THE SWIMMING POOL at Cisco City Park opened for business on Saturday, May 24 with a free swim day and will probably close on Labor Day, September 1st.

In consideration of the fact that the pool has been opened and persons will be swimming this summer, if not at the pool then in lakes or other places where swimming is possible, we are printing the following article from the National Swimming Pool Institute.

POOL INDUSTRY OFFERS SAFETY TIPS

Memorial Day traditionally marks the opening of public swimming pools across the country, and millions of Americans have already begun to enjoy what an A.C. Nielson study has determined is their favorite recreation activity--swimming.

The National Spa and Pool Institute (NSPI), formerly the National Swimming Pool Institute, urges swimmers and splashes to plunge with precaution this summer wherever they pursue their pastime--at the beach, club, public recreation facility or private pool.

"It's been said that the safest thing to have around the water is a child who can swim," says NSPI Chairman Ken Nelson. "We urge anyone with access to a swimming pool to take advantage of the swim classes and 'waterproofing' training available through their local Red Cross, YW and YMCAs, youth clubs, Scout groups and community pools.

"A child who can swim will be safer on fishing trips, camping trips and beach vacations, too."

Nelson also suggests that homeowners planning to build an in-ground pool this summer be aware of safety considerations in its design and construction.

To help assure the safety of swimmers in private pools, NSPI worked with several other national safety and health groups to develop its Suggested Minimum Standards for Residential Swimming Pools to guide its members' design and construction practices.

Participating in preparation of the Standards were the American Public Health Association, the National Safety Council, the American National Red Cross and the National Sanitation Foundation. Copies of the Standards are available for \$3 each from NSPI.

For those who already own pools, NSPI suggests that their families and guests learn and observe these tips for safe, pleasurable swimming:

- *Never swim, or let anyone else swim, alone.
 - *Never let children play in or around the pool without constant supervision.
 - *Have basic lifesaving equipment available at all times, as well as a list of emergency telephone numbers.
 - *Do not permit roughhousing or horseplay in or around the pool.
 - *Don't swim when you've just eaten or you're overly tired.
 - *Stay out of the water during rain storms.
 - *All outdoor pools should be protected by a fence which cannot be opened or climbed by toddlers.
 - *Keep pool decks and diving boards clean and clear of debris.
 - *Exercise caution in using diving boards and slides. Don't jump or dive in water less than five feet deep.
 - *Have a local NSPI builder or service company make periodic safety and maintenance checks of all pool appliances and equipment.

only that sense of authenticity, but also a familiarity with his subjects that only a deep personal interest can achieve. His work can be found in private collections and in galleries throughout the southwest. He participates in rodeos and plans of one day having a ranch of his own. Since his graduation from high school in 1970, he has studied with well known artists from the Fort Worth Art Center and Texas Christian University. Lyndy also attended Tarrant County Junior College, where he studied Technical Illustration. It is indeed fortunate for the art lover that Lyndy is capable of blending together the best of two major interests - the flavor of the west, and a skillful use of art media to portray his subjects with maximum authenticity. **WALT CUDE** A native of deep East Texas and no stranger to all of Texas, Walt Cude was born in Palestine in 1933 and now lives in Fort Worth. As a boy he was fascinated with all of life, the sunlight, the trees and more especially the animals, birds and fishes. Hardwood river bottoms and the piney woods in East Texas are a paradise for all of these. The settings, habits and life styles of many of his later-to-be subjects for paintings

were studied even at an early age. Fishing trips to the Gulf Coast and visits with relatives in the brush country of South Texas yielded a broader knowledge and exposure to the wildlife of the Southwest. Wide-eyed and energetic, his early studies soon blossomed into sketches and later to paintings, and very recently into the third dimension of sculpture. He graduated from high school at Palestine, entered the University of Texas as a Geology major, but after two years and two summers afield in West Texas and New Mexico he returned to his love of art. Transferring to Texas Christian University in 1955, he received a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in 1958. From 1954 to 1963 he illustrated covers and story illustrations for the *Texas Parks and Wildlife* magazine. Working to please the panel of experts was a difficult job. Response To Petrini's Request Not As Hoped

