Lions Hear Air Force General At Weekly Meet

The United States should have a defense budget that would assure a balanced military organization that will always be strong enough to protect the people and keep its shores free from attack. That was an opinion expressed by General Dennis B. Sullivan, Strategic Air Force Division commander, in a talk Wednesday noon at the weekly luncheon of the Cisco Lions Club. General Sullivan, who commands SAC units at three military bases, is headquartered at Dyess AFB.

The congress controls the size and strength of the military, General Sullivan said. President Carter cut the B-1 bomber program and sharply reduced the DOD budget when he took office, but General Sullivan believes the president now is having new thoughts.

SAC's bombers, the B-52s, are all over 20 years old and need updating, the general said. A new program should include all developments and progress since the B-1 originated, he added.

Russia spent 100 billion dollars more on defense than the United States in the last 10 years, General Sullivan said. The USSR now spends an average of 18 to 15 percent more each year than the USA.

General Sullivan noted that a billion dollars spent on defense generates some 70,000 jobs. With the nation's welfare and jobless spending growing by leaps and bounds, he wondered if defense spending wouldn't be a good way to improve the economy.

Retention is a big problem with the military, General Sullivan said. An adjustment in pay scales would improve this situation, he believes, noting that military pay is some 20% below comparable jobs in private industry.

Lion Norm Richardson introduced the speaker. Boss Lion Archie Chamness introduced Willard Johnson and Ken Parker as Lion Cubs and said they would be initiated in the near future.

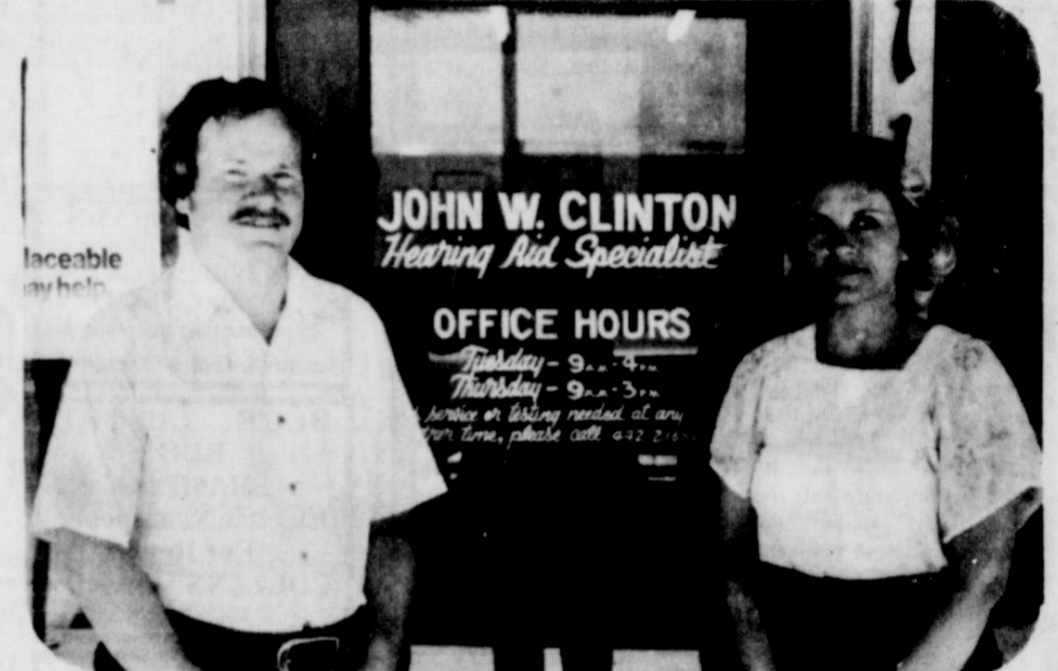

Rats In The Garden

During the last few weeks, many complaints, regarding rats eating garden vegetables, have been made.

Being unconfined, these rats pose particular problems for their elimination. Different techniques must be used for their control. Since most complaints are about rats eating garden vegetables, their food supply cannot be cut off (i.e. you wouldn't destroy the garden to get rid of the rats). An effort should be made to eliminate as many rat harborage as possible. Lumber and trash piles, stacks of wood for the fireplace, abandoned cars and appliances all make excellent rat homes. The rat's water supply should be cut off. Buckets, tubs, barrels, birdbaths, old tires, cans, and ditches all collect water and are used by rats for drinking. Food in the form of dog food and seeds stored in utility rooms and mower houses is another strong attraction for rats.

