a few years ago," said Mr. Woolley. He said he hopes everyone will come by and view the artistic abilities of these men. He went on to say he believes the show will be interesting and fun for everyone to see.

The featured artists include Lyndy Benson, Walt Cude, Randy Souders, Bill Stevens, Paul Tadlock and Larry Wetherholt.

LYNDY BENSON Lyndy Benson is a staunch advocate of the western way of life. The Panorama of the old west and its transition into the modern-day working cowboy is

more than a legend to him. Lyndy has lived and worked on several large ranches. His work shows a vivid reality and his characters and subjects are genuine. His pencil renderings and paintings portray not only that sense of authenticity, but also a familiarity with his subjects that only a deep personal interest can achieve. His work can be found in private collections and in galleries throughout the southwest. He participates in rodeos and plans of one day hav-

ing a ranch of his own.

Since his graduation from high school in 1970, he has studied with well known artists from the Fort Worth Art Center and Texas Christian University. Lyndy also attended Tarrant County Junior College, where he studied Technical Illustration.

It is indeed fortunate for the art lover that Lyndy is capable of blending together the best of two major interests - the flavor of the west, and a skillful use of art media to portray his subjects with

maximum authenticity.

WALT CUDE

A native of deep East Texas and no stranger to all of Texas, Walt Cude was born in Palestine in 1933 and now lives in Fort Worth. As a boy he was fascinated with all of life, the sunlight, the trees and more especially the animals, birds and fishes. Hardwood river bottoms and the piney woods in many of his later-to-be subjects for paintings East Texas are a paradise for all of these. The settings, habits and life styles of were studied even at an early age. Fishing trips to the Gulf Coast and visits with relatives in the brush country of South Texas yielded a broader knowledge and exposure to the wildlife of the Southwest. Wide-eyed and energetic, his early studies soon blossomed into sketches and later to paintings, and very recently into the third dimension of sculpture. He graduated from high school at Palestine, entered the University of Texas as a Geology major, but after two years and two summers afield in West Texas and New Mexico he returned to his love of art. Transferring to Texas Christian University in 1955, he received a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in 1958.

From 1954 to 1963 he illustrated covers and story illustrations for the *Texas Parks and Wildlife* magazine. Working to please the magazine reviewing panel of experts was a difficult job. This experience made Walt more, alert, a greater student of detail of the subjects he has painted. The massive buffalo, the large-mouthed bass in its underwater surroundings, the horned owl, snowy owl, the eagle, the curious raccoon and its young, the sleepy opossum, the darting squirrel, birds

Tribute Paid Military Veterans At Cemetery

"It is fitting that we remember with deep gratitude those who forfeited their lives that our country might remain free," said Roy G. Hathaway, lay minister, in a talk at Memorial Day services Monday at Oakwood Cemetery here.

"We hope that we can repay through service our debt to these patriots. This gathering will, perhaps, offer a small measure of comfort to the loved ones assembled here."

Brad Kimbrough, commander of the John William Butts Post 123 of the American Legion, welcomed those attending. He placed a wreath at the cemetery to honor the war dead. The Rev. David Adkins, Methodist minister, gave the invocation.

Mr. Hathaway led the singing of several songs that, he noted, emphasize "our love of God and country." These songs included Battle Hymn of the Republic, America the Beautiful, God Bless America and America.

E.L. Jackson, veteran Legionnaire, was introduced by Mr. Hathaway praised for "your contributions of patriotism and to Americanism."

The program was concluded with the singing of "My Buddy" by the audience and the playing of "Taps" by Tim Jones, Cisco Junior College band director. After the service, miniature U.S. Flags were provided

by the Legion Post for use in decorating the graves of military veterans.

The cemetery flag flew at half mast until noon when it was raised to the top of the flag pole.

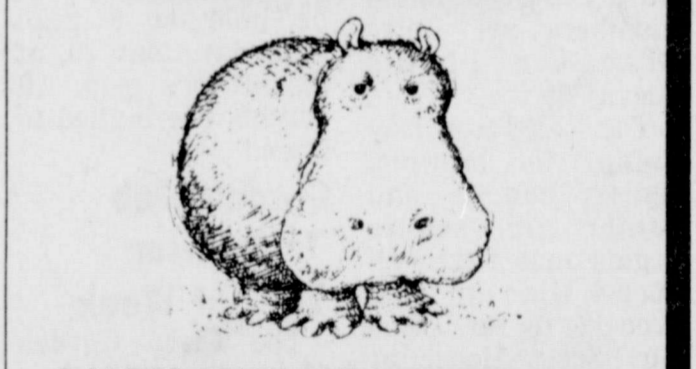

Two Ranger High School students representing Eastland County Farm Bureau will attend the 18th annual High School Citizenship Seminar on the Baylor University campus in Waco, July 14-18.

