

### Progress Being Made In Airport Runway Work

Progress is being made in the improvement program planned at the Cisco Municipal Airport, city officials reported Thursday. Bids for providing base materials for the new runway have been advertised by the City of Cisco.

David Johnson and his crew of EnRe Corporation volunteers have been on the job for the past week moving and leveling dirt in preparation for the proper base fill. Bob Moore Transport had donated the use of equipment to water the runway during the dirt work.

Machinery for the EnRe Corporation to use in moving dirt was leased from Brontke Brothers, Abilene contractors, and paid for by the Chamber of Commerce airport committee.

City officials hope the runway work will be completed before freezing weather begins.

Young men born during the year 1961 will register for the military draft at the Cisco Post Office and other postal centers throughout the nation during the week beginning Monday, July 28.

Those born during 1960 registered during the past week. Some 50 registered here without incident, post office workers reported.

## Contract Awarded For Four New School Classrooms Here

A contract for the construction of four additional classrooms at Grammar School was awarded to Sanguinet Construction Company of Stephenville by the board of trustees of the Cisco Independent School District at a meeting Monday night.

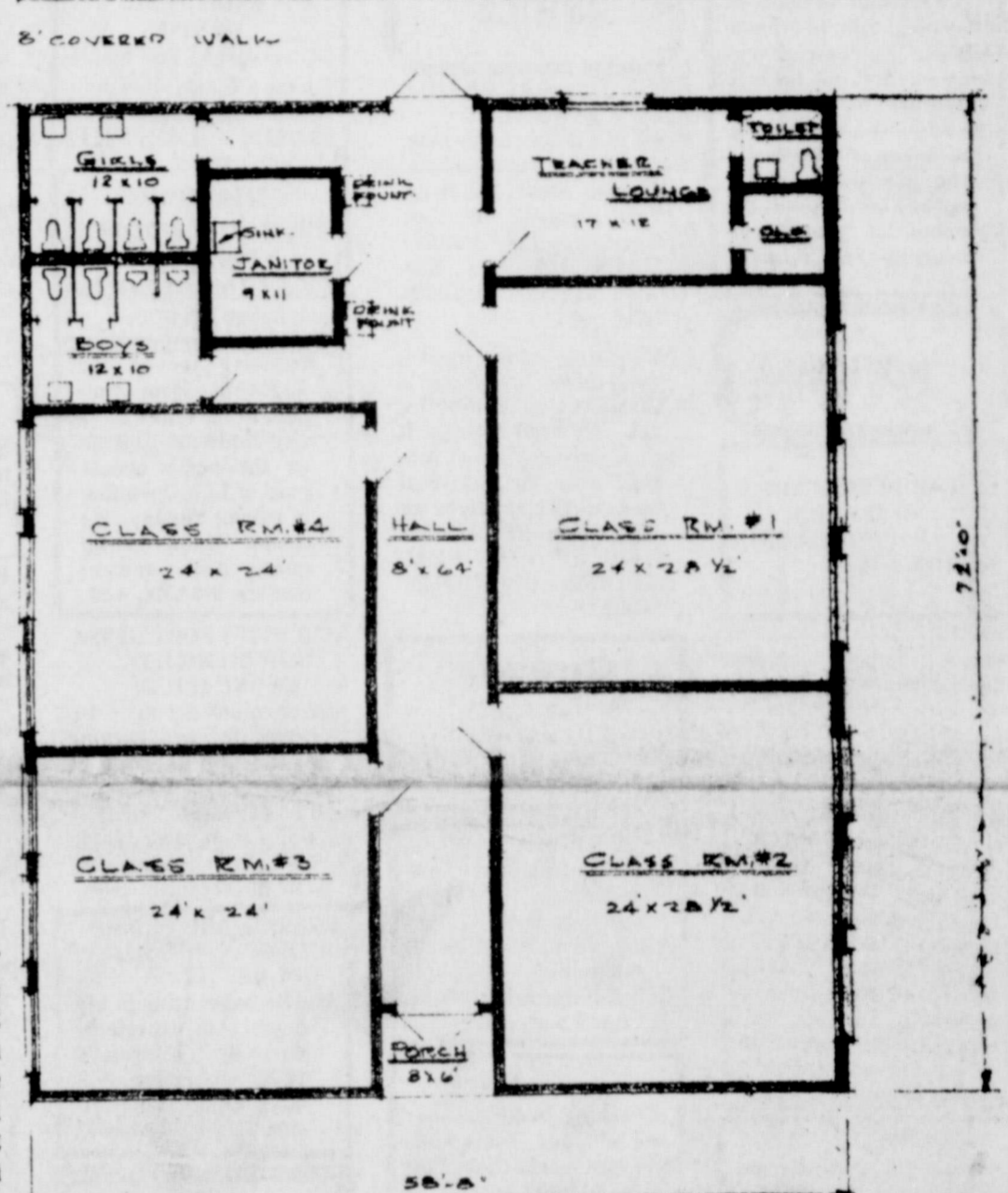
The Sanguinet company's bid of \$107,209.79 was the lowest of six bids submitted, Supt. James Couch reported. High bid was \$139,000.

