## Abbott Awarded Plaque As C-C Manager Of Year

Gene W. Abbott, manager of the Chamber of Commerce in Cisco for the past ten years, was named Chamber of Commerce Manager of the Year by the CofC Executives Association of West Texas at their 1980 meeting in Amarillo Sept. 21-24.

Mr. Abbott is shown in the accompanying picture with a plaque that was presented to him in ceremonies directed by Mary Lou Wysong, CofC manager at Spearman and winner of the award in 1979.

The award was the second honor for a Ciscoan for community work this year. L.W. (Dick) Woolley, president of the First National Bank, was presented a plaque in Austin early this month as winner of the Texas Industrial Association award winner for CofC industrial committee workers in towns under 50,000 population.

A native of Cisco, Mr. Abbott has been one of the town's top promoters for many years. Before he took early retirement from Lone Star Gas Company as their manager at Kerrville to return home to take his present job, Mr. Abbott had served two terms as Cisco CofC president and on the board for many more years. He was Cisco's West Texas CofC delegate for nine years.

A past president of the Cisco Industrial Foundation, Mr. Abbott is a former Lions Club president, past commander of the American Legion Post, a former president of the Cisco Country Club, and long active in Salvation Army volunteer and welfare work. He is a past president of the Community Chest, and he served as president of the West Texas CofC executives organization in 1975. He was named Cisco's Citizen of the

Year by the CofC in 1968.

Mr. Abbott is an Army veteran of WWII and his service included a tour of duty in the Pacific Theater of Operations. He married Catherine Collins, also a Cisco native, on Christmas Day following Pearl Harbor. They have two daughters, Cathy Strother and Susan Isenhower, and five grandchildren.

Following the war years, Mr. Abbott operated a grocery store, and served as manager of the local gas

company before being transferred to Kerrville.

In presenting the award, Miss Wysong noted that "for the past ten years, Gene Abbott has done a superb job as manager of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce, a fact which was noted with an award at the last annual banquet."

Mrs. Abbott accompanied her husband to Amarillo for the annual meeting. The program featured work sessions devoted to various phases of CofC work.

## Million Dollar City Budget Approved At Council Meeting

A million dollar city budget plus ordinances setting the tax rate and rates for city water and services were approved for fiscal 1980-81 at the regular semi-monthly meeting of the City Council last Tuesday night.

The new budget, which was completed at a special council meeting and public hearing Sept. 18, anticipates revenues of \$1,075,036.26 during the year beginning Oct. 1. Budgeted expenditures total \$980,688.35 with a surplus of \$94,347.91.

An ordinance fixing and determining rates and charges for water, sewer and sanitation services was approved. It provides for an increase of about \$2.00 per month in the minimum rate for water, sewer and trash hauling.

The new minimum water rate was up \$1 to \$5.50 for the first 2,000 gallons of water. The sewer rate was up 50 cents to \$4.00 and the trash hauling rate went up 50 cents to \$4.00. The over-all minimum bill for city ser-

vices in a one-family residence will be \$13.50 under the new ordinance.

The ordinance in its entirety was ordered published in The Press as a legal notice.

An ordinance levying taxes for the use and support of the municipal government during the coming year was approved. It provides for a city tax rate of \$2.53 on each \$100 based on 33 1/3 (one third) of assessed property valuation. This was the same rate on which taxes were paid during the past year.

Discounts are provided for early tax payments as in the past in the new ordinances, and penalties are provided for delinquent payments.

The new water and sewer ordinance provides for a \$5.00 penalty for delinquency as compared with a five per cent penalty under the regulations for the past year. Water rates are the same after the increase on the minimum of 2,000 gallons.

The new budget expects revenues as follows: general fund, \$618,494.26; water and

sewer, \$357,842; airport fund, \$3,200; and revenue sharing fund, \$95,500.

Expenditures were summarized as follows: general fund, \$555,494.26; water and sewer, \$201,564.59; airport, \$2,742; revenue sharing, \$93,500; water and sewer bond and debt, \$39,387.50; financial administration, \$63,000; and gas pool for all departments, \$25,000.

Largest item of expense anticipated by general fund is the police department, \$138,120. Other items include: administration, \$31,626; fire department, \$64,361; street department, \$86,190; accounting and billing, \$81,714; and sanitation, \$52,800. The water department expenditures project \$129,350; sewer, \$72,213, and financial administration, \$63,000.

