

# EDITORIALS

A Letter From the Publisher

Cisco is on two important thresholds. One is the upcoming 100th birthday which will be properly marked by a Centennial Celebration, which deserves our combined all-out participation.

The second is what is undoubtedly going to be "another boom" for the city and area, as growth continues and expansion emerges, as industry, business and the resulting people come to enjoy the many benefits of this key Sunbelt spot.

It would seem that if for no other reason, the citizens of this good community have every right to expect that all will be in order when these thresholds are crossed. Evaluation and examination is good, and since it should begin on a personal basis, we'll address that direction and begin with a personal soul-searching.

The Press stands accused in some quarters of failing to present both sides of issues at City Hall. This is a serious accusation and it bothers us. If this be so - and we certainly don't imply that we have all the facts - then we immediately want to publicly apologize, because we see our responsibility as providing all the information we can, "on all sides."

For a long, long time, we've hoped that there weren't "sides", and that differences could best be worked out by the individuals involved, and properly reported by the Press, people who know their job, the people, the town, and in our opinion, do a good job.

But if there are "sides," and if the Press hasn't been airing "both sides," then there's more than us at fault. There should be only side: THE CISCO SIDE.

After a weekend of "ear-to-ear" telephone calls from Cisco citizens, we're convinced that the citizens have a right to expect some very specific things. (And as a tax payer and civic booster, the Press certainly considers itself a "citizen.")

First of all, it would appear that the city's present form of government (commission, city manager) is a fact of life. It was adopted several years ago, and apparently the time limit for questioning the election and/or the method of establishing that government has passed.

And recent indications are that attempting to change it back to the mayor/commission form could probably endanger the city's home-rule status - and conceivably plunge it toward general rule designation which could strip it of many of the privileges it now enjoys.

The possibility is frightening that the state legislatures would set tax votes and other key decisions.

So it would appear that acceptance of the present form of government is the first order of business. And that the second order would be to follow the city charter, in letter and spirit.

Which brings us to the Press article in question. It states in part: "The regularly scheduled meeting of the City Council on Tuesday night, Jan. 13, was not held for lack of a quorum of members." It would seem the people of Cisco have a right to know why there wasn't a quorum. Very important business was conducted at the meeting specially called for Wednesday evening.

The article closes with what appears to have been a brief discussion after the meeting ended, at which the city manager told a councilperson that the particular topic wasn't on the agenda and couldn't be discussed, and further that it would only be discussed under council order.

Remote observers might see this as quite a bit of petty gobble-gook; and frankly, it undoubtedly appears the same to not just a few locals too.

So it would seem that we might all do our Cisco well by forgetting "about sides", and thinking about what's best for Cisco; and be about working together with what we have. It's generally understood that under a city manager form of government, the council should harmoniously and with the best interest of the city, adopt policy, which the city manager, an employee, should with his staff and employees, carry out.

It might mean taking a lot of "ourselves" out of city matters, and putting more of co-operation into our thinking. It's a fact that "things move slowly" at the City Hall, and perhaps that's the way it should be, because when many of us attempt to "speed things up", we invariably get into problems. The City is a separate entity, and deserves the best management it can get, to provide the services the citizens deserve and expect.

At best serving on boards and commissions is a thank-less task and everyone who offers to serve, deserves our respect and support. If we are unhappy - there's an election every year.

The Press is for Cisco. The only side it wants to print is the Cisco side.

Centennial Time might be a good time for each of us to join hands, work together and help make this an even better place to live in the second 100 years. - H.V. O'Brien.

## Woman & Daughter Remain In Hospital

A Cisco woman and her daughter remain in the Intensive Care Unit of Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene this week after being seriously injured in an automobile accident Friday afternoon near Abilene.

It was reported Tuesday morning that Mrs. Ben (Ruby) Streiff and her daughter Connie, a fifth grade student at Cisco Intermediate School, were both doing a little better on Monday, but neither will be released from Intensive Care until possibly Thursday.

Ruby Streiff was reported to have broken ribs on one side of her body, and she and her daughter both had to undergo surgery to remove their spleens. They both also suffered from lacerations and injuries about the head.

Also injured in the accident was the Streiff's son Jason, a second grader at Cisco Primary School. Jason was released from the hospital on Saturday after being treated for a broken nose and face lacerations.

