

Field Appraisers For Taxable Property To Begin Work Monday

The field appraisers for McMorries & Company will begin the task of re-evaluating all of the taxable property within Eastland County on Monday, February 9.

The work will begin in the Rising Star area of the County with at least two crews working. One will be concentrating on the rural property while the other will be working on the city property. Jim McMorries, owner of the company, said that a third crew will probably start in either Cisco or Eastland on the city property. The work is expected to take several months before completion.

As stated in previous newspaper reports, the re-evaluation of the County property is being done to put the taxing districts of Eastland County in compliance with new State Tax Laws. These laws call for all property to be placed on the tax rolls of the jurisdictions at fair market value with 100% assessment ratios by the 1982 tax year. They also called for the creation of a new Central Appraisal office for each county within the State. In order for the County tax districts to meet these and other requirements for the deadline of 1982, it is necessary to carry out the re-appraisal at this time.

Every effort will be made to keep the citizens and property owners of the County advised as to how the re-

appraisal is proceeding and in what areas it is being worked on. Each property owner should be contacted by a representative of McMorries & Company during the next few months in order to help with the valuation of his or her property. Please ask for identification if it is not furnished to start with and if you as a property owner have any questions or problems concerning the valuation of your property, please contact your local tax assessor.

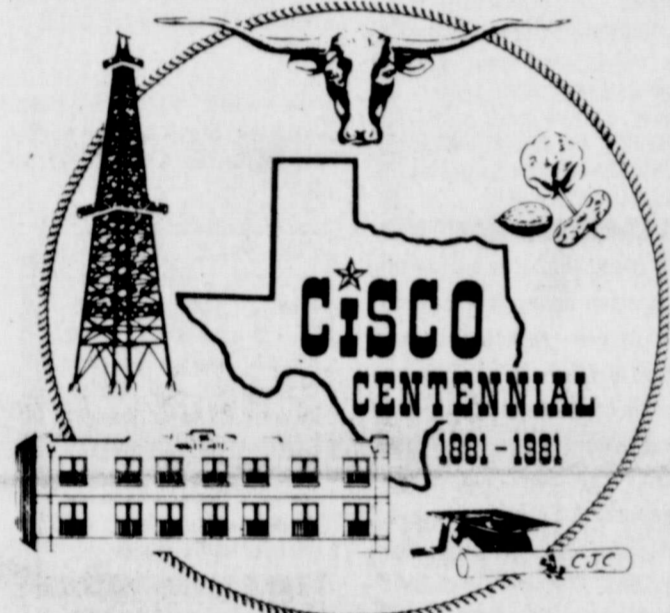
Faith Crusaders Meet In Home Of Peggy Roberts

One side has the Centennial logo like you see at the top of the article and the other side says "Cisco, Texas - Where a proud past meets a promising future!"

