She said the sessions would probably have to be held at night, possibly two times a week on Monday and Thursday, and two sessions on Saturday.

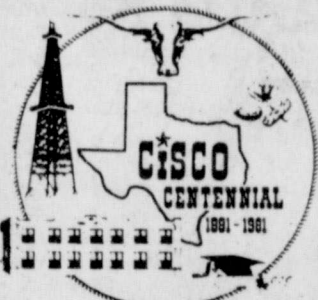

Good Rain Adds Water to Lake, Improves Outlook for Region

Rainfall measuring up to four inches fell in this Eastland County region last weekend through Tuesday to add some 30 inches of new water to Lake Cisco, fill Lake Bernie, and materially benefit area farms and ranches.

The Tuesday rain measured up to three inches and was of the "gully washer" variety. Battle Creek, northwest of Cisco where the City of Cisco has a pump station, ran until late

Thursday and the city's pumps operated for about five days.

C.H. (Cats) Ingram, lake patrolman, reported that the creek was running Friday between Lake Bernie and Lake Cisco and would likely

run for several weeks.

Forecasters called for more rain this weekend.

Area rural residents said the rain filled most stock tanks and was a big help to grain crops where bugs had been at work lately.

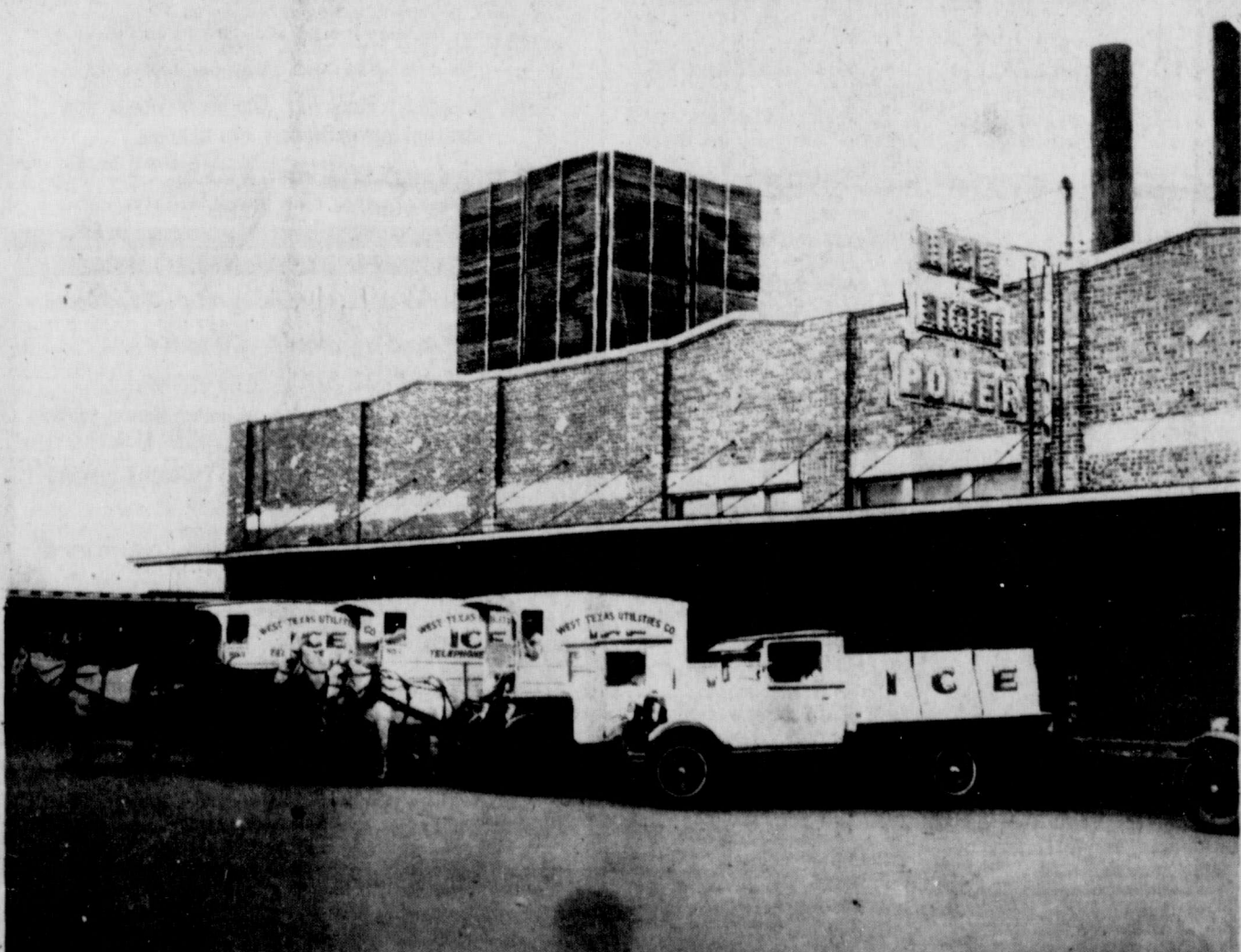

Don Williams' Mom Still Believes In Her Busy Son

CISCO — In his "I Believe in You," Don Williams sings of his faith in children and old folks, but it seems the country-western entertainer himself has trouble keeping in touch with his mother in Cisco.

