FROM THE MAIL BAG

One of the most-often-asked questions when I speak at a seminar is: "How do you find bass on a lake you've never fished before?"

Well, first you've got to keep in mind the kinds of cover bass live in, like: weedbeds, lily pads, brush, flooded timber, reeds, overhanging trees, riprap, rocky shore bordering deep water, bridge abutments, piers, etc. I just cruise around the lake looking for such cover and fishing it with a variety of lures.

I use a variety because you can't ever be sure what ol' mister bass using a good, fine-grain file and wants at any time of day. That goes dressing the hook point until it for his old lady, too. So, I let the bree easily into your thumbnail.

SNAKE BITE!

Allan R. Magie, Ph.D., M.P.H.

Though most are harmless, and some even helpful, the sight or mention of a snake sends chills through most of us. Folklore and misinformation have grown around the slithering reptiles, their habits, appearance, and behavior. One story, circulated years ago, told of a snake that was born as a twin to a human baby!

Dismissing our fables and fears about snakes, we can be impressed by how innocently they exist in nature's cycle Snakes feed on birds, eggs, frogs, fish, and small rodents. They hunt in fields, grain stacks, shallow water, trees and bushes, marshy areas, and animal burrows. They'll often rest in a deserted house, or sun themselves on a fence or rocky ledge. Cold weather sends them into the ground. Hot weather finds them in the shade of a rock or under a bush waiting for the cooler night

It's true some snakes are poisonous, producing a venom that's injected through fangs or chewed into the victim. But even poisonous snakes are suspicious of people and will retreat if given a chance. They'll strike when they're disturbed, teased, or handled. During moulting they may be a bit more nervous and defensive, but it's only because they're slightly handicapped. Just before they shed they're nearly blind, and a quick escape is difficult.

Preventing an encounter with a poisonous snake is better than worrying about how to treat a snakebite. Know what snakes live in your area, what they look like, and where they are likely to be found. A pair of high boots, loose pants, sharp eyes, and common sense are your best protection when walking in areas likely to harbor snakes. While hiking or climbing, don't place your hands or feet where you can't see. Don't reach into rodent holes or

thick foliage. Watch the trail. If a snake does strike, you are not likely to move fast enough to avoid being bitten. The strike is the quickest movement any animal can make. It often comes without warning. A snake can strike



The outlook for continued growth in Texas agriculture is bright, and the demand for food and fiber from countries overseas is growing. With good export facilities, the state's agricultural industry is ready to expand its share of the export market which in turn will translate into more jobs and income for both rural and urban

U.S. Agriculture Still A Top Industry

Today's consumers benefit from the fact that U.S. agriculture remains a giant among American industries. It sill has the capacity, says Dr. W.E. Black, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, to produce all the food needed at home as well as for many people abroad.

The average U.S. farmer today feeds 48 at home and 22 abroad. This so-called capacity is primarily the result of new technology and capital flowing into agriculture. But, productivity in agriculture is slowing down, Black warns, primarily because of the reduced research support to this critical industry.

"U.S. agriculture plays a vital role in defraying part of the mounting fuel import bill. In 1981, we will likely export \$48.5 billion of food and import about \$18.5 billion. U.S. agriculture will generate about a \$30 billion positive balance of trade. In order to bring in these dollars, the U.S. will export about 163 billion metric tons of food and fiber"

"The world is better off because the U.S. is an agricultural giant", Black says. "Our future food supply depends on increasing yields per acre, rather than putting new lands under the plow. Today, the farmer is using more sophisticated machinery, better seeds, herbicides, insecticides, antibiotics, and so on. With increased research support, he may well be poised on the threshold of even greater technological revolution," he adds.

Increasing costs of capital, fuel, water, labor and other production needs are of much concern to farmers. Producers are not always able to transfer these rising costs to consumers as they occur, and consquently many are caught up in a tight cost-price squeeze very rapidly

Reflections **Perspective** By I. Will Ussery

The very old and very small port city of Fao, Iraq is without contest one of the dirtiest, smelliest towns it has ever been my privilege to visit. And I lived in our construction camp on the northern fringe of the town for eleven months.

The town has long since been replaced by Basra, some sixty miles inland on the Shatt al Arab River as the principal port, but it still boasts its Customs' Office, and a few small coastal vessels put into Fao to discharge their cargo. The only connection between Fao and the rest of the country is via the one road to Basra, and via the river.

The Oil Company has a small loading terminal on the bank of the river just upstream from Fao, and the storage tanks for that terminal and for the much larger...huge, in fact...deepwater termianl out in the Persian Gulf past the mouth of the river are situated in the mud flats outside the

Fao sits somehwat precariously on the bank, the west bank, of the "Shatt" in the midst of date palm gardens and give the impression of having been pre-fabricated from mud brick a thousand years ago and just sort of scattered like jackstraws in its present position. And no one has taken the trouble to straighten it out. The strip of date gardens is less than a mile wide at Fao, and quickly tapers off into nothing but tidal mudflats a short distance downstream. Immediately to the west of the frings of dates lies "Mumm-la-hah", or

'The Salt Place". It is there that tidal waters are entrapped in vast "pans" formed by small dykes. The dykes extend only barely above the tide, and the water is allowed in through cuts in the banks. The cuts are closed and the water is allowed to evaporate, leaving a deposit of salt which is scraped from the ground and shipped up the river on barges to Basra where it is somewhat cleaned and refined. Quite a principal source of salt for the entire country, actually.

