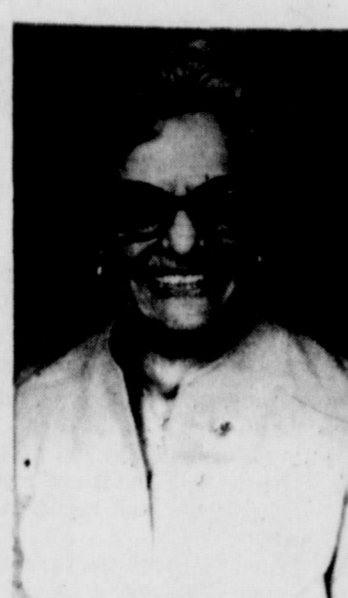

Petition Legality Is Being Studied

The legality of a petition asking for an election on the proposition of abandoning the city manager form of government is being studied by lawyers for the some 350 persons who signed the document, The Press was informed this week.

Mrs. Audye Wagley, who filed the petition last month, told the Abilene newspaper recently that her group was also seeking advice as to whether the election several years ago that installed the city manager form of government was legal. Home rule cities are required to have 5,000 residents and Cisco's official population was less than that figure when the election was held, the article quoted her as saying.

City Attorney W.B. Wright, Jr., ruled that the petition could not be considered by the City Council because it was not in compliance with laws governing home rule cities.

Trustees Extend Couch Contract

The contract of Superintendent James Couch was extended one year for a total of three years at the regular monthly meeting of the board of trustees of the Cisco Independent School District Tuesday night.

Mr. Couch is currently serving his fourth year as head of the Cisco Public Schools, and he previously served for several years as a principal

In other action, the board approved the purchase of a washer and dryer for the Home Economics Department at a cost of \$512.

Although the twin problems of inflation and unemployment loom large before us, the minimum wage rose from \$3.10 to \$3.35 an hour Jan. 1.

That increase, though nobly intended, will only make both problems worse.

The latest of the increases mandated by legislation passed in 1977 means that the minimum wage has increased by 46 percent since that year. A U.S. Chamber of Commerce study concluded that for every 20 percent increase in the minimum wage, 880,000 job opportunities are lost — either existing jobs abolished or the failure of new job opportunities to present themselves.

Common sense tells us that if business costs increase, only two things can happen: Ways can be sought to cut those costs, or prices must be increased to compensate. Either way, Americans on the lower end of the income spectrum lose. They lose job opportunities, and they feel more keenly the ravages of inflation than people who have more discretionary income.

Especially hard hit are teenagers. With the unemployment rate in the 16-to-19-year-old age bracket running between 15 and 20 percent — and over 50 percent among minority youths in some cities — we must find a way to put these willing workers into jobs.

Yet, it is unrealistic to expect businesses to hire untrained, even immature, workers if we require them to pay wages at a higher level than their productivity justifies. Young people find themselves in the treadmill of not being able to find work because they have no experience, and not being able to gain experience because they can't find jobs.

The best way out of this quagmire is to institute a "Youth Opportunity Wage." This youth differential in the minimum wage would allow businesses to pay teenage workers a slightly lower amount, making it economically possible to create new jobs or place these less productive workers into existing jobs.

When they have gained maturity and skills, they will be able to work at the higher adult minimum wage, or, more likely, move above that level.

Would the youth differential throw older workers out of jobs? No. Mature workers are more productive and well worth the difference in pay. Further, most of the jobs in our economy require some measure of skill or experience and thus could not be filled by the young workers who would be covered by the differential. In fact, the number of workers above the age of 20 employed in minimum wage jobs is a minimal percentage of the workforce.

If we are serious about helping our fellow citizens, we must look for workable solutions. Is it better to be unemployed, or to have the satisfaction, and income, that comes from working? The question before us is that simple. Congress must realize it does not work in a vacuum. Every action we take affects the lives of every American and the economic well-being of our nation. We have a sacred obligation to remember that and act accordingly, rather than to legislate through wishful thinking.