Local response to a request made recently by Dr. Rinaldo Petrini, architect in charge of the Hilton Hotel restoration here, has not been as good as hoped for. Dr. Petrini urges that citizens help out in this project since it is for the good of all of Cisco. Dr. Petrini's original request was that anyone who has old photographs, newspaper clippings, documents or any written illustrations of how Cisco used to look, to please loan them to Petrini and Associated Architects. They are in the process of compiling a report about Cisco which will hopefully cause the city to be declared a historical district. The more documented proof of Cisco's history they can present, Dr. Petrini emphasized, the more likely Cisco will be declared such a district. In fact, he said if they get enough findings in this search it will be almost 100% assured that Cisco will be declared a historical district. All citizens are urgently asked to contribute anything they might have, or know of, to the research. Dr. Petrini asked that the items be left at The Cisco Press office for Catherine Worthy. Miss Worthy of Cisco has been hired by Petrini and Associated Architects to do the research work for the report. He said Miss

Worthy will pick the items up and send those who loaned them a receipt through the mail. The items would then be copied and notarized, with the original being returned to its owner in about a month's time. He also stated that pictures or articles would not be placed in any publication without first getting the owner's written permission. He said the deadline for receiving these items is June 15, since the survey and report must then be prepared. Dr. Petrini emphasized they would like to know about anything, or see any photographs or documents, of Cisco and its past from the Red Gap days up to, and including, the present time. He stressed that no matter how seemingly unimportant the item, they would like to get a chance to evaluate its worth to their research. He stressed, "Sometimes the most insignificant item, might be the most significant element in our search." Dr. Petrini went on to say, the success of this survey and of the final aim of this venture; to place the City of Cisco on the National Register as a historical city, depends a great deal on the response from the citizens to this appeal for written and visual documentation to substantiate our

of all feather, the game fowl such as geese, quail, pheasant, and the wild turkey are some of the subjects he has mastered. His portraits of pets have also thrilled many owners.

Today his paintings bear the beauty, the mood and the detail that few wildlife artists achieve. He is appreciated by the amateur for the beauty of his paintings, but more especially by the veteran naturalist for his meticulous treatment of feathers, fur and scales, as well as the foliage surrounding his subjects. His settings are authentic. His colors are unquestioned. His compositions are always interesting and sometimes surprising. Many well-known collectors of wildlife by Walt feel his paintings and sculpture are truly superb investments. They are reasonably priced with great promise of increasing in value as the artist gains in acceptance.

Recently Walt has broadened his media from watercolors and oils to sculpture. He has finished three of a series of six gamebirds which include wild turkeys, ring necked pheasants, bob white quail, mourning doves, mallard ducks and Canada geese. Like his paintings, these renderings are authentic with amazing attention to detail in spite of the rather small size of the subjects. There are to be limited editions of thirty bronze copies, selectively hand polished for maximum contrast. Finished bronzes are on display along with many of Walt's paintings at the Thompson Gallery of Original Art in Stephenville, Texas. Additional information on these collector's pieces is available from the artist.

RANDY SOUDERS
Randy Souders was born in Chickasha, Oklahoma, but became a Texan when he was two years old. At 10, his fondest dream was to become a fine artist. Dedication and desire enabled Randy to obtain his goal very early in his career. He is recognized throughout the southwest for his ability to achieve the intricate detail so prevalent in his work. The way he depicts an old railroad station, or a late 19th century mansion is so engrossing that it simply amazes the viewer.