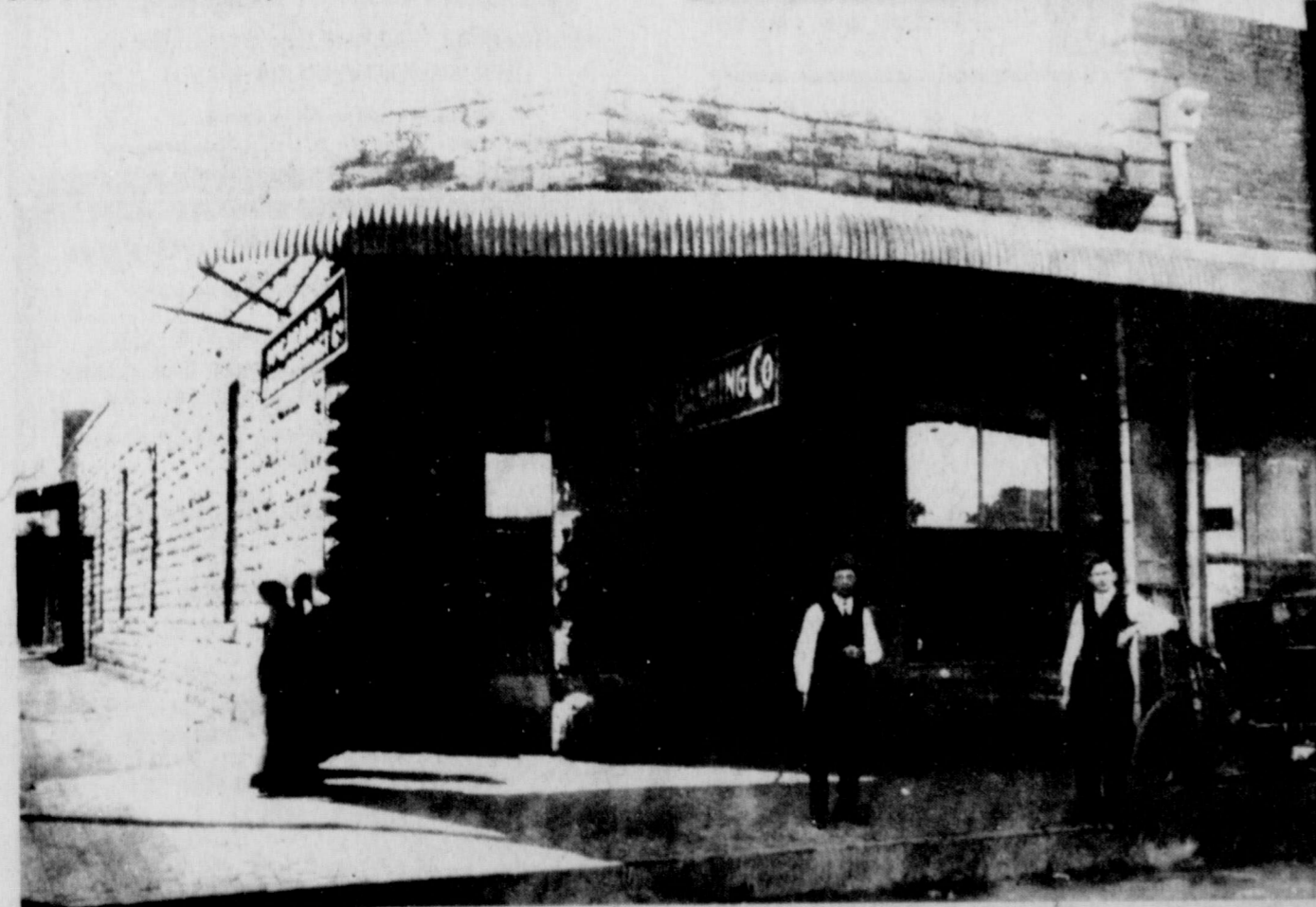

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IWU Reflections In Perspective

The early morning Middle East Airlines (MEA) flight from Dubai to Beirut was one I patronized quite frequently. It afforded a day in Beirut which could be used for shopping for the little bits and pieces of goodies which we could not find in the shops in Teheran, and I could still arrive on a flight to that city by late bedtime.

So, having completed my somewhat regular tour which began in Kuwait and ended in Dubai, I booked out on that flight with confirmed reservations on a late afternoon flight to Teheran. Sort of a routine procedure. The airline would provide a "day room" in Beirut and I would arrive at home somewhat rested from what was usually a hectic and tiring four- or five-day tour of Kuwait, Bahrain, Abu Dhabi and Dubai.

The scheduled departure was at 0700. The flight crew was at the terminal on time, as were the passengers. But the flight was delayed. We waited in the spacious departure lounge of Dubai International Airport. Tea was served, but there was no explanation for the delay.

I came across the Captain, with whom I'd flown before. "The Palestinians are lobbing mortar rounds onto Beirut airport, and I have no desire to share the cockpit with a live mortar shell!" He explained, smiling. "Don't say anything to the cash customers. We shall be taking off before long." And in another hour we did just that. Took off.

