FINALLY SOMEONE is going to give some recognition to the men who fought for country during the Vietnam war.

There are a number of Vietnam veterans, or relatives of these veterans, living in Cisco. I thought this article might be of interest to those of Cisco.

The article is from Texas Legion News, which is prepared and distributed by the American Legion, Department of Texas.

The recent public rejoicing over the return of the hostages from Iran has opened again the agonizing psychological wounds of the Vietnam War.

Some 300,000 were wounded in Vietnam, 75,000 disabled, and over 57,000 died.

With us today are the amputees, the blind, the burned, and the spiritually maimed...as from every war. But Vietnam produced a new kind of veteran, embittered, cynical or ashamed, and often feeling betrayed by his own country men.

Although most of them are proud that they served, they don't advertise it. Even now, unemployment among younger Vietnam-era veterans runs higher than among nonveterans of the same age.

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tion's personality. It is time to speed up the healing of that split, to open our hearts and welcome home the Vietnam veteran too. On March 16, The American Legion will present its Distinguished Service Medal to the dead and missing Americans of Vietnam at the Tomb of the Unknowns in Arlington National Cemetery. It is the highest award of the country's largest veterans organization, and the first national recognition of this sort for those who fought in Vietnam.

It's time for all of us to separate the war from the warrior, for Americans to begin to show openly that they do appreciate the service and sacrifices of those who represented them in Vietnam.

The American Legion encourages all Americans to join with its members in a day of remembrance and gratitude on March 16, and to plan other activities to show their appreciation for the millions of Vietnam veterans who have paid dearly for even simple recognition.

SOME VIETNAM WAR FACTS

In terms of American casualties, the Vietnam conflict ranks with World War I. The toll was higher in World War II, lower in Korea. But Vietnam stands out as the most unpopular and controversial of our wars, and the longest. And whereas the previous U.S. Military involvements ended in armistice, victory, or armed truce on restored pre-war fronts, Vietnam concluded with gradual troop withdrawals and the eventual fall of Saigon.

WAR: World War I-Numbers in Uniform 4,734,991; Death by all Causes 116,516; Wounds not Mortal 204,002; Total Casualties 320,518

WAR: World War II-Numbers in Uniform 16,112,566; Death by all Causes 405,399; Wounds not Mortal 670,846; Total Casualties 1,076,245.

WAR: Korea-Numbers in Uniform 5,720,000; Death by All Causes 54,246; Wounds not Mortal 103,284; Total Casualties 157,530.

WAR: Vietnam-Numbers in Uniform 8,744,000; Death by all Causes 57,692; Wounds not Mortal 303,704; Total Casualties 361,413.

Arrington-Edwards Funeral Home of Eastland, Bakker Funeral Home of Eastland, Cisco Funeral Home of Cisco and Kimbrough Funeral Home of Cisco recently released a notification that effective 12:01 June 1, 1981 they will cease to provide ambulance service in the cities of Eastland and Cisco and in the county of Eastland.

Betty Hanna Tells Of Heart Attack, 'Miracle' Recovery

Little did I dream only a month ago that I would be writing the story of my own heart attack.

It has been a weird period for me, and I imagine only those who have shared by experience will appreciate and understand these words.

Let me explain now that what I am saying is what was told to me by others. My memory of those days in the hospital is a complete blank.

For three days before my attack I followed a normal course of daily activity, but now I have absolutely no recollection of sitting through church services in Breckenridge, of getting a haircut and a permanent the next day in Austin, or of telling my husband, Joe, that I was sick and thought I was

having a heart attack.

On the morning of Jan. 28 Joe said I told him I had been awake with indigestion since 6 a.m. I called him from the bathroom, and he found me there, my color ashen. He carried me to the bed and realized that I had stopped breathing.

He phoned Viola and Walter Grubbs, friends from Abilene who live on the fourth floor above us here in Austin, and asked them to call a doctor. Then he started giving me artificial respiration.

Joe had never practiced artificial respiration or seen it administered, but evidently divine interference guided him, because I began breathing again.

Meanwhile Mrs. Grubbs

said she opened the phone book to search for a doctor, and the phone number of the Austin Emergency Medical Services seemed to jump out at her. She called them, and they were in the apartment building in seconds, screaming up in two ambulances and a fire truck.

They rushed to my room and took over from Joe. They used every means you have heard to make my heart beat again, including electric shock and several injections of something in syringes. They removed me to Brackenridge Hospital, and the doctors began the battle to save my life.

They say it is a miracle that I am alive. When they took me to the hospital I had stopped breathing twice. The doctors advised calling the family because they considered I had about a one percent chance of living. And if I lived, chances were that I would be a vegetable from lack of oxygen to my brain for such an extended period.

The doctors battled for my life in the intensive care unit. From there I recuperated another week at Seton Medical Center and then came home to the Greenwood Towers apartment where Joe and I are living during the legislative session.

It is humbling to look back on such an experience and realize how much you owe to so many people. Joe, of course, saved my life. We have enjoyed nearly 40 years of married life, but the next ones we share will mean much more because we have shared both life and death together, and our feelings for each other is stronger, deeper and more meaningful now.

Our children were there - Judi, Steve and Mark - and though for days I could not see or hear them, I felt the strength of their wills urging me to fight, and for them I did.