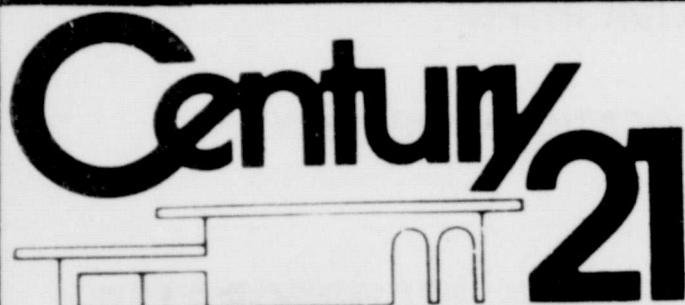
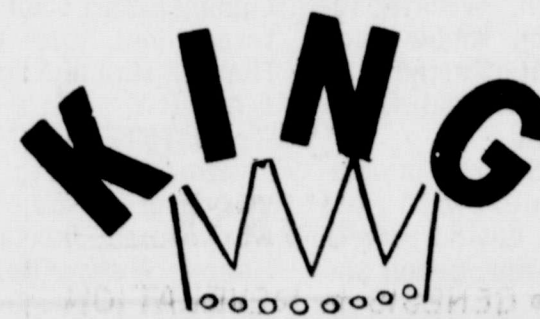

Mr. Strong and I Remember

Mr. C.A. Strong and my father C.A. Byars both worked at the Chestnut and Smith Gasoline Plant located on the hill just south of Ranger on the Eastland road. Oh! what SWEET MUSIC the name Gasoline Plant sounds to us today.

We remember drip gas. Drip gas was gasoline condensed in gas pipe lines. Some people used it in those early day cars.

The pipe lines had connections and at some of these connections the gasoline dripped out and a can or

barrel was placed under the drip to catch the gasoline. First come, first served was the usual policy of the gasoline consumption. It made the cars, spit, kick, belch, smoke, and backfire as well as ruined carburetors, but some people used it anyway.

We remember the road out of Ranger that forked at the foot of the Gasoline Plant Hill, one road went to Eastland and the other to Merriman. At this point there was located a grocery store on the East side of the fork and a blacksmith shop and later a gasoline station at the fork

owned by Fat Warner. The place was called Lingo City, a nickname. Then the brick Highway was built and was called Bankhead Highway. What an improvement over the old chug hole and rocky road we were accustomed to. Later more and bigger cars came into use and the Highway was re-topped and widened and became Highway 80. Still later a bigger and better highway was built and was called Interstate 20. Portions of Highway 80 still remain, as you travel Interstate 20 you will occasionally see a Highway 80 sign. You

are reminded of a chopped up fishing worm that still wiggles here and there.

We remember Merriman School where Mr. and Mrs. J.N. Poe and Miss Lola Browning were teachers. Miss Browning later became Mrs. S.A. Green of Eastland. The teachers were loved and respected. Mr. Poe was a kind and gentle teacher but could turn into a grizzly when things got out of line or control. Mr. Poe's assignment for an English Class was to compose a poem, bring it to class and read it. The one that was remembered by most of the class, because it was so funny, was composed by a boy.

His poem was as follows:
Old woman a spinning
That's the beginning
Cow and a calf
That's half
Butter on the wall
That's all.

In those days if you got into trouble at school it meant double trouble, when you got home you got it again.

We remember the box suppers at school and learned the prettiest box did not always contain the best goodies. The sing songs that we attended at school and children were called on to lead. Some of couldn't lead a goose to water much less lead a song, our parent's faces beamed at our efforts.

The play parties we had at our homes, the parents attended as well as the children. The parents visited

and had fellowship while the children played anti-over, flying dutchman, drop the handkerchief, London Bridge and many other games.

We remember the cracked rusty knuckles we children acquired playing marbles on an oil packed play ground. Only home made lye soap would clean our hands and knees. On the 4th of July we always had a big picnic and looked forward to the ten gallon can of Banner Ice Cream. Some of the kids sight read the name of the Ice Cream Company and for a long time thought of it as BANANA ICE CREAM CO.

