Trustees Name New Coaches, Principal; Reelect Teachers

Trustees of the Cisco Public Schools named a new high school football coach, a new high school principal and employed teachers for the 1981-82 school year at their regular meeting Monday night.

Jim Puryear, principal of

the junior and senior high school, was named head coach and athletic director to succeed Rick Calhoun, who resigned last month to take a job near New Braunfels.

Mr. Puryear had been the Cisco High School coach for

six years before going into administration four years ago.

The board named Mike Turner, assistant junior and senior high school principal, as Mr. Puryear's successor.

The board also hired Clyde Evatt, former Lobo coach who has worked for Texas Instruments at Abilene for the past two years, as assistant coach and defense coach for the Lobos. He will join the faculty next Monday to take over classes taught

by Mr. Calhoun. James Couch, superintendent of schools, said the transition of Mr. Puryear from the principal's office to the coaching department would be gradual during the present semester. Mr. Turner, who has been working with him, is familiar with the duties that he will be assuming gradually and full-time next fall.

Mr. Puryear, a resident of Cisco for some 18 years, decided to return to coaching "where I was happiest," he said. His coaching experience includes three years at Carrollton, three years at Ranger JC, eight years at Cisco JC, two years at Wharton JC and six years at Cisco High School - all as a head coach.

Achievements for Puryear teams included Texas JC conference champions at both Ranger and Cisco Junior Colleges, a district championship at Cisco High in 1973, and two appearances in the Wool Bowl with CJC teams. Five times he was selected to coach post season game teams.

"We are pleased to have Mr. Puryear back at the helm of the Lobos," Mr. Couch said. "And we are glad that Mr. Evatt is coming back to us."

The Evatt family has continued to live in Cisco and he has commuted to Abilene for his work there.

All members of the faculties of the various units of the school system were given new contracts, Mr. Couch said.

Dr. Bookout On Job As College Leader

Dr. Dan Bookout, president of Southwestern Chiropractic College here, is a former airline pilot and a practicing chiropractor who is looking forward to the opportunities and the challenges offered him as the chief executive officer of the new school.

A native of Texarkana, Dr. Bookout has been associated with a brother in a large chiropractic clinic there. He is a graduate of Texas Chiropractic College at Pasadena, the only other school for chiropractors in the state.

Before going to chiropractic school, Dr. Bookout studied at Texarkana Junior College, San Jacinto Junior College and the University of Wyoming. He joined his brother in practice at Texarkana several years ago after practicing for a time elsewhere.

Dr. Bookout is a veteran of the U.S. Air Force and left active duty as a command pilot. He then went to work for Chicago Southern Airlines and was made a captain at age 30. After a few years as a pilot, he decided to enter chiropractic school.

Dr. Bookout's wife, who is working at their clinic, will join him here in the near future. They are Baptists. He has been active in chiropractic association activities and in community affairs in Texarkana. His hobbies include golf, boating and flying.

Following the goats will be breeding sheep, market lambs, dairy animals, beef breeding cattle and steers.

