JULY 4TH is upon us folks, with it being this Friday. Since the holiday falls on a press day, we will be moving the press run up to Thursday so the newspapers' employees will not have to work. I HOPE everyone is planning to attend the July 4th festivities which will be held at the Cisco City Park on that day. I am sure there will be plenty of cold drinks available to quench your thirst during the hot day. Then after dark, you can sit, or stand, and watch the fireworks display of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce.

IN CASE YOU have not noticed, we are in the middle of a heat wave and the temperatures have been constantly reaching above 100 degrees in Cisco. Saturday was perhaps the hottest day so far, with the highest temperature reading I saw on that day being 109 degrees. That is hot.

THE MONDAY night City Championship game for the Cisco Little League was won by the Major Braves. They will be going to Breckenridge soon to play in that city. The Braves defeated the Major Giants in the championship battle, which was dedicated to Pat Nixon. Mr. Nixon, an assistant coach for the Giants, was killed here in an auto accident Saturday morning.

WITH THE mention of the Fourth of July, we would like to caution you to be extremely careful this year if you plan to set off any fireworks of your own. Please avoid using fireworks in any area which might catch something on fire. The Allstate Insurance Company has released the figures for two of several thousand similar incidents, all of which occurred the same day:

*Fresno, Calif.—Rockets landed on the roof of a motel. They destroyed the upper floor of one wing. Twelve second-story rooms were totally destroyed. Twelve others on the ground floor were damaged by water. One fire fighter was injured. Investigators found additional rockets on both sides of the building after the fire.

*Denton, Texas—Rockets caused severe damage when they landed on the roof of a home. The resulting fire destroyed 75 percent of the roof covering and damaged the attic area. The rest of the house and its contents were damaged by water. After the fire, several additional rockets were found around the house.

The rockets that caused approximately \$270,000 in property damage to the structures in these two July 4 incidents—and millions of dollars of property damage countrywide—were bottle rockets, the kinds used by overzealous Americans to celebrate the nation's independence.

Council Accepts Resignation, Appoints Acting City Manager

The City Council accepted the resignation of City Manager John Boland immediately and named City Secretary Marilyn Smith as acting city manager at a special meeting at 6 p.m. Friday at City Hall.

An earlier decision to act on Mr. Boland's resignation, which had been submitted at a

special meeting June 26th to be effective July 11th, was ignored when the new special was called in a notice posted at City Hall. The notice was signed by City Councilmen William J. Eudy, Jerry Jeffcoat and Louise Allison.

Mrs. Smith had been employed by the City Council about two

weeks before the meeting to fill a vacancy as City Secretary.

Despite short notice, the posted notice attracted a capacity crowd and Abilene newspaper and television reporters. Mayor Roy Cartee presided at the meeting, which was attended by Councilmen Eudy, Jeffcoat, Allison and Lucy Collier. Councilmen Raymond Whitley and Harold Pippen were absent.

After Mayor Cartee called the meeting to order, Councilman Eudy reported that he had initiated the special meeting "so we can act on the resignation matter and get back to normal." He made a motion that Mr. Boland's resignation "be accepted now and that he be paid in full until July 11th." Mr. Jeffcoat seconded the motion.

Mrs. Collier, whose motion that action be delayed until the regular July 8th meeting, asked why the new action was being taken. Mr. Eudy answered that "we are receiving undue publicity and I am afraid it will continue." He added that "we will hire an acting city manager and put the word out that we are seeking a city manager."

Mayor Cartee asked Mr. Boland if he had any objections, and Mr. Boland replied that he did not.

Attorney Truman Kirk was recognized. He told the Council

they had a weak case in calling the meeting an emergency. He noted that "your city attorney is out of town, and I suggest that you wait until the regular meeting to act."

Mayor Cartee, ignoring the suggestion, called for a vote on accepting the Boland resignation immediately. Mrs. Collier cast the only vote against the motion.