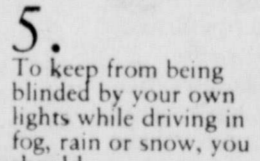

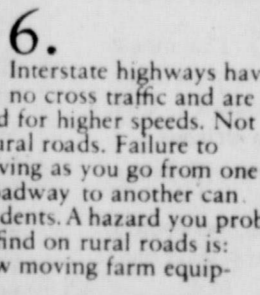

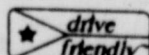

Farmers Should Forget Federal Spending Proposals, but...

U.S. EXPORTS DUE BETTER PROFITABILITY IN WORLD MARKETS
Texas Congressman Charles Stenholm (D-Stamford) appears to be among a growing number of farm state lawmakers who support multilateral trade agreements, according to statements made to members of the Texas Farmers Union meeting in Dallas.

Noting that the U.S. did not sell one single bushel of grain in world markets in 1980 at a price above the cost of production, Stenholm told the statewide farm organization's audience that officials of other exporting nations such as Canada and Australia "are asking when

we Americans are going to stop selling our grains so cheap."

"The U.S. controls sixty percent of the world wheat market," noted the second-term congressman and member of the U.S. House Agriculture Committee. "That means we are poor businessmen if we can control a market but cannot increase our own profitability."

However, he quickly added that farmers don't have control of their markets, pointing out that ninety percent of the world's grains are traded by just four of the largest companies, three of which are foreign-owned, and the fourth partially under foreign control.

"We're going to continue to see the export market treated

as a solution to the farm problem, and certainly it is," he said. "But the days of productive agriculture in this country are numbered unless there is a change in profitability."

While advocating a higher price for farm goods, Stenholm warned the farmers against seeking income improvements through federal farm programs.

"Farmers cannot take a liberal approach to this congress and administration," he said. "The idea of spending more money for anything in the 97th Congress is going to be difficult. In fact, just keeping what's there will be difficult enough."

Stenholm also said he had little doubt that fuel costs would rise by another dollar per gallon in a relatively short time, but, rather than suffering from diesel costs, farmers should be able to "get the 16-20% return they deserve because of the definite price feasibility of 'gasohol' (ethanol) relative to expensive oil."

Reflections In Perspective

Remember the "Henna Blondes" you knew years ago? I say years ago because I've not heard the term used in years and years. Depending upon the amount of the extract from that plant which grows throughout Iraq and Iran used, the hair could be tinted from a sunburst orange through deep red to auburn. The Persian women use it to bring out the auburn tint. Sparingly, I've seen a few Arab women who would allow a wisp of brilliant orange-red hair to stray outside their "aba", which is worn pulled tightly across the forehead and which covers all the rest of the frame with the exception of the face. That part of the person is mostly covered by a goat-skin mask which is formed to fit across the nose and in which slits are cut for the eyes. Goatskin is not so widely used, anymore. It has been replaced by more modern materials.

And the Arab women; and some of the Iranian village women, use the extract of henna for yet another purpose of beautification. They dip their fingertips, over the nails, in the stuff. And they rub it into the palms of the hands and over the soles of their feet and the tips of their toes. Makes them appear to have been shelling green walnuts...and tromping the husks. To these Western eyes, at least. But to them, it is supposed to present something of a sexy appearance to the males in their lives.

And perhaps it works. In 1961 the dictator of Iraq (something of a Khomeini in a military uniform) issued a decree prohibiting the use of henna on hands, fingers, feet and toes. Seems he found such practice to be "morally destructive". And some dictators make quite an issue of the morals of their people.

While the ban was observed in Iraq, the decree had no effect on the practice in other Arab countries. And Dubai is indeed another Arab state. And my story takes place in...and on a flight out of...Dubai.

