Jimmy Halbert, 39, of Stephenville, the driver, was treated for first and second degree burns on his left arm at E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital Sunday night. He was burned in trying to put out the fire. He was released after treatment.

City Police had a mystery on their hands this week after a van was found burning with nobody around at the city dump grounds at 7 p.m. Saturday.

The van, a 1978 Dodge in good appearance and condition, was burning when the Cisco Volunteer Fire Department received a call. Policemen John Ferguson and Jim Reynolds began investigating when no driver or owner was around.

The van had a sticker issued by the U.S. Navy at Pudget Sound, Washington. No foul play was indicated. The fire apparently was set with gasoline, police said.

Officer Ferguson said a suicide note was found in the van and it read "Dad: I'm sorry I failed you. Jack."

Police searched the dump ground area without finding any sign of anyone who might have been in the van or who might have seen it.

Police Chief Kenneth Eaves said a call to the Navy base in Washington State indicated that the van had been loaned for one day to a man nam-

ed Norvell Lee Holly, 38, who was listed as a Navy deserter. The loan was made three months ago, and the call from Cisco police

was the first that the Van owner had heard from or about it.

Firemen said the damage was confined to the interior of the van. The paint and glass seemed in good condition. The vehicle was impounded by City Police to await the investigation results.

Humor Dry During Drought

Drought is an integral part of the dry-lander's philosophy.

In an apocryphal story, two cowmen somehow got themselves onto Noah's Ark. After forty days and nights of more water than they knew existed, their perspectives remained unaltered. After landing, true to the instincts of their kind, they left with their two cattle to search for the best range.

"Had one heck-of-a-rain all over this country," one said. "Sure did," dryly intoned the other. "Should be a fair

year for grass if we get another good rain before the drought sets in."

Some organisms are adapted to drought, their life cycles synchronized with nature's long dry spells and brief outpourings. Ranchers, dryland farmers, and others who work the land have also adapted to drought. None, unless psychotic, has done so happily. A few, somehow, maintain a wry humor. Some, probably those who have pulled too many dead cows from mudholes, remain pessimistic even during times of plenty.

One leather-faced old-timer continued taciturn whatever the elements offered. During dry times and the mournful bawls of water-starved cattle, pessimism came easily. "Everything's burned-up. I'm wiped-out. Terrible year," was his only remark. If too much rain came, he would shake his head sorrowfully. "No good. No good a'tall. All drowned-out."

During one especially good year, when the rains were timely and fell gently and the temperature just right, the old-timer and a neighbor rode through herds of fat cows and frolicking calves.

"Well," said the neighbor, "you got to admit, this year's near perfect."

"Hrumph," snorted the old-timer. "Too much growth. Damned hard on the land."

Drought is not only part of the western's philosophy; it

plays an active role in his daily thought. He knows it will inevitably come; his mind's prepared for its hardships-though never adequately; but he never forsakes hope that it won't come until next year-or the next-or the next. And he is always convinced that any cloud, any approaching front, no matter distant or puny, can end it. Perhaps without such perspective, dry-land living might well prove intolerable.

Professional weatherman can key-punch their impartial computers and report cold, objective statistics:

EASTLAND CO. (64 Year Statistical Base)

Average precipitation...27.04 inches.

Years with precipitation 25% above average...11 out of 64.

Years with approximate average precipitation...37 out of 64.

Years with precipitation 25% or more below average...16 out of 64.

Statistics as has been noted, will prove what you wish. Based on the previous information, 58% of the 64 years yielded average rainfall. 75% of those years offered average or above average rainfall. Only 25% of the years were below average. Percentages such as these should gladden the hearts of all.

But rainfall is fickle, falling scantily during seasons of critical need and abundantly after crops (if any) are harvested and bony cattle sold; soaking newly seeded ground, then forsaking struggling seedlings to scorching winds and parched earth.

This year seems such a year. Early rains encouraged the heady feeling known best to those who toil the land. The winter, and months before, had been dry. The rains were coming perhaps a bit late, but they came in relative abundance. And with them came their companion-hope. Plants completing their life's cycle in one year grew rapidly and many set seed. Perennial grasses, the rancher's lifeblood, thrust-up new leaves and seed-stalks. Brush was cleared, ground broken. Seeds were planted, imbibed water, sent roots downward and fragile stems up. Promise. Hope. And the rains stopped.