Plans call for work to start August 1 with 120 days in which to complete the project. Mr. Couch said the board hopes, and the contractor has promised to try, to have the building addition complete by the time the second semester begins.

The addition calls for four call rooms 24x28½ feet with an 8x64 foot hall in the center. In addition to the classrooms, there will be a 12x17 foot teachers lounge with adjoining rest room plus a larger rest room for facility for students, giving the building two such facilities in place of the present one. There will also be a 4x11 janitor supply room.

The new rooms will be built adjacent to classrooms at the southeast corner of the present building and gym. A covered walk way will be built between the present building and the new addition, leading to the school cafeteria.

Mr. Couch said the board had been working on the project for some six months. Mr. Couch and Trustees Willis Parker and

Charles Humphreys went to Dublin on Wednesday to inspect a savings and loan association building that the Sanguinet company has under construction there.

Exterior of the new addition will be stucco on concrete blocks.

Mr. Couch said the project was being finance largely with money given the CISD by the state as incentive aid when Cisco

and Scranton school districts consolidated several years ago. The money was for use in remodeling and enlarging. The board had saved the money and very little local funds will have to be used, Mr. Couch added.

The building enlargement program was made necessary by increasing enrollment.

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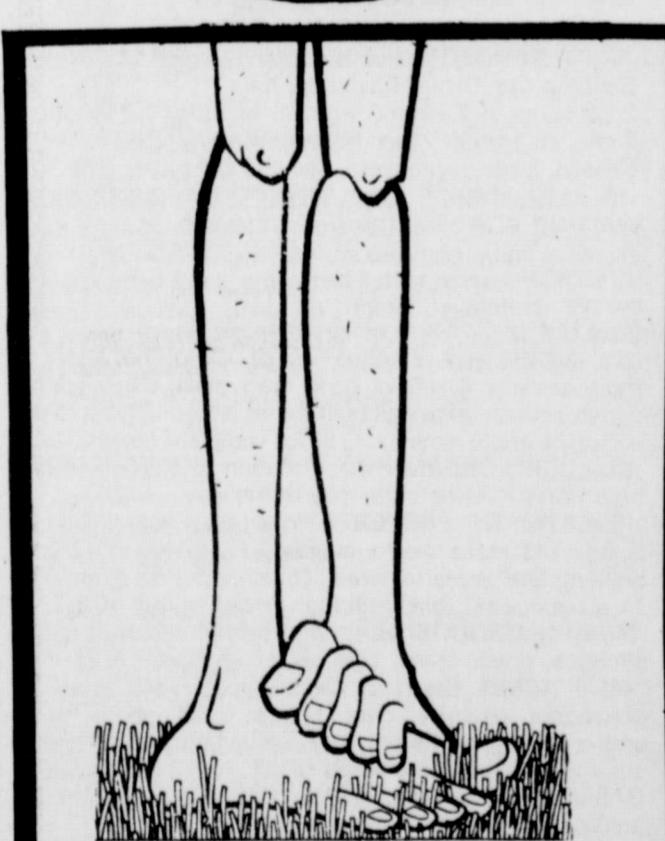



## Comanche Peak Nuclear Plant To Open In '82

Estimated dates for operation of the Comanche Peak nuclear plant have been revised to 1982 for Unit 2, and the estimated cost of the plant has been changed to \$2.235 billion, or \$972 per kilowatt, Texas Electric announced today.

The new cost estimate is an increase from the \$1.7 billion estimate made in 1977. The change in schedule means an estimated delay of about one year for each unit.

TESCO President Bill Marquardt noted that even at the higher cost, Comanche Peak will still mean substantial savings to the company's customers compared to what

they would pay for electricity produced by natural gas and oil.

He said in 1985 electricity produced by Comanche Peak will be 25 percent cheaper than electricity produced by natural gas and oil plants.

Marquardt said previous cost and schedule estimates have been based on existing design requirements and safety estimates for nuclear plants, as well as on experiences other companies have had in building plants.

But he said the design for Comanche Peak that was acceptable when construction started in 1974 has been

## Ironing Is Back

As if recession, the energy crisis and the Texas heat wave aren't enough, ironing is staging a comeback!