His mother, though, doesn't seem too concerned about it, noting that her son is a busy man with a career that, after all, she encouraged in the first place.

"He's gone for the top all the time," said Mrs. Bob Bevers, during a phone interview with the Reporter-News. She said it was February a year ago when she last spoke with Williams.

She certainly seems to believe in him, and she says she suspects the popularity of country music will propel his career even further. Williams was "Male Vocalist of the Year" in 1978.

"I think it's wonderful," she says proudly of her son's career. "I've been happy he could make a living at something he could love so well."

Williams is playing a concert 8 p.m. Thursday at Tarleton State University in nearby Stephenville, but it's unlikely his mother will be in the audience.

Mrs. Bevers recently underwent knee surgery and has been confined to her bed. Able to move about (and reach the phone) only with the aid of crutches, she will have a knee-cap replaced in Dallas soon.

Born in Floydada, Williams learned his first guitar chord from his mother, she said. After that, it seemed there was rarely a moment when there wasn't music in the house.

"He never had a music lesson or a singing lesson," she said. "It was a natural." At 6 years of age, he won a little clock by singing in a sort of talent show in school, she recalled.

Mrs. Bevers noted that he acted then pretty much as he does now when bestowed with an award — with great modesty. "He has always acted grownup. He has always been independent."

Williams sang "all the way through high school," often with his brother. "They sang at amateur contests and things like that." She says she isn't sure just how he got into the music business.

As for his brother, Jimmy, he is now working in Corpus Christi, though Mrs. Bevers said she isn't sure just what profession he is engaged in. It isn't music, however.

"I can never keep up," she said.

The two brothers also have a sister, Debra, who now lives in Laredo, where she works as an instructor for an Alcoholics Anonymous group, Bob Bevers said.

Williams, as Mrs. Bevers is quick to point out, has been especially successful in England. By 1976, the singer had three songs that had reached the No. 1 plateau.

Described by one country music reviewer as having a "soft, smooth, country-pleasin' style" that is gentle on the ears, Williams usually appears in old jeans and a battered cowboy hat.

He's visited the Big Country several times. A year ago he appeared at the Taylor County Coliseum, wowing about 5,000 folk with his like "Tulsa Time," "It Must Be Love" and "Love Me Over Again."

But the highlight came when Williams did his giant hit "Amanda," a song done by Waylon Jennings as well. The crowd, in fact, had been shouting for him to do it from the concert's start.

Mr. and Mrs. Bevers, engaged in a stainless steel cookware business, says they follow Williams' career and wish they could hear from him more often, but that they realize the busy pace of his life.

Bevers, who married Williams' mother 11 years ago following a divorce, said he usually just sees the country-western entertainer at the concerts. It's very seldom he can come for a visit, he said.

"He doesn't have time for that," Bevers said.

