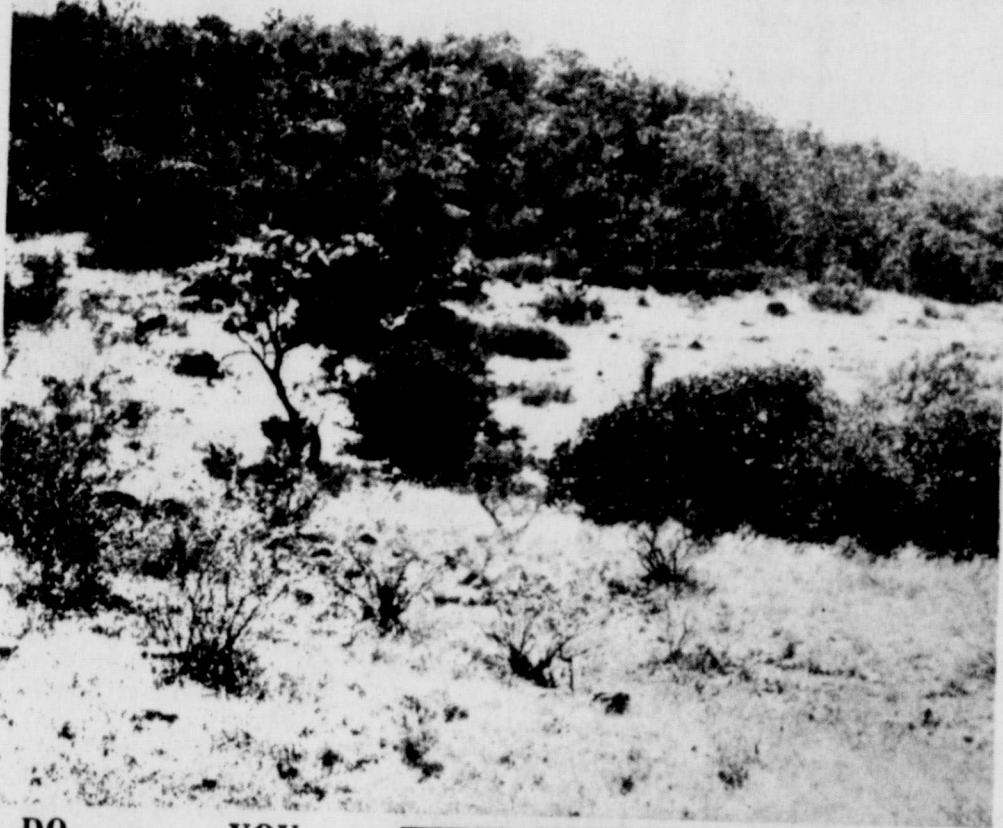

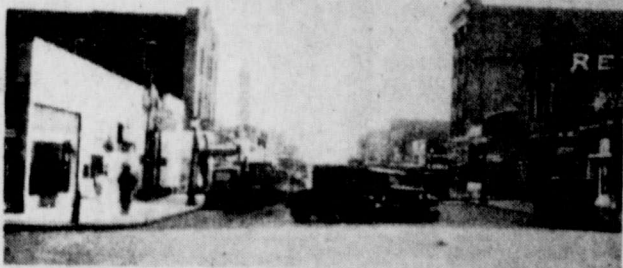
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Where Were These Taken?

County Re-Appraisal Is Underway

The re-appraisal of Eastland County began in earnest Monday, February 9. The work is being done in order of the various tax districts of the County to be in compliance with new Tax Laws passed by the 1979 Legislature. These laws require among other things that each County within the State set up a County-wide Central Appraisal Office which is capable of having 100% market values on all property by the 1982 tax year. In order to have these fair market values by the 1982 deadline, it is necessary to have the re-appraisal as quickly as possible.

Four appraisers are presently at work within the County with the possibility of several more being added before the valuation of the County is completed. The men are employees of McMorries and Company of Hereford, Texas which is a professional appraisal firm that has been in business for

over 20 years. The men on the job at this time are J.W. (Jake) Williams, Bob Hamman, David Cooper, and Bill Penny.