Some \$95,500 in revenue sharing funds are expected to finance the purchase of a \$28,000 backhoe, \$5,000 for a police car, \$6,000 for a pickup, \$11,500 for the new property appraisal survey,

\$10,000 for auditing, and \$29,680 for miscellaneous services including the baseball field, Lake Cisco cabins and other items.

General fund revenue anticipates \$183,000 in sales tax receipts, \$136,000 in tax revenues, \$35,000 in rents and leases, \$79,000 in sanitation fees, \$45,000 in miscellaneous taxes and fees plus other lesser items.

The new budget's expense increase in size was limited largely to salary adjustments for employees, City Manager R.J. Turpin noted in a covering letter to the Council.

In other action, the Council set the salary of City Secretary Marilyn Smith at \$850 per month. She had been paid \$1,000 monthly while serving as acting city manager. She also is the city's acting tax assessor collector and heads that department.

## Contract Awarded For Base Work At Airport

A paved runway for Cisco's municipal airport could be a reality in 10 to 12 weeks, City Manager R.J. Turpin reported Friday after a contract had been awarded for pre-paving base work.

Bontke Brothers, Abilene contractors, were low bidders for a contract for the pavement base work. The firm's bid was \$45,158.80 to cover the runway with sand, gravel and crushed stone as specified by Texas

Aeronautics Commission engineers. A San Antonio firm was the only other bidder, asking \$55,917.22 for the project.

Bids were opened at a special meeting of the City Council at 8 a.m. Wednesday at City Hall. The bid opening had been delayed at the Council's Sept. 9th meeting.

Mr. Turpin met with Bontke officials Thursday to finalize the contract. Work was expected to get under-

way during the coming week. Although the company asked 40 days in which to do the work, Mr. Turpin hoped they would be able to do the job in three weeks since Bontke has been doing highway work in this area and has equipment and materials here.

Mr. Turpin said efforts will be made to be ready to open bids for the actual paving by the time the base work is finished.

Engineer Glen Strube of TAC spent two days here this past week and was at the airport most of Wednesday. The EnRe Corporation is near completion in dirt moving and leveling work for the runway. This firm has contributed considerable labor and some equipment to the project.

The city is eligible for an additional grant that would be used to extend taxiways and enlarge the paved area around the hangars, Mr. Turpin said. He added that he was busy with paper work on this matter. He said the city has had inquiries lately from individuals interested in leasing ground on which to build single airplane hangars at the airport.

The runway project is being finished with grants, the city's part being provided with money raised by a Chamber of Commerce airport committee, donations of money and labor and use of some city equipment.

## Pengo Announces New Bldg. Plans

Pengo Completions announced Friday that they will build a 60x130 shop building at their five-acre headquarters site at 602 East 16th Street in Cisco. A contract for the building has been awarded to Roy Cozart, local builder, and work is due to begin Monday.

The new building will enable Pengo to have a complete shop and additional warehouse facilities to service the equipment it operates out of Cisco, District Manager W.L. (Bill) Wood reported. The project represents an expansion of

company activities, he added.

Pengo has some 35 employees on their Cisco payroll and plans call for others to be added when the new building is completed late this year, Mr. Wood said. Pengo operates four well servicing units out of the Cisco district headquarters, and other equipment here includes 16 pickup trucks, a dump truck, winches, backhoes and others.

Pengo Completions, which is a subsidiary of Pengo Industries of Fort Worth, has been operating here since May 1, 1979. Glen Doggett of Abilene, a former Ciscoan, is president of Pengo. Ed Davis of Fort Worth is the operations manager.

Mr. Wood and his wife, the former June Wells, are both graduates of Cisco High School and grew up in Cisco. They live with their four children at 2300 Beech Street. Mrs. Wood is Pengo's office secretary here.

Pengo is a member of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce and the firm sponsored a girls team in the softball league here last summer.

SPEAKER OF THE House Bill Clayton "is a fine gentleman who may have committed some bad errors, but he's no crook," State Rep. Joe Hanna said in Eastland County this week. (Clayton is on trial presently in Houston on charges of having accepted a bribe in return for favors to the insurance industry.)

Certainly the House needs his (Clayton's) leadership in this next term, Rep. Hanna said, because there are some tough matters to be considered. "We hope that Clayton will be exonerated, but if he isn't, I personally prefer Gib Lewis of Fort Worth as Speaker," he said. (Lewis and John Bryant of Dallas are seeking the Speaker post in the event Clayton is convicted.)