Janet Zarate, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Santos Zarate Sr. Terry Place, Ranger; and Richard Trice, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry W. Trice, 427 Hodges, Ranger were chosen to represent the county because of their leadership ability, scholastic achievement and character, said Ernest Reich county president.

This year's seminar speakers include Dr. Clifton Ganus, president of Harding University, Searcy, Arkansas; Alex Shekhe, Waco; Dr. C.L. Kay, president of the Institute for Business & Economic Education, Lubbock; W. Cleon, founder of the Freeman Institute, Provo, Utah; Dr. Thomas

Cunningham, a family life specialist, Stillwater, Oklahoma; and Jack Jackson, a flight instructor for American Airlines, Fort Worth. Dr. Ganus will cover "Understanding and Preserving Our American Heritage," "Moral Foundation of Freedom," and "Pyramid of Freedom." Shekhe will discuss "The Real Russia" as he left it three years ago. Dr. Kay will give a current report on the status of the Middle East based upon his recent visit to the area. Skousen will speak on "The History, Strategy and Tactics of the Communist Party" and "The Miracle of America." "Citizenship and Self-Esteem" and "Citizenship and the Family" will be the topics of Dr. Cunningham and "The Price of Free Enterprise" will be discussed by Jackson.

Also speaking at the seminar will be the 1979 Farm Bureau Queen Tracy Syma of

Sinton; the three Talent Find winners, Stephen Schwartz, Kay Collier, and Beverly Carothers, all of Goldthwaite; and the 1979 citizenship essay winner, Laura Henly of Childress and Jeanie Powell of Ralls. The students attending the citizenship seminar will have the opportunity to enter the first annual LEB Young Speakers for Free Enterprise.

To enter, students will need to present at least three speeches on free enterprise during July 21-September 12, 1980 and be Farm Bureau members.

Students wishing to compete will enter a district contest during September 22-October 15, 1980. Two students will be selected from each district contest to compete in the state contest to be held at the 1980 TFB convention in San Antonio, November 30-December 3, 1980.

Best Pecan Spray Time

County Extension Agent, DeMarquis Gordon, predicts the best to spray will be during the period of May 29 through June 2.

Gordon suggests that owners of pecan trees check their trees to determine the best time to spray. One good method is to flag 50 to 100 pecan clusters with tape or ribbon. Check these clusters each day and when one sees the first entry into pecan by the small worms, begin spraying on that day.

Insecticides are often applied too early for effective control of the worms.

of all feather, the game fowl such as geese, quail, pheasant, and the wild turkey are some of the subjects he has mastered. His portraits of pets have also thrilled many owners.

Today his paintings bear the beauty, the mood and the detail that few wildlife artists achieve. He is appreciated by the amateur for the beauty of his paintings, but more especially by the veteran naturalist for his meticulous treatment of feathers, fur and scales, as well as the foliage surrounding his subjects. His settings are authentic. His colors are unquestioned. His compositions are always interesting and sometimes surprising. Many well-known collectors of wildlife by Walt feel his paintings and sculpture are truly superb investments. They are reasonably priced with great promise of increasing in value as the artist gains in acceptance.

Recently Walt has broadened his media from watercolors and oils to sculpture. He has finished three of a series of six gamebirds which include wild turkeys, ring necked pheasants, bob white quail, mourning doves, mallard ducks and Canada geese. Like his paintings, these renderings are authentic with amazing attention to detail in spite of the rather small size of the subjects. There are to be limited editions of thirty bronze copies, selectively hand polished for maximum contrast. Finished bronzes are on display along with many of Walt's paintings at the Thompson Gallery of Original Art in Stephenville, Texas. Additional information on these collector's pieces is available from the artist.

RANDY SOUDERS
Randy Souders was born in Chickasha, Oklahoma, but became a Texan when he was two years old. At 10, his fondest dream was to become a fine artist. Dedication and desire enabled Randy to obtain his goal very early in his career. He is recognized throughout the southwest for his ability to achieve the intricate detail so prevalent in his work. The way he depicts an old railroad station, or a late 19th century mansion is so engrossing that it simply amazes the viewer.

Realizing that this young man's talent and dedication help to enhance a cherished segment of our fading American heritage, many people are adding his nostalgic works to their collections.

Randy loves the outdoors and all competitive sports but a very unfortunate accident occurred in 1972. His neck and back were broken while diving in a local lake. He remains partially paralyzed and is still confined to a wheel chair. Although at times painting is very difficult, Randy has

never abandoned his desire to become a highly proficient artist.

