## Of No Value Until You Give It Away?

Did you ever own anything that was of no value to you until you gave it away? Most of the property owners in the City of Cisco are owners of something that will never be of any value to them until they give it away. It could then become very profitable to them as a reflection of what it could do for them.

Let me explain in detail how the owners of City of Cisco property could benefit from something they own by giving it away.

First, most all of the property owners in Cisco own oil and gas and other minerals under their property.

Second, it will never benefit them under their ownership because it would be out of the question for someone or a company to try to lease the minerals under lots enough to cover 40 acre tracts, which would be the necessary acreage for an economical location to drill a well for oil and/or gas. But if the City of Cisco owned the minerals, they then could make a lease that would cover all the minerals that was given them and collect the bonuses for the City Treasury.

Third, when the City has received the highest bid for

bonuses for the lease, the company would then start a development program, selecting a location that would not interfere with the homes or businesses, drill for oil and/or gas and according to geological surveys proper locations would encounter oil and/or gas in the drilling of wells.

Fourth, when oil and/or gas is found the City of Cisco would then be receiving royalty income from the production of these wells. At the present price, should a well be drilled and production be found the city would get 12.5 barrels of oil from every hundred barrels of oil produced. The city would be exempt from paying the Windfall Profit Tax.

The present price of oil is \$38.00 per barrel. If the drilling program encountered production in ten wells over the city limits each well making only 40 barrels per day, this would generate income for the City of Cisco amounting to \$1,900.00 per day, \$57,000.00 per month, \$684,000.00 per year. If, in these wells drilled, there was a reasonable amount of gas produced it would not take too much gas at the present price or gas to increase that income from production to

## LOCAL VOTERS CAST BALLOTS

Local registered voters were casting their ballots in the City, Hospital and School elections here Saturday morning. A record turn-out of voters had been forecast for the April 4th election with some observers predicting 1,200 to 1,500 voters.

The polls at the Corral Room of the Laguna Hotel opened at 7 a.m. and closed at 7 p.m.

The City of Cisco election ballot provided for voters to choose councilmen for Place five and six. Two candidates were running for Place Five—Ivan Webb and Audye Wagley. There were three candidates for Place Six—Randy Linn, Jay Maples and Bobby Ingram.

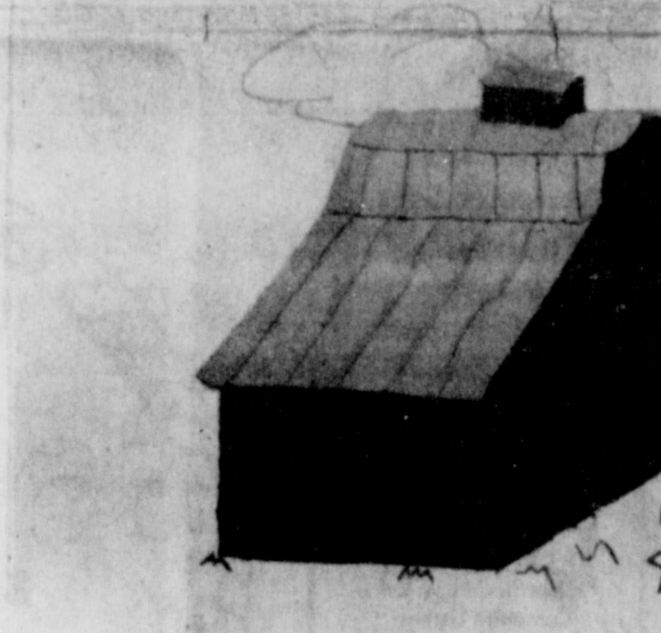
Mayor Roy Cartee and Council Members Louise Allison, Jerry Jeffcoat, Harold Pippen and William J. Eudy were listed on the recall section of the city election ballot.

This was the first time in the community's 100 years that voters were being asked to vote a recall ballot.