"Finances, as usual, will be our No. One problem. Bullock says we'll have a surplus of some \$three billion and Gov. Clements says \$1 billion, so I figure it's somewhere in between." Inflation hurts the state too, he said, and one of our problems is turnover - we lose some 40 per cent a year.

Re-Districting will be a problem too, he said, pointing out that District 54 (made up of five counties including Eastland) is probably going to need about 16,000 more people to keep it to the ratio. (Palo Pinto lost about 4,000). We'll get the figures in April and I sure that I continue to represent Eastland County.

School finance probably will continue to be a two-year basis, he said.

Attorney Mike Siebert, a bee keeper who introduced Rep. Hanna to the Lions Club audience, said that we'd all heard of "Killer Bees" in Austin, but that he considered Joe a "Worker Bee."

COMES A note from W.E. Syers, Texas author who does a column called OFF THE BEATEN TRAIL, who's doing a book on the supernatural in Texas ("ghosts to witchcraft, thought-travel to precognition, the doppelganger effects, and few 'things.'")

He'd turned up a couple of clues out of Eastland County and wonders if they're worth pursuing. He writes: "I've run across an old tale

relating to "dancing Indians" at Eastland, one told originally by Henry Yelvington, I believe. 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## Beef Cattle Accounts For More Than Half Of Overall Volume

Beef cattle, normally the No. 2 agricultural crop in Eastland county in terms of cash income, accounted for more than half of an overall volume of \$32,710,000 in 1978, De Gordon, county agricultural agent told the Rotary club at its noon meeting Thursday at the Colony Restaurant. He was the guest of Tony White, program chairman.

The 1979 figure was more than \$10 million higher than that of the previous year, he said. Because of a dry 1978 fall the peanut crop was not particularly good, accounting for only \$9 million compared to \$18,399,000 from the beef cattle industry.

Peanut prospects for this fall (1980) are poor, the agent said. "Some estimates are that the crop will be 70 per cent less than 1979."

In contrast, beef cattle furnished a prosperity more apparent than real, Gordon explained. Dry range conditions forced a sell-off of much of the stock, resulting in a short period of lower prices. That trend has now been reversed as stockmen start herd rebuilding, holding back heifers for new stock, and offering a limited supply of steer calves, causing prices to rise. The result has not been favorable to feeders, packers and others in the market area, although good for the producer. Five packing houses in west Texas have closed for lack of a sufficient supply, the agent said.

But on the whole, he characterized the cattle industry outlook, both in the short and long run, as favorable.

There is very little prospect for a late peanut crop this fall, he said. Rainfall now totalling only 13.81 inches (Eastland station) almost half of which fell in June, did not follow the pattern of the last five years, when enough rain fell in August and September to rescue the crop from drought. The county's average rainfall is 28 inches a year. Since 1974 the actual has been nearer 20 inches.

Some farmers are considering plowing up and baling their vines, which would not bring in enough money to pay the bankers their loans, Gordon said. Right now, he said, concern centers on the prospects for a small grain crop which is planted on the fall.

Irrigated peanuts are spotted in quality. Irrigation in Eastland county, mostly from wells, is supplemental in nature, and without rainfall does not significantly affect the yield, Gordon pointed out.

Pecans, likewise, are in poor prospect. The 1979 crop, one of the biggest, did not mature well. A lot of it remained "stuck on the trees" he said, and this year's fruit, particularly among the

natives, did not form. In addition to cattle and peanuts, principal sources of agricultural income cited by the agent, were: swine, \$945,000; turkeys, \$815,000, and grain sorghums, \$700,000. Hay crops, such as coastal bermuda of which there are 50 to 70 thousand acres in the county, have so far yielded only one cutting because of the drought.

In nearly all cases farmers are faced with increasing costs which have offset price increases and limited profits. The cost of producing one cow, as a nationwide average, has risen from

\$295.25 in 1978 to \$420.64 in 1980. These prices, Gordon explained, are somewhat higher than occur in Texas, but reflect significant facts. A breakdown from these figures shows that only in 1979 when a per cwt cost average of \$75.67 weighed against a market average of \$90.96, did the stock producer earn a fair return. Most of the time his profit was around \$2. per cwt. In 1980, so far, he has actually lost a dollar per cwt.