Just before passing over Damascus, twenty minutes out of Beirut, there was a noticeable cut in power. We slowed down, somewhat. And instead of making the usual portside turn we continued straight ahead across the mountain range which holds the Mediterranean out of the Arabian Peninsula. Power came back on with a surge, and the Captain announced via the intercom—"Beirut airport has been temporarily closed. Sorry for the delay, but we are diverting to Nicosia, Cyprus until it is opened. We apologise for the delay, which may be for only a few hours. We hope to clear up the matter and to have you on the ground in Beirut in time for you to make your onward connections. MEA ground personnel will meet you at Nicosia." And so; to emulate the Apostle Paul... we were washed out of the air onto the shores of the Isle of Cyprus.

We taxied into an assigned position; number nine of a line of intercontinental jet aircraft which had likewise been diverted. We were met by MEA ground personnel and were ushered into the transit lounge of the terminal to join the passengers of the other eight aircraft. And quite a gathering it was, indeed.

The restaurant and the two bars which served the lounge were doing business. And were well patronized. And I had been there for only a short while when I came across a British subject whom I'd known for several years in Abu Dhabi. He had dedicated himself to the project of drinking one of the bars dry and was enlisting assistance. Barney was good at that sort of thing. A thoroughly likeable Englishman, he was. I convinced him that while I was most pleased to see him again after at least two years' absence (his) from Abu Dhabi, I could contribute little to his project.

After some four or five hours a masterpiece of organization turned up. The milling passengers were called, by the number of their flight, flight by flight to report to the desk. We did, and were served lunch at around mid-afternoon. We were also informed that housing accommodation was being arranged, and that we would be kept informed. Hotel arrangements were being made in Nicosia and in the two other two major cities on the island.

Our flight was finally called, and we were placed aboard two rickety busses for Nicosia, to be deposited at the ground-level entrance of the "Hotel Alexandria". The hotel occupied the two floors above street level. Shops were on the ground floor. And don't think for a moment that our flight had the hotel to itself.

And where MEA got all their help remains a mystery to me. Cheerful, pleasant, unhurried; they appeared and worked their way through the mass of people, identifying their passengers. "We are so sorry, but we must spend the night here. There can be no private rooms. We trust that you can understand. Minimum: two people to the room. We shall keep you informed. Patronise the bar and the restaurant. We are picking up the tab."

Barney's flight came to that hotel, and he picked up where he had left off at the airport. He was not in the least obstreperous; just insistent. And he enlisted the support of a couple from Beirut who had been to India on their honeymoon. And an Italian geophysicist who was on his way from Argentina to Iran...his first trip to that country where he would join the Italian National Oil Company.

Turned out that the Italian and I were assigned to be roomies for the night. He spoke no English, and my Italian left a bit to be desired. But he spoke fluent Spanish. There was no problem of communication. He was a charming person. But I had a pressing desire to get home. Cyprus is a pleasant, lovely island but I was supposed to be home...and was sort of expected. I called the downtown office of MEA.

Since I was not terminating my flight in Beirut, perhaps there was indeed something they could arrange. They'd call me back. And they did. I was booked on Olympic Airways early on the following morning for a flight to Athens from whence I would be flown in the late afternoon by SABENA, the Belgian Airline to Teheran. All confirmed. Could I come to the office so that she could rearrange my ticket? I could and did.

Walking into that beehive of activity, I espied a lovely young Greek Lebanese lady whom I'd known at the transit desk in Beirut. With her husband and young son, she was trying to help work out the problems of the diverted flights. And it was to her desk that I was directed. "I wondered if it would be you. There are not all that many people with your name".

After an uneventful, quiet night in the Hotel Alexandria I met the early flight to Athens where the airline again put me up for the day. The Hotel Atheneos was on the beach, but I spent the most of the day sleeping. Arriving in Teheran on schedule; I went home to find that nobody knew anything at all of the "troubles" in Lebanon. I had a story to tell of my odyssey. Rather enjoyed the diversion, actually.