Randy Souders received his Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Texas at Arlington.

BILL STEVENS
To Bill Stevens, the portrayal of all his subjects, from a furry raccoon to the fierce African elephant, presents a challenge to achieve total accuracy. His patient, painstaking effort to achieve this goal is recognized and appreciated by art collectors everywhere. Bill's paintings compliment the homes and offices of clients throughout the world.

Bill is a native Texan, now living in Fort Worth. He was born in Ranger, Texas, in 1923, where, as a boy, he spent every possible moment in the outdoors, mesmerized by what it had to offer. He studied all wildlife, their habits and their environment. His boyhood experiences and a strong desire to become an artist prompted him to pursue a career in art.

Bill began his formal studies at the American Academy of Art at Chicago and upon completion, continued his studies through private instruction under such renowned artists as Karl Sula and Glenn Babcock.

Bill Stevens is comfortable with all media, but he prefers watercolor, pencil and oil.

PAUL TADLOCK
"Sculpting is an exciting and exacting experience," says Paul Tadlock. One of the world's handful of premier Wildlife Sculptors, Tadlock is uniquely qualified to make the judgement. His works grace prominent displays in museums, galleries and discriminating private collections around the world.

From his studios in Fort Worth, Tadlock roams Mexico, Alaska, Canada and the Continental U.S. to photograph, study, hunt, lecture and display his sculptures.

"The way I figure it, I'm four years behind," he says of his work, and the demand for it.

He had already achieved an executive career in industry when he decided in 1973 that sculpting was what he had to do. He resigned his job and set to work.

His engineering background helped him scale his sculptures to precise proportions. His first piece, Pronghorn Antelope, drew immediate critical acclaim from artists and from laymen. The edition sold out in weeks.

Tadlock then set a primary goal: to sculpt a series of the twenty big game animals indigenous to North America. No other sculptor has ever undertaken such an ambitious goal.

No ivory tower artist, his care with detail is achingly exact and he sets high standards for his work.

Southwest Art magazine describes his work: "...one gets the feeling that the pieces are capable of movement." "...he researches each specimen down to the smallest detail." "His stone sheep is poised on a crag with forefeet suspended in space. His whitetail deer half crouches in a covert."

Wildlife and wilderness areas have been an integral part of this tall, native Texan since he was a young man.

Bronze is his primary medium although he also works in other metals. "Part of me is in every work I do," he adds.

That 'work' is superb...perhaps unmatched.

Tadlock was born in Housotn, Texas, and moved to Dallas with his family while still a young boy. He began hunting with gun and camera when he was 23.

Married and the father of two grown children, Tadlock has attended the University of Texas, Austin; North Texas State University and received his ABA degree from the University of Texas in Arlington.

He is a member of 13 art and wildlife organizations including Safari Club International and the Hunting Hall of Fame. **LARRY**

WETHERHOLT
"How on earth do you describe someone with as many facets as Larry Wetherholt? Where do you begin to tell about a man who has been everything from a grave digger to a laboratory technician? From his days as a short-order cook and restaurant manager to ownership of his own graphic arts studio, Larry's background has been as colorful as his flaming red beard," states a printed brochure by Frank Monte.

Mr. Monte continues in his statement on Wetherholt, "His roots are plainly here in the midwest farm belt and his work reflects that ingrained respect for the soil and for growing, living things. A 15-month hitch with the marines in Japan and the Far East nurtured his deep appreciation for delicate flowers lines and muted textures.

"The man is constantly busy - a dervish involved with more projects than three ordinary people. Let's see--since I've known Larry he's been caught up in bee-keeping...wine making...rock polishing...photography and film animation...sculpture (clay, stone, wood and beeswax)...bow hunting...leather working...fishing...jade carving...and who knows how much more.

"He's an historical buff with interests centering on the old west and the American Indian. Occasionally he gives into a deep-seated love of the circus that manifests itself in a quick chalk rendering of a clown.

"And with all these 'favorite' things to



wallow-in and to draw from Larry still finds time to be incredibly prolific in his studio (which needless to say, he finished himself). It's certainly not unusual for him to bring a still-wet painting to work, describing it as, "just something I whomped-out last night." A lunch hour is sufficient for him to produce two finished pen and ink sketches.

"Like any non-artist, I'm consistently amazed at the way Larry can detect the character and beauty in the most ordinary scene. A dilapidated house--the back of some dreary tenements--a rusting locomotive--a sewing machine--they all take on a surprising warmth and charm when Larry has transferred them to his canvas. His sketch book is a kaleidoscope of Indian scenes, anatomy studies, family portraits, wildlife drawings, landscapes, seascapes,

remembered scenes from the Orient and imagined scenes from places he's never been. "So how do you describe someone so thoroughly alive and involved? Is he a modern renaissance man? Perhaps, although he'd be uncomfortable with that description."