Some plants, where scattered rains have passed or minor topographical features have captured additional water, will grow. Most perennials, long adapted to hard times, have sacrificed top-growth to avoid depletion-and death-of their root systems. Given water, they will grow another year, or even this one. But most of the new plants, especially the ones starting as the rains slackened, have turned to

crisp straw in the burning wind. This writer, investigating rangelands during the past few weeks, found tall, leafy grasses-seeds nearly mature-dead and discolored as if sprayed with insecticide. A strange and sickening sight, even to one who owns no stock.

Drought comes and goes, and-in its way-laughs at us all. It laughed cruelest in the old days when cattle had only natural streams and ponds and the occasional spring. With their dry, bitter humor, cowmen dragged-home and skinned the dead. "Bank's cows, but hides ain't mortgaged," they'd say.

Drought's laughter is a little muted by today's wells and pipelines and stock ponds. Muted more by irrigation, though heat and low humidity cause excessive evaporation, more frequent watering cycles, and increased cost. Improved pastures and hay offer the possibility of "making it through." But for those dependent on much rangeland and little water, "making it through" usually means barely surviving-and no appreciation of drought's humor.

There is little government agencies can do when drought strikes hardest. The Soil Conservation Service can assist in preparing an analysis of what forage remains and how much can be expected to return. Its conservationists can provide assistance in preparing grazing plans incorporation measures to combat drought conditions-both present and future. Perhaps of most importance, the SCS can help the landowner analyze the land's total resource and prepare detailed, carefully evaluated plans involving all aspects of the operation. It can be, hopefully, something to make the drought less harsh. Unfortunately, no government program offers rainfall as an operational guarantee.

Maybe it helps to grit one's teeth and laugh with the drought.

Two drought-blasted ranchers rocked on a front gallery, looking for signs, thinking of rain sayings, desperately hoping. Did the wind seem to be picking-up? Were the locusts sounding a tad different? Somehow, one thought to mention that what a person was didn't matter. The Lord plainly says in the Bible that rain fell on just and unjust alike.

"Now that's a definite sign of hope," said the other, straightening in his chair. "If we can get rain on the land of the unjust, what's left can be watered with a bucket."

If it should happen that way, most of us will be among the first to get wet.

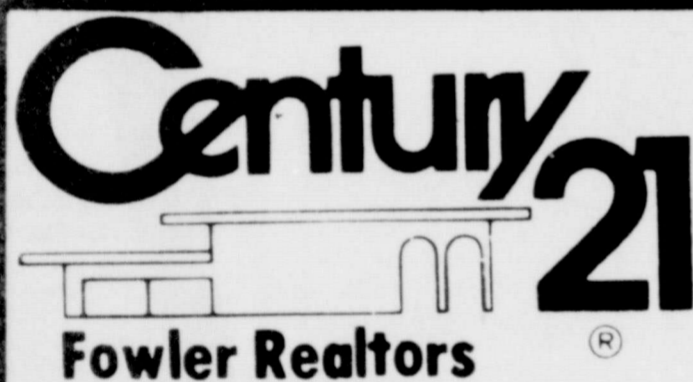

The Draft And The American Tradition

Military obligation has played a major role in Anglo-American history from at least the Ninth Century. The Anglo-Saxon fyrd or local militia was used by Alfred the Great against the Viking raiders. William the Conqueror required military service from all free men as did Henry II. It was the freemen militia that defeated the French knights as Agincourt and Crecy. Elizabeth I issued the Instructions for General Musters in 1572 to strengthen England in the face of the Spanish threat. Both sides used drafted and impressed soldiers in the English Civil War.

In the American colonies, over two hundred laws defined the duty of military service. The Historian D.E. Leach has shown that there was a general "assumption that the colonists themselves would be ready and able to serve as soldiers, an assumption resting mainly on the English tradition and practice of compulsory military obligation."

The American Revolution did not separate the new United States from this tradition. If anything, it served to strengthen it because a citizen army was considered a better safeguard for a free government than a professional or mercenary force. The classic myth of Cincinnatus, the citizen who takes up arms in time of danger and then returns to his civilian labors once the crisis is passed, was quite popular in the early Republic. After all, had not a citizen army just beaten the best professional army then in existence?

During the American Revolution, rebel control of the militia companies had been a valuable asset, a situation we best remember in the legend of the Minuteman. Where would we have been had Paul Revere's cry "To arms, to arms" been met by a mass exodus to Canada.

