Texas DPS Urges Motorist To Be 'Exceptionally Careful'

Austin--The Texas Department of Public Safety has urged motorists to be "exceptionally careful" during the

long Labor Day weekend because of the increased volume of traffic which can be expected. Colonel Jim Adams, director of the DPS, said "Labor Day, the last holiday of summer, becomes the last holiday-period-for far too many Texans and many more have their holiday ruined by a traffic accident."

"Our Statistical Services Division of the DPS, has predicted that 45 persons may die during this 78-hour period. In order to provide maximum protection for the driving public we are placing additional Troopers on the highways. Most will be in well-marked, black-and-white units, although unmarked units will be utilized to detect those determined violators who make the highways unsafe for others." He also said they will be especially watchful for drunken drivers.

Col. Adams said "we can easily overcome the predictions if motorists comply with the speed limits, use their seat belts, avoid driving while impaired by alcohol or drugs and watch out for the other driver."

A U.S. Treasury study has shown that 70 percent of the personal income taxes in this country are paid by people whose annual income exceeds \$17,000.

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Vets Views

While most Vietnam Era veterans now agree with a majority of the public that America should have stayed out of Vietnam, these same veterans are glad they served their country and would serve again if asked to.

This was among the findings in a survey conducted for the Veterans Administration by Louis Harris and Associates, which was released today by Max Cleland, Administrator of Veterans Affairs. The study was ordered by President Carter "...to better understand some of the issues that will continue to confront the Vietnam Era veteran."

The survey reflects strong patriotic feelings on the part of veterans, despite disillusionment with the war and a great deal of bitterness about their treatment after the war. Ninety-one percent of the veterans serving in Vietnam agreed with the statement: "Looking back, I am glad I served by country." Two-thirds of Vietnam veterans say that they would serve again if asked.

The survey also confirmed an advance sample finding that although only one in five Americans still supports America's involvement in the Vietnam war, a great majority of the public has a high regard for the veterans who fought that war.

Cleland said, "It appears that the public is finally separating the war from the warrior. Despite the unfriendly reception the Vietnam veterans received when returning home, which is verified in the survey, this group of veterans is beginning to find some understanding and sympathy among the American people."

There also is evidence that most veterans of the Vietnam Era are adjusting well to civilian life, although there remains much to be done in healing the physical and psychological scars. Cleland said, "The survey underscores the need for efforts such as the VA's new readjustment counseling program for Vietnam Era veterans. Since its authorization by Congress late last year 86 unique 'store-front' Vet Centers have been opened nationally to help those veterans who most need help with readjustment problems," he added.

Louis Harris and Associates interviewed 7,000 persons nationwide between November 1979 and March 1980. They fell into four groups: the general public, Vietnam Era veterans, educators and employers. The surveys are the most thorough and comprehensive ever undertaken of attitudes towards Vietnam Era veterans. An advance sample survey of the general public was released last November.

According to the independent Harris Survey, soldiers who had not completed high school at the time they went of Vietnam were almost five times as likely to have seen heavy combat as those who had completed college.

Administrator Cleland said, "These same educationally disadvantaged veterans were identified as needing additional assistance in President Carter's message to Congress. Congress is currently considering the President's request to extend the GI Bill time limit to provide educational benefits targeted specifically to strengthen occupational skills of this special group. I urge Congress to pass this legislation to insure these veterans have ample time to pursue this necessary training."

The completed survey also showed that Vietnam veterans feel they have more serious problems than combat veterans of the World War II era, and the public, educators and employers agree. A majority of World War II and Korea veterans also feel Vietnam veterans have more serious problems than combat veterans of earlier wars. Significantly, recognition of the special problems facing Vietnam veterans is greatest among those groups which were most opposed to the war.

The survey also found that while the public and veterans are in substantial agreement that news media have had a significant effect in shaping American attitudes about the veterans of the Vietnam Era, they differ

on whether this effect has been positive or negative. The Vietnam Era veterans feel television news stories have given the American public an unfavorable impression of them. Contrasting that is the view of the substantial majority of the public that they got a favorable impression of those veterans from the television news. Most agree the coverage was realistic.