Wetherholt was born in Decatur, Illinois. He is married to Dorothy Elizabeth and they have five children.

He has been a member of the Board of Directors--Decatur Area Arts Council, past Keynote speaker at annual Missouri Council of Arts, past lecturer at Southwest Missouri State College, one man show at Southwest Missouri State College, exhibited in 19th annual Illinois Art Exhibit, 1976--Macon County Purchase Award.

His paintings are in the collections of: City of Tokorazara, Japan; A.B. Chance Company; A.E. Staley Mfg. Company; Biddle Advertising Company; State Farm Insurance Company; Macon County; Various Private Collections

throughout the U.S. His works are produced in most mediums with a primary interest in oil and watercolor.

Local Writers Are Busy, Busy

Some places, like politicians, go to great lengths to hire the right Public Relations Consultants so they will have plenty of favorable publicity. Eastland County, however, is fortunate enough to receive a priceless amount of publicity—and it costs nothing. This comes from an amazing group of authors, journalists and publishers who live and work right in this area. This talented group is involved in newspaper work, teaching, and writing free-lance material which reaches across the nation and into other parts of the world. A number of these working writers belong to the Cisco Writers' Club, an organization which sponsors a number of annual events promoting journalism.

Writers usually prefer to discuss their work rather than themselves, but biographical facts are available about some of these authors.

When "Cisco" is mentioned to readers of the Abilene Reporter-News, they usually think of one of the Eastland County Correspondents—Helen Wallace. Mrs. Wallace writes the Cisco news, and has written many feature articles as well. "Helen", as she is affectionately called in the area, is married to Norman Wallace, President of Cisco Junior College. His profession has carried them to Houston, Evadale, Starkville, Mississippi, and Amarillo. The Wallaces, with their two sons, came to Cisco in 1974. Shortly afterward Helen began writing news articles for Cisco Press, and later had a column "Cisco Tally" in the Lake Country Star.

Jay Staggs engaged Mrs. Wallace to read features on area people over KERC Radio during the last two years that he owned the station.

Helen has written numerous articles for magazines, and these have appeared in Grit, Flower and Garden, Accent, Law Reserve, and Fences Industry. On some of these publications, she has made duplicate sales. Photography is included as part of her profession, and she illustrates most of her articles. She has a large file of colored transparencies on flowers, scenics, wildlife, and people.

Along with her writing, Helen spends much time on community and Civic affairs. She has held a number of offices in the Cisco Writer's Club, and is Vice President at the present time.

Helen, who spent her childhood in East Texas, attended Stephen F. Austin in Nacogdoches, and received her B.S. in Journalism from Sam

Houston State University, at Huntsville.

Bill M. Roberst, Journalism Instructor at Cisco Junior College, and Director of Student Publications, is a talented newcomer to the local writing scene. He came to Cisco in 1978, bringing a number of impressive credits with him. He is a former Sports Writer, Assistant Sports Editor and Sports Editor of the Odessa American, the Casa Grande, Ariz., Dispatch, and the Abilene Reporter-News. He has written feature stories for the Reporter-News, Tennis Times Magazine, and Texas coach. He has been a Columnist for the Odessa American, The Reporter-News, and the Casa Grande Dispatch. He has also been a Graduate Assistant Instructor of Journalism at Abilene Christian University.

Bill lists his birthplace as Hollis, Oklahoma, but is very much at home in Eastland County. He is interested in local history, and writing a historical book at present. He, with his wife and three children, lives in Cisco, and is a member of the Cisco Writer's Club.

Another newcomer, Marilyn Smith, has Degrees in various fields. She graduated from the University of Texas at Austin with Bachelor's Degrees in English and Journalism, and did Post-graduate work at Southwestern Texas State for a paralegal Degree. Marilyn works for the C.S. Boose and Associates Law Firm. She and her husband, Vernon Smith, moved to Cisco from Austin a few months ago. The Smiths have a small daughter.

This is Marilyn's first time to live in Cisco. She was born in West Plains, Missouri, in 1950, but moved to Kress, Texas, when two years old. Her interest in drama, prose, and poetry has continued through most of her life. She worked for the Plainview Reporter-News for two years, writing and doing a number of other tasks. In 1972 she had a poem published in Portals, a Writer's Magazine from Wayland Baptist College. In 1978 she made a lengthy report to the Texas House of Representatives on the subject of Foreign Trade Zones and Their Application to Texas. In 1974 she won a Lion's Club Peace Essay contest with an article entitled "Peace Is..."

