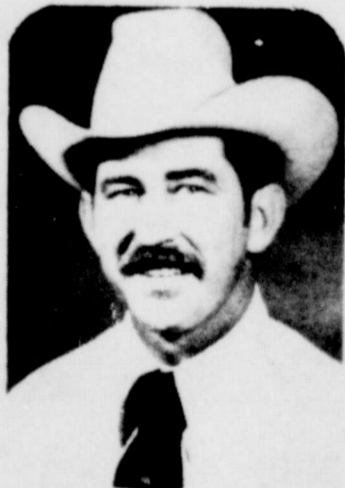

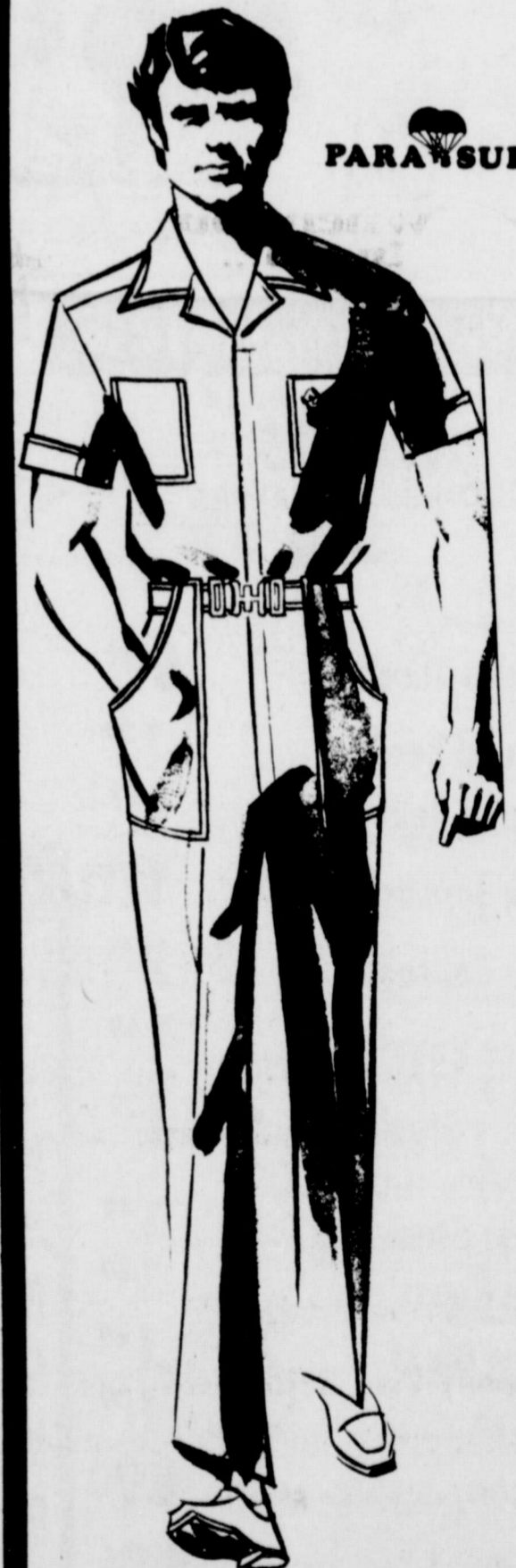

GORDON SPOT

For the last week or ten days, homes and other buildings throughout Eastland County have been invaded by moths. We have had from five to ten calls per day concerning these moths. Some have questioned if these moths may be the ones that eat clothes and carpets. Other have asked if we might expect an invasion of army-worms. Others just want to know how to exterminate the moths since they are a nuisance in the home or office.

The moths are the adult stages of various types of caterpillars and larvae. About 80 percent of the moths we are now seeing are the adults of cutworms. These are not moths that will damage clothing or carpets. In fact, they do no damage except being a nuisance in buildings. We had a very large population of cutworms this spring and they have now gone into the adult or moth stage. We do not expect another generation of cutworms this late in the year.

To control the moths in buildings, spray with a household spray, containing either diazinon or baygon. Spray around windows and doors to prevent entry into the building.

Cotton, once an important crop in Eastland County, may be making a come back. Some estimate that there will be from 2,000 to 4,000 acres of cotton planted in the county this year. If things continue as planned, we may

even have a cotton gin near Rising Star.

A real important step in controlling the cotton boll weevil is to have a uniform planting date for the county. It seems the Eastland County farmers are planning to plant the last week in May. However, the wet soil may have a lot to do with the planting dates of cotton as well as peanuts and other crops.