In the public school trustee election, the ballot listed three candidates for two vacancies. Incumbent Willis Parker was unopposed for Place Four. B.D. Trice opposed Incumbent Johnny Cagle for Place Five.

There were three candidates for two vacancies on the board of the E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital. They were Bruce Stovall, Armo Chambers and Dell J. Crockett.

The citizens of Cisco would not be out any money, all they would have to do is enjoy all the improvements of the City of Cisco.

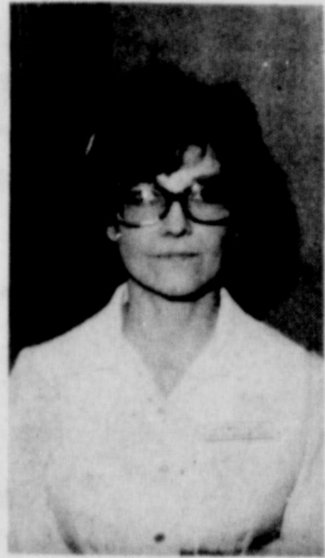

## E.L. Graham Hospital To Negotiate Lease With SHMA

The board of directors of E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital has announced plans to negotiate a lease arrangement with Southwestern Health Management Affiliates (SHMA), an affiliate of Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene. The announcement was made by Dr. E.E. Addy

Jr., chairman of the Hospital District Board and chief of the medical staff.

Director of Nursing Kay Mosley, pictured above, has assumed duties as director of nursing at the E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital. She grew up here and is a graduate of Cisco Junior College and the Tarleton State University School of Nursing. She has been employed as a nurse for 13 years. Mrs. Mosley is the wife of Gary Mosley, employed by United Energy here, and they have three children.

The unanimous decision to seek the lease came during the regular March 23 board meeting after three months of study, said Dr. Addy. The next step, he said, is to work out contract details, and it is expected that the agreement will be signed within 60-90 days.

"It is obviously becoming increasingly difficult for a small hospital such as ours to survive amid federal and state regulations, an uncertain economy and increasing operating costs," said Dr. Addy. "We believe this management arrangement is the best way we can assure the city and hospital district of continued quality medical care and keep our hospital from becoming a health care casualty."

Through the lease arrangement SHMA will provide the 30-bed Graham Memorial Hospital with financial backing, management expertise, consulting services, and participation in group purchasing arrangements.

Also through this association, Hendrick Medical Center will work directly with Graham Memorial in the recruitment and retention of qualified physicians for the Cisco hospital district, as well as working

closely with the City of Cisco and other area cities to attempt to resolve the ambulance service problem.

Hendrick Medical Center has already been providing interim administrative support to Graham Memorial since mid-March when former administrator Garner Altom left to head the admissions department at Hendrick Medical Center.

Dr. Addy emphasized, however, that the new management lease will in no way effect the location, name or ownership of Graham Memorial.

# CONSTRUCTION OF MORMON CHAPEL

One of the busiest places in Eastland these days is the construction site of the Chapel of the Latter Day Saints - (Mormons) - located on County Road just south of Oak Meadows Sub-division. Work on the 3½ acres of land is supervised by Owen Whiteman, a Building Superintendent with Bud Bailey Construction Co. of Salt Lake City, Utah. Eight workmen are employed on the project - several who came with the company, and local Sub-contractors.

"We are in phase one and two of a five-phase project here," says Mr. Whiteman, looking across massive foundations on the oak-dotted shelf of land. "We started this building more than two months ago, and hope to be finished in July. The Foundation and side walks are finished; the floors will be poured soon. In this area we will have a Chapel, baptis-

timal fount, classrooms and a kitchen. All plumbing and air conditioning will be laid in for the completed project. This first part of the project will be in all-wood siding, in earth tones, and composition shingles. Eventually all portions of the Chapel will have brick siding, and the building will be about four times the size of this 3,700 sq. ft. building."