Although the entire County must be covered, the appraisers will be working in the Rising Star area at first. The men will be working by maps of both cities and rural areas. Due to the time involved and the cost factor of making return trips, the rural crews will measure and chart the property as they come to it on their maps. In some cases, this may require that land that is split between two districts or close to the main district they are working on, also be measured at the same time. The men will first check to see if the property owner is at home; and in all cases give them their identification. In the cases, the owner is not home the appraisers will need to go ahead and measure the property improvements while they are

there.

Every effort will be made to keep the property owners informed as to which area of the County is being worked and if a property owner has any question concerning the appraisal he is urged to contact his local school tax office for information.

CJC To Offer Ten Different Community Service Courses Here

Cisco Junior College will offer ten different Community Service Courses to people in the general area of Cisco during the current spring semester. Community service courses are open to everyone, have no admission requirements, and are usually taken by people interested in the subject for the pleasure of learning about it or how to do it. The courses are designed primarily for adults, but some are open to children. Each course will carry a small tuition fee to cover the basic costs of offering it.

Beginning the week of February 23, 1981, the Monday afternoon and evening classes are as follows:

POWDER PUFF MECHANICS--Automotive mechanics for females, 2:00 p.m.; **CROSS-STITCH DESIGN**--a needle art form worked from graphs on evenweave fabrics, 7:00 p.m.; **BEGINNING GUITAR**--basic skills of guitar rhythms, chords, and music reading, 7:00 p.m.

Tuesday afternoon and evening offerings are **ART FOR CHILDREN**--beginning and intermediate art for children ages 5-14, 4:00 p.m.; **SMALL ENGINE REPAIR**--

basic repair of small engines, 7:00 p.m.; **FEATURE WRITING**--study of newspaper and magazine feature material, with emphasis on identifying subjects, research, interviewing and writing, 7:00 p.m.

Tuesday and Thursday evenings at 7:00 the **WOMEN'S EXERCISE** classes will be held in Vocational-Technical Building #2. The course is a physical fitness program in which choreographed routines are performed to music and is a fun form of exercise.

Wednesday evening's class will be **BRIDGE**--the fundamentals of bridge at 7:00. **GARDENING** classes will be on Thursday evenings at 7:00. This course will involve the when, where, and why of home vegetable gardens.

Friday evening's offering is **MOTORCYCLE MECHANICS**--basic repair and instruction in mechanics of your motorcycle, 7:00 p.m.

Interested persons may pre-register through the CJC Registrar's office, or at the time of the first class meeting. Early registration

is advised because some of the courses have a class size limit. Tuition costs range from \$15 to \$30 with some classes requiring the students to furnish their own supplies.

For more information call the Registrar's Office or Clois Purvis at Cisco Junior College at 817-442-2567. If there is a course that anyone would like to have offered, bring this to the attention of Mr. Purvis; it may be that the class can be offered in the near future.

IWU Reflections In Perspective

We generally think of a carpenter as one who builds houses. Of course, a skilled carpenter may also do remodeling, replace a roof, or even engage in a trace of cabinet-making. And he may be engaged by general contractors who may have a lot of concrete to pour...forms must be built and set, you know.

In planning and setting up an outpost or isolated project, regardless of its nature, one of the most important individuals (but never let him know it) on the payroll is the carpenter. And our project on Das Island was certainly isolated. And we had concrete to pour the forms for which required a very highly skilled carpenter.

Now we had a recruiting system on that project which was unique in my limited experience. The client recruited all the labour, other than the especially skilled specialists and the supervisors which we brought in from the U.S. There was a very rigidly fixed wage scale; any deviation from that scale must have the approval of the client. He paid the wages on the basis of our time sheets and was reimbursed the labour cost. There was to be no runaway inflation caused by contractors competing for labourers, the local supply of which was quite limited.

Our carpenter was one Hossein, bin Mahmoud, a Baluchi from Oman. Hossein was a sort of shy, mild-mannered man and like most Baluchis was somewhat slight in stature. While the Baluchi originate in that area which comprise southern Iran, northwestern Pakistan and the southern tip of Afghanistan known generally as "Baluchistan", many of them have emigrated to some of the Arab states. Hossein was just such a Baluchi. And I've never seen a more skilled carpenter in the general field of small carpentry and cabinet-making.

