New Cisco Manager Hires Police Chief

Bill Pence of Cisco, has been hired by the newly-named city manager, R.J. Turpin, as Chief of Police in Cisco. Mr. Pence has been working with the Eastland County Sheriff's Department as a deputy sheriff for the past six months.

Mr. Pence will be taking the place of Kenneth Eaves whose resignation was to be effective Friday, August 29. Mr. Pence was chosen from among five or six applicants and was to be sworn in Friday morning by Mayor Roy Cartee.

Mr. Turpin was in Cisco on Wednesday and Thursday of last week, according to acting city manager Marilyn Abbott-Smith. She said he instructed her to continue as acting city manager until he takes his office on

Council Hires R.J. Turpin As New City Manager Tuesday

The Cisco City Council hired R.J. Turpin, of Ranger, as the new City Manager in a 4 to 1 vote here at Tuesday night's regular meeting. Council member Harold Pippen made the motion, which was seconded by

council member Jerry Jeffcoat. Acting city manager Marilyn Abbott-Smith called the roll for voting which went as follows: Council members Jerry Jeffcoat, Harold Pippen, Raymond Whitley and Lucy Col-

lier, all in favor; council member Louise Allison, against; and Mayor Roy Cartee, abstaining; council member Bill Eudy was absent from the meeting.

Mr. Pippen, who requested the item be

placed on Tuesday night's agenda, stated he personally felt it was time to take action on hiring a city manager. He said such action was needed in consideration of the citizens of Cisco, the council and acting city

manager Marilyn Abbott-Smith, whom he said has done a "bang-up job for the past two months." Ms. Smith was named acting city manager following John Boland's resignation June 25. She had serv-

ed as city secretary for about two weeks before that time.

Mrs. Allison argued against making a decision Tuesday night, since only two of eight applicants had been interviewed. She said she was not going to make up her mind after two people and saw no reason to rush into hiring a new city manager. She stated, "It is easier to hire than fire, if they don't work out."

Mayor Cartee also argued against making a decision that night because he said he personally felt "two candidates do not suffice." He went on to say, "I do not feel it would usurp the community's trust if we wait two more days." (Three more candidates were scheduled for interviews Thursday night.) He said a choice from five rather than two, "serves to be easier."

Mrs. Collier said she was very impressed with Mr. Turpin and, "I think it is for the betterment of the community to do as the people want."

Following the vote Mr. Jeffcoat said, "We've been torn apart these last two months" and he hoped no one on the council had been offended by the vote. He concluded by saying the hiring of Turpin has "started a forward movement and we need to get behind the man and go forward...let's not let individual differences blind us...let's get behind this man and give him a boost."

Mr. Turpin is 55 years old and has been married to his wife Wilda, for 37 years. He is active in church activities and he has been a member of the Lions Club.

In 1967, he served as Executive Director for the Chamber of Commerce to the Northwest Chamber, including all of the West (Continued On Back Page)

Cisco and has been in law enforcement 20 years. He has worked for police departments and sheriff's offices in Odessa and Midland and was police chief in Kermit, he said.

He has also served as constable of Precinct 4 in Eastland County. Pence said he received a law enforcement certificate from Texas A&M University and was certified by the state when he went to work for the Eastland County Sheriff's Department.

Pence said he was a security officer for an oilfield production company before taking the deputy's job with the sheriff's department. He was also formerly employed as a bus driver for the Cisco Junior College athletic department.

Pence and his wife, Virginia, have eight children.

CJC To Open Season Against McMurry J.V.

Area football fans will get their first taste of local games when the 1980 Cisco Junior College Wranglers open the new season Tuesday night, September 2, in a game with McMurry College Junior Varsity of Abilene. Kick-off will be at 7:30 p.m. at Chesley Field in Cisco.

Coach Bill Anderson said the CJC squad has worked out with Abilene Christian University and scrimmaged Sul Ross. Coach Anderson said there is "a lot of work to do...we've got a long way to go"; however, he then said the outlook for this year is "not totally bad."

The Wranglers were #1 in the nation in pass defense and #7 in the nation in pass offense in 1979.

Coach Anderson said there are several sophomores that will be playing this year, but only two returning starters: Ricky Nunn, defensive linebacker and Morris Rangle, offensive tackle.