Middle East Airlines is a Lebanese-based airline of absolutely first class rating. Partially owned for quite some time by Pan American and Trans World...with BOAC's having a thin slice...although I've been told that the American companies sold their interest to Air Frances some years ago; MEA operated on very profitable routes, and gave simply superb service. And I was taking an early morning flight on MEA from Dubai to Beirut. On the Boeing 707, it was a flight (non-stop) of just over two and a half hours.

I was fortunate in that my employer allowed me to travel First Class, and my customary seat was in the second row from the front of the cabin...on the aisle. I flew enough in that area that most of the ticket agents knew "my seat", and would assign it upon my having confirmed my booking. And so it was on that morning in Dubai.

I had boarded the flight and had taken my seat when the plane was boarded by a man I recognized as a relative of the Ruler, Sheik Rashid bin Maktoum al Qassemi, accompanied by three of his wives and three children. Somewhat smallish, the children were. Two of the wives were anything but smallish. The third, and obviously the youngest, was quite comely...what could be seen of her.

Two of the children established themselves in the seats across the aisle, while the third took the window seat in the next...and remaining row. The hostess came along and apologetically informed me that the window seat beside mine was to be occupied by one of the Arab women...a very large Arab woman. And if I should like to change my seat to avoid having to sit alongside the lady, she would understand. The hostess; that is. Now I've flown alongside a variety of characters in my time, and the fact that a very large Arab woman, all done up in enough gold chains, bangles and bracelets as well as being wrapped in a coal black "aba" and hiding her pudgy face behind a mask would not disturb me one whit. Not for a mere two and a half hour flight to Beirut. And I didn't relish the thought of sharing space with a very young Arab who'd quite likely become careless with his jam and sweet rolls, not to mention having to crawl out over my feet every ten minutes. No, thank you just the same. I didn't mind the Arab Lady as a travelling companion.

So; the lady was ushered into the window seat, where she promptly began to settle herself by somehow managing to pull her feet up, take off her sandals and sit crosslegged in the seat adjoining mine. And the foot which stuck across almost onto the seat I was occupying was generously stained with henna, as were the fingertips and palms of her hands. Somehow, it didn't send thrills up down my spine. Again, I couldn't escape the feeling she'd been tromping green walnuts.

Airborne; and breakfast was served. First, there was the matter of helping the hostess strap the lady in. She had to come off her cross-legged arrangement in order for that to be accomplished. "Fasten seat belt" light went off, and I informed the lady that she could again make herself comfortable. She proceeded to do just that. And then breakfast was served. Needless to say, neither sausages nor bacon were served my travelling companion, although a double helping of grilled mushrooms were added to the scrambled eggs.

Before beginning the meal, the lady asked me to explain the source of such a feast. I explained that it was a gift of the airline. How much would she have to pay? (She was still suspicious of a trick.) Absolutely nothing.

She was incredulous, but she testily sampled the mushrooms. The scrambled eggs she could understand. Finding the toaststools to her liking, she began scooping them up with bare fingers and stuffing them into her mouth. Took a bit of manipulating of the mask, but she managed. Likewise the eggs. She had no use for the likes of forks and spoons...except to stir her tea. Then she took the little individual serving of jam. She was curious about that article. I explained that it was a sweet, and had to restrain her from popping the thing, package and all, into her mouth. I opened it for her. She dipped the tip of a finger into it for a taste, and then proceeded to scoop it all out with the same finger and to pop that in. She was so obviously pleased that I gave her one of my two servings of jam, and stopped the hostess to suggest that perhaps she could find another serving of jam in the galley. Smiling, she returned with a handful of them for my companion.

The flight was uneventful, except that the seats occupied by the smallish children were a mess by the time we reached Beirut.

But henna-stained hands and feet still, somehow, fail to "grab me" - as the young folk would say.

How To Button Your Jacket And Vests

For the well-dressed man, confusion sometimes arises over how many buttons to button on jackets and vests, says Beverly Rhoades, a clothing specialist.