The mayor then asked consideration of the second item, and Mrs. Allison moved that Marilyn Smith be named acting city manager. Mr. Eudy seconded the motion. After brief discussion, the council voted in favor of the motion with Mrs. Collier causing a "no" vote.

Mrs. Allison then noted that she understood Mr. Boland had no objections to being relieved before July 11th.

The Rev. Buddy Sipe, pastor of the First Baptist Church, was recognized and he told the council that he has lived in Cisco five years and has enjoyed life in the community. He noted that he disliked seeing turmoil. He praised John Boland as a man and as a public official and urged all efforts for harmony and unity.

Mr. Sipe closed the meeting with a prayer in which he asked "forgiveness for being unkind to one another" and sought guidance for actions to weld and mould the community into one unit.

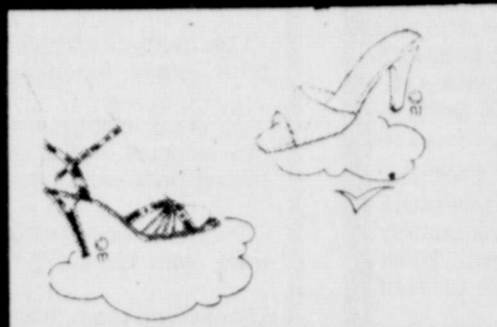

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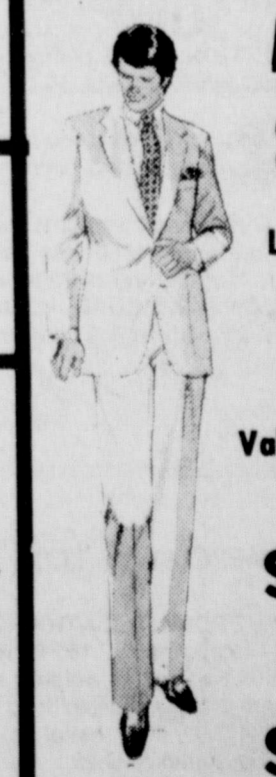

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Dorothy Farnsworth Wins Women's Golf Championship

The sports-minded people of Eastland County will remember June of 1980 for more than its early summer heat wave. For on June 13th, at the Country Club in Abilene Dorothy (Mrs. Major) Farnsworth of Cisco won the Championship of the Women's West Texas Golf Association - First Place in the 5th Flight. This was a great thrill for the slender,

auburn-haired player, who had previously won the Cisco City Championship for the first time. This local honor, she says, "is almost as hard as winning First somewhere else, since there are so many fine players right here." Two of the top Cisco Women Golfers went with Mrs. Farnsworth to the West Texas Tournament, and won places. Mrs. Mary Ann Perry placed second in 4th Flight,

and Letha Stafford won Consolation in the 4th Flight.

The local golfers were among 144 women from West Texas who were invited to compete. Mrs. Farnsworth's top form and smooth, hard-driving strokes brought her into the lead. This was her first win on a State level, although she had won in area Tournaments. She has played at Eastland, Brownwood, Abilene, Baird, and Granbury.

In many ways Mrs. Farnsworth's life is similar to that of other women of this area. She and her husband, Major, live on an acreage northwest of Cisco. Dorothy works during school terms as the Principal's Secretary at Intermediate School. Major works for the Railroad, raises cattle, and has other business interests. Their sons are grown now, with Bill in the army in Korea, and Larry in Odessa. The Farnsworths are members of the First Baptist Church in Cisco, where both fill offices in the Sunday School. Dorothy has coached a Girl's Softball Team, and is Coaching a High School Girl's Golf Team. But what really sets Dorothy Farnsworth apart

from women who simply like to watch a Football game or Tennis match is the intensity of her devotion to individual attainment in sports.

For Golf is a very individual game. It is similar, in its need for rhythm and coordination, to playing music. "I used to play the piano," Dorothy says. "And there's something similar in the way your train and arm and hand have to work together smoothly. You must practice and practice. I play what I can during the winter, but most of my real practice comes in the summer. If I slack on my playing for even a few days, I can tell it."