I don't mean "wholesale ironing for backbreaking hours" only "touch up" ironing to give today's natural fiber garments such as cotton, linen and silk, the look of complete success, along with comfort.

Even easy-care fabrics can be improved with an occasional ironing touch-up.

Since many of us packed our irons away when permanent-press clothing appeared on the scene, we may be wondering what kind of irons we need to help care for today's fashions.

Despite high rates of inflation over the past six years, irons have changed little in price.

Likewise, few design changes have been made, so old irons will probably work just fine.

One new development is the compact steam iron which is lighter and smaller than the standard iron but is not necessarily a bona fide travel iron.

Suppose you have an old steam iron, but it does not seem to be steaming properly. One home remedy you may wish to try is this: Fill the steam reservoir with distilled vinegar. Plug the iron in and allow it steam for about 10 minutes. For the steaming process place the iron on a metal cake rack so the steam can escape. Be sure to set the rack on a surface that will not be damaged by heat or steam.

Check the steaming process to make certain the iron does not "steam out" before the end of the period. Unplug the iron, turn the iron upright and let it stand overnight. Then pour out the vinegar and rinse the reservoir thoroughly with distilled water.

Should you use distilled water or tap water for your iron? Some manufacturers recommend exclusive use of distilled water. Other manufacturers suggest switching to tap water once in awhile. Consumers Union says unless you have extremely hard water or water that is chemically softened, you can use tap water all of the time.

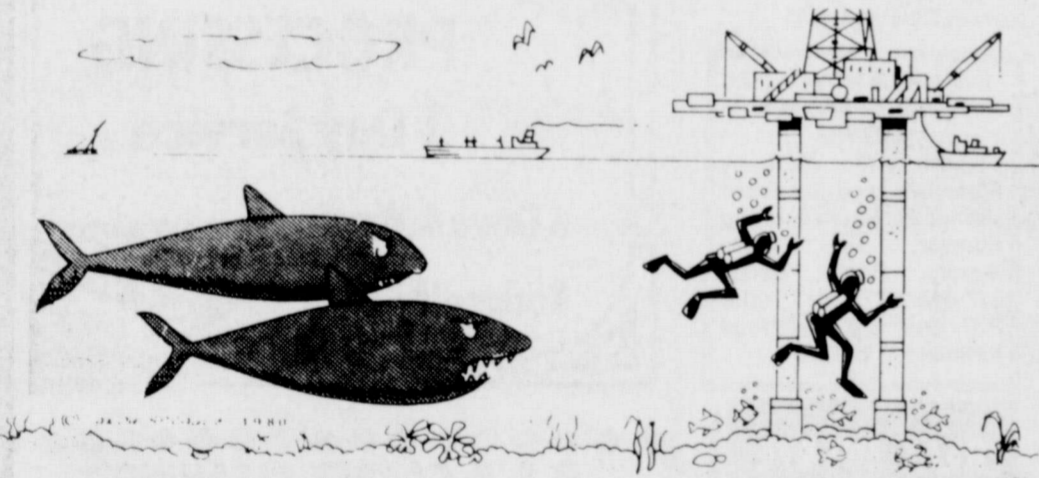

## Homemaking Tips

By Janet Thomas

If you're in the market for a new iron, what should you look for? 1. Look for a full range of temperatures and easy-to-read, easy-to-use temperature settings. 2. Make sure it has good steam production with extra steam and spray features. The number of vent holes are really no clue to the amount of steam produced, so it can be tricky to evaluate steam production without a demonstration. 3. Check to see what weight you will be most comfortable with. Irons should be heavy enough to remove wrinkles but not so heavy that they are tiring to use. 4. Is the cord location convenient for you? Some models permit the cord to suit left-handed ironers. 5. Does the iron have a light that warns when the iron is plugged in? Does the iron have a stable heel rest?

It would seem that ironing is staging a comeback. Will it redeem itself this time? Recipe for the Week: At this week's County Fair Association meeting, we were surprised with a special treat by the Fair Chairman, Mrs. Dewey Cox of Ranger. As you might already know, Frances Cox is an excellent cook. Frances had baked a dessert she calls "Bit of Chocolate."

Let me assure you that this

recipe is simply delicious and many of us weren't bashful in asking for seconds. Thank you Frances for sharing your recipe!

Bit o' Chocolate  
2 3/4 cup flour  
1 1/4 cup sugar  
1 1/2 cup thin sliced bananas  
3/4 cup softened margarine  
2 eggs  
1 1/4 teaspoon baking powder  
1 1/4 teaspoon baking soda  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
2 teaspoons vanilla  
1/2 cup milk chocolate pieces

Preheat oven to 350°. Grease and flour 15" x 10" jelly roll pan. Combine all ingredients but chocolate, mix, bake for 25 minutes.