Yet, the patriotic spirit was not always enough. Several states, including Virginia and Massachusetts, which had been in the forefront of the independence movement, resorted to the draft to bring their militia units up to strength. In 1778 the Continental Congress agreed to General Washington's request for authority to draft men from the militia into the Regulars. Since all healthy men were theoretically liable for the militia this amounted to authority to draft on a nation-wide basis into the Regulars.

In 1792 the Congress, operating under the new Constitution, enacted legislation enrolling "each and every free able-bodied white male citizen" between the ages of 18 and 54 into the militia and established the right to call the militia into national service. Thus the

tradition of service was clearly preserved by the Founding Fathers.

Some prominent statesmen wanted to go even further. Thomas Jefferson wrote to Secretary of War James Monroe in 1813 to argue that "We must train and classify the whole of our male citizens and make military instruction a regular part of collegiate education. We cannot be safe till this is done."

Today the contention is sometimes made that conscription is "slavery" or "involuntary servitude" as defined under the 13th Amendment. Nothing could be further from the American experience. In each and every case, service has been an obligation of free citizens only. As in the 1792 act only those considered full and responsible members of the community

were to be entrusted with the community's defense. In those days the interdependence of rights and duties was better understood than it is today.

The assertion that conscription violates the 13th Amendment has never been sustained in theory or law. The Supreme Court in 1918 specifically rejected the appeal to the 13th Amendment in a series of cases arising from the use of the draft in World War I. The Court ruled that the power granted to Congress in the Constitution to raise and equip armies included the power to compel service. As Chief Justice Edward D. White phrased it: "As the mind cannot conceive an army without the men to compose it, on the face of the Constitution the objection that it does not give power to provide for such men would seem to be too frivolous for further notice." Furthermore the Court ruled that such service was a duty of citizenship. To compel someone to fulfill a legitimate obligation is not a violation of any of his rights.

Special Lawn Care

College Station-Current severe heat and dry conditions pose many problems for homeowners, and lawn care during times of stress is one of the most difficult to deal with.

Dr. Richard L. Duple, turfgrass specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, offers hope with some practical advice to help homeowners cope with lawns during the extreme weather conditions of this summer.

Where water is limited for lawn use, Duple suggests watering only when the lawn shows signs of stress, such as wilting or discoloration.

"When you can water, soak the lawn about 3 or 4 inches deep to encourage deep rooting, stronger plants. Ideally, lawns should be watered early in the morning to incorporate any dew which might be present and to reduce evaporative loss," he says.

When water is available, Duple recommends mowing at a height of 2 1/2 to 3 inches at 10 to 14 day intervals.

"If you cannot water the lawn, mowing at a height of 3 to 4 inches and only when the lawn becomes unsightly is the best practice. Mowing at this height will allow common St. Augustine and bermudagrass to mature and produce seed. The seedstalks can be shredded with a mower in late fall or winter to allow seed to revitalize the lawn next spring," he emphasizes.

The specialist also recommends little or no fertilizer during the summer months, and an active insect and disease control program to protect against further damage.

In South Texas, a particular pest during the dry years is the chinch bug. Chinch bug damage can be distinguished from drought injury by the yellowish, irregular patterns of the infested areas.

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Dove Season Dates Set

Austin-The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission at a public meeting in Austin Wednesday adopted hunting seasons and bag limits for mourning and white-winged doves under a two-zone arrangement as in the past.

The North Zone mourning dove season will be Sept. 1-Oct. 30, 1980. The straight 60-day season represents a change from the split season used last year.

For mourning doves in the South Zone, the season dates will be Sept. 20-Nov. 2, 1980, and Jan. 3-18, 1981.

The white-winged dove season dates are Sept. 6-7 and 13-14 in Brewster, Cameron, Culberson, El Paso, Hidalgo, Hudspeth, Jeff Davis, Kinney, Maverick, Presidio, Star, Terrell, Val Verde, Webb Willacy and Zapata Counties.

In South Zone counties having an open season on whitewings, the fall season for mourning doves will end Oct. 29, 1980. In counties which have days with concurrent whitewing and mourning dove hunting in either zone, the legal shooting time for those days is noon to sunset. In all other counties in both zones,

shooting hours are one half hour before sunrise to sunset.

Dove Program Leader Jim Dunks advised the commission that the split hunting season for mourning doves in the North Zone has received opposition from some hunters who contend that they are penalized by having the winter season. "The winter season in the North Zone will be controversial, but it appears that the straight season will appeal to the majority of hunters," Dunks said.