Mr. Whiteman explains that this type of Chapel is distinct from a Mormon Temple, which contains areas for ordinances of more sacred nature. The local Chapel, however, will be headquarters of the Eastland Branch of the Ft. Worth Stake, with Norman Rawson of Cisco as Branch President. The local Church is also served by two Missionaries - Sisters Nancy Wakefield and Cassie Lynch. These leaders and about 80 members in the area are looking forward to attending the new Chapel.

"This Chapel, I believe, will be unique among Church buildings in Eastland - both in facilities and construction," says Superintendent

Whiteman. "For one thing, its foundation makes it an almost indestructible building. It is concrete, 9 inches through, set four ft. deep, with 3½ tons of steel reinforcing bolted into the walls.

"Eastland has no zoning ordinances or building inspections. But Church architects in Salt Lake City set up standards for our buildings, standards which are adapted to local terrain and conditions by an architect from the area. We are using an architect from Ft. Worth, and the building will have its final inspection from him.

"When all the facility is completed, there will be a large Recreation Hall, featuring a place for indoor basketball, a theatre, musical program and dances. This, under the same roof as the Chapel, will afford a place for an active youth program. There will be no place in this Chapel, however, for mass storage of food or relief supplies. These are kept at other designated areas.

have very eye-catching landscaping for the Chapel grounds. We have tried to save all the native oak trees possible, and other trees and shrubs will be added."

Mr. Whiteman grew up in the town of Bountiful, Utah, north of Salt Lake City, and his permanent home is located there. But he and his wife Yvonne and their four children are living in the country near Cisco during this construction project.

"When I heard the Company wanted me to come to Texas, all I could think about was 'Sand and Cactus!' He laughs. "I had never lived in Texas before, you see. But I was agreeably surprised by this area, with its hills and oaks. And I couldn't ask for better building weather than we've had during the construction here. I called Salt Lake City yesterday, and it was snowing."

When asked about the differences between this area and where he grew up, Mr. Whiteman replied:

"The place where I live is about 85 per cent Mormon, and Utah as a whole has about a 60 per cent Mormon population. So one of the first things I noticed, outwardly; was the smoking in public places, such as grocery stores.

Then I noticed how many different kinds of Churches there are in this area - it is really astonishing. I had been a Missionary in Ireland, so I was accustomed to other groups, but I had not seen so many in one place. They all seem to get along together. And although Mormons are a small group here, we have had good friendly treatment. So I like Eastland County very much.

"When this Chapel is completed in July, there will be a special program with a Dedication Service. The Church will want the public to come out and see the facility. It is hoped that the Chapel will make a real contribution to the religious life of this area."

## Lions Hear About Building of Gas Plant in Africa

The building of a plant that converted natural gas into liquid form in Algeria was described for members of the Cisco Lions Club by J.W. Cook, retired engineer, in a talk at their weekly luncheon last Wednesday noon.

Mr. Cook, a native Ciscoan who spent a good many years in engineering assignments throughout the world, said the Algerian plant liquified natural gas that was loaded on specially constructed ships bound for ports in the United States and elsewhere.

The plant was finished in 1977 and is over a mile long. Algeria, he said, has enough natural gas to serve the world's need for a hundred or more years.

There are two ports in the United States where the gas ships could be unloaded, Mr. Cook said. Others were planned but environmentalists blocked their construction. He sees no danger to anything or anyone in the plants.

The Algerian project, which was to have expanded the plant very considerable, apparently has been abandoned. The Algerian government decided that it was not getting enough for the gas, and to permit a price hike to meet the demand would upset markets in the United States.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

RE: Cisco Historic District Bound by T&P Railway Lines, First Street, 9th Street, Avenue J, 14th Street, and Railway Right-of-Way Cisco, Eastland County, Texas

The Cisco Historic District will be considered by the Texas State Board of Review for nomination to the National Register of Historic Places. The National Register is the Federal Government's official list of historic buildings and other

cultural resources worthy of preservation. Listing in the National Register makes private property owners eligible to be considered for Federal grants-in-aid for historic preservation and provides limited protection through comment by the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation on the effect of federally financed, assisted, or licensed undertakings on historic properties. If a property is depreciable and located in a district in the National