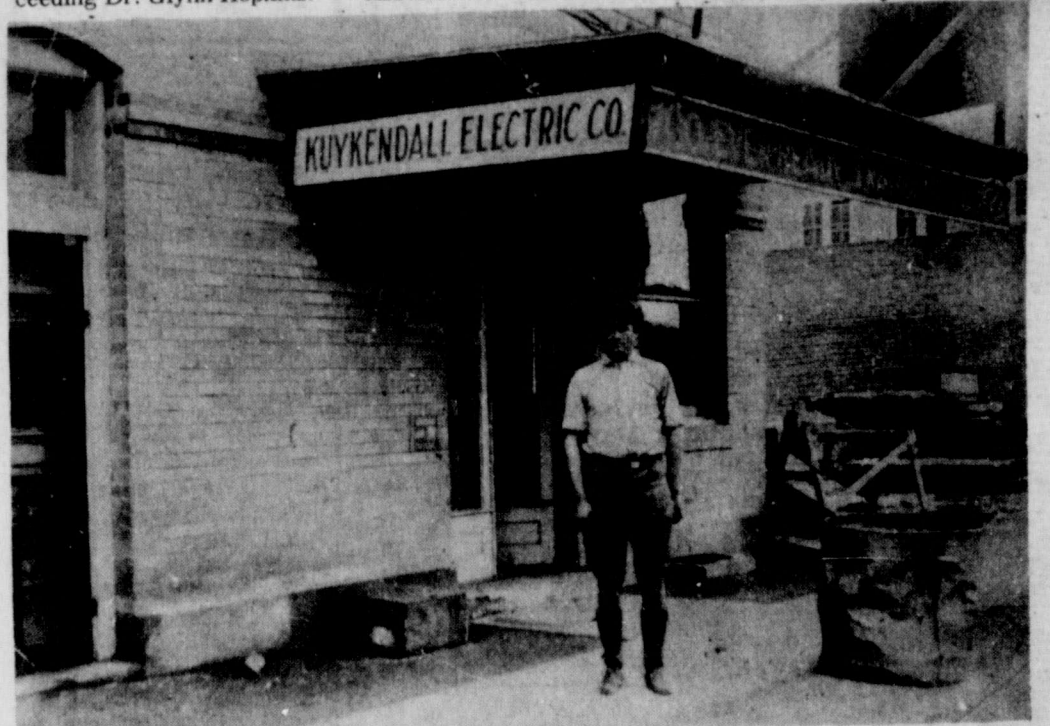
Prize money and ribbons will be furnished by the Cisco Livestock Show Association.

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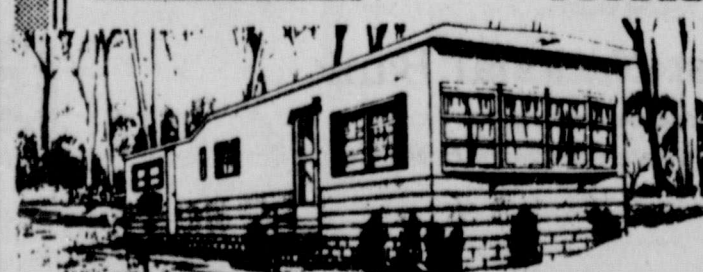
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GORDON SPOT

By DeMarquis Gordon

Each spring, I get several inquiries on what's causing bean seedlings to die suddenly. This is a common problem in all areas of the county and is brought about by a group of soil-borne fungi.

These fungi are present in soil throughout the year but are especially damaging during a cool, wet spring. Once the condition begins to appear, there is little that can be done to correct the problem. However, there are several steps that should be taken to reduce losses from damping-off where this disease has become a problem.

"Rotation" is one of the most important steps to preventing losses from this disease. Never follow vegetables from one group with another vegetable from the same group. Vegetables from the same group have similar diseases which build up in the soil and increase losses each year. Following is a grouping of plants based on their soil-borne diseases:

- GROUP A**
Watermelon, Cucumber, Squash, Cantaloupe, Honey Dew Melon, Pumpkin
- GROUP B**
Cabbage, Cauliflower, Brussels sprouts, Turnip, Mustard, Radish, Collards, Lettuce, Swiss Chard, Spinach
- GROUP C**
Pepper, Tomato, Potato,

GROUP D
Carrots, Sweet Potatoes, Beets

GROUP E
Sweet Corn

GROUP F
Onions, Garlic, Shallots

GROUP G
Beans, Peas, Cowpeas

"Planting on a bed" is a method of planting which will keep the root zone of developing seedlings in a drier, more aerified soil and thus reduce losses from damping-off. Soil saturated with water has a greater tendency to have damping-off problems than soil from which free water drains quickly after a rain.

"Know the soil temperature" at which the vegetable you are planting grows best and do not plant before the temperature is reached. Here are some optimum soil temperatures for seed germination:

- Beans 86-95 degrees F.
- Cucumbers 86-95 degrees F.
- Lettuce 77-86 degrees F.
- Okra 95 - degrees F.
- Spinach 77 degrees F.

This is partial list of vegetables and temperatures at which they germinate best. As a gardener, you should now at what temperature ranges seed will germinate and grow the most rapid. The less time spent as seedlings, the less plants will suffer from seedling disease.

