time-savers for many busy Texans. Used at their optimum, they can be both time and energy savers. However, optimum use takes practice. Beginners should allow plenty of time to prepare complete meals. Select dishes that are family favorites and use tested recipes. Learning to adapt recipes for microwave cooking comes later with ex-

Consider these three factors when planning complete microwave meals: holding time, standing time, and reheating.

When considering holding time, remember that some foods retain heat longer than others, depending on the density and size of food.

Cook foods with a long holding time first such as roasts, ham, baked potatoes, casseroles, etc., will remain hot while you microwave the rest of the meal.

Standing time allows food such as meats, eggs, bacon, chicken, fish, baked potatoes and corn to continue cooking after removal from the oven. Cover these foods to prevent heat loss. Standing time is usually indicated in recipes and should be considered when meal planning.

The time needed to reheat precooked foods is another factor to consider when planning complete microwave meals. The instructions provided with your oven are the best guide to reheating. Most foods can be reheated on the high power level, except for meats, refrigerated main dishes, and individual plates of food, which should be reheated at 50% power. A covering prevents loss of moisture. Wax paper, plastic wrap, paper towels and ovenproof lids are all





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

#### **Congressional Comment**

WASHINGTON, D.C. -'Do we really need it? Can we afford it? Can the need best be realized at the local level?"

Those three questions have become as close to the "Stenholm philosophy" as anything I can devise. Those are the questions that I believe the people of the 17th District elected me to answer each and every time their money is to be spent through the federal budget. Sometimes the resulting answers aren't easy

I recently proposed an amendment to the Department of Transportation (DOT) Authorization Bill which would have answered those questions in what has appeared to some to be opposition to the transportation needs of the handicapped. That amendment would have created a local option which would allow transit authorities, in consultation with members of the local handicapped community, to establish programs which effectively meet local transportation needs, rather than leaving those needs to the discretion of

"Big Brother" in Washington. At issue are DOT regulations that require that all public transportation systems receiving federal financial assistance become accessible to handicapped persons, including wheelchair users. For the most part, this requires liftequipped buses and modified rail vehicles and stations. Onehalf of peak-hour bus service must be accessible by 1982, which could be extended to 1989 in the case of "extraor-

Can we afford it? Cost estimates for complying with these regulations range from \$6 billion to over \$8 billion (current dollars, excluding inflation). Specialized services designated by the local community would cost an estimated \$4.4 billion.

Can the need best be realized at the local level? My amendment (which was narrowly defeated) and a similar amendment, the Cleveland Amendment to the Surface Transportation Act which will be debated later this session, would allow communities to pursue alternative approaches for meeting the transportation needs of handicapped persons. Programs created as local options to full system accessibility must be developed in consultation with members of the local handicapped community.

This is a complex and often emotional issue, however, the bottom line remains: Do the benefits really justify the costs?

#### Return To Basics Recommended

A return to the basics in public education is one of many recommendations for improving Texas schools contained in a comprehensive report submitted to Governor Bill Clements by the Governor's Advisory Committee on Education.

The Governor said that the report - the result of an exhaustive year-long study by the blue ribbon group - will be used as the basis of his recommendations to the Texas Legislature when it convenes in January.

"I have carefully studied this report and I think it is superb. I wholeheartedly endorse it and I predict that a big percentage of these recommendations will be acted upon by the Legislature in its next ses-Governor Clements

"This report is a blueprint for making our secondary and elementary schools second to none in the nation," Governor Clements said, 'and these recommendations could lead to the most significant and beneficial changes in our Texas public school system since the Gilmer-Aikin laws were

passed some 30 years ago." In their report to Governor Clements, the committee members state, "Texans are well served by their schools. Many goals of public education are being achieved. Yet, the schools can and must improve. The public, the policymakers, and the educators must be dedicated to reaching consensus and generating the will to act on important issues. Through combined efforts, education will be improved for all the students of Texas.