Register and the property contributes to the district, there are also certain provisions of the Tax Reform Act of 1976 that may apply. Section 2124 of the Tax Reform Act of 1966 encourages preservation of historic depreciable structures by allowing favorable tax treatments for rehabilitation. In addition, it discourages destruction of historic buildings by eliminating certain otherwise available Federal tax benefits both for demolition of historic structures and for

new construction on the site of demolished historic buildings. If the property contains coal resources and is listed in the National Register, certain provisions of the Surface Mining and Control Act of 1977 make it less likely that surface mining of the coal will be permitted by the State or Federal Government. It is also important to emphasize what does not happen as an automatic result of National Register listing. The owner is not required to

open the property to the public and does not have to have privately-financed alterations, additions, or even demolition approved by the Texas Historical Commission or the Department of the Interior. The only times when either of these agencies become involved is if there is some kind of Federal funding connected to the project. That is, if the owner accepts a grant, the property must be maintained in proper condition for a certain number of years and the work financed must be visible to the public. Or, rehabilitation projects for which the owner files for the tax benefits must be in accordance with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation.

Finally, any Federally funded, licensed, or assisted activity with a particular property will also bring the Advisory Council for Historic Preservation and the Texas Historical Commission into the planning process, in order to insure that the site or structure's historic significance is not adversely impacted.

If you wish to comment on whether the property should be nominated to the National Register, send your comments to Truett Latimer, State Historic Preservation Officer, Texas Historical Commission, P.O. Box 12276, Austin, TX 78711. Comments must be received before the State Board of Review considers this nomination on

May 2, 1981. The meeting will be held that day at 9:30 a.m. at the Community Center, Port Aransas, Texas. You are welcome to attend the meeting if you wish. We would appreciate your notifying us if you plan to be there so that we can arrange the agenda accordingly.