As seedlings develop into more mature plants, they also develop a resistance to

organisms involved in seedling disease.

"Seed quality" is important because high quality seeds will grow out of the seedling stage faster if all other factors favor seedling growth.

"Use of Vapam fungicide" will reduce losses due to seedling disease, but this practice is expensive and recommended only as a side benefit from nematode control. Captan is a fungicide that can be used on select vegetables. When using Captan refer to the label for vegetables on which it can be used and the rate per 100 feet of row.

Damping-off is a serious problem in vegetables in this area, but losses from it can be reduced significantly by following the above steps.

Nematodes and their control will be discussed next time.

Eastland Co. Livestock Show

The Eastland County Livestock Show scheduled for March 19, 20, and 21 will have some major changes. The number of entries are also more than the last two years. The 1981 show has 460 entries compared to 418 last year.

The most important change is the method of selling the market animals at the special stock show sale. In the past the champion and reserve champion animals sold under open bidding. All other market animals sold at a pre-set premium above market price. This year the top one-half of each market class will be sold under open bidding and the bottom half of each class will sell at market price. However, the rules limit each exhibitor to only one steer, one hog and

one lamb eligible for the sale, unless one exhibitor has both the champion and reserve champion animals in the same division. In this case both animals will sell in the auction.

Another change will be the breakdown of classes in the swine division. The swine will show by breeds rather than by color as in the past.

For the first time there will be a broiler show in the stock show. A pen of broilers will consist of five chickens. There are 290 pens of broilers entered in the show. One-half of the broilers will sell at the special auction. Exhibitors are responsible for processing and delivering the birds to the buyers.

The rabbit show will be open to all 4-H and FFA members of school age. In the past only 4-H members could show rabbits.

The number of entries in each division are as follows:
Breeding Swine - 34,
Breeding Beef - 42, Breeding Sheep - 71, Dairy - 6, Goats - 25, Market Swine - 152, Lambs - 87, Steers - 14 and Broilers - 29 pens. Exhibitors of rabbits do not have to turn in entries until Friday morning, March 20.

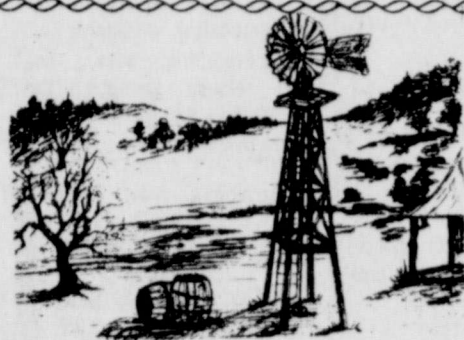

the British accuse Americans of brutalizing the King's English when we speak it in our native fashion. Whether or not I agree with them is beside the point.

Stepping outside the office at Jebel Dhanna one hot autumn day I espied a cloud of dust forming up a couple of miles or so toward the desert to the southwest. Curious; I found the shade of one of our bedroom "caravans" and waited the opportunity of identifying the cause of the dust cloud. It was distinctly coming in our direction. 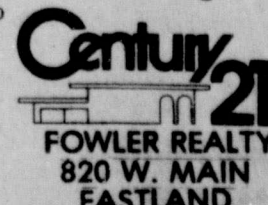

Homemaking Hints

By Janet Thomas

Interested in buying or selling some gold jewelry? Beware of frauds. I am including some basic information on the many different types of gold jewelry.

Only karat gold jewelry is real gold - no matter how bright the glitter, so know what you are doing before buying or selling gold jewelry.

Understanding certain words and other points about gold is a must. **WHAT IS A KARAT?** Karat refers to the percentage of gold in an item. Always look for a karat stamp. An item marked 24K (24 karats) or 999, is 100 percent pure gold. Each karat represents 1/24 part of pure gold. The finest gold jewelry is usually 18K (eighteen parts pur gold and six parts of another metal), since 24K generally is considered too soft to use for jewelry.

