> It is interesting to note that a year ago in the City of Muleshoe, the Southwestern Public Service Company was serving 657 customers. As of March 1, 1947, the number of customers has increased to 754. This does not include the customers which are served by the Bailey County R.E.A. The increase of electrical energy in and around Muleshoe has been terrific, both in the homes and for industrial purposes. In the last few months the City has increased the size of the boosting pump for the water supply in Muleshoe, and two other large power users, the Muleshoe Alfalfa Dehydrating Company and King Grain Elevator Company are being connected to the system. Alwestern Public Service Company on its rural lines serves 28 irrigation

The substation consists of three transformers which weigh 18 tons. along with numerous switching devices; and new voltage regulators have been ordered and will be installed when received. The Purwestern Public Service Company bought materials from practically every state in the Union trying to assemble the substation for instal-

The current is introduced to the substation at 66,000 volts from the high lines coming from the Clovis. New Mexico, Generating Station, Denver City Generating Station, Tuco Generating Station, and the Amarillo Generating Station. It is then reduced to 2300 volts for distribution in the town, and with a smaller transformer mounted on the poles located in the alleys, the current is reduced to 220 or 110 volts. which is used in most business houses and all residences.

> POST OFFICE BOX RENTS TO INCREASE JULY 1

Authorization to incease box rents has been received at the Muleshoe postoffice from the department in Washington. Accordingly, rates will be increased July 1, it was said.

Employes here said boxes which have rented for 45 cents a quarter will then rent for 60 cents a quarter; 60 cent boxes will be 75 cents; and 75 cent boxes will rent for \$1.00 a quarter. Rate of charge on box rents is based on postal receipts at the office concerned.

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