Other survey findings included:

- * Nearly three-quarters of the veterans of earlier wars feel that people their own age gave them a very friendly reception compared to less than half of the Vietnam Era veterans.

- * Most of the veterans who served in the Vietnam area said that they experienced moderate or heavy combat conditions while there.

- * Three-quarters of the Vietnam Era veterans feel the federal government should be doing more for them. A two-thirds majority of the American public agrees.

- * Employers' commitments to hiring Vietnam Era veterans have declined over the decade of the '70s.

- * The vast majority of educators report that neither age, nor military experience, nor discrimination has been a problem for Vietnam Era veterans at their schools. They rate the veterans frequently

College Station--Serve pasta for hearty eating at mealtime, says Mary K. Sweeten, a foods and nutrition specialist.
 Pasta includes all members of the spaghetti, macaroni and noodle family, she explains.
 Mrs. Sweeten is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.
 The bland flavor of pasta complements a variety of foods from mild cheeses to highly-spiced, tomato-based sauces.

To use pasta in salads, add salad dressing while pasta is still hot to prevent sticking and to help blend flavors.
 Use different kinds of pasta interchangeably in

most recipes that call for a given weight of uncooked pasta.
 However, if the recipe calls for one cup or one and one-half cups, accurate

substitution may be hard.
CALORIES
 A one-half cup serving of macaroni provides 130 calories, spaghetti, 173, and egg noodles, 117.

For diets which restrict the use of eggs, select pastas other than egg noodles to avoid this ingredient, the specialist advises.

 In addition, pasta, a good source of food energy, the B vitamins and iron at low costs, helps stretch the food dollar by making meat and other protein foods go farther.

Pasta also supplies small amounts of protein which is supplemented in meat, poultry, fish, cheese, eggs and milk--foods often combined with pasta, the specialist points out.

VARIETY
 Pasta dough may come in 150 different shapes, ranging from alphabet shapes to wide lasagna-type noodles.

Among the most unusual shapes are the Italian varieties such as the green noodles containing spinach or the cresta di gallo shaped like a rooster's crest.

STORAGE
 Store pasta at room temperature in a closed container to keep dust, moisture and insects out for up to one year, except egg noodles.

Keep egg noodles no more than six months, she recommends.

PREPARATION
 Cook pasta to tender yet firm stage but not sticky. Add pasta to rapidly boiling, salted water, and cook only until tender.

Thick pastas require more water. Avoid overcooking pasta--it becomes soft and mushy.

Shorten the cooking time if pasta will be used in a combination dish that needs further cooking.

Cook pasta just before serving, Mrs. Sweeten continues.

If you must cook it ahead, keep it hot in a strainer over hot water, and add cooking oil, butter or margarine to reduce sticking.

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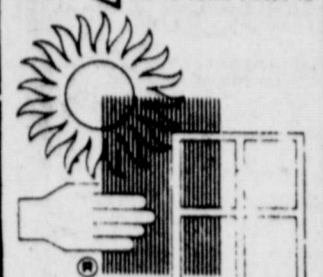
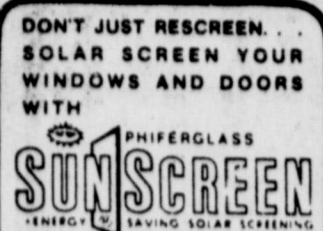
DPS Urges Motorists To Be Extra Careful This Labor Day

Cities Tax Rebate Bonus One Time Only

Austin, Tex.—State Comptroller Bob Bullock, Thursday Aug. 14, 1980, said continued improvements in the tax processing system in his office will result this month in a one-time, multi-million sales tax rebate bonus to cities and quicker tax reimbursements in the future. Bullock said Texas cities who levy the optional one-percent city sales tax will receive two rebate checks for August. He said this month's "extra" check will include a large amount of money from second quarter returns filed in the Comptroller's office on the July 31 deadline and normally would have been included in the Sept. payment.