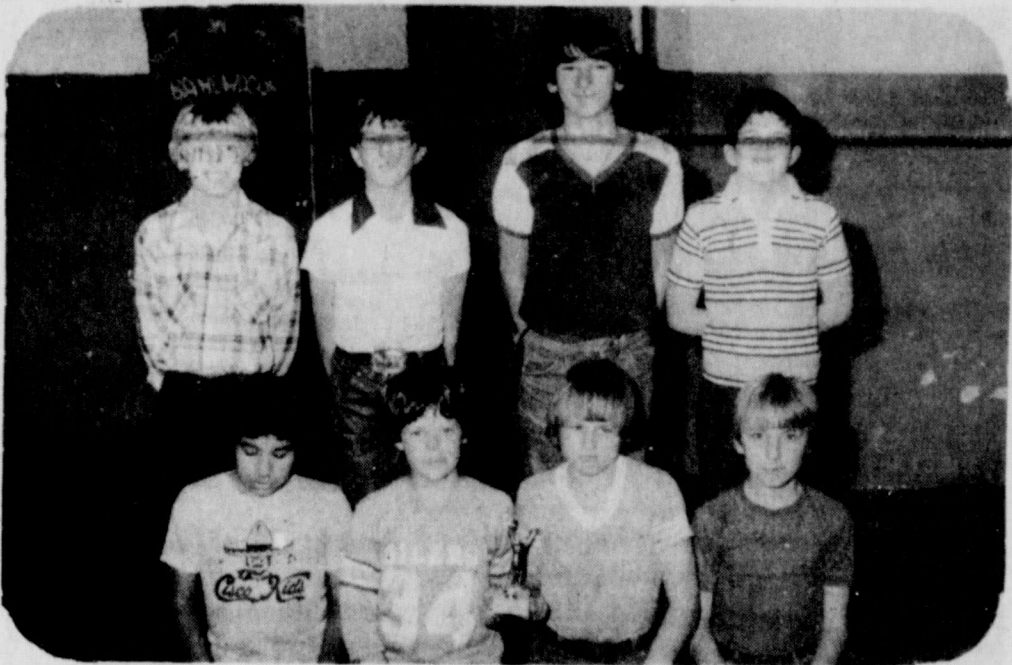

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A Stranger and Ranger

In the Feb. issue of "The Texas Monthly" writer John Bloom had a feature story called "Old Oil - The Ranger Revival". Mr. Bloom is a Roving Reporter for the magazine, and usually writes incisive, arresting prose. He is a journalist of such stature, in fact, that it is difficult to reply to him in his own medium. But the generally interesting article was marred, in my opinion, by the opening paragraphs - which were supposed to describe present-day Ranger and the surrounding area.

I wish that I could report that Mr. Bloom approached Ranger after a good meal on the Freeway, and that he was in a mood of sweetness and light as he glanced over the hill. But alas - this was apparently not to be. A man of his talent and position, however, has a responsibility to endure the hardships of the road, and view life with a less than cynical eye. For there are still people who believe everything they see in print! And since there are around 3,000 people in Ranger who disagree with Mr. Bloom's observations, it might be worthwhile to confuse this Reporter with a few facts.

"From I-20," says Mr. Bloom, "Ranger looks like the original place that time forgot. You approach it through the raw, unvarnished landscape of the Cross

Timbers, etc..." Obviously Mr. Bloom was coming upon Ranger from the east. For if he had approached Eastland County from the west, he would have had a basis of comparison with Toyah, Pecos, Peyote, Monahans, Colorado City, Loraiah, and Sweetwater!

I might mention here, however, that the more forbidding the territory, the more indomitable the people. Ranger people, though, have had enough trouble to put some gravel in their craws - and this town is not going to curl up and die whether the oil floats back up or not. The Chamber of Commerce reports, in fact, that many more people would move to Ranger if housing was available. So the quality of available materials and the price of new homes - not to mention the financing - is one hurdle the town will have to clear. But that situation is certainly not Ranger's fault!

I'm surprised at the description of the landscape, since Mr. Bloom should know his southwest. This area is a land of moods and variety, and the landscape and vegetation is never the same. It sounds like the Reporter hit Ranger during the last summer's drought, when everything was seared from the heat. (I have been told, however, that the Chamber of Commerce sign out on the Freeway was not cracking and peeling!)

At another time the writer would find a landscape glittering with snow, or a pastoral scene with fresh green grass, myriads of bluebonnets and western paintbrushes, and soft clouds bouncing in a gentle sky. Like an Uncle of mine used to say - there's nothing wrong with West Texas that a good rain won't cure! And it all comes down to this: better know your country by living with it before you describe it - one trip won't do the job!

Obviously the view from the Freeway is not Ranger's best - you can't even see Ranger from the Freeway! Ranger proper lies in an attractive natural setting - a bowl rimmed by nice wooded hills. The local Garden Club has been particularly active in tree planting and other beautification projects, and there are many pecan and fruit trees among the oaks. Two parks add to the greenery.

Admittedly there are some rocks around the Freeway and on the hills around Ranger. But there are also fertile valleys, and uplands with loam (and sand) suitable for growing almost anything. Eastland County is not a recognized "goat" area, but it has around 40,000 cattle, and ranks second in the state in peanut production. Agricultural products bring in over \$30 million dollars per year to the area,

and Ranger gets its share. Not much Eastland County land is sold off by the families who inherit it, so there are a number of well-known local cattle brands burned in the Heritage Area at Texas A and M. One farm in the Ranger area has been in the same family for more than 100 years.

It is hard to ignore Mr. Bloom's description of beautiful down town Ranger: "Main Street is three blocks long, and frequented by the elderly." It sounds like our Reporter drove through on the day of a Senior Citizen's Luncheon at the downtown Center! Yes, Ranger was the first place around to begin a balanced program for its elderly citizens, believing that these pioneers should not be warehoused as long as they are physically able to get about. So they are certainly not stranded in lonely homes and apartments!

But actually there are people of all ages in Ranger. Witness the large enrollment in the new public schools, and the enrollment of around 500 at Ranger Jr. College. This College has enlarged in many ways under President Jack Elsom. It enrolls foreign students as well as young people from this area, and offers vocational as well as academic programs.

A drive around the town will reveal that most people live in attractive homes in Ranger, and they aren't anxious to tear many of them down. For some of the structures are built of Thurber brick, which bears about as much resemblance to the

modern cinder block as a real diamond does to glass. This desire to save Ranger's heritage extends to the depot, which - when restored - will become a Museum and a home for the Chamber of Commerce. The hospital, however, is modern, as well as the Boy's Club and some other structures. And fourteen Churches, most of them new or recently restored, invite the public to worship.