And some weeks later I ran into Barney Wise in Beirut, where he lived at the time. The airport had remained closed for five days. He had an enjoyable vacation on the Isle of Cyprus. With the honeymooning couple. And with the Italian geophysicist.

Flatulence Affects Many

COLLEGE STATION--Flatulence, or intestinal gas, plagues many people, old and young, says Cass Ryan-Crowe, a foods and nutrition specialist.

The increasing interest in adding fiber to the diet and the substitution of beans for meat has made it a major concern for more Americans.

Dr. Ryan-Crowe is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

The problem may not stem solely from the foods eaten but may result from swallowing air while eating, she explains.

Eating too fast, swallowing larger pieces of food, eating when under stress or talking with a mouthful of food will probably cause frequent belching.

Gum chewing, eating hard candy, smoking and drinking carbonated soft drinks are also causes for excess gas in the stomach.

If no belching occurs, the excess gas down the gastrointestinal tract and may pass as flatulence, the specialist continues.

The diet is another cause of flatulence. Certain foods are notorious for their ability to produce gas.

Beans cause gas because the bacteria in the intestines thrive on two nondigestible carbohydrates in the beans, and the bacteria actually produce the gas.

Diets that contain large amounts of fiber may also produce flatulence because of the increased amount of fermentable nondigestible carbohydrates in the colon.

Flatulence is an embarrassing problem. Eliminating certain foods

from the diet and changing eating habits can help, but for some individuals, there is no treatment, the specialist adds.