Dorothy had wanted to play Golf for most of her life. "But I didn't have the chance when young," she mentions. Born in Cisco, she attended local schools and Cisco Junior College. She went on to Bethany College, Bethany Okla., where she majored in Physical Education - intending to make a career of it. But she decided that a life with Major Farnsworth was more important, and left school when she married.

A generation or so ago few women were playing Golf.

Among the early Cisco Champions were Mrs. Garland Nance and Mrs. W.J. Foxworth. About seven years ago Cisco Junior College offered a Community Course on Golfing, with J.L. Stafford as Instructor. About twenty people enrolled, and a number of them are still playing. Dorothy Farnsworth and Ruth Puglese were among the group, and still play occasionally as a team. Dorothy credits much of her success in golf to her encouraging husband and two special people - her teacher J.L. Stafford, and Letha Stafford. "Both of them spent a lot of time with me, encouraging me and showing me how to handle the game. They are both fine players."

Dorothy's own interest in Golf was another plus. This pulled her through her first year of playing, which she refers to as "pretty awkward". After that her skill improved rapidly. The Cisco Country Club Golf Course, with its rolling hills, helped in the long run, she believes. "It's well-kept, beautiful, and a very tough course. Once you learn to play there, other courses seem so very easy!"

The Course at Granbury, she states, is her favorite in the area, one of the very best anywhere.

Dorothy declines the use of Golf Carts at any of the courses, preferring to walk along with her quick, long steps. "I use the game for exercise," she says. But Golf, she adds, has many more benefits than the exercise part. It's played in the open, with the bonus of fresh air and sunlight. Then there's the coordination part, and the fact that a Golfer must learn great self control. "You can't be easily upset, or have a temper - especially at a Tournament!" Dorothy smiles.

There are still few women professional Golfers around, and their play is a lot less than the men. Women do not compete against men in the "big time" circuits. Dorothy believes there will be more opportunities for women Golfers in the future, and that girls who are interested in the sport should develop

their talents.

Around Cisco Dorothy sometimes plays with her husband on "couples" matches, or competes against men just for fun. It's the fun and relaxation part of the game which she particularly likes. "You absolutely cannot stay worried about something else and play a good game of Golf. Just as a musician, you must have your mind totally on what you are doing."

The professional Golfer Dorothy most admires is Lee Trevino, whose manner of playing and handling himself on the course typifies - to her - the best that lies in Golfing. Her own ambitions are aimed at keeping her skills sharp and maybe playing at State someday. In the meanwhile she'll be spending many hours on Cisco Country Club Golf Course, and enjoying all of it.

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INDEPENDENCE DAY

Back To The Declaration

At the time of this speech (August 17, 1858) Mr. Lincoln was a candidate for the senate from Illinois

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On June 3, 1980, Mr. Thomas Metzger won the Democratic congressional nomination for the 43rd district of California. Mr. Metzger is a member of the Klu Klux Klan, who believes America was founded upon that principle. This latter opinion is interesting, certainly not because of Metzger's espousal of scholars, intellectuals, and public figures. According to such people America is, in principle, a racist country because its great founding document, the Declaration of Independence, was intended to apply not to all men but to some few men only.

This slander against the Declaration was refuted more than a century ago by Abraham Lincoln in many of his speeches during the national debate over slavery. Among those speeches was the following, delivered at the outset of Lincoln's campaign for the senate against Douglas, in August of 1958. In this speech Lincoln reaffirms the central importance of July 4, 1776 in the American political experience, and delivers a stern reproach to those who would deny the promise and the purity of the Declaration of Independence.

The Declaration of Independence was formed by the representatives of American liberty from thirteen States of the Confederacy, twelve of which were slave-holding communities. We need not discuss the way or the reason of their becoming slave-holding communities. It is sufficient for our purpose that all of them greatly deplored the evil and that they placed a provision in the Constitution which they supposed would gradually remove the disease by cut-

ting off its source. This was the abolition of the slave trade.