Predictions that prices for calves will rise to perhaps as high as 90 cents, suggest a favorable outlook for the stockman, Gordon said.

While the adjoining countries of Iran and Iraq are generally sort of lumped into the hopper labeled "Middle East", and although many aspects of the development of the two countries are quite parallel; they are poles apart, culturally.

The Shi'ite sect of Islam is dominant in Iran, where it is estimated that 93 percent of the indigenous population is Moslem. On the other hand, the Sunni sect prevails in Iraq. Although fundamentally identical, the Shi'ites insist that the hierarchy of The Faith should have been handed down through The Prophet's daughter, Fatima and her husband (who was also her cousin), ali and their young son, Hossein.

The Sunnis maintain that upon the death of Muhammad, the scepter should pass to the family of his uncle, who was the then patriarch of the Quaraish tribe. This simple difference of opinion caused a rift between the two camps which led to the assassination of Ali, Hossein and many of their followers in the village of Herat in Iraq.

The month of Moharram in the Shi'ite calendar commemorates the death of Ali and Houssein at Herat, and during that month the sect is whopped into an emotional frenzy which culminates in a final fling of processions formed at mosques and parading through the streets and villages. In somewhat rare instances, the participants flail each other to signify the suffering of the martyrs; for the most part they flail themselves as indications of their willingness to suffer a similar fate.

The Sunnis consider this to be heretic to their interpretation of The Faith, but with an incomprehensible show of consideration Shi'ite observation of Muharram is not suppressed, even in cities in Sunni country.

A parallel can be drawn comparing the two countries, in that Iraq witnessed their "Glorious Revolution" in 1959. For the most part, that revolution set the pattern for the Revolution of the Islamic Republic forces which overthrew the late Shah of Iran. Similar patterns of radicalism were demonstrated. Mass executions marked the victory of the revolutionary forces. "If you are not with us, you are against us" was the basic

philosophy of the two revolutions.

While the majority of the skilled and trained statement of Iraq were able to flee the country, the revolutionaries wisely kept the strength of their armed forces relatively intact. The General Staff of the army showed very little change. Not so in Iran, where the highly trained and educated "Supreme Commander's General Staff" was more than decimated by the execution squads of the Revolutionary Council.

In the period of transition, revolutionary Iraq cut its ties of dependance on Great Britain for its military hardware...together with considerable reliance upon the United States for its land-based arsenal...but only after having negotiated arms supply deals with Russia.

Here, there is a difference which could place Iran in a very precarious position, militarily. With the exception of ground transport equipment consisting of Russian copies of the old British "Bedford QL" trucks, the land ordinance is almost exclusively "Made in U.S.A." Likewise the Iranian air force, in 1979 the most powerful and best-equipped air force in the entire Middle East.

With personnel trained in the U.S., and with maintenance supervised by the U.S. Air Force, and with tactical training of its pilots directly under the supervision of U.S.A.F. officers and men, the Iranian Air Force was highly dependent upon the country which became its prime target of abuse and criticism. Needless to say, the departure of the U.S. from the scene left quite a void.

Iraq's air force is equipped to a large extent with Russian MIG fighter aircraft, supplemented with a sprinkling of French Miragis. While Iraq sent officers and men to Russia for training, conversations with senior grades in the early sixties indicated that that training was somewhat elementary, in the opinions of the Iraqi's.

Iran's pilots on the other hand were trained in the U.S. to fly the planes with which their air force was equipped. Tactical combat training was done at home, but by foreigners.

Iraq has no doubt, notwithstanding their having gone through twenty years of political turmoil, maintained the combat readiness of its military equipment. In the case of Iran, this is highly

unlikely. It is well known that their access to spare parts and skilled maintenance for their highly sophisticated aircraft has been cut off...and has not been replaced.

Back to the basic differences between the Iranians and the Iraqis; while the Iraqis proudly describe themselves as Arabs, to call the average Iranian an Arab is to insult him. Under the direct influence of the Arabs as a part of the Arab Empire for almost two hundred years, the hodge-podge tribal mixture which makes up the people of Iran proudly disclaim any bloodline connection...nor ethnic affiliation...with the Arabs. This attitude places Iran somewhat at a disadvantage in an appeal for help from "Our Moslem brothers in the Arab World", while Iraq can claim identifiable brotherhood with peoples from the Persian Gulf to the Straits of Gibraltar.