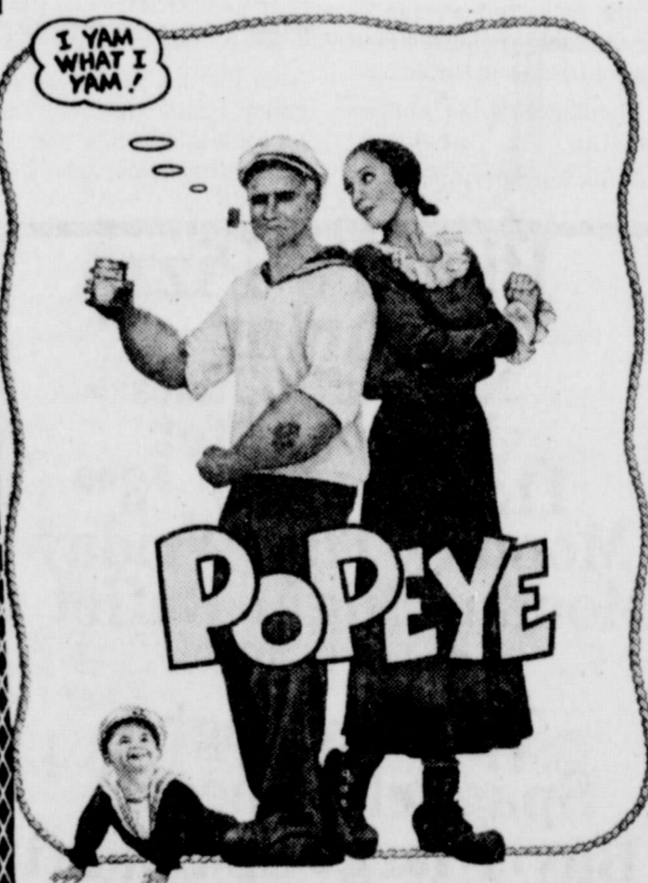

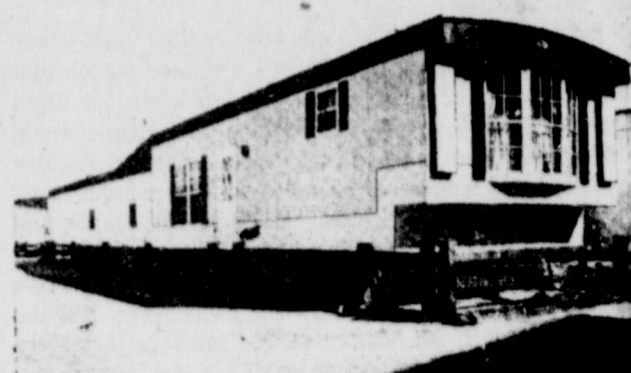

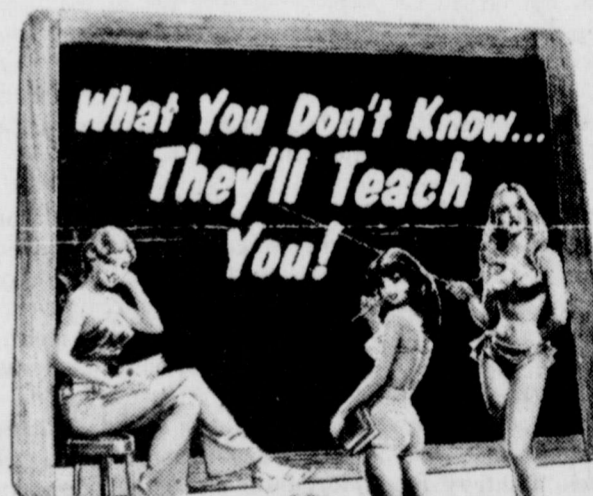

Stiffer Punishment For Injury To Children

AUSTIN (AP) - A Dallas police detective told a hushed legislative committee Tuesday of a couple's sexual abuse of their 11-year-old daughter and said he was shocked that they could receive no more than 20-year sentences.

Tom Sewell spoke to the House Criminal Jurisprudence Committee in favor of Gov. Bill Clements' measure to increase punishment for rape, sexual abuse and injury of children under 17.

The bill was sent to a subcommittee for further review, but with a Feb. 17 deadline to report back. Committee members voted 8-1 against a motion by Rep. Sam Hudson, D-Dallas, to send the bill to the House floor immediately.

Sewell said he had been a Dallas policeman for 26 years, the last four of them spent in the juvenile section.

"I didn't know people did this sort of thing to their children. The seven-, eight- and nine-year-olds that we

see misused in their homes to an extent you can't believe. We see so much oral sodomy to an extent it almost becomes commonplace," Sewell said.

He read the committee the signed confessions of a Dallas couple who are serving 20 year sentences for sexually abusing the woman's 11-year-old daughter.

The woman said the girl had been compelled to have intercourse with her stepfather and to perform homosexual acts with her.

"When my mother gets tired of having intercourse with my daddy, he makes me have intercourse with him," the girl's statement said.

"Twenty years! With ... early parole and time off for good behavior, this is not enough," Sewell said. "There are cases that deserve punishment. Under the present law, justice cannot be adequately served."

Clements' bill increases the maximum punishment for sexual abuse or rape of a child from 20 years to life and the minimum penalty from two years to five years. It also raises the maximum prison term for indecency with a child from 10 to 20 years and for injury to a child from 20 years to life in aggravated cases.

A KDFW-TV series on child abuse caught the governor's eye, and a videotape was shown to the committee. A man convicted of raping, kicking and torturing an eight-year-old girl was interviewed, and a psychiatrist said of him: 'In my view, he ultimately would have killed.'

The committee also sent to subcommittee three bills designed to make it easier for prosecutors to obtain aggravated rape convictions. Aggravated rape differs from ordinary rape in the violence used and in the punishment - a maximum of life instead of 20 years.