There are more than 100 business scattered around various parts of Ranger. Some of them are light and heavy industries, including manufacturing. The American Car Company, located north of town, is nationally known for its steam cleaning and renovation of railway cars. Ranger's Industrial Foundation, composed of business and civic leaders, is very actively bringing new business and industry into the area. Some of these are related to oil exploration and petroleum products, but others deal in goods and services unrelated to the oil fields.

No "forgotten spot" could have as many Clubs as Ranger! There are about 26 organizations in the City, offering recreation and projects for persons of all ages. Then, believe it or not, there is quite a bit of shopping in Ranger, with places to buy everything from fine diamonds to groceries.

With this type of commerce around, it is not surprising that the two financial institutions - First State Bank and First Federal Savings and Loan, have assets of more than 20 million. Not bad for a town that is supposed to be dead!

But the most important part of Ranger is not the money, the industry, the

location, or the oil - but the people. Yes, people - around here - are still more important than things! And the people who stayed with Ranger when the oil boom folded were a special breed. Some of them are still among the "old people" walking on Main Street.

Their patience, tenacity and endurance is carried on by descendants and newcomers who have joined the local scene. Many are talented people who could bring in more money in the Metro-Plex, but they are not for sale there. They realize that no place on earth is a paradise, and neither is Ranger. But the town symbolizes a part of themselves, and they want to stick around and help a good thing all they can.

So come back again, Mr. Reporter, and meet some of the Ranger people. They have many stories that might surprise you. And you might hear a folk song that would soothe you, a fiddle tune to delight you, and learn that the real gourmet food is found at Club meetings and Church dinners. Who knows - the local saying "No Stranger In Ranger" might even begin to apply to you!

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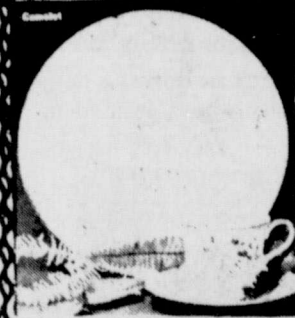
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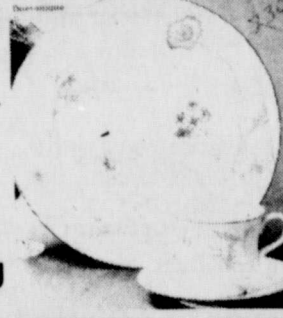
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Preliminary Reports State Eastland Co. Growing

From the preliminary reports of the 1980 Census of Population and Housing we can see how much Eastland County has grown in the last ten years. In population, Eastland County has gone from 18,092 to 19,446 and has increased in housing units from 8,274 to 9,349.

The Cisco division has gone from 5,170 to 5,464 in population and has increased housing units from 2,298 to 2,672 and the city of Cisco has increased in population from 4,160 to 4,497 with the number of housing units rising from 1,720 to 2,024.

The Eastland division is now at 5,483 in population whereas ten years ago it was 4,748, with housing units now at 2,738 instead of 2,285. With a big difference between the city of Eastland and the Eastland division, the population of the city has grown from 3,178 to 3,744 and housing has increased from 1,374 to 1,740.

The Gorman division's population is now at 2,623 and was 2,548 ten years ago. Its housing units now stands at 1,249 instead of 1,139.

The town of Carbon has gone from 264 in population to 281, and has increased housing units from 128 to 144.

The city of Gorman as gone from 1,236 to 1,260 and has increased housing units from 576 to 605.

In the Ranger division there has been a growth to 3,709 from 3,578 in population and a small increase in housing from 1,573 to 1,576. The city of Ranger has increased from 3,094 to 3,169 and housing has gone to 1,334 from 1,316.

The population in the Rising Star division has increased from 2,048 to 2,167 with housing rising from 979 to 1,114. In the town of Rising Star, the population has now grown to 1,195 from 1,009 and housing units now stand at 588 instead of 511.

IWU Reflections In Perspective

If there is a single indispensable household article, it is the broom. Universally; it is a tool, appliance, weapon...whatever...which is found in homes ranging from the tents of the Beduins to the thatch huts of totally uncivilized savages along the jungle-crowded banks of the Rio Catatumbo right on up to the most palatial homes in the most highly developed countries.

Oh, I know; the broom has been replaced by all manner of electric powered gadgetry. Sales propagandists would have you believe that; but don't. The broom has always been, is and always will be one thing no household can make do without. Remember the sayings like... "A new broom sweeps clean", (poor grammar, actually. Should be cleanly). And the one I like, but which is seldom observed... "Never move an old broom".

And brooms come in all manner of forms. One could speculate that there are far more hand-made brooms used in the world today than there are of the neat, well-made broom factory models. Beginning with the "faggot broom", which is simply a roundish brush of small branches stripped from a shrub and tied around the end of a light pole and ranging on upward to the synthetic fibre brush which is molded onto the end of a well-turned handle of hardwood.