He showed up on the regular air charter along with many other recruits, complete with smile, total respect for "Sahibs"...and his kit of tools which were carried in a wooden chest (small) with a rope handle. The tools consisted of two saws, the teeth of which are so filled that the saw cuts on the pull rather than on the thrust, as we know sawing and a variety of other tools which appeared to us to be somewhat crude. Hand-made chisels, some hammers which appeared to have been left when Noah finished his ark, and a block plane which was quite obviously hand-made.

Knowing somewhat the nature of his duties and the scope of the work which would be required of him; on my very next flight to Bahrain I purchased a kit of tools for Hossein. Saws, squares, chisels, hammers, two planes complete with router blades...the lot. You'd have thought he had been given the keys to the chest containing the Crown Jewels of Austria. Needless to say when he was asked to make a built-in desk and bookshelf for my quarters he selected the choice plywood from the packing cases in which much of our materials were packed, and did simply a more than expert job of it...with considerable dispatch. Smiling all the while, he grasped my right hand and kissed it, then touched it with his forehead when I complimented him on the finished job.

Hossein made a plywood chest for his new tools and asked the warehouseman for a padlock for it. There was a fitted place for each tool in the chest, and the end of each working day found every tool cleaned, oiled and placed in its appointed place.

Came the end of the job, and the tools' having been classified as "expendable" Hossein was told that they belonged to him. Again; expressions of deepest gratitude for such unheeded generosity. But he had done a commendable job. It was felt that the gift of the tools represented a minimum bonus for his services. Then came the day of his departure.

Now the Oil Company, although we were on a tiny sand spit of an island, had suffered quite a bit of pilferage of small tools. As a consequence, labourers departing on leave or at the end of a project or termination for any other reason had their baggage searched by the local gendarmes, a contingent of six of which we had on the island. They opened Hossein's tool chest, and immediately charged him with attempted theft.

He finally prevailed upon them to take him to see "Bill Sahib", who would confirm that the tools were indeed his very own and not stolen. Tears were streaming down his cheeks as he explained to me the reason for his being accompanied by the police. To save face for the police I went with them to the landing strip, had Hossein lay all his tools out on the sand, identified each one and assured the police that they had all been given to Hossein. The police were congratulated for having done their job, and somewhere today there is one carpenter, Hossein bin Mahmoud perhaps plying his trade back in his home in the Oman...with a most impressive kit of tools which were a gift from "Bill Sahib, the American".

jungle. Shantung and linen surfaces everywhere add texture.

Colors that will be featured for spring and summer fashions are quiet and soft. Pastels will be seen everywhere such as ice-blue, baby pink, soft citrus yellow, coral, and pistachio. Exotic earth tones will surface in copper, dark brown, ruby ox-blood, batik blue and a blue forest green. Tropical colors like hot orange, yellow and bright green will also be seen. The naturals will consist of burlap, almond, worry, straw and oyster gray. Khaki is in whether in British tan or American army green. The traditional navy and white will return.

OSCAR WEEKS'

You can't miss Oscar Weeks' Barbeque Place in Cisco - it's located on Highway 183, leading toward Breckenridge.

Although the rustic building actually fronts on a side street, its orange-mauve, green roofed exterior catches the eye from several directions. And something else grabs the senses - the wonderful, homey smell of beef, grilling over a real wood fire. The smoke rising from several chimneys indicate there is more than one wood stove in this restaurant. The main dining room, as well as other parts, is warmed by an old-fashioned cast iron heater.

On every day except Sunday and Monday, from 11:00 a.m. to six p.m. there are cars parked around the modest entrance, for almost everyone in Cisco drops by Oscar's sooner or later.

Local business people, students, ranchers, and travelers mingle with the crews from drilling rigs. They are all after Oscar's lean, pit grilled brisket, his special secret sauce, some of the best potato salad around, or maybe a barbeque plate with beans, slaw and the trimmings. Other items on the menu are barbequed chicken, pork ribs, or links. Customers are also treated to the easy welcome of Oscar and his wife, Betty, who are sometimes assisted by one of their three children.