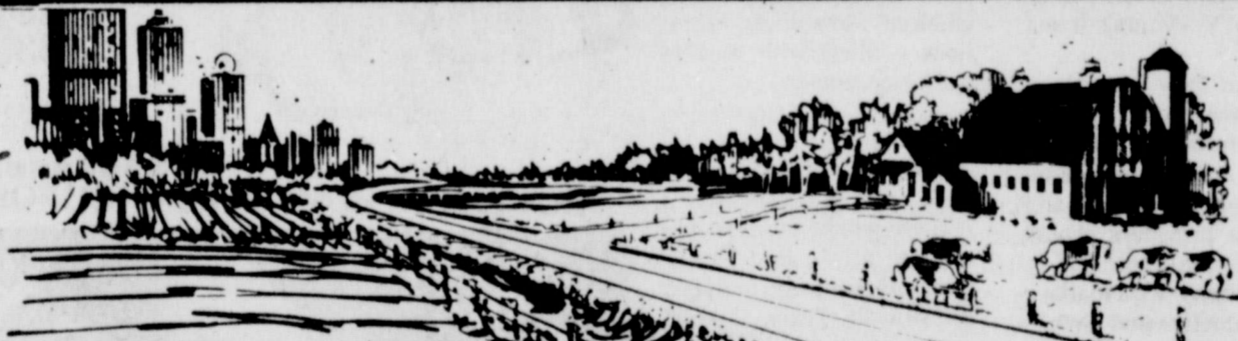

Reich, Shults to Attend Texas Farm Bureau Leadership Conference

Ernest Reich of Cisco, Eastland County Farm Bureau president, and Bob Shults of Rising Star, Legislative Committee Chairman of the same organization, attended the Texas Farm Bureau Leadership Conference held at the Austin-Hilton on January 26-28, 1981.

American Farm Bureau President Robert Delano and Texas Farm Bureau President Carrol Chaloupka led discussions exploring areas where County Farm Bureau presidents might better serve their respective counties.

Among the topics discussed in the Legislative Chairman sessions were the following: property taxes on agricultural land, financing of public education, redistricting to assure pro-

portionate rural representation in Congress, regulations regarding production and taxation of gasohol, and the right of farm workers to organize and bargain collectively without assistance of federal or state governments.

Speakers for the general sessions included Bill Clayton, Texas House Speaker; Robert Delano, American Farm Bureau Federation President; Grant Teaff, Baylor University Head Football Coach and Governor William Clements.

Joe Gosch, who resides with his wife Sue and three children at 305 West 4th Street, Cisco, is the Agent-Manager for the Eastland County Farm Bureau.

GUIDELINES

Early childhood is an important period in the formation of sexual attitudes, but most adults are not prepared for dealing with children's sexual feelings and behaviors, Cindy Wilson, a family life education specialist, says, in offering some help.

Between the ages of two and six, children become aware of physical differences between the sexes.

They express curiosity about reproduction and birth.

They develop childhood romances, and they engage in a variety of sex play.

Young children ask more sex-related questions than do children in any other age group, including adolescents, according to researchers.

Mrs. Wilson, on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, has compiled the following suggested guidelines for helping young children learn about sexuality in the natural course of their daily lives:

PHYSICAL DIFFERENCES

Use correct words for the physical parts of the children's bodies.

Slang or nicknames are generally inappropriate for genitalia.

Small children will have to learn the correct terms later, and they may be embarrassed when they use family words in the presence of their peers.

Provide natural opportunities for children to observe each other. Some natural places for children to learn about body differences include the bedroom while changing clothes and the bathroom.

Use resources when discussing body differences. Many books are available for use with children of different ages, and there are now anatomically correct dolls and puzzles on the market.

REPRODUCTION AND BIRTH

Children often display curiosity about reproduction, especially children who are about to experience a birth in their own family.

When a child asks questions about reproduction or birth, begin answering by finding out how much the child knows first.

Start with questions as "Well, where do YOU think babies come from?" or "How do YOU think it got there?"

Children may have been given incorrect or inaccurate information by other children or even by adults. So parents, teacher, and child-care providers should be aware of and be able to provide simple explanations for reproduction and birth.

Give accurate information about reproduction.

Babies do not grow in tummies, do not sprout from seeds, do not arrive by stork or grow in a cabbage patch!

Parents and other adults involved with children should realize that they may have to answer children's questions about this subject again and again.