We remember carrying our lunches to school in syrup buckets. Holes were punched in the lides to keep the food from sweating and getting soggy. We were allowed to eat our under the church brush arbor tabernacle. We traded biscuit and sausage

for a buttered sugared biscuit, as an example of trading.

The Merriman Church we remember, it so well. We had revival meetings under the old brush arbor and many of us were saved at these revivals. We had our Baptismal services in Colony Creek east of the bridge where the present Lake Leon Filtering Plant is now located. I think a scout was sent out to find a water hole that was at least preacher waist deep. We graduated from Merriman and went on to other schools and churches, we often wonder what became of the wealth that belonged to Merriman Church, School and Cemetery. At one time they were the richest in the nation. Oil wells all over the place. A request was made to move the dead from the cemetery so another oil well

could be drilled. Someone wrote the following:
Merriman Cemetery
All of olddom knew the answer, when the chairman shook his head, pointing past the man of millions at the city of the dead. "Why disturb the weary tenants in your narrow strip of sod?" 'Tis not ours, but theirs the title rested by the will of God. We the board have talked it over, pro and con with out avail. We reject your hundred thousand-Merriman is not for sale!"

The names of C.A. Strong's children were: Theola, Thommye and Doyce. The C.A. Byars children were: Clifford, Laura Lou and Noah. They went to church together, to school together and played together.

Mr. Strong will be celebrating his 100 birthday July the

27th. I have known Mr. Strong and his children since I was ten or eleven years of age.

Some of the names we remember at Merriman are, Lane, Gray, Henson, Landtroop, Williams, Graft, Strong, Byars, Brothers, Brewer, Coop, Fox, Boulter, Pugh, Stacks, Horton, Underwood and Burch to name a few.



Homemaking Tips

"Conservation cookin'" saves time, money and energy -- and "the proof" is in some actual recent tests. Homemakers and industry both share the task of making kitchen ranges more energy efficient -- and recent tests prove big savings are possible and easy.

Volunteers in a "conservation cookin'" test saved a whopping one-third in energy, just by the way they cooked, according to all reports.

Of course, that's the homemaker's part.

But what about industry? It, too, has a share in the task, and the appliance world is a buzz with word of new designs on the drawing boards and in testing stages -- all focusing on greater energy efficiency for ranges.

As consumers learn of the innovations in ranges, they can be on the lookout for them to study and compare -- then consumers will be more apt to insist on the most energy-saving features for their money, whenever they actually buy.

But, until industry's "brightest energy stars" hit the market, homemakers can save one-third - or more - right now just by learning the easy techniques of "conservation cookin'."

Before you learn what to do, remember the "what not to do's" first - since they make the big difference.

During the recent "conservation cookin'" tests, the energy wasters were found "guilty" of these practices:

- * they opened the oven door frequently,
- * they cooked on the high setting too long,
- * they turned on the wrong surface unit, and
- * they often failed to reduce the heat during cooking.

Once you have the "don't" firmly implanted in your mind, it's time to concentrate on the "do's."

Here's a test on "conservation cookin'" that teaches the techniques and pinpoints your own problems at the same time.

Answer "yes" to each of the questions below, and you're already successful at "conservation cookin'":

Do you --

- use flat-bottom pans that hug the surface element closely?
- use a pan size equal to the size of the surface element?
- turn the heat down as soon as the liquid starts boiling?
- turn down the electric surface units as soon as they're red?
- preheat only as long as necessary - and only for products that require a preheated oven (mainly baked items containing sugar.)?
- resist the temptation to open the oven door unnecessarily?
- keep from leaving the oven door open too long?
- If you had to say "no" to any of the questions, you need to change those cooking habits before you are an expert at "conservation cookin'".

Now for a peek into the industry crystal ball at what's to come in ranges.

Industry is working on several design changes to improve range energy efficiency.

