More than 400 Texans actively involved in volunteer work around the state convened in Austin May 7-8 for the statewide Fifth Annual Texas Volunteer Conference.

The two-day conference was hosted by the Governor's Office for Volunteer Services in conjunction with a number of private and public agencies which depend on volunteer efforts.

Rita Clements, the First Lady of Texas and a long-time volunteer herself, was chairman of the conference and presented the 1980 Governor's Awards for Outstanding Volunteer Service to the winners during a ceremony and banquet on Wednesday evening.

Among the winners were Richard and Joan Bell of San Antonio. Mr. Bell is a deaf-blind man who volunteers his time to help other handicapped individuals adjust to and overcome their limitations in order to become productive members of society. Mrs. Bell is deaf herself and through her sensitive caring and communication becomes the eyes for her husband.

ravaged their city in April, 1979, a group of ministers met and formed this non-profit corporation, operating on donated funds, to rebuild Wichita Falls.

A special award was created by Governor Clements for Dr. Martha Walke of Abilene. Dr. Walke, a busy physician, wife and mother, has no time for volunteer work herself, but she conceived the idea of allowing her patients who have difficulty paying their medical bills to do volunteer work in the community in return for credit on their accounts. Working through the Voluntary Action Center in Abilene, which places the volunteers in a job suitable to their skills and time available and keep track of the hours, Dr. Walke's patients are allowed \$3.50 credit on their bill for each hour worked.

Keynote speaker for the conference opening session was William Broyles, editor of award winning *Texas Monthly* magazine. He spoke on "What's Ahead for Texas and the Vital Role Volunteers Will Play."

Marlene Wilson, internationally known as an authority in the field of volunteer management, author of the book "The Effective Management of Volunteer Programs," was featured in a session on "networking" making the most of community resources, and conference participants met by city and planned cooperative programs.

Now's The Time To Get Those Pressure Canners Checked

Gardens are flourishing. So, now is the time to see if your pressure canner is in good working order.

First, you will want to have your pressure canner dial gauge checked for accuracy. If it does not register correctly, then your food may spoil. The Eastland County Extension Service is sponsoring a pressure canner gauge clinic on Monday and Tuesday mornings, May 19 and 20 from 9:30 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. in the County Extension Office at the Courthouse.

Charge for testing a canner gauge for accuracy is 50 cents. Proceeds will go to the Eastland County Extension Homemakers' Council.

If your canner has a gasket, check to see if it is allowing steam to escape. If the pressure can't reach 10 pounds, then buy a new gasket.

You will want to wash the bottom or kettle part of your canner - inside and out - with soapy water. If the outside is stained, you can use fine steel wool with soap as a cleaner for those other than the porcelain coated ones.

To clean the inside, fill the canner half full of water and

add one cup of vinegar. Put the canner on the range. Be sure you have the rack in it so that it will be cleaned too. Let pressure go to five pounds for 10 to 15 minutes. Slide canner from hot range unit and let cool until gauge reaches zero. Let it sit 4 or 5 minutes, then open petcock and remove the lid. Pour out the vinegar water, rinse and dry.

Clean the openings in the canner lid by drawing a string or pipe cleaner through them. Take off removable petcock and safety valve.

May Marks Tornado Time

April, May and June are prime time for twisters. May seems to be the worst month of all and the hours between 3 p.m. and 7 p.m. are the most dangerous time because that is when it is easiest for thunderstorms to form and create tornadoes, according to weather experts.

North Central Texas in the area ranging roughly from Lubbock to Dallas seems to be the heart of the Texas tornado zone, the U.S. Weather Service (USWS) says. But few areas are safe from tornadoes. A killer tornado struck north of Austin in April and many other areas are vulnerable because they have spring storms. For instance, warm, moist air coming up from the Gulf of Mexico can collide with concentrations of

cool, dry air coming across North Texas from the Rocky Mountains and the northern U.S. This collision creates thunderstorms that may spawn tornadoes and hailstorms.

Scientists have studied tornadoes for years and the one thing they are sure of is their unpredictability. Twisters may appear anytime, anywhere there is a storm. People need to be alert and prepared to deal with them at all times but especially during prime tornado time, the Texas Medical Association says.