Simple and accurate explanations are important because the processes of reproduction and birth are not easily understood the first time around.

Use books to explain reproduction and birth. Avoid using plants and animals as substitutes for discussing human reproduction. Remember, young children are greatly interested in reproduction and are intrigued by all new babies.

MASTURBATION

Masturbation is now widely accepted as natural and healthy for both children and adults according to researchers.

Although some adults may feel uncomfortable about this, they will handle situations most effectively if they adopt a relaxed approach to masturbation.

Ignore masturbation in most situations.

Avoid negative responses such as scolding or punishing children for engaging in masturbation.

Frowning or pulling the child's hands away from the genitals may communicate that these organs are bad or dirty.

Negative responses, criticisms or threats can cause children to develop unhealthy feelings which can continue throughout life.

Stress that there is a better time and place for masturbation. Parents or teachers may want to quietly, but firmly, explain to children that it is best to participate in this activity when children are by themselves.

Compulsive masturbation may be a response to family stress.

This activity done to excess may suggest that the child needs more time and attention from others.

Parents, child-care providers, and teachers can work together to help the child overcome anxiety and find other means of satisfaction.

NEXT: Sex play, obscene words and adults' responsibilities in helping young children view these situations - along with reading list for parents.

People n Things 'Landmarks Of The Past Are Still Here'

HOME AFTER a couple of weeks or so in Mexico are the Sutton Crofts and the Willis Parkers. It was a trip via travel trailers and it covered some 2500 miles, counting driving their pickups while their trailers remained secure in parks.

A highlight, perhaps, was visiting La Paz, a community of some 80,000 people that is the capital of Baja California Sur and located on a beautiful, placid bay on the Gulf of Lower California.

GETTING TO La Paz took some doing, the Ciscoans report. Their trailers were parked in Guaymas when they decided that they should see the southern tip of the Lower California country. So they drove to Los Mochis and spent the night in a hotel.

Next morning, they drove 25 miles to Topolobampo (which Parker has trouble pronouncing) and went aboard a large ferry. Mexico has four of these modern diesel powered ferries sailing the Gulf of California (sometimes called the Sea of Cortez). For 100 pesos each, the Ciscoans rode all day in peaceful fashion, landing at La Paz as the sun went behind the horizon.

The ferries, by the way, carry trucks and cars in their lower deck. Big 18-wheelers (heavily loaded) backed on the ferry, hauling everything from live pigs to bottled drinks, fresh fruits and vegetables, lumber and petroleum products. La Paz must import virtually

everything they use and need to eat and drink. You can take your car for about \$30 and your car and trailer for \$100 or so.

A taxi ride into town cost 200 pesos, and the Ciscoans stayed at a beach hotel. La Paz was colonized some 400 years ago and a dozen times or so the hurricanes wiped the area clean. In the 1700s, Jesuit priests founded a mission and by 1850 some 400 people lived there. In 1853, an American soldier of fortune named William Walker captured La Paz and declared himself President of the Republic of La Paz. A few months later, they ran him away.

La Paz is now "on the boom", thanks to the American tourist. There are a dozen nice hotels and motels and three trailer parks. La Paz is the southern terminus of the 19-foot paved highway from San Diego south over 1,000 miles. Ferries carry folks in from Guaymas, Topolobampo, Mazatlan and Puerto Vallarta.

They tell you that prices are more reasonable in La Paz and folks (Mexicans) cross to buy television sets and assorted things to resell on the Mexican mainland.

Parker heard about one American tourist who bought a beautiful big shiny black pearl from an itinerant peddler. It turned out to be a pure steel ball bearing.

The Ciscoans confided their purchases to souvenirs and learned that you can get a substantial discount when you offer half the asking price.

The ferry ride back to Topolobampo was a night run so the Ciscoans elected to spend a few dollars more and sleep in double-decker cabins. Waiting was a big hassle, they report. At La Paz, they waited three or four hours before passengers were loaded. A cafeteria on the ferry served tasty meals - a chicken baked in sauce or a stew with rice and refried beans. (Crofts wondered what fried beans tasted like before they were refried.)