The number of buttons to button differs according to whether the wearer is standing, walking or sitting, she points out.

Miss Rhoades is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

In general, here are some guidelines to follow: When standing, button all jacket buttons.

When walking, button only the top button on a two-button jacket. Button only the middle one for a three-button jacket.

For double-breasted jackets, button all buttons if possible. Button at least the top two for six-button, double-breasted jackets.

When sitting, a man can leave all jacket buttons open.

For vests, button all buttons unless the vest is tight. This is true for standing, walking or sitting.

However, if the last button on a vest is off-set purposely by the manufacturer, do not button it-it will cause puckering.

For the five- or six-button vest, buttoning the bottom is optional. Leaving the bottom button open may provide a more neat, well-polished appearance in case buttoning it causes pulls and pckers.

If vests are snug, the wearers may want to unbutton them when sitting.

Sweater vests follow the same rules as indicated above if they are buttoned up the front.

For a more casual look, leave all buttons on sweater vests open especially if a jacket is not worn.

For Crying Out Loud

COLLEGE STATION—For years, parents have listened to their newborn babies cry without any way of telling why—sleepiness, hunger, illness or anger.

Howard Golub may have an answer.

Golub, a doctoral candidate at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, is developing a technique for diagnosing illnesses by listening to infants' cries, says Mary Ann Shirer, a health education specialist.

Dr. Shirer is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

After listening to numerous tape recordings of healthy and unhealthy babies, medical researchers in connection with Golub's project have programmed a computer to analyze 88 different components of a baby's cry, Dr. Shirer explains.

Now in the experimental stage, Golub's technique is being tested on mothers and their infants at the Boston Hospital for Women.

Researchers report that this new computer program may have the capability to detect in newborns the following conditions: jaundice, respiratory distress, brain damage and Down's Syndrome, sometimes referred to as mongolism, which is a congenital abnormality with mental and physical manifestations.

Some day Golub's technique may serve as the early-detection device for problems that would otherwise not surface until later in life.

Range Seeding Pays

Seeding rangeland is a step in the right direction for boosting grazing potential. But it's expensive and requires proper planning, selection of adapted plants, good seeding methods and careful management.

"First, look at the quantity and distribution of desirable plants currently present," suggests Dr. Tommy Welch, range brush and weed control specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. "If desirable plants make up less than 10-15 percent of the vegetation, seeding is probably necessary."

If desirable plants are uniformly distributed and make up more than 10-15 percent of the vegetation, grazing management can usually improve range conditions, notes the specialist.

"Seeding is usually necessary following a brush control method such as root-plowing that destroys existing turf. Also, seeding is usually the most effective way to establish desirable vegetation on abandoned

cropland," says Welch. He advises seeding only on better range sites to insure reasonable chances of success. Do not disturb steep, potentially erosive sites. Seeding range sites that receive runoff water usually provides good results.

Another consideration is to select species and varieties of plants for seeding that are adapted to the area's soil, climate and topography (lay of the land). Also, select plants that are easily established, palatable to animals, relatively productive, able to withstand competition by undesirable plants, able to withstand moderate grazing, and able to prevent erosion under moderate grazing.

Welch suggests checking with county Extension agents or local Soil Conservation Service officials for information on adapted plants.

Planting into a well-prepared seedbed is essential. An ideal seedbed is firm below the seeding depth, is free from live plant competition, and has moderate

amounts of mulch or plant residue on the soil surface.

"Preparing a good seedbed on an abandoned cropland is possible without undue expense, but on rangeland it's a different story," says Welch. "However, prepare the best seedbed that available resources will allow. For example, rootplowing followed by roller chopping or chaining is an acceptable method of seedbed preparation on brush infested rangeland."

When it comes to seeding rangeland, the two most common methods are broadcast and drill. Broadcasting places seed on the soil surface while drilling puts them into the soil and is superior where a drill can be used. However, broadcast seeding by aerial or ground application is often used because most drills are not sturdy enough for rough rangeland, explains Welch.