As the people eat and visit and pay their moderate charges they are hardly aware of the years experience and training behind the man who serves them at the counter.

The story of Oscar Weeks really began over in Slaton, Tex., where he was born in 1933, during the depression. Trouble hit early for the little black boy - his Mother died when he was four years old, and his Father a year later. There were six of the orphaned Weeks children, and they came to Cisco to make their home with an Aunt and Uncle, Melissa and

Henry Harrison. "The Harrisons raised about three other children besides us," Oscar recalls. "One of their own, and two more. Cisco folks probably remember the Barbeque Stand they ran, over here on the north side of town."

The Harrisons were the first people to teach Oscar how to make barbeque. He helped in their Stand, and later he worked as a dishwasher and Fry Cook in the Savoy Restaurant in Cisco. He began to learn valuable lessons on how to associate with people from all walks of life.

The Harrisons and their foster children attended a little Baptist Church near their home, and Oscar became a member.

"I really thought a lot of that little Church," he says. "I was sorry it finally disbanded - and was torn down - while I was away in the Air Force. I still miss it."

Just before World War II one of Oscar's older brothers, Billy Bruce Weeks, enlisted in the Navy. He was stationed at Pearl Harbor, and killed during the Japanese attack of Dec. 7, 1941.

Oscar's attempts at getting an education ran into difficulty. He finished the Black Grade School in Cisco, but the only High School in town was segregated, and he could not attend. The only Eastland County High School provided for black children was in Eastland, with no school bus to bring them in.

"You got there the best way you could," Oscar notes.

Finally Oscar didn't "get there", and dropped out. He joined the Air Force in 1951, and was stationed at Lackland Air Force Base, San Antonio, for five years. This marked the beginning of travels which would take him almost around the world, with many unusual experiences.

Oscar's enlistment was during the Korean War, and



he had a brother in Korea. The ruling that more than one brother could not be sent into actual combat at one time probably saved Oscar from some bad situations. When he showed aptitude for cooking he was sent through a training school, and worked as cook in the Hospital and Dining Hall. He received the rank of sergeant while serving there in San Antonio.

In 1956 Oscar was sent to Germany, where he cooked for 18 months in a Mess Hall for American troops. When he had time off he toured the country, visiting historic places. "Germany is a beautiful country," he remarks. "Cold - but really interesting. We were well treated there."

Then it was back to the United States, where Oscar cooked at Parks Air Force Base, near Oakland, Calif. Afterward he was moved to Ellington Field, Houston, where he worked as an In-flight Cook - made sandwiches and short orders. In 1960 he was transferred to an Air Force Base at Detroit, Michigan, where he cooked for three years.

Oscar's first experience with the Japanese culture came when he was sent to a station at Tachikali, Japan. But then his situation changed abruptly. For the war in Viet Nam was escalating, and Oscar was sent to Thailand for special instruction in Field Range Cooking. He describes this as done in a mobile kitchen, consisting of a large stove sitting on the back of a truck.

But fortunately Oscar didn't have to use this training in Viet Nam. Instead he was assigned to a Chef's School at a hotel operated by the Japanese in Tokyo, Japan. The gourmet food, he reports, was "fantastic," and he developed a taste and appreciation for Japanese cooking. "When properly done - when you can get the right ingredients - this is the world's finest food," he states. "It was really elaborate. And I learned some unusual decorative things, like ice carving."

Upon graduation Oscar was sent to Honolulu, Hawaii, where he was placed on the private Staff of Lt. General Jacob E. Smart. The General entertained many well-known figures at his dinner parties, including Military leaders, a Catholic Cardinal, Bob Cummings, and John Wayne. Oscar served John Wayne his favorite food - barbequed steak - and had opportunities to meet and talk with him personally. "John Wayne was a tall man - taller than I, and I'm six ft. one - very nice and friendly. And he really liked my steak!"

"My time there on the Island was the most pleasant of any of my assignments." General Smart was sent to Parish on Hawaii, where he became Air Force Deputy Commander in Chief of Europe. And Oscar was transferred right along with him, into a new world of cooking. He studied in Paris, learning the French way with food.

