Summer Band Beginner Program Success

Our first summer band beginner program was a tremendous success. Thirtythree sixth grade students, who had not played a band instrument before, started a new band era in Cisco. When this program reaches full growth, you will want to be part of it. You can. It is easier now than later. I will be more explicit later in this article.

The man who heads the Suzuki school of music and is also president of the Sony corporation in Japan, has written a very enlightening book entitled Kindergarten Is Too Late. He presents, with a great deal of validation, a theory of when music study should begin. He could be right. But given the proper guidance and support at home and school, we can all achieve an enormous amount of musical ability and appreciation.

Some advantages of our new summer beginner program are: --like instrument classes as opposed to all types of instruments in one class. (Who on earth would try to teach Texas, American, and world history in one class)

-a clear and rested mind. The students are not trying to solve the problems of six or building who will be from

-overload pressure relief. When regular school begins about one half the sixth grade will have already covered about six weeks of material. So the other half will be able to have more teacher time.



Hostesses for the evening were Loree Crowll and Mattie Damron. Refreshments following the meeting were



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

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AMENDMENT NO. 5 House Joint Resolution 86

proposing a constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to grant budget execution powers to the governor, subject to approval by a budget execution committee.

The proposed amendment would empower the legislature to authorize or direct the governor to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of appropriated state funds (excluding constitutionally dedicated funds). This power, commonly called "budget execution authority," would exist only to the extent granted by law and would be subject to procedures, conditions, and limitations provided by law. Further, any action of the governor would be subject to approval of a budget execution committee composed of the governor, the lieutenant governor, the speaker of the house, and the chairmen and vice-chairmen of the house appropriations committee and of the senate finance committee.



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BACKGROUND Under the constitution and Budget Board. the statutes of Texas, the governor presently has various powers and duties with respect to the preparafor short of the power of control over spending of aption, enactment, and execution of the state budget. Artipropriated state funds. This power, if granted, might incle IV, Section 9, of the conclude

stitution requires him to account to the legislature for all public funds received and paid out by him, and requires him at the beginning of each regular session to present "estimates of the amount of money required to be raised by taxation for all purposes." Under Article IV, Section 24, all officers in the executive department are required to report semiannually to the governor with respect to all funds received and disbursed by them; the governor is empowered to require an accounting from them at any time; and the governor is authorized to inspect their books and accounts. Much more important, however, is the veto power (Article IV, Section 14). He can veto the entire appropriations bill or any one or more items of appropriation within it. However, he cannot reduce an appropriation for a particular purpose; nor, according to rulings of the courts and of the attorney general, may he veto provisions (riders) that place qualifications, limitations, or conditions on the expenditure of appropriated funds. 1. Under our present system, which has been in effect for more than 100 years, state spending has been kept under reasonable control while our citizens' tax burden has continued to be among the lowest in the country. Additional controls on spending are much less needed in Texas than in most

ABANDONED OR BAL-ED PEANUTS One of the provisions of the current peanut program that has been discussed only to a limited extent is peanuts that are abandoned or baled. This matter seems to be becoming increasingly more important and has a direct bearing on the amount of quota pounds eligible to be carried forward or to transfer from a farm. Regulations provide that once peanuts are dug, they become quota peanuts and there must be an accounting of the production.

So, what does a peanut producer do if he decides to abandon or bale peanuts? First, he needs to visit the county office and file an application for disaster credit on Form ASCS 574. Second, if the peanuts are going to be baled, arrange for an appraisal of the potential production prior to the time the peanuts are baled.

RETIRED TEACHERS TO MEET