Time seeding so that developing seedlings will have the best growing conditions. Warm season plants grow in the summer and will make their best and most vigorous growth if seeded in late winter or early spring. A late summer or fall seeding

date for cool season plants may be best because young seedlings may not be able to tolerate hot, dry summers.

To get a newly seeded area established, protect it from grazing through at least one growing season, depending on growing conditions. During periods of harsh growing conditions, two or three years of deferment may be necessary to allow seedlings to establish.

Welch notes that weed control measures such as mowing, shredding or use of herbicides may be necessary during the first growing season to allow seeded species to become established.

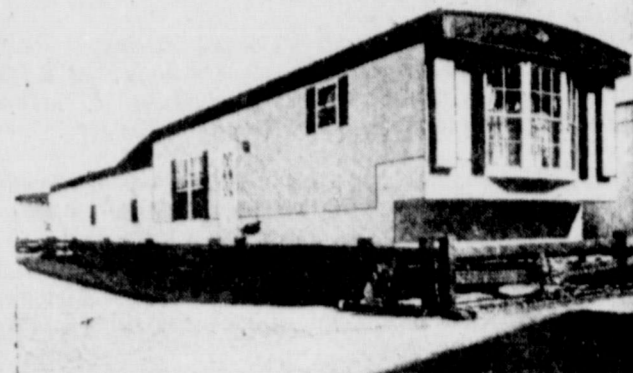

The proposed modification involves construction of a turboexpander unit to handle additional 30MMSCF per day of natural gas. ONC has submitted an application to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), pursuant to the requirement for Prevention of Significant Deterioration (PSD) of air quality in the Clean Air Act, 42 U.S.C. 7460, and regulations promulgated by the EPA on June 19, 1978, and amended on August 7, 1980. The EPA is proposing to approve this application and is hereby extending the opportunity for comment concerning this project.

2. Location of Proposed Construction

The compression station is located southeast of Cisco, Texas, 6.8 miles south on U.S. 183, 3 miles east on FM 2526, and 0.4 miles north on a gravel road.

3. Project Description

The proposed modification involves the addition of a turboexpander unit (Unit 2). This involves gas dehydration, gas chilling, demethanizing and recompressing the natural gas. Presently, the plant is processing 30 MMSCF of natural gas per day; with the proposed expansion, the capacity will be doubled. Since the proposed modification involves emissions of NOx in excess of 40 tons/year, it is considered a major modification. No other pollutants will have a "significant" net emission increase.

4. Best Available Control Technology (BACT)

The company proposes to utilize MEP-8 engines for the turboexpander Unit 2. The company chose not to use gas turbines because of their lower fuel efficiency, higher operating costs and lower power output.

Gasohol Alternative 'Superfuel' Coming Into Its Own

EDITORS NOTE: Reprinted from the Abilene Reporter-News, the following is a primer on gasohol. Information on the pros of gasohol is from Al Mavis, president of the National Gasohol Commission in Lincoln, Neb.

Gasohol is a term that refers to an alternative motor fuel which is 90 percent gasoline and 10 percent alcohol. Though either regular or unleaded gasoline may be blended with the alcohol, the alcohol must be ethanol (200 proof alcohol). Since the recipe for gasohol calls for nine parts gasoline to one part alcohol, gasohol stretches the use of gasoline (and foreign crude oil), Mavis said.

5. Air Quality Impact

A PSD air quality analysis was performed to determine if the National Ambient Air Quality Standards (NAAQS) for NOx will be exceeded due to the proposed modification of ONC Carbon Plant. Ambient NOx concentrations were determined to be 62.1 ug/m3 as existing and 85.5 ug/m3 with the proposed expansion. A background concentration of 20 ug/m3 for NOx was assumed.