It was uncertain on Friday who would start as quarterback or as running backs this week, according to Coach Anderson, since there are six available quarterbacks and seven running backs.

Stenholm To Speak At College Dedication

Congressman Charles T. Stenholm knows the full impact of a "dream-come-true". On Sunday, September 7, Mr. Stenholm will help to celebrate the fulfillment of a six-year dream which is now a reality. He will

be the principal speaker of the Convocation and Dedication of Cisco's new professional school, Southwestern Chiropractic College.

The genesis of Southwestern was some eight years ago when Dr. Chief Brown of Cisco dreamed of starting a new professional school for Chiropractors somewhere in the local area. The first organizational meeting was held at an ice-cream parlor in Baird, Texas. Doctors, educators and interested friends of chiropractic discussed the dream over their ice-cream cones. Immediately, the

physical appetites were satisfied, but the mental hunger for a four-year chiropractic college of academic excellence was felt by the entire group.

A professional educational and research consultant was retained to determine if the dream was premature or; if indeed, another chiropractic school was needed in the State of Texas. The consultant wasted no time. Telephone surveys, letters, and research forms were sent out across the United States. Data was gathered from an independent study of the Texas Manpower (Continued On Back Page)

Study.

Research showed that although Texas had gained tremendously in population since 1950, the number of practicing Doctors of Chiropractic had progressively declined. In 1950, there were 1,518 doctors, but by 1978 this number had dropped to only 932.

Since all demographic trends pointed directly to the Sun Belt and Texas, the dream became a determined effort of endless hours of work in planning meetings, public presentations, fund raising and public relations. A new Chiropractic College was an absolute necessity, not only for the immediate area, but for the State of Texas and the entire nation.

Research showed that there were 85 counties in Texas without the services of a chiropractor. It also showed that the average age of the doctors was decreasing as is usual in the other areas of the healing arts. In fact, it was discovered that the average age of Texas Chiropractic Doctors was 57 years.

Many doctors indicated that they wanted to retire, but they had so many patients who depended on them that they simply could not slow down. Most were working from 5 to 6 days a week and were treating record numbers of patients.

The large active practices, strenuous educational requirements, seminar attendances and shortage of doctors demanded the organization of a new chiropractic college.

Shipman, Chairman of the Board-of-Regents, believes that his prayers were answered when Dr. Hopkins accepted the position. Dr. Shipman has stated many times "We have the best man in America! Dr. Hopkins' numerous experiences as president of many business corporations, personnel positions and excellent experiences in academics assures us of having the number one school in the United States. Our excellence in professional education will be unsurpassed."

Dr. Hopkins arrived in Cisco on July 7 at 11:30 a.m. The Cisco townspeople wasted no time in their acceptance of Dr. Hopkins and the new college. In fact, thirty minutes after he arrived in town, he was introduced as the main speaker at the Cisco Lions Club. Dr. Hopkins stated, "Our acceptance by the citizens across the state has been phenomenal. We are very grateful for the strong support of the entire State of Texas. Hundreds of letters have poured in from all across the United States in the expression of gratitude and support for our new school."

Faculty have been hired, students have pre-enrolled, the curriculum has been developed; classes will begin on September 3, 1980.

The eight-year-dream will become full reality when Congressman Stenholm gives his address at the Convocation and Dedication of Southwestern Chiropractic College on September 7 at 1:30

at the First Baptist Church in Cisco. All interested persons are invited to attend this historic dedication and convocation.

Homemaking Hints

Each month I have the privilege of giving a nutrition program at the Senior Citizens Centers. I present this program at the noon nutritional meal. I always

look forward to going to the Cisco, Gorman, and Ranger centers each month. One of the rich rewards of being a County Extension Agent is that you get to meet so many

nice people over the county.

This month I have been speaking on No-Nitrite Meats. No-nitrite meats must be handled carefully for safe food consumption.

In the past, products with names like "salami", "bologna" and "frankfurters" had to be preserved or "cured". Curing is a way of preparing meat to make it stay safe to eat for a longer time than fresh, raw meat. Nitrite is used most often to cure products such as bologna, frankfurters, bacon and salami. The nitrite not only acts as a preservative but helps give these products their distinctive color and taste. But more important, it helps to stop germs from growing in these meats - germs that can cause botulism. Botulism is a food poisoning that is so serious that you can die from it.