GORDON SPOT

If you got your pecan trees sprayed the first few days of June, you probably got good control of the pecan case-bearer. We found the first entry of the small worms into the pecans on June 2. Trees not sprayed during the last week probably have had much of the crop destroyed.

We had some good rains during May and our soil has a pretty adequate supply of moisture. However, the high winds and warm temperatures we have been experiencing is taking the moisture out fast.

One way we can conserve the moisture in our vegetable gardens to apply a mulch to the soil surface. Mulch is simply any material spread on the ground to protect the plant roots from heat, cold or drought, to reduce weed problems, and to keep fruit clean. And with hot summer weather approaching, mulch can be just the thing to keep that garden producing a little longer.

Several kinds of mulches work well and have a place in the home garden.

Clear plastic is one. It warms the soil early and more than other mulches. However, it stimulates weed seed germination and growth. Clear plastic works well if weeds are not a problem.

Black plastic also warms the soil early in the season and also greatly reduces the weed population but will control nutgrass. Adequate soil moisture should be available when black plastic is applied. Water by using drip system or water soakers beneath the plastic.

Paper is also a good mulch. Newspaper is used widely as a mulch. Several sheets of newspaper laid flat over the

surface of the row work well as a mulch. However, it reduces soil temperature, so it's best to apply paper after crops are growing and the soil is warm. As with black plastic, apply paper when the soil contains good moisture. Unlike plastic, the paper deteriorates and does not need removing at the end of the gardening season.

Organic mulches such as compost, leaves, grass, clippings, peanut hulls, and hay are by far the most common. They reduce soil temperature and save moisture in the summer. You should not use organic mulches too early in the spring because they allow the soil to warm very slowly. Organic mulches help prevent soil crusting, control weeds, prevent erosion, lessen fruit rot, save moisture and reduce summer temperatures. Apply the organic mulches at a depth of one to two inches around growing plants. With organic mulches, increase the amount of garden fertilizer by about one-fourth to compensate for nutrients used by micro-organisms during the breakdown process. At the end of the season, turn under organic mulches to improve the soil's condition.

The Light Touch

People sometimes stumble over the truth. However, most of them get up and hurry away as if nothing had happened.

The cry of a baby is the most touching sound in the world—for the first five minutes.

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Homemaking Tips

By Janet Thomas

Most food prices will rise this year but not as much as the past two years. According to the USDA economists, they predict we may even see a price decline for pork, poultry, and eggs.

In general, expect an eight percent rise as tops, the USDA economists say.

Economists view this as better than last year's eleven percent rise and the 1978 rise of ten percent, but they caution the consumer about one "hitch"—weather.

If weather plays a damaging role in farm production, then we might see the same eleven percent rise in food prices as we saw last year.

Why do prices keep rising in spite of plentiful food supplies generally?

Inflation and the rising costs of energy and transportation account for the bulk of the sharp increases, and the farm-production side adds another one percent.

Here's a forecast from USDA economists on specific food items:

Look for the biggest price rises on cereal and bakery goods, beef and veal, fish and seafood, fresh vegetables, processed fruits and vegetables, other prepared foods, dairy products, sugar, and other sweets.

Look for smaller increases on other meats—even a price drop on pork, poultry and eggs.

Other items that will reflect smaller increases are fresh fruits, fats and oils, and non-alcoholic beverages.

Combat rising food costs and inflation! Food preservation will provide your family with fruit and vegetables the year around at lower cost. The Eastland County Extension Service will be sponsoring a HOME FOOD PRESERVATION WORKSHOP on Wednesday, June 11th from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. and again on Thursday, June 12th from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. The workshop sessions will be held in the Texas Electric Reddy Room in Eastland.

Free food preservation bulletins will be available at the sessions, or by calling the County Extension Service office, 629-2222.

The FOOD PRESERVATION WORKSHOP is for young and old alike.

If you've never canned and want to learn, plan to attend. If you've canned for years, come and refresh your memory in recommended procedures.

The Workshop is free and everyone is invited to attend.