The report addressed the following areas and made these recommendations:

1)School Cirriculum: The Legislature should repeal all existing laws that mandate elements, courses, or subjects to be included in the curriculum, and give the State Board of Education the authority to establish and implement "a state basic curriculum." This curriculum would give strong emphasis on reading, writing, and arithmetic.

2) Student Learning: Social promotions should be

Students: Efforts to influence federal policy should be unified, particularly in the areas of bilingual education and special education, to provide more effective programs in Texas schools.

4) Student Behavior: While existing laws are sufficient to allow authority and flexibility to discipline disruptive students, alternative learning programs should be developed for disruptive students and a procedure should be established to ensure that parents and students read and understand the discipline policy in advance.

5) Teacher Training: A state competency test should be required for all teachers before they receive a teaching certificate. In addition, there should be more rigorous and consistent enforcement of the standards for teacher education institu-

6) Excellence in Teaching: A significant increase in salary and fringe benefits for teachers is needed to make teaching positions competitive with professions in business and industry reuqiring equivalent preparation and training. Also, a Master Teacher position should be created to recognize qualified, high performing career classroom teachers with higher pay and leadership duties

7) School Operations: Schools, especially classroom teachers, should be relieved of excessive paperwork that reduce classroom time and effort.

8) State/Federal Relationships: State and local officials should work together to influence federal laws and regulations from a Texas position regarding educational matters. Local control of the public schools should be maintained. Federal decision making is not the key to meaningful school improvement.

In a letter to Governor Clements, Dr. Tate stated, "This report represents the cohesive effort of a skilled and dedicated group of Texans who served as committee members. The committee met monthly and most members attended each of seven public hearings. In addition to the official functions, individual members spent many hours gathering information and analyzing and discussing ideas with people across the State."

In addition to Dr. Tate, the committee included 19 other Texans from all parts of the State. Businessmen, parents, teachers, school administrators, and other educational professionals served on the committee appointed by Governor Clements.

Governor Clements has announced that he is renewing the committee membership for another year to facilitate active support of the recommendations before the Legislature. He said the committee will assist in getting the education program through the Legislature by functioning through prelegislative and legislative session deliberations.

PURCHASE OF the Randy Steffen collection of printed materials may well be considered a real asset to Cisco Junior College.

The value of the collection to CJC was considered by Oleta Shirley, CJC librarian, in a memo to Dr. Norman Wallace, president. She studied the inventory of books, pamphlets and so forth and submitted the following evaluation:

"The Randy Steffen Collection would add valuable resource materials unattainable elsewhere. Assuming that the pamphlets, documents and paperbacks are in good condition, it would broaden our scope of research material for many years, providing, of course, that methods of preparation and filing are provided for easy accessability.

'Recognition for obtaining this collection would also make scholars aware of the outstanding Texas Collection we already have. This would ultimately lead to CJC's Texas Room becoming a major center for research for a broad spectrum of people doing senior research about Texas and the Southwest."

Mrs. Shirley's study was made from a detailed inventory of the Steffen Collection made by a team from the military library at Fort Sill. The Collection includes such material gathered by the late Mr. Steffen for use in his history of the foot soldier, a work of several volumes. Other historical books on the cavalry with extensive drawings and illustrations of saddles and uniforms were the basis for collecting many books and pamphlets as source material.

The Fort Sill team assigned a value of more than \$10,000 to the Steffen Collection. Some of the books are reprints of first editions, Mrs. Shirley noted, that CJC has in its library available only for use in the library. These reprints could be placed on the shelves for checkout.

Mrs. Shirley found that a limited number of the books in the collection are valuable first editions - some inscribed by the authors for Mr. Steffen.

Mrs. Shirley noted that there is a considerable amount of information about Texas in the Collection. Much of the information would be difficult to impossible to obtain elsewhere.

CJC paid \$7,000 for the Steffen Collection, using funds from the Leon Maner