He said one check represents taxes being returned from last month's rebate cutoff through the end of July. The other check is the result of allowing an extra week of tax allocations for cities during the first week of Aug. The City sales tax is collected by merchants and businesses along with the state sales tax and is refunded each month to the cities where it is collected by the Comptroller's office. Hints For The Aged & Handicapped

DEAR PAT -- A member of our local Easter Seals organization gave me your name and thought you could assist us in a problem we have had for years.

Our son is nearly 13 and was born with a club foot. This foot is so much smaller. We have now reached the point where he needs one man's shoe and one boy's shoe—that match. We are desperate now. I hope you can help.

For years we have also been trying to find some place to accept his second pair of new shoes due to the fact we have been buying two pair for some time. It is such a waste to throw them away when someone could get some good out of them.—Mrs. M.S., Indiana

DEAR MRS. S.—I can and I will. First, I hope you still have all those "extra" pairs of odd-sized shoes because someone certainly can use them.

I am sending you a list of several companies that offer assistance in "mix and match" shoes for individuals with problems similar to your son's.

In the meantime, when trying to get men's footwear to match boy's foot wear, your best bet is in the area of sporting shoes such as tennis, jog, running, etc. or in a boot called the "Wellington" boot. This is a very comfortable boot with a heel like that of a man's dress shoe. This is more of a shoe-boot or dress boot. It is not like a western or cowboy boot. The toe is rounded for comfort and it comes in leather (black or brown) or in the rough-out style.—PAT

DEAR PAT—My sister lives with my widowed

mother in Arkansas. My sister is 44 and has Cerebral Palsy. They both receive social security based on my father's earnings. My sister draws social security because she is disabled and has never been able to work. Her check is too high to qualify her for health care through SSI and she has never been able to get health insurance because no insurance company that we have tried will let her qualify because she has cerebral palsy.

Would you please let me know if you know of any way that we can get additional health insurance coverage because as she gets older we feel there will come a time when she will need it.—Mrs. E.W., La.

DEAR MRS. W.—Yes, there are a number of good insurance companies that provide health insurance for the disabled. I am sending you a list of company names so you can contact them individually and decide which one is best for your sister's needs.—PAT

Emergency Loans Available From FmHA

Emergency loans for farmers, ranchers, or aquaculture operators are available through county offices of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA). Jack Phillips, FmHA county supervisor, said today.

Phillips asked that those who need farm credit as a result of the drought should make their needs known at the Farmers Home Administration office at Eastland.

Applications for assistance in the disaster stricken counties will be accepted by Farmers Home until May 21, 1981, for physical and production losses.

FmHA loans covering actual physical and production losses may be used to replace installations, equipment, or buildings, (including homes) lost through this disaster. Funds may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock, or to meet interest and depreciation payments on current real estate and chattel debts. Other loans, beyond actual losses, can be made for annual operating expenses or to make major adjustments in a farming (or ranching or aquaculture) operation.

"Funds can be used for essential operating and living costs," Phillips said.

Loans covering actual losses are made at an interest rate of five percent and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible consistent with the applicant's reasonable ability to pay. Loans beyond actual losses have various maturities, depending upon the purpose of the loan.

The interest rate for actual loss loans is five percent. Other loans are being made at an interest rate of thirteen and one-half (13½) percent.

To be eligible for an emergency loan, an applicant must have suffered losses from the disaster and be unable to get credit from other sources.

Emergency loans can be used to help the farmer restore damaged farm operations and additional loans based upon the emergency designation can be used to reorganize the farm for greater efficiency and better production.

Time For Pecan Growers To Have Leaves Tested

Pecan growers in Texas should collect leaf samples for zinc analysis during the next few weeks.

Purpose of the analysis is to help growers find out how good a job they did with their zinc spray programs, points out John Cooper, pecan pest management agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Inadequate zinc applications will result in stunted trees and reduced pecan yields.