Streetsweepers in Teheran used faggot brooms; and quite effectively, it could be observed. A team of three or four sweepers could stir up a stifling cloud of dust in the process of keeping the streets of the city clean. Ton for ton, it appeared that they moved more dirt into the air to settle on passing automobiles than they did into the gutters (jubes) along the streets. Most households kept a faggot broom around for the servants to use in cleaning the driveways and such.

But the principal broom of the house was a handsome article, indeed. It could be best described as a glorified whisk broom. And broom it was. No frills nor folderol. It is made of broomcorn, just as are the brooms turned out in broom factories all over the western world. Somewhat longer in the brush, but with the conventional sweeping-broom configuration. Hand-stitched with cotton thread, the handle of the broom was formed by the stub ends of the heads of the broomcorn. The entire thing was something like twenty inches, maybe two feet in length. And that was that.

Now our Turdoman Bhadji (housemaid) had a broom. She could work wonders with it in the day-to-day cleaning of the carpets. And the rest of the house, for that matter. She also displayed it as something of a symbol of authority and position. She'd rarely answer a call to the garden gate without first tucking her broom under her arm. Maybe it was just to have something to do with her hands as she talked to the caller.

But seeing Noelli doing her daily housecleaning, stooping and bending over that king-sized whisk broom incurred the sympathy of My Lovely Wife, who instructed me to keep an eye out for a proper broom for the bhadji. It was not to be. Brooms as we know them simply were not to be had in Iran. The broom such as Noelli used did its work well, so why change? Anyway; wooden handles were and would be difficult to come by.

One bright day, though, the supermarket displayed a stand of genuine American-made brooms. Complete with long, painted handles they were a delight to behold. I bought one (at a price which would have made a down payment on an electric sweeper) and happily transported it home for MLW to present to her housemaid. This modern gadget would take much of the back-breaking work from sweeping. Noelli should be pleased.

And she was. When we presented her with her brand-new broom, she was all smiles. She admired the wire stitchery, the density of the bristles, the even cut of the brushing end of the broom, and even made a few swipes with it across the kitchen floor. She stared quite long at the handle, which was painted a bright blue.

The following day Noelli put her broom to use. But I never knew what she did with the handle. She'd cut it off, right off, right where the bristles were gathered around its end and was using it in exactly the same manner as she'd been using the broom she had when we moved into the house. Probably sold it to a cripple to be used as a walking stick.

Jon Cermin Cruises Bahamas

Cruising the Bahamas is often a popular vacation pastime. For Jon Cermin of Cisco, along with 17 other college students, the tour of the islands this past January was much more than just a vacation—they also steered and navigated their home-sailboat through the Caribbean, made their own meals, and went diving and snorkeling in the seas.

After departing on a three-week journey which began in Miami, the 14 Texas Lutheran College students and four students from Tarkio College in Missouri sailed to the deserted or sparsely populated islands of the Bahamas; also visiting the capital city of Nassau on Providence Island.

Dr. John T. Sieben, assistant professor of mathematics at TLC, traveled with the students on the cruise along with an instructor from Tarkio College. Tarkio has provided the In-

terim Bahama cruise opportunity since 1976, and TLC joined them this year for the first time. Dr. Sieben taught at Tarkio before coming to TLC last fall.

Living in close quarters, the students learned cooperation and teamwork on their 65-foot sailboat. Although the boat came with a certified captain and first mate, students became the crew members, working in shifts. Plotting courses, navigation, and tending the sails were a few of the responsibilities of the crew. Following both the horizon and the compass needle was a constant concern for those on duty.

Fending the waves and weather, the group followed its itinerary as closely as possible. Through readings prior to the trip, the students had gained knowledge of the history and nature of the Bahaman culture before their arrival, and explored the various islands and their inhabitants along their route.

All students were required to keep a daily log of the trip in which they made observations of their experiences. In their visits to the islands, the students encountered not only villages, but many unpopulated areas. David Nordman, a TLC student from Austin, described one of these in his journal on January 10:

"Today we made it to Holmes Cay and went looking for the blue hole. What a great spot, it looks like a set right out of the movie 'Blue Lagoon.' The blue hole is about 90 feet deep and is right in the middle of the island. About the only way to get into the water of the blue hole is to jump! It's about a 20 foot leap. It was very mysterious. Swimming and looking down into the depths of the hole you feel like you are floating into nothing, floating in space. Visiting places like this, where people come very seldom, we feel beautiful and free, part of story book scenes."

On the ocean, the importance of sailboat terminology and navigation was realized several times when the small boat sailed into rather stormy weather. Kirstin Brekken, a senior from Grapevine, observed the following:

"...The boat continued to lean further across the deck and the warm salt water stung our eyes. The whole thing was both frightening and exciting...The wind was 45 knots and eventually ripped the sail. It was good to get below when the next crew came up at 5:15 a.m. The storm seemed like something out of the movies—at some points it really scared us—had us saying our prayers anyway, while those below slept through the whole thing."

