## Violinist Reproduces Album "Memories and Meditations"

Violinist Jack Courtney, formerly of Cisco, has reproduced, by popular demand, a long play album originally produced in 1968, entitled "Memories and Meditations On the Old Violin." Jack has revised and added the harmony parts (by way of multiple recording on the old violin), making "trio violin" on three old hymns of inspiration, such as "Rock of Ages," "Pass Me Not," and "Amazing Grace."

The album was produced by Rainbow Sound, Inc., in Dallas, with this picture on front, along with a beautiful antique framed photograph of the violin on canvas.

The album stresses the old favorite hymns and songs such as "The Old Rugged Cross," "The Haven of Rest," "When They Ring the Golden Bells" (which includes vibra-harp), "Beyond the Sunset," etc.—a total of 15 songs.

Mr. Courtney selected "Precious Memories" as the initial title song for the album.

## Three Bank Directors Purchase Moran Bank

Three current directors of the Moran National Bank recently purchased the combined interest of stock from a group of shareholders it was announced Monday, January 4, by Don E. Landers, president and chairman of the board of the Shackleford county banking concern located in Moran, Texas.

Landers, along with Ross E. Montgomery and Bobby E. Moore purchased the stock holdings of the W.G. Jones, James Garrett, and Snyder families. The acquisition of the stock was effective January 2, 1981.

In announcing the change in stock ownership, Landers was quick to praise the former shareholders. "The Snyder family has played an instrumental part in this financial institution since it was founded in 1925 as a national bank," he continued. "The Jones family has also been active in, and dedicated to, the service of the Moran National Bank for many years. Also, James Garrett has served the bank as a past president and has been a director of the bank for over 10 years."

He recalls when as a child he lived two doors from the composer of this song, the late J.B.F. Wright, who resided on the West 7th Street during a part of his childhood days in Cisco.

He has played on the same violin as pictured above (Nicolo Amati) since 1932.

His father was the late Jesse Courtney, also a former Ciscoan of many years, who owned and operated a shoe shop on Avenue D. His hobby was restoring old violins. He did not allow Jack to play on this instrument until he had two years of lessons. His father acquired the violin (in several pieces) from an elderly lady. His keen eye for unusual quality in a violin, coupled with his ability to restore such as instrument, more than warranted his purchasing this old violin in its broken state.

The instrument bears the date of 1683, and beyond question, it is obviously very old, and its tone speaks of the past.

The album sets the mood for meditation and brings back many memories. Contemporary arrangements on several of the old favorite hymns makes this album pleasurable meditative listening throughout, for both young and old.

Mr. Courtney has fond memories of his childhood training on the violin in Cisco from Mr. J.B. Ely, his daughter, Jewel, both formerly of Cisco, and Mrs. Ben Krauskopf.

The album includes background music with electric lead and bass guitar, rhythm guitar, piano and organ.

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# Homemaking Hints

By Janet Thomas

Families with two money earners face unique challenges in managing their money. Although two incomes have helped push median family income to over \$18,000, or 34% more than for single earner families, more money doesn't necessarily mean fewer problems.

First of all, the second paycheck doesn't always go as far as people thought it would. It costs money to earn money. Some of the costs of earning a second income are obvious ones: taxes, insurance, social security and other expenses, transportation, and extra clothing.

But, there are also hidden costs.

**Income Tax** - When there are two earners, the "marriage penalty" of the progressive income tax system affects family income. When this happens, the first dollar of the second income is taxed at the same high rate as the last dollar earned by the first earner. For example, if a husband earns \$15,000 and his wife earns \$8,000, her first dollar is taxed at the same rate as the last dollar he earned, not at the same rate as his first dollar. The effect is higher taxes.

**Spending For Services** - Another "hidden cost" of two incomes is increased spending for services usually provided by the family itself. The growth of fast-food establishments is testimony to the growing number of families who eat many meals away from home because time and energy for meal preparation are limited. Housekeeping services are also brought by some two-job families. As more money is spent for services, less money may be left over to meet other expenses or for special purchases.

**Avoid Over-Spending** - Having two pay-checks can lead to unrealistic expectations about what money can buy. Families who know a second income will be only temporary should time any long-term credit purchases carefully. When the second income stops but installment payments are still due, serious financial problems can arise. Even is the second income is permanent, couples should exercise caution in spending beyond their means and their needs.