We are still seeing an increased interest in watermelon production and gar production in Eastland County. New cash crops are needed in our area to help insure a more stable income.

Eastland County cattlemen may be interested in attending the Heart of Texas Cow/Calf Clinic, May 22. The clinic is planned for cattlemen of this area and will be at the Brownwood Cattle Auction. Registration begins at 8:30 a.m.

The first topic to be discussed is "Estrous Synchroniza-

tion". Other topics will be: "Livestock Biologicals" and "New Brucellosis Program." During the afternoon, "Beef Sire Selection"

will be discussed and there will be a panel discussion on "What the Beef Industry is Looking For." Speakers will include Ex-

tension Service Livestock Specialists, a veterinarian, cattle order buyers and a commercial laboratory representative.

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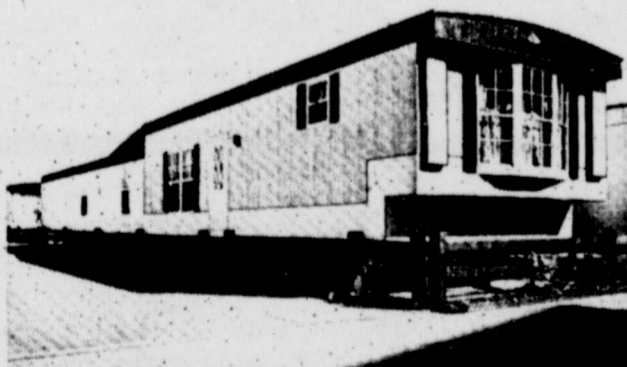
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4-H Roundup

Pecan insect and disease control and marketing will be the topics of a meetings and field day, Friday, May 23, south of Rising Star. The Eastland County Pecan Grower's Association is sponsoring the field day for the benefit of everyone interested in pecan production.

The field day will be at Charles George's orchard and will begin at 9:30 a.m. and will conclude by 12:00 noon.

Dr. Sammy Helmers, Extension Horticulturist, will discuss pecan nut casebearers control and other insect problems. Disease control will be discussed by Dr. Chip Lee, Extension Plant Pathologist, reports County Extension Agent DeMarquis Gordon. The third speaker will be Dr. Jim Anthony of Fort Worth, who will discuss organization for better pecan marketing.

Following the discussions the visitors will examine pecans in the orchard, to observe stages of development and insect or disease build up.

The George place is located three and one half miles south of Rising Star. Visitors should go two and one half miles south of Rising Star on Highway 183 and then turn southwest on country road for one mile.

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THE EASTLAND PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH
The Presbyterian Church

When the Presbyterian Church is mentioned in Eastland County, many people think of two historic, picture-book Church buildings located in Cisco and Eastland.

The Cisco Church, on West 6th Street, is constructed of brick, with a flight of stairs leading to a beautifully appointed Sanctuary.

The Eastland Church, on Walnut and Valley Sts., has just been redecorated extensively. It is white, with classic columns and stained glass windows of a muted aquamarine shade. Both buildings have the irreplaceable aura of beloved older Churches, as if the essence of prayers and devotions over the years has somehow permeated the very walls. Memorial gifts remind worshippers of pioneer members; fine organs and pianos add beauty to the services.

There are about 100 Presbyterians in Eastland County now - part of the world-wide Presbyterian Alliance, which numbers around 50 million persons. There are 12 branches of the Presbyterian Church in the United States, with about 13 million members. The largest body is the United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America (Northern), and The Presbyterian Church in the United States (Southern). These groups have not reunited on an official basis, but hope to complete a Union in 1981.

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included Church-State Unions. One of Presbyterianism's deep roots goes back to the Greek word "Presbusteros" (Elders) and deals with the system of the Church government of apostolic times.

By the 1500's, two major religious "reformation" movements developed on the Continent of Europe. The first was led by Martin Luther. The second was begun by Ulrich Zwingli, who was followed by John Calvin.

Calvin, born in France in 1509, was a scholar who preached doctrines almost revolutionary for this time - the sole authority of the Scriptures, justification by faith, the Priesthood of all believers, and Church government by all members. These teachings led to the formation of the Presbyterian Church in 1559 - an event which shook the social, political, and religious world of that day.

When Calvin was forced to flee to Geneva, Switzerland, a Scottish reformer named John Knox came and studied under him. Knox returned to Scotland and helped establish the Presbyterian Church as the state Church of Scotland.