The 1980 Amendments to the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 require the concurrence of private owners of properties nominated to the National Register. Final guidelines on how that concurrence is to be documented have not been formulated. Until they are approved and implemented, the U.S. Department of the Interior will not review any privately owned properties. Should the Cisco Historic District be approved by the State Board of Review May 2, the nomination must be held at the Texas Historical Commission office until the Department of the Interior gives permission to again submit privately owned properties. 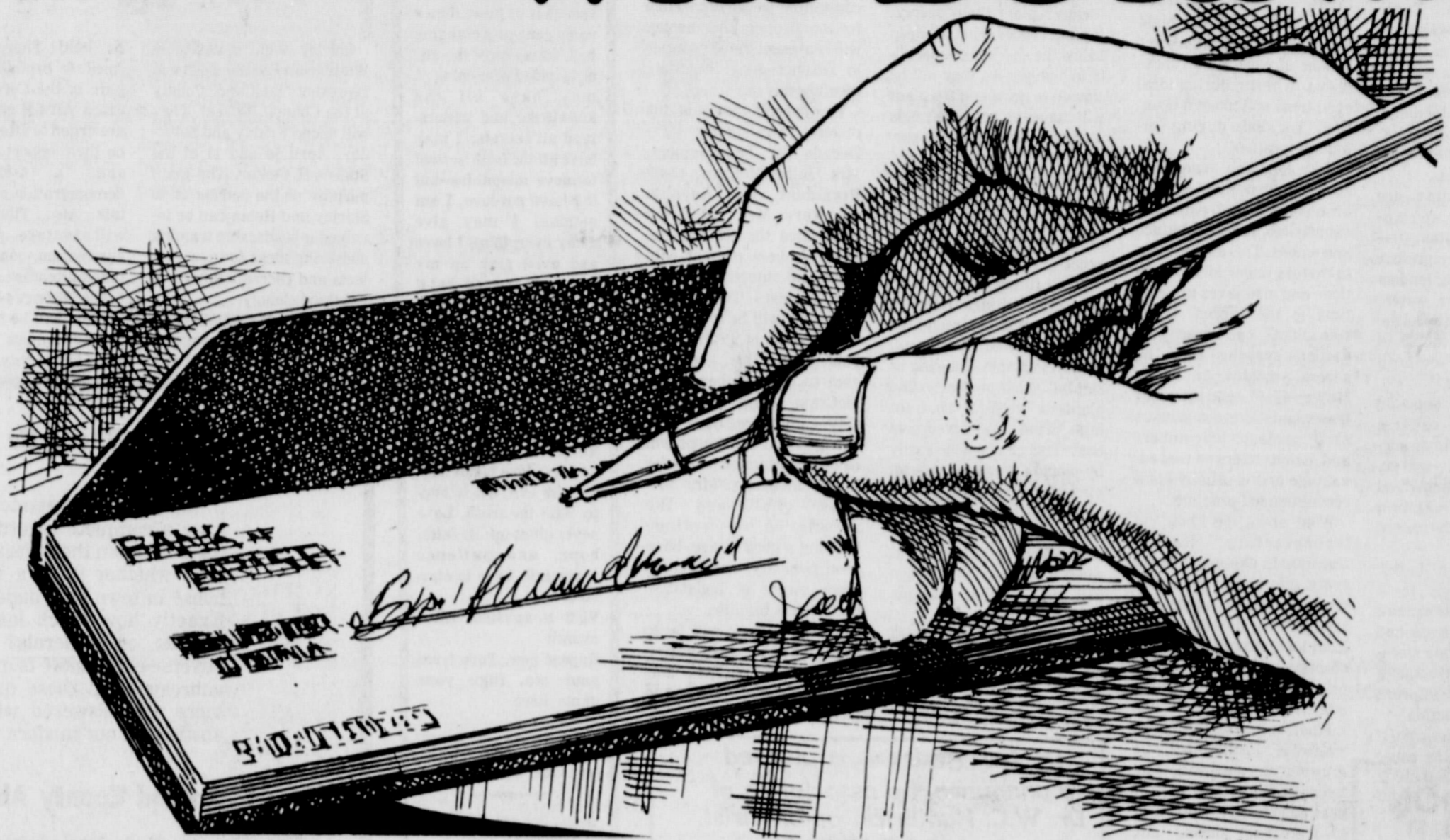

# GORDON SPOT

Oak bud poisoning can be a serious problem in livestock each spring, and this spring the potential is especially great.

Drouth, high summer temperatures, early frost and winter moisture have led to a situation of little or no high quality rangeland forage in certain areas of Texas. Oaks, particularly shin oaks, in these areas present a poisoning problem in late March and April.

Oakbuds when eaten by livestock, especially cattle, cause poisoning. Toxic substances of oaks are thought to be tannins. These are most toxic when oaks are budding and leafing. When more than 50% of the diet is oak, animals become sick. More than a 75% diet of oak usually causes death.

Signs of poisoning are gaunt, tucked up appearance; constipation, frequently followed by profuse diarrhea; weakness; tendency to remain near water; reluctance to follow the herd, emaciation; mucus in droppings; dark-colored urine; and collapse.

Move animals showing symptoms to an oak-free pasture and put them on adequate feed and water. Feeding a supplemental feed containing 10% calcium hydroxide may help reduce losses.

Prevention is a better cure. Control oak in a pasture and save the pasture as a reserve for the oak-bud season. Use moderate stocking and a deferred-rotation grazing program to improve range forage production.

Consult a veterinarian if you are unsure of the cause.

of livestock poisoning and losses.

While it is best to seed some vegetables directly in the home garden, others do best if transplanted. In this area of Texas tomatoes, peppers and eggplant should always be set out in the garden as transplants. The reason for this is the weather. These vegetables are somewhat fickle when it comes to ideal environmental conditions for setting fruit. Bloom and fruit set must occur before temperatures get too high. Setting out transplants after danger of frost allows these plants to bloom during ideal conditions and to set a bountiful harvest during optimum weather.