Among those are smaller ovens, more and better insulation, no-window ovens, possibly smaller oven vents, improved oven doors and seals and flatter surface elements.

In addition, researchers are studying the use of oven-construction materials that absorb less heat.

All in all these insights and developments should go a long way toward making the energy picture a bit brighter.

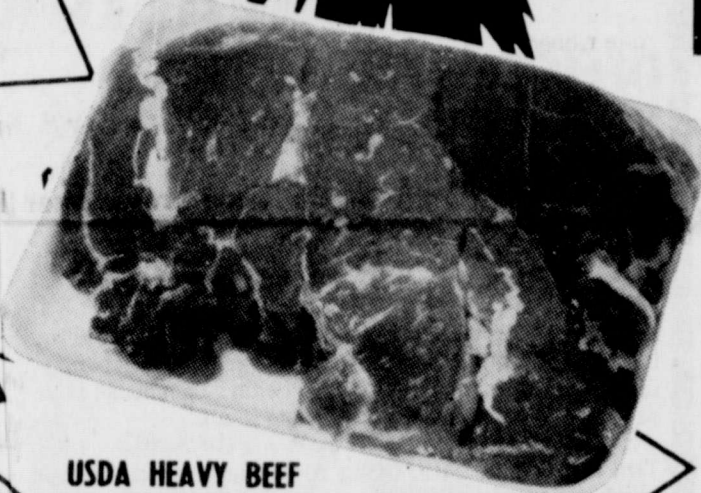

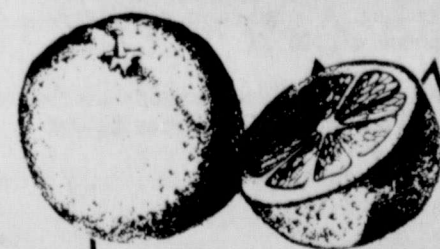

One unlawful possession of a controlled substance.

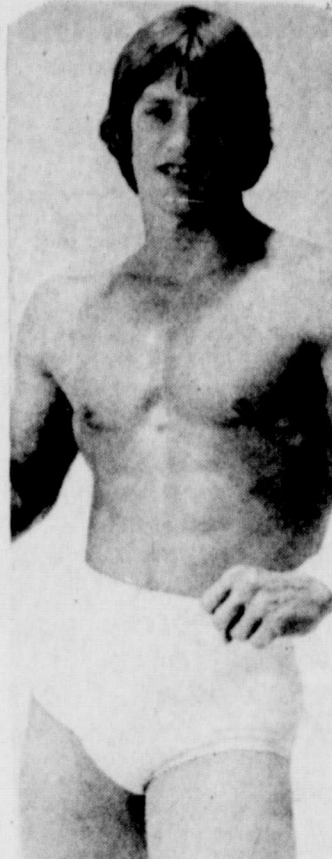

SOMETHING LIKE seven million gallons of Battle Creek water went into Lake Cisco during the rains of the past weeks, reports City Manager John Boland. The Battle Creek pumps and motors were overhauled a couple of months ago in readiness for spring rains.

Fire Department To Give Tornado Signals Here

C.W. Guthrie, chief of the Fire Department, has released the way to tell the difference between tornado watch and a tornado alert or warning.

When there is a tornado watch the fire sirens will be set to blast three times. The signal will be sounded for 40 seconds and 20 seconds off, 40 seconds on and 20 seconds off, with the final blast sounding for 40 seconds. Remember this is for a tornado watch. This means one should be prepared in case of a tornado.

When the authorities have received information concerning a sighted tornado the

fire sirens will operate on a continuous blast. This means one should seek cover, do not get in the car, do not go out of doors.

If at home, the bathroom or the hall is the safest place to be. Do not open the windows as this can cause the house to become explosive with sudden gust of wind rushing into the home.

Remember the signals and do not use the telephone in calling the fire department, except in case of fire, as the fireman will be busy.