As to where all this may lead...the entire world is in a quandary. Analysts are poring over their statistics, and political sociologists are pontificating right and left concerning the eventual outcome of the Iraq-Iranian war. And the entire world is watching the Straits of Hormuz, that narrow (24 miles wide) entry to the Persian Gulf through which passes an oil tanker every 22 minutes. Although it would amount to "cutting off the nose to spite the face", either country is perfectly capable of closing the Straits. And such an act would call for an immediate reassessment by the non-communist world which depends upon the Straits of Hormuz as a delivery alley of an estimated forty percent (minimum) of its petroleum supply.

The relations between Iraq and the U.S. have been severely strained for twenty years, although the Iraqis, with characteristic Arab opportunism, have studiously avoided jeopardizing the supply of Western technology.

Finally, for what it is worth, Iraq has had twenty years in which to learn to live with its revolution. And theirs is a relatively cohesive people. Such is not the case in Iran, whose revolution is yet in a state of birth, and has yet to receive the whole-hearted support of the five major tribal societies which make up the majority of the population.

Interesting...but somewhat frightening.



Occasionally I receive calls about CAROB. Carob is being used by many individuals as a chocolate or cocoa substitute. The carob bean, also known as locust seed, St. John's Bread and as Honeybread, is a pod rice in sugar and a source of protein and some B vitamins.

It has flavor very similar to that of chocolate.

The carob tree grows along the Mediterranean and in the United States. It thrives in the same climate where oranges are grown. The entire fruit except for a few hard seeds is edible, both fresh and dried. It is a popular ingredient in Chinese cookery.

Carob is easily substituted for chocolate or cocoa in most recipes. People who are allergic to chocolate or who wish to avoid caffeine, the stimulant that is in

chocolate, are interested in its use. It is available in tablet, powder, syrup and water forms.

Recipes for its use are available from the manufacturer.

**RECIPE FOR THE WEEK**  
**Fast and Easy Pineapple Cake**

Sift together 2 cups flour, 1 1/2 cups sugar and 1 teaspoon soda. Stir in a No. 2 can of crushed pineapple, juice and all. (or use 303 can). Pour into well greased and floured 11 x 13 inch pan. Sprinkle on top 3/4 cup brown sugar and 1/2 cup nuts. Bake at 350 degrees for 35 to 40 minutes.

Boil for 10 minutes: 3/4 cup sugar, 3/4 cup canned milk (small can) and one stick butter (1/2 cup). Pour on top of hot cake.

GORDON SPOT

We often see the high cost of food blamed for the rising costs of living. Actually the cost of food has not risen as rapidly as most other consumer products.

One reason for food price increases is marketing cost, led by labor. These marketing costs are up 10 to 12 percent since last year.

Labor's share of the retail food dollar will be more than that of the farmer's in 1980. According to the economists, 32 cents of every dollar spent for food items this year will go to labor costs while only 30 cents will go to the farmer.

Due to limited production of quality hay in Eastland County this year, many different types of emergency hay are being harvested, such as sorghum.

While forage test may cost a few dollars it will probably save people many dollars in supplemental feed or livestock condition. Only when a hay's feeding value is known can a person make a useful decision on the necessity of a protein or energy supplement.

A forage test can give a positive value on which to base a feeding program, and with the high cost of feed, that's essential for a sound management program.

Anyone interested in getting hay tested for protein or other nutrient content may get information forms at the Extension Office. We also have a hay probe for sampling hay that we will loan to you.

We would like to remind the producers that the county hay show will be held next Friday at the Eastland County Fair. A program on quality hay production will be given at 1:30 p.m. Friday.

We had a very good pecan tour last Tuesday. Charles Walker's orchard, which was first on the tour, has one of the best pecan crops in the whole Cross Timbers area.

## PUBLIC NOTICE City Ordinances

**ORDINANCE #548**  
AN ORDINANCE LEVYING TAXES FOR THE USE AND SUPPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL GOVERNMENT OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS, AND PROVIDING FOR THE FISCAL YEAR 1980-81; PROVIDING FOR THE TIME AND MANNER OF PAYING THE AD VALOREM TAXES LEVIED.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS:

**SECTION 1:** That there is hereby levied and there shall be collected for the use and support of the Municipal Government of the City of Cisco, Texas in the year Nineteen Hundred and Eighty (1980) upon all property, real, personal, and mixed, within the incorporated limits of said City subject to taxation, a tax of two dollars and forty-three cents (\$2.43) on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) based on 33-1/3% assessed valuation; For the maintenance and support of the general government and for the operation of the City Government to be placed in the General Fund 100% of the total amount collected.