"They use a lot of cheese, wines, and pastry. There I learned some really elegant desserts, and how to serve very formal dinners with around seven courses. We would have 150 to 200 people at some of these dinners." General Smart became a

Four-Star General in Paris, then in 1966 he was reassigned to a Base at Dover, Delaware. There he retired, and his assignment was taken by Brig. General John B. Wallace. Oscar cooked in the home of Gen. Wallace, and assisted at parties at the Officer's Club. He served a number of Government and Military figures at these affairs.

Although he kept in practice on gourmet cooking, Oscar found that many people liked his good West Texas food - including barbeque. Once he prepared some for a party which included the President's daughter Lynda Johnson. After this event he was invited to work in the White House as a Chef, but he declined. He was beginning to think of a little more freedom someday - and a chance to work for himself.

After General Wallace retired, Oscar cooked in the same house for Brig. General Fred Vetter. Then another assignment followed - Scott Air Force Base, in Ill., to work for Gen. James C. Sherrill, Deputy Commander in Chief. There he cooked on Aircrafts in flight - the C-5 A's. And there he decided on his own retirement, which came in Nov., 1971, with the rank of T/Sgt.

Oscar stayed in Delaware three years after that, working in large food services at Dover Downs and the State Dept. of Corrections. While at Dover Downs he became acquainted with A.J. Foyt, Mario Andretti, and Bobby Allison and his brother. He cooked for them, and took time off to watch them race on the tracks.

Oscar sums up his reasons for returning to Cisco in one sentence: "It was home to me." Also, he was married to a Cisco girl - whose maiden name had been Betty Merrill. And he had enjoyed coming back and forth during his Air Force days.

So he came back in 1974, and his first ideas was to get out of the restaurant business - to try something different. He enrolled in a C.J.C. in an Auto Mechanics Course under O.K. Jackson and

Danny Claborn, then a welding Course under Gerald Bint and Bob White. In 1976 he opened a Service Station out on East 8th Street, but he found that customers were always asking where they could get something good to eat. So he began to keep a little barbeque, just on the side, and the first thing he knew, he had no time to grease cars!

One thing led to another, and he opened a little room with one table, where he is now, and called it Oscar's Barbeque Shack. And the rest is history - with expansion and building more space.

Now, in addition to the Cisco restaurant, Oscar is catering Civic affairs, Clubs, parties, doing custom cooking of such things as turkeys and beef for other people, and carrying barbeque sandwiches to a number of locations.

In Putnam his sandwiches are at the Hitching Post and Party Port. In Cisco they are at C.J.C., Ted's One Stop, La Cantina, Taylor Center, Russell Newman, and the Donut Shop. In Eastland the sandwiches are carried at Hillcrest Gro., Taylor Center, and the Gulf Station. Margaret's Gro. carries them in Ranger, and the Morton Valley Gro. north of Eastland. Oscar reports he will soon have new labels on these sandwiches, listing ingredients.

But it takes more than labels to make good barbeque. Slow cooking, says Oscar, is a must, over a wood fire. And he uses a mixture of mesquite and oak for this.

Oscar and his family live comfortably on his acreage on the north side of Cisco. He is a member of the Chamber of Commerce, a member of the Masonic Lodge - Crawford Lodge No. 918 - and a Lifetime Member of the Air Force Sergeants Association. And sometimes phone calls come, from that other world of the Air Force. And some General will be on the phone, just wondering how Oscar is getting along. A lot of memories come back, but Oscar doesn't men-

tion them much. And few people know of his experiences. Recently he was asked: "Oscar, why haven't you told people around here where you have been, where you have studied cooking, what you have done?" And this was his reply: "But no body ever asked me."

Tree Squirrels In Your Attic?

Tree squirrels are very interesting animals but when encountered by urban dwellers, they may be a pest. They cause problems by chewing insulation on electric wires, staining ceiling tiles with urine, by depositing feces in attics, by breaking the weather seal of a house, and by the introduction of combustible materials. The noise they make as they scamper about is distracting. They can enter houses by many routes such as openings for utility wires, boxed eaves or corners, chimneys, vents, louvers, cellar windows, knotholes—practically any avenue through which they can squeeze or gnaw their way.

