Mrs. Carlile Due To Begin Prison Term

Annie Carlile, 46, is expected to begin serving a 12-year sentence in the Texas Penitentiary during the week of July 7th, Eastland County authorities reported Thursday. She was sentenced to the penitentiary in February 1978, after trial in 91st District Court on charges of murder in the shooting death of her husband, Dale Carlile, in July 1977.

District Attorney Emory Walton reported that a mandate from the Texas Supreme Court, affirming the sentence, was received by District Clerk Roy Lane. His office was processing papers that would direct Sheriff John Morren to pick up Mrs. Carlile, who had been free on bond since the trial.

Mr. Walton said that no further litigation was indicated and that Mrs. Carlile would be taken to the prison during the week. He said she would be eligible

Cisco 1980-4,396; 1970-4,160; Gain 236

The Post Office mailed census packets to all householders, and census enumerators were to examine the returned questionnaires and to make calls at households where there was no response.

Figures from neighboring Stephens County showed a gain of about 15 percent - from 8,414 in 1970 to 9,722 in 1980 with Breckenridge up 792 from 5,944. Figures were not released for other neighboring counties. Taylor County had a gain of 10,806 to 108,808. Abilene was still below 100,000 with a pre-preliminary total of 95,816.

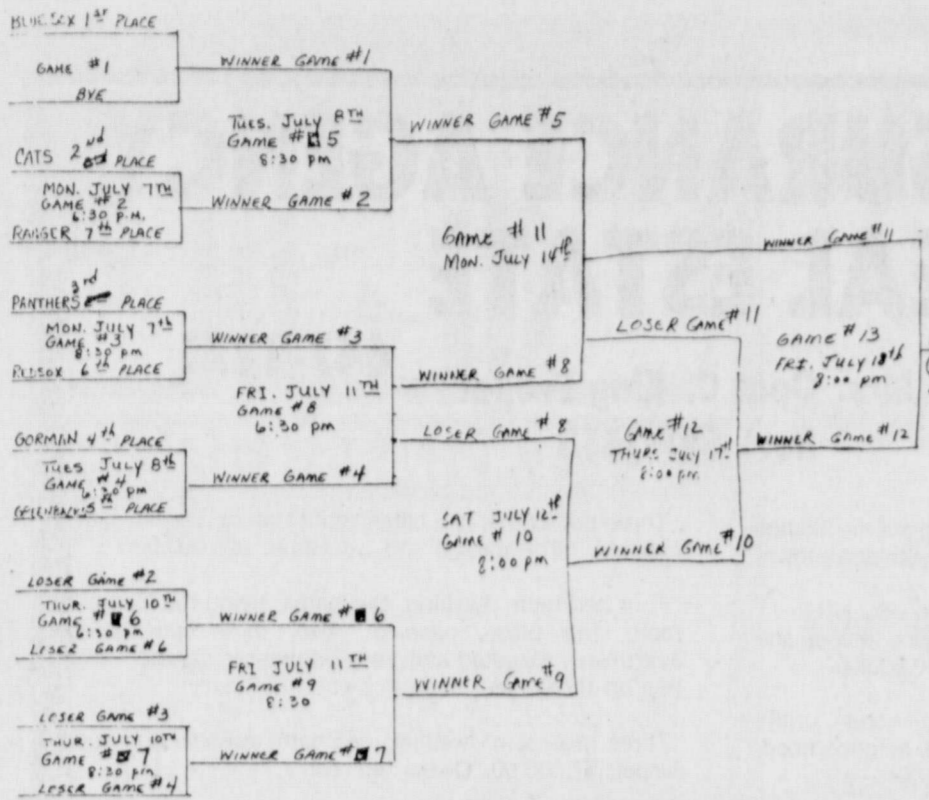

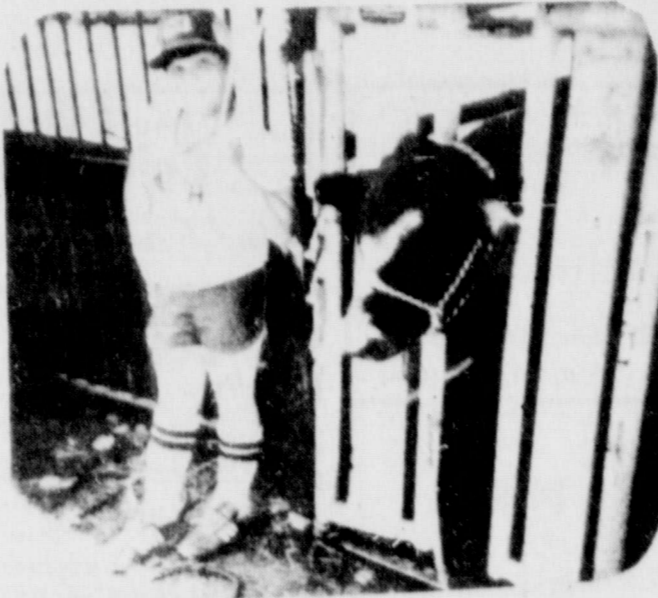

8. Contrary to popular belief...you should not take salt tablets unless your doctor has cleared you for them...excessive salt is extremely dangerous to some people with certain undiagnosed diseases.

The National Weather Service urges you to heed these rules...This heat wave is just as dangerous as any tornado or blizzard situation.

GORDON SPOT

The extreme heat wave continues in our area causing all forms of life to be stressed. This includes crops, trees, lawns and ornamentals as well as people and animals.

One of the heat stress signs we are seeing on trees and other ornamentals is leaf scorch. Leaves first show a burning or scorching around margins usually with older leaves being affected first. The marginal scorch progresses inward until the entire leaf withers and drops. The extent and spread of the leaf drop is dependent on the type of plant and cause of damage. There are several unfavorable conditions that may cause leaf scorch.