Mid-August through mid-September is the best time to

collect leaf samples to indicate the true nutritional status of the pecan tree, explains Cooper. Take two leaflets from the second compound leaf on the current season's growth. Collect 60 to 100 leaflets at random around the tree, and select samples from trees in all areas of the orchard.

Enclose leaf samples in a plastic bag to prevent moisture loss and take them to the county Extension Office for mailing to the Soil Testing Laboratory at Texas A&M University. Or mail samples direct to the lab

located in Room 230, Soil and Crop Sciences Bldg., Texas A&M University, College Station, Tex. 77843. Enclose \$2 for each sample to be analyzed.

If the analysis shows zinc to be less than 60 parts per million (ppm), then the spray program was not sufficient to supply the tree with adequate zinc and reduced production can be expected, says Cooper.



The agent also advises pecan growers to continue their vigilance for black aphids and hickory shuckworms.

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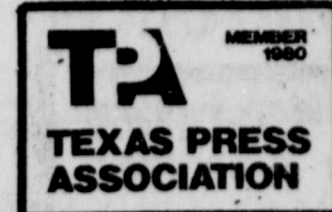

People Things

RUIDOSO, N.M.—Without the tourist and horse racing, this community would be a village of perhaps 2,000 people. That's a statement we heard here the other day. And a look around the area bears out the man's thoughts.

Tourists have been coming to the Ruidoso region this year in increasing numbers, the CoFC office told us. This has likely been the result of the rising costs of gasoline and transportation, for Ruidoso is the closest mountain resort area for Texans and those of the southwest.

The permanent population has been estimated at about 7,500 with the summer figure several times that number. There are literally hundreds of tourist type businesses — motels, restaurants, drive-in, gift and art shops, service stations and garages, and the like.

Ruidoso and the area are very scenic with pine trees and greenery. They get between 20 and 30 inches of rain every year. Mountains tower to 12,000 feet. The city is a little over 6,000 feet.

You see quite a lot of for sale signs and there are a lot of sales, we're told. Property values are very high, as you might imagine.

A few days here makes one wonder if arrangements to live in Ruidoso during the summer months wouldn't be real desirable. Day-time temperatures may reach the mid 80s, and the nights are in the 40s and 50s. There are no mosquitoes and few flies.

RUIDOSO HORSE RACING features the quarter horse — so named because of its ability to run a fast quarter mile (440 yards). Two quarter horse races will have purses of more than \$1,000,000 this year — the All-American Derby on Aug. 24 carries a purse of about \$1,250,000 and the big event, the All-American Futurity on Labor Day will have a purse of \$1,280,000. And the 1981 Futurity purse will be \$1,500,000. The Futurity is an event for two-year olds.

The Futurity cash build-up begins a year or more ahead of race time with horses being nominated with a payment of \$50. Payments are due every few months on the nominees until the final \$750 a few days before the race. In 1978, some 1,500 horses were nominated. The number dropped with each

payment (by elimination etc.) to 301 in August before the Labor Day running. The final field was selected from that group.

There are several hundred horse owners here for the season that begins in early May and runs through Labor Day. Racing is every Thursday through Sunday. Trainers get 10% of the winner's purse in each race every day, and the jockeys get another 10%. Bettors bought over \$32,500,000 worth of tickets at the windows last year, and 1980 is due to be another record year.

The racing program calls for 12 races beginning at 1 p.m. and ending around 6 p.m. They have parking for 4,000 cars and seats for 5,000 or so people.

MET UP WITH the Oral Davises of Rising Star at the travel trailer park where we're staying. They're just back from Europe and they, too, saw the famous Passion Play in that delightful Bavarian city. Also met Mr. Davis' brother and wife and the brother's twin sister from Lubbock here. The twin sister says she doesn't like to be in crowds with her twin brother because he tells his age.

Also saw the Gene Abbotts of Cisco in town for vacationing at the Ruidoso cabin of Mrs. GA's sister Agnes. The Dizzy Deans spent the August 21-23 weeks in Ruidoso to visit friends and cool off. Ran in to Mr. Tom Creighton, former member of the Texas Senate from our district, at the race track.