Normally, the presence of squirrels in an attic can be detected by hearing running or gnawing sounds in the attic or walls during day. Running, squealing, and gnawing sounds at night generally indicate that rats are present.

Squirrel bites should be treated as potentially dangerous wounds. Infection may occur because squirrels may carry certain types of disease. There is very little information that would indicate that tree squirrels, though more aesthetic than rats, are less capable of carrying disease organisms. They also carry several types of parasites which may attack or annoy man. In short, many of the same problems that are associated with other rodents in human dwellings are also common to tree squirrels.

There are four different groups of squirrels in Texas—gray, fox, rock, and flying squirrels:

GRAY (cat) SQUIRRELS are the most common in urban or heavily wooded areas in East Texas. They have gray fur, whitish bellies and gray bushy tails fringed with white-tipped hairs.

FOX SQUIRRELS are the most common in the rest of Texas. Their fur is a rusty grayish-yellow with pale yellow-orange belly and bushy tails fringed with reddish hairs.

ROCK SQUIRRELS have black heads and shoulders with the fur fading to a mottled-gray on the rump. This a western species and is not related to the other species.

FLYING SQUIRRELS, being nocturnal, are rarely seen, and prefer heavily wooded areas in East Texas. The layer of loose skin along

the sides of the body permits flying squirrels to glide for great distances. They do not fly in the common sense of the word.

CONTROL OF SQUIRRELS

Control recommendations are given for tree squirrels as a group, but characteristics of the different species you are dealing with should be considered. Game laws generally protect squirrels, but most game departments have recognized the need for their control under certain conditions. In no cases should game laws be disregarded just because they may be inconvenient. Nearly all states have some regulations or restrictions regarding the use of live traps, shooting, steel traps, and the application of toxicants. IN TEXAS: PRIOR TO CONDUCTING ANY CONTROL PROCEDURE ON A GAME SPECIES* CONTACT YOUR LOCAL OFFICE OF TEXAS PARKS AND WILDLIFE DEPARTMENT.

BUILDING THEM OUT

Building squirrels out of structures is a permanent solution to the problem, does not harm the squirrels, and presents no legal difficulties. A thorough search for squirrels on the premises should be made before any reconstruction or repairs are made. Squirrels learn their surroundings well and will seek another way into a structure if an existing opening is closed. Squirrels having a nest inside a house will gnaw holes to get back inside if the old openings are closed.

Vulnerable areas which squirrels are not yet using should be protected with materials such as one-half inch hardware cloth, 26 gauge sheet metal, or other materials of similar hardness. Squirrels can gnaw through wood, plastic, and other "soft" materials. If wood is used for repairs, gnawing can usually be discouraged by applying a commercial repellent if available. Such repellents are not permanent and may discolor the area treated.

Entrance and exit holes being used by the squirrels should not be covered before the squirrels are driven from the structure. If squirrels are re-entering through these openings before they are covered, simple "one-way doors" can be made with hardware cloth or sheet metal. The "doors" should be installed so that the squirrels can leave the structure but cannot re-enter the opening.

Squirrels may jump onto roof tops from nearby trees. To remedy this situation, tree limbs, within ten feet of the structure should be pruned. Metal bands, two feet wide, fastened around tree trunks six to eight feet from the ground will prevent squirrels from climbing isolated trees, but are ineffective if squirrels can jump from tree to tree. Squirrels also use utility wires reach a structure, and they can climb drain pipes, shingles, and even brick and mortar walls.

An effective method of squirrel-proofing utility wires is to install a three foot length of hard plastic tubing over the wires. The tube will roll when squirrels contact it, causing the squirrel to fall off the wire.

Commercial sores of repellents and odor suppressants should be consulted to determine product availability. Always read the label prior to use. Follow label directions.

TRAPPING

Live traps of several kinds can be used to remove squirrels from attics or houses. These traps are designed with openings approximately seven inches by seven inches and are nineteen to thirty inches long. Traps can be placed in attics, on roofs, or secured to limbs. Fruit, peanut butter, shelled pecans, or other types of nuts and seeds can be used as an effective bait in the trap. Traps should be checked frequently and the animals relocated as soon as possible after capture. It is recommended that squirrels be taken at least five miles away from where they were caught to prevent them from returning.