**Spending Plan** - Two-job families can receive maximum satisfaction from their money if they base their financial decisions on open communication and

thoughtful planning. Establish financial goals both spouses agree on, and set realistic time tables in achieving them. Discuss how to handle in-coming money. Should it be "his", "hers", or "ours?" Some alternatives include:

- pooling all the money into one account and paying everything from a single account with special allowances for each spouse.
- letting each spouse control his/her own income with contributions for household operations or with each responsible for paying specific items each month.

Designate who will take responsibility for paying bills. Try out this system and be willing to make adjustment in it if things don't work out.

## RECIPE FOR THE WEEK

Be a "do-it-yourselfer" and save money on your grocery store bill by preparing your own convenience mixes.

**VANILLA PUDDING MIX**  
 1 1/2 cups sugar  
 2 1/2 cups nonfat dry milk  
 1 1/4 cups flour  
 1 teaspoon salt

To prepare: Stir the ingredients together until well mixed. Store in tightly covered container in cool place. One recipe makes 24 servings.

**Variations:** 1. Chocolate Pudding Mix - add 3/4 cup cocoa to other ingredients before stirring.

2. Caramel Pudding Mix - substitute 1 1/2 cups brown sugar, packed, for granulated sugar. To make pudding from mix: 1 1/2 cups vanilla, chocolate or caramel pudding mix 2 1/2 cups warm water 1 tablespoon butter or margarine 1 shell egg, beaten 3/4 teaspoon vanilla

Combine the mix with the water in top of a double boiler, place over boiling water and cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Cover and cook 10 minutes longer. Add the fat. Remove from heat and beat half of the hot mixture into the egg. Blend slowly into the remaining hot mixture. Cook over hot water one minute longer. Remove from heat and stir in vanilla. Makes 6 servings.

In the Eastland County Nursing Home there are many volunteers who make life brighter for the residents. Sometimes we think of them as doing all the giving in this situation - yet many of these volunteers would probably state that they have received a lot of benefit for the time spent. At least that was my own experience, during the time I was a local volunteer....

As I drove to the Nursing Home that morning, the sky was clear and brilliant - as if a dark scroll had been rolled away. A mockingbird sang from a mat of fresh oak leaves. Carpets of grass and flowers tried to remind me that it was spring. But my mind was shrouded with a question, and I could not roll it back like the clouds from yesterday's sky.

Why did the people in the Nursing Home, where I would soon play my violin, have to suffer the indignities of old age, failing health, confinement, and a loss of creative power?

I hadn't asked that question at first. I had planned to simply go there each Monday, play my instrument, give the residents a pat on the back, and tell them that everything would turn out fine. The last thing I had expected was a spiritual crises in my own mind.

But that was before I had begun to care for the residents as individuals, and feel the terrible questioning start.

Why did Clyde have to be twisted and helpless, and confined to the dreadful contraction of a chair he pushed

along? He was a religious man, people told me, and he still tried to sing "Heavenly Sunshine" in a mumble. And Althea - how her eyes lit, in her lovely 90 yr. old face, when I played "Sweet Hour Of Prayer". Yet her legs were so weak and painful that she had to push herself about in a wheel chair. And dear little cheerful Frances - living in courage!

I turned each case over in my mind. If I had the power, I would transform every one back into a vibrant young person, with their infirmities gone forever. There was something disturbing about the thought, as if I were daring to consider myself more compassionate than God.

I had a son who enjoyed difficult puzzles and cryptograms, who claimed there was always a key which gave the solution to any riddle. But some of the pieces were missing to this dark riddle of life, and I saw no key to the answer. And how could I go on this morning, playing hymns on the violin, pretending to bring hope to the people, when I feared in my mind that they had little to hope for on this earth?

Life was, indeed, an existence full of strange contrasts. This soft warm air was particularly welcome after a hard winter. Rain, after drouth, was always like a breath of God. I reflected that I was thankful for the money in my pocket, because I had known what it was to be without. Lunch would taste good today, for I would be hungry. There was

something mind-expanding about any experience of contrasts.

But time to put on a smile. At least the Nursing Home, shaped oddly like a cross, was small enough to be more homelike than some institutions.

I pushed a door open, hearing subdued clatter inside. But as I approached the Activities Center, I saw that an earlier meeting was being concluded. A group of young people were standing in the room, with the residents sitting in a semi-circle.

"That will be fine," The Activities Director was saying. "With all these young people to help us next Friday, our Walk-A-Thon will be a great success. And with the funds going for such a good cause —"

I paused at the threshold of the room, remember that this was one of the charitable projects the Nursing Home was involved in. But as I glanced toward the elderly residents, I saw that they were as interested in the young people as in the project. And I could hardly blame them, for there was an air of hope and vibrance in the young faces and bodies. How wonderful to be young!