The fact that King James of England was a Presbyterian undoubtedly led to his desire to see the Scriptures "Properly translated into English". He gathered 40 of England's leading scholars - including members of the Church of England and Presbyterians - for this tremendous work. The King James Bible, since its publication in 1611, has given hope, inspiration and direction to millions of people.

Many early Anglo-Saxon settlers of American (Puritan) were Presbyterians. Although in Europe this group had not fully adopted the idea of the separation of Church and State, the American Presbyterians made this part of their creed. The Colonist's struggle for freedom was called "The Presbyterian Rebellion" in England. A number of Presbyterians signed the Declaration of Independence, with John Witherspoon - a Presbyterian Minister - being the only clergyman to sign this document. After the war the Presbyterian Church became a dominant force in the new country.

Church Colleges such as Princeton emphasized the desire of the Church for an educated nation. The Church continued its missionary

work with a zeal which propelled it into the western frontier. One group, called the "Cumberland Presbyterians", separated from the main body of the Church over several matters, including how much education a Minister should have. (The main body upheld the idea of intellectual, highly educated Ministers.) The Cumberland Presbyterians, along with Methodists and Baptists, began work in Texas as early as 1829, in spite of laws against Protestant activities. The Cumberland Presbyterians also figured prominently in early day religious work in Eastland County. Austin College, founded by Presbyterians in 1849, is the oldest College in Texas.

The Civil War brought deep divisions to the Presbyterian Church. But after the war the Church began to pioneer in many areas. In 1874 and 1875 the first Presbyterian Churches were organized in Comanche and Brownwood. The present building in Comanche is dated 1907.

The first Presbyterian meeting place in Eastland County was probably a log building south of the present-day site of Eastland. The group who worshipped there later disbanded, and further information about this organization is not available at present.

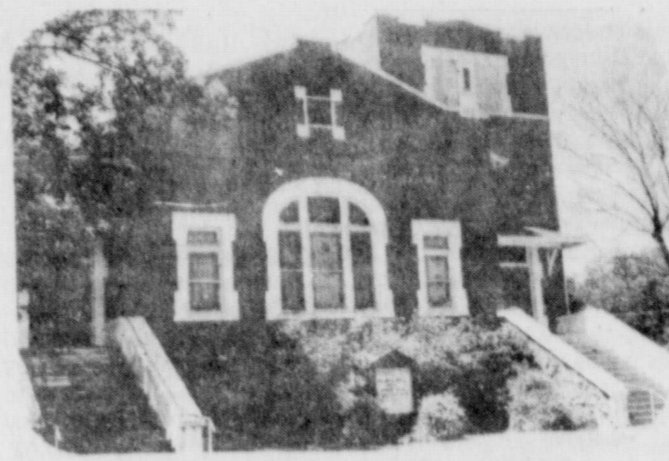
On Aug. 29, 1881, Rev. John Sylvanus and Isaac H. Ellis, Commissioners from the Trinity Presbytery, U.S.A., met with four other persons to organize a Church in the newborn town of Cisco. A small frame building was constructed on Ave. G and 8th St., on land set aside by the Texas Central Railway. In 1882 the T.C. Railway gave a tract of land on West 7th St. to the Cumberland Presbyterian Church. This group was eventually unable to establish a Church building and the members eventually began attending the Presbyterian Church U.S.A.

In 1891 the Cisco Church transferred to the Presbyterian Church U.S., and the Rev. Walter Shive became the first Southern Minister. In 1893 the Church building - along with all other Cisco Churches - was destroyed by a tornado, and the congregation had to rebuild. By 1924 the membership had grown to 280, overflowing the small white Church. Plans were made for the spacious brick building on West 6th, and this was finished in 1925.

In 1981 this Church will celebrate its 100th Anniversary with a number of events. One highlight of the occasion will be an excellent book by Mrs. Melvin (Evelyn) Bailey giving the History of the Church. This volume is being published at present.

In 1885 a Church was organized in Rising Star, but disbanded at a later date. In 1886 a Church was organized in the rural community of Sabanno, and services were held there until 1971. Many community and Church leaders came from this fine congregation. A Church was organized in Ranger in 1900, but disbanded in the 1930's.

During the oil boom in Eastland, in 1921, the present Church was organized, with a Dr. Estes as the first resident Minister. The present-day building was the

original one constructed on the site, making it one of the oldest Church buildings - with continuous services - in Eastland County.

Lists of Presbyterian Church members from Eastland County have always included and families who are leaders in education, business, Civic and charitable affairs. The Eastland County Churches have been active in community services, including Scouting and other worthwhile activities for young people.