One of the most common conditions causing leaf scorch is root failure. Roots may be damaged by such things as diseases, insects, or a change in the soil caused by man. When this occurs the leaves are not furnished with enough water and nutrients to supply the top.

Root failure often results when oxygen is made unavailable to the roots. Such is the case with over-watering, adding fill soil, soil compaction or natural gas leaks. Building concrete walks or patios over a portion of the root system will cut off the oxygen to those roots. Feeder roots are destroyed when ditches are dug or the soil is plowed underneath large trees. This may result in leaf scorch two or three years later. Plants vary in sensitivity to this condition and some can survive much better than others. Post oak trees are one of the most sensitive. Many times limbs overhanging driveways will scorch when other parts of the tree show no scorch. The roots

are unable to absorb and translocate enough water and nutrients to adequately furnish the plants.

Another common cause of leaf scorch is simply a shortage of soil water.

Toxicity from herbicides or excessive use of fertilizer burns roots and causes their failure. Certain herbicides may kill roots directly while others translocate to foliage tissue causing leaf scorch.

A blockage of the trees vascular tissues may cause leaf scorch to only one or two limbs. Some diseases will cause water transporting vessels to become plugged and prevent normal translocation.

With any of these problems leaf scorch is worse in very hot weather because the leaves are losing water at a faster rate.

The treatment for leaf scorch depends on the source of the problem. First, the problem should be corrected if possible such as stopping a gas leak. There is no cure for most vascular diseases of

trees except pruning infected limbs.

Regardless of the cause of leaf scorch, plants should be provided with an adequate amount of water and fertilizer. In most cases the plants recover in time.

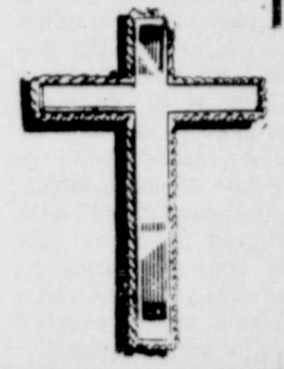