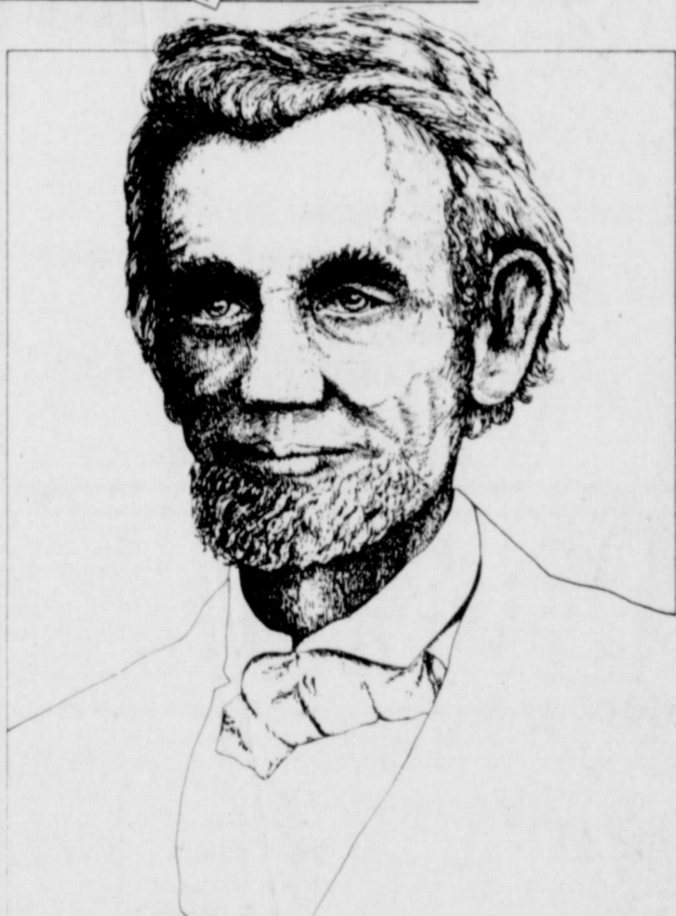
So general was the conviction, the public determination, to abolish the African slave trade, that the provision which I have referred to as being placed in the Constitution declared that it should not be abolished prior to the year 1808. A constitutional provision was necessary to prevent the people, through Congress, from putting a stop to the traffic immediately at the close of the war.

Now if slavery had been a good thing, would the fathers of the republic have taken a step calculated to diminish its beneficent influences among themselves, and snatch the boon wholly from their posterity? These communities, by their representatives in old Independence Hall, said to the whole world of men: "We hold these truths to be self-evident: that all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness."

This was their majestic interpretation of the economy of the Universe. This was their lofty, and wise, and noble understanding of the justice of the Creator to his creatures. Yes, to all his creatures, to the whole great family of man. In their enlightened belief, nothing stamped with the Divine image and likeness was sent into the world to be trodden on and degraded and imbruted by its fellows.

They grasped not only the whole race of man then living, but they reached forward and seized upon the farthest posterity. They erected a beacon to guide their children; and their children's children, and the countless myriads who should inhabit the earth in other ages.

Wise statesmen as they were, they knew the tendency of prosperity to breed



tyrants, and so they established these great self-evident truths, that when in the distant future some man, some faction, some interest, should set up the doctrine that none but rich men, or

none but white men, or none but Anglo-Saxon white men, were entitled to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness, their posterity might look up again to the Declaration of Independence and take courage to renew the battle which their fathers began, so that truth and justice and mercy and all the humane and Christian virtues might not be extinguished from the land; so that no man would hereafter dare to limit and circumscribe the great principles on which the temple of liberty was being built.

Return to the fountain whose waters spring close by the blood of the revolution. Think nothing of me—take no thought for the political fate of any man whomsoever—but come back to the truths that are in the Declaration of Independence.