The range of the tide at Fao averages thirteen feet, and it would appear that the town itself rests at an elevation of something like fifteen feet ... at most. The desert flats which commence not far south of Basra and extend right on to the mudflats of Fao and Mumm-la-hah are totally barren, although in flying over the desert traces of the ruins of cities which thrived in Biblical times can be seen. Legendarily, Abraham and his family originated there in one of those longforgotten cities. But back to Fao, its dusty alleys, flies, smells of drying fish and open sewers which flow into the river through the date palms.

The desert slopes very gently into the Gulf to the southwest of Fao, and it is across this gentle slope that the tide rises and falls. At low tide there is a mudflat of more than fives miles, at a point or two. It was across that mudflat and on out into the Gulf to the new terminal of Khor al Amaya we were engaged to construct a pair of large-diameter pipelines for the purpose of diverting the Oil Company's loadings from the riverbank. And getting those pipelines across the mudlfats appeared to be unsurmountable chore. One contractor had already tried ... and had failed.

We set out upon a scheme which proved ultimately to be successful. We would dredge a "flotation ditch" large enough in width and depth to accomodate a 400 ft. construction barge. The ditch would originate along Khor Abdullah, which was the channel which ran inland to the west of the mudflats and would terminate where the mud rose to an elevation slightly above the reach of the tide. After considerable effort, we were able to conduct a reasonably accurate survey which indicated the total required length of the dredge channel to be 26,500 feet. Not all of that was totally exposed at low tide, but the majority of it was. We engaged the services of what was then the world's largest suction dredge to cut our ditch.

Now to reach the dredge by sea a journey of more than forty miles was required. Down the river to Kafka Light, a starboard turn at the Light to Khor Abdullah Light, another turn to the right and thence to the outer mouth of the dredged channel. And the weather was not always to be depended upon to be cooperative. The Oil Company had an "Air Boat" which they placed at our disposal. It became my personal vehicle for daily visits to the dredge to collect progress reports from the two young British engineers I had stationed aboard the dredge to collect the necessary data.

The air boat is a very light, very shallow hull on the stern of which is mounted a small aircraft engine. The engine is fixed to a structure which puts the propellor has access to free air. It is also high enough to allow the same propellor to clear the hull of the small boat ... and its passengers. Noisy! And the craft had a peculiar affinity for a moist track. It would travel a mile a minute on the damp mud, but if you were out on the flats too long, and the sun and wind happened to dry them...you were stranded until the following high tide. So; I was at the mercy of the tides in obtaining my daily reports.

Now the air boat came complete, with operator. And the operator was one, each, very robust Arab (I suspected him of being a Kurd) who proudly bore the name of Jaffar bin Mohammed. And Jaffar bin Mohammed was a con artist of the first water. His philosophy seemed to be "He who speaks first, speaks the truth". And Jaffar bin Mohammed always tried to get in the first word, unless he was being subjected to questioning in which case he would try to make his replies as convincing as possible.

The Oil Company had several Iraqi employees working at Fao. And the majority of them lived in Basra. The Company operated busses which hauled the employees along the road across the desert skirting the date palms to Fao. The outward trip was made on Saturday, the first working day of the Moslem week, and returned with the men on Thursday. We,

being totally profit-oriented Americans had the ridiculous custom of working seven days a week...and all hours of each of those seven days. Incomprehensible to such as Jaffar bin Mohammed.

And it was Thursday. The bus would depart at noon. Jaffar bin Mohammed was waiting patiently in the outer office for me to tell him that he was free to go to the bus station. When a case is transferred to the Eleventh Court of Appeals, the judges travel to hear oral arguments, but the research and paper work is still done here. All cases filed in this district are presently heard at the courtroom in Eastland. Research and paper work pertaining to these cases are also done

In the past, certain people have wanted to move the court of Abilene. At different times, legislation has been introduced to have the court moved. When this has happened, people from Eastland have rallied to meet the challenge. A sufficient airport has been built and the

courtroom updated. But there is no Eastland clamor now.

According to County Judge Scott Bailey, if our legislative body wants to pass a bill allowing all courts to hear arguments from cases in their district in other towns where the court is not situated that is fine.

If the Eleventh Court is singled out, that is discrimintory.

Arguments have been stated that Eastland is not centrally located and thus the court should be moved.

This can be said for other district courts but so far no legislation is pending to move their courts or transfer cases within their districts.

Many local people feel the current legislation is a first step in moving the court permanently from Eastland.