The accident reportedly occurred as Mrs. Streiff and her two children were returning to Cisco after taking her husband to the Abilene airport. At the Elm Dale intersection, as the Streiff automobile was entering the on-ramp to Interstate 20, a pickup allegedly ran a yield sign hitting the Streiff vehicle.

Two men in the pickup were reported to have been unhurt in the accident. The Streiffs live at 1112 West 7th Street in Cisco.

## Over 1200 Tax Exemption Notices Mailed Out To Local Homeowners Here

Over 1200 tax exemption notices were mailed out to local homeowners of the Cisco Independent School District in early January. The tax office personnel would like to thank all of the homeowners who have already returned their signed forms. Their cooperation in getting the exemptions back to the School District is greatly appreciated. They would also like to remind all others not to forget that in order for their exemptions to be valid for 1981, the exemptions must be returned by April 1, 1981.

For the benefit of those not receiving an exemption last year or not familiar with the types of exemptions available, the following is a brief description of the exemptions that citizens may

1. \$5,000 Residential Homestead Exemption - For the home you owned on January 1, 1981, if it was located within the Cisco ISD and it was your residence at that time.

2. \$10,000 Over-65 Exemption - If you qualify for the \$5,000 exemption and are also over 65 years of age.

3. \$10,000 Disability - Those who are totally disabled in accordance with Social Security requirements and not able to work.

4. Open Space or Ag-Use Exemption - Landowners involved in agricultural activities are eligible for this exemption if they satisfy certain requirements. For these requirements, you should check with the tax office.

5. Veterans Exemptions - All qualified veterans are eligible for this exemption. To check on your eligibility for this, a veteran should check with either the tax office or the veterans administration.

Cisco Chief of Police W.A. (Bill) Pence reported Tuesday morning that Cisco is suffering from a real bad vandalism problem. He urged all citizens to watch their property and call the police department on any acts of vandalism they may witness.

Chief Pence reported the Police Department has recovered four stolen truck tires and two automobiles which were stolen and stripped. He said two suspects were under arrest for the stolen autos but the case had not been completed by press time.

## STRAIGHT ANSWERS FROM THE D.P.S.

(Ed. Note: This is basic information. We recommend that local drivers read it, re-read it, have young people read it and all become very familiar with the situations.) My last article concerning traffic control signs at city street intersections brought about a need for discussing the right-of-way laws for the intersections where there are no signs.

Prior to discussing what the law allows, I want to mention an aspect that is not allowed. A few years ago a change in the right-of-way laws did away with the first vehicle into the intersection having the right-of-way concept. This no longer is true. The first vehicle into an intersection has no bearing on who is to yield the right-of-way.

There are four basic rules that need to be understood in order to know who must yield the right-of-way at an intersection.

First, at intersections where there are traffic signs erected, drivers are required to obey them.

The second rule deals with intersections where a single lane street or a street of only two traffic lanes intersects with a street which has three or more lanes or is divided. In this instance I am describing an intersection where there are no signs to govern the movement of traffic and so the smaller street must yield the right-of-way to traffic on the larger street.

The third rule deals with intersections where there are no signs and one intersecting street is paved and the other is unpaved. Traffic on the unpaved street must yield right-of-way to traffic on the paved street.

The fourth rule concerns intersections where the streets have the same number of driving lanes and the surfacing of the streets is the same.

Here, a driver is required to yield right-of-way to traf-

fic on his right. Another part of the fourth rule deals with an intersection where one road terminates at the intersection. In this instance the intersection has no signs, the surfacing is the same, but one road ends at the intersection forming a "T" intersection. Traffic on the terminations roadway must yield right-of-way to traffic on the through roadway.

In all instances that I have mentioned you will notice that the right-of-way is not given because of one street being a U.S. or a state highway which is intersection with a city street.

Highway designation does not enter into determining who must yield the right-of-way, but instead you need to consider signs, size of intersecting streets, surfacing, or "T" intersection.

There are two other points I want to make in dealing with right-of-way. In Eastland the drivers on some streets "assume" they have the right-of-way. I suppose it's custom that drivers on Main Street (U.S. 80) assume that they have the right-of-way over side streets as well as do drivers on Commerce, Sadosa, Seaman (Tex. 6), and others, but this is not the case. Each intersection has to be dealt with by the rules that have been discussed.

The other point I want to make is that the law doesn't give the right-of-way to anyone.

Instead it states who is to yield the right-of-way. A good driving practice is to assume that you never have the right-of-way until you can tell that the other driver has given it to you.