But what had my Grandfather said, at age ninety-five when someone asked him if he would like to be young again He had paused, and thought, and finally answered:

"Why yes - I would like to be young - but only if I could know what I know now!"

The young people were beginning to stir restlessly, tired of confinement. Their movements were elastic and quick. The aged people in chairs look wistfully toward them, observing a world they could not enter - a world of dreams, accomplishment, and freedom.

Here, I thought contrast here, I thought suddenly. Could these young people possibly appreciate —

Then the revelation burst upon me, as if my mind had busily shifted questions and answers into their proper

places. Or was this shaft of Higher wisdom, illuming my darkness?

"Of course -" the words leaped into order - "Of course these young people cannot possibly appreciate youth, for they have never known anything else! And how, I ask you, could anyone really appreciate Eternal youth unless they have known old age in this world?"

I stood quietly for a moment, stunned by the idea. Then the young people were through the hall, and the older faces turned toward me. They were eager for their songs of faith - faith tried in fires I had not yet known.

"I'm so glad to see you today," I stammered. "Why don't we begin by your singing 'Heavenly Sunshine', while I play?"

And the smile I gave back to them was real.

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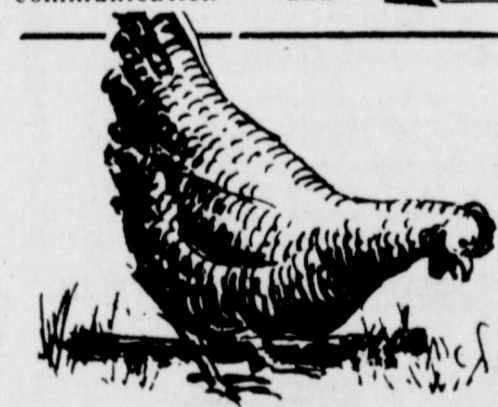

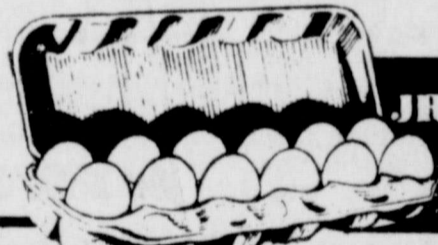

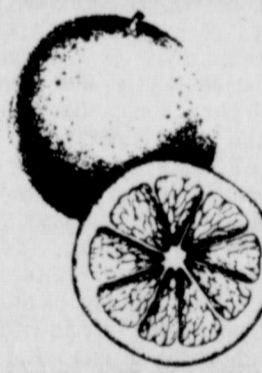

## Draft Registration Guidelines

REGISTRATION GUIDELINES: WHO MUST REGISTER—Male citizens and aliens residing in the United States born in 1960, 1961 or 1962 except those on student or similar visas or who are members of trade or diplomatic missions, and men already serving on active duty with the Armed Forces. Members of reserve components not on active duty must register. Men born in 1963 and later years will be required to register within 30 days of their 18th birthdays. WHEN: Men born in 1962: during the week of January 5th. To help avoid lines, individuals are encouraged to register on a day of the week keyed to the month of birth: on Monday, January 5, for those born in January,

February and March; on Tuesday, January 6, for those born in April, May and June; on Wednesday, January 7, for those born in July, August, and September; and on Thursday, January 8, for those born in October, November and December. Friday and Saturday may be used as "make-up" days for those who are unable to register on the suggested day. Men born in 1963: within 30 days of their 18th birthday. Men born in 1960 and 1961 should already have registered this year; those who have not are encouraged to do so as soon as possible. WHERE: At any of more than 34,500 U.S. Post Offices throughout the nation, or at embassies or consular offices overseas.

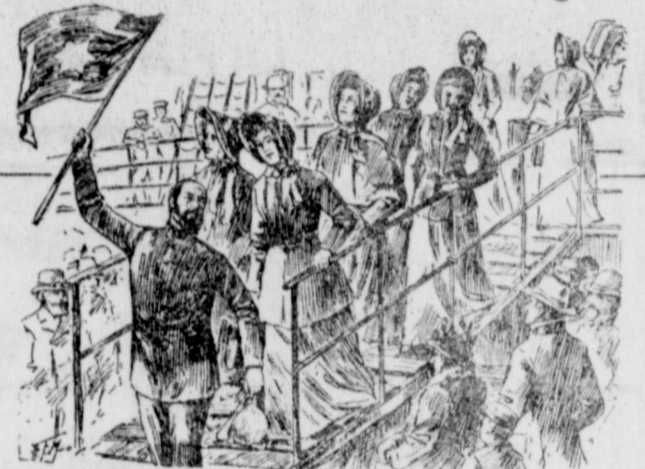

## STRAIGHT ANSWERS FROM THE D.P.S.

Question - Why doesn't Eastland have more stop signs?

