Dynamiting Investigation Continues

County Sheriff John W. Morren and Cisco Police Chief Bill Pence were continuing their investigation Friday, and taking statements from ten teenagers and their parents about the Saturday night dynamiting at the Cisco football field.

The statements will be turned over to District Attorney Emory Walton and 91st District Court Judge Jim Wright, the law enforcement officers who are cooperating in the investigation, reported.

The explosion occurred about 9 p.m. Saturday, reportedly from what was believed to have been as many as five sticks of dynamite, and damages presently are being estimated in the thousands of dollars.

In addition to a hole (about 12 by nine by five feet deep) at the 30-yard line in the field, all the glass in the press box was blown out, the stadium lighting system damaged, and residences adjoining are reporting serious structural damage.

The suspects are minors and apparently will be filed on as juveniles.

\$250 per month car expense of City Manager Turpin for the use of his personal car on city business for the past three months. The \$750 expense was listed in the monthly bills being reviewed for approval by the city council and mayor.

City Manager Turpin stated the council could approve the expense or disapprove it, in which case he would refund the money.

Council members Phippen, Eudy and Jeffcoat seemed in agreement with the idea that the city manager should be compensated for using his own, personal car on city business in Cisco, since the council had provided former city manager John Boland with an automobile which was relinquished to the police department, where it was more needed when Turpin became Cisco's city manager.

Also during the discussion of the bills, both Mayor Cartee and Mrs. Allison questioned the buying of gasoline for the City of Cisco from R&R Fuel Company in Ranger. Both the Mayor and Mrs. Allison argued that they believe the gas should be bought in Cisco from local wholesalers. City Manager Turpin stated he is saving the city four cents a gallon buying the gasoline in Ranger and he further stated, if the local competitors "will meet that price, I will buy from them."

Mayor Cartee then asked City Manager Turpin, "Do you know who provided the city's storage tanks for gas?"

Turpin replied, "I do not, but I know they belong to the city now."

Mayor Cartee said, "The men we dropped" donated the tanks to the city.

At this point, council member Jeffcoat asked Mayor Cartee if he was suggesting "we subsidize these people now?"

Mayor Cartee said "no", but he believes the city manager should personally contact them about the situation. City Manager Turpin replied they were informed before gasoline was bought from Ranger.

Council member Jeffcoat made a motion to accept the bills and Eudy made the second; however, the motion was never put to a vote since continued arguments from Mrs. Allison and Mayor Cartee apparently sparked the motion by Phippen to adjourn the meeting.

In council action taken during the meeting, the minutes of a regular meeting on December 9 and called meetings of December 16, 17, 18 and January 14 were unanimously approved.

At the opening of Tuesday night's meeting, Mayor Cartee read a poem written by DeDe McGrew, a Cisco High School student, entitled "I Love Cisco." He stated he plans to send her a letter of appreciation and commendation for the verses.

"That's the chance he took when he joined the fire department!"

