budget plus ordinances setting the tax rate and rates for city water and services were approved for fiscal 1980-81 at the regular semimonthly meeting of the City Council last Tuesday night.

The new budget, which was completed at a special council meeting and public hearing Sept. 18, anticipates revenues of \$1,075,036.26 during the year beginning Oct. 1. Budgeted expenditures total \$980,688.35 with a surplus of \$94,347.91.

An ordinance fixing and determining rates and charges for water, sewer and sanitation services was approved. It provides for an increase of about \$2.00 per month in the minimum rate for water, sewer and trash

The new minimum water rate was up \$1 to \$5.50 for the first 2,000 gallons of water. The sewer rate was up 50 cents to \$4.00 and the trash hauling rate went up 50 cents to \$4.00. The over-all minimum bill for city serresidence will be \$13.50 under the new ordinance. The ordinance in its entiri-

ty was ordered published in The Press as a legal notice. An ordinance levving taxes for the use and support of the municipal government during the coming year was approved. It provides for a city tax rate of \$2.53 on each \$100 based on 33 1/3 (one

third) of assessed property

valuation. This was the same

rate on which taxes were

paid during the past year. Discounts are provided for early tax payments as in the past in the new ordinances, and penalties are provided for delinquent payments.

The new water and sewer ordinance provides for a \$5.00 penalty for delinquency as compared with a five per cent penalty under the regulations for the past year. Water rates are the same after the increase on the minimum of 2,000 gallons.

The new budget expects revenues as follows: general fund, \$618,494.26; water and

fund, \$3,200; and revenue sharing fund, \$95,500. Expenditures were sum-

marized as follows: general fund, \$555,494.26; water and sewer, \$201,564.59; airport, \$2,742; revenue sharing, \$93,500; water and sewer bond and debt, \$39,387.50; financial administration, \$63,000; and gas pool for all departments, \$25,000. Largest item of expense

anticipated by general fund is the police department, \$138,120. Other items include: administration, \$31,626; fire department, \$64,361; street department, \$86,190; accounting and billing, \$81,714; and sanitation, \$52,800. The water department expenditures project \$129,350; sewer, \$72,213, and financial administration,

Some \$95,500 in revenue sharing funds are expected to finance the purchase of a \$28,000 backhoe, \$5,000 for a police car, \$6,000 for a pickup, \$11,500 for the new property appraisal survey,

\$63,000.

\$29,680 for miscellaneous services including the baseball field, Lake Cisco cabins and other items. General fund revenue an-

ticipates \$183,000 in sales tax receipts, \$136,000 in tax revenues, \$35,000 in rents and leases, \$79,000 in sanitation fees, \$45,000 in miscellaneous taxes and fees plus other lesser items. The new budget's expense increase in size was limited

largely to salary adjustments for employees, City Manager R.J. Turpin noted in a covering letter to the Council. In other action, the Council set the salary of City

Secretary Marilyn Smith at \$850 per month. She had been paid \$1,000 monthly while serving as acting city manager. She also is the city's acting tax assessor collector and heads that depart-

Certainly the House needs his (Clayton's leadership in this next term, Rep. Hanna said, because there are some tough matters to be considered. "We hope that Clayton will be exhonorated, but if he isn't, I persoanlly perfer Gib Lewis of Fort Worth as Speaker," he said. (Lewis and John Bryant of Dallas are seeking the Speaker poast in the event Clayton is convicted.)

"Finances, as usual, will be our No. One problem. Bullock says we'll have a surplus of some \$three billion and Gov. Clements says \$1 billion, so I figure it's somewhere in between." Inflation hurts the state too, he said, and oen of our problems is turnover - we lose some 40 per cent a year.

Teachers will get a raise. I don't know how much, but it won't be the 50 per cent increase, that one group is ask-

Re-Districting will be a problem too, he said, pointing out that District 54 (made up of five counties including Eastland) is pro-bably going to need about 16,000 more people to keep it to the ratio. (Palo Pinto lost about 4,000). We'll get the figures in April and I sure that I continue to represent Eastland County.

School finance probably will continue to be a twoyear basis, he said.

Attorney Mike Siebert, a bee keeper who introduced Rep. Hanna to the Lions Club audience, said that we'd all heard of "Killer Bees" in Austin, but that he considered Joe a "Worker Bee."