I contacted an Eastland official about the above question and I learned several things. First, a survey was made a few years back to determine an approximate cost for signing Eastland's intersections. The cost of signs, installation, etc. would have been staggering. Also, maintenance for so many signs as well as an ever present need for replacements would constantly be an added expenditure for the taxpayer.

The possible need for more signs was approached from the safety standpoint too. It is possible to have too many traffic controls. If traffic flows smoothly through an intersection without accidents occurring you probably don't need any other control

than the intersection right-of-way laws. However, if a certain location develops an accident problem, more control is needed. There were only a few problem intersections in Eastland when the sign study was made. Mr. Victor Cornelius provided Eastland with several dozen signs and they were used in the problem areas. (Some examples are along W. Plummer towards the Crestwood addition)

Fact is, signed or unsigned, there is no intersection which is free of rules as to who must yield the right-of-way. I will address these rules next time.

A farmers income tax workshop has been planned for Friday, January 16. The workshop is being sponsored by the Extension Service and will be in the new Eastland National Bank meeting room. James Denton, Extension Economist, will lead the workshop which will begin at 9:30 a.m. and will continue as long as there are questions. In past years we have ended the workshop about 2:30 p.m.

While most taxpayers have until April 15 to file their 1980 income tax returns, farmers and ranchers face a much earlier filing date.

Agricultural producers who do not file an estimate of their income by January 16 and do not pay estimated taxes must file their tax returns and pay due taxes by March 2. However, if farmers file an estimate,

they have until the April 15 deadline to file final returns.

I would like to mention several considerations for Eastland County farmers and ranchers as they prepare their 1980 income tax returns.

Filing requirements for 1980 are the same as in 1979. For example, an individual must file a return if his gross income is \$3,300 or more, and a married couple under 65 years of age must file if their joint gross income is more than \$5,400. If both are 65 or older, they may make \$7,400 before a return is required.

In contrast to the 1979 optional standard mileage rate of 18½ cents, rate per mile for 1980 is 20 cents for the first 15,000 miles of business travel in your automobile. The rate has increased to 11 cents from 10 cents for business travel of more than 15,000 miles or when one's automobile is fully depreciated.

The standard mileage rate of 9 cents per mile is permitted as a deduction for charitable, medical or moving expense purposes.

A taxpayer should determine his actual transportation expenses (according to IRS guidelines) before deciding whether to use the standard mileage rate or to use his actual transportation expenses.

New installment sales recently passed by congress significantly changes the rules for reporting gain from sales of real property and personal property. The changes which become effective for 1980 include:

-Repeal of the requirement that no more than 30% of the selling price be received in the tax year of sale to qualify

-Two or more payments are no longer required.

-Installment sales tax treatment is automatic unless rejected by the taxpayer.

-The selling price for sales of personal property no longer have to exceed \$1,000.

-The rules are tightened on installment sales between certain related parties--whether through kinship or through business organizational structure.

One report has stated that the new Installment Sales Revision Act of 1980 would "simplify the installment sales tax rules".

Other changes concern business energy investment credit and alcohol fuel credit as well as numerous Revenue Rulings, Revenue Procedures, Tax Cases and minor law changes.