You can also transplant such so-called "cool season" crops such as cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli, lettuce and onions. This allows them to mature under ideal conditions and also saves growing time in the garden. Using transplants can lessen the garden growing time by several months or more. However, setting out transplants of crops such as okra, squash, cucumbers and melons offers no real advantage and is usually not a recommended practice.

What about the "how" of transplanting? Handle transplants like eggs! Make every effort to avoid undue stress to young plants. Be sure plants do not suffer from lack of moisture, wind damage or excessive heat prior to and immediately after transplanting.

Most plants that are available locally will be growing in plantable containers such as peat pots or peat cubes. If possible, plan to transplant during late afternoon or at least on a cloudy day. I personally think it is a good idea to set your transplants in a bucket or pan of water for several minutes prior to planting so

the root system is thoroughly wet.

Determine the proper spacing for the crop and dig a hole 4 inches wide and 4-6 inches deep. Put about a cupful of water directly in the hole and allow it to soak in. Set the transplant in the center of the hole and fill in with soil. Make certain the peat container is completely beneath the soil level as it may act like a wick and rapidly dry out the rootball, thus killing the plant.

Depth of planting is important and often beginners make the mistake of setting plants too deep in the soil. Set most transplants only slightly deeper than they were originally growing. If tomato plants are tall and "leggy" plant them deeper. If plant roots are set too deep below the soil level, especially in heavy soils, they will be slow to grow and the plant will have to produce roots along the stem near the surface. The original roots may, or may not, grow eventually. Either way, the advantages of transplanting are lost and harvest may be delayed greatly.

When filling the hole with soil at planting, leave a slight depression around the plant to hold additional water from spot watering or rainfall. Also protect young plants a week or so from high wind and excessive heat. This can be done easily by placing a shingle, board, milk carton or some similar protection on the windy or sunny side of the plant. A can placed around the transplant when it is set in the garden will also prevent damage from pesky cutworms.

So much for the art of transplanting. Next I will go into greater detail on how to grow tomatoes like you have never grown them before.

**Homemaking Hints**

By Janet Thomas

Home sewing is a great way to fight inflation. Generally speaking, you can sew a quality garment for 1/2 of the cost of a ready-made garment.

If you are planning to do some spring sewing, here is some information that will save you both time and money.

Before you start sewing spring-fashion items, take inventory of the fabric notions and patterns you have on hand. Your savings can be considerable in terms of storage space, money and time.

**Why Organize?** There are several good reasons. You may be a collector of fabric and have various yardages from years back. You may have bought thread on sale only to discover that you already have 6 spools of white thread and don't need anymore. You may also have some spools of color you don't even like. We all make mistakes in purchases. Get rid of these! They are confusing and they take up valuable space. Give these items to someone or garage-sale them since one person's "junk" may become someone else's "treasure".

**Set Up Files.** This will assist you in inventorying your sewing materials. One idea is a metal file box (such as a recipe file) and 3x5-inch cards. **FABRIC FILE** - Many people purchase fabric and forget they have it. To prevent this from happening, clip a swatch of each fabric you have on hand and all newly added purchases as you go. Attach each to a file card.

On the card write the fabric content, care, width and length of each yardage. This way the swatches will be easily accessible for color matching and eliminate measuring a second time.

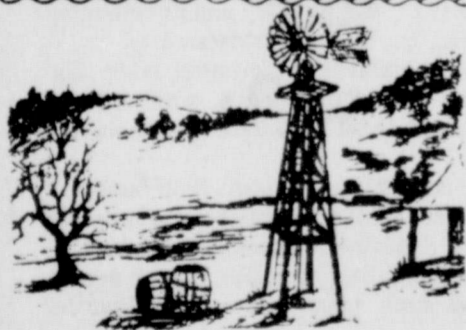