But some people are questioning the safety of nitrite and that nitrite may be harmful in some way to people's health.

So some consumers and meat processors have asked USDA to change the rules so they can have bologna, bacon, frankfurters, and other cured meats without nitrite, but still called by these names.

USDA did change the rules, but with one important difference. The new rules say the products without nitrite must be called "UNCURED". Labels for these products will read: "uncured frankfurters", "uncured bologna", "uncured bacon", or "uncured salami".

When you see the word "uncured", that means you must take care of the products just as you would fresh meat like ground beef or fresh pork. You can keep uncured bologna, bacon, and frankfurters in the refrigerator only 4 to 7 days, not 2 to 3 weeks as you can keep bacon, bologna, and franks with nitrite.

The new rules also say the labels of "uncured" meat products must carry a warning: "No Nitrate or Nitrite Added. Not Preserved - Keep Refrigerated Below 40 degrees F. at all times".

To protect your family and yourself from food poisoning, handle these new uncured products with old names as carefully as you do raw meat.

So, remember, if you buy uncured meat: keep it refrigerated, don't let it sit on the table or kitchen counter, and don't pack uncured meats in sack lunches unless you can keep it cool.

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INFORMED VOTING

AMENDMENT NO. 4
Senate Joint Resolution 18, proposing a constitutional amendment to authorize bingo games for charitable purposes on a local option election basis.

The proposed amendment of Article III, Section 47, of the Texas Constitution would authorize the legislature to pass a law permitting and regulating bingo games conducted by a church, synagogue, religious society, volunteer fire department, nonprofit veterans organization, fraternal organization, or nonprofit organization supporting medical research or treatment programs. The law must permit the voters of the county, justice precinct, or incorporated city or town to determine whether the bingo games may be held in the county, justice precinct, or city or town.

The law enacted by the legislature also must require that:

- (1) the proceeds from the bingo games are spent in this state for a charitable purpose of the organization conducting the games;
- (2) the games are limited to one location on property owned or leased by the organization;
- (3) the games are conducted, promoted, and administered by members of the organization; and
- (4) the organization must report quarterly to the comptroller of public accounts about the proceeds collected from the games and about the purposes for which the proceeds are spent.

BACKGROUND
Each Texas Constitution adopted before the 1876 Constitution contained the following provision: "No lottery shall be authorized by this State; and the buying or selling of lottery tickets within this State is prohibited." This provision was omitted from the 1876 Constitution. In its place, the 1876 Constitution Article III, Section 47, which has remained unchanged since its adoption. This section directs the legislature to pass laws prohibiting the establishment of lotteries and gift enterprises. The legislature has carried out this duty by passing penal laws prohibiting lotteries and gift enterprises. The present relevant penal laws are contained in Chapter 47 of the Penal Code.

The courts of the state

have held that a game is a lottery if:

- (1) a prize is awarded in the game;
- (2) the distribution of the prize is determined by chance; and
- (3) a participant in the game pays a consideration for the opportunity to play the game.

A bingo game at which a prize is awarded and at which a consideration is charged for the opportunity to play the game clearly is lottery.

The attorney general of Texas has ruled that a law exempting churches, veterans organizations, or other nonprofit charitable organizations from prosecution under the lottery statute violates Article III, Section 47. (Tex. Att'y Gen. Op. No. M-965 (1971).) As a result, an amendment of Section 47 is necessary to permit an organization to conduct bingo games.

ARGUMENTS FOR:

1. The charitable purposes for which churches, synagogues, religious societies, volunteer fire departments, veterans organization, fraternal organizations, and medical research or treatment organizations are organized are of great benefit to society. The revenue from the

bingo games would be limited to use in this state for the charitable purposes of these organizations. As a result, the public welfare would benefit substantially from the bingo games.

2. The attitudes of persons about bingo games vary greatly from one community to another. The proposed amendment would allow, according to a law to be passed by the legislature, each community to decide for itself whether to permit bingo games conducted by charitable organizations.