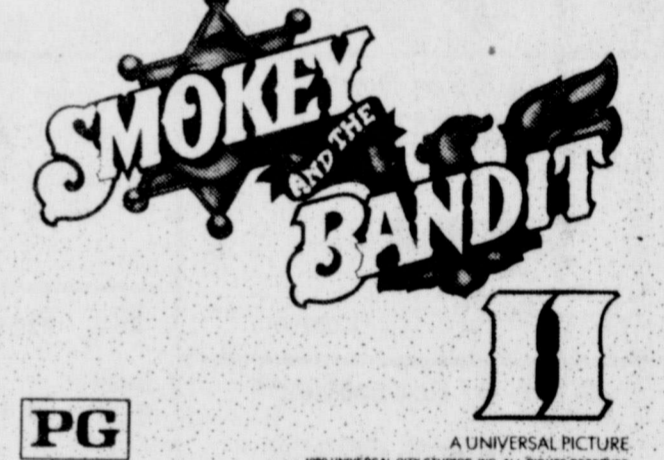

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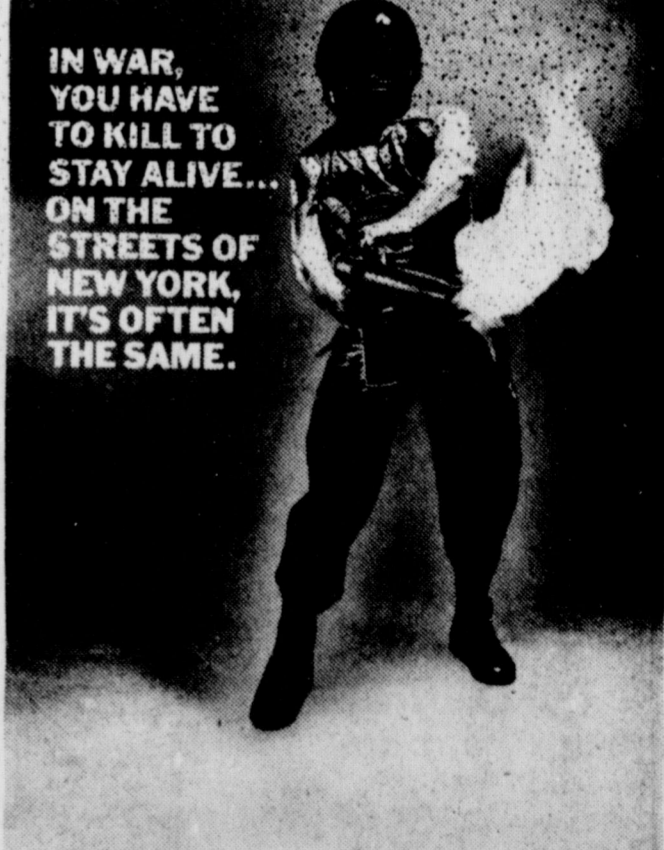

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Students and teachers interested in the second summer

internship program sponsored by Congressman Charles W. Stenholm can

pick up applications at the Congressman's Abilene District Office in the Federal Building.

Applications for the program, which will include two Omar Burleson Congressional Interns and two Lyndon Baines Johnson Congressional Interns, must be postmarked by midnight, February 14, and mailed to the Abilene office.

The interns selected will receive full Congressional Office experience at Stenholm's Washington office, with one intern from each program to serve during June or July of this year.

"After the overwhelming success evidenced by our first internships last year, I had no hesitation in sponsoring the program again," Stenholm said. "The four young people who served during the initial program were truly outstanding workers and I feel that the experience they received will serve them well in the future, whether in a government related field or as private citizens."

Selection for the internships is made by a District-wide seven-person selection committee, chaired by former Congressman Omar Burleson.

Others eligible include any student or graduate student who was enrolled during the preceding academic year at any of the District colleges, universities or technical institutes, or any other school, if the person's home of record is within the District.

Also eligible are teachers, counselors or administrators in any District elementary, middle school, junior high or high school or any instructor, any grade of professorship or administrator of any institution of higher learning within the District. The only requirements is that the person be involved actively in working with students.

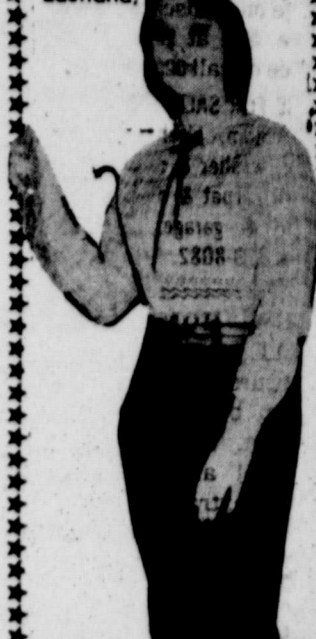

## HEAP Program Will Help Many to Meet Increased Costs

Some 600,000 Texas households will divide \$33.8 million this winter under the Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP), Marlin W. Johnston, acting commissioner of the Department of Human Resources said today.

The program, established by Congress, is designed to assist low income households meet the increased cost of energy for heating their homes.

Johnston said the case assistance will be one-time payments, and will range from \$20 to \$140, based on family size, income, primary heating energy used, and county of residence.