Frosting:  
4 cups confectionery sugar



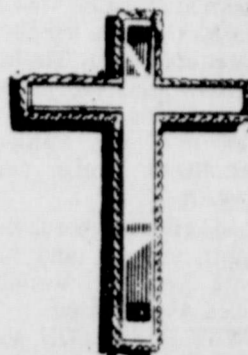

**About Cheese**  
We should call cheese the original health food. Ounce for ounce it has the same protein value as meat, fish or poultry. 3 ounces of cheddar has about the same protein as 3 large eggs. 3 ounces of cooked chicken or beef pot roast. Also, it is readily digestible. As with all dairy products, cheese is perishable and should be kept well wrapped and refrigerated. Unsliced cheese keeps better than sliced because air doesn't get to it as easily.

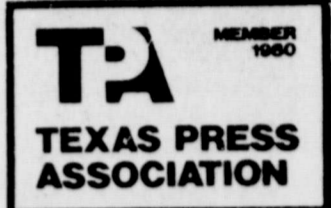
A few things to remember when cooking with cheese. Use low heat, high heat makes cheese tough and stringy. Avoid long cooking periods, it's better to simply have it melt. Add cheese at the end of baking time when used a topping for casseroles. The best oven temperature between 325 to 375 degrees. Another answer to prevent cheese from toughening or hardening while the casserole bakes is to cover the cheese with a generous layer of bread or cracker crumbs. One day I was making scalloped potatoes and in the middle of it I discovered I had no American or cheddar cheese but that I did have some swiss. The potatoes were delicious, so I've used swiss again and again.

# City Postpones Action On Watering Ordinance

A volunteer water conservation program remained in effect for at least two more weeks Friday after the City Council decided to delay action until the next meeting on passing an ordinance governing residential yard watering.

The council expressed the hope that "our people will do a better job of cooperating" to relieve some of the pressure on the city water system to meet high demands. Area residents have used nearly 1,800,000 gallons per day during the past month.

The council studied an ordinance similar to one passed recently by the City of Sweetwater, which would give the city manager authority to decide and put in effect Phase I, making it unlawful to use city water for outside watering; or, Phase II, provisions of watering on even numbered days by houses with even numbers or odd days for odd numbers. Violation of the ordinance would result in a \$200 fine.

It was decided that the emergency in Cisco does not make such regulations necessary at this time and that changes should be made in another ordinance to be considered at the next meeting.

Residents were urged by the council to observe the odd-even plan implemented recently.

In other action, the council heard a report by Mrs. Betty McGinness on plans for a 1981 Cisco Centennial.

Purchase of a used Ford tractor with weed

cutting equipment at a cost of about \$3,000 was approved, and Utilities Superintendent Frank Young was instructed to proceed with the purchase. The machinery will be used to cut weeds and grass as required by a recently enacted city ordinance.

Laddie Pierce, local Ford dealer, was advised that the city has utilities already available to a lot he is considering to use at Highway 183 and IH-20 just south of town - east of the Gulf Service Station there. Mr. Pierce said he has purchased the tract as a possible site for his Ford business.

Jim Puryear, high school principal, told the council that the football field was plowed and seeded to new grass some months ago and watering was mandatory if the field was to be used this year. The council approved plans to water the field from 4 to 6 a.m. every other day.

Truman Kirk, local attorney, was recognized by Mayor Cartee, and he inquired as to any plans the council has made for employing a new city manager. He was not given an answer.

Miss Donna Morton, manager of Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. here, and Mack McGee of the SWBell district offices in Wichita Falls, appeared before the council to report that the company has filed application with the Public Utility Commission in Austin for a 11.5% rate increase. They gave the council a copy of the request.

Council member Lucy Collier inquired what if anything had been done to provide for Lake Bernie to be drain into Lake Cisco, increasing the watershed of the big lake as provided for in council action several months ago.

He suggested that three old 8-inch drain lines be opened at the bottom of the dam on the Lake Cisco creek side to permit water to empty. The valves are some 50 years old and will probably have to be cut open, it was decided. Mr. Young was asked to check on the expense involved.

Mr. Cartee reported on meeting with county

officials regarding the city sending jail prisoners to the new jail soon to be opened in Eastland. Cisco's jail is considered substandard as a place to keep juveniles, he added. The council decided to await more details as to the probable cost involved.

Each council member was asked to nominate one citizen to serve on a committee to consider possible changes in the city charter. Names submitted included those of Truman Kirk, JoAnn Cermin, John Moss, Mary Ellen Wood and Virgil Murphy who will work with two others plus City Attorney Billy Wright and Acting City Manager Marilyn Smith.

All members of the council were present except Jerry Jeffcoat.