**SECTION 2:** It is hereby made the duty of the Tax Assessor and Collector and City Treasurer and every such person collecting money for the City of Cisco to deposit to the General Fund of the City.

**SECTION 3:** The ad valorem taxes herein levied shall become due on the 1st day of October, 1980, and may be paid up to and including the following January 31st without penalty, but if not so paid, such taxes shall become delinquent on the following day, February 1st, and the following interest shall be payable thereon, to-wit: if paid during the month of February, one-half percent (1/2%); during March, one percent (1%); during April, one and one-half (1 1/2%); during

May, two percent (2%); during June two and one-half percent (2 1/2%); during July three percent (3%); during August, three and one-half percent (3 1/2%); during September, four percent (4%); during October, four and one-half percent (4 1/2%); during November five percent (5%); during December five and one-half percent (5 1/2%); and during January, six percent (6%). Such unpaid taxes shall bear a penalty of eight percent (8%) from February 1st, 1981.

**SECTION 4:** All taxpayers shall be allowed discounts for the payment of taxes prior to January 1, 1980, said discounts to be allowed under the following conditions: (a) three percent (3%) discount on all ad valorem taxes due, if such taxes are paid during the month of October, 1980; (b) two percent (2%) on all ad valorem taxes due, if such taxes are paid during the month of November, 1980; (c) one percent (1%) on all ad valorem taxes due, if such taxes are paid during the month of December, 1980.

**SECTION 5:** The taxes herein levied shall be a first and prior lien against the property upon which they are assessed and the said first lien shall be superior and prior to all other liens, charges, and encumbrances, and this lien shall be attached to personal property to the same extent and with the same priorities as to real estate.

**SECTION 6:** This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force for and after its passage.

**SECTION 7:** Should any part of this ordinance be declared invalid, for any reason, that invalidity shall not effect the remainder of this ordinance, which has been

**ORDINANCE #549**  
AN ORDINANCE FIXING AND DETERMINING RATES AND CHARGES FOR WATER, SEWER, AND SANITATION SERVICES IN THE CITY OF CISCO, AND SURROUNDING AREAS SERVED BY THE CITY OF CISCO AND REPEALING ORDINANCES #441, 459, 465, 465-A AND 483, DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS:

**SECTION 1:** Effective as of OCTOBER 1 the month rate and charges for water inside the City Limits of the City of Cisco shall be:

2,000 gallons minimum—\$5.50  
Next 8,000 gallons—\$.95 per 1,000 gallons  
Next 40,000 gallons—\$.85 per 1,000 gallons  
Next 100,000 gallons—\$.65 per 1,000 gallons  
Next 1,000,000 gallons—\$.55 per 1,000 gallons  
Above 3,000,000 gallons—\$.45 per 1,000 gallons

**SECTION 2:** Monthly sewer rate shall be:

Residential:  
Flat rate—\$4.00  
Over age 65 or totally disabled persons unable to work—\$2.50

Commercial:  
1st 10,000 gallons—\$4.00  
Above 10,000 gallons—\$.40 per 1,000 gallons

**SECTION 3:** Monthly Sanitation-Solid Waste removal shall be:

3.1 Residential  
One family residence—\$4.00  
Two family residence—\$7.50  
One family residence/mobile home—\$7.50  
Mobile home in or out of park—\$4.00  
One family residence/apts.—\$7.50  
\*Each additional apt.—\$4.00  
Private apt.

buildings—\$3.00 per apt. Over age 65 or totally disabled persons unable to work—\$2.50

3.2 Commercial  
3.2.1 Class I: Jewelry, banks, savings and loans, confectioneries, candy stores, bakeries, fruit stands, cigar newstands, dentists, physician's offices, chiropractic offices, shoe repair, antique shops, attorneys, accountants, churches, upholstery shops, ice houses:

Rate I: 0-5,000 sq. ft. of building floor area \$8.50  
5,000 and over of building area \$9.25