In addition to the educational, cultural, and geographical knowledge the students gained, they also developed a closeness often felt when a group of people live and work together every day. "...The more time I spend with these guys (and girls)," observed Nordman, "the more fun I have with them and the closer we become. We share our thoughts more freely now and don't get embarrassed as easily anymore."

But like all good things, the well-rounded "fantasy island" cruise soon came to a close. "...We have one more place to visit before being zipped back into reality, the world of school and highways, honking cars, pollution and stationary land..." wrote Brekken.

"My feeling is that a learning experience doesn't have to take place in a classroom," Brekken concluded in her afterthoughts about the trip. "I feel we very successfully mixed learning with pleasure. Be-

ing exposed to different regions of the Bahamas was an excellent way to study and compare the culture. The people of the Bahamas are very pleasant—even the hagglers in the straw market. The scenery was fantastic, the places unbelievable. I feel very fortunate to have been able to be a part of such a cruise. I enjoyed meeting and interacting with each individual."

The students who sailed the Caribbean have now been back in class for over a month. Everything is pretty much the same as before—except for a few different courses and several minor changes—but they carry the memories of a unique and educational month's experience with them. What better way to study liberal arts?

A Resurrection For Ranger Oil?

The author regrets that Sun Texas Oil Company declined a number of requests for a local interview concerning its work in Eastland County. So this article had to be compiled from various second-hand sources I consider reliable.

I do not like to work in that way. But, in this case, I feel that the right of the public to know what concerns them overrides all else. Especially when these facts are common knowledge elsewhere.

Ironically, the Office of Sun Texas Oil is only a short distance away from the Eastland Telegram.

In an inconspicuous office in Eastland John Hawkes, Landman for Texas Sun Oil, works on the Ranger Oil Recovery Project. The setting may seem commonplace, but the project is electrifying - a waterflood resurrection for the old Ranger Oil Boom field, which is estimated to hold 86 per cent of the oil which was there in the first place.

Luther Ellison, Sun Oil Petroleum Engineer, actually began this project in his Dallas office in 1972, before the first Mid-east oil blockade. Charles Dickson of Midland, Chief Engineer and an expert on techniques of secondary recovery of oil, is now the Ranger Project Manager. A number of other Sun geologists and engineers are involved in the plan.

The stakes Sun Texas is playing for are very high - millions of barrels of oil believed to be lying in a continuous sheet of sand more than 3,000 ft. below Ranger and the area around it. The cost of recovery will be tremendous - around 100 million dollars, with an estimated 8 years before the investment begins to pay off. But the eventual payoff could run into the billions, especially with the current decontrol of oil.

The water for recovery will probably be piped from Possum Kingdom Lake, and forced into the underground formation. This technique has already been used successfully in a number of places, such as old fields in Oklahoma, and the limestone formations of Scurry County. Even in Saudi Arabia, with its wells producing 900 barrels each day, water is sometimes flooded into underground formations to force the wells to flow without pumping.

But in the Ranger area there are a number of unknowns and variables in the formation, so no one can predict with certainty how much oil can be received. For no one really knows how much oil came from Ranger in the Boom Days. Some say around 50 million barrels.

Any modern boom would not particularly swell the population of Ranger, since most of the oil would simply be piped away.

For Sun Oil, the risk is worth taking. If the Company and its team win, it will undoubtedly rise above its listing as the 11th largest oil company in the nation. And the U.S. needs all the barrels recovered from the field. The estimated 28 billion oil reserved in the U.S. at this time will not last the nation long, with the present usage. Up through the 1950's the U.S. was a large exporter of cheap oil - now it imports about half of what is used. But two wars, a mushrooming urban population and the Jet and Plastic Age have canceled out cheap energy. And years of Government price controls slowed domestic oil exploration. Only recently has the Ranger Project seemed feasible in price. But with \$40.00 per barrel oil, one-fourth of the world's reserves in Saudi Arabia, and Russia's oil reserves running dangerously low. The time appears to be right. Since the Ranger Project was conceived, each piece of its puzzle has been falling into place.

At the beginning of the project, on that day in 1972, Sun Engineer Luther Ellison met with the select production men to discuss possible oil

fields worth recovering. While sitting in this Dallas office Martin Russo, a leading Sun geologist, suggested the Ranger Field. And from that time on, for some reason, Ellison couldn't get the challenging old field out of his mind.

Finally Kenneth Larson, a veteran geologist, was assigned the job of searching out all available information on the Ranger field, where Sun Oil had originally participated. As he tackled the enormous task, he realized there were no really reliable reports on this boom. Even Sun Oil had destroyed its data! The field had been discovered in 1917 and abandoned in 1921, long before the Railroad Commission became actively involved in regulation and records. The field had been drilled by hundreds of wildcaters, many with no knowledge of geology. But Larson found about 500 old driller's logs, 35 modern logs from the 1960's, Scout cards, and a field map drawn in 1920. From these accounts he decided on the nature of the field and the possibility of recovery.