3. In spite of the present prohibition of lotteries, it is a current practice in many communities for charitable organizations to conduct bingo games to promote their charitable purposes. The law enforcement authorities in some communities have given tacit approval to the games by failing to enforce the prohibition. The proposed amendment would allow the legislature to pass a law that simply permits a community to legalize, within limitations, the current practice in the community.

4. Bingo games provide an opportunity for entertainment, social gathering, and relaxation for a significant part of a community's

members. For example, the social life of many elderly persons revolves around the charitable organizations to which they belong. If charitable organizations are prohibited from conducting the games, many persons are deprived of a primary source of social activity.

AGAINST:
1. A problem that is inherent to bingo games is the possibility of fraud. A regulatory scheme to prevent fraud in the games would be very difficult to administer, and therefore, safeguards would be ineffective.

2. Persons engaged in organized crime often have become involved in other forms of legalized gambling and there is no reason to expect that legalized bingo games would be any different. Organized crime is a growing problem in the state. The legalization of bingo would present organized criminals with an opportunity to make further advancements into the state.

3. If bingo games are legalized, the number of the games would dramatically increase. Following this increase, persons with low incomes would become the most frequent participants in the games because they are the most vulnerable to the ill-advised hope of winning money or prizes in this form of gambling. Thus the games would take money from poor people and bring

GORDON SPOT

By DeMarquis Gordon

In May and early June this looked like a good year for making hay. However, hay production ended with the summer drought. It now appears the supply will not be adequate.

It is very important that stockmen know the quality of the hay they are going to be feeding this winter. Hay shows are a good method for stockmen and hay producers to get this information.

Hay shows are designed to be educational and provide producers an opportunity to view top quality hay. It is important that producers know all the key elements that go into top quality hay and are familiar with hay judging procedures.

The eighth annual Eastland County Hay Show is set for October 3 as a part of the County Fair. The Eastland FFA Chapter is sponsoring the hay show with assistance from the Young Farmers Chapter. All entries should be submitted to the FFA by September 13. This will give them time to get protein analysis of each bale by the date of the hay show. We would like to encourage all producers and stockmen to make plans now to get entries in the hay show.

An Eastland County peanut clinic was conducted last week. About 30 peanut growers brought problem plants to the clinic for identification of problems and to get advice from specialists.

The main problem that over shadows all other problems is dry weather. We saw a lot of peanut plants that had very few if any peanuts on them.

Irrigated peanuts are not much better. Most wells are low and without the help of rainfall these peanuts can not produce a good crop.

All crops in Eastland County such as grain sorghum, cotton and pecans are having the same problems.

If we should get rain in September an application of fertilizer to pastures will pay good returns.

Nitrogen can boost fall production on improved pastures. Although considerable nitrogen may have

been applied in the spring, that has been used by grass during the spring and summer.

Actually, fall applications of nitrogen can double forage production. Research in Texas indicates that this doubling of normal forage production is obtainable from dryland improved pastures by applying 50-70 pounds of actual nitrogen per acre.

So, producers should take advantage of cooler temperatures and generally available moisture during September by applying a top dressing of nitrogen to pastures and hay fields. The increased production that will result will be well worth the effort and cost after this dry summer.

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New County Jail Opens

Sunday, August 31, 1980

NOTICE

There will be an open house at the new jail on Saturday, Aug. 30th. The public is invited to visit between the hours of 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.

Perhaps the new Eastland County jail cannot be called beautiful, and its design is far from traditional. But the tan brick complex, located beside the old jail north of the Courthouse Square in Eastland, is modern and well-constructed. The old sandstone jail standing above it is a last relic of the old West — the new building is the symbol of another age and set of concepts. The old jail, built in 1897, cost \$8,000. The new building cost \$775,000, making it one of the most expensive structures in Eastland County.

Built by Boone and Pope of Abilene, with James H. Wheeler Jr. as architect, the new jail will be occupied on Sept. 2nd. It contains more than 8,000 ft. of floor space, and is composed of steel, brick, and concrete — with bullet-proof glass in the receiving area on the south side.