Tornadoes usually occur in hot, sticky weather with southerly winds and threatening sky with thunderclouds bulging down. In most cases the tornado moves from the west or southwest toward the northeast. Rain and hail often precede the tornado.

Another good signal to watch for is the USWS bulletin. The USWS issues three types of weather bulletins. The severe weather watch bulletin indicates where and when probabilities are highest. The severe thunderstorm or tornado warning bulletin means a severe thunderstorm or tornado actually has been

sighted in the area or indicated by radar. It is advisable to take cover immediately if the warning is issued in your area. The all-clear bulletin indicates the storm or the threat of a storm has ended in the area previously included in a severe thunderstorm or tornado bulletin.

When a tornado warning is issued, the TMA urges people to get inside as quickly as possible. Most people killed in the Wichita Falls tornado last year were in vehicles trying to outrun the storm. If you are inside, open windows on the side of the house away from the storm's approach if there is time to do so. If the house has a basement, take refuge there near the wall in the most sheltered and deepest part. If there is no basement, take cover in the smallest room with stout walls. Even a closet will do. Or lie under a heavy piece of furniture against inside walls near the center of the house. Seek shelter away from windows and upper floors of buildings. Keep listening to a battery-powered radio for emergency bulletins.

If away from home, take shelter in a steel-framed or reinforced

concrete building. In open country, move away from the tornado's path at a right angle if you know you can outrun the tornado which can move up to 70 mph. If unable to escape its path, lie down flat in a low place that is reasonably safe

from flash floods, shield your head and cover your face with clothing to prevent suffocation from dust. Do not stay in a car, trailer or mobile home. Stay out of buildings with wide-open roofs, such as theaters and gymnasiums.

"The beauty of the commodity boards is that they are created and controlled by the producers themselves," he added. "Even though some producers may choose not to participate, they work for the benefit of every grower."







Congressional Comment

FINAL CONSIDERATION of the so-called "windfall profits tax" was completed by the House on March 13, with the House-Senate Conference Report approved by a vote of 302 to 107.

The millions of words that have argued against the tax fell on deaf ears, as the drive to "punish the majors" now lacks only Senate approval. The fact that the tax will reduce — not increase — supplies of petroleum seems to have been a minor consideration. The fact that many small producers and royalty owners will be seriously crippled economically is a point that has gone ignored.

One vote stopped an attempt to exempt the first 1,000 barrels of production from the tax, an exemption that would have given the small royalty owner and producer a needed break.

A recent letter from a retiree who depends on the royalty income from his stripper wells, says it far better that I could: "Inflation of 16-18 percent and the windfall profits tax is going to destitute us. Without inflation, this tax is going to take more than 40 percent of our small royalty income. Worse still, this tax will very probably shut down the properties from which we get 90 percent of our income — stripper wells. This tax will render these properties unprofitable."

"It makes no sense to tax out of existence 75 million barrels annually of stripper oil just

to punish the major companies."

I fought this "consumer tax" (that is who will ultimately bear the tax) from start to finish, but unless it is rejected by the Senate and returned to the Conference Committee, the bill has passed.

THIS WEEK I announced my support for the Bipartisan Coalition to Back Efforts to Balance the Budget and its proposal to cut Federal spending by \$26.4 billion this year.

Among the reductions recommended was a 17.5 percent cut from 17 major regulatory agencies. The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) was not among the agencies named and I would like to point out why: Agriculture has already been cut far more severely than any other department or agency. Just two years ago, agriculture's budget totaled \$7.7 billion, compared to \$2.8 billion in the 1981 fiscal year budget submitted by President Carter earlier this year.

I particularly oppose further reductions in agricultural research. A cutback on research funding would return about \$2 to taxpayers on a per capita basis, but in six or seven years, without additional agricultural research, food prices will escalate 10 to 15 times as much. That's being penny-wise and pound-foolish. It's time to cut the unproductive areas, not the production

Q: I've heard that cholesterol is associated with heart disease. What is cholesterol? Are there certain foods to avoid that are high in cholesterol content?