Most domestically produced gold jewelry is 14K (14 parts gold and ten parts of another metal - or about 58.5 percent pure gold). No American-made gold jewelry may be stamped with percentages other than karats according to a Federal Trade Commission regulation.

WHAT IS MEANT BY '585' OR '750'? This appears on some European jewelry. This marking means that gold karatage is stated in percentages of 1,000. So, 750 equals 18K (75 percent pure gold), and 585 means 14: (58 percent pure gold).

IS COLOR IMPORTANT? Color of gold depends on the other metals alloyed with it. Gold alloyed with copper has a reddish cast. Gold alloyed with nickel or palladium produces "white gold" used in setting diamonds.

HOW DO I KNOW

WHAT'S WHAT? Understand certain words, so you don't pay "karat gold" prices for gold-plated jewelry.

Gold Filled - Gold filled jewelry has a layer - or layers - of gold mechanically bonded to a base metal, such as copper. The gold layer must have a fineness of at least 10K and must be at least 1/20 the total weight. The jewelry should be marked "gold filled" or "G.F." and state the karatage of the gold layer - 14 G.F., for example.

Rolled Gold Plate - Rolled gold plate is often used in high-quality costume jewelry. This type is made like gold-filled, but the gold layer is less than 1/20 the total weight. Markings should indicate the ratio of gold to the metals used - "1/40 12K Rolled Gold Plate."

Heavy Gold Electroplate - At least 100 millionths of an inch of gold is electrolytically electroplated to a metal base.

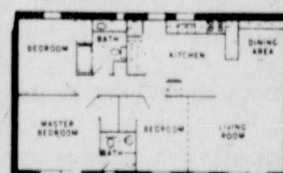

State Senator Glasgow of Stephenville, states that the State of Texas may be \$1.4 billion short of revenue in meeting the current proposed budget, based upon information he and other legislators received from the Comptroller's Office this week.

The Senator explained that this shortage was caused by revenue not being as much as anticipated, failure to include "riders" in the estimated budget totals and numerous pieces of legislation that ask for tax relief, increased support for local government or new programs.

"We are going to have to stand back and take a look at the budget as a whole and list our priorities," stated Senator Glasgow. The Senator noted that it is now belt-tightening time, as the Texas Constitution does not allow deficit spending.

Legislation the Senator listed as important to his district was the repeal of the utility sales tax on retail business, the teacher and public employee pay raises and measures giving financial support to local governments.

The Senator went on to say

that the lateral road fund was one measure that probably would not be affected by the shortage. "A portion of the motor vehicle fuel tax is dedicated to use of the counties for their roads, and this is the source of the funds for the lateral road fund," stated the Senator.

Activity in the Texas Senate this past week has involved such diverse subjects as increased funding for programs to the aged, the anticipated signing of the lateral road fund bill by the Governor, appointment of a re-districting committee and further testimony in committee hearings on the oral confessions bill.

The Senate this past week passed a House Bill that would increase the amount of funding for programs assisting the aging. The bill received strong support in the Senate and will become effective immediately upon the signature of the Governor. The monies will be administered by the Area Agencies on Aging.

The lateral road fund bill is to be signed by the Governor this week. The counties of Texas will share in an accumulated \$24.1 million in funds. These funds are earmarked for maintenance and construction of county roads in rural areas. The measure was co-sponsored by Senators Traeger, Caperton and myself in the Senate.

The Senate this past week has taken the first in its efforts for re-districting. The Resolution adopted authorizes the Senate to sit as a Committee of the Whole and named a subcommittee to develop an initial plan. This plan will be reported to the Senate of the Whole for consideration.

The final census figures are not to be received until April 1st. After that date, the subcommittee will formulate and submit an initial plan, and there the fun shall begin.

The oral confessions bill is now to be heard for the third consecutive week in the Jurisprudence Committee. Testimony is expected to be completed this week on the bill. A vote will be taken and the prospects appear good that the bill or an amended version of the bill will be reported favorably out of committee to the Senate Floor.

It is my opinion it is essential that oral confessions be admissible in a criminal prosecution. I have experienced situations as a prosecutor when the accused would orally confess to the crime and I could not use that confession and the guilty individual would go free.