You may do anything with me you choose, if you will but heed these sacred principles. You may not only defeat me for the Senate, but you may take me and put me to death. While pretending no indifference to earthly honors, I do claim to be actuated in this contest by something higher than an anxiety for office. I charge you to drop every paltry and insignificant thought for any man's success. It is nothing; I am nothing; Judge Douglas is nothing. But do not destroy that immortal emblem of Humanity—the Declaration of American Independence.

Stamford Rodeo Beginning

Fifty years ago during the great depression, the small West Texas town of Stamford was in search of some event which in some way might pull its people and community back together.

So, in February of 1930, directors of the Stamford Chamber of Commerce proposed a three day Cowboy Reunion as a publicity and advertising feature to promote Stamford. From that meek beginning was born the Texas Cowboy Reunion. Over the 50 years to July 2-5, 1980, the annual event has grown to become a "Living Legend" of the West. In five decades, TCR has become the world's largest amateur rodeo.

Cleburne Huston remembers the organizational meeting of 1930. "Several projects were discussed and laid aside. Finally, a rodeo, with attendant attractions, was proposed. Stamford had staged rodeos from the time of its founding in 1900 but with no permanent organization or

regularity of days," said Huston.

"Various names were suggested and rejected," continued Huston. "Finally, pioneer Stamford photographer Ray Rector rose and spoke the words: 'I move that we call it the Texas Cowboy Reunion! There was a moment of shocked silence in the room. The word 'Texas' covered a lot of territory and was more ambitious than most of us had contemplated. It was like aiming at the stars - a challenge beyond our reach."

Huston says there was neither time nor money to construct an arena or build grandstands. However, a natural amphitheater had been provided by nature in the shallow, red-clay ravines on Swenson ranchlands just outside the city limits.

"The barren area had a flat, triangular space, with steep banks on the sides," recalls Huston. "Crude bleacher seats, partly shaded by cotton-bagging were built on one side of the ravine. The opposite side of the arena was strictly earthen with ledges carved out for open-air seating."

"It required courageous spectators as well as tough cowboy contestants to endure the blazing sun and thick red dust of those first rodeo performances. But people came from near and

far and scores of cowboy ranches from West Texas ranches to make this first annual session a glorious success," adds Huston. Active from the start were cowmen like: A.J. Swenson, manager of the farflung SMS ranches; R.L. Penick, one of the founders of Stamford, and Charles E. Coombes, pioneer lawyer and for many years secretary and general manager of Texas Cowboy Reunion Association.

To the credit of the founders, the Texas Cowboy Reunion has become much more than a simple rodeo. "It is in all senses a 'reunion' of men and women, young and old, who come together each summer at Stamford to enjoy the cowhand sports, riding and roping, to thrill at the sight of a parade, dine again on chuckwagon food, swap yarns at the meeting of the Oldtimers Association, dance the old dances, sing the old songs, share companionship and pay tribute to longtime friends who now are gone," states Abilene newspaper columnist Katharyn Duff.

Success of the golden anniversary celebration is a result of hard work over the years by two organizations. The Texas Cowboy Reunion, Inc., stages the rodeo and the Texas Cowboy Reunion Oldtimers Association works to keep alive the traditions of spirit and fun.

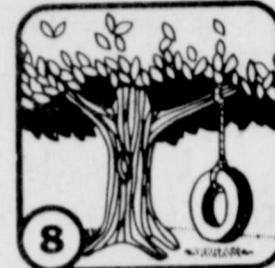

Congressional Comment

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The Congress recently approved legislation which includes meaningful changes in the farm disaster loan programs administered by both the Small Business Administration (SBA) and the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA).
I supported this measure because, in effect, it places the disaster loan programs for farm businesses under the jurisdiction of the more qualified FmHA.
A major provision of this bill is the "credit elsewhere test," which requires loan applicants to seek assistance from other sources before approaching the SBA. Accordingly, the FmHA disaster loan program has been modified to provide the same benefits now provided to victims under the SBA program, thus changing the FmHA law to coincide with the eligibility requirements of the SBA program.
Because farm businesses will now be eligible for loans under FmHA, those eligible will be required to first apply to FmHA for a loan where terms and rates are as favorable as SBA-administered business disaster loans. However, if FmHA denies to grant a loan or if FmHA changes their program so that the same benefits will not be available from FmHA as from SBA, the eligible applicants