In addition, it is expected that there will be no adverse impacts on Class I areas, or upon visibility, soils, or vegetation of the surrounding areas, and that there will be significant impact on growth due to the proposed project.

otherwise would have been diverted for gasoline production, to be used for the manufacture of other petroleum products, gasohol will help ease the United States' dependence on crude oil imports, he said.

A remedy for engine knock and ping, gasohol has an octane level three to four points higher than regular and unleaded gasoline, Mavis said. It is similar to premium gasoline and reduces or eliminates "dieseling" - the continued running of the engine even after the ignition is turned off.

As the octane level increases, exhaust emissions with gasohol are reduced. According to tests conducted by the University of Illinois, exhaust emissions from a vehicle burning gasohol contain 30 percent less carbon monoxide and hydrocarbons than emissions from a gasoline-powered vehicle, Mavis said.

Not only does gasohol reduce air pollution, it also acts as a solvent, cleaning out carbon buildup and soot deposits in the vehicle fuel system, he said. Because of this cleaning action, changing the fuel filter after initial gasohol use is advised.

Except for the new fuel filter, gasohol should lengthen the life of your car and improve its performance without vehicle modifications, Mavis said.

Meanwhile, the benefits of gasohol production, which is dependent upon the manufacture of alcohol, include a "new viable market for agricultural producers of grain," he said. Since alcohol is derived from the fermentation and distillation of renewable crops such as

corn, wheat, sorghum, potatoes and sugar cane, farmers can "keep the dollar at home" with an alternative marketplace for their produce.

According to NGC figures, a bushel of corn will yield about 16 pounds of alcohol, 16 pounds of carbon dioxide and 16 pounds of a by-product high in protein, Mavis said.

The alcohol of course can be used for gasohol, and the carbon dioxide can be captured for use in bottling carbonated drinks. Suitable for human consumption and already used as feed for livestock and poultry, the high-protein by-product can be shipped overseas to starv-

ing countries, he said.

Instead of exporting surplus corn, which has a high starch content, the corn could be better implemented in making both gasohol for fuel and a more nutritious, high-protein food product for under-nourished populations, Mavis said.

In summary then, gasohol is a renewable source of energy that is supposed to improve vehicle life and performance, create additional jobs provide useful by-products and maintain a healthier American economy.

If these are the benefits, then what of gasohol's disadvantages? "I can't think of any," said Mavis, who refer-

red to gasohol as a "super fuel".

However, several Big Country gasohol users said the price of gasohol is a definite drawback.

Asked about the higher cost, Mavis said: "We figure anything's cheaper than goin' to war in the Middle East for oil. And actually, the Arabs have been awfully good to us. The more they raise the price (of crude oil), the better it looks (for the gasohol industry)."

"Gasohol is coming into its own," he said. Since major oil companies such as Diamond Shamrock and Chevron have become interested in the development of gasohol, "it's turned the corner," he said.

The exhibition includes more than 100 bronze and other items - from the first simple wine cup to the extraordinary life-size terracotta figures buried with the first emperor of Qin. The items feature discoveries that have fundamentally changed our knowledge of ancient Chinese history and art.

The items are among hundreds unearthed since 1974 when farmers sinking wells came upon evidence that led to the discovery of an entire army of clay figures buried to the east of the first emperor's tomb site. Other ancient bronze items have been found in excavations dating back 25 years or more.

Archaeologists there are real excited about untold riches that still await them in Chinese soil. There is a picture on display of a hill that is known to cover ruins that will be evacuated soon.

The exhibition will remain at Kimbell through Feb. 18. It has already appeared at New York and Chicago and goes to Los Angeles, Boston and San Francisco before returning home to China. Admission is free but you need a ticket to be sure of getting in. One of the attendants told us that you can be pretty sure of being admitted if you show up any week day around 3 p.m. Weekends are crowded. They're averaging 4,000 people per day to see the exhibition. It is open daily except Mondays. Parking seems to be a problem.

There are numerous publications and aids to make your museum tour more profitable.