My family was also there beside me, and my friends, and I know they were telling me not to give up.

I received a roomfull of flowers and hundreds of get well wishes. My friends said that thousands of prayers must have been offered for me, and I know God listened.

To all of you who sent flowers and cards, who called, who wished me well, who prayed for me, let me thank you from the depths of my heart - slightly damaged though it may be!

But the doctors say my recovery is nothing short of miraculous, and I guess the fact I am writing this supports that fact. Except for a little weakness that I'm far overcomng, and a tendency to forget names and places occasionally, I am really in good shape. So I hope to be home very soon and back on the job!

GORDON SPOT

By DeMarquis Gordon

The rains during the first half of March have been great. It seems we are ready for a good spring now. With all the fruit trees in bloom we know spring is not far off. Let's just hope winter is over and that our fruit will not be killed again this year.

While we wait to see if the fruit is going to make it this year, we must take precautions to protect the fruit from insects and diseases. That means getting the sprayer out now.

When 70% of the petals have fallen spray with Malathion, Sevin, or Zolone. Either one of these will control the insects. A fungicide is needed to control diseases. These may be mixed and sprayed on trees on the trees in one application. The fungicides you may choose from include Captan, wettable sulfur, Benomyl, or Topsin M.

One spraying will not be enough. You will need to spray three more times at 10 to 14 day intervals.

It may be necessary to repeat another spraying on late maturing varieties. Do not apply insecticides within three days of harvesting plums or within seven days of harvesting peaches.

If you would like more information on control of insects and diseases on fruit you may call or come by the Extension office and ask for a copy of the Homeowner's Fruit and Nut Spray Schedule:

Root knot nematodes are the single most important home garden disease in Eastland County. I would estimate that at least 50% of the gardens in this area are damaged by root knot.

One problem with controlling this pest is that it is hard to detect the problem early enough for gardeners to take protective measures. Once nematodes are found on

plant roots, little can be done to save that year's crop.

So, it is important to inspect the roots of plants for galls as you remove them from the garden in the fall. These galls or knots indicate the presence of root knot nematodes and this is the time to take effective steps to control the pests. Another system of root knot is stunted, yellow plants. Examine the roots of such plants for galls.

When soil temperature reaches 50 degrees F. for seven days at a depth of 6 inches, treat the area with Vapam fungicide using 1 quart water per 100 square feet. Water the chemical into the soil using 1 inch water and repeat in 48 hours.

Vapam is water soluble and will be leached down into the soil with irrigation. It is important that the chemical be moved as deep in the soil as possible to get maximum control.

This method of treatment takes care of the entire area compared to row application where only a 12-inch band is treated. After treatment, leave the area undisturbed for seven days. Then till the soil to get the chemical out. Wait an additional two weeks before planting.

Additional steps can be taken at planting to further insure nematode control. In those areas where root knot is found to be most severe in summer or fall, plant onions, garlic, or sweet corn. These crops are not susceptible to root knot, and their use will further reduce the nematode population.

Also, it should be standard practice to plant nematode resistant varieties when available.

Once nematodes are found in a garden, the control program as outlined above must be followed annually. Based on current knowledge, it is impossible to completely

eliminate nematodes from a garden. But a sound control program will keep the population at a manageable level.

The planned 1,950-foot venture is located on a 168-acre lease.

Lions Hear Talk By Press Editor At Weekly Meet

The Cisco Press cares about Cisco and wants to contribute all it can to the community's progress and general welfare. Editor Herrel Hallmark told the Lions Club in a talk last Wednesday noon at their weekly luncheon.

"We are not 'controlled' by any person or group except God, our own conscience and

ethics," Hallmark said. "We want to help Cisco grow - not tear it down with slander and/or gossip about people or businesses of the community."

Hallmark, who has been with The Press for ten years, noted that The Press is always glad to run "letters to the editor" as an avenue for local citizens to give vent to their feelings and frustrations.

"We will steadfastly refuse to publish any unsigned letter or one that is unjustly derogatory of an individual or business," he said. "In the past few weeks we have had to refuse some letters because they were written by persons who wished to shame or embarrass named individuals of our town. We refused to print at least one letter from each of the 'groups' and we feel our decisions not to print the let-

ters were fair and just to all concerned."

Hallmark added that The Press does not want to become an unsigned gossip sheet which would vie for attention with the so-called "City News," a yellow sheet thrown around town which no one seems willing to claim responsibility for.

The Press, a successor to the old Cisco Roundup, has deep roots in the community. It commenced as a four-page weekly in the 1880s. Hallmark said The Press

presently is owned by H.V. O'Brien of Eastland, who also owns newspapers in Eastland, Ranger and Rising Star. They are all printed in a modern offset plant at Eastland.

"There are two important events coming up for our citizens during the month of April," Hallmark said.

"We're observing our city's centennial and we are holding an important city election." He urged everyone to support the centennial program and to

take part in the election. Lion Bill Roberts was program chairman and introduced Hallmark, who is a native of Cisco. Guests included Mrs. Herrel Hallmark and Anna Odom, little daughter of Lion Olin Odom.

President Eddie McMillan appointed a committee of past presidents, headed by Archie Chamness, as a nominating committee to submit a slate of officers for 1981-82 at the next club meeting.
