WE RECEIVED a report that the Tommy Ball family at 206 Avenue I in Cisco, have a pea patch in their garden which is planted to spell their last name (BALL).

CISCO HAS STILL been blessed lately with some fine showers which help cool things off a little and make plants grow. There should be some fine gardens this year and some very pretty yards, if the rains continue to fall in this area.

Let's all hope they continue falling so the level of Lake Cisco may rise a few feet (or even inches) this year.

A WHEN BAD thunderstorm approaches the Cisco area, a lot of people begin thinking of tornadoes. Unfortunately, the United States has become known as the 'tornado capital of the world" due to the frequency of twisters occuring in an area known as "tornado alley." "Tornado alley" extends from Texas north through Oklahoma, Kansas, Nebraska and Missouri.

In that "alley," from April through June, warm air flowing northward from the Gulf of Mexico collides with cold, dry winds blowing south from Canada, according to the National Wildlife Federation bimonthly report, and these "discordant elements" give birth to the violent thunderstorms that spawn tornadoes.

Also according to the report, if 1980 is an average year, some 600 to 1,200 tornadoes will kill about 120 Americans before this year's tornado season is over.

The following information comes from the above mentioned report and is interesting, if not somewhat alarming, due to the fact that this is the tornado season for this area.

A tornado (from tornada, the Spanish word for thunderstorms) is a rotating column of air spinning around a vacuum. "Erupting from a cumulonimbus, or thunder cloud, this funnel is made of condensed water; in effect it is a cloud itself," says National Wildlife. When the "cloud" reaches the ground,

operations based in Cisco, volunteered to donate labor and equipment for the runway dirt work.

The city has some \$100,000 in cash 'matching funds' from TAC for the aiport project, Mr. Boland said. The city's share or matching funds includes credit for \$60,000 for the land and \$7,600 for fencing. The fencing was accomplished with a cash outlay of about \$2,000 with the balance in donated labor by individuals.

Both Mr. Boland and Chairman Ronnie Ledbetter of the City Airport Advisory Board agreed that the EnRe contribution would be sufficient to provide virtually all of the balance of needed "matching funds." The project provides that the city's share of the cost can either be cash or "in kind" labor. The airport zoning board, which was appointed several weeks ago, met with Mayor Roy Cartee and City Manager Boland at the Chamber of Commerce offices last week and reviewed the project. The board includes Gerald Winnett, Gordon Strawn, J.W. Sitton and Mr. Ledbetter. This group nominated Dr. Chief Brown to be the 5th member and chairman of the board. Airport funds on hand include some \$7,500 in money donated by Cisco citizens and business firms. Mr. Ledbetter said that a similar amount is expected to

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it picks up dirt and debris which makes it turn black in color. Its great destructive power comes from the high, twisting velocity of its winds, which can churn at more than 400 miles per hour.

Scientists do not know why tornadoes form in some clouds and not in others. Because most twisters are short-lived and seldom travel more than 15 miles, they are extremely difficult to study. T. Theodore Fujita, a University of Chicago meteorologist who is considered the nation's leading authority on twisters, told National Wildlife, "If you look at a world map for places that are likely to have tornadoes, you look for areas where warm moisture can move inland onto a continent from tropical waters, uninterrupted by mountains.

Usually, twisters spin in a counterclockwise rotation. traveling northeasterly at about 40 miles per hour. Most of them fizzle out in less than half an hour. "But occasionally," reports National Wildlife, "twisters come in bunches over a longer period of time." In this century this has happened three times:

*On March 18, 1925, seven tornadoes ripped across a 437-mile area of Missouri, Illinois and Indiana. The largest of them covered more than 200 miles and killed nearly 700 people.

"On March 18, 1965, a massive siege of 37 twisters covered 835 miles in six states. Some 800 people died and property damage surpassed \$300 million.

*On April 3 and 4, 1974, the greatest tornado eruption in the nation's history occurred. In a 16-hour period, no fewer than 148 twisters gouged through 13 states east of the Mississippi River, covering 2,000 miles and killing about 300 people. The damage amounted to more than a half-billion dollars.

The worst tornado of last year struck the north Texas town of Wichita Falls on April 10, 1979-a day local citizens now call "Terrible Tuesday." For 20 minutes in the late afternoon the city of 100,000 people was struck by

a violent tornado whose winds rotated at more than 200 miles per hour, killing 45 people and destroying about \$400 million worth of property. Wichita Falls is on the southern tip of tornado alley. Meteorologists predict that in the heart of tornado alley, chances are that a specific location might be struck by a twister about once every 250 years. "But tornado patterns do not fit mathematical models," explains National Wildlife. Oklahoma City has been hit by twisters 32 times since 1892. And the community of Codell, Kansas, amazingly, was hit three years in a row-1916, 1917 and 1918-on

the same day, May 20. Researchers may never be able to prevent tornadoes. although Fujita has been able to break up scaled-down twisters in his laboratory. Fortunately, advances have been made in tornado detection. In Norman, Okla., a 30-foot dome houses a radar system operated by the National Severe Storms Laboratory. A year ago, the system picked up alomst every twister in the area, and enabled weathermen to locate some tornadoes a half

an hour before they hit. The tornado report is National Wildlife's fourth in a series on violent natural phenomena. The others covered tidal waves, earthquakes, lightning and volcanoes.

If a tornado approaches your area, National Wildlife offers this advice: "Go to the basement or innermost room of the house or building, away from windows. Cover yourself with pillows and mattresses. If you are in a car, get out quickly and lie in a ditch, culvert or other low spot. In the Wichita Falls storm, 25 of the 45 people killed were in automobiles; 16 of them had gotten into their cars, hoping to

escape.