Beef Cattle Accounts For More Than Half Of Overall Volume

Beef cattle, normally the No. 2 agricultural crop in Eastland county in terms of cash income, accounted for more than half of an overall volume of \$32,710,000 in 1978, Gordon, county agricultural agent told the Rotary club at its noon meeting Thursday at the Colony Restaurant. He was the guest of Tony White, program chairman.

The 1979 figure was more than \$10 million higher than that of the previous year, he said. Because of a dry 1978 fall the peanut crop was not particularly good, accounting for only \$9 million compared to \$18,399,000 from the beef cattle industry.

Peanut prospects for this fall (1980) are poor, the agent said. "Some estimates are that the crop will be 70 per cent less than 1979."

In contrast, beef cattle furnished a prosperity more apparent than real, Gordon explained. Dry range conditions forced a sell-off of much of the stock, resulting in a short period of lower prices. That trend has now been reversed as stockmen start herd rebuilding, holding back heifers for new stock, and offering a limited supply of steer calves, causing prices to rise. The result has not been favorable to feeders, packers and others in the market area, although good for the producer. Five packing houses in west Texas have closed for lack of a sufficient supply, the agent

But on the whole, he characterized the cattle industry outlook, both in the short and long run, as favorable.

There is very little prospect for a late peanut crop this fall, he said. Rainfall now totalling only 13.81 inches (Eastland station) almost half of which fell in June, did not follow the pattern of the last five years, when enough rain fell in August and September to rescue the crop from drouth. The county's average rainfall is 28 inches a year. Since 1974 the actual has been nearer 20 inches.

Irrigated peanuts are spotted in quality. Irrigation in Eastland county, mostly from wells, is supplemental in nature, and without rainfall does not significantly affect the yield, Gordon pointed out.

Pecans, likewise, are in poor prospect. The 1979 crop, one of the biggest, did not mature well. A lot of it remained "stuck on the trees" he said, and this year's fruit, particularly among the

In addition to cattle and peanuts, principal sources of agricultural income cited by the agent, were: swine, \$945,000; turkeys, \$815,000, and grain sorghums, \$700,000. Hay crops, such as coastal bermuda of which there are 50 to 70 thousand acres in the county, have so far vielded only one cutting because of the drouth.

In nearly all cases farmers are faced with increasing costs which have offset price increases and limited profits. The cost of producing one cow, as a nationwide average, has risen from

\$295.25 in 1978 to \$420.64 in 1980. These prices, Gordon explained, are somewhat higher than occur in Texas, but reflect significant facts. A breakdown from these figures shows that only in 1979 when a per cwt cost average of \$75.67 weighed against a market average of \$90.96, did the stock producer earn a fair return. Most of the time his profit was around \$2. per cwt. In 1980, so far, he has actually

lost a dollar per cwt. Predictions that prices for calves will rise to perhaps as high as 90 cents, suggest a favorable outlook for the stockman, Gordon said.

Iran-Iraq Dilemma

While the adjoining countries of Iran and Iraq are generally sort of lumped into the hopper labeled "Middle East", and although many aspects of the development of the two countries are quite parallel; they are poles apart, culturally.

The Shi'ite sect of Islam is dominant in Iran, where it is estimated that 93 percent of the indegenous population is Moslem. On the other hand, the Sunni sect prevaisl in Iraq. Although fundamentally indentical, the Shi'ites insist that the heirarchy of The Faith should have been handed down through The Prophet's daughter, Fatima and her husband (who was also her cousin), ali and their young son, Hossein.

The Sunnis maintain that upon the death of Muhammad, the scepter should pass to the family of his uncle, who was the then patriarch of the Quaraish tribe. This simple difference of opinion caused a rift between the two camps which led to the assasination of Ali, Hossein and many of their followers in the village of Herat in Iraq.

The month of Moharram in the Shi'ite calendar commemorates the death of Ali and Houssein at Herat, and during that month the sect is whopped into an emotional frenzy which culminates in a final fling of processions formed at mosques and parading thrugh the streets and villages. In somewhat rare instances, the participants flail each other to signify the suffering of the martyrs; for the most part they flail themselves as indications of their willingness to suffer a similar fate.