The building has been under construction for more than a year, but bad weather, difficulty in obtaining materials, a painter's strike, and necessary inspections have delayed its opening. It was urgent that this building comply with the Texas Jail Standards, as well as the Federal Guidelines looming behind them. For Guidelines, as Eastland County folk have learned, are not merely gentle suggestions. Not when County Officials can be hauled to Federal Court for alleged non-compliance. Not when inmates of the old jail win the litigation, forcing the County to construct a new facility.

This landmark decision — that County Officials can be held personally responsible for the structure of a jail — was made in 1978 by Federal Judge Leo Brewster, ruling on a litigation by several prisoners in the Eastland County Jail. These inmates were assisted by the Civil Liberties Union of Ft. Worth. The Officials were ordered to build a new jail by Jan. 1, 1980. This was the last official ruling by Judge

Brewster, who died in 1979.

County officials learned that facilities to confine even 25 prisoners would cost around a million dollars, and it was almost impossible to erect such a structure by Jan. 1st. The best they could hope for was May, 1980. Since there were no public funds to build such a jail, they called for a referendum on a new tax known as the "Road and Bridge" tax. This was approved by the public, providing funds to begin construction.

Civic groups and County leaders have made several tours of the completed building. Among those taking part in the final inspection on Aug. 18 were James H. Wheeler Jr., architect, Judge Scott Bailey, Sheriff Johnnie W. Morren, Deputies Gene Millican and Ben Sancillo, County Commissioners Danny Woods, O.E. Blackwell, L.T. Owen, C.B. Dill, County Clerk Joann Johnson, and members of the news media.

They found a complex and interesting building, built low enough on the ground to accommodate wheel chairs when necessary. A large portion of the east and south wings are arranged for administrative purposes, with the reception area and offices for Sheriff Johnnie Morren, two deputies, and Liquor Control Officer L.D. Adams. The architect managed to brighten this area with beige floor tiles, and off-white and harvest gold decor.

Bill Green will be Head Jailer in the new building, assisted by Bill Pence and John Mackey. Mary Clifton will be Jail Matron. Eventually there will be four jailers in the building. These and other added personnel, as well as utilities for the automatic heating and cooling system, will make this a more expensive building to operate than the old jail.

But if prisoners in the old jail are expecting completely different surroundings after moving, they will be disappointed. A vault-like reception door leads to their

area, and there the floors are gray concrete. There are steel fixtures, few objects resembling normal home furnishings, and barred doors controlled by electronic devices. The "drunk tank" is as elemental as an Indian Kiva, where the offender wakes up to a concrete bench and a floor sloping to a drain. There is a lack of any sort of privacy, and the cells are shut away from the sun, the rain, and everything natural and living. Not even a window where a prisoner can watch the cars — or girls — go by toward Main Street.

The new facilities, however, are arranged for much better segregation of classes of prisoners. The women and juveniles are completely removed from adult male prisoners. Persons accused of violent crimes will be placed in different cells from those detained on minor infractions. There will be an outdoor exercise area, and a library stocked with good reading material. And more space is provided for the accused to meet with lawyers.

Ironically enough, the old jail has room for more men than the seventeen spaces provided in the new facility. Eight other cells are arranged in the new jail for women and juveniles, making twenty-five spaces in all. Whether this ratio will work for Eastland County remains to be seen. The women are traditionally less violent per capita than the men around here! And if everyone doesn't try to keep down the crime rate, the new jail will be overloaded from the beginning.

In the area of security, however, the new jail is every superior. Eastland County has had some notorious jail breaks in the past, many times involving holes in the roof of the old building. Now with steel ceilings, electronic doors and various other devices, inmates will be hard pressed to work their way to the street. The building has an auxiliary power plant, in case Texas Electric is knocked out. So no more sinister nights with a Sheriff risking being "jumped" on the second floor of the old jail — no more inmates sneaking down the 1890 stairs to murder a Deputy.

Those reasons alone will probably cause Eastland County folk to accept the new jail with good grace — including the "Road and Bridge" Tax they will be paying for at least twenty years.

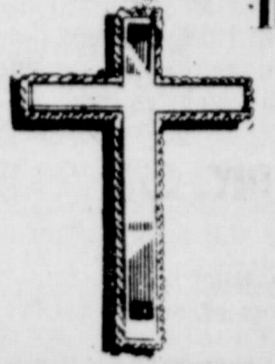