The Ranger boom - a wild and wasteful binge in many ways - furnished much of the oil for the Allied war effort in World War I. It blew in with the McCleskey well in 1917, which first produced 1600 barrels of oil and 3 million ft. of gas. Contrast that the average well in America today, which makes 17 barrels daily!

The tremendous amount of gas in the Ranger field apparently caused more than one oil gusher. The gas was flared off, burned and

wasted, in fires that - according to old-timers: "Lit up Ranger every night as bright as day."

Shortly after the McCleskey well, 400 other wells had been drilled, about the total amount in Saudi Arabia today. Before the gas pressure failed there were 5,000 wells in the field, with a total production of around 70,000 barrels of oil per day.

The price failed about the time of the gas pressure, skidding from \$4.25 in 1919 to about a dollar a barrel. In 1970, before the sharp price rises, oil sold for just over \$3.00 per barrel. With recovery costs tagged at around \$32.00 per barrel, vast waterflood projects were out of the question at that time.

In 1977 Luther Ellison made John Hawkes, Area Land Manager for the Midland District, a special Projects Land Manager for the Ranger field. This was kept secret even within the Company. Hawkes hired a Midland Consulting Firm to search through title records in the Eastland County Courthouse.

As Hawkes and his employees arrived in Eastland County, they reportedly experienced a number of cultural shocks. This involved more than the dreariness of continual eating out, and the isolation of motel living. Obviously their singleness of purpose leaned more toward influencing people than winning friends. Furthermore, they encountered the Eastland County attitude, which assumes that strangers, even if they arrive in packs,

are to be treated as fellow human beings.

This included a show of interest about where the stranger had been, and what they were doing in this locality. This was undoubtedly disturbing to anyone endeavoring to lease land quietly and quickly from a number of people. Especially that land held around a 4,000 acre block called the John York Survey - owned by Texas Pacific - where some of Ranger's best wells had been drilled.

The strangers managed to survive everything, but they found that Eastland County people were not inclined to lease to an unknown company. They had had enough of unscrupulous operators and their destruction and piles of junk. In 1979 Hawkes evidently decided to squelch rumors about this work - for he began informing landowners that he was a representative for a major company.

Leasing went faster after that, but scouts (spies?) from other companies sniffed the air and arrived on the Eastland County scene. In the meanwhile Hawkes men scoured the 48 states to round up royalty holders. And about the time of this leasing climax the revolution hit in Iran, shutting off about 8 per cent of the U.S. oil.

Dickson was named Project Manager on April 1, 1980, and began to select sites for exploratory drilling - wells which would tell geologists the size, thickness, and porosity of the oil reservoir.

But as he began, a large purchasing deal was consummated far from

Eastland County - a transaction in which Sun Oil bought large blocks of Texas Pacific Stock from Seagram Co. of Toronto. (And other parts.)

This purchase included the John York Survey! Now Sun, becoming Sun Texas, owned about 16,000 acres of the prime Ranger Boom land!

In August of 1980 Sun Oil drilled the first experimental well of the Ranger Project, about a mile South of I 20. The underground geology looked about as they had thought.

Since then, the situation has been changing almost daily. Oil prices have been rising, with partial and now full decontrols. There is a possibility the Windfalls Profit Tax will be repealed, giving more incentive for recovery of oil. Then, a few days ago, it was reported that two gas wells had been drilled for Sun Oil S.E. of Ranger.

If the Ranger Project succeeds, it will open new frontiers in oil recovery from other depleted fields. So who knows - the Ranger