The Sunnis consider this to be heretic to their interpretation of The Faith, but with an incomprehensible show of consideration Shi'ite observation of Muharram is not supressed, even in cities

in Sunni country. A parallel can be drawn comparing the two countries, in that Iraq witnessed their "Glorious Revolution" in 1959. For the most part, that revolution set the patten for the Revolution of the Islamic Republic forces which overthrew the late Shah of Iran. Similar patterns of radicalism were demonstrated. Mass executions marked the victory of the revolutionary forces. "If you are not with us, you are against us" was the basic

philosophy of the two revolutions.

While the majority of the skilled and trained statemen of Iraq were able to flee the country, the revolutionaries wisely kept the strength of their armed forces relatively intact. The General Staff of the army showed very little change. Not so in Iran, where the highly trained and educated "Supreme Commander's General Staff" was more than decimated by the execution squads of the

Revolutionary Council. In the period of transition, revolutonary Iraq cut its ties of dependance on Great Britain for its military hardware...together with considerable reliance upon the United States for its landbased arsenal...but only after having negotiated arms supply deals with Russia

Here, there is a difference which could place Iran in a very precarious position, militarily. With the exception of ground transport equipment consisting of Russian copies of the old British "Bedford QL" trucks, the land ordinance is almost exclusively "Made in U.S.A." Likewise the Iranian air force, in 1979 the most powerful and best-equpped air force in the entire Middle

East. With personnel trained in the U.S., and with maintenance supervised by the U.S. Air Force, and with tactical training of its pilots directly under the supervision of U.S.A.F. officers and men, the Iranian Air Force was highly dependent upon the country which became its prime target of abuse and criticism. Needless to say, the departure of the U.S. from the scene left quite a

Iraq's air force is equipped to a large extent with Russian MIG fighter aircraft, supplemented with a sprinkling of French Miragis. While Iraq sent officers and men to Russia for training, conversations with senior grades in the early sixties indicated that that training was somewhat elementary, in the opinions of the Iraqi's. Iran's pilots on the other hand were trained in the U.S. to fly the planes with which their air foce was equipped. Tactical combat training was done at home, but by foreigners.

Iraq has no doubt, notwithstanding their having gone through twenty years of political turmoil, maintained the combat readiness of its military equipment. In the case of Iran, this is highly unlikely. It is well known that their access to spare parts and skilled maintenance for their highly sophisticated aircraft has been cut off...and has not been replaced.

Back to the basic differences between the Iranians and the Iraqis; while the Iraqis proudly describe themselves as Arabs, to call the average Iranian an Arab is to insult him. Under the direct influence of the Arabs as a part of the Arab Empire for almost two hundred years, the hodge-podge tribal mixture which makes up the people of Iran proudly disclaim any bloodline connectoin...nor ethnic affiliation...with the Arabs. This attitude places Iran somewhat at a disadvantage in an appeal for help from "Our Moslem brothers in the Arab World", while Iraq can claim identifiable brotherhood with peoples from the Persian Gulf to the Straits of Gilbralter.

As to where all this may lead...the entire world is in a quandary. Analysts are poring over their statistics, and political sociologists are pontificating right and left concerning the eventual outcome of the Iragi-Iranian war. And the entire world is watching the Straits of Hormuz, that narrow (24 miles wide) entry to the Persian Gulf through which passes an oil tanker every 22 minutes. Although it would amount to "cutting off the nose to spite the face", either country is perfectly capable of closing the Straits. And such an act would call for an immediate reassessment by the noncommunist world which depends upon the Straits of Hormuz as a delivery alley of an estimated forty percent (minimum) of its petroleum

The relations between Iraq and the U.S. have been severly strained for twenty years, although the Iraqis, with characteristic Arab opportunism, have studiously avoided jeopardising the Western supply

technology.
Finally, for what it is worth, Iraq has had twenty years in which to learn to live with its revolution. And theirs is a relatively cohesive people. Such is not the case in Iran, whose revolution is yet in a state of birth, and has yet to receive the whole-hearted support of the five major tribal societies which make up the majority of the population.

Interesting...but somewhat frightening.

Occasionally I receive calls about CAROB. Carob is being used by many individuals as a chocolate or cocoa substitute. The carob bean, also known as locust seed, St. John's Bread and as Honeybread, is a pod rice in sugar and a source of protein and some B vitamins.

It has flavor very similar to that of chocolate.