In adopting the two-zone alignment, the commission set aside a proposal to establish a three-zone setup after reviewing written and verbal objections. The three-zone plan would have set a large portion of North and Central Texas and would have combined the Trans-Pecos region with the Rio Grande Valley in the same zone. Objections to the three-zone plan were strong from sportsmen in San Antonio and El Paso areas.

As was the case last dove season, one fully-feathered wing must be retained on all dressed dove carcasses in all of the South Zone at all times, and counties of the North Zone which have a concurrent whitewing and mourning dove season.

The North Zone is comprised of Kinney, Uvalde, Medina, Bexar, Comal, Bays, Travis, Williamson, Milam, Robertson, Leon, Houston, Cherokee, Nacogdoches, and Shelby Counties and all counties to the north and west. The South Zone includes all counties to the south and east.

Bag limits for mourning and white-winged doves will remain unchanged from last year, at 10 per day, 20 in possession. Hunters may take a limit of each species during the white-wing season in counties offering a whitewing season.

The commission also set the early teal duck season for all teal species for Sept. 13-21, 1980, with shooting hours from sunrise to sunset. Bag limit will be four per day in the aggregate.

The rail and gallinule season will be Sept. 1-Nov. 9, 1980, with shooting hours from one half hour before

sunrise to sunset. The daily bag limit on large rails (king and clapper) will be 15 in the aggregate per day; possession limit 30 in the aggregate. The daily bag limit

on small rails (sora and Virginia) will be 26 in the aggregate per day; possession limit 25 in the aggregate. The gallinule limits will be 15 per day; possession limit 30.

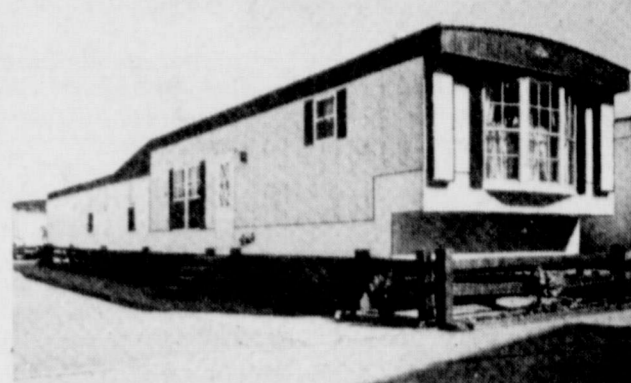

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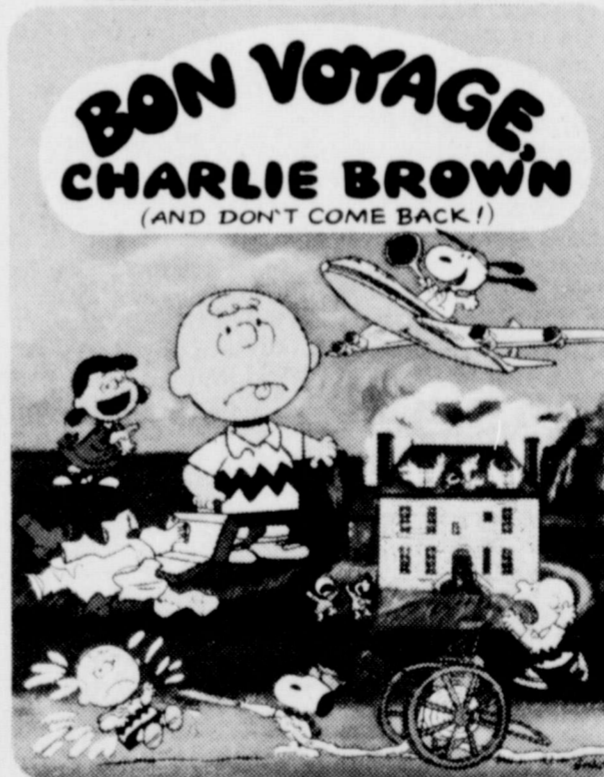
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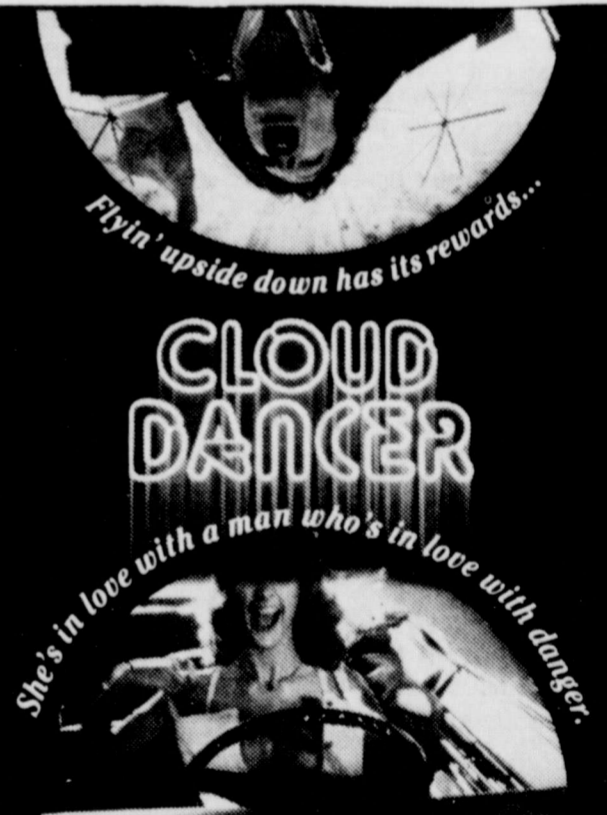