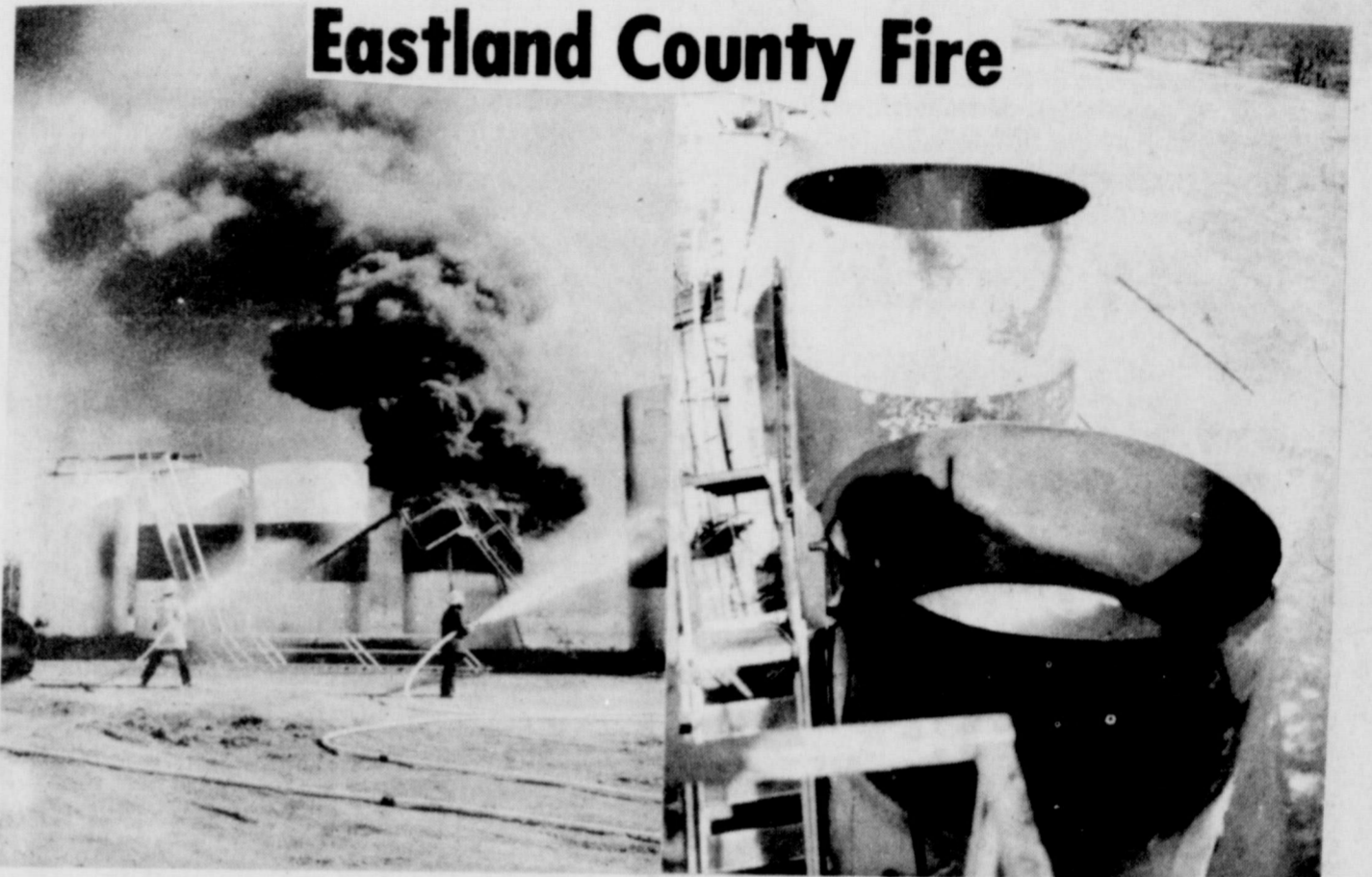
When a firefighter complains that his department is undermanned,

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GORDON SPOT

Euonymus, a popular shrub in Eastland County, is often damaged or killed by euonymus scale. You can identify this insect by the small brown scale found on the leaves, stems, and trunk and the small white flakes on the leaves.

Now is a good time to spray the euonymus and other shrubs and trees to control scale insects. They should be sprayed with a dormant oil.

If all the scale are not killed now they will begin a new generation in May. At that time they can be sprayed with a mixture of summer oil and malathion or diazinon.

It is the time of year when Eastland County cattlemen need to put up their guard against a pest that annually plunders their pocketbooks.

Lice are the culprits, and they begin to reproduce rapidly with cool weather. They reach peak population in late winter and early spring.

Uncontrolled, lice can soon infest a whole herd, because with cold weather, cattle tend to bunch up more and the pests can easily move from one animal to another.

Costs to cattlemen—both in control efforts and dramatic production losses—increase as lice populations build.

Lice infestations irritate animals, causing itching, scratching and rubbing on fences or anything else available. This produces denuded areas, bruises and lacerations on the affected animal.

Heavily infested animals will have an unthrifty appearance and will suffer weight reduction, decreased milk production, anemia or even death.