The name Vida Killion brings pleasant thoughts to Eastland County, but it is known far beyond this area.

Vida (Frazier) Killion was born near Blue Ridge, Texas. She graduated from local

schools and East Texas State Teacher's College (Now East Texas State U.). She was a reporter for the college paper, and had poems published in same. She married Pastor O.T. Killion, Assemblies of God Church, in 1933, and was licensed as an Assemblies of God Minister the same year. In 1944 she was ordained. In all pastorates Mrs. Killion wrote news for Church activities and Civic affairs. In Assemblies of God Publications she has had articles published in Sunday School Counselor, and at least ten "How-To" articles which have literally gone around the world. In The Pentecost-

al Evangel she has written many news stories over the years, and articles: "Testimony of Healing," "How Do I Go To Sunday School?" and "I Almost Missed Christmas."

Tax Board Urges Equalization Revue

AUSTIN—The State Property Tax Board (SPTB) today reminded Texans of their right to appear before local boards of equalization to appeal values assigned to their property for ad valorem tax purposes.

SPTB Executive Director Kenneth Graeber noted that "the right to appear before the board of equalization is the single most important remedy available to taxpayers regarding the value placed on property."

"The board of equalization is the taxpayer's opportunity to be heard in an informal setting and without incurring expensive court costs," Graeber added.

He pointed out that each local government which collects property taxes must have a board of equalization (BOE) to hear taxpayer appeals on values, and that most BOEs meet in the period ranging from May until about mid-July.

Taxpayers who rendered their property to the local assessor must be notified of the time and place of the board of equalization meeting the assessor raised the value rendered.

Even those who did not render still have the right to appear before the BOE, but persons in this category will have to learn on their own when the board will meet. Graeber pointed out that BOE meetings are open to the public, and the time and place must be posted in the administration office of the jurisdiction and with the appropriate county clerk. A city BOE, however, is not required to file notice with the county clerk.

The information is also available from each local tax office by phone; and, at least 10 days before the board meets, notices must also be published in a local newspaper.

Graeber said there are two basic situations in which taxpayers are entitled to receive an adjustment in their tax value:

If it exceeds local market values—if you can find and

submit to the BOE the kind of evidence which indicates that the value assigned to your property is too high, then you would be entitled to a reduction in its valuation.

If it is valued higher than similar property—Regardless of what other property like yours is selling for, the value of your property on the tax roll should be about the same as the value for all similar properties in the jurisdiction.

The State Property Tax Board director reminded taxpayers that the BOE's sole authority is over the value of property. "The board must limit the taxpayer's discussion only to matters concerning property values. Discussions regarding the amount of taxes or the injustice of taxation merely waste the taxpayer's time."

"These complaints should be referred to the appropriate governing bodies," Graeber added.

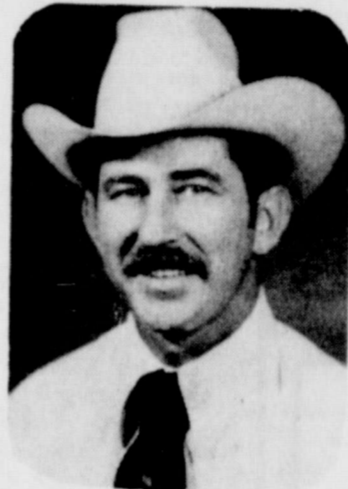

Effort Underway To Exempt Small Royalty Owners

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Congressman Charles W. Stenholm announced today that a major effort is now underway in the Congress to exempt small royalty owners from the recently enacted windfall profits tax.

Stenholm recently introduced legislation which would exempt the royalty owner of up to 10-barrels-per-day of royalty interest under the windfall tax. The bill, H.R. 7211, is similar to one introduced by Congressman Keith Sebelius, R-Kansas, introduced about the same time.

Stenholm said that he and Representative Sebelius have decided to join forces in an effort to improve the chances of getting the legislation through Congress. While he expects passage to be an uphill battle, Stenholm said he believed many representatives in the Congress are beginning to realize the need to deal with some of the "injustices" of the windfall profits tax.

The Congressman went on to point out that many small royalty owners, faced with today's high inflation, are dependent upon their royalty checks to help offset economic difficulties. This is especially true of retired persons, whose royalty checks help supplement their social security payments, he said.

The Stenholm-Sebelius effort now has about 50 co-sponsors and Stenholm said that he expected more to join in the initiative. "We are determined to obtain this exemption and have every intention of fighting this thing through the Congress," Stenholm ended.