SHOOTING

In urban areas it is not advisable to shoot squirrels because of the danger to other people or animals. Also, most cities have ordinances against firing a gun within the city limits. In rural areas, where it is possible to do so, you can most easily eliminate one or two squirrels which are creating problems in and around your home by shooting them. The preferred tool is a .410 gauge shotgun, although some may prefer to use rifles. BB caps and pellet guns are also used, however, they do not always kill large squirrels. Before shooting squirrels, make sure that it is done in accordance with the game laws, as squirrels are protected year round in some counties.

Beef Cattle Short Course

Brush control and range management will be the topics at the first session of a beef cattle short course, Monday night, February 16 at the Cisco Junior College Agricultural building.

Dr. Bob J. Ragsdale, Extension Range Management Specialist from Texas A&M University will teach the Monday night session which begins at 7:30 p.m. announces County Extension Agent, DeMarquis Gordon. The short course is being sponsored by the Extension Service in cooperation with the Cisco Junior College

Agriculture Department.

Dr. Ragsdale will discuss the latest information on chemicals available for brush control and other methods of brush control. Grazing systems for good range management will also be discussed.

A second session of the short course will be held Monday night February 23. Dr. James Armstrong will discuss the Brucellosis program on that night.

All cattlemen and others interested are encouraged to attend the short course. There will be no attendance fee charged.

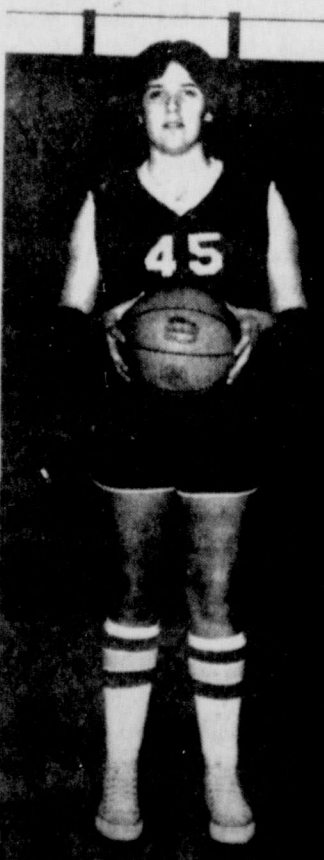

CJC Board Briefed On Plans For Grid Clinic

Plans for the first annual Cisco Junior College Football Clinic to be held as a one-day affair on Saturday, February 28, were outlined for members of the board of regents of CJC at their regular monthly meeting last Monday night.

Dr. Norman Wallace, CJC president, said the clinic will be a workshop affair with lecture sessions under the direction of Gordon Woods, Brownwood coach; Ted Sitton, Abilene Christian University; Don Harrison, ACU; Jerry Taylor, Stamford; and others.

Bill Anderson, CJC coach, will serve as the coordinator for the clinic as well as assist with the program. The clinic

will cover various phases of football techniques — offense, defense, public relations and so forth.

Invitations have gone out to schools throughout this region for their coaches to attend. The cost to the coaches will be \$5.00, including their lunch at noon. A good crowd has been forecast.

Vice-President Carroll Scott briefed the board on plans for the first annual CJC Basketball Camp to be held on the campus this coming summer. It will be designed for non-varsity players, and those who attend will pay \$95 including room and board. The clinic will be held July 6-10 for girls

and July 13-17 for boys. Details will be announced in the near future.

Mr. Scott also told the board about plans for the first annual CJC Invitation Basketball Tournament planned for next December 3-5. Already accepting invitations are Cisco, Early, DeLeon, Baird, Albany, Eastland, Rising Star and Clyde High Schools.

The board was given details on regional seminars planned by the Association of Community College Trustees for the coming year. It was decided to hold the March meeting on Monday, March 16, as the annual spring break will take place during the previous week.