Lice infested animals may also be more subject to respiratory diseases such as pneumonia. Heavy lice infestations often stunt calves. Undernourished cattle of any age usually have the heaviest infestation.

Insecticide control of lice is not difficult to achieve but

there are some problems. Most insecticides don't kill eggs; therefore, retreatment is required in two or three weeks to prevent another buildup. However, if the initial treatment comes late enough in the season, there may not be enough time for lice to build to economic levels again before warm spring weather.

Pour-on and spot-on grubicides labeled for lice are effective and considerably reduce the problem of cold stress associated with dips and sprays. However, the possibility of a host-parasite reaction is always a threat if the material is applied after the cut-off date for grub control.

When used in a preventative program, properly placed and maintained dust bags offer effective control of

lice. Bags should be hung in areas that cattle frequently use or hung in such a manner that cattle are forced to use them. One dust bag station should serve about 30 head.

The spot-on formulation of chlorpyrifos (Dorsban 44) is a new product that has been effective against lice. The product kills all stages of lice—eggs, nymphs and adults. One application is adequate for season-long control if the entire herd is treated and no untreated animals are later introduced into the herd.

Only a small amount of chlorpyrifos is required, thus eliminating cold stress from soaking animals with sprays and dips. The insecticide is not a grubicide, so it can be

used anytime without fear of a host-parasite reaction. However, this product is not labeled for dairy animals.

Whichever lice control program is used, the cattlemen should be certain to read label directions and pay particular attention to warnings, restrictions and pre-slaughter intervals.

* Use a small-hole throat plate so the fabric won't be pulled down into the needle hole.

* Use a new size 9 or 11 sharp machine needle, or one of the special needles that help prevent skipped stitches. Loosen the machine tension if necessary.

* If you have trouble sewing sheers without getting puckers, hold the fabric taut and place a layer of tissue paper under the fabric as you sew. Tear the tissue away from stitching.

* For the smoothest and most inconspicuous seams, use French seams on straight edges, double-stitched and trimmed seams on curves.

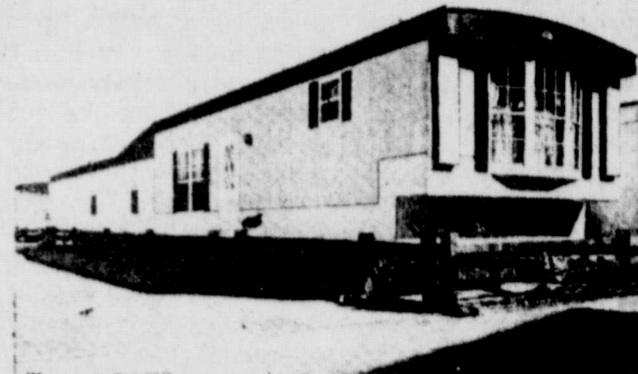

I recently read a story about John D. Rockefeller Sr., that I would like to share.

AS A YOUNG MAN, JOHN D. ROCKEFELLER, SR. was as strong and husky as a farm lad. When he entered business, he drove himself harder than any slave was ever driven by the whip of a taskmaster.

At the early age of 33, he had made his first million dollars. By consecrating every waking moment to his work, he controlled, at age 43, the biggest business in the world. When he was 53, he was the richest man on earth and the world's only billionaire.

For his achievement he had bartered his own happiness and health. He developed alopecia, a con-

dition in which not only the hair of the head drops off but also most of the hair from the eyelashes and eyebrow. One of his biographers said that he looked like a "mummy". His weekly income was a million dollars, but his digestion was so bad that he could eat only crackers and milk.

Then John D. began to do some thinking in the long nights when he couldn't sleep. One night he made a startling discovery: he would not be able to take even one of his thin dimes with him into the next world! His was the despair and helplessness of the little boy who sees the relentless tide coming in to sweep in to oblivion all the sand castles he has been building.

For the first time in his life he recognized that money was not a commodity to be hoarded but something to be shared for

the benefit of others.