The basic doctrines of the Presbyterian Church still include the sovereignty of God, salvation by Christ, and the Holy Spirit as Guide and Comforter. There have been some changes in "the social gospel", or how the Church relates to the needs of the world around it.

The Church still believes the whole Bible to be the inspired word of God. This includes the Ten Commandments, which set forth God's will for man. The Church accepts all valid modern translations of the Bible, using these for worship and study.

Worship in a Presbyterian Church is simple but reverent, a focused around Bible study and the Minister's sermon. There are two Sacraments in the Church - baptism and Communion. Communion - The Lord's Supper - is open to all Christian believers.

Presbyterians stress salvation by grace, not works, but believe that devotion to duty and good works are the natural results of a changed heart. A person may join the Presbyterian Church in several ways. One is by transfer of letter from any Christian denomination. Another is by study in a Communicant's class, held

Pippen seconded the motion and all voted in its favor.

In other action, Whitley made a motion to approve the minutes from the April 8 meeting. Eudy seconded the motion and all voted in its favor.

Louise Allison requested that the election of a Mayor Pro-Tem be placed on the agenda for the next meeting, since there is an Attorney General's ruling against secret ballots in an open meeting. Mrs. Allison was elected at the April 22 meeting for the position by ballots. Following this correction on the minutes, Collier made a motion to approve the minutes of the meeting. Allison seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

The council was briefed by Ed Farley on data he has collected over the years concerning Lake Bernie. He stated he is asking the city to unplug the 24-inch line which runs through the spillway and allow the water to flow into Lake Cisco. Mayor Cartee stated the item is scheduled for the May 27 meeting and he assured Mr. Farley a decision would be made at that time.

Council member Jeffcoat made a motion to adopt a resolution to establish the Cisco Industrial Development Corporation "to encourage employment, public health and the public welfare." Whitley seconded the motion and all voted in its favor.

Following its second reading, council member Eudy made a

motion to adopt an ordinance abandoning and closing portions of 11th Street and the alleys of Blocks 35 and 36. Jeffcoat seconded the motion which passed unanimously. The area concerned is where Burgess Industries is located and the council's action was required in order to allow Burgess to get a clear title.

Mrs. Allison made a motion to adopt a resolution "enabling the Governor to designate the City to design, construct, operate and maintain new and existing waste treatment works." Pippen seconded the motion and all voted in its favor.

Mayor Cartee appointed Velma Joyner, Wayne West and J.C. Fletcher to the Board of Equalization. The council then heard a report from Louise Allison about the County Tax Board. She said at the Board's last meeting, May 7, the contract of appraising all property in the county was awarded to McMorris Tax Firm which has been in the appraisal business over 20 years. She said the Chief Appraiser of the Board is Steve Thomas.

Council member Eudy made a motion to approve the City's participation in the Central Texas Opportunities Program. Pippen seconded the motion which passed unanimously. This program provides assistance to low income and based income families on their utility bills. The city's participation in the program would be concerned with water

bill.

During citizen-council discussion, Dr. H. Chief Brown stated there have been a number of rumors, untruths and falsified circulars about him in town. He said another rumor has begun and he wants to clean it up before it gets started. He explained the rumor says he is planning to start an area in Cisco like Impact near Abilene. This is untrue according to Dr. Brown, he says he hired Billy Wright to form a business corporation for him because he plans to finance the building of some houses or apartments in the northwestern part of town. He said the surveys have been made, the plots laid and only the basics of the building have been finished. He said Cisco needs housing and his actions should be a benefit to

the city. He emphasized that he is "fed up with lies and untruths and wants rumors settled."

Youvonne McMillan asked about the procedure for having an item placed on the agenda and the general ruling seemed to be that such items be given to Mayor Brown or City Manager Boland, since there is no City Secretary. Louise Allison said the council meets for the benefit of the citizens and if they would like to discuss something, they may do so during the citizen-council discussion.

Dorothy White asked that council members refrain from using her name in public places unless they have something good to say. She said she has been told that someone overheard a conversation against her in a local restaurant.

Gus Smothers asked who the Lake Patrolman is and what hours he works. Boland said "Cats" Ingram is the patrolman and he works Wednesday through Sunday the number of hours he is needed. Mrs. Smothers stated her cabin at the lake has been broken into, the locks taken off and someone has been sleeping there. She said she thinks the patrolman should keep a closer eye on the property at the lake. She also said she reported a cabin on fire at the lake several weeks ago, but allegedly the Fire Department did not answer the call until it was reported by someone else several minutes later.

Rev. O.T. Killion gave the invocation at the opening of the meeting.