Payments will begin in January and continue through March, 1981, Johnston said.

About 400,000 households will receive the energy payment automatically, and do not have to apply for it. These are households now receiving benefits from Aid to Families with Dependent Children, Supplemental Security Income, or Food Stamps.

The remaining 200,000 households are low-income families and individuals not already receiving public assistance. Members of these households will be required to apply for HEAP benefits beginning January 5, and not after February 28, 1981.

Each county in Texas has a designated location for members of these 200,000 households to apply for the energy assistance. These

locations may be determined by calling the local office of the Texas Department of Human Resources. If certified as eligible for the assistance, applicants should have their payments within 20 to 30 days.

Household gross monthly income cannot be more than the following figures for eligibility. Numbers of people in household, in parentheses, precede income figures:

procedure. Dispatch offers of a broad range of services to the police departments, the sheriff's office and to the public.

The Chief Dispatcher is in charge of the message center operations, insuring that the S.O.P. is adhered to and the equipment is maintained and supplies are on hand.

There are five full-time employees, and each works an eight-hour shift, 40 hours a week. They are beside Mercer, of Olden; Jourline Miller of Cisco; Bob Burkett of Eastland; Sherry Arriola of Eastland; and Rebecca Crain of Gorman.

The Center maintains three major radios: a county frequency with a 50-mile radius; an inter-city-mutual aid with a 75-mile radius; and 37,180 remote transmission from the courthouse; and course Citizen Band, Channel 9.

The Center has teletype facilities funded by the Texas Department of Public Safety, with Texas-wide and nationwide net-works.

Data centers available include drivers license, vehicle registration, state and national stolen property listings.

The message capabilities affords Dispatch contact with all Texas police departments, sheriff's departments, and all states (except Hawaii) police and sheriff departments, as well as with 125 foreign countries through Interpol.

Wanted persons and stolen property data may be entered into the state and national networks from the Eastland County center.

Mr. Mercer reports that the center keeps 15 logs, which reflects growing use of the facilities, which also includes other emergency services including explosive, chemical and nuclear reports as well as night business telephone file number and Skywarn (weather) reports.

The message center in 1980 recorded 316,985 pieces of business for an average of 381 a day, 36 an hour or one every minute and a half.

Radio transmissions are up with 139,636 logged last year: 70 per cent teletype public service; five per cent out of county; and 25 per cent routine. There were 126,003 pieces of teletype traffic with about 80 percent for data checks.

There were 45,994 telephone calls or roughly an average of one every ten minute.

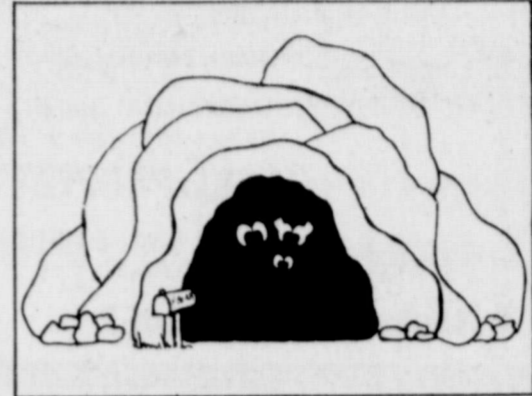

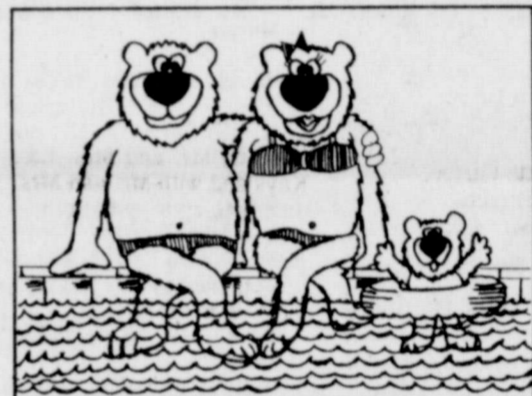

Einstein's most famous work, the special theory of relativity, led to creation of the atomic and hydrogen bombs and other uses of nuclear energy. It was formulated while he worked for the Swiss patent office in the late 1900s after he had been turned down for teaching jobs at European universities.

The special theory of relativity, with its famous equation, predicted that matter could be turned into energy, energy which would be far more powerful than the mass of the matter would indicate. Thus, a few pounds of atomic material produced devastation unlike anything man had ever caused when the atom bomb was introduced at the close of World War II.