Congressional Comment

The Administration's \$616 billion budget for fiscal year 1981 is a nightmare of deception, unrealistically optimistic projections, inadequacies concerning our defense budget and irresponsibly high domestic spending. One hardly knows where to start in to solve the problems it would create if enacted.

But let's look for a moment at what the budget means to you the taxpayer. The President is projecting a \$16 billion deficit, based on his assumption revenues will be up by more than \$75 billion. Where does the extra money come from? Some \$19 billion will come from a Social Security tax increase.

But that's only the obvious tax increase. Everyone who has received a cost-of-living pay raise will pay more both in terms of numbers of dollars and percentage of his salary because he'll be pushed into a higher tax bracket.

Then, of course, the windfall profits tax will further bloat the federal treasury, and ultimately will be paid by the consumer.

The Administration is predicting a recession for this year, and there is serious question whether the revenue projections can be reached, even with the near-draconian tax burden working Americans will have to bear. And that tax burden will work against recovery from the recession.

If we are to solve the economic problems of the 1980's, we need new tax policies which place greater reliance on the private sector by expanding its productive capacity and efficiency. And the starting point is to give the American taxpayer greater control over his hard-earned income through substantial tax reductions for individuals and business.

A cut in tax rates will generate more jobs, greater economic activity and an expanded tax base which, over time, will yield the same or higher revenues, even with lower tax rates.

Just as important is readjusting, or "indexing," tax brackets so that cost-of-living wage increases are just that, and not an excuse for the federal government to grab a higher percentage of income.

We must also encourage personal savings and investment through tax exemptions and take other action to stimulate capital formation. Giving tax breaks to businesses so that they can accumulate money to invest may sound like only a way to help business, but it really would benefit everyone through improving productivity. In 1979, the productivity of the American worker actually declined by .9 percent. And without increasing productivity, there can be no real growth in the economy.

In short, we must restore a pattern of growth to the American economy through prudent but people-oriented tax policies.

TUPELO, MISS.—Little House on the Prairie was the most constructive program on television and Soap was the least constructive according to the Fall 1979 Television Monitoring Program of the National Federation for Decency.

ABC was the top sex-oriented network. CBS was the top user of profanity and Procter & Gamble was the number one sponsor of both sex and profanity according to the report.

The monitoring, covering 799.5 hours of prime-time programming between September 9 and December 1 last fall, was done by approximately 450 trained volunteers in nine states.

The report showed a decrease of 5.1 per cent of sexually-oriented activity during the period when compared with a similar period of 1978. The decrease came in the area of skin scenes, which the NFD described as "undue and unnecessary emphasis on the female anatomy." The number of skin scenes dropped from 1842 in 1978 to 1604 last fall. NBC was the only network

WASHINGTON, D.C. —

As the attention of the world has been drawn to the Middle East during the long and frustrating siege of our American Embassy in Iran, many Americans have begun to focus on attitudes held not only by our enemies, but our so-called allies as well.

We have watched with growing concern as one after another of our allies has demonstrated less than united support for the American position in Iran, conceding more and more to their own petroleum dependencies. The United States, we thought, stood alone.