In the morning he, like Scrooge, lost no time in transforming his money into blessings to others. He began to help worthy causes. He established the Rockefeller Foundation so that some of his fortune could be channeled to needed areas.

It would require a book to describe the benefits that resulted from the many hundreds of millions of dollars that he showered on universities, hospitals, mission work, and millions of underprivileged people.

He was the one who helped rid the South of its greatest economic and physical scourge - the hookworm. We can thank John D. every time our lives and lives of our children are saved by an injection of penicillin because his contributions aided in the discovery of this miracle drug. His money sparked the research that saved and is still saving millions of people from untimely deaths from malaria, tuberculosis, diphtheria, and many other diseases.

Betty Hanna, 59, wife of State Rep. Joe Hanna of Breckenridge, "improved a little bit during the day" at Breckenridge Hospital after suffering a massive heart attack about 8:30 a.m. Wednesday, said her son, Mark Hanna.

Asked if his mother has a history of heart problems, Hanna said: "No, she's been the healthiest person in the family."

editor of *The Breckenridge American* and covers the Texas Legislature for the newspaper when in Austin.

She is a journalism graduate of the University of Texas.

A native of Breckenridge, she also is a freelance writer and author of a book on Stephens County. A member of the Texas Historical Com-

mission, she served as chairman of Breckenridge's Bicentennial celebration and president of the club for state legislators' wives.

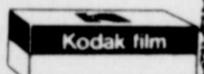

Congressman Stenholm Named To Key Subcommittee

D.C.—Congressman Charles W. Stenholm today was named to four key subcommittees of the House Agriculture Committee that will essentially serve as the staging area for formulation of the 1981 Farm Bill.

Subcommittee assignments for the 17th District Representative serving his second term in Congress include: Cotton, rice and sugar; livestock, dairy and poultry; tobacco and peanuts; and wheat, soybeans and feed grains, including oilseeds.

Stenholm said he "couldn't be happier" with his subcommittee assignments since "all initial work on the Farm Bill will originate in each of the four subcommittees I will be working on."

While the entire Agriculture Committee will vote on the final farm package before consideration by the House, each subcommittee is handed the responsibility for policy formulation, including mark-up (complete deliberation and formal review) vote. In the past, mark-up has been before the full committee. "It would be very difficult to effect any real change or any guidance in policy direction for the commodities without being there at the beginning," Stenholm said.

"I expect to take a very active part in work on the new Farm Bill," Stenholm continued, "and quite frankly, I'm looking forward to it. Right now there are a lot of questions regarding the future direction of agricultural policy in this country and that policy will have a widespread effect on the economy of the country as a whole."

"We know there have to be changes made," Stenholm said. "We just cannot afford to continue to export our farm products below the costs to produce them. Neither can we afford the high toll on our soil, water and energy resources."

Hearings on the Farm Bill are expected to begin in mid-February.

Stenholm is now one of only two Texans on the Agriculture Committee, a committee noted for its domination by Texans in past years. Congressman E. (Kika) de la Garza of Texas is new chairman of the committee.

Other House Committee assignments for Stenholm include a return to the Small Business Committee. Members of this committee will caucus within the next week for sub-committee assignments.

GUAYMAS, Sonora, Mexico - (Written Friday, Jan. 23, while wondering what we're going to do about watching or hearing the Super Bowl football game.)

Like the mail man's oath indicates, we made it to this warm and friendly Mexico Pacific coast country despite rain and snow and assorted hazards. But it wasn't easy. In company with the Sutton Crofts and the Willis Parkers and in three travel trailers, we departed Cisco a week ago and by the time we got to Midland a norther was howling.

Roads were open and the forecast wasn't too bad, so we took off next morning. By the time we arrived at Pecos, the rain and snow had closed the highway for a 50-mile stretch to the west so we put in at a trailer park. And we stayed there two nights with temperatures as low as 25 degrees.

Leaving Pecos Monday, we slowly made our way west. We passed at least four big trucks overturned beside the highway. One had scattered a load of gallon cans of whole potatoes - two or three thousand cans. After 50 miles or so, there was bright sunshine and clear sailing. And we made it to Deming, New Mexico.