may seek assistance from the SBA-administered program. The FmHA disaster assistance will now be limited to \$500,000 per disaster for net non-reimbursed loss, as in the SBA procedure.

The FmHA has the expertise necessary to effectively handle the disaster claims of farm businesses, and that agency has a sufficient staff to process the accompanying paperwork, unlike the SBA which has neither. Also, the Administration has agreed to hire 200 additional personnel to assist in administering the expanded loan through the FmHA program, thereby allowing SBA to concentrate on non-agricultural disasters and other small business loans.

Disaster loans are designed to aid businesses unable to obtain adequate credit elsewhere in emergency situations. Under the provisions of this legislation, these businesses will be able to borrow up to \$500,000 at 5 percent whether qualified by SBA or FmHA. Businesses with a good credit rating will have the right to receive a loan from FmHA or SBA at a rate not exceeding 1 percent above the current cost of money to the government for amounts up to \$500,000 (currently 10 percent). These will be subject to review after the first three years and every two years after that to determine whether the borrower can obtain a loan

Hints For The Aged & Handicapped

DEAR READERS—I have recently been in contact with American Airlines officials regarding a new service they are offering that enables persons with hearing and speech impairments to obtain travel information and airline reservations from their home.

The service is directed at the estimated 15 million person in the United States who have hearing impairments ranging from mild hearing loss to severe deafness, and the 4 million persons in the U.S. with speech handicaps.

The service employs telecommunications devices that are widely used by people with these impairments.

Individuals with handicaps which prevent them from talking or hearing and

who have the device can call American Airlines toll-free and communicate via keyboard.

To communicate with an American reservations agent, callers dial the toll-free number, place the handset of the telephone in the cradle of an acoustical coupler and begin typing on a 60-word-per-minute teleprinter, the standard transmission speed for the hearing-impaired community. The words print out on a teleprinter at American and a reservations sales agent answers the callers' questions by return message on the teleprinter.

"In the past it has been extremely difficult for people with hearing and speech disabilities to obtain reliable, timely information on airline travel. We have been aware of the problem and studying it for a long time," said Robert H. Phillips, American's vice president-passenger services. "We are pleased to be the first major airline to offer this service on a nationwide basis as part of our commitment to make it as easy as possible for everyone to travel by air," Phillips said.

For information on flight schedules, fares, seat assignments, and ground arrangements such as rental cars, hotels and ground

transportation, call toll-free 800-543-1586. In Ohio, call 800-582-1573. (This number is only for those who have telecommunications devices attached to their telephones).

I asked what arrangements are made for individuals with specific physical disabilities such as those requiring oxygen and found that: for those individuals who require oxygen when

they fly, they must provide a letter from a license physician describing how much oxygen they will need, and their travel must be approved by one of America's area medical directors. The passenger also must be accompanied by an adult who knows how to operate oxygen equipment. A fee of \$40 per flight coupon is charged for providing the equipment. American is not equipped

to carry stretchers. The airline will assist the blind and deaf, when necessary, and their seeing-eye or hearing-aid dogs may travel with them in the passenger cabins. "It's a simple matter of comfort and convenience," Phillips said. "American wants to do everything it can to accommodate the handicapped, and when our people know a handicapped

passenger is coming, we can do more for the passenger if the individual calls in at least 48 hours in advance so seat assignments can be made and airport personnel can plan for needed special services."

from non-federal sources at a similar rate and term. In the event that this is possible, the borrower will be required to accept such a loan.