All Americans were heartened, therefore, when the Canadian government revealed their involvement in the concealment and recent escape of six American diplomats from under the noses of the Iranians.

The successful plot to conceal the six in the Canadian Embassy in Tehran for three months undoubtedly has severely threatened Canadian-Iranian relations, but must surely seal a growing bond between the U.S. and our neighbors to the north.

It would seem that in our clamor for support from allied and non-allied nations abroad, we have often failed to keep our fences strong with our two closest neighbors — Mexico and Canada. With the increasing recognition of Mexico as an oil-exporting nation, we have turned more and more of our attention to that tattered fence along our southern border, while paying less and less attention to Canada.

Mexico has, with some cause, treated overtures toward more favorable trade with the U.S. with some disdain. Their actions in refusing the return

of the Shah following his medical treatment in this country, were, to say the least, an embarrassment to our government, to point out only one example.

On the other hand, Canada, with perhaps the same justifiable sense of neglect, has demonstrated what I feel is a level of admirable support.

They have supported our position in Iran on every front, from the U.S. resolution on economic sanctions (vetoes by the Russians) to halting their own imports of needed Iranian petroleum. This latter was done in the face of fuel shortages of their own.

Canada remains an important exporter of natural gas and some liquid petroleum to the U.S. Current long-standing contracts call for Canadian exports of up to 1 trillion cubic feet of natural gas per year to the U.S., making up 5 percent of our domestic consumption. The actual amount of Canadian liquid petroleum exported to the U.S. (about 100,000 barrels per day) is less significant in terms of overall supply than in its importance in easing a critical transportation bottleneck to the northern states.

On another front, Canada recently took the position that they would not make up the shortfall of grain exports to Russia caused by the American embargo precipitated by the invasion of Afghanistan.

While we might wish that our neighbor would join us in actual economic sanctions against Iran or in stopping their own scheduled grain sales to Russia, we cannot quarrel that when American lives were involved — six of them — they stood strong and tall on our side. That stand should not be minimized — or forgotten.

per cent. People shown drinking alcohol in prime-time rose from 2,630 in 1978 to 4,677 last fall, an increase of 77.83 per cent. Ads were not included in the beverage monitoring.

The report showed 68.57 per cent of all prime-time programs had sexual content, with 52.73 per cent containing profanity. A total of 87 per cent of all programs contained either sex and/or profanity. Sex incidents were aired at an average of 5.37 per programming hour on all three networks. ABC aired 5.64 per hour, CBS 5.51 and NBC 4.96. Over a period of one year the networks would air 11,531 suggested intercourse scenes or sexually suggestive comments during prime-time. That would rise to 18,429 when skin scenes were added.

Procter & Gamble was listed as the top sponsor of sex for the second year in a row. Other top sponsors of sex included American Home Products, General Foods, Pepsico, Chrysler, Warner-Lambert, General Motors, Sterling Drug, Unilever-Lever Brothers, and Ford Motor Company.

The top sexually-oriented programs were CBS Movies, NBC Movies, ABC Movies, ABC Specials, One At A Time (CBS), Soap (ABC), Real People (NBC), B.J. & The Bear (NBC), Three's Company (ABC), Archie Bunker's Place (CBS), Hello Larry (NBC), and WKRP in Cincinnati (CBS).

NBC had a constructive programming rating of 6.388, CBS 5.910 and ABC 5.557. Top constructive rating possible was 10.

This was the third consecutive year for the NFD to conduct the monitoring program.

The top profanity-oriented programs were CBS Movies, NBC Movies, ABC Movies, Archie Bunker's Place (CBS), Dallas (CBS), Holocaust (NBC), Rockford Files (NBC), and M-A-S-H (CBS).

The top constructive programs cited in the monitoring were Little House on the Prairie (NBC), American and National League Baseball Playoffs (NBC), Prime Time Sunday (NBC), 60 Minutes (CBS), The Waltons (CBS), 20-20 (ABC), Wonderful World of Disney (NBC), Holocaust (NBC), Shirley (NBC) and Eight Is Enough (ABC).

The top most constructive programming sponsors were Nissan Motors, Goodyear, Eastman Kodak, Kraftco, IBM, Mars, Phillip Morris, AT&T, IT&T, and Shell Oil.

The least constructive programming sponsors were Olympia Brewing, Norton-Simon, Noxell, Toyota, American Cyanamid, Schering-Plough, Honda, Beecham, Dow Chemical and Colgate-Palmolive.