THE TRIP home from Mexico took one day to get from Guaymas to Nogales, Ariz., just across the border. Crofts used the premium (\$1.20 gallon) gas in his Chevy pickup because it "pinged" too loud with the 48 cent regular Mexican gas.

Parker's Ford pickup seemed to like the 48 cent variety and he topped off his two tanks before crossing the border.

Parker, who is a peanut farmer, and Crofts, a retired rancher, enjoyed looking over the farming and livestock raising operations in Mexico. Wherever there was irrigation water, crops were lush. And you saw none in areas where water wasn't plentiful. It doesn't appear to rain much in the Mexico Pacific coastal country.

Vallie Parker and Mary Crofts enjoyed visiting numerous souvenir shops and admiring Mexican arts and crafts. And they bought some. Vallie is a rock hound and she enjoyed one afternoon looking at the rocks in the San Carlos bay area where the movie Catch-22 was filmed. And she found a few keepers.

(This sketch is the first in a series of articles which will explore highpoints in the rich history of Cisco. The series is inspired by the celebration of Cisco's Centennial, and each sketch will attempt to be something more than just a combination of historical facts. In attempts to bring to life the spirit and drama which have accompanied the changes in our community, I will use certain fictional characters and multiple points of view at times. The events explored have been chosen somewhat arbitrarily, but they will be treated in chronological order.)

CISCO-THE BEGINNING

A man on horse back reaches the top of a gently sloping hill, and stops to look down on a small clearing below. He sees what appears to be a general store, two

saloons, and a white, wooden building which somehow seems apart from the other structures. It is mid-morning and the houses cast long shadows on the red clay, leaves and stubbles of grass of the little town.

In the school yard surrounding the white building, the rider sees a boy of eleven or twelve with dark woolen pants cuffed at the knees. He also wears a white linen shirt, casually tucked into his pants hanging by oversized suspenders.

Looking down from the hill, the rider sees the town as ill-defined and precipitous against the wildwood landscape and thinks it crude and primitive compared to the Fort Worth fresh in his memory.

The boy playing with his dog in the school yard looks out across the horizon and sees the rider silhouetted against the brilliant sky. The rider's clothes are dark and

his hat is of a light color. The foreground between the boy and rider is all rocks and trees and brush. Looking at the countryside the boy thinks it wild and limitless.

Suddenly his attention is diverted by the sound of fast, well-metered footsteps climbing the school house steps behind him. He turns and sees his high-button-shoed, self-determined sister, soon to graduate from the country school and eyeing the store keeper's son. She wears a red sash bonnet and patterned cotton dress.

"Girls!" the boy thinks with a look of disgust, and he throws a stick across the school yard. His dog chases after the stick with simple urgency. From the top of the livery stable the widow's calico cat gazes down at the boy and dog with disdain. She does a quick back step to avoid being seen, obviously reflecting on some past unpleasant experience with the pair.

The sights, sounds, and smells of the town offer a thousand hooks for the boy's senses. The smell of a fresh baked pie cooling on a window sill. The clamped sound of a rug being beat forms a counterpoint with the clang clang of hammer against anvil. And, of course, the rustle of the intermittent but ever present breeze.

The rider cannot foresee the growth and change that will be a hallmark of the little town. He continues to ride west. Sparrows sing along his trek.

In the mind of the rider, the little town has registered no special significance. To the boy, the town is his reactive universe, independent of size and distant surroundings. Dark clouds move slowly across the West Texas sky. The boy loads wood on a wagon. The rider is out of sight. The date is a day in 1880. The place, Red Gap, Texas.

On May 17, 1881, the Texas Central Railway begins the sale of town lots. Colonel W.B. Abrams, the land commissioner of the Texas and Pacific Railroad renames Red Gap "Cisco" after John