The carob tree grows along the Mediterranean and in the United States. It thrives in the same climate where oranges are grown. The entire fruit except for a few hard seeds is edible, both fresh and dried. It is a popular ingredient in Chinese cookery.

Carob is easily substituted for chocolate or cocoa in most recipes. People who are allergic to chocolate or who wish to avoid caffeine, the stimulant that is in chocolate, are interested in its use. It is available in tablet, powder, syrup and water forms.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK Fast and Easy Pineapple

Sift together 2 cups flour, 11/2 cups sugar and 1 teaspoon soda. Stir in a No. 2 can of crushed pineapple, juice and all. (or use 303 can). Pour into well greased and floured 11 x 13 inch pan. Sprinkle on top 3/4 cup brown sugar and 1/2 cup nuts. Bake at 350 degrees for 35 to 40 minutes.

Boil for 10 minutes: 3/4 cup sugar, 34 cup canned milk (small can) and one stick butter (1/2 cup). Pour on top of hot cake.



We often see the high cost of food blamed for the rising costs of living. Actually the cost of food has not risen as rapidly as most other consumer products. But, there is no argument that the cost of food continues to go up.

One reason for food price increases is marketing cost, led by labor. These marketing costs are up 10 to 12 percent since last year.

Labor's share of the retail food dollar will be more than that of the farmer's in 1980. According to the economists, 32 cents of every dollar spent for food items this year will go to labor costs while only 30 cents will go to the farmer, the producer of those items. Other parts of the dollar goes to packaging, transportation, profit, rent, energy, interest and taxes.

Due to limited production of quality hay in Eastland County this year, many different types of emergency hay are being harvested, such as sorghum. Down in South Texas rice stubble is being baled. While this hay is useful, it is not equal to good quality hay because it is low in feeding value. Without supplementation, livestock on such hay will suffer weight losses and reduced rebreeding percentages.

With a lot of this low quality hay being baled and sold over the state, forage testing is more important than ever. The forage test is the only way that a definite feed value can be assigned to a particular lot of hay.

While forage test may cost a few dollars it will probably save people many dollars in supplemental feed or livestock condition. Only when a hay's feeding value is known can a person make a useful decision on the necessity of a protein or energy supplement. The hay's feeding value might be such that no supplement is needed or it might be such that the animal is slowly starving without a supple-

ment. A forage test can give a positive value on which to base a feeding program, and with the high cost of feed, that's essential for a sound management program.

Anyone interested in getting hay tested for protein or other nutrient content may get information forms at the Extension Office. We also have a hay probe for sampling hay that we will loan to



SECTION 1: That there is hereby levied and there shall be collected for the use and support of the Municipal Government of the City of Cisco, Texas in the year Nineteen Hundred and Eighty (1980) upon all property, real, personal, and mixed, within the corporated limits of said City subject to taxation, a tax of two dollars and forty-three cents (\$2.43) on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) based on 33-1/3% assessed valuation; For the maintenance and support of the general government and for the operation of the City Government to be placed in the General Fund 100% of the

total amount collected. SECTION 2: It is hereby made the duty of the Tax Assessor and Collector and City Treasurer and every such person collecting money for the City of Cisco to deposit to the General

Fund of the City. SECTION 3: The ad valorem taxes herein levied shall become due on the 1st day of October, 1980, and may be paid up to and including the following January 31st without penalty, but if not so paid, such taxes shall become delinquent on the following day, February 1st, and the following interest shall be payable thereon, to-wit: if paid during the month of February, one-half percent (1/2%); during March, one percent (1%); during April, one and one-half (11/2%); during

May, two percent (2%); during June two and one-half percent (212%); during July three percent (3%); during August, three and one-half percent (312%); during September, four percent (4%); during October, four and one-half percent

(4-12%); during November five percent (5%); during December five and one-half percent (512%); and during January, six percent (6%). Such unpaid taxes shall bear a penalty of eight percent 8%) from February 1st,

SECTION 4: All taxpayers shall be allowed discounts for the payment of taxes prior to January 1, 1980, said discounts to be allowed under the following conditions: (a) three percent (3%) discount on all ad valorem taxes due, if such taxes are paid during the month of October, 1980; (b) two percent (2%) on all advalorem taxes due, if such taxes are paid during the month of November, 1980;