3.2.2 Class II: Office buildings, laboratories, oil supply, creameries, tailor shops, theaters, pool halls, amusement centers, warehouses, produce, freight, express, bus depot, railroad, feed and seed stores:

Rate II: 0-5,000 sq. ft. of building floor area \$8.50  
5,000 and over of building floor area \$9.50

3.2.3 Class III: Studios, photographers, art, welding, hardware, dry goods, post office, telephone, television, sporting goods, engravers, florists, funeral homes, machine shops:

Rate III: 0-5,000 sq. ft. of building floor area \$8.50  
5,000 and over of building floor area \$9.75

3.2.4 Class IV: Grocery, mini-marts, supermarkets, fruit and vegetable markets, hospital, nursing homes:

Rate IV: 0-2,000 sq. ft. of building floor area \$9.50  
2,000 - 5,000 sq. ft. of building area \$13.00  
5,000 and over of building floor area \$24.00

3.2.5 Class V: Cafes, cafeterias, sandwich shops, drugstores, pharmacies, service stations, parking lots, restaurants:

Rate V: 0-2,000 sq. ft. of building floor area \$9.50  
2,000 - 5,000 sq. ft. of building area \$22.50  
5,000 and over building floor area \$38.50

3.2.6 Class VI: Furniture, auto supply, department stores, paint stores, lumber yards, printers, plumbing and electrical supply, wholesale houses, hospital supply, janitorial supply, junk dealers, moving and storage, garages:  
Rate VI: 0-5,000 sq. ft. of

building floor area \$9.50  
Each additional 1,000 of bldg. floor area .90/1,000

3.2.7 Class VII: Motels, hotels, rooming houses:  
Rate VII: 1-10 units—\$.60 each unit

11 and over—\$.55 each unit

3.2.8 Class VIII: Schools and colleges  
Rate VIII: Cisco Public Schools—\$.10 per student/month  
Cisco Junior College—\$.14 per student/month

3.2.9 Class IX: Housing Authority—\$1.00 per unit

3.2.10 Residential collections shall be 2 times per week

Commercial collection shall be 5 times per week

3.2.11 Containers for residential pickup shall be plastic bags. Containers for commercial pickup shall be plastic bags, 20 or 30 gallon cans, or approved garbage bins. Boxes and brush in 2-foot bundles will also be picked up. All boxes MUST be broken up. Mobile home parks shall provide wire cages on location to serve all spaces adjacent to pick up point.

**SECTION 4:** Residences outside the city limits shall be charged the same rate as inside the city limits for water, sewer and garbage, plus \$5.00 extra per utility per month.

**SECTION 5:** Residences not connected to the City of Cisco sewer system but receiving service for garbage removal shall be charged the regular garbage charge only. Businesses and commercial users in the same category shall be charged according to the garbage charge in Section 4.2.

**SECTION 6:** \$5.00 penalty for delinquency.

6.1 The monthly rates and charges as now or hereafter fixed by the City of Cisco, Texas, to be paid for sewer, water and sanitation services furnished by the City of Cisco, Texas, shall be due and payable before the 16th day following the mailing of the monthly bill therefore by the City of Cisco, Texas, and if such charges are not paid on or before such date, same shall thereafter be considered delinquent, and a late charge of \$5 on the amount of the bill will be made.

6.2 Discontinuance of service for non-payment. If such delinquent charges are not paid on or before the expiration of 10 days from the date same become delinquent, the City Manager, with just cause, is hereby authorized and directed to cause to be disconnected the water service furnished by the City of Cisco, Texas, to the users for which charges are made. A charge of \$10.00 will be made for reconnecting such service.

There is probably not a human being anywhere at any time who does not experience a certain amount of frustration. We are told that frustrations are the common lot of human beings, which makes it no easier to take when our way is blocked. . . . How can we cope with these frustrations? Do we simply give up the fight? Of course not. That is the worst possible way to meet one of life's commonest experiences.

A far better way comes from the wisdom of Harvard's great president of some years ago - Dr. Charles W. Elliot. Here is how he managed his frustrations:

"When necessarily involved in contests or critical undertakings, I tried first to do my best in the actual struggle, then not to concern myself too much about the outcome. That ended my responsibility.

"And where I was blocked and defeated, I always turned at once to some other field of my work where progress looked possible; meanwhile biding my time to return to the blocked road. . . . Thus a man can avoid waste of energy and a constant state of worry and disappointment.


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