A: Many doctors believe that high cholesterol levels contribute to heart disease and that men over the age of 30 and women past menopause should take care to limit their intake of foods rich in this substance. Cholesterol is a crystalline alcohol used in many of the body's chemical processes and is required in correct amounts for good health. The body receives cholesterol in two ways: by manufacturing it and by eating various types of plant and animal foods. Egg yolks, cream, chocolate, coconut and liver are a few foods particularly high in cholesterol. Various types of shellfish are high in it, too. Some foods that have a low cholesterol-content include poultry, veal, fish, grains, cereals and many fruits and vegetables.

Q: I've heard that people are living longer these days. Is this true?

A: Yes, people are living longer today as a result of advances in medicine and greater participation in physical fitness activities. According to the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, males born in 1977 (the latest year in which figures are available) will live to be 69.3 years of age, more than two years longer than their counterparts born in 1967, who will live to be 67.0 years old. Females born in 1977 are expected to live to be 77.1 years old versus 74.2 years of age for those females born ten years earlier. This has important implications in retirement planning for all individuals.

Q: What is the difference between whole life and term insurance?

A: Whole life, often called straight life, is permanent insurance. It insures you for the whole of your life at the same or "level" premium every year. The level premium creates important secondary values—the cash values in your policy. Term insurance used to be called temporary insurance, however, it now may also insure you for the whole of your life. Initially term insurance is less costly than whole life, although eventually term premiums are more than whole life policy costs.

Hints For The Aged & Handicapped

DEAR PAT—I can use both of my hands but don't have the full use of either one of them. Caring for my hands and nails are a big problem and I wish I could do it for myself.

Is there any kind of device that would allow me to do my own nails?—C.M., Georgia

DEAR CARRIE—Nail care is difficult for those who have any kind of finger or hand limitations but here are a few ideas on what others have come up with.

Before beginning, place your hands in warm, soapy water a few minutes to do your nails immediately after your bath. They are much easier to work with.

Wrap a cuticle tool with adhesive tape and, by using your teeth to hold the tool, push the cuticle back.

Nail clippers instead of scissors to trim your nails are easier to manage. The clipper has a flat side so it can be placed on the table.

Press the clipper with the heel of one hand while clipping the nails on the other hand. This way, you don't have to hold the clipper and it is easy to get the job done even though you don't have the strength in your fingers to press the clippers.

After clipping, you will need to file the nails which is next to impossible for those without good finger control.

Place two emery boards on the edge of your dresser or vanity table and tape them down. Tape one with the rough side up and the other with the fine side up. This eliminates most of the tedious work.

Unemployment Benefits: Who Qualifies?

Unemployment insurance is not a welfare program for the poor. It is a program for all working people, rich or poor, who lose their jobs because of conditions beyond their control.

With 97 percent of the nation's work force now covered, it behooves everyone to know the facts about unemployment insurance.

To start with, you do need a work record. State laws vary, but they usually require from fourteen to twenty weeks of regular employment during the previous year to qualify. Typical benefits are about 50 percent of your weekly earnings, up to a maximum benefit. Payments usually cease after 26 weeks, but in times of high unemployment this may be extended to 39 weeks or more with the help of federal funds. When applying for benefits, it pays to be prompt. The waiting period (usually one week) doesn't start until the application has been filed.

The basic premise of the system is that you must be out of work through no fault of your own. Thus you may be partially or wholly disqualified if:

1. you quit your job;
2. you were fired;
3. you refused to take a substitute job.

There are important exceptions to each of these, however, that may allow you to collect benefits anyway.

1. Even if you quit, you may still qualify if you can prove you had

"good cause" for quitting.

2. Even if fired, you may still qualify if you can prove you were fired unfairly.

3. Even if you refused a substitute job, you may still qualify if the job wasn't "suitable"

As a rule, in order to remain eligible for benefits, you are not required to take a job that offers a significantly lower salary or status than the one you lost.

Although some people try to collect unemployment benefits to which they're clearly not entitled (a dangerous game with penalties for those who succeed and are caught), many others fail to apply for benefits to which they are entitled.

Some people are simply embarrassed to apply for what they consider "a handout" as long as they're not in dire need of the money. But it's important to understand that unemployment benefits are a form of insurance; the money comes from a payroll tax on employers rather than from general tax revenues. The money you collect may eventually cause an increase in your former employer's tax rate, but it won't deny funds to others who are more needy. In short, you should have no more qualms about applying for unemployment benefits than about applying for Social Security; it's a right you've earned.