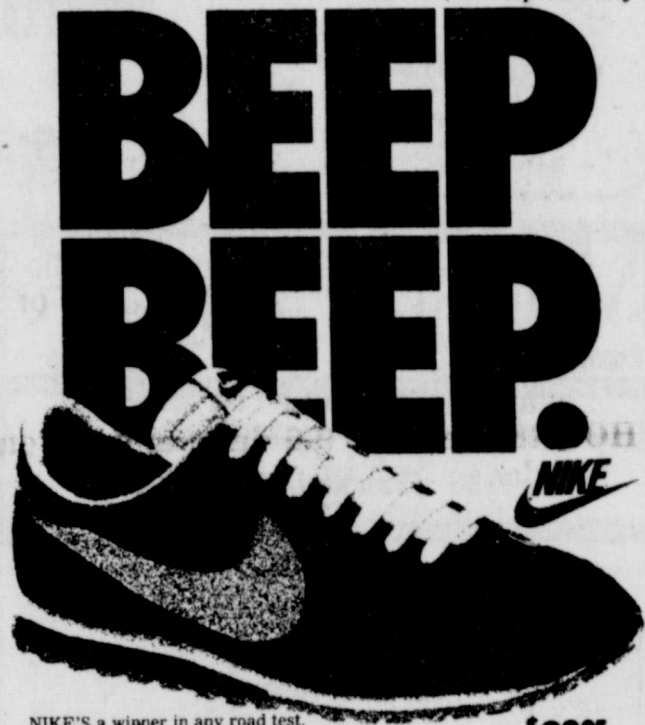

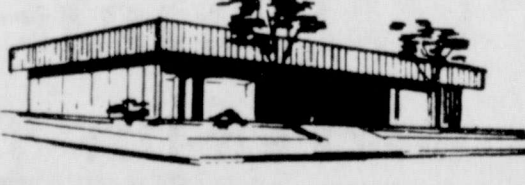

Michigan State Supreme Court

Rules Against Mobile Home Zones

WASHINGTON, D.C., February 25, 1981—In a landmark decision that will have great repercussions on how local jurisdictions will meet their growing future housing needs, the Michigan State Supreme Court ruled this week that communities cannot restrict the location of mobile homes just because they are mobile homes, the Manufactured Housing Institute (MHI) reported today.

In a 4-3 ruling the high court said Monday, February 23, that modern mobile/manufactured homes have few defects or other drawbacks to justify discrimination under local zoning laws which frequently prohibit them outside of designated mobile home parks, according to MHI.

Any future zoning restrictions, the court ruled, must be based on such reasons as failure to satisfy standards meant to assure compatibility with mobile/manufactured homes and other nearby housing, according to the decision.

The Supreme Court concurred with an earlier ruling by the State Court of Appeals declaring that a single mobile/manufactured home is not in itself a nuisance. That Appeals Court ruling concerned the Robinson Township in Michigan's Ottawa County and its attempt to block a family from placing a mobile home on a privately owned piece of land within the town limits, MHI stated.

Poisonings Increase in Spring and Summer

GALVESTON—The child is screaming and coughing. Mother runs to the garage and finds the child coughing, gagging, and having difficulty breathing and falls unconscious to the floor from a pan where his dad was washing greasy car parts with gasoline. An unusual occurrence? "No," says Michael Ellis, director of the Texas State Poison Center. "Spring and summer always brings us an increase in the number of ingestions of gasoline and other petroleum distillates." During 1980 the Poison Center was contacted over 19,000 times for a poisoning emergency and some 11,000 times for general information about preventing poisoning. "The poison inquiries are primarily about children," Ellis said, "in fact, about 70 percent of all our calls involve the child who is 5 years old or younger. This is the prime age for small objects found down low to go directly in the mouth." And what about our child who drank the gasoline? "Gasoline and other petroleum distillates such as furniture polishes, lamp oils, lighter fluid, etc. present us with considerable

problems," Ellis noted. "If these products get into the lung of the child, the lung can be coated with the liquid and asphyxiation and death over a several day period occurs all too frequently." And there isn't much we can do about the situation."

March 15-21 is National Poison Prevention Week and a good time to check for poor storage of poisons. Although the ingestion of foreign substances occurs quite frequently in the young child, luckily true poisonings do not occur nearly as frequently. "Rushing the patient to the hospital emergency room after they have ingested a foreign substance, is not the best approach to the problem," said Ellis. "About 85 percent of the time the patient can be treated at home and does not require medical attention.

Since a poisoning emergency occurs whenever you are least expecting it, the telephone number of the Poison Center in Galveston is 1-713-765-1420. It is answered 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Keep the number handy, remember, children act fast, so do poisons.

NOTICE OF APPLICATION FOR WASTE DISCHARGE PERMIT RENEWAL
City of Cisco, P.O. Box 110, Cisco, Texas 76437, has applied to the Texas Department of Water Resources for a renewal of Permit No. 10424-01 which authorizes a discharge of treated domestic sewage effluent at a volume not to exceed an average flow of 650,000 gallons per day from the treatment facilities which are located approximately 1/2 mile north of the intersection of U.S. Highway 80 with U.S. Highway 380 in Eastland County, Texas.

The treated domestic sewage effluent is discharged into Sandy Creek, thence to Hubbard Creek Reservoir in the Brazos River Basin. The permit, if renewed by the Commission, will specify conditions and limitations generally the same as those currently enforced by the existing permit. The expiration date of the existing permit was November 26, 1980. It is proposed that the expiration date be specified as midnight, two years after date of Commission approval.

LEGAL AUTHORITY: Section 26.028 of the Texas Water Code, as amended, and Chapter 25 of the Rules of the Texas Department of Water Resources.

No public hearing will be held on this application unless an affected person who has received notice of the application has requested a public hearing. Any such request for a public hearing shall be in writing and contain (1) the name, mailing address and phone number of the person making the request; and (2) a brief description of how the requester, or persons represented by the requester, would be adversely affected by the granting of the application. If the Commission determines that the request sets out an issue which is relevant to the waste discharge permit decision, or that a public hearing would serve the public interest, the Commission shall conduct a public hearing, after the issuance of proper and timely notice of the hearing. If no sufficient request for hearing is received within 45 days of the date of publication of the notice concerning the application, the

permit will be submitted to the Commission for final decision on the application.