Rotary Club Hears Discussion Of Gov. Clements 'Crime Package'

Features of Governor Bill Clements' legislative "crime package" — a group of ten bills designed to strengthen criminal justice in Texas — were discussed before the Cisco Rotary Club Thursday noon by District Attorney Emory Walton of Eastland. Walton, presented by Tom Autrey, program chairman, placed especial emphasis on bills to:

1. To permit Department of Public Safety investigators, with the approval of certain district judges, to utilize "wire taps" in gathering evidence in drug traffic offenses;

2. To admit so-called "oral confessions" as evidence in the trials of accused criminals;

3. To refine "aggravation" in rape cases to establish the victim's "fear of the attacker" as sufficient evidence of intent whether stated or implied during the attack;

4. Increasing the magnitude of the crime in offenses against children;

5. To strengthen the bail bond program by eliminating loopholes which permit sureties to escape payment of bonds in forfeiture cases, and to

6. Replace funds formerly

supplied by federal grant in financing the Criminal Justice Planning Division of the State government by increasing certain court costs.

Walton, citing instances of his own experience as a prosecutor in Eastland County, wherein defendants in particularly heinous rape and child abuse cases escaped just punishment by unrealistic appellate rulings on evidence sufficiency or statutory limitations, asked members of the club to contact State Sen. Bob Glasgow or State Rep. Joe Hanna in support of bills to establish the rape victim's fear or concept of the attacker's actions as legal evidence of the degree of crime whether or not these actions are accompanied by stated intent and, in particular, to advance the rape of a child from a second degree to a first degree felony, thereby entailing a maximum punishment of life imprisonment. He emphasized that injury in sex crimes is often more tragically psychic than physically curable.

In regard to the "wire tap" bill, Walton pointed to a number of proposed safeguards, protecting the public against an indiscriminate and harassing use of the technique which, he explained, is intended as a means of securing evidence against the "higher-ups" in the criminal drug traffic hierarchy. Only the Department of Public Safety would be authorized to pursue such sources of evidence and then only with the approval of one of some ten designated district judges.

In the case of oral confessions — which in Texas alone of all states is barred from submission in criminal trials — the governor's bill would require the defendant's ver-

bal admission to be reduced to writing and sworn to before a magistrate within 48 hours of its utterance.

As an interesting sidelight, Walton pointed to the fact that within the first four weeks of the current legislative session at Austin more than 600 bills had been poured into the law-making hopper.

Texas Farmers Union President Mike Moeller Holds Eastland County Forum

Mobilizing family farmers and ranchers to assure that Washington lawmakers hear from the countryside as they write new multi-year farm legislation is the goal of newly elected Texas Farmers Union President Mike Moeller who visited Rising Star Tues., Feb. 3 for an Eastland County forum, one stop in his blitz of the thirty-one counties of the 17th Congressional District.

Moeller's campaign, designed to involve all factions involved with agriculture in each county regardless of any group affiliation, will culminate in a Farmers' Town Hall Meeting, a policy dialogue session with U.S. Congressman Charles Stenholm scheduled for February 21 on the Cisco Junior College in Cisco.

"Instead of committee staff members, congressional aides and administration economists writing such critical legislation, we're making every effort we can to get the folks whose livelihoods are affected to provide their input for the new farm law now so that the farm community doesn't find itself simply responding to the law after it's already adopted," Moeller said.

Considering the expense of travel to Washington from Texas, Congressman Stenholm has generously agreed to work with us to turn out as many of his constituents as possible to the

Taxpayers Signatures Necessary On Returns

Federal income tax returns must be signed and dated, the Internal Revenue Service said. In the case of married taxpayers who file jointly, both spouses' signatures must appear on the form.

When married taxpayers file joint returns, lack of income or absence from the home of one spouse is not a valid excuse for the missing signature on the return. Both spouses must sign regardless of their individual incomes. If one spouse is away from

home, the return should be sent to him or her prior to filing, according to the IRS.

Spouses who cannot sign due to disease or injury may have their husbands or wives sign for them. After signing the infirm spouse's name in the proper space, the words "By (name of the spouse who signed), Husband (or Wife)" should be added.

The spouse who signed should also attach a dated statement to the return that includes the following information: the name of the return, the tax year, the reason the other spouse cannot sign, and that the ill or injured spouse has agreed to having their name signed.

If a spouse cannot sign the joint return for any other reason, the husband or wife can sign only if given a valid power of attorney.