By placing disaster loan programs for farm businesses under the auspices of the FmHA, I feel that the procedure will be in more logical hands. The FmHA's experience and knowledge in these matters makes them the best choice to handle the large volume of disaster loan applications received. Because the FmHA is much better staffed, this bill will eliminate many of the problems that farm businesses have had in their dealings with the federal government through the SBA-administered disaster loan program.

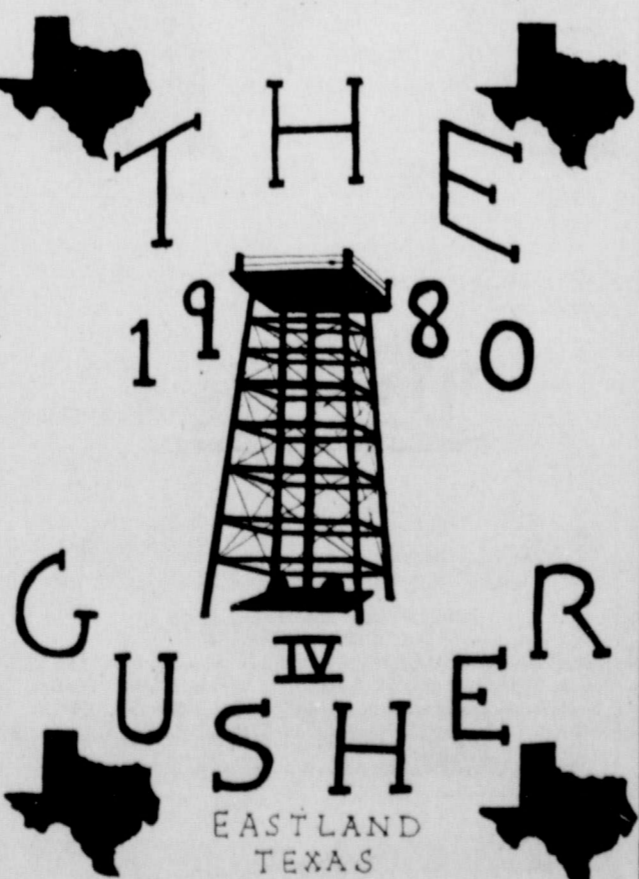

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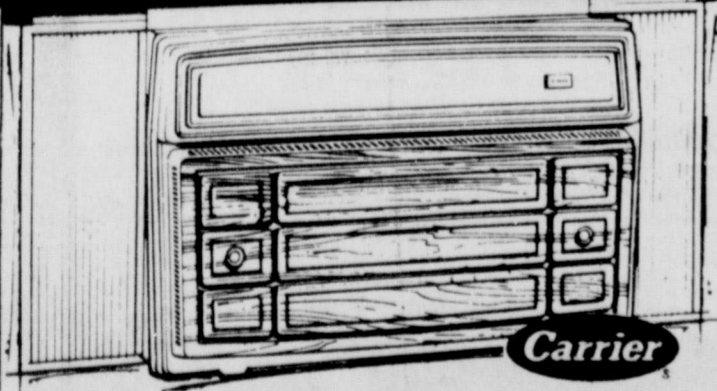

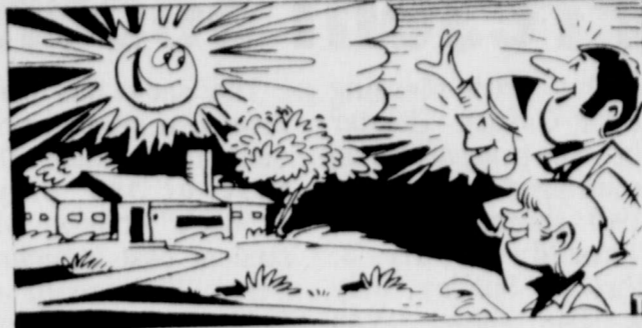
MANAGING YOUR MONEY