Spent the night in a nice trailer park owned by a young couple who moved there five years ago from Chicago and who said they wouldn't consider ever leaving New Mexico. From Deming, we went to Tucson where the Crofts visited her sister for the night. We stayed in a trailer park managed by a couple in their late 40's who formerly lived full-time in a travel trailer. The lady had been stricken with cancer and (probably as a last resort) was flying to Mexico City regularly for Laetrile treatments. She

looked healthy and said she believed she was improving. The trip south into Mexico had a two or three hour delay at Nogales, Ariz., while assorted papers and insurance matters were attended to. Insurance is somewhat of a ripoff for Mexico travel - about \$55 per week.

The trip to Tucson was on Inauguration Day so we listened to it all on the car radio. Also we "covered" the hostage release by car radio. Cisco's closest tie to the hostage thing, by the way, is very probably the fact that the late Mrs. A.J. Olsen's grand-son-in-law, (son-in-law of Bess Olsen Franklin) is administrator of the hostage receiving hospital at Wiesbaden, West Germany. This was reported to Miss Helen Crawford of Cisco in a Christmas letter from there.

Leaving Nogales, we made it to Hermosillo before dark and spent our first night in Mexico at the Kino Trailer Park, a real nice and clean place beside the highway where Mexico trucks made loud noises all night. Mexico trucks don't have the silencer equipment (mufflers) like USA trucks and they thunder down the road with noise you wouldn't believe.

At Gaymas (pronounced Ymas), we're at Las Playitas Trailer Park. At San Carlos, 10 miles southwest, there is quite an American colony of trailer folks and the parks there are full. There's quite a lot of fishing in the Gulf of California and the bays here. Shrimp is \$3 to \$5 per pound off the boats. Four fishermen can rent a fishing boat complete with bait, equipment and crew for \$20 each per day.

Prices of just about everything we've run into is about 50 per cent higher than in the USA. They have created a blend of gasoline (premium for the no-lead USA cars) for the snow birds and it costs you \$1.20 per gallon. The next grade (84 octane) is 48 cents per gallon. It clatters considerably in your car. If you drink beer, it is about \$12 per case and liquor is \$15 or so per quart. Eating out prices are about the same as in the states.

When we had a meeting of our group to plan the trip, Mr. Parker was absent at a school board meeting. So we elected him our wagon-master. And he has done a good job leading us.

This seemed like a pretty good time for a vacation with only the Inauguration and the Super Bowl to consider when we left. Dick Tracy was between cases, and Buz Sawyer wasn't in the middle of something. So if we can just see the Super Bowl this weekend, it will be pretty nearly complete.

Rotary Club Is Told To 'Plan Ahead For Taxes'

Saving on income taxes is primarily a matter of planning ahead, Bobby Smith, Cisco CPA, told the Cisco Rotary Club Thursday noon. It is usually too late to do anything but figure and pay the tax after the business

year is complete, he said. "The only way I know to keep from paying any income tax at all is not to make any money."

He explained that speaking to any group on ways to reduce the amount of taxes

is difficult because every individual is a different case. "There are no hard and fast rules." Even tax agents and auditors often disagree on specifics in any given case, he said; what one would say is allowable another would rule out.

The only practical way to cut income tax costs, he suggested, is to plan ahead and conduct ones business during the tax year so as to take advantage of as many allowable deductions as possible.

He mentioned such general areas of tax management opportunities as:

(a) Long term capital gains, where savings of as much as 60 per cent of the gains on the sale of capital assets are allowable on property held for a year or longer;

(b) Installment sales which spread the income from property transactions over more than one tax year;

(c) Accurate figuring of withholding taxes to avoid penalties for underpayment;

(d) Interest paying investments, such as bonds, some of which, notably state and municipal bonds, are tax exempt;

(e) Job credits and so forth.

It is wise, he emphasized, to keep all available credits in mind during the tax year and to manage ones income in a manner to take advantage of all possible savings when the time comes to file a return rather than wait until the end of the year to figure ways of reduction.
